## JOURNAL

The Sixteenth Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of the Philippine Islands was held at the Cathedral of S. Mary and S. John, Manila, on Friday, April 8, 1921.

The Convocation began with a celebration of the Holy Communion at 7 a. m., the Bishop being the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. G. C. Bartter.

Morning Prayer was read at 9 o'clock by the Rev. A. E. Frost, assisted by the Rev. Hobart E. Studley, at which the Bishop read his annual address.

The Convocation was called to order at 9:30, the Bishop presiding.

A roll call showed the following persons present: The Bishop, the Rev. Hobart E. Studley, the Rev. A. E. Frost, the Rev. G. C. Bartter, the Rev. Ben Ga Pay, and Mr. A. W. B. Frederick, a delegate from the Cathedral Parish.

The Rev. Hobart E. Studley was elected Secretary of Convocation.

The Convocation having no funds there was no report from the treasurer.

The Rev. G. C. Bartter, President of the Council of Advice, read the report of the Council for the year 1920.

The Bishop reported that he was in correspondence with Dr. Merrill of the Bureau of Science looking forward to the publication of the Igorot Grammar by Miss Waterman and Ilokano Grammar by Mrs. Bartter.

The Bishop re-appointed the Council of Advice: the Rev. G. C. Bartter, the Rev. H. E. Studley, Mr. W. H. Birt and Mr. A. D. Cooper.

The Rev. H. E. Studley proposed the following amendment to the title of Art. 7 of the constitution: That the word "District" be changed to "Convocation"; the Rev. G. C. Bartter seconded it and it was unanimously carried.

The Rev. H. E. Studley was elected Treasurer of Convocation.

The Bishop was elected Registrar of Convocation.

There being no further business the Convocation adjourned to meet at the call of the Bishop.

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## ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP

MY BRETHREN:

The Constitution of the Missionary District requires that there shall be an Annual Convocation, and it is in conformity with this requirement that the present meeting has been summoned. The last

Convocation was that held during the visitation of Bishop Graves on St. Andrew's Day, November 30, 1918. For over a year after that there was no Bishop present and no Convocation was held. I was consecrated as the second Bishop of the Philippine Islands on February 25, 1920, and arrived in Manila, March 13. I found it impossible to call Convocation in 1920, and the present has seemed the earliest time at which the provision of the Constitution could be carried out.

In greeting you for the first time in Convocation I wish to record my appreciation of the cordiality with which I have been received in the Diocese, the co-operation that has been given me, and the faithfulness and steadiness with which the various works of the Diocese have been carried on throughout a period of trial, uncertainty and lack of support such as has scarcely, if ever, been the lot of any missionary work of the Church of which I have had knowledge. The situation was most difficult, and for that matter has not seen much of improvement up to the present time. Unrest had crept in—missionaries had come, and gone almost as soon as they arrived—institutions and stations were without heads, or under direction (in some cases) of those who had not had opportunity to learn their needs, opportunities or purposes—finances were chaotic—and on every side there was work to be done where it had once been carried on as well as opportunities offered to us in new places, all of which had to be neglected because there was no one to do the work or to seize the opportunities. It soon became a question with me whether I should go immediately to America and endeavor to strengthen our sources of supply there or remain here and make as my main effort that of placing the house in order as best I might. There can be no doubt that there was but the one thing to do. Criticism might be made that disproportionate time and energy had been given to a single congregation; but I wish to place on record that the close connection of this congregation with the Cathedral Church has made my Acting-Rectorship the means by which, more than anything else could have done, my ideas have been cleared and my plans for the Diocese formed. I shall not deny that the more than double burden has been, and is, a very heavy one—but I am satisfied that it has been a valuable aid and I am grateful for what it has done for me. The cost has been great, for at the end of my first year I find myself with no knowledge of any one of the languages spoken by the natives of the Islands (a knowledge that is of prime necessity to any and every missionary who wishes to get down into the inmost recesses of the hearts of the people to whom God has sent him): nor have I been able to study anything else, or even to read, as I should have done. No day has gone by without my realizing that different members of the missionary staff have found me lacking in many things that

they naturally expected to find present in their Bishop—more, I venture to think, than would have been found if conditions had been more normal. I can only ask their indulgence, and their prayers that as the years go on God will strengthen me for the work to which He has called me.

It is not my purpose today to dwell at greater length upon these things. I append a copy of my First Annual Report to the Presiding Bishop, which states as clearly as I am able to state it now my impression of the present condition of the work in the Diocese, and my hopes and plans for the immediate future. It contains also my record of official acts for the ten months since my consecration.

And now, I commend you to God. It is His call that has brought us here; it is His work that we are doing. We have only to do His bidding as faithfully as we may, and to remember always that thing which at times is so difficult to keep within our grasp when many of the details are so decidedly of the earth, earthy,—to remember that our work for Him is a spiritual one, and that its one and only object is the bringing of souls into a relationship with Him that is so entirely spiritual as to teach men how to live in the world without becoming worldly; how so to learn Christ that in their own lives they reveal Him to their fellow-men.

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## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF ADVICE

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1920

The Council of Advice has been composed of the following: Dean A. B. Parson, resigned; the Rev. Hobart E. Studley, the Rev. G. C. Bartter, Messrs. W. N. Burdick, resigned; A. D. Cooper, Secretary; and W. H. Birt.

Meetings were held on January 12, 24 and 28; February 26; March 28, and October 8.

The following matters were considered:

*January 12.*—The treasurer was authorized to use ₱1,000.00 appropriated for the Cathedral Dormitory towards liquidation of debt of ₱1,656.28 left over by the late superintendent. Dormitory rate raised to ₱30.00 per month. Permission given to the Chinese Mission committee to increase the salary of the Rev. Ben Ga Pay ₱160.00 for the year 1920.

*January 24.*—The matter of ministrations at the Bontoc Mission was considered, and Fr. Frost was requested to supply them with the necessary services. Permission granted the Chinese Mission committee to increase the salary of the Rev. Ben Ga Pay by ₱30.00 per month.

*January 28.*—The affairs of the Bontoc Mission were considered, and further steps taken to provide the Mission with proper oversight. Permission given to rent Baguio Rectory to a prospective tenant.

*February 26.*—A letter from Deaconess Peppers applying for educational allowance for her daughter was endorsed.

*March 28.*—Decided to discontinue the Cathedral Dormitory as a dormitory for Filipino students, owing to lack of a suitable superintendent and also of commendable results in the past, and offer it for one year to a committee of the American School Incorporated for a school for American and European children.

*October 8.*—Various medical bills were approved. It was decided that as no apportionment had been made, none should be levied for the year 1920.

Baguio School affairs were considered, the Bishop stating that if the Department of Missions would finance the project to the extent of \$5,000.00 over a period of 5 years, he believed it would be feasible to reopen the school provided a headmaster were obtainable. The Council endorsed this policy.

Birt for his work of supervision.

At the April meeting Bishop Mosher was present and presided for the first time.

The resignation of Dean Parson was accepted with regret. Mr. F. C. de T. Glazebrook, Col. E. A. Root and Mr. Basil G. Butler were elected as members. The Bishop was requested to act as Dean until such time as a successor to Dean Parson be appointed.

At the October meeting the treasurer's report for six months was accepted. Permission was given Mrs. J. E. Ainsworth to

install a stained glass window in memory of her husband. The Chapter approved of the change in the Sunday services adopted by the Cathedral Vestry.

REPORT OF THE CATHEDRAL BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S  
AUXILIARY TO THE DEPARTMENT OF  
MISSIONS

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1920

Dear Sir:

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Cathedral at Manila met regularly for business on the third Monday in January, February and March, the Vice-President, Deaconess Massey, presiding up to the time of the arrival of Mrs. G. F. Mosher, who had been elected President. Owing to the

absence from Manila of many of our active members, work has been carried on under great difficulty; meetings were discontinued during the hot season as usual, and owing to the impossibility of securing a quorum, no regular business meetings have been held since March. Our work has not stopped, however, and with the return of old members and the addition of new ones, a new interest in the Auxiliary is promised for the coming year.

Addresses were made at the different meetings by Mrs. Mosher on work in China, and by Deaconess Routledge and Miss Diggs on their work in the out-stations at Tukuran and Alab. A report from our delegate to the Auxiliary meetings at General Convention in Detroit in October, 1919, was read at the January meeting. A Bible study class was organized under the leadership of Mrs. J. A. Massey, who was also present at the Convention in Detroit and is therefore well informed as to the newest developments in Auxiliary work. Seven meetings of this class were held.

The Lenten sewing meetings were held at the Bishop's house. Fifty hospital shirts were made for the hospital in Zamboanga and sixteen purificators for the Mission stations in Alab and Bontok. In October of this year, the annual Christmas Sale was held at which articles made during the year at the Missions were sold for their benefit. **APPENDIX C**  
**THE HOUSE OF THE HOLY CHILD**  
**MANILA**

The House of the Holy Child is incorporated under the laws of the Philippine Islands for the purpose of "providing a home for Filipina and American Mestiza girls whose parents are dead or who have been abandoned, and for settlement work among the children of the neighborhood."

At the close of the year 1920 there were 32 girls in the house a few of whom are supported by parents or friends. All of the girls are legal wards of the house.

During the year one of the girls left to help Miss Bartter at the Moro Settlement House, Zamboanga, one was married to a member of the parish, one was given back to her father and taken to America, and one new girl was taken in.

The house has been in financial difficulty during the year, having ended some months with an overdraft at the bank; but we succeeded in ending the year with a balance in hand of ₱606.16.

The year has seen two changes in the personnel of the house. Miss Bartter left to resume her work in Zamboanga in January owing to the arrival of Mrs. L. Allen, a regularly appointed worker from New York.

Mrs. Allen resigned in November, and was succeeded by Mrs. A. I. B. Massey, who was here visiting Deaconess Massey, and very kindly stepped into the gap. Mrs. Massey was still resident worker at the close of the year, and has promised to stay till March 1.

Continuity is a thing the house has badly lacked in the past, and something that is essential to the successful accomplishment of our purposes for the girls. Sisters are our only solution of this problem.
