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NOTICE IN REFERENCE TO BEQUESTS.

As the kind intentions of some of the deceased friends of the Society have been rendered abortive for want of correct knowledge of the law, the Committee call special attention to the following directions:—

REQUISITES FOR VALIDITY OF WILL.—It should be remembered in the first place that, (a) A will must be in writing, and signed at the foot or end thereof by the Testator or by some other person in his presence and by his direction; (b) Such signature must be made or acknowledged by the Testator in the presence of two Witnesses, who must be present at the same time, and (c) Such Witnesses must attest and subscribe the will in the presence of the Testator.

GIFTS BY WILL TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.—Gifts by will to the Baptist Missionary Society and other Charitable Institutions were formerly subject to restrictions stated in the "Notice in Reference to Bequests" contained in previous reports. But the effect of the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891 (54 and 55 Vict. c. 73), Secs. 3 and 5 and 9, is that no gift in favour of a Charitable Institution, made by the will of a Testator dying after August 5th, 1891, can be void by reason of the subject matter of the gift being land or an interest in land. The distinction formerly drawn between personal property which is an interest in land (that is, in any way secured upon or payable out of land) and pure personalty is abolished, and even land may now be lawfully given by will to a Charitable Institution. But lands so given must be sold within one year from the Testator's death, or such extended period as may be determined by the Court or the Charity Commissioners, and if not sold within such period it will vest in the official Trustee of Charity Lands, and the Charity Commissioners will order it to be sold, and the net proceeds of sale to be paid to the official Trustees of Charity Funds in trust for the Charity in favour of which the land has been given (Sec. 6).

1.—Bequest of an Ordinary Pecuniary Legacy to the Society.—In this case there is no need for the provision formerly inserted in wills directing the legacy to be paid exclusively out of such parts of the Testator's estate as might lawfully be disposed of for charitable purposes. The bequest may be in the following form:—

"I give to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society the sum of \mathcal{L} , free of duty, for the general purposes of the said Society" (or, if so desired, "for the Translation Fund of the said Society," or "for the School Fund of the said Society").

2.—Bequest to the Society of a Pecuniary Legacy made Payable out of the Proceeds of Sale and the Conversion of the Testatoe's Real and Personal Estate, or of a Share of Such Peoceeds.—Very frequently a Testator gives his real and personal estate or his residuary estate to Trustees on trust to sell, and out of the proceeds of sale to pay the legacies previously bequeathed, which may include a legacy to the Society. And a Testator may now bequeath a share of such proceeds to the Society. In these cases, although perhaps not essential, it is considered prudent, at all events until the interpretation of the abovementioned Act has been settled by judicial decision, to add to the gift of the pecuniary legacy or share to the Society the following direction:—

"And I direct that in case all the real and leasehold estate comprised in the devise and bequest in trust for sale herein contained shall not be sold within one year from my death then the said legacy (or share) herein bequesthed to the said Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society, and the duty thereon shall be paid out of the proceeds of sale and conversion of my personal estate and the proceeds of sale of such of my real and leasehold estate as shall be sold within one year after my death in priority to all other legacies (or shares) payable thereout."

3.—GIFT BY WILL OF LAND TO THE SOCIETY.—If land or a house of any tenure or a freehold or leasehold ground-rent is intended to be given to the Society, it should be given to a Trustee or Trustees on trust to sell within one year after the Testator's death if practicable, and to receive the net purchase money and pay it to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Society. The Testator will probably desire that the Succession Duty on the gift and also the cost of any application which may be necessary to extend the period of one year within which the sale must be made under the above-mentioned Act shall be paid out of his general estate. A gift by will of freehold land or a freehold house or a freehold ground-rent for the benefit of the Society may be made in the following form:—

"I give unto and to the use of (names of Trustees), their heirs and assigns, my freehold (description of land or house or ground-rent) upon trust to sell the same if practicable within one year from my death, and to receive the proceeds of sale thereof and thereout, and out of the rents and profits until sale to pay the expenses of such sale and all necessary outgoings, and to pay the residue of such proceeds and rents and profits to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society for the general purposes of the said Society. And I direct that the Succession Duty payable in respect of the above gift and also the costs of any application to extend the period for sale under the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891, shall be paid out of my general estate."

A gift by will of leasehold land or a leasehold house or a leasehold ground-rent for the benefit of the Society may be made in the following form:—

"I give to (names of Trustees), their executors, administrators, and assigns, my leasehold (description of land or house or ground-rent) upon trust to sell the same if practicable within one year from my death, and to receive the proceeds of sale thereof and thereout, and out of the rents and profits until sale to pay the expenses of such sale and the rent reserved by the lease under which the same premises are held and all other necessary outgoings, and to pay the residue of such proceeds and rents and profits to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society for the general purposes of the said Society. And I direct that the Succession Duty payable in respect of the above gift and also the costs of any application to extend the period for sale under the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891, shall be paid out of my general estate."

METHODS FOR FREQUENT AND REGULAR GIVING.

THE following are some of the methods now in operation, with a detailed description:—

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

A Missionary Treasurer and Secretary having been appointed, the chapel is divided into sections, more or less according to size. Each section is placed under the superintendence of a collector, chosen, if possible, from those sitting in the section itself. The collectors are provided with books, in which are entered the numbers of the pews. the name and address of each seat-holder and of other attendants, according to their respective divisions. These books also contain columns ruled for each month in the year. The contributions are collected by means of small envelopes. Monthly giving being desired, these envelopes are placed in the pews on a certain Sunday in each month. Should there be any individuals who prefer to give less frequently, their envelopes are supplied at the appropriate intervals. The contributors, having enclosed their subscriptions, deposit their envelopes in the weekly offering boxes (should any be in use) or return them to the collector. Once or twice a month, as may be thought well, the Secretary meets the collectors at the close of a week-evening service, handing over the envelopes unopened for them to enter the sums they contain in their books. The money may be paid in by the collectors monthly or quarterly, their books being initialed whenever payments are made. The Treasurer remits to the Mission House four times in the year. In some instances receipts are given month by month to every subscriber, these being enclosed in the new envelopes; in others receipts are given once a quarter, with a reminder of arrears, should there be any; whilst in other cases receipts are deemed unnecessary.

In adopting this method the distribution of a circular, signed by the pastor and officers, explaining and commending it has been found of great service. With these circulars slips are issued, upon which subscribers may enter the sum they propose to give, and state how frequently—whether monthly, quarterly, half-yearly, or annually—they would prefer to give it.

THE DISTRICT METHOD.

This method divides the congregations not into sections according to the seats occupied in the chapel, but into districts according to residence. One collector or, as may be preferred, two collectors are appointed to each district. After a circular, signed by the pastor and officers, has been distributed, and a statement has been made from the pulpit, a general canvass is made to secure promises of help; the collectors then call for the contributions monthly, or less frequently, as the subscribers may choose. If thought desirable, the small cash envelopes may be also used in working this plan. At least once in three months the collectors should hand over their money to the Secretary, so that as often it may be forwarded to the Mission House. If this scheme, or the one already described, is to prove successful, the smaller sums as well as the larger should be sought. To those who may resolve to attempt this method of securing frequent and regular giving books will be forwarded on application to the Secretaries of the Society.

Another plan to which attention may be called consists in the general circulation of

MISSIONARY BOXES.

The plan adopted by some churches is as follows:-

- 1. The boxes are definitely family boxes, and not intended to supersede or interfere with any existing annual subscriptions or any public collections at the chapel.
- 2. The boxes are numbered consecutively, and have on one side a short address to stimulate missionary zeal, and the suggestion that the boxes should be placed on the breakfast-table every Lord's-day morning to receive the family offerings for the work of God among the heathen (in accordance with 1 Cor. xvi. 2). This is a cardinal feature of the plan.
- 3. The boxes are called for quarterly at the houses of those who have taken them (unless they prefer to bring them to the chapel) by collectors appointed for that purpose, as soon after each quarter as possible, who give receipts for the amounts received.
- 4. The collectors hand in the total amount received from the boxes in their districts to the Mission-box Secretary, who initials their receipt-book counterfoils, and gives out the names of any new families to be called upon with the view of getting more boxes taken.

Boxes can be forwarded from the Mission House for this use in Christian families.

THE PENNY-A-WEEK SYSTEM.

As the first step in the adoption of this, as of every other method, let the church appoint its own Missionary Secretary. Then let this officer select as many collectors as may be required to collect the pennies from an aggregate of eleven—not more than eleven—subscribers, which sum, with the penny of the collector, will amount to a shilling. These pennies might be obtained at the chapel services or at the home. They should be paid in monthly to the secretary, who should remit quarterly to Furnival Street. This method is equally adapted for the gathering in of larger weekly sums than a penny. The apparatus for putting this plan into operation will be readily supplied from the Mission House. This system is commended as being especially suited to Christian Endeavour Societies.

A PRAYER UNION

has recently been instituted, of which full particulars may be obtained.

As the circumstances of churches vary, it is necessary to be prepared with a variety of methods. It is hoped that in one or other of the above, every church will find a plan of regular and frequent giving suited to its own particular requirement.

PLAN AND REGULATIONS OF THE SOCIETY.

NAME.

The name by which the Society has been, and is, designated is "The Baptist Missionary Society," including "The Particular Baptist Missionary Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Heathen," which was formed in 1792, and "The General Baptist Missionary Society," which was formed in 1816.

OBJECT.

The great object of this Society is the diffusion of the knowledge of the religion of Jesus Christ throughout the whole world, beyond the British Isles, by the preaching of the Gospel, the translation and publication of the Holy Scriptures, and the establishment of schools.

MEMBERS.

The following persons shall be considered Members—viz., pastors of churches making an annual contribution; ministers who collect annually; and all Christian persons concurring in the objects of the Society, who are donors of ten pounds and upwards, or subscribers of ten shillings and sixpence annually to its funds.

GENERAL MEETING OF MEMBERS.

A General Meeting of Members only shall be held annually, at which the Committee and Officers shall be chosen for the year ensuing, the Auditors of accounts appointed, and any other business pertaining to the Society transacted.

In choosing the Committee and Officers, the Chairman of the Meeting shall receive all names which it may be intended to propose. Out of the list so obtained, forty-two Members of the Committee shall be chosen by ballot, those who have the greater number of votes being the persons elected, and the Members so elected shall be empowered to fill up the number to fifty-four Members, as required by the following rule, from the list of nominations presented at the Annual Meeting. No name shall appear on the Nomination List for Election to the General Committee at the Annual Meeting without the consent of the owner.

COMMITTEE.

That the affairs of the Society shall be conducted by a Committee of fifty-four persons, two-thirds of whom shall be residents beyond twelve miles of St. Paul's; the Committee to meet monthly, or oftener, in London, on a fixed day, for the despatch of business; seven Members to be deemed a quorum; the Committee to be empowered to fill up vacancies.

PUBLIC MEETINGS.

A Public Meeting of the Society shall be held annually, when the list of the Committee shall be read, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the previous year reported. The Committee shall also be empowered to summon Public Meetings, in London or elsewhere, whenever the interests of the Society may seem to require.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

Final Treasurers and Secretaries of Missionary Auxiliaries shall be Corresponding Members of the Committee, together with such persons as it may be found necessary to add to their number.

HONORARY MEMBERS.

The General Meeting of Members shall also be empowered to appoint as Honorary Members of the Committee any who have rendered important services to the Society; provided the nomination of such Honorary Members of Committee shall proceed only from a resolution of the General Committee of the Society, or from six Members of the Society who are combined therein.

HONORARY MEMBERS (EX-OFFICIO).

Presidents or Principals of Denominational Colleges shall be *ex-officio* Members of the Committee of the Society.

MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY ENTITLED TO VOTE AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

All Honorary and Corresponding Members of the Committee, and all Ministers, who are members of the Society, who may occasionally be in London; and also Ministers residing in London, similarly qualified, together with the Treasurers and Secretaries of London Auxiliaries, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the Meetings of the Committee.

FUNDS.

All moneys received on behalf of the Society shall be lodged in the hands of the Treasurer, or of Trustees to be chosen by the Society. When the amount received shall exceed the sum needed for the current expenses of the month, it shall be invested in the Public Funds, until required for the use of the Mission.

ALTERATION OF CONSTITUTION.

No alteration in the constitution of the Society shall be made without twelve months' notice having been given at a previous Annual General Meeting.

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING

HELD IN THE MISSION HOUSE, FURNIVAL STREET, HOLBORN, E.C., TUESDAY, APRIL 24TH, 1900.

- 1. After singing a hymn and reading the Scriptures, the Rev. H. C. WILLIAMS, of Corwen, offered prayer.
- 2. On the motion of the General Secretary, GEORGE E. FOSTER, Esq., J.P., of Cambridge, was unanimously called to the chair.
- 3. The Digest of Minutes of the Committee for the past year was brought up and read by the GENERAL SECRETARY.
- 4. The Officers presented and read the Report of the Committee together with the Balance-sheet and Abstract of Accounts for the past year, as passed by the Auditors.
- 5. On the motion of the Rev. R. GLOVER, D.D., of Bristol, seconded by E. P. COLLIER, Esq., J.P., of Reading, it was resolved:—

That, in adopting the Report for the year ending the 31st March, 1900, together with the duly audited Balance-sheet and Statement of Accounts, the subscribers in Annual Meeting assembled place on record their devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the many and signal blessings of the past year in connection with the labours of their missionary brethren in distant lands. With regard to the debt of £4,123 0s. 6d., this Meeting pledges itself to heartily co-operate with the Committee in an immediate effort to secure its extinction, and confidently anticipates that such action will commend itself to the practical sympathy and support of all friends of the Society and the churches of the denomination.

6. On the nomination of the Committee, moved by the Rev. J. JENKYN BROWN, of Birmingham, seconded by the Rev. T. G. TARN, of Harrogate, it was unanimously resolved:—

That the Revs. Benwell Bird, of Plymouth, and E. Medley, B.A., of Hampstead, be elected Honorary Members of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, having rendered important services to the Mission.

7. On the motion of J. S. FOWLER, Esq., of Weymouth, seconded by H. Knott, Esq., of Manchester, it was resolved:—

That the following gentlemen be requested to act as Scrutineers, to report the result of the examination of the balloting papers to the officers of the Society for publication—viz.. Messrs. C. B. Chapman, W. L. Smith, T. G. Atkinson, W. D. Howieson, W. W. Parkinson, C. H. Chapman, T. W. Smith, C. E. Smith, and T. Denman.

8. The lists of nominations of Members to serve on the Committee having been supplied, the voting papers were collected and referred to the Scrutineers.

9. On the motion of the Rev. Benwell Bird, of Plymouth, seconded by W. Payne, Esq., of Clapton, it was resolved:—

That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be given to William R. Rickett, Esq., J.P., for his valuable services as Treasurer during the past year, and that he be respectfully and earnestly requested to continue them during the year ensuing.

10. On the motion of the Rev. S. Vincent, of Plymouth, seconded by E. Rawlings, Esq., of Wimbledon, it was resolved:—

That the best thanks of this Meeting be given to Alfred Henry Baynes, Esq., for his efficient services as General Secretary during the past year, and that he be earnestly requested to continue them during the year ensuing.

11. On the motion of the Rev. T. M. Morris, of Ipswich, seconded by the Rev. C. E. Wilson, B.A., of Serampore, it was resolved:—

That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be given to the Rev. J. B. Myers, the Association Secretary of the Society, for his valuable services in connection with the deputation and association work of the Mission during the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services in the ensuing year.

12. On the motion of C. D. WHITTAKER, Esq., M.A., B.Sc., of Taunton, seconded by J. J. Gurney, Esq., J.P., of Newcastle, it was resolved:—

That the best thanks of this Meeting be given to the Auditors for their efficient services during the past year, and that the following gentlemen be requested to act as Auditors for the year ensuing—viz., Messrs. W. W. Parkinson, E. H. Keen, Jas. Everett, T. W. Smith, and W. Lepard Smith.

13. The GENERAL SECRETARY gave notice of the following motion, which, on behalf of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, he intended to move at the Annual Members' Meeting in April, 1901, viz.:—

That for the future the Presidents for the time being of the Baptist Unions of England, Scotland, and Ireland and Wales, be ex-officio Members of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society during their respective terms of office.

14. On the motion of the GENERAL SECRETARY, seconded by H. CECIL RICKETT, Esq., of Hampstead, the following resolution was passed unanimously:—

That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be given to George E. Foster, Esq., J.P., of Cambridge, for his kind and efficient services in the chair.

15. The foregoing Minutes were read and confirmed.

16. The Meeting was closed with the Benediction.


- 3. The GENERAL SECRETARY (Mr. Alfred Henry Baynes) presented and read extracts from the One Hundred and Eighth Annual Report.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

N the closing year of the nineteenth century it seems only fitting and wise to cast a backward glance over the past hundred years of foreign missionary effort.

It has been well said by Dr. Werneck, "A century of missionary foundations lies behind us; a century of building up and building out before us. The nineteenth century has been the apprentice-ship of evangelical foreign missions, in which doubtless many mistakes have been made, but we are now in the possession of a large missionary experience which will be our schoolmistress for the twentieth century. Missionary results are not to be reckoned by years, but by centuries. The work already done is but the seed of coming harvests; and it is surely inspiring to remember that the number of heathen now baptized in a single year, is as large again as the whole number of converts in 1800."

Dr. George Smith, the distinguished Secretary of the Free Church of Scotland Missions, says:—

"Stated broadly, the Churches of the Reformation at the close of the nineteenth century spend annually from three to three and a quarter millions sterling in sending missions and Bibles to non-Christians, as against £10,000 at its beginning. They send out above 6,500 men, two-thirds of whom are married, and 4,000 unmarried women, against fifty men only a hundred years ago. Then, there was not one convert from the dark races ordained to preach to his countrymen the unsearchable riches of Christ; now there are upwards of 4,000. Then there were hardly a hundred native Christian workers; now there is an army of 68,000. Then there were fewer than 10,000 native communicants; now there are a million and a half of every tribe and kindred and tongue, all round the globe.

"These figures exclude all Bible and Christian literature work, Missions to the Jews, to decadent Christian Churches, and the Colonies, and the wives of missionaries,

the majority of whom double the efficiency of the men. If these be added, the expenditure for 1897 will be £3,248,874, and the total number of foreign missionaries will rise to 11,839 in 1897, of whom 5,263 were women.

"The statistics take no cognisance of four of the most powerful forces at work in the civilisation of the thousand millions of non-Christians. These are educational, medical, and industrial missions, and Bible and pure literature circulation. Nor do they take heed of the martyrs and confessors and the multitude of Christian dead, since Carey baptized Krishna Pal in the waters of the Ganges in 1800. Nor can they even touch the direct spiritual experience, nor record the secondary civilising influence of every true convert. The late Dean Vahl showed 864,155 native youth of both sexes under Bible and general instruction in the year 1895. This is very much under the truth. But think of all that it means, that, from the primary vernacular school to the university degree with honours, a million of native youth should be daily taught the Word of God!

"Well may we exclaim, in looking over the past years of the closing century Behold what signs and wonders God hath wrought amongst the Gentiles."

Yet to-day, at the close of the nineteenth century, there are vastly more people in India and China who have never heard the blessed Gospel of the grace of God than the combined populations of the entire continent of Africa and the whole of South America.

In China, in the one province with the largest amount of Christian missionary agency at work, each mission-station has a parish of 1,285 square miles in extent, and in the whole of the Empire each missionary has for his share of the work 158,000 needy souls; while Thibet, Afghanistan, Baluchistan, Turkestan, Siberia, Siam East, and the great heart of Central Africa and South America have scarcely been trodden by the foot of a Christian missionary.

If any one message of the Master deserves pre-eminence as a command it is surely that last injunction—"To the uttermost parts of the earth"—this is the Master's last command, and obedience to this may truly be deemed "the article of a standing or a falling Church."

The real question is not—Can the heathen be saved without missionary effort? but, Can the Church itself be saved without it? for there is ever a real and vital bond of connection between Christian missions and healthy, active church life. A dead Church cannot send forth living missionaries, and a Church which does not send out missionaries is ready to die.

Would that the Christian Churches of this highly favoured land during the coming century should dare to do great things for God, and expect still greater things from God.

Let us rejoice that there are already many signal indications that a real revival of the true missionary spirit is at hand. The rapid growth of the Student Volunteer movement and its magnetic power over the best of our youth in our universities and colleges; the forthcoming Ecumenical Missionary Conference in New York, the missionary development of the great Christian Endeavour movement in America and our own land—these and other kindred movements surely point to a new era of missionary advance and coming triumph.

"Is this the time, O Church of Christ, to sound Retreat? To arm with weapons cheap and blunt The men and women who have born the brunt Of truth's fierce strife, and nobly held their ground? Is this the time to halt, when all around Horizons lift, new destinies confront?

"No! rather strengthen stakes and lengthen cords, Enlarge thy plans and gifts, O thou elect, And to thy Kingdom come for such a time, The earth with all its fulness is the Lord's, Great things attempt for Him, great things expect, Whose love imperial is, whose power sublime."

THE PAST YEAR.

In reviewing the work of our own Society during the past year, the uppermost feeling must be one of devout thankfulness for signal success. In the following pages our brethren report progress in almost all the fields of our labour. In India, the opening up of new stations, a large ingathering of converts, and a great improvement and advance in our Christian elementary schools. In China, the rapid growth of native Christian Churches, their independence and self-support, and an increasing number of baptisms. On the Congo, the establishment of the new Comber Memorial Station at Kibokolo, in the densely populated Zombo country; large additions to the native churches, and in the staff of native Christian evangelists entirely supported by local native Christian contributions; the building and opening of the new chapel at San Salvador (its entire cost being met by the native Christians themselves); and the completion and publication of Mr. Whitehead's "Bobangi Grammar and Dictionary." and Mr. Holman Bentley's "Pioneering on the Congo," with cheering tidings from the West Indian and European stations of the Society; while at home we have, at the present moment, a remarkable and unprecedented number of offers from able, well-equipped, earnest, and devoted young men, longing to engage in foreign mission service.

Our only present difficulty is the lack of the needful means to send them out.

Surely in this emergency we should give ourselves to prayer; in the past every great door has been opened by the key of prayer. As has been truly said, "God waits for a waiting people." Can we doubt that He who is sending us the men, in answer to importunate, believing prayer, will so move the hearts of His stewards that the needful means shall be no longer wanting?

There is no more painful sign of the materialism of our time than the question so frequently asked, "Do missions pay?" and the attempt so often made to settle the inquiry by comparing the number of converts with the amount of money spent. "God weights, instead of counting and weights in His own balances."

Not alone by mere numbers can the results of the labours and toils of Christian missionaries be rightly judged. What uplifting, ennobling, and humanising influences have they exerted!

"They have reduced savage tongues to languages, giving to them alphabets and grammars; they have translated the Scriptures into well nigh every form of speech, thus opening the way to the intellectual development of races for ages stagnant and stationary. They have been the cause of the emancipation of millions of slaves, and have ever proclaimed the essential equality of the human race. They have quenched the fires of Suttee, have suppressed infanticide, and rung the death-knell of caste. Wherever the Christian missionary has appeared he has corrected abuses, restrained passions, inspired hope, and awakened aspirations in savage breasts for something higher, truer, and nobler than the primeval forest can impart, or swamps and jungles generate."

Ultimate results defy our coarse statistics; our eyes are too dull and our minds too narrow to scan God's doings. Eternity alone will fully reveal them. The Christian Church to-day has set before it a supreme opportunity—the whole world open to the Gospel; a new century dawning, and the possibility of raising the standard of the Cross in every part of the world within the present generation. May such a grand and united forward movement be made that it shall be said, with truth—

"Where the vanguard rests to-day The rear shall rest to-morrow."

YOUNG PEOPLE'S MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Young People's Missionary Association (Secretary, Rev. R. Wright Hay) has effected 10 new affiliations during the past year, 3 Christian Endeavour Societies, 3 Bible-classes, 2 Sunday-schools, 1 Christian Band, and 1 Happy Hour Class having joined its ranks.

The register now shows the following affiliations:—2 Colleges, 98 Sunday-schools, 42 Christian Endeavour Societies and similar organisations, and 10 Bible-classes; in all, 152.

During the year 35 personal members have joined the Association, bringing up the number of personal members to 101.

In the year ending March 31st, 1899, the young people federated, through the Y.P.M.A., on behalf of the Baptist Missionary Society, contributed to the funds of the Society £1,734 13s. 2d., and there is reason to believe that it will be found that that amount has been considerably exceeded in the year to which this Report refers.

The monthly meetings of the Association in the Library of the Mission House have been more largely attended than in any past year, and such subjects as "How to Use the Holiday Season in the Interests of Missions," "The Holy Spirit in Missions," and "The Priesthood of Believers in Relation to the Evangelisation of the World," have been dealt with in conferences which have proved helpful to many young Christians and to Christian workers among the young.

Two new lantern lectures have been provided by the Association for use among the churches—one on "China's People and Work for Their Salvation"; the other (the slides in which were kindly loaned by Mr. W. C. Parkinson, L.C.C.) on "Mission Work at San Salvador." Others are in course of preparation for next winter.

The Y.P.M.A. Journal has a steadily-growing circulation and its enlargement is contemplated.

The paper read at the Leeds Missionary Conference in October, 1899, by the Rev. J. W. Ewing, M.A., B.D., on "How to Increase Missionary Enthusiasm among the Young," has been sent by the Association, with a letter commending to their sympathetic consideration its practical suggestions, to all superintendents of Metropolitan Baptist Sunday-schools.

Speakers on behalf of the Society have been sent by the Association to numerous Sunday-schools during the year, but the desire of the Association in this direction is still far from being attained—the regular and systematic

visitation on behalf of missions of every London Sunday-school which is, or ought to be, interested in the Baptist Missionary Society.

The Association desires earnest prayer in its behalf that in the coming year it may be more widely and more mightily used than hitherto, for the extension of the Saviour's Kingdom in and by the schools and Young People's Societies, which it seeks to help and to make helpful to others in His name and cause.



OUR WORK IN INDIA.

The progress of our work in India during the past year, although carried on under specially depressing conditions, has been remarkable. Famine, fever, and plague: "The cup of sorrow and suffering for India," writes one of the most experienced of Indian missionaries, "seems full to overflowing. Famine succeeds famine, and the plague which has already

wrought such havoc in Western India is now sweeping over Northern India, bearing thousands into eternity; while fever following upon hunger and weakness is now rife in most of the famine-stricken districts."

The Rev. Herbert Anderson, the Indian Secretary, glancing back over the year, writes:

"The year's sorrows have indeed been many. In July Brother De Cruz of Chittagong, in August Mrs. Gilbert of Serampore, and in November our brother, John Kerry, while in England on furlough, were called to the service above, and in the loss of children, dear as life, more than one other of our family circles were made to enter into Christ's fellowship of suffering—deep, intense, inexplicable. Yet was our God good beyond hope and expectation in the blessings concealed in bereavement."

Through a gracious Providence the lives of our missionaries have been preserved, and many have been permitted to take a large and active part in famine relief work, as the almoners of the Christian churches of the homeland, and in so doing have undoubtedly opened the way for a far wider dissemination of the Gospel, and our brethren believe that in India, as in China, the spirit of Christian beneficence which came to the relief of perishing millions will pave the way for the cordial reception of the Gospel on the part of large numbers of the people belonging to the stricken districts.

Mr. Anderson further reports:-

"The year has been memorable in the opening of the new stations of Narainganj in Bengal, Aska in Orissa, and Chhata in the North-West Provinces, the re-occupation of Purneah, and the decision to rank Simla as one of the regular stations of the Society. The Rev. T. O. Ransford begins his career at Narainganj under the happiest auspices. At Chhata, Dr. F. V. Thomas has inaugurated a medical mission among the numerous villages, and his prospects of securing the same wide influence and evangelistic success as attend similar medical missions in other parts of the Empire are very bright. In Purneah the Rev. Denham Robinson has started a pioneering work of great difficulty and considerable self-sacrifice. His patience and perseverance will be rewarded. In Simla tentative arrangements have been made, but as soon as the way is clear a resident European missionary with a competent staff will carry on the work of that important place, hallowed by memories of the persistent labours of our brother the late James Smith."

Referring to the present-day aspect of Christianity in India, one of India's most experienced missionaries writes:—

"Unless I am greatly mistaken in reading the signs of the times, the antagonism to Christianity on the part of the educated classes in India is to-day very distinctly on the wane, and there is a slow but seemingly sure movement toward the Gospel. Attempts to reform Hinduism have ended in acknowledged failure. Theosophy has been tried and found wanting, and the eyes of thoughtful Hindus are unmistakably turning to Jesus Christ as the one and only fulfilment of their hopes."

YERNACULAR PREACHING AND CHEERING RESULTS.

It cannot be made too plain that the one great object of the missionary is to Christianise by the clear, loving proclamation of the blessed Gospel of the Grace of God. By the roadside, in the street, at river ghauts, in the bazaar, the house, the train, and the tramcar, wherever a listener can be secured is the good seed sown.

"Sow in the morn thy seed,
At eve hold not thine hand,
To doubt and fear give thou no heed,
Broadcast it o'er the land."

During the past year there have been many striking instances of conversion and public confession of Christ by baptism.

Referring specially to confession by public baptism, the Rev. Herbert Anderson writes:—

"It is a remarkable sign of the decadence of non-Christian faiths that to-day soarcely a convert is baptized but a determined struggle to reclaim him is made, and his return to the faith he has left does not to-day involve for him social disability or material loss. This was not so half a century ago."

Dr. Vincent Thomas, of Chhata and Kosi, writes:-

"I had the joy of baptizing our first convert in Kosi last July, a young man named Puran, who had been receiving instruction in the truths of the Gospel for nearly ten months. He of his own accord asked for baptism after hearing an address on the words, 'How long halt ye between two opinions?' and as Isa Charan's report of his character and conduct was excellent, and his faith sincere and real, he was baptized publicly before a large number of people. Since his baptism he has had to endure severe persecution, loss of employment and social ostracism, and, moreover, has been seriously ill. At the first shock he was a good deal depressed in spirit, but he never wavered in his faith and loyalty to Christ, and he has now, by his patience and courage, overcome much of the opposition aroused by his baptism, regaining his former employment."

The Rev. John Stubbs, of Patna, reports the following interesting case of the baptism of a Mohammedan family:—

"A Mohammedan family of seven souls has been added to our Christian community. Of this family, the father, Ibrahim, an educated man, a writer, of about fifty-five; his wife, Latifa Nisa, of about fifty; and their daughter, Firozi, of about sixteen, have, I believe, been truly converted, and have been baptized. Humanly speaking, these baptisms are due, in the first instance, to the labours of the ladies of the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission. They visited the house of these converts, and induced the father to attend our Sunday vernacular services. Then he came to see mc, when I ascertained that he was intellectually convinced that Mohammedanism did not meet the soul's need, especially in the matter of atonement, but that Christianity did. At length, after many interviews, when we carefully studied the Word of God together, he heartily accepted Christ as his Saviour; and as the Zenana ladies had been used of God to win for Christ, at the same time, the heart of the mother, and also of the daughter, it was, so far, easy for them to confess Him in baptism. But for this I am not sure that any of them would have been baptized. They might have individually believed, but they might not have been able to bear the breaking up of the home, which baptism, apart from the others, would then have involved. Of course, the Mohammedans did their utmost to prevent the baptism. Some of the leading moulvies sent for the father, and, by their arguments, tried to shake his belief in Christ, but in vain. Then they tried to bribe him to relinquish his intention to become a Christian, but this, too, failed. There were several minor difficulties which had to be overcome before the baptism could take place. The mother and daughter had all their lives been in pardah, and had never seen the face of a strange man, much less of a European. But as I could not baptize them until I was assured that they were believers, it was needful that I should have an interview with them. One of the Zenana ladies met this difficulty by bringing them, in a deli, to see me, when, without hesitation, they both spoke most clearly as to their renunciation of all other trusts but Jesus' finished work as their hope of salvation, and also of their desire to publicly confess their faith in baptism. Another difficulty was concerning the daughter, who is married, but has never lived with, nor been supported by, her husband, who is now in Calcutta. The father, at my suggestion, wrote, informing his son-in-law that his wife intended to become a Christian, and he replied that she could do as she pleased. Thus, in answer to our prayers, the way was made quite clear. The baptism, at the beginning of the hot season, in the Ganges, close to the Mission House, was a memorable occasion. The river shone in the light of the morning sun, but the faces of our little company lit up from within, by the 'joy of harvest,' were far brighter. On the sloping bank nearest the water, were the missionaries and native Christians, and behind them several of our European Sunday evening congregation, whom I had invited to be present, and behind them, again, a crowd of Mohammedans and Hindus. How heartily we sang a bhajan, the refrain of which is:

"'Victory to Thee, Lord Jesus!
Victory to Thee, supreme King!
Victory to Thee, great victory Giver!'

"When I asked Ibrahim, his wife, and daughter, whether they forsook their old religion as false and man-made, and also whether, knowing themselves to be sinners condemned by God's law, they rested all their hope of salvation on Christ's atonement, boldly their 'Yes' rang out on the morning air. The mother and daughter, having all their lives been shut up in a zenana, had never, before that morning, seen the river, but the Lord's strength was perfected in them. They were triumphant, the mother especially. The baptism made a great stir amongst the Mohammedans. All kinds of lying reports were spread abroad. One was that I had made each of the candidates drink a spoonful of blood before I immersed them. One Mohammedan. in order, as he said, to set his mind at rest as to whether God approved of the baptism or not, gravely suggested that a bonfire should be made, and that Ibrahim and I should stand in the midst of it, and he promised that if we came out unharmed he, too, would be baptized. Even the Hindus were stirred up to inquiry. A Hindu gentleman, doing business with a Mahajan in the Chauk, against whose house we were preaching, asked me if it was true that I had baptized some people recently. On my saying 'Yes,' and giving him particulars, he asked: 'On what conditions do you baptize?' This gave me a welcome opportunity for testimony before a considerable number of interested listeners, and I trust the testimony was not without result. Some of the Mohammedans were very angry. A few days after the baptism, one man, after abusing Ibrahim in the bazaar for having become a Kaffir, beat him violently on the head with his shoe, and wounded him, so that he bore on his face the marks of the Lord Jesus. Ibrahim and I prayed together about the matter, and after reading the closing verses of Matt. v. and Rom. xii, we felt that though he was entitled to the protection of English law, yet he was also under law to Christ, and so it would be better for him to endure suffering for righteousness' sake. I cannot say whether the Mohammedans feared that legal proceedings would be taken or not or whether the Lord, in answer to prayer, softened their hearts, but two days after the assault was committed an apology was tendered by Ibrahim's assailant, and regret was also expressed by some of the leading Mohammedans. Since then there has been no similar persecution. We have used our utmost endeavours to induce the daughter's husband to grant her a writing of divorcement, but he refuses to do so, Friends in England will, I think, be surprised to learn that though in Hindu and Mohammedan law, as administered in India by our English Government, provision is made for the possibility of conversion from one religion to the other, yet, owing to the comparatively modern introduction of Christianity, there is no corresponding equality of justice in the case of conversion from either of these religions to Christianity. As the law in India now stands, in the case of a Christian male convert from Mohammedanism, by Christian baptism, ipso facto, the previous Mohammedan marriage becomes null and void, but in the case of a female convert the previous marriage is still binding, so that, even though, as in Firozi's case, she may never have

lived with her husband, so long as he lives, she cannot re-marry. This is a cruel law, and relief by legislation is sorely needed. Friends at home can help us by prayer about this matter."

Mr. Stubbs also mentions the following case of Christian courage and faithfulness to conviction:—

"When our esteemed brother, Mr. Benwell Bird, visited us in December last, he was much impressed and gratified at the commendation of the Gospel by the business life and testimony of one of our Gulzarbagh native Christians, to whom I introduced him. As Mr. Bird felt that friends at home would be delighted to know of this result of missionary work I make mention of it here. Our brother is a draper, and has a shop in the busiest thoroughfare of Patna city, and over his door a large board with his name, and trade description, and added to that, in large letters, the word 'Christian,' If a man in England thus paraded his religion it would, probably, excite suspicion, but in India it is a brave witness for Christ. Our brother is a solitary witness for the Saviour in the commercial centre of Patna. He witnesses by closing his shop on the Lord's Day, the only shop in the bazaar which bears its witness to the Sabbath; and, also, by the integrity of his business life. He has one of the kest businesses in the bazaar, for, while other adjoining shops are frequently empty, his shop is nearly always crowded with customers. This is a proof that the people have found out, as some of them have told me, that what goes on in the shop agrees with the name outside."

The Rev. W. Bowen James, of Julpigori, referring to his experiences on a recent preaching tour made in North and North-East Bengal, writes:—

"We often take with us the Scriptures in five or six languages, that the various nationalities we meet with in this district may have in their own languages the message of Divine love.

"In addition to the proclamation of the Gospel at all the places visited, we have since January sold four thousand eight hundred copies of Gospels and other portions of the Bible. What will become of these? Some of them probably will be glanced over with curiosity, and then put aside and forgotten; some, it may be, will attract the attention of the enemies of Christianity, who, to show their disapproval and hatred. will tear them to pieces. But some, I would fain believe, will be carefully read and re-read, and will produce impressions upon the minds of the readers that will give them no rest until they shall have broken through the cruel fetters of caste, and in spite of the entreaties, yea, and curses of parents and friends, will embrace Him who died to redeem them. The night after the market at Keranti, I occupied a native hut on the outskirts of the market-place, kindly placed at my disposal by the owner. About ten o'clock, as I was about to retire for the night, I heard in the distance the words uttered in Bengali, 'Behold My hands, and My feet, that it is I Myself; handle Me, and see; for a spirit hath not firsh and bones as ye see Me have.' As there were no native Christians in that place besides the two evangelists who accompanied me and who had already retired for the night, I inferred that the reader must be a non-Christian. I remained listening, and as the reader went on reading, I felt I must have an interview with him. When I got near the door of his house, I asked if I might enter, and, on entering, saw seven men seated on the floor, one of the seven having the Gospel by Luke in his hand. Several questions were exchanged, one of which led the conversation to Calvary's great sacrifice and the glorious victory won over death and the grave. As I walked back to the hut, and reflected on the work of the day, I wondered how many there would be like these men, pondering on the word preached, and distributed that day at the market."

Mrs. W. R. James, recently at Jessore, mentions that :-

"In July, a Hindu gentleman, of about thirty-three, came to us, saying he had run away from his friends, in order to confess Christ in baptism. He was a good English scholar, and I was surprised to find what he knew of the Scriptures—his spirit was very sweet, simple, and sincere—of that type which is only to be seen among the most devout of his race. I asked him how he came to believe in Jesus, for I found that for some time he had evidently been an intelligent believer. He produced, with deep reverence, from a little handkerchief, a book called 'Light and Life,' by the Rev. W. A. Hobbs, a missionary of our Society in Jessore, but who is now retired saying, with emotion, that this little book had led him into peace—'Life and light—it is just what I wanted,' said he.''

The Rev. Gogon Chunder Dutt, of Khulna, reports the conversion and baptism of Bepin, a celebrated Hindu Guru, a Brahman by caste. Mr. Dutt adds:—

"Bepin Behary Mozumdar knows Hinduism well. He carefully studied the Bible and sincerely accepted Christ as his Saviour, and the Bible as the Word of God. He has some knowledge of English. To some extent he has studied the Hindu system of medicine. He also possesses a splendid power of speaking. He has money of his own to support himself, and he is now engaged in visiting different parts of the country to tell them what Christ has done for him. All well-wishers of India rejoice to see men like Bepin preaching the Gospel in India after the example of Paul. Our earnest prayer is that Bepin may be used of God as His instrument to preach the Gospel efficiently."

A few illustrative cases taken from the reports of our missionaries will make still clearer Mr. Anderson's remarks as to the trials and persecutions of Christian native converts.

The Rev. W. Carey, of Dacca, writes, reporting on the Watch-night Service in the Dacca Chapel, and of the forty young native students who were present:—

"Their heads were bandaged with woollen comforters and their shoulders wrapped round with shawls—but bare legs from the knee. My teeth chattered as I tried to speak, but God was with us, and ten of the men lifted their hands in token of resolve to live for Him through the new year.

"I think, next, of one of these men who, before the month was out, came to be baptized. I believe him to have been brought near to the Saviour, and chiefly through the influence of one of the Professors in the College, a man of exceptional gifts, who himself had come out from Hinduism and been baptized by Mr. Hay. Whether he made 'the great refusal' it is impossible to say. He was an undergraduate in the Professor's class, and very earnest in his request for baptism. The day was fixed and the time appointed. But constancy failed under the strain and torture of the pressure brought to bear by his relatives and friends. The day that

should have witnessed his confession brought only the following letter written to his Professor friend:—

- "'MY DEAR SIR,—I know not what to write. The blood runs cold to think of it. I never dreamed that I will have to prove myself false to you.
- "'Oh! what will you say when Mr. Carey will ask you where is the boy whom you spoke so much of?
- "'Yesterday evening I could not see Mr. Carey as I was detained by ——— Babu. I was there till 9 p.m. During this time all sorts of persuasions were going on. But I stood nobly against all this through the Lord's grace. But, alas! when I came home thence, they told me that there is another telegram from my mother. She is going to commit suicide. I was asked what I want—either my conversion or mother's committing suicide. My dear Sir, to speak the truth, all my heart gave way, my weakness prevailed upon me. I gave my consent to wait till my mother is convinced of my noble aspiration, which is quite impossible.
- "'So you see I have spoiled my life. Let me go to hell, which is the proper place for me. I am tired of the sun and wish my life at an end.
- "'My dear Sir, don't hate me for my cowardice. It is in you where I find my peace of mind. As long as I live you shall be my ideal. These are the words from the very bottom of my heart.
- "'I know not whether I will be allowed to attend the College to day or not.— I am, &c., &c.'
 - "I wrote to him and sent the letter through his teacher, who replied as follows:—
- before sending his letter on to you and assured him that both you and I would continue to pray for him.

 The the eatened suicide was not only a trick, but one with which ——'s mother had probably nothing to do. He acted just as I had apprehended, though he told me often enough that he was ready to give up all for the sake of Christ. He came to see me yesterday and seemed depressed. I had prayer with him and said what I could to encourage him in his "noble aspiration." It is curious how often he uses the word "noble" about his own conduct. I made him promise to call on you when convenient. I feel really sorry for him, but will not probably speak to him on the subject any longer.—Yours, &c.'
- "He did not call upon me, but a week later sent me this letter written on board a steamer bound for Assam:—
- This is the third day of my journey, and I hope to reach there by to-morrow evening. The reason of sending me away from Dacca, I think you have been able to understand. It is quite against my will and desire that I now go there. To speak more plainly I have been forced to do so. My uncles desire that I should read at Sylhet. They are afraid of keeping me at Dacca. . . . as a matter of course they will get angry with me if I act contrary to their desire (which I wish to do) and may put a stop to my expense—which, I fear, they will not fail to do . . . under these circumstances I know not what to do . . . My dear Sir, forgive me
 - . . Please fail not to write to me by the return of post.'
- "I wrote, of course, and also to the missionary at Sylhet—a personal friend of my own—and a true servant of Jesus Christ. His reports are encouraging. He believes the lad's faith to be sincere and firm, and says he makes no secret of it, but cannot in defiance of his guardians see his way to be baptized."

Mr. Carey reports another typical and encouraging case :-

"The brightest day in all the year to me was Sunday, February 19th, when Babu ovinda Chandra Datta, a local Zemindar and a convert from Hinduism, was baptized 1 his own village and in his own tank. He had been long under instruction, and ad often stepped forward and then stepped back in the matter of an open confession. hat morning I got a letter from Bindu Babu saying the baptism would take place t three o'clock. Mr. Morris and Mr. Ransford, with two of the preachers and ivself, went over by the one o'clock train. The village lay about a mile from the anj-across the fields. When we got there the candidate met us at his own door nd took us into the house. It was a solid little pucca building, with a tank in front and a masonry $qh\hat{a}t$. The reception room was furnished with benches and carpets, ad filled with the members of the family-dressed in their best-many of them omen. We held a short service in this room and questioned the candidate in the resence of all. It was a trying ordeal for him—but he witnessed a good confession. is mother would not come in. She was waiting in some other part of the house. fter the service her son went to entreat her to consent to witness his baptism. here was some delay, and we began to wonder what would happen. Then he came orth alone, and we moved out of the house to go to the steps of the tank. At that oment a furious relative rushed forward and declaimed against the act, and tried stop the caudidate by force. His widowed sister followed, crying and abusing by irns and clinging to his arm. I reminded them that the candidate was of age, the aster of the house, and free to act according to his conscience, without let or ndrance, in the eyes of the law. Also that it would be necessary to secure him at freedom by sending for the constable of the village if they did not desist. And, irther, that while we would allow no force to be used to prevent the baptism they ould see we would use no force to effect it. The only appeal should be to the ndidate's own conscience and will. Then they loosed him-and there was a oment of great stillness and tension.

"I said to the candidate, quietly, but loud enough for all to hear: 'Govinda, if you e ready to confess the Lord Jesus Christ, and obey His command, come forward now ithout fear, and be baptized in His Name.' He hesitated barely a second, and then alked down into the water, and Bindu Babu, who had led him to the Saviour, ptized him. The moral effect of that free decision and loyalty to conscience, the ower of the grace of God manifested in a nature specially shrinking and timid, was ident and deep. Our home-going was a song of praise."

Referring specially to the work of bazaar preaching, the Rev. A. Law, of gra, writes:—

"It is hard, it is tiring, it is trying to the temper, it is barren to the eye, but it is sential.

"Other branches of missionary labour are more or less debatable. There are prox d cons for medical missions, educational missions, industrial missions, &c., but, so as I know, the case as regards open-air preaching is all pro and no con. It is rd, for a beginner anyhow, to keep bazaar addresses at once varied and yet full of a same message to an ever-changing crowd. It is as hard as it would be for a welling evangelist at home to conduct all his missions in one place and with the ne helpers instead of constantly changing the one and the other. It is tiring, cause we can't always avoid standing a long time in the sun, though I need hardly we prefer shade when we can get it. It is trying to the temper, because the

audience is usually apathetic or hostile and not infrequently abusive. It is great amusement, no doubt, to say insulting things to a sahib who won't retaliate—a missionary is the only kind of a sahib they can have that amusement with. It is not very hard to take that in quietness, but it is hard to hear our gentle, loving Master blasphemed and reviled, and not blaze out in anger. Then it is barren to the eye, because in general if a man is interested and concerned about his sin, he is afraid to say so there before a mocking crowd. The crowd comes and goes, a man listens for awhile—longer and more eagerly—the preacher's hopes rise, and he addresses his remarks more and more to the one silent face; suddenly, perhaps in the middle of a sentence, the man goes away, and the preacher's heart falls.

"But this bazaar preaching is good work; it is often thoroughly enjoyable, it is made sacred by the Saviour's own example, and it is the work He commanded His disciples to do.

"Not infrequently it leads to little conversations. A trader will invite me to sit on a shop-front and rest. It is at the same time the shop counter and the shop floor, as well as a seat for customers. It is not private. There is no privacy in this land of open doors—except in zenanas. People at once gather round, and often listen more eagerly and attentively than to the actual preaching—one is not talking to them you see.

"There are five native brethren engaged in this work, so we occupy two preaching places every morning and every evening, changing them almost every day. To be exact we preach in twenty different places every week and can always get a crowd to listen."

The Rev. John Stubbs reports the following incidents in connection with bozaar preaching:—

"One afternoon, a Hindu, on hearing me say that Jesus Christ was my Gurā, and that I was His disciple, asked me if I had ever seen Jesus Christ. When I said 'No' he replied: 'I have seen my Gurū, and I would rather have a Gurū I can see than one I cannot see.' I rejoined: 'Have you ever seen the Mahārānī Victoria?' 'No,' he said. 'But,' I asked, 'you believe in her existence, and are willing to be ruled by her, because you see the good effects of her sovereignty?' 'Yes,' he answered. Then,' I explained, 'that is just our position concerning Jesus.' The light of truth at once shone into the man's mind, and was reflected in his face. He immediately bought a Gospel, and several others, who had been closely following the conversation, followed his example. Another occasion, especially, stands out as a ray of sunshine in connection with the bazaar work of the past year. It was during the hot season, in the early morning, when we were preaching under the shade of the trees adjoining the vegetable market in Patna city. Specimens of almost 'every creature' in Patna were listening to the Gospel from our lips. When we finished, a Brahmin, with whom, in past years, I have had several discussions, bought a Bhajan book. He told me that he had bought one some months ago, but had lost it. He said, too, that he had also bought a Gospel, which he had often read. Then, turning to the people, he told them that he was sure the religion taught by us was the true one, and if they only knew it they would all accept it. I need hardly add that, after hearing this unsolicited testimony, a Hindu at once stepped forward and bought a Gospel for himself."

The Rev. Albert Law, of Agra, reporting upon his work amongst lepers, writes:—

'A most enjoyable part of our work is done at the Municipal Leper Asylum, where have a service every Thursday, and where sixty-five men and eight women sit ently and patiently awaiting death 'without the camp.' Theirs is a doleful life, would think. The ordinary interests of life—domestic, social, and commercial—denied them for ever. Here is a father without children—a young wife without shand—a trader without wares. Their physical sufferings are always present and en keen. Their appearance is horrifying and suggests yet further horrors. Ink of one there whom I see every time, yet have never seen, whom none shall ever again. The untold horrors of that face are shrouded in oiled rags, and from find the dreadful mask come low heart-breaking groans almost incessantly. 'Is always like this?' 'Yes, he is always like this; he never talks, sahib.'

And yet with all these surroundings, if I feel a little down-hearted about the rk, nothing is so inspiring as a visit to these same lepers. Their welcome is so dial—the score or so Christians are so bright, the others are so eager to listen and eady to croon their hymns with a tender burden of 'the sympathising Jesus.' by never make objections. They never ask silly questions. They sit in a semille and nod their poor disfigured heads in appreciation as they are told of Him beare the world's sin. Many a man has exchanged that abode of earthly plation for a Father's home on high, and by G.d's grace many others will."

The Rev. Daniel Jones adds :--

We have at present nineteen lepers who have been baptized, and three candidates it baptism,'

THE NATIVE CHRISTIAN CHURCHES.

t is well that the churches at home should know that the policy of the nmittee for years past has been to use their utmost endeavours to mote the establishment and growth of independent, self-supporting, ressive native churches.

every missionary is urged to point out and enforce the duty resting n all native Christians, from the very first, to sustain and support reh life and work and to provide, as far as may be practicable, their places of worship, support their own pastor, or, if unable to do this, nake the best arrangements possible amongst themselves for the conduct heir own religious services.

he Committee are glad to report cheering progress in these directions. he Rev. Robert Spurgeon, of Barisal, writes:—

The Baptist Union of Native Christian Churches have authorised four festivals cure a special effort among the churches every quarter. These are: The Harvest val, the Famine Festival, the Baptist Union Festival, and the Indian B.M.S. val. It is uncertain, as yet, how these will succeed; but where a pastor is not; paid, a chapel not being built, or a school not being supported, the church s, or ought to need, an outlet for its liberality and love. If these festivals ne permanent there is no doubt of the benefit that will follow in the spiritual

During the past year several new chapels in Eastern Bengal have been built at the cost of the native Christians themselves, and others repaired.

Mr. Spurgeon reports :-

"One of the most important and pleasing facts of the year is the appointment of Babu John Haldar as pastor of Askor, our largest church. He was an evangelist of our Society, working with Mr. Teichmann at Pirozepur. In January he voluntarily resigned his regular pay, and accepted the call of the church. He now entirely relies upon the gifts of his people: and they rally round him faithfully. At the dedication service Mr. Teichmann, Mr. Tregillus, and others took part. We all feel our brother has acted nobly, and are sure his Lord will honour and use him among the people. His good example, high ideal, and constant teaching are already working.

"Another significant occurrence deserves a record. In February our zealous brother Babu Dyal C. Haldar resigned his position and pay as an evangelist to become the missionary of the Indian Baptist Missionary Society to the hill tracts beyond Chittagong. He is a man greatly beloved, and he has excellent gifts both of tong and speech. Both in our district and in Calcutta his influence has been good. At the farewell meeting in Barisal he was presented with a leather hand-bag by his numerous friends. We felt glad and grateful that our district should yield such a man for so great a work. It was not the city of Jerusalem from which Paul and Barnabas were sent forth, but the church at Antioch. Thus, not from Calcutta, but from Barisal has gone forth our first missionary to the heathen."

Reporting on the native Christian churches in the South Villages, the Rev. Khristanga Biswas writes:—

"The present condition of our churches is very satisfactory, and they are becoming increasingly independent and self-supporting. I have every reason to expect that all the native Christian churches will support their pastors and become independent ere long."

THE INDIAN BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

As a very gratifying proof of the growingly aggressive activity of the native Christian churches, the recent establishment of the Indian Baptist Missionary Society is surely a very encouraging fact.

A few extracts from the first annual report of this new organisation cannot fail to interest friends of mission work.

"The Society is a bright example of how a mustard seed grows into a large tree. The first seed sprouted out at Serampore only a year ago and has now spread its branches to the North-West Provinces, East Bengal, and to Orissa. The success which this Society has achieved within such a short period of time will doubtless convince those who were not sanguine about its success that the Society will live for some time yet. We are heartily thankful to the Indian churches for so readily according this infant Society all the help it needed. What else can be a matter of more satisfaction than the fact that our Indian churches have learnt to extend a helping hand to the cause of Christ! It cannot be ignored that the Indian churches are beholden

to our foreign missionaries for almost all they possess, but it is a matter of great gratification that the latter are not the foundation or pillars of this Society. The money is Indian, the agents are Indian, and the business of the Society is managed by Indians too. These facts will not fail to convince everyone that the Society is not under European superintendence. Several friends were appointed to form what we call the Central Committee, and the management of the Society's affairs was placed in their hands. This Committee had four sittings during the year under report."

This new organisation has now in its service, and entirely supported by contributions from the native Christian churches: a Bible-woman, Sister Mariam Begam, working at Bwhani, in the Punjaub; a native evangelist, Dayal Chunder Haldar, working in Hill Tipperah, E. Bengal; a second evangelist, Brother Atyananda, at work at Augul, in Orissa; and a third, named Nobin, working amongst the Santhals.

We rejoice at this proof of aggressive evangelistic zeal amongst the native Christian churches of Bengal.

NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTIONS AND SCHOOLS.

i.

SERAMPORE COLLEGE.

Principal—The Rev. E. S. SUMMERS, M.A.

Tutors—The Revs. C. E. Wilson, B.A., and J. W. Gilbert, B.Sc.

During the furlough of the Rev. E. S. Summers, M.A., in England, the Rev. T. W. Norledge has been the Acting Principal, and reports on the work of the College during the past year as follows:—

"During the cold season the Theological students spent two months in camp, preaching in the towns and villages of the district. They were divided into two bands, each of which stayed out a month, and was under the supervision of one of the missionaries. No difficulty was generally experienced in gathering large crowds together in the markets. More than seven hundred Gospel portions were sold.

"Preaching was regularly carried on during the Jagannath Festival, and the evangelists—with occasional help from the students—have continued the work in the town. English services on Sunday evenings in Serampore, and Bengali services at either Johnnagar Chapel or Serampore have been regularly held. The Johnnagar Chapel has been repaired at considerable expense. Babu Hari Kumar Dass commenced work as an evangelist at Singhur at the beginning of the year, but through ill-health was unable to stay many months. He has since worked at Serampore, and Babu Mati Lal Sircar has continued the work at Singhur alone.

"Mr. Wilson was compelled, under medical advice, to go to England on furlough in the spring. His departure was deeply regretted by the teachers and students of the College and the members of the church and congregation. He had so energeti-

cally engaged in every kind of Christian service that nearly all alike were sensible of how severe a loss his enforced furlough would be to the varied work of the College. Mr. Page very heartily responded to an invitation to assist in the College work on Mr. Wilson's departure.

"Sickness and death have been busy in our midst. Hardly any of the College staff but has not, at one time or other, been compelled, through ill-health, to keep away from work. Babu Nepal Chandra Patra, an evangelist, was bereaved of his wife and eldest daughter. Mrs. Gilbert, only about eight months after her arrival in India, was sorely afflicted, and quickly passed away. The intense grief into which our brother, Mr. Gilbert, was plunged by this sad event only those who lived with him can at all realise. I will not dwell further on the dark side of the past. I hope brighter times will cheer the brethren in the coming years.

'The Third Annual Convention of Evangelists was held at the College in the spring. The attendance was larger than in the past, and the meetings were felt by all present to be of a helpful character. The progress made by the Indian Baptist Missionary Society during the previous year, and the deep interest shown in it by Indian brethren, were very encouraging. The missionary meetings were most enthusiastic and stimulating.

"The English Theological students were permitted, through ill-health, to postpone their Midsummer examination till the opening of the new term in June. The result was not satisfactory. They did not pass the examination as creditably as usual. Doubtless the results of the annual examination, which will shortly be held, will be better. Amrita Lall Sircar obtained an average of 619, and Jagadananda Nag of 419. Amrita Lall Sircar has again taken the first place in the Bengali Teachers' Examination of the India Sunday School Union. We heartily thank the gentlemen who have assisted in examining the English and Vernacular Theological classes. The following is a list of the subjects studied by the English class during the year:—

"There are twenty-five students in the Normal Class, one of whom will appear at the next Middle Vernacular Examination. The four students referred to in the last report were successful in the examination. One of them is now working as a teacher. The remaining three, with two new students, are studying the course appointed for the Government Normal Class Examination. The opening of this higher class of study at the beginning of the year will, I hope, result in time in the Society having more efficient teachers for its schools. Mr. Gilbert, who teaches some of the subjects of this class, is, among other things, instructing the students in Practical Teaching.

"The superintendence of the Boarding School was resumed by the Rev. B. C. Ghose at the beginning of the year; the Rev. S. S. Mukerjea, who during Mr. Ghose's absence had charge of the school, returned to his work at Magurah. Three boys appeared at the Entrance Examination last January, one of whom, Rajendra Lall Mondle, passed in the second division."

Π

ORISSA NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTION, CUTTACK.

Principal—Rev. Thos. Bailey.

Tutors—Rev. Geo. Howells, B.A., B.D., and Rev. Shem Sahu.

Assistant Tutor—Rev. Niladri Naik.

The Principal of the Cuttack College is the Rev. Thomas Bailey, who reports:—

"The work of the new year began, as usual, on the first Monday in March. We find this time most convenient, as it admits of the young men spending practically the whole of the cold season in evangelistic work. At the close of the session, and after the sittings of the Annual Conference, the students are sent, as far as expedient, to the districts to which they belong; evangelistic parties are formed having a missionary, or one or more of the senior native evangelists, at the head, and the students are distributed amongst them for special tours or for the whole of the season, as may be found most convenient. They thus enjoy opportunities for practical work of a very valuable kind, and receive a most important part of their training.

"The new session opened with eight students, who were joined the following week by two others, raising the number to ten.

"The whole of the young men have studied with me in Butler's 'Analogy,' Chaps. II. and III.; Church History, 'From Christ to Constantine,' Chaps. I. and II.; and Cambridge Bible on Acts, Introduction and Commentary to end of Chap. II. There

have been few absences from the lessons owing either to sickness or any other cause, and the whole class has worked remarkably well.

"The assistant tutor, the Rev. Niladri Naik, in addition to exercising the usual supervision, has led the young men in Dr. Buckley's lectures on the prophecies concerning Christ from Daniel to Malachi, and in the Epistle to the Galatians.

"Simcon Sahu, the senior student, having completed his course of study, has been cordially accepted by Conference as an evangelist on the usual probation."

Mr. Howells writes :--

"The following is the list of subjects I have taught during the past session, with the assistance of my wife, who has taken the classes in New Testament Greek and in English Literature and Grammar."

- "I. Apologerics.—Iverach's 'The Truth of Christianity' (Second half, thus finishing the book). A class of two.
- "H. Biblical Theology.—Adency's 'New Testament Theology' (Chaps, VI.-VIII., furshing the Teaching of Christ; and Introduction to the Theology of the Apostles). A class of ten. Bennet's 'Old Testament Theology' (pages 1-75. Introduction and Israel in History). A class of two.
- "III. SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY.—Laidlaw's 'Foundation Truths of Scripture' (Chaps. I.-IV.). A class of two. (Chaps. VI.-X., completing the book). A class of two.
- "IV. OLD TESTAMENT EXEGUSTS The Book of Job (Chaps, I.-X.; with Introduction, Analysis, and Notes). A class of tel.
- "V. Hebrew.—Davidson's 'Hebrew Grammar' (to the end of the Irregular Verbs, with xercises in composition). The Book of Jonah (Translation into English and parsing). A class of one.
- "VI. GREEK.—Huddleston's 'Essentials of New Testament Greek' (Lessons L.—NXV., with exercises and corresponding grammatical portions). A class of two. Lesson XV. to end, with exercises and grammar. First Epistle of John (Translation into English, with parsing and grammatical notes). A class of two.
- "VII. ENGLISH.—Literature.—Milton's 'Paradise Lost' (Book III., vv. 1-415, with Introduction and Notes). A class of two. Grammar.—'A New Manual of English Grammar' pages 1-79, to end of verbs). A class of three. Translation Exercises in some of the Theological books studied during the session, and in Milligan's 'Lord's Prayer.' Classes of two and three.

"The intellectual attainments of students on entering our college vary considerably. While one has received only what would correspond to an ordinary Board school education, another is an undergraduate of Calcutta University. This makes the work of classification somewhat difficult, but it has been my aim to give each student just as much as he is able to receive. An increase of classes and subjects has been thereby rendered necessary. Three have pursued their studies with me only in the vernacular, three have taken some English, two have done more advanced English and made a beginning in Greek, two have studied largely in English and have made considerable progress in New Testament Greek, while one of these two has laid a firm foundation in Hebrew, and shows every sign of being able to take a course on a par with that of the average British theological student.

"On principle I have made large use of the vernacular even when the books prescribed have been in English. The Indian mind is tempted to think more of words than of thoughts, more of the outward expression than the inward reality. This temptation to superficiality is, I find from experience, greatly increased where the training given is entirely in a foreign language. Therefore, as an instrument of education, I have had my students, including the most advanced, pay considerable attention to translation of their studies into the language of their own vernacular, the language they are to use in their future work. An education entirely in English

—the common method in secular colleges—seems to me a grave mistake, viewed from a strictly educational standpoint.

"The students have, with perhaps one or two exceptions, worked hard and earnestly in my classes, as well as in those of my wife, throughout the session. Teaching them has been a real delight, and we trust this important time of preparation may be of real service to them in their life work of winning Orissa for Christ"

Mr. Shem Sahu reports as follows:—

"All the students have studied with me in Wayland's 'Moral Science' the whole of the Chap. I. of Part I.; and in exegesis the Gospel by John in the Cambridge Bible Series, Introduction and the Commentary on the first chapter. The sermon class has been held on the Saturday morning. In training the future preachers of Orissa our aim is to point them to the old paths and to the Godward side of the grand old doctrine of Grace."

III.

NORTH-WEST NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTION.

DELHI.

Principal—The Rev. STEPHEN S. THOMAS.

Assistant—The Rev. Joel Waiz Lall, M.A.

The Rev. Stephen S. Thomas, the Principal of the Delhi Institution reports:—

"In my last report I stated that the marked event of the year was Mr. Joel Lall's taking his B.A. with honours. This year I am able to add that he has come out first in the Punjaub in the M.A. examination. At our North-West Conference in Agra a recognition service was held in Havelock Chapel, when our friend was formally set apart for the work of the ministry. May the great Head of the Church deign to use the life He has so richly gifted and make it a source of blessing to this land. Another gratifying feature of the session has been the settlement of six men in work in different stations of the Society. Most of them had been with me for several years, having been boys in the school: and it is a matter for great thankfulness that they give so much promise of useful work. May the Lord of the harvest use them also in His vineyard!

"It is with great sorrow that I have to report that one man, Daniel Peter, who was to have gone out with the other six, was found guilty of adultery, and was dismissed. This is the first case of the kind during my twelve years of office. Our hearts have also been very saddened by the death of two of our most promising big boys. For George Yaqub I cherished many hopes of service here, but the Master saw fit to take him from us.

"The results of the recent examinations are, on the whole, highly satisfactory, and give evidence that the men have worked well. To give other testimony than my own, I may quote from the reports of two of the examiners. The Rev. D. Jones, the Examiner on the Epistle to the Romans, writes: 'On the whole, they

have done well, and I have much pleasure in testifying to what I consider a good set of papers on a very important subject.' The Rev. A. Law, who examined on the Contents of the Pentateuch, writes: 'Altogether it is very clear that the class has well mastered the five very full books given for examination.'

"Bazaar Preaching.—This has been carried on vigorously for the greater part of the session. Mr. Joel W. Lall is quite an accession to our preaching staff both in the bazaar and in the ordinary services. Preaching in the streets of Delhi is a severe test of a man's temper, courage, and character. When possible, the men have been divided into three parties, Mr. Hasler and Mr. M. J. Pande joining us in this work. In the spring I took the men out for a little district work, and was again pleased with the earnestness and fervour and simplicity with which they presented the Gospel to the villagers.

"Boarding School,—The number of boys is forty; their conduct has been good and their work very fair. No general review of the session's work can give much idea of what it is to be in charge of an institution like this, with sixty or seventy people looking to you for the direction of almost every detail of their life—instruction, play, food, clothes, sicknesses, quarrels, and, as the Indian auctioneer says, 'other details too numerous to mention.' I wonder what sort of report a mother with a dezen children could write of her year's work in the family! Still less can I report my work with my five dozen! May He whose they all really are deign to accept and bless the manifold and often menial service rendered in His name."

CHRISTIAN ELEMENTARY YERNACULAR DAY SCHOOLS.

At the close of last year there were in attendance in the vernacular Christian day schools connected with the work of the Society in India

6,806 children

taught by

288 native Christian teachers.

And it may be well to again mention the policy of the Committee in connection with elementary Christian education.

The Committee recognise it as a duty to see to it that an elementary vernacular Christian education is provided for all the children of native converts, especially in districts where there are no Government schools; such education being always upon distinctly Christian lines. If higher and more advanced education is desired, the parents should avail themselves of the Government institutions for such purpose.

During the past four years the Rev. R. H. Tregillus, of Khoolna, has had charge of all the schools connected with our Eastern Bengal Mission, and during this term has wrought most beneficial changes in the staff of teachers and in the general management and equipment of the schools, and is therefore able to hand over this most important department of mission

work in admirable condition to his successor, the Rev. W. W. Milne, of Barisal, who takes charge from the commencement of the New Year.

The report of Mr. Tregillus is as follows:

"Reference was made in the last report to a special effort made to help a number of teachers to obtain their needed Government Certificates. The results of the Government Examinations of last year were published early this year, and we learnt that three teachers had passed the Chatra Britti, three the Upper Primary, and five the Lower Primary Examinations. In this way they became qualified as I., II., and III. Grade teachers respectively.

"The successes of the scholars at the Government Examinations at the close of last year, as published early this year, were fewer in the Lower Primary standard than the year before. Only twelve Christian boys, two girls, and eleven non-Christian boys obtained passes. This was partly owing to a slight disarrangement of work occasioned by teachers preparing for their own examinations, and partly to the raising of the examination standard in some subjects. In the Upper Primary Examination three passes were secured. For the first time scholars went in for the Chatra Britti Examination, and four certificates were obtained. Should ordinary success attend our scholars at the various examinations this year, the results will be beyond comparison with results of previous years. At the September examinations our schools supplied twenty-two Christians and eight non-Christians Upper Primary, and three Chatra Britti candidates; while from the ranks of our teachers there were three candidates at each of the examinations. For the Lower Primary Examination to be held in November we have about 170 candidates in our schools. Allowing a liberal reduction for absentees and failures, we hope to double the record of two years ago.

"The routine of work during the year has not materially differed from that of the previous two years. There have been eleven trips from Khulna to the Beels district during the year, involving over twenty weeks of travelling. When visiting most of the schools for the second time I had the company and assistance of Mr. Milne. This gave him an introduction to the special sphere of work he hopes so soon to enter upon.

"To deepen our gratitude to Him who has so patiently borne with usin spite of our failures, I should like, by a word or two of comparison, to indicate a few tokens of progress during the past four years.

"The most satisfactory feature of this comparison is the fact that Christian scholars contribute some 67 per cent, of the increase. The progress made in the work of the scholars is seen when we compare the number (already given) of candidates at the various Government Examinations with what obtained four years ago.

"Seldom, I believe, did the number of L.P. passes reach twenty; only occasionally was an Upper Primary pass secured, and a Christian Chatra Britti candidate from our schools was unknown. Among our teachers the Government certificate-holders were—one Chatra Britti, three Upper Primary, and two Lower Primary. We hope, when the results of this year's examinations are furnished, to find on our staff ten Chatra Britti, nine Upper Primary, and over thirty Lower Primary certificate-holders.

"Encouraging as are these results we should be dissa isfied had we not cause to

believe that our teachers have gained a deeper sense of the sacred responsibilities which pertain to their position. May blessings already granted prove but an earnest of richer blessings awaiting this important work in the future."

BISHTOPORE BOARDING SCHOOL.

The Rev. Khristanga Biswas, the master of Bishtopore School, reports:—

"The present number of boys on the roll is twenty-two; fifteen out of them are supported by funds contributed by the Birmingham Y.M.M.A., and seven are day scholars. On Sunday they attend the Sunday class regularly and after the Sunday class they go about begging handfuls of rice from the Christians. They collect together the rice and sell it to be spent for God's work. They have newly established a prayer meeting which is held on every Wednesday at every Christian house, where they glorify Him by offering prayers and reading Scripture to them. They have also a Christian Endeavour meeting, composed of preachers and teachers, which takes place on every Saturday. For this I am glad to say that these boys are moved by our Saviour, who quickens their hearts with His Spirit, making them true workers in His vineyard."

THE CUTTACK HIGH SCHOOL.

Though not strictly a missionary institution, it has always enjoyed the cordial co-operation and good wishes of all the missionaries. Mr. John Young, the headmaster, reports:—

"The results of the Middle Scholarship and the Primary Scholarship Examinations were received at the beginning of the year now reported on. One of our pupils passed the former, and four the latter. The one who was successful at the M.S. Examination also passed a highly creditable examination for admission to the Government Telegraph Department.

"Two of our old pupils have done exceedingly well. One, Miss Isabella G. Samuells, has taken the B.A. degree of the Calcutta University with Honours in English. She joined the above school fifteen years ago when she was four years old. She gained four scholarships, three of which—a Primary, a Middle, and a Matriculation—were won while she was with us. On the occasion of her passing the Matriculation Examination she was at the head of the list of the successful candidates in Orissa. She is now studying for the M.A. degree at the Government College here. The other is Mr. G. H. Stewart, the elder son of the late Dr. W. D. Stewart, for many years the Civil Surgeon of Cuttack. He has qualified for the M.D. degree at the Edinburgh University Medical College, and has recently joined the Medical Service in this country, having completed his course of studies at Netley.

"It may also be interesting to the friends of the institution to know that all our assistant teachers—six in number—are our old pupils.

"The number of names on the registers is sixty-three."

KHARRAR BOARDING SCHOOL.

The Rev. Geo. Anstie Smith reports:

"The boarding school has proceeded very satisfactorily this year; the moral tone has been exceptionally good.

"The numbers have remained nearly stationary at about 40 throughout the year. Of these 13 are in the Middle School classes, and 27 in the Upper and Lower Primary classes. Four boys will (D.V.) present themselves at the Middle School Examination to be held shortly. Last year one boy was successful in this examination, and he hopes to pass the higher examination in English very soon."

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND SOCIETIES OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAYOUR.

The total number of Sunday-school scholars in regular attendance during the past year was 5,326, with 432 teachers.

The Rev. W. Carey, who is Sunday-school Secretary for Bengal, writes :-

"The first place on the Sunday-school roll of honour has been won by the district known as the *South Villages*. This district (including Canning Town and Mutlah) has during the past year gained three schools, six teachers, and 110 scholars. For years they have sent in regular monthly returns, and their reward lies in the solid prosperity and progress of the work.

"The second place on the roll of honour belongs to Jessore. The missionary there, enfeebled by repeated attacks of fever, and not naturally of a statistical turn of mind (except where the New Jerusalem is concerned), has yet given himself to this business with an unforgetting constancy which has made me his debtor and forwarded the work. Jessore has added one school and nine scholars to its list.

"Chittagong has the third place on the roll of honour. Though there are but five schools in that district. Moreover, one school and fourteen scholars have been added this year. The missionary there is of a statistical turn of mind. His returns have never to be touted for. They walk in of their own accord on the due date."

The Rev. John Stubbs, reporting upon Sunday-school work in Patna, N.W.P., writes:—

"One dear child, a bright intelligent girl of about ten, has been called during the year to the heavenly home. She was one of our first scholars, and soon won a warm place in our hearts. Her mother, a Musalmani, a widow, though she did not hinder her from coming to school, always seemed fearful lest she should become a Christian. The child herself, however, loved to hear about Jesus, and to join in singing His praise. The ladies of the Z.B.M.M. hospital told us that when she was there for treatment, she used to cry on Sunday mornings because she could not come to the school. When she came home to die, though she was almost literally only a skeleton her soul still clung to the school, and though her body could not walk to it, up to the Sunday before her death her mother used to carry her poor little feeble frame, and lay it on the ground at Mrs. Stubbs's feet, and there she remained all through the school. When she died, our only feeling was one of thankfulness. This is the fourth girl who has died since the school commenced, six years ago, and we have reason to believe that they are all with Jesus. I cannot help thinking that the Lord has called these girls to Himself to outwit the parents, who have been full of dread lest the children should come too much under our influence, and so be led to Him. I think we can truly sing :-

> "Patna children we see standing close by their King, And He smiles, as their song of salvation they sing."

The Rev. J. G. Potter, the Sunday-school Secretary for the North-West Provinces, reports:—

"The statistics for 1899 show little change from 1898. The interest in Sunday-school work has been sustained, but there is no great increase in numbers. It is hoped that special attention to this most important branch of Mission work will be given during the next year. Our new Secretary, the Rev. W. J. Price, whom we alt welcome to the office, will, I feel sure, do his best to stir us up in this matter. Our Conference has also asked him to act as Conference Secretary of the Christian Endeavour Movement, in connection with which much remains to be done in India as in other lands. It will be my aim to carefully study this movement during my prospective furlough in England. Already a beginning has been made at Kharar, Delbi, Agra, and other of our stations."

From Agra the Rev. Daniel Jones reports:-

"Our Sunday-schools, nine in number, have 356 on the rolls, with an average attendance of 284. There is no work of greater importance being done in India today than that done among the young in Sunday-schools. But it is not possible for us to have all our Sunday-school teaching on Sundays, so we have Bible Schools on Saturdays and Wednesdays, and here we have 400 children in attendance, so that altogether in Day- and Sunday-schools we have at times as many as 700 children under instruction."

From Cuttack, Orissa, Mr. Harvey writes :-

"With forty-three names on the roll our school can scarcely be said to be a large one. Those who are on the roll, however, have attended regularly and shown considerable interest in the lessons—the International Series. The Sunday School Union report shows that in the examination on the Gospel of John four passed in the first class, Middle Division, with an average of eighty-two and a half, and three in the second class; one in the third class, Junior Division; and three in the first class, Viva Voce. Considering the examination in English is open to all India these results are good, and evidence at least a knowledge of the facts contained in the Gospel of the Divinity."

From Berhampore, Orissa, Babu Daniel Mahanty, Superintendent, writes:-

"We feel exceedingly grateful to have been spared to write the twenty-fifth annual report of the school. The number of pupils on the roll on 30th September, 1899, was 136—girls fifty-nine, and boys seventy-seven—against sixty-four girls and sixty-four boys reported last year. There are twelve classes, six for girls and six for boys, and twelve teachers, five female and seven male. Twenty-three of the pupils appeared for the I.S.S.U. Scripture examination, held in the month of July last, of whom seven passed in the Middle Division (one in the first class, five in the second, and one in the third). The report of the other Divisions has not yet been received. During the year, nine girls and ten boys were baptized and received into the fellowship of he Church, three girls and four boys have been candidates for baptism, and six girls and three boys are receiving instruction from the paster in the inquirers' class confucted by him on Saturdays."

Comparing this table with the statistics for the previous year, it exhibits a falling off of twenty-three societies and 350 members.

The Rev. W. Carey writes :-

[&]quot;'He that ploweth ought to plow in hope."

[&]quot;My first thought as I went out to sean the diminished furrows in the Christian Endeavour field was, What is wrong? The field spreads out from my stile like a map. In some parts were straight clean lines well out and well sown with seed. In others, zigzaggy tracks that spoke of wandering eyes and nerveless grasp. Here and there lines that led to nothing—faint scratches almost obliterated by the lapse of time. A good portion lay waste and desolate, untended and untouched.

[&]quot;Whatever's wrong—it's not the plough. That was my final thought. There it stood in the centre of the field—as good a plough as ever God gave the iron for and man forged into shape—a fine, sharp, deep-cutting implement, capable of churning the soil after a thorough and workmanlike fashion, to the great enrichment of the

harvest. But it lay idle for lack of the yoked oxen, faith and love, to draw it (no others patiently toil all day), and the yoked hands, purpose and pertinacity, to drive it. Broad acres of fallow land but an unused plough: that was the secret. A tool needs a hand to guide it. A plough presupposes a ploughman.

"This plough is the Christian Endeavour idea—with the pledge for the blade—and on the handles is written 'wanted a firm grip and a steady aim'—'He that ploweth ought to plow in hope.'"

'When I got down from the gate and began tramping the furrows my heart got lighter and boots heavier with every step. Good soil, at any rate, I thought, as the rich loam clung to my feet.

"There is zeal and devotion to Christ in the Bengali Church, a willingness to spend and be spent, pathetic aspiration for more earnest and fruitful Christian experience—only it is latent and sometimes dormant. It is liable, on occasion, to exhaust itself in jets of extravagance and excitement: at other times to weep itself away under the influence of penitent emotions without the accompaniments of a newly-directed will and strenuous sustained efforts after a better life. Then it is peculiarly the prey of an indolent spirit, and very easily chilled by the indifference of others, especially of natural leaders like the missionary and his staff. But, all the same, it is there—fallow ground needing the plough, waiting to be turned over, laid out and prepared in expectation of the harvest it is fitted to yield.

"The richest part of the field is the Beel district of Backergunge and Madaiipore Ihere, alas, lies our worst loss. Some of the societies were very small. Some have been merged in others. Some, it is said, have never really deserved the name. Their response to the 'roll call' at rallies was taken as evidence of their existence when they were not really organised or at work.

"Signs of Improvement.—Practically the whole of our loss lies in one plot, and it is sufficiently accounted for by the local circumstances. These circumstances are rapidly changing. There is the making of a strong Union of real 'Christian Endeavour' in the community, and all the signs point to the time being near.

"For one thing, Mr. Spurgeon has thrown the weight of his supreme influence into the scale. The Beclman, a new paper which he edits, gives a column to Christian Endeavour. He has appointed two territorial bishops, both sons of the Beel, both young, gifted and carnest—one of them with a special interest and training in children's work, the other wise, experienced, with all the moral effect of a great renunciation (the sure pay of the mission for the uncertain income of an independent church) added to a high Christian character and the pastorate of the largest church in the Beels.

"Then the Indian Secretary (to the front in Christian Endeavour as in everything else) has recently visited the district, heartening the members and presiding at their last annual meeting. Moreover, all the schools are passing into the hands of Mr. Milne—a canny Scotchman with C.E. on his coat and in his heart; while at Madaripore, of the two European brethren who have just been appointed, one at least is known to be a Christian Endeavour leader. We shall see something to rejoice over in 1900 if we plough on 'in hope.'

"The Rest of the Field.—It has seemed necessary to go into detail on the Beel section, because, as I said, practically all our loss lies there. Elsewhere it is nothing. Only two societies have ceased to be in other parts of the field, while the gain has been seven.

"So, then, we have finished our 'tramp in the furrows.' It has been tiring work —but we have now exact knowledge of the state of the field. There are sunny por-

tions it was a pleasure to stand in. Let us not forget them. The clods that bestrew the surface are there to be broken, not to block the way. The soil will be all the richer for them then. As for the plough, let us lay hold of it with both hands earnestly and drive ahead, remembering that

"'We fall to rise,

Are baffled to fight better,

Sleep to wake.'
"'He that ploweth ought to plow in hope.'"

The Rev. Khristanga Biswas, of Bishtopore, bears valuable testimony to the great value of the Endeavour movement in the South Villages. He writes:—

"The Christian Endeavour movement is rapidly spreading throughout our churches. I believe that young men of these churches will be stirred up and moved by the blessed Spirit to work zealously for Christ. I am sure such a movement is a valuable thing for Christian churches, and at the same time is very promising for the future."

The Rev. George Anstie Smith, of Kharrar, also reports:-

"The Christian Endeavour Society carried on entirely by the boys amongst themselves is an increasing power for good, the daily Bible study, based on the excellent arrangement in world-wide use, is led by each active member in turn. On the Sabbath, I am usually present, otherwise the whole arrangements are carried out by them. They practise discipline amongst themselves, with the best results, and are a little chary of accepting new members to full privileges. Two at least from amongst them are first-rate bazaar speakers and hold the crowd better than most preachers."

ORPHANAGES.

GIRLS' ORPHANAGE, CUTTACK, ORISSA.

Superintendents: MISS LEIGH AND MISS ADA N. THOMPSON, B.Sc.

Miss Leigh reports:-

"The past year has given us encouragement in many ways. There has been marked improvement in the general behaviour of the pupils. The absence of several girls who caused a strong element of unrest and resistance to rules accounts for this change. The Christian Endeavour Society is now amalgamated with the other branch societies recently formed by Miss Gleazer and Miss Barrass, our valuable teacher, Susela Roul, being the secretary. This new arrangement will, we trust, develop interest, and help to prepare the pupils for future usefulness in Christian work when they leave us. Eight attend the inquirer's class. During the year ten have been received into the orphanage, five have married, one has been dismissed, and two have returned to their parents living in Calcutta. The general health of the children has been excellent, and the report of the sanitary inspector who pays surprise visits is satisfactory. We thank the friends who have so generously sent us gifts of garments, toys, and books, all of which have greatly helped us. Skirts, pinafores, jackets, and patchwork are very useful, as well as small boxes for prizes."

Miss Thompson, B.Sc., writes:-

"There are 107 scholars in the day-school, 64 coming from the orphanage and 43 from the Christian villages. Thirteen girls passed the Government examination in the vernacular standards, and two passed in English. Nineteen girls sat for the India Sunday School Union Examination (subject—the International Lessons, January to June). Ujwalla, Imogen, and Lydia, our three eldest girls, as they teach in the Sunday-school, took the Teachers' Examination, and all passed in the second class. Of the others, who took the Scholars' Examination in the middle and junior divisions according to age, five passed in the first class, seven in the second, three in he third, and one failed."

THE BOYS' ORPHANAGE, CUTTACK.

The Rev. Thomas Bailey states :-

"This institution has continued its useful course. The number of inmates, though not large, is larger than at any previous period while it has been in my charge. Last year we reported twenty-four boys on the premises, and eight receiving help while residing with their friends. Three of the former have left us—one is earning his living as a domestic servant; one has been taken by his mother, an ayah in Calcutta, to live with her; and another has left to be with his mother, an ayah in the district. Six have been received. Three of these are from the Cuttack villages and the need in each case was specially urgent; the remaining three had been received as infants into the Girls' Orphanage, and were assiduously cared for by Miss Leigh until they had reached an age when they could be trusted to share the rougher life amongst the boys. They are bright little fellows, and have settled down very comfortably. This increases our number to twenty-seven on the premises, and, after various changes, there are nine receiving help while residing with their friends.

"Of those on the premises, two are in domestic service, six are working at the Press under Mr. Harvey, and, of the remainder, fifteen attend the day school provided for them on the premises, two attend the Girls' Day School under Miss Thompson, and two have been received into the Mission English High School by Mr. Young."

THE FAMINE AND FAMINE ORPHANS.

Before the close of last year, the Rev. Daniel Jones, of Agra, wrote :-

"Already we are face to face with a fearful famine. We can hear the threatening murmurs of a terrible storm of want and woe advancing towards us. In Rajputana to the west of us, and at our doors they are said to be in near prospect of a worse famine than in the terrible year of 1868. Already there is a water famine, and troops are guarding the little water there is. Water and grass are selling at fabulous prices. Thousands are already on relief works. Crowds are pressing on in our direction hoping for something. Our prices are nearly at famine rates. This at the beginning of October, what will it be in May and June?—for no rain now means no harvest in March—April, and already the autumn harvest has failed. Our hearts almost fail within us, as the memories of 1897 crowd in upon us; but the Lord reigneth."

The Rev. A. Law also reported :-

"The gaunt hand of famine is again knocking at our doors. Distress in this district will be keen this winter. We dread to hear again so soon the wailing of widow and orphan, and we wonder what God's plans may be for this vast, darkened land. Whatever be the immediate future we all pray that the will of the Father may be done, and the ultimate end the glory and extension of His kingdom."

The Rev. Geo. Anstie Smith, of Kharrar, wrote:

"My impression is that signs are not wanting of a most terrible time near at hand, to which 1897 will be as nothing. Pinched faces and hungry looks meet one everywhere. We surely must do something to meet this terrible visitation."

Since the close of 1899, the number of the famine-stricken have alarmingly increased, and, at present, more than four millions of the people are being kept alive by Government relief.

The land from which millions get their only food is rainless and parched, and already millions of gaunt sufferers are trying to earn a bare subsistence on relief works, while many more, equally destitute, are too far away, or too weak, to profit by Government help; and for some time past corpses have been found in the jungle, and children are being sold by their parents. Worse still, till July, at the earliest, no grain will be available for food, or fodder for cattle. Besides this, in districts outside the famine area, grain is at famine prices. According to the latest statement, help on the largest scale is needed for comforts for sick, clothing for destitute, and housing of orphans, and replacing agricultural and industrial plant.

Mr. Donald Smeaton, a Member of the Viceregal Council in Calcutta, who was sent by the Indian Government to the famine-stricken districts as Special Commissioner, reports by the last Indian mail:—

"In my visit to the famine-stricken provinces, which was undertaken by order of the Viceroy, I travelled through Central and part of Western India. The condition of the country is much worse than I had anticipated. For hundreds of miles on end not a single stalk of corn or even dry stubble is to be seen, nor yet a blade of green pusture. There is no water except in the larger rivers and streams. The whole country is one vast, bare, brown, lonely desert. The mortality among cattle is appalling. The officers of the Government are doing their very best to alleviate the general misery, but they cannot achieve the impossible. They have not money enough to do more than barely sustain the life of the five millions who are now employed on relief works, and of thousands upon thousands of those silent sufferers in deserted villages who would rather die than labour in relief works. More money is wanted, and wanted quickly. I have witnessed two famines; I know the people well and their patience under suffering, but I think the crisis through which we are now passing is by far the most acute of the century. Great Britain and Ireland owe a debt to the Indian peasant, a debt of millions upon millions. India has risen as one

man to support by her voice, as well as by money, her fellow subjects in the South African struggle. Let the United Kingdom stretch out to her now a helping hand and extricate her from the deadly grip of famine!

"No words are needed to emphasise the terrible condition of things implied in the fact that nearly five million natives are kept alive by charitable relief, whilst more than twelve times as many, including the worst cases of all, which escape the notice of the Famine Commission and its officials—have the utmost difficulty in keeping body and soul together. Thousands have already died from absolute lack of food, and the number of victims is constantly increasing. The severity of the famine cannot be expected to abate for three months to come, and it is more likely that the distress which began in the failure of rain last autumn, followed by a partial failure of the usual winter rains, will be intensified by the hotter season, and the probable scarcity of drinking water. It would be impossible to exaggerate the terrible nature of this visitation, which in many respects is worse than the great famine of 1897."

The committee record with feelings of great gratitude the prompt and generous response made to the famine appeals which appeared in the January and February issues of the MISSIONARY HERALD, which has enabled them to cable out to the Famine Relief Committees, working in connection with our own and the Zenana Missions, sums amounting to Five Thousand Two Hundred and Eighty Pounds.

FAMINE ORPHANS.

AGRA, N.W.P.

The Rev. Albert Law, reporting on the seventy boys in the Agra Famine Orphanage, a legacy from the distressing famine of three years ago, writes:—

"They are well, cheerful and obedient. Their splendid health all through the het weather is largely due, the Doctor says, to their systematic exercise—football, cricket, and collisthenics. Two boys died during the year, and there still remain two others who have not yet outgrown the effects of the terrible privations through which they passed during the famine.

"Sometimes a visitor asks, 'Are they all Christians?' No, they are not, as an equal number of English boys taken at random would not be. But they at least are not heathen, nor is it likely they ever will be. Some are Christians. There is a society amongst them, which meets every Saturday afternoon, and forty boys have signed this pledge of membership:—'I promise that I will love my Lord Jesus Christ and will pray and read the Bible every day. I also promise that every day and all the day I will endeavour to please Jesus.'

"Somebody else asks 'What are you going to do with them? Are they going to sponge on the Mission when they grow up?' Not if we can help it. Seven are learning to be carpenters, seven tailors, and seven shoemakers. One is a barber and cuts the hair of the rest, and with fear and trembling I have now entrusted him with a razor. As the smaller boys grow up they, too, will be put to trades. We have an

opening for gardeners as soon as we have boys big enough, and as many as possible will be trained as household servants. One has already gone out into service, and on Sundays turns the heads of his old associates by appearing at church in a resplendent drab and scarlet livery with brass buttons and a broad smile. Of course, we are on the look out also for preachers and evangelists. If a boy shows ability he will have every opportunity, but we are not anxious on this score. We are only anxious that every boy may have the love of Jesus and the hatred of sin burning in his heart and then we know that whether he be barber or carpenter or evangelist, he will preach as we preach, because he must, and can't help himself. May God give us all to see this."

The Rev. Daniel Jones, pleading with friends in England on behalf of these "famine waifs," writes:—

"We have under our care seventy lads. We are bound to face the question, What are they to do? They cannot be all 'pen-holders.' Shall we teach them, or get them taught, to take hold of the saw, the needle, the last, the hammer, and so on? We had better do so. Already we have in a quiet way started our lads on carpentering, tailoring, shoemaking, and cooking, and they take to these things very well on the whole. There is much to be done, and I would close with the closing words of our last year's report in reference to many of our dear little lads who are waiting for some kind friends at home to adopt them. If you could see one of our lads kiss the photograph of the lady that I told him was his mother—he has no other—I think a number of motherly hearts at home would respond and send us word, 'Give me a boy.' We shall be glad to hear of any friends who will be willing to help. Money sent to the Mission House, London, will be duly reported and sent out. Now, dear friends, to the help of the Lord in this matter, and secure at once real living connection with the work out here."

Doubtless, as one of the results of the present scathing visitation of famine, the number of famine waifs thrown upon the hands of our missionaries will be largely increased, both boys and girls, and larger gifts will be needed to meet the cost of their maintenance, clothing, education, and training.

The Committee confidently anticipate that the funds for this purpose will be willingly and promptly contributed by friends in this country.

WORK AMONGST ENGLISH-SPEAKING NATIVE STUDENTS.

In the capital City of Calcutta, the Rev. Charles Jordan has for some years past conducted important work amongst the better circumstanced native students in the Government and other Colleges of that great educational centre.

Mr. Jordan writes:-

"I have carried on regular evangelistic work among English-speaking native

students. A room has been allowed me for holding a Bible-class in the Y.M.C.A. Native Branch, 85, College Street. Every Friday evening a class has been held. Our subject of study has been the Gospel by St. John, which is the favourite Gospel with educated young Indians here. We have had a question-box outside this room. From this box the accumulated questions have been forwarded to me at least once a week, and the work of answering these questions has given a grand opening for teaching the Truth, especially as to the deity of our Lord, the Incarnation, and the glorious doctrine of the Atonement. Very much interest has been evinced by many young men, and I pray that this labour may prove not to have been in vain in the Lord."

Referring to cases of inquirers that have come to him, Mr. Jordan reports:—

"Had we been able to do for such, what is not infrequently done in other missions, we might have baptized possibly six more young men. But, as I have learned by years of experience, that to afford persons, even temporarily, food, shelter, and clothes in order that they may be baptized, even in the case of genuine believers, is more or less to weaken and demoralise them for the rest of their lives. It is better for them, if necessary, to seek work in a new place, and then to be baptized, even though they should join some other mission. I have known instances of young men, who in former years were brought to Christ at Serampore, who, when sometimes hundreds of miles away in Upper India, in after life, when independent, have confessed their faith, and declared that they were converted at Scrampore. Our greatest concern must be to bring men to Christ, even though as to their subsequent Christian life our Lord's weeds are fulfilled: 'One soweth and another reapeth.'"

The Rev. A. E. Collier, of Bankipur, also carries on special work amongst the native student class. He reports:—

"The reading-room for students, opened twelve months ago opposite the Patna Government College, has been well attended throughout the year, and numerous opportunities for private conversation on religious topics have been afforded. Bible classes have been held regularly, and it has frequently been cur privilege to tell inquirers of the way of salvation.

"A series of megic-lantern lectures were given in a shamayana creeted in the compound of the Patna College at the time of the entrance examinations, and these were attended by a large number of students from the surrounding district. The subjects were—'Character-Sketches from the Old Testament,' 'Pilgrim's Progress,' 'The Parables of our Lord,' and A Holiday Tour in England.'

"Thanks to the kindness of many friends in India and England the library has been considerably extended and the table furnished with literature throughout the year. But there is still a great need for more good books and magazines. It is a great deal gained if we can but create a taste for wholesome literature. The young men will have English books, but the cheap novels which usually reach them are injurious and detasing."

MISSION MEDICAL WORK.

The value of Medical Mission work can scarcely be overrated. From the parts of our mission fields come conclusive testimonics that the

missionary with a little knowledge of medicine is able to win his way to confidence and welcome in many homes that otherwise would be closed against him, while the fully qualified missionary surgeon is able to work miracles of wonder—opening the eyes of the blind and causing the deaf to hear, and drawing crowds to listen to his message.

Reporting on missionary medical work in the Chhata Kosi District, Dr. F. Vincent Thomas writes:—

"There is a population, almost wholly agricultural, in the immediate neighbourhood of nearly 170,000; and, further afield, we have the native state of Bhartpur to the west, where medical missionary work is still more needed, and to the east, across the Jumna, an accessible and hitherto practically unworked territory in the direction of the Aligarh District. This field affords sufficient scope for one man's efforts, and has, moreover, a claim on a medical missionary in that, like most districts of this kind, it is very poorly provided with medical, and especially surgical, aid by Government agencies. Owing to the interrupted nature of much of the itinerant medical work exact figures were not kept; but as close a reckoning as is possible under the circumstances fixes the total number of patients treated, on tour and while resident in Mathura, at about 4,000. A few surgical operations were performed, and these helped to commend me to the people more than anything else I did. But surgical work must always be limited till one is settled in the district and a dispensary established."

Dr. S. David, a Native Christian medical man, reports from Delhi:-

"The total number of patients from 1st October, 1898, to end of August, 1899 were:—Old cases, 8,020; new cases, 5,383; total, 13,403. Prescriptions given to those able to pay for their own medicines, 210; cases treated in their own homes, 817; major operations, 3: minor operations, 616; midwifery cases, 3. Received in voluntary contributions in dispensary during above eleven months, Rs. 86-9-9. A great number of tracts and New Testament portions in Urdu have been distributed. I hold daily a short service in dispensary when a number of patients are assembled.

The Rev. A. E. Collier, of Bankipur, reports:—

"During about seven or eight months medicines were freely dispensed to the sick poor. Urgent cases were seen at any time, but regular patients attended on Mondays Wednesdays, and Fridays, the numbers continually increasing till the daily attendance reached one hundred and twenty. Whenever patients attended evangelistic services were held, usually conducted by Chheda Lal, evangelist, and the opportunity utilized to lead the poor suffering people to the One who can save both body and soul."

The Rev. F. W. Hale, of Palwal, writes :-

"This department of our work has made great demands upon my time, but it has been, beyond all question, time well spent. Our medical work has proved the surest means of winning the friendship of the people, and I consider it to be beyond all things the most practical and eloquent way of demonstrating the fact that our faith is not a matter of word only, but of deed. Much of our time is spent in camp, but even then I am forced to spend half the day in medical work, for the people

crowd after me wherever I go. The dispensary in Palwal was open about six months in the year; being alone I cannot keep it going during my frequent absence from the station. The total number of visits made by patients to my dispensary is 5,514. A large number beside have been treated by Dr. E. C. Joshua at his dispensary in Hodal."

TRANSLATION AND LITERARY WORK.

MISSION PRINTING PRESSES.

CALCUTTA.

Dr. Rouse being in England, Mr. M. N. Nath reports as to translating and literary work done during the past year:—

"The Bible reprint work has chiefly occupied my time. The small pica edition of our revised Bengali Bible by C.A.B.S. has made good progress. Another edition in bourgeois type has been commenced during the year.

"The reprint of Dr. Wenger's Commentary on the Epistles to the Romans, Galatians, and Ephesians has been finished, and we are now going on with the Epistle to the Philippians.

"The C.A.B.S. Translation Committee have been engaged for some years in bringing out a new Bengali version of the New Testament, and almost from the beginning of this work I have been working as the editorial secretary. I prepare the draft, and send the sheets, when set up in type, to the members of the Committee. In this work I do not as a rule take any help from our Baptist version. I translate from the Greek, having the English Revised Version before me for my guidance. The work is making slow progress, as we meet only once a week for examining the sheets, when we can examine a few verses only. The four Gospels have been published separately and together, and the Acts of the Apostles is in the press, and about 5,000 copies are to be printed soon. A tentative edition of the Romans has been printed and circulated among the missionaries, pastors, and other leading members of our community for their opinion. We are now at the end of the 1st Corinthians. There are about sixteen Bengali and European members on the Committee, and about eight are generally present at the meetings.

"I have brought out for the Tract Society twelve numbers of Monthly Messenger tracts. 15,000 copies of each number have been issued and circulated every month. Some of them have been written by me, and some by others, but I have edited all of them

"Two Musalmani-Bengali pamphlets for Mohammedans have been prepared by Mr. Monro, C.S. (of Ranaghat), who has retired from the Government service, and is now engaged in the Lord's work. Of the two tracts, one is on the authenticity and the authority of the Bible, especially of the New Testament, and the other is on the teaching of the Moulvies concerning the sinlessness of Mohammed, compared with the Quran, and other books by Mohammedan writers of olden times."

OUTTACK, ORISSA.

The Rev. Thomas Bailey, of Cuttack, reports:-

"No changes of special importance have occurred during the year in connection

with the Ori, a Old Testament revision. Arrangements have, for the most part worked smoothly, and progress has been satisfactory. Last year we reported printing completed to the end of Isaiah, and copy prepared to Jeremiah end of Chap. i. Printing is now completed to Ezekiel vi. 4, and copy prepared to Ezekiel end of Chap. xii.; we are now therefore working on the last of the greater prophets, and as we approach the end of this part of our labours where less has been done in the way of revision than on the earlier books, and the style is in many cases obscure, satisfactory renderings are sometimes difficult, and progress is necessarily slow, and we need all the advantages and skill gained by previous years of experience. The Oriya language itself has also, in the meantime, undergone extensive changes, and expressions which were current and acceptable in Dr. Sutton's time would now be harsh and unsuitable. Great advances have also been made during recent years in the science of Biblical Criticism, the results of which are rendered available to us in the elaborate works published by German and other scholars, so that while professing to be merely a revision, ours is largely a new translation, and could not well be otherwise. We have used Dr. Rouse's new Bengali version for constant reference, and scarcely less so the previous versions by Drs. Carey, Yates, and Wenger.

"My worthy colleague, the Rev. Shem Sahu, has felt the strain somewhat severely, and has applied for three months' leave, which, however, will be partly utilised in work amongst the churches. Mr. Pike has assisted as heretofore; acceptable help has also been rendered by Mr. Young and two native ministers,

"The Calcutta Auxiliary Bible Society made their usual grant of Rs. 600 for the year. We thank them very warmly, and apply for a similar grant for the coming year."

CUTTACK PRINTING PRESS.

The Rev. C. H. Harvey, Superintendent of the Cuttack Press, reports:

"The past year has seen the completion of the work in connection with the Press building addition, and we now have an office in every way suitable for the work and comfortable for the workers. With the larger building there has been an increase of work, and it is an interesting coincidence that the largest single edition put forth from the Press since its establishment has been put forth during the year of Press building extension. This edition—a Life of Christ in Oriya (20,000 copies, 200 pp. royal 32mo), the printing of which is paid for by the Bible Translation Society—is having quite a remarkable sale. Last year's edition of 6,000 copies was disposed of before half the cold season's work was over, and this year 15,000 of the 20,000 edition have already been disposed of, so that it is altogether likely that the whole edition will go before the close of the cold season. The book itself is in the words of Scripture, and is preceded by a poem on the Story of Creation and Way of Salvation, and it is apparently these verses which are the great attraction. Much care has been bestowed on the poem and on the book as a whole by Mr. Heberlet, and its so general acceptance is gratifying. PASTORATE VACANT.

The Rev. C. H. Williams reports:—

"The pastorate of this historic Baptist Church is still vacant, but thanks to the B.M.S. missionaries and a few outside friends the services have been regularly conducted throughout the year. The congregations have been large and an increase is specially noticeable at the weekly prayer meeting.

"The year has been one of changes, but the Unchangeable One has given us many signs of His unchangeableness, and with gratitude we can report peace, prosperity, and progress. Early in the year the church lost two of its most faithful and zealous workers by the transfer of the Rev. J. G. and Mrs. Potter from Agra to Kalka. To wish these friends God-speed and to give them some practical proof of our appreciation of their services, a social tea was held, and at the after-meeting addresses were delivered, and they were presented with a beautiful marble model of the famous Taj Mahal to remind them of their Agra friends,

"We were especially privileged during the last cold season in having visits of such well-known men as the late Dr. S. H. Kellogg, Principal Fairbairn, and the Rev. F. B. Meyer, as well as other less prominent but equally 'good men and true,' engaged in different parts of the Indian mission field; nearly all these brethren preached in Havelock Chapel, and we all owe much to their inspiring words.

"During the year several soldiers have put on Christ in baptism. Some of them availed themselves of this privilege when away on furlough and others were baptized here by our senior missionary, the Rev. D. Jones. Our Christian Endeavour service has been greatly appreciated by most of those in fellowship with us, but to reach a large constituency who could not be induced to come to a meeting of this kind, it was thought best to hold a mid-weekly evangelistic rervice in its stead, and from the first the Master has given us tokens for good at this meeting. A goodly number of men have found peace in believing, and are now among our regular Christian workers."

PASTORATE VACANTA

The Rev. H. Patterson writes:-

"The Lord's day services, morning and evening, have been carried on at Dinapore during the year without interruption. Considering the fewness of the members of the church, and the shifting character of the congregation, they have generously supported the ordinary expenses of the place. Special calls also have, on the whole, been well responded to. The morning congregation has been, as in previous years, rather poor; but that of the evening, and for the military element the voluntary

one, has been remarkably good all through, with the exception of a month or two in the cold weather when the station was almost empty both of civilians and soldiers. This part of the Dinapore work is the Lord's, and it is done for His sake; but at the same time it is a great hindrance to anything like systematic, efficient district work more especially in the cold weather."

The Rev. H. A. Lapham, of Matale, in the Kandy district, reporting on the work during the past year, writes:—

"During the first half of the year I was away in New Zealand, the work of the Kandy and Sabaragamuwa districts being carried on in my absence by the native missionaries under the superintendence of Messrs. S. R. Perera and D. W. Abayaratna. This experiment in putting in natives to act for Europeans in the oversight of districts was decidedly successful.

"In June, Mr. Bruce Etherington, B.A., of Torquay and Regent's Park College, joined our staff, and has since been engaged in acquiring the vernacular a work in which he displays much facility. In November, Mr. Hankinson, who had previously spent some months in the hills in a vain search after health, was obliged to return to England. His departure was much regretted by all our agents and by the pastors of the Baptist Union. Since that date I have had to take the oversight of the work in all three districts and have regularly spent ten days or more a month in the Colombo district travelling about among the stations and churches. I have in this way visited nearly all the stations in that district now, and not a few of the schools. The work has been hard but not over-burdening, the native missionaries of all the districts, on this occasion as always, developing under the pressure of emergency and new responsibility a capacity for helpful assistance to the European missionary that has been most gratifying. If the work has been kept from going back and has even advanced a little it is chiefly due to the heartiness and intelligence with which all mission agents and pastors alike have co-operated with the superintending missionary.

"In the Kandy District we have managed to spread out a little, having established a new sub-station at Humikate, beyond Rattota. This is in the centre of a vast district peopled entirely by Buddhists and unworked by any other missionary society.

"In the Sabaragamuwa District we have opened a new station—Pusalla, about ten miles on the Colombo side of Ratnapura, so that the Baptist Missionary Society has now a continuous chain of stations, residences of native missionaries, at short intervals from each other, stretching from Colombo through Ratnapura to Balangoda, a distance of about ninety miles. In that ninety miles of main road we have two native churches with pastors and five native missionaries, so that, with God's blessing, we ought to see something achieved there very soon.

"Most of the churches in both Colombo and Kandy Districts seem to be in fair working order. Since Mr. Hankinson's departure I have been careful to give the pastors of the Colombo District every possible opportunity of consulting me, as the pastors and elders of the Kandy District have always been accustomed to do."

THE COLOMBO DISTRICT.

ELEMENTARY, CHRISTIAN, DAY, AND SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The day-school work in connection with our Ceylon Mission is most encouraging, all our schools are conducted by Christian teachers, and the children are thoroughly well grounded in elementary Christian truth. We have in these schools 3,402 children with 36 Christian teachers, and 1,440 children in regular attendance at Sunday-schools with 109 teachers.

The Rev. W. D. Hankinson, at present in England with Mrs. Hankinson seeking restoration to health, writes:—

"My breakdown in health prevented me from visiting the various stations in the Colombo district as much as I had hoped to do; but, happily, our native brethren are more independent of a missionary's guidance and oversight than is the case, perhaps, on less advanced mission-fields.

"Some of the self-supporting churches are doing well, carrying on their own work without any financial assistance from England. The weaker churches, being without pastors, still need much guidance and sympathy, and we were hoping, just before I had to leave, to arrange for each to have pastoral oversight. During my absence, the native brethren will visit and encourage these weaker churches, and Mr. Lapham has promised to give them whatever counsel and help they need.

"With regard to the work carried on by the evangelists who are supported by the Society, there had been baptisms in several of the districts before I left, and, perhaps, the statistics will show that there have been others since. But this work is very difficult. In both Buddhist and Roman Catholic centres they meet with organised opposition, and severe persecution must be suffered by any who leave their old faith for the faith of the Gospel of Christ. Still, there are in several of the districts instances which show that the Gospel is still the 'power of God unto salvation,' and where persecution has been bravely suffered for Christ's sake.

"The enlargement of the Boarding School is now finished, and gives accommodation for seventy-five girls. We hope, while in England, to receive from sympathising

friends at least £100 to enable us to cover part of the cost, which has been more than was at first intended. This department of the work is certainly worthy of sympathy. Miss Moodic has given very devoted attention to it, and Mrs. Hankinson and I were extremely sorry to have to leave her. We carnestly hope that her health will be sustained."

The following is the report of the Colombo Native Christian Girls' Boarding School:—

Lady Principal—Miss Helen Moodie.

- "Another year of work in the boarding school is ended, and we can truly say it has been one of encouragement.
- "The numbers have increased to forty-five. The health of the girls has been good throughout the year and conduct satisfactory.
- "The Government examination was held on November 6th and 7th, and forty-two were examined. There were five failures in Singhalese and one in English.
- "The vernacular subjects have again this year been stronger in the first five standards than in the upper three.
- "The Bible-class and prayer-meeting have been held on alternate weeks by Mr. Aponso.
- "Singhalese Sunday-school has been conducted at Cinnamon Gardens, from 3 to 4 p.m. We have been grateful for the help Mr. Etherington has so readily given from time to time here and in taking the class usually conducted by Mrs. Hankinson.
- "The little prayer-meeting, held on Saturday nights in one of the teacher's rooms, has been well attended.
- "The lives of the Christian girls have now been well tested, and we hope that early next term they will be baptized. The testimony recently received from some of their parents of their lives whilst at home during the holidays is very encouraging.
- "During the year a new dormitory, box-room, and dining-room have been added to meet the increasing demands for admission, and there is now accommodation for seventy-five boarders.
- "Miss Maggie Perera, who for so long taught in the school, was married to one of our pastors on December 20th. Though we are sorry to lose her, we are glad to know that she is doing good work in the village where she and her husband reside, and trust that she will there be used by God as she has been used in the boarding school in bringing many souls to Christ."

DISTRICT EVANCELISTIC WORK.

The reports from the evangelists working in the Colombo District are distinctly encouraging, and many baptisms have taken place.

The eleven evangelistic districts are as follow: Colombo South, Avisawella, twenty-eight miles inland; Chilaw, fifty miles northwards on the sea coast; Diyagama, twenty-five miles to the south of Colombo; Kanduboda, fifteen miles inland from Colombo; Kandana, ten miles from Colombo; Ranála, sixteen miles inland from Colombo; Rayigam Koale, seventeen

miles south and eight inland; Veyangoda, twenty miles from Colombo; Warágoda, near Colombo; and Welipenna, thirty-three miles south of Colombo and eight inland.

The inhabitants of these districts are mainly Buddhists, with, in two of them, a few Roman Catholics.

THE CEYLON BAPTIST UNION.

The Rev. W. D. Hankinson, before he was compelled to leave Ceylon in consequence of failure of health, sent the following report relative to the Ceylon Baptist Union:—

"It will be remembered that this Union was formed in July, 1895, in order to enable the native churches, which had been thrown upon their own resources by the wise decision of the Committee, to help and encourage each other. Included in this Union there are fifteen churches with a total membership of about 700. Until eight years ago these churches were more or less dependent upon the Society for the support of their pastors, and when the decision came that this foreign support must be entirely withdrawn, the churches were left either to support their own pastors or to carry on their work as best they could. While a few of the churches were strong enough to support pastors, the smaller ones have been left to themselves since that time, though they have received advice and sympathy from the missionaries and some of the native brethren. This has been for them a trying but valuable experience. They have learnt at least one lesson—the lesson of their own weakness, and have learnt more and more to look to the right source of strength.

"Having learnt their need, there are signs that even some of these weaker churches will ere long be supporting their pastors.

"By means of the Union the stronger churches have been enabled to help and encourage the weaker, and there has grown up a spirit of willinghood which makes us feel sure that these self-supporting native churches will grow in spiritual strength and independent vigour. While speaking thus hopefully, we must not lose sight of the fact that some of them are very weak, and there are hindrances to the development of the voluntary principle which sometimes discourage us."

THE KANDY DISTRICT.

The evangelistic districts in the Kandy division are Kandy, Gampola, Katugastota, and Umvela.

Mr. Markus, in his report relative to school work in Elwela, writes :-

"The Buddhists of this place formed, during the last year, a society for the advancement of Buddhism, and resolved that the existence of our missions school in their midst was harmful to their progress, and so tried various ways of driving the teachers from the place and destroying all our work, but our teachers' energy, meekness, patience and peaceableness frustrated all their designs, and to-day our school is doing better than ever, and they are leaving us alone."

THE SABARAGAMUWA DISTRICT.

The evangelistic districts in the Sabaragamuwa District are Balangoda, Ratnapura, and Madampe.

The Sabaragamuwa District is probably the most difficult to work in in consequence of strong Buddhist opposition, which has been carefully organised, and is now carried on in the hope of destroying our work and driving us from the field. It should also be remembered that a large proportion of the people are living upon heathen temple lands, and soare required to render annual service to the temples.

Notwithstanding this bitter opposition, however, the evangelists are working with earnestness and heartiness, and their reports as to results are more encouraging than for many years past.

It has been recently said by one of China's most experienced missionaries "the outlook for all forms of missionary activity in China was never so bright as it is to-day." The policy of the "open door," now so happily assured by the recent action of the Government of the United States of America, cannot but help on the changes in China that seem now inevitable.

The ferment of new thought has forced open mental oyster shells in China which never before took in one occidental idea, and they are now fast becoming accustomed to this novelty, and are even desiring more.

New ideas cannot be shut out entirely, even from Chinese minds, and once an entry is gained, THEY cannot be banished to a distance of three thousand li beyond the frontier, like the Reformer, Chang Yui Hun.

The Christian Church in China is the great force of the future. In the whole empire of China there is no other force which has within itself the seeds of life.

Old China will doubtless die hard; but the tide of progress must advance. China cannot go back to her former condition; to-day there is a widespread spirit of inquiry that cannot be stifled by any retrogressive edicts. There may and probably will be passing drawbacks, but the flow of the tide is onward. The light is breaking, the dawn draws on, and slowly but nevertheless surely "the old order changeth." There has been no real abiding reaction among the peoples of China, only a temporary arrestment of expression and action, such as sometimes happens in early spring when chilling winds strike opening buds; but there is no return to winter, only a standstill for a brief space before buds open and flowers bloom.

GOD never ceases working; there is still "the pillar of cloud and fire" in His leadership, His hand outstretching in miracles of soul-healing and life transformation. He still opens doors to nations and to human hearts. He still guides events. To His servants still His word is "Go." Darkness and death are abroad, we have the Light of Life—about us a worldwide famine, and we have the Bread of Life; while across the centuries still comes the Divine command, "Give ye them to eat."

OUR WORK IN THE SHANTUNG PROVINCE.

CHING CHOU FU.

Ching Chou Fu City is near the main road from Chefoo to Chi-nan Fu, the Provincial Capital, and is distant from these places 250 miles and 120 miles respectively. Chou-ping City lies on the main road half-way between Ching Chou Fu and Chi-nan Fu.

From Ching Chou Fu are worked the four counties of Lin-k'ü, Shou-kuang, Lin-chih, and I-tu.

The Rev. R. C. Forsyth reports :-

"Our staff here during the past year has been increased by the arrival of Mr. Shipway, and Miss Sefton has replaced Miss Shalders, returned home invalided — The staff now stands at thirteen married and three single men, and six ladies of the Zenana Society; thirty-five in all. — The opening of the Imperial Post, which mark—another stage—in

the development of China, has modified, and will, we trust, soon supersede, our own couriers. The initial difficulties have made the service irregular, and until it is in better working condition we do not feel justified in doing away with our own mail system entirely. We trust, however, that very soon the new system, which is under the control of Sir Robert Hart, will be in thorough working order.

"As regards the Mission Press, the set-back which the Reform movement has had, the absence of the staff on relief work, the political unrest, &c., has led to considerable reduction in the sale and distribution of our literature.

"This year the figures stand at 52,233 books, and 16,060 sheet tracts, &c., printed; and 37,862 books, and 11,045 sheet tracts, &c., issued, so that the stock stands high. Mr. Jones has now going through the press a book on Chinese Synonyms, something on the principle of Roget's Thesaurus, which we trust will soon be in hand.

"A new hymn-book of over 300 hymns is now ready for the press, compiled by Mrs. Couling, Mrs. Drake, and Mrs. Bruce, but will most likely be printed in Shanghai.

"Relief Work.—For the first six months of this year a very considerable part of my time was taken up with correspondence and arrangements for relief work in connection with the Yellow River floods.—I myself was also personally engaged in the work of relief for about six weeks in the county of Pohsing, during the absence of Mr. Harmon, who was called away elsewhere. As Government relief was going on in the district, and our own Christians had been relieved, I determined to follow the plan which Brother Drake adopted, and give relief in the shape of relief work, thus spending the money not only in relieving but leaving a substantial benefit to the district.

"After a good deal of difficulty, and interviewing the county magistrate several times, I succeeded at last in obtaining his consent to this new style of relief work.

"An official list of these villages which had suffered from the floods was obtained, and from these in rotation bands of men were gathered who were set to work in repairing roads, bridges, and the banks of a local stream, called the Chi-mi-Ku, which had been washed away in the floods.

"We repaired in all several sections of road, four bridges and about twenty miles of river bank, and employed over 3,000 men. As I was called away, Rev. F. II. Chalfant, of the Presbyterian mission, finished this work for me.

"Messrs. Nickalls, Drake, Harmon, Burt and Wills were also engaged in relief work. In all we have received over £4,000. After the ardnons work of the previous two years we felt the need of a change to the coast, and visited Pei-tai-h'o, a new port on the Gulph of Pechili, about six hours' rail ride from Tientsin.

"While in Pei-tai-h'o, from August 17 to 22, 1899, a conference of missionaries was held, and I had the honour of being appointed secretary, and the responsibility of seeing that the necessary arrangements were made. In all about ninety missionaries, from all parts of North China, attended—these representing twelve societies; most of them were, however, in the place as visitors.

"It was decided to claim equal status for Protestant missionaries, which had already been granted to the Catholics by the Chinese Government.

"In connection with the conference a special train was run to Shan-hai-Kuan, to allow those who wished to inspect the Great Wall of China the opportunity of doing so. In all about sixty availed themselves of the facilities offered, and a hot though otherwise enjoyable day was spent. This was further interesting as the first train excursion ever held in this country.

"Mrs. Forsyth reports on her work amongst the women as follows:-

"In each of the two church districts where my work lies I have chosen four central stations, where I go twice a year for one-week classes. This is designed for the further instruction of the Christian women of these stations, and any others who may be living near enough to attend, either coming daily or coming for the week, and bringing their own food. We supply them with a little soup or porridge besides. Every morning we have our class from breakfast till noon, and study the life of Christ as contained in one or other of the Gospels. It has taken us three years to complete this study. This autumn I began an examination of the classes on what we had done. Out of thirty, all except one or two took 70, 80, 90, and 100 per cent. Most of these women, whose ages range from thirty to eighty years, have learned to read within the last three years, and most of them are now able to read Matthew or Mark intelligently. I have now in the sixteen classes something like 150 women under instruction. The kindness, sympathy, and love I receive from these dear Christian women is to me wonderful; for any slight headache or tiredness their sympathy is quite touching, and for any home trouble they never cease to pray till the trouble is passed.

"'This is one half of my work, the other is evangelistic. Every morning we spend in class, and in the afternoon a few of the women and one or two of the Christian men accompany me to one or two of the near villages, where, either in the street or on a threshing floor, or in the court-yard of someone who is friendly, we hold an evangelistic service. These services have been, by the blessing of God, the means of bringing some into the church, and others who were unfriendly have been changed into friends. It also helps the Chinese to do more in themselves taking the "glad tidings" to their neighbours. Every evening also, an evangelistic service is held in the court-yard where worship is held at the central station. In this way many are reached who would be ashamed to be seen going after the foreigners by their neighbours.

"'In each of the two church districts I have four Bible-women at work. They go round the neighbourhood for five days of the week, returning to their homes for Saturday and Sunday. These women, though poor and ill-instructed, yet have done good work, because of their love and zeal, amongst the women less enlightened than themselves.'"

THE NATIVE CHRISTIAN CHURCH AT CHING CHOU FU.

The Rev. J. Percy Bruce, B.A., who has the general oversight of the Ching Chou Fu church, reports:—

"There have been 125 received by baptism during the year, and 8 by transfer including those restored to fellowship); 32 have passed away, and 14 names have been erased from the church roll. The total membership now stands at 1,618, compared with 1,531 last year, showing a net increase of 87. There are 176 seeking baptism next year, and 629 others joining in our services; while the number of children registered as under Christian instruction on Sunday stands at 547.

"The monthly conference of pastors and leading Christian workers throughout the districts, which I commenced in the autumn of last year, has been continued throughout this year, except in the harvest seasons. About 40 attend regularly, each one of whom has stations allotted to him, which he visits every month. As I explained in my last report, the time is occupied with Bible study and conference on

different subjects connected with our work, or on some doctrine of Scripture. They have proved very profitable to us all, and I am persuaded that the effect on the church as a whole has been, and will be, increasingly good. Mrs. Bruce has held her classes for women and girls as in former years, both in the spring and autumn. They were attended by about seventy, chosen from the six pastoral districts into which the church is divided. The visiting of the women in the country, and holding classes with them in their own stations, has been carried on vigorously by Miss Kirkland and Mrs. Forsyth. This work among the women and girls throughout the church, both in the city and country, is perhaps the most encouraging feature in our work, calling for great thankfulness from us all. Our satisfaction, however, is mingled with concern at the unavoidable closing of the Girls' City School through Miss Shalders's illness. We hope and pray that the way may be speedily made clear for its re-opening. It would be difficult to estimate the possibilities of good all over the church that lie in the patient maintenance of that work on the lines adopted by Miss Shalders.

"The great need of the church now, and indeed for the past few years, is a considerable reinforcement of the pastorate. Of the six men originally appointed, two resigned four years ago, and have not yet been replaced. The work in their districts is being carried on partly by untrained men, and partly by pastors from neighbouring districts. The church is still unable to call pastors, not for lack of funds to support them, but for lack of suitable men. Meanwhile, the needs of the church have largely increased; there are now 90 stations and 1,600 odd members, compared with 50 stations and 1,000 members when the original six pastors were elected. We estimate that instead of the number being reduced to four, it ought to be increased to eight, and the funds of the church are sufficient to support eight. We must still wait one or two years before the eligible men will have finished their course in the Institute.

"VILLAGE SCHOOLS.

"At Mr. Couling's request the village schools have this year been transferred to my care to be supervised in conjunction with the supervision of the church. As my experience of them is short I have but little to say. They have been regularly visited by the native school inspector, and more or less regularly by Mr. Couling and myself. There is a great deal to encourage and not a little to discourage. The discouragement proceeds mainly from the inefficiency of many of the teachers. In this respect, however, next year promises a great improvement. There will be several new teachers appointed who have just enished their course in the Training Institute and in Mr. Couling's High School. To have a staff or nucleus of a staff of teachers from Mr. Couling's school will be a new experience, and specially gratifying on that account, It will be interesting to watch their work, both because of the effect we hope to see in the schools by the new element of intelligent sympathy with the ideas of the missionary produced by close contact with him in early years, and because we shall now begin to see the fruit of Mr. Couling's long and patient work. It becomes more and more patent that our largest hopes, not only from the point of view of the church but of the nation at large, lie in those who are children of Christian parents, who have been under Christian training from earliest years, and whose characters have been formed under the personal influence of the missionary. But it is just such men that we have to wait for through long years, and the work of training them calls for greatest patience.

"Looking into the future, so far as the church is concerned, the outlook is hopeful. Not only is the number of accessions increasing, but there is also a larger

number of those whose hearts are loyal to the truths they profess, and growingly devoted to the Lord whose Name they bear."

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The Rev. C. Spurgeon Medhurst writes :-

"It is a matter for devout gratitude that while the American Presbyterian Mission in I Chou Fu, South Shantung, and the church in Western Shantung connected with the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions have been devastated and terrorised by robbers and rioters—violence, murder, and arson being the order of the day—we have pursued our ordinary work during the year in undisturbed peace. Another ground for thankfulness is that the Governor, H. E. Yu Hsien, who, if he did not instigate, at least encouraged, these outrages, has been recalled to Peking. Had he continued in power the disorders would certainly have spread, sooner or later, probably, involving us all. As it is, nothing has occurred to hinder our labours, and the people listen to our words with a respect and attention unknown a few years ago.

"An unexpected illustration of the people's confidence in us came to light last summer. The weather was very dry, anxiety for the crops was universal, mandarins and people were througing the temples and praying for rain. To show our interest in all that concerned their welfare, I posted notices on the four gates of the city to the effect that we would hold a daily service in the chapel at noon, and pray for rain. The immediate result startled me. There were no signs of the weather breaking. The sky still remained cloudless, but a general sigh of relief went up from all parts of the city. 'The rain,' the people said, 'is not far off. The Yeh Su Kiao has begun to pray.' Nor were we made ashamed before the scoffer. On the Sabbath following this special week of prayer it was my pleasure to conduct a public thankagiving service for the plentiful rain.

"There are two large mosques and a not inconsiderable colony of Mohammedans in Ching Chou Fu. We have been able to do but little active work among them, though we have always kept on friendly visiting terms with ministers and leaders. An interview with one of these gentlemen has generally meant an hour's sharp unprofitable controversy; but in this quarter, too, there is a change. One of the ministers now comes to me, or to some of the museum assistants, three or four times a year for a talk on the New Testament. He has no intention of becoming a Christian, and likes to show off his Arabic, but the fact that he seeks instruction at all is suggestive, and a distinct advance on the Mohammedan attitude as I knew it ten years ago.

"In the behaviour of the students who periodically come to Ching Chou Fu for the Prefectural Examinations there has been a marked improvement, even since last year. Two of these intellectual contests have been held again this year. Seven or eight thousand strangers from all parts of the Prefecture lodges within our gates for two months, and, of course, crowded to the hospital and museum, but no ill words were uttered, and only one man of the hundreds who daily flocked to the museum attempted to make a disturbance. For the most part they quietly sat and listened day after day to the Word of Life as I have never before known them to do. The caviller, was, of course, sometimes heard from, but not so frequently as in previous years, and the only limits to our opportunities for preaching were our own powers of endurance. Ten years ago the presence of these men in the city made no difference to our Sunday congregation, but this year and last they have come in such

numbers to the chapel that it has been considered advisable to have services for the women elsewhere. Work in the Ching Chou Fu Prefecture is divided between ourselves and the American Presbyterians, and for the past two years I have been indebted to eur American neighbours for the assistance of some capable and earnest native helpers. I was pleased to find that the two Presbyterians who came to my aid this year had both received their first favourable impressions of Christianity at the museum, when that institution was very much smaller than it is now. It is no exaggeration to say that the work done in the Ching Chou Fu Museum has an influence in all parts of Shantung, and that all Missions in the province benefit by it. Some are imitating our example and are starting museums in their own stations.

"All through the year I have been steadily at work, when the weather was favourable spending most of my time itinerating, visiting in the city and neighbourhood at other seasons. Nor have I knowingly let slip unused any opportunity for spreading the light, whether it was with the single individual or the large crowd, whether with the wealthy gentleman of the city, the educated teacher, or the illiterate country rustic. Yet I have no conversions to report, nor am I able to tell of stations opened during the year, though I do know of impressions made, and am hopefully watching inquirers who are groping in the dark towards the light. Pioneer effort in China such as I am engaged in does not lend itself to statistical record. Had the workmen who tunnelled Mont Cenis or who blasted the entrance to New York Harbour been required to render periodical reports of their work, they could only have done so by inches. We are drilling the rock beneath the surface, and though there often seems very little displacement, and but slight advance, we do feel that the drill is biting its way farther and farther in. Unless some unforeseen set-back should occur, I confidently look forward to annual baptisms by the thousand after a few more years' persistent work. It is well, however, to bear in mind that there are many things beyond our control which may, any day, alter the entire outlook. When the political barometer points to 'stormy' there is little chance in China of gaining adherents, or even patient listeners. A family quarrel; a village law-suit; a wild rumour springing from no one knows where; the opposition of a village elder, or of a father or an elder brother, or perchance an unintentional slight on the part of the missionary or one of his assistants, will frequently blast a promising beginning and postpone the harvest for years.

"Believing that he is the best missionary who best succeeds in getting others to work, I take great pleasure in reporting a most hopeful revival of the evangelistic spirit in the Lin Chih section of the church. The pastor, Nich Tung An, though intellectually inferior to some of his co-pastors, exceeds them all in evangelistic fervour. During the year he has succeeded in getting the people to subscribe towards the purchase of a monster umbrella tent for use at large fairs. The idea was entirely his own, and to encourage the movement I agreed to double every cash subscribed. Volunteers have promised to take the tent and preach at eight or nine of the twelve or thirteen fairs which are held in that district in the course of each year. I need hardly add that as often as my other engagements will allow I shall lead this new volunteer movement in person.

"My greatest need—a lack which will, in a measure, be supplied next year by graduates from the Gotch Robinson Institute—has been trained native helpers. No foreigner, however well he speak the language, can hope to be successful as an Evangelist in China if he is alone. Ninety-eight per cent. of our converts are made by the natives. We scatter seed-thoughts; we ray forth ideas which modify and raise the ideals of those among whom we live; but we can seldom of purselves

lead souls into the light. Oral persuasion is difficult oftentimes among one's own countrymen; it is a hundredfold more so when one tries to speak in an alien tongue words which shall bite into heathen consciences long educated in modes of thought utterly foreign to the natural trend of the speaker's mind. On the other hand, the converted native is very dependent on the foreign missionary, with his centuries of Christian training, for support and direction. He has yet to learn how to work alone. A large and consecrated body of native evangelists, capable of self-direction, is perhaps the greatest and most pressing necessity of the present time."

THE COTCH-ROBINSON NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The Rev. J. S. Whitewright, the Principal of this Institution, writes :-

"The work of the Training Institution has been carried on as in former years, and the progress and general conduct of the students has, on the whole, been very encouraging. The only addition to the usual curriculum was the translation and teaching of sections of Broadus on 'The Preparation and Delivery of Sermons' for the benefit of the senior men, also a special course on 'Methods of Teaching' for the benefit chiefly of those likely to be teachers of village schools.

"Daily preaching has been carried on by the students at the dispensary and in the rooms attached to the museum, and on Sundays in the surrounding villages. The number of visits paid to the museum during the year was 78,399.

"Leaders' classes were held in the Spring and Autumn as in former years, with attendances of about sixty men."

The Rev. A. G. Jones reports:

"It is in virtue of God's helping hand that I am enabled to report that the share of the theological teaching entrusted to me has been carried on with very slight interruption during the entire session, so that at the end I found I had abated very little of what was contemplated at the beginning. The class-attendance was fair, but, in the case of many of the students, leaves great room for improvement.

"Since I last made a report, the class, consisting of from twelve to fourteen men, was examined in Christology. Thereupon I commenced the teaching of anthropology, dividing the subject into two main divisions: the first was devoted to a general study of man, his origin, original state, the unity of the race, the soul transmigration, materialistic view of the soul, immortality; transmission of life, native and Christian views of it; personality, identity; the nature and standard of virtue; the will and its powers and limitations. I have detailed the above topics, because the time spent on the entire subject was great, and could only be justified by pointing to the above list as representing those points that every religious teacher in the Far East must be well informed on. The second main division was devoted to the doctrine of sin proper, giving a great preponderance to this aspect of the condition of humanity, and combating as well as I could the tendency of native materialism, fatalism, and pantheism to undermine the plain voice of the moral nature, a vice that shows its effects in Christian bodies long after their formal organisation.

"The examination held after these terms of teaching seemed to me to show very fair, and, in some instances very bright results. Of course as I teach, about one-fifth of my time goes in weekly examination, conducted step by step with the teaching.

"The labour of preparing, translating, and delivering such lectures as will serve to cover our needs over a reasonable future, that can be used by others, and that will prove fairly sufficient for the intellectual equipment of the Christian preacher and teacher that labour has been up to this date undiminished, and is about as much as 1 can stand. There is, however, this consolation and hope, that the great burden of the work is over and done, and the matter is in such a shape that, when I take my furlough, the teaching can still go on in the same uninterrupted order and method.

"I am at present engaged in preparing and translating lectures on the Atonement, with a view to their permanent utility. No effort that I can give has been spared. Whatever may be the profit of this work to others, it certainly has been of high value to myself; and I cannot help feeling that, step by step as I go forward, I am amply recompensed for my pains. If conviction, certainty, and clearness of personal apprehension are of use in helping others, I assuredly feel that I have reached higher ground from which to give that help than any I had reached before."

NATIVE CHRISTIAN BOYS' NORMAL BOARDING SCHOOL

AND

VILLAGE DAY SCHOOLS.

The Rev. Samuel Couling, who is the principal of the Normal School and has charge also of the village schools, reports:—

"However interesting school work is in the doing, it is bound to be humdrum in the telling.

"We began the Chinese year (in February, 1899) with 65 boys in the school. The year has been much like other years, filled with long days of work and brief holidays. The examinations for the year are over to-day, but I cannot report the results for a few weeks. It may interest friends to know that about twenty written examinations have been held, with the thermometer in the room hardly once going up to freezing, and sometimes down to 25 degs. freezing. Under these circumstances the boys can hardly do themselves justice.

"The usual subjects have been taught during the year, with the addition of some more advanced subjects for the older students. I have taught a class in the elements of economics, one of the most important subjects for the Chinese to-day, and my wife has worked hard at a class in moral philosophy.

"This year the first boys leave the school at the completion of their seven years course; though of course a good many have left at various times without finishing the work. These boys, three in number, have maintained a good character, have worked well, and have passed good examinations; they are at once to be put in charge of village schools. It would be foolish to boast of what they are going to do. but I may be bold to say we have not hitherto been able to get teachers so fit and promising as these young men. There should be two or three equally good scholar leaving the school each year in future, and I need not say that this should by-and by make a great difference to the whole Church.

"With regard to educational questions generally, things remain very much where they were. The anti-reform movement, which began with the deposition of the Emperor some fifteen months ago, still continues, but it is probable that even the antireformers will soon see that they are delivering both themselves and their country bound into the hands of their enemies. Numbers of the best Chinese see this, of course, but at present there seems to be nothing to do but wait. Kang-yi, one of the highest in the land, has caused the school for girls in Shanghai to be shut up, and has openly spoken against all schools for Western learning as being injurious to China. Perhaps the more of this kind of thing there is the better, as it must disgust the intelligent Chinese to see their high officials so pitiably expose themselves, and must hasten the return to those reforms which were so ruthlessly swept away. I say, as I said last year, it is important that we should be ready to take every advantage of the opportunities that such a change will give us.

"The question of teaching English is also being more and more pressed on us. We are now so civilised as to have a post-office, with an English-speaking clerk, in this city. He has opened a class, and teaches some kind of English, for which there is an nereasing demand.

"I give below the results of the previous examinations not yet reported :--

"Passes in all subjects—Life of Christ, 14; Life of David, 16; Life of Paul, 5; Old Testament History, 11; Temperance Physiology, 23; General History, 10; Geography, 11; Physical Geography, 22; Arithmetic, 18; Algebra, 7; Euclid (Books II. and III.), 13; Chemistry, 5; Practical Chemistry, 10; Heat, 3; Sound, 7, Total, 175."

MISSIONARY MEDICAL WORK.

Dr. Russell Watson, who is in charge of the missionary medical work in the Ching-chu-fu District, reports:—

"STATISTICS OF THE HOSPITAL AND DISPENSARY FOR THE YEAR 1899.

"Out-patients—men, 7,410; women, 2,240. Total, 9,650. In-patients—men, 177; women, 34. Total, 211. Patients treated at a distance, 250. Poisoning cases treated, 33. Total cases, 10,144.

"Above are the statistics of the Hospital and Dispensary for the past year. Both have been open continuously throughout the year. No events of marked importance have occurred during this time. Evangelistic work has been carried on daily. Each morning Divine worship is held, at which all in-patients who are able, and their friends, are expected to attend. The in-patients have each a relative, in some cases more than one, staying to nurse and attend on them. An effort is made to systematically teach both friends and patients, while they stay with us, the Christian catechism and some small portions of the New Testament. At noon, while the out-patients are assembling, short addresses are given to them on some aspect of the Gospel. The students attending the Institute come in rotation and help in this work.

"The outlook to us missionaries in Shantung is not at present very bright. A strong anti-foreign outbreak to the west of us around Chi-nan-fu has led to much trouble and suffering, where, in addition to the murder of Mr. Brooke, of the S.P.G. Mission, over 3,000 converts, chiefly Catholic, have been rendered homoless. To the east of us the railway is being constructed, which is to lead from Tsing-tao to Chi-nan-fu. This is also causing turmoil and bloodshed, for the people are resenting what they regard as the forcible methods of the Germans. At present this district is quiet, but we have doubts as to its continuing so long."

CHOU-PING DISTRICT.

From Chou-ping thirteen and a half counties are worked. The ground is divided thus between the missionaries, though frequent changes take place through furloughs, &c.; Mr. Harmon has had charge of Putai, Pin-chou and half of Ching-chêng. These counties are always subject to floods by the overflowing of the Yellow River, and are exceedingly poor, Mr. Nickalls has charge of Chi-tung, half of Chou ping, and half of Chingchêng, and has recently been appointed to work Po-hsing instead of Mr. Harmon, Mr. Wills has the two southern counties of Po-shan and Chihchuan, both hilly districts, besides the town of Chou-tsun, which lies twelve miles S.E. of Chou-ping, and is one of the most important marts in the whole province. Mr. Harmon is now associated with Mr. Wills in the Chou-tsun work. Mr. Burt has charge of the large, highly-cultivated county of Chang-chiu and the half-county of Li-cheng up to the gates of Chi-nan-fu. Mr. Drake is responsible for Hsin-cheng, Kao-yuan, Changshan, and half of Chou-ping.

The six southern counties are hilly; the northern counties are swampy, malarious, and more or less subject to destructive floods from the Yellow River.

The Rev. Frank Harmon writes :-

"The work of the past year differs in no material respects from those which have gone before. It is of the same character as those I have reported on for so many years past. No new developments have taken place; we have been met with the same discouragement and partial failures as of old, though I am thankful to say that opposition is not nearly so keen, and indifference is giving place to interest.

"It was remarked in the report for 1899 that the number of baptisms was below the average, and various reasons were given to account for that fact. In so far as I was concerned, however, the reason why no baptismal service was held was that I had come to the conclusion that a longer probation for inquirers before baptism was desirable, and I therefore increased the period from eighteen months to two and a half years, or at least two years.

"This plan seems to work well. The first examination is held at the end of eighteen months, or at least one year, and another examination of the same candidates is conducted the following year. This gives us better knowledge of the applicants, tests their sincerity and Christian character, and encourages them to continue their study of Christian truth,

"About 200 candidates for baptism were on the books last year, and this year 185 of these were baptized, bringing the total membership of the district under my care to 888, and leaving some 200 on our lists as candidates for baptism in 1900.

"A very satisfactory feature of the applicants for baptism is the increased number of women who are joining us. This is largely due to the faithful work of the ladies of the Zenana Mission and the Bible-women working in the district. During the year classes have been held by Misses Aldridge and Simpson. Mrs. Harmon has spent two

months at Chiu-Chen, and this, while a very decided help to me, is not without its good effect on the women members of the Church, who came in in little parties for a stay of from one to four days while my wife was there.

"Some of the stations, too, were favoured with a visit from Mr. and Mrs. Smyth in the spring, so that altogether it cannot be said that the people have been neglected.

"I held one class, for leaders of stations only, for three weeks in the middle of the summer. The men were specially picked, and did really very good work. There were some very promising young men amongst them, and altogether it was so satisfactory a venture that I propose to repeat it in future years. Mr. Burt kindly gave me his assistance with this class.

"Ordinary evangelistic work has been carried on as usual, and the regular evangelists have been very much helped by the Christians in some districts. Preaching in markets and fairs is no longer a dangerous or unpleasant service. My people tell me they can always get an attentive audience almost anywhere, and the consequence is that Christian truth is certainly finding its way very much more rapidly than formerly amongst the towns and villages of Shantung.

"Yang Tung Shan, the medical evangelist, supported by the Bloomsbury Sunday-school, has done good work during the year in treating the sick at Chiu-chen, while I have continued to treat all cases of eye disease presenting themselves on the two days in each month set apart for that purpose.

"Feng-i-Hsin, who is maintained by the Church at Cirencester, is a very capable man who commands the confidence and esteem of all who know him. He is a very acceptable preacher to both Christians and heathen.

"Yang-Ch'ang-Ch'ing, who is supported by the Bible class of Ebenezer Church, Margate, has done really excellent forward work, preaching in fairs and markets. He is always at his post, and has been very successful in vanquishing opposition and leading Christians to aggressive work of the best kind. As a consequence, the Church in that district grows steadily, and is more active than in some others.

"As I write, Shantung is in a state of great disquiet, due to a prolonged drought, a reactionary governor—who, I hear it rumoured, is now superseded—the building of railways, and the activity of secret sects opposed to Christianity generally, and more particularly to Roman Catholics.

"We cannot forecast the future with any degree of confidence, but we believe firmly that light is breaking over this dark land, and that no power can avail to stop the tide of progress slowly rising over the Empire, or arrest the broadening and brightening of that Light which is Life indeed."

The Rev. W. A. Wills reports from Chou-ts'un :-

"In numbers our congregations are about the same as last year. While many new faces have come amongst us, our loss has been heavy—occasioned by deaths and migrations. Twenty-two have been baptized, and two restored into fellowship. We close the year with 225 in church fellowship.

"The village schools have many bright intelligent lads full of promise; to these I confidently look for the carrying on the church's work in the future. Having received an early Christian education the will be freer from much of the superstition that still clings to those converted in later life who were trained in heathen schools and homes. The annual distribution of prizes are days anticipated by the scholars much as Christmas day or birthdays are by the young at home. I have to thank friends at home for sending me parcels of toys, picture books, &c., suitable for

these prizes, and thus enabled me to afford the children encouragement, and give them at least one 'red letter' day in the year.

"In the early summer we had heavy rains and severe floods, which swept away hundreds of homes. The autumn has been very dry, no rain for nearly three months, aising grain to almost famine prices; so our people will have a hard and suffering winter. Notwithstanding their poverty they unitedly raised a few pounds to help others in still greater distress. This year they have also leased a small building for a country church. The deeds are in the name of the 'B.M.S.,' and have been handed me for safe custody. This makes the second building our people have themselves purchased, and given to the 'B.M.S.' They are but small places, but well adapted for the present needs, and it is cheering to see those efforts of self-support. Having purchased the place they also feel themselves responsible to furnish and repair it and provide the necessary carekeeper.

"The Christian Endeavour has gone on steadily since last year's report, and not without some tokens of blessing. There are now thirteen branch societies with a membership of over 300. The attendance keeps up well, and at times has been remarkably good. The prayer meetings have been felt specially helpful, and some have avowed themselves as followers of Christ.

"We have many and large opportunities for service. The chapels in Chou-ts'un, Chih-ch'un, and Po-shan are in the very heart of immense populations, with towns and villages north, south, east, and west. The small museum at Chou-ts'un attracted 38,170 visitors during the year.

"The dispensaries at each of the above centres are always busy spots on their public days. Sickness has been very prevalent, and for weeks I have daily had to attend cases of cholera and typhoid fever; this has given me many opportunities of preaching Christ in the homes of the patients, and some have since attended our services, but the actual results we must leave until the great day shall reveal them.

"Our Colporteur, Bible-woman, evangelists, and aided preachers have not only conducted the regular services at our village churches on Sundays, and preached at markets and fairs, but have continued to visit from house to house in several villages far removed from any place of worship, reading the Word, distributing tracts, holding services, and in other ways endeavoured to point the heathen to Christ.

"The magic lantern has often been used to illustrate the 'Life of Christ,' &c., and by this means thousands have been brought together to hear the Gospel story of a Saviour for them."

The Rev. S. B. Drake reports:-

"The Yellow River flood of 1898 greatly interfered with missionary work during the first half of 1899, for the relief work undertaken on account of the flood was continued into the month of June last. We hope, however, that that display of sympathy on the part of foreign Christians with the Chinese in their sorrow may, in addition to the good done by direct relief, exert a moral influence that shall prepare many hearts for the reception of Christian truth.

"It will be interesting to those kind friends that contributed to the relief fund to know how the money was disposed of. Of course, I write only about that portion of the fund that was placed in my hands for distribution.

"Before giving relief in the form of doles, I tried to provide work for the needy and thus give relief as wages for labour. In the matter of providing work, I succeeded beyond my expectation. I made 17,805 ft. (long) of raised road through low-lying land; repaired 292 breakages in river banks; deepened a section of a river

bed 5,400 ft. long; paid for labour in repairing six bridges, and strengthened the weakest parts of Kao Yuan city wall by throwing up a substantial earthen bank, thus securing the city should it be again surrounded by the waters of the Yellow River. On these works about 5,600 different men found employment and, at the same time, relief.

"Since relief work ended, I have been continuously employed in visiting stations, conducting classes, &c. I am glad to report that most stations are more than holding their own in point of the numbers attending worship. I have tried to gather a number of Christians at certain centres month by month for the consecutive study of the Scriptures, &c. On the whole these classes have been well attended.

"During the past year I did not baptize any converts, not because there were none to baptize, but because I feared that the recent relief work might induce some merely nominal inquirers to ask for baptism. Moreover, I thought my refusal to baptize converts, notwithstanding the advantage relief work had given us, would have a good moral effect upon both baptized and non-baptized. They would see that relief was not regarded by us as a means of purchasing converts.

"In consequence of there not being any baptisms to report I have left the statistics as they stood last year.

"Work among women has been steadily carried on. Mrs. Drake's class for women held every Sunday in Chow Ping city, has been well maintained. When Mrs. Drake has been away in the country, Mrs. Burt and Mrs. Smyth have taken her place-During the Spring, Mrs. Drake spent six weeks in Kao Yuan. During the Autumn she again spent one month there, and conducted two sets of classes for women, of ten days' duration. The two Bible women, Mrs. Chang and Mrs. Tsui, have rendered good service in helping Christian women to read the Scriptures, besides having made several trips to distant places to help forward more recent learners. Mrs. Tsui has also visited the female learners in the counties of Hsin Cheng, Chang Shan and Eastern Chow'ping."

MISSIONARY MEDICAL WORK.

THE PROYINCE OF SHANSI.

TAI-YUEN-FU AND DISTRICT.

The Rev. Geo. B. Farthing reports as to the work at this important centre and the out-stations connected with it:—

"In attempting to recount the story of our work for another year, one is conscious of the strong tendency there is for each report to bear a family likeness to every other which has preceded it.

"For the moment a desire for variety and novelty prevails, but only for a moment. Why should the thought of sameness disturb? Is it not unavoidable? Our object is always the same—the presentation of 'Jesus Christ and Him crucified.' Having this theme, and satisfied that it is the grandest with which mortal man was ever entrusted, no passing desire for novelty in a report can hold us long. Whatever be the means we employ it is the claims of Christ which are always paramount and which are enforced to the best of our powers. Everything is considered vain which fails to win an entrance for the Lord whom we present.

"For the free, wide proclamation of the Gospel we deem that it is preaching, a function born with Christianity, and almost peculiar to it, which must ever be given the chief place; wherefore it is, that preaching, whether to many or to few, whether within the walls of our chapels or elsewhere, has had the largest part of our strength.

"Then we have continued our week-evening Bible-classes. The study during the year has embraced the Epistles of Colossians, Thessalonians, Timothy, Titus, Philemon, Hebrews, and First of Peter. Evening by evening an carnest company has met in order to look beneath the text to something of the inner meaning and heart of the sacred Word desiring to grow up into Christ Jesus. With so many things in their past, and the prevalence of corrupt custom and the allurements of sinful surroundings, it is absolutely necessary, as for us so for them, to give heed to the things believed, and to cultivate their spiritual nature, and to learn to practise the presence of Christ in order to stand. Our evening gatherings are helps to this end, as well as a setting forth of the truths of the Gospel to those who are inquiring the way to Zion.

"The street-chapel has been opened daily, with the exception of Sundays. By means of it talks with passers-by, as well as more formal addresses, have been used to carry home the Gospel story.

"In the summer, and again recently, special services were arranged for, both in Tai-yuen and at the outstations, for the purpose of giving more consecutive and definite teaching to inquirers. These were well attended and much appreciated. The subjects treated dwelt upon the life of complete surrender which Christ demanded, and which it should be our joy and happiness to yield to Him.

"Several new camps having been formed, to the south of Tai-yuan-fu, of levies from Hupei and Hunan, efforts have been made to reach them, and not without success. Some of the officers have called again and again to talk with me, aud, whilst in some instances references to the Christian religion were markedly eschewed, yet in others the sole reason of the call was to hear and ask about Jesus. Amongst the men there are not a few who have heard the Gospel in their own provinces, and whenever the hours fixed for drill permit of them attending service on Sunday, they meet with us.

"Our Opium Refuges in Tai-yuan-fu and Chiao-cheng give practical evidence of Gospel philanthropy. To the patients who avail themselves of our aid the Gospel is preached. And not without result. Many of them have left us with their memories stored with hymns, eimple prayers, and the cardinal facts of the Gospel. Some of them—would that it were a larger proportion!—attend our services regularly and attach themselves to the Christian Church. Ninety-eight men have passed through the Tai-yuan-fu Refuges during the year, and, with very few exceptions, were discharged free from craving. A nearly similar number of patients received treatment at Chiao-cheng.

"In connection with our stations we have three schools. Would that the number of schools could be increased many-fold; but plas! the Shansi people do not prize highly the privileges of an education. As our Churches increase in influence, a spirit of learning will also be awakened. This is proved by the manner in which even the women at our stations have struggled against a lifetime of darkness and ignorance and struggled successfully. Perhaps one of the most interesting meetings I have had during the year was one in which the majority of those present were women and each read a verse in turn, as is the practice of most of them in the daily worship in their homes. These women were intent upon getting instruction, and had memorised a good part of the Gospel of St. John with a view to being in possession of the facts needing explanation. These women are mothers, whose lads are at school, as might be expected. Our schools have done a good work. Some of the boys are beginning to take services in the villages, and our hope is that we shall raise from among them a capable body of men to whom may be committed the ministry of the Word.

"Twenty-four men and six women have been baptized this year, and our membership for this district is now one hundred and forty-six. With the coming of Mr. and Mrs. Whitehouse, and the taking up of full work in the coming year by Mr. Underwood, we shall hope to gather in those who have come under the Gospel, but who live too far afield to receive our ordinary ministrations. If one dared to quarrel with Providence, it would be because, notwithstanding the many thousands living at our doors, those who are stirred to interest in truth should be so largely from amongst those who live at great distances, and those to the east of us in well-nigh inaccessible places. But we will not quarrel; the Gospel light is travelling with them, and how brightly that light is shining in many dark places only moves us to thanksgiving."

A most interesting and encouraging case is thus reported by Mr. Farthing:—"A man applied for baptism three years ago, and so far as knowledge, holy living, and devotion were concerned, was entitled to receive the ordinance. But he had a wife. This wife would not allow the idols to be removed. Her husband is a strong man, but strength counts for little with such determination and doggedness and tireless energy with the tongue as she possessed. The idols should not go. Nor did they. The idols in the house are there at the discretion of the head of the house. That is a Chinese axiom. Every idol for which a man is responsible has to be put away before he can be received for membership with the Church. That is the Church rule.

"In the eighth moon this man again requested baptism, but since the idols were not removed the Church refused to consider his appeal. I enjoined upon the man the need of taking the matter in hand at once, and promised I would bring his case forward again the following month if he would return home and persuade his wife to yield in regard to the idols. He was hopeless as ever, but went home to try what

he could do. His wife asked him whether he had been received, and showed unwonted interest, he thought, in doing so. He told her that she was the barrier. 'How?' she asked. 'Because you will not let me throw out the idols,' She persisted that they were hers, not his; but not for long, for she broke down with, 'I have so wished you to join the Church, and would not for anything hinder you. The difference this Jesus doctrine has made in you I cannot gainsay. Bad habits given up, as I know. and the kind husband you have been to me since you followed this religion, all make me wish you to continue to follow it.' And then, perhaps really wanting light, or perhaps only that she might give way with good grace, she asked him to invite some of the Christians to come and talk with her concerning the idols, and show her why they need be put away before he could be baptized. He did as she desired, and the woman after hearing arguments was convinced that the idols were a positive hindrance to herself as well as to him, and out they went. We hope the wife will soon follow her husband through the waters of baptism. This year has been fruitful in such picturesque, shall I say, illustrations of the power of Christian life and If it were not that my idea of a report is that of an account-book-like statement of facts, I would indulge my desire to relate more of these incidents.

"The annual accounts sent home by an earlier mail would show you that of the sum expended on mission work in this district, one-third of the whole was raised from native sources. But that only partly states the fact, because each station has its own voluntary fund, expended for Church purposes, which do not find a place in our mission accounts, although a full statement of receipts and expenditure is presented to the Church and inspected by the missionary. Then the accounts sent home included the outlay upon medicines for the coming year of opium refuge work, and these are somewhat costly, so that as the money will come back in receipts to be taken at the refuges, a fair comparison would require some £12 to be deducted from the present year's expenditure to be charged up next year. Thus, while we do not express ourselves as having attained all at which we aim in the matter of throwing the cost of mission work upon the natives as soon as can be, yet we point to results, as not altogether without cause for thanksgiving and congratulation. Nor is it merely the sum raised which gives us pleasure, but rather the conquest it shows over the sordid miserliness so characteristic of the Chinese.

OUR OUTSTATIONS.

"Haiav-Tuen.—The work at this place has been steady. It yearly grows in hopefulness. The mission simply subsidises the evangelist. Other expenses are raised by an annual subscription of the members.

"Shih Tich.—The station from which I am writing this report, to catch the mail courier, is a constant source of joy. The villages out in the lower hills gladden me upon every visit. The children in the school are reverent, studious little mortals, who answer questions about God, the Saviour, and the Trinity, sin, idolatry, and gaving faith in a way that causes me to fear whether I shall not soon be drawn out of my depth and caught floundering. The women, too, have in this district—the Christian women, I mean—chosen voluntarily to unbind their feet as an encourage ment to their daughters to bear the taunts of evil-disposed neighbours upon their feet being left unbound. Several of the girls have been taught to read, and the girls at school with Miss Shackleton in Tai Yuan Fu are largely from this neighbourhood. Old Hu is well stricken in years, but has done effective work. He is a simple man with no pretensions of any sort, and no large stock of gifts; but he possesses what

makes the absence of the rest tolerable, much grace, loving tact, and sincere desire to glorify the Saviour.

"Chair Cheng.—The opium refuge work has been carried on as usual. The patients have been slightly in excess of last year. Several have been added to the church. The growth in grace and knowledge is marked in the character and bearing of many of our Christians. Liu Hsiang Cheng is in charge, and does a very good, if not exactly brilliant, work. There are several village causes in connection with this station, and each one of them is full of promise.

"Ping Tou.—This station is doing fairly well. The number of inquirers has increased. The men wish to buy a place as a chapel, and I am intending to visit them to-morrow to confer with them as to ways and means. They have already collected a good proportion of the sum it is proposed to expend. Certainly they need a better chapel, and we have been hoping to secure a better place for the large congregation which meets there for service, still I do not want to acquire a building which may, perhaps, be as 'a bushel' for the hiding of their light. One will need grace to decide aright in this matter.

"Siû Pu.—This station has given us cause for thankfulness. As reported last year the friends could find no fit place for meeting together. One man has by deed of gift made over his court and garden upon the main street with some timber towards a simple building which it was proposed to erect. The cost would be very little, since the labour was to a large extent promised without charge. This I accepted, when written terms were given of the labour to be expected, and a deed making the ground and court over to the mission beyond recall. Something has been done in the gathering of materials, and the chapel will soon be erected.

"One new feature is the commencement of a week-day service in the near villages to Tai Yuan on a definite plan. There has for years been desultory work, but I am convinced that only the systematic and plodding pays and so wish to try something like regular work on a sort of local teacher's plan. It will permit of our native brethren exercising their gifts as well as brace up our Christians and inquirers.

"I can only express my gratitude and thankfulness to God for all His help vouchsafed to us through another year. We have had much and serious sickness to contend with, but the lives of our friends and helpers have been graciously preserved. Chiao Cheng has given some cause for grief and foreboding, but one has never lost faith in an eventual rightening up of affairs there. Above all, the evidence that the good hand of our God is with us is so palpable, so manifest, that doubt would be sheer disloyalty.

"That our staff is to be reinforced with the coming year is a cause of great joy. That Mr. and Mrs. Whitehouse are on their way, and will probably be ready to begin work almost immediately, does not fail to gladden and encourage us. We thank the Committee for having sent them to us most heartily, and beg of them to speedily yet further increase our numbers. In the district of Tai Yuan we should have a staff of from four to six missionaries and two zenana ladies in order to in any way adequately overtake our work and avail ourselves to the full of our opportunities. The enforced return to England, through ill-health, of Miss Foord deprives us of an effective worker. We trust that her loss will be made good without delay."

The Rev. Frank and Mrs. Whitehouse will, we trust, by the time this report is issued, have joined Mr. Farthing and Mr. Underwood in Tai Yuan Fu, where the district work is so increasing as to render reinforcement absolutely necessary.

HSIN CHOW AND THE DISTRICT.

The Rev. Arthur Sowerby reports with regard to this district :-

"The past year has been one of mingled blessing and trial, both affording cause for thankfulness. While we are being steadily encouraged by the results of our labours we have also much cause for praise, for help, and deliverance, in hours of trial and suffering, and with deep feelings of gratitude we would ascribe our thankfulness to our Blessed Lord.

"In all directions we have not only been able to carry on steady work, but in every part of the work we can mark progress.

"At Hsin Chow the medical work has been very heavy, and both surgical and medical cases have taken much of my time. One night last Winter I was summoned from my bed to see a soldier suffering from a gun accident. The poor fellow's rifle had exploded in his hand, which was completely shattered, and almost torn from the wrist. I found him in great pain and suffering badly. That night I gave him what help I could, and the next morning with Mr. McCurrach's assistance, amputated the fore-arm just above the wrist. The patient made a good but somewhat slow recovery, and both he and his mother have often attended our services throughout the year. I have had, as usual, more than one case of violence and some with bad results. man was attacked by some business rivals, in the temple next door to our house, and so badly beaten about the head that he died within a few days from hemorrhage on the brain. Another young fellow, who had been previously a party to a murderous assault on another man, was himself attacked in turn, and badly wounded. I did all I could for him but did not see him for several hours after he was hurt. Tetanus set in, and his death was frightful. He slipped away from those who were attending him at his father's house and hastened his end by a horrible debauch. There is now in the hospital a young lad of sixteen who was freezing to death on the streets. He had been exposed to the intense cold, destitute and almost naked, and must have died if we had not sheltered him; as it is, his toes are frost-bitten and are gaugrenous.

"During the summer a terrible epidemic of typhus fever laid hold of North China. While many of the cases were comparatively slight, still in some quarters the mortality was very large. We had several cases here; several of our scholars, servants, and converts suffered, and gave me a most anxious time. Mr. and Mrs. McCurrach both had the fever, Mr. McCurrach slightly, but Mrs. McCurrach very seriously, and we owe much to the valuable skill of Dr. Smith and the kind and devoted assistance of our friends, Mr. and Mrs. Simpson and Miss Shackleton. For two months most of my time was taken up in visiting the fever patients, and any outside work was of course left alone. In God's great mercy we have only one death to record, that of Mr. Wang, a Christian, and engaged as teacher to Mr. McCurrach. During his illness he frequently assured us that his mind was at peace; and, indeed his only concern seemed to be for the other sufferers.

SCHOOLS.

"With regard to schools, we have had a large accession of scholars this year, and the school is steadily developing into a high school for the most promising scholars from the other schools. Of the four senior students we have a most gratifying report to give. The last of the four, Yao Yu Yu, has been baptized, and all four show themselves to be earnest and consistent Christians. I have held classes for them in arithmetic, algebra, trigonometry, natural philosophy, geometry, "McKeuzie's History of Nineteenth Century," physiology, logic; while we are also making a

close and careful study of Mark's Gospel. I feel most humbly and deeply thankful for the conversion and earnestness and consistency of these young brethren.

"I must not omit to mention the class that has been held for women every Wednesday. This has been on the whole well attended, and two women have been baptized. Typhus fever alone prevented another woman from receiving the ordinance.

"I will not detail the work at the various out-stations, but we have to record the faithful labours of the evangelists and steady and increasing success. The station at Chuan Mo Chen, which was very weak, is now progressing hopefully, and the evangelist there, Kao Wen T'ang, has proved himself to be a most valuable addition to our band of workers. At Fan Shih, our most distant out-station, there is also considerable success.

"The number received by baptism is twenty-two, but for the fever in the summer and my subsequent visit to the coast to meet our friends who have lately joined us, this number would have been much larger. As it is, some eighteen converts from the northern out-stations are waiting over till next year for baptism.

"It was a great joy to welcome our friends, Mr. and Mrs. Dixon, back to Shansi and Hsin Chow, and their arrival has given a considerable stimulus to the work, and it has also been a source of much gratification to welcome our friends, Mr. Sidney Ennals and Miss Renaut. Hsin Chow has so sorely needed more labourers that one is more thankful than one can express for these additions to our missionary band.

"Mr. and Mrs. McCurrach kindly relieved me of the school work on Sunday afternoons, and I have been most glad to leave this part of the work to their fostering care.

"The Evangelists have attended classes regularly and I have especially dealt with, Old Testament prophecy and Homiletics. I am glad that at last they are showing improvement in the construction of their sermons.

"I have completed a small commentary, or exposition of the Messianic Psalms, which I trust may soon be published.

"We have closed our mission year with a conference of our Christians. The meetings were well attended and quite the best we have had. The main subject of the conference dealt with the 'Work of the Holy Spiritin Redemption, in the Church, in the Believer,' and I think all felt the meetings to be highly profitable. This time also the Christians defrayed the entire expenses.

"At the present time we are having good congregations at all the out stations, and at Hsin Chow we have to have two services on Sunday morning, as we cannot accommodate all who come. Never before have I been able to write a report with a heart so full of thankfulness and praise."

SHENSI PROYINCE.

The Rev. Moir B. Duncan, M.A., and Mrs. Duncan are now on their journey back to Shensi after a furlough at home.

The Rev. A. G. Shorrock, B.A., sends the following report of the work of the past year:—

"The writing of the yearly report brings afresh to one's mind the missionary's responsibility in relation to our Lord's final commission. How far has all the work done—evangelistic, educational, literary, medical, secretarial, or other—proved

effective in making disciples and teaching them to observe all the commandments of Christ? Some results are easily tabulated, such as the number of members added books distributed, patients seen and cured, moneys expended and contributed; but there remain other results no less real, which it is impossible to take account of. The seed of the living Word seems to germinate particularly slowly in the Chinese mind, but there is ample evidence everywhere, both in the general attitude of the people and in individual interest, that the Word is taking root in many whose names do not appear as converts or inquirers.

"During the year several instances have come to light of men who have been quietly reading our books for years. One man had been convinced of the truth of Christianity through a careful reading of Acts; another had been impressed with the majesty of the true God by the book of Exodus; others were found to be quite familiar with the teaching of our Lord through the constant study of the New Testament.

"There must be many of whom we know nothing who are being savingly influenced by the written or spoken Word. We pray for larger direct results, for we are always deeply conscious of the overwhelming preponderance of the unsaved, but year by year there is evidence of prejudice dispelled and of a more believing attitude toward the Gospel.

"Soon after the Chinese New Year a band of Christian young men and teachers joined me in the provincial capital of Hsi-an-fu for a special mission lasting half a month. We separated into four bands and preached day by day in the book-shop and in the main thoroughfares. Good attention was given everywhere. Bands of Christians also went out to the villages on a voluntary evangelistic tour. They gathered an audience by beating a gong or drum, then sang and preached. The Gospel was put in all simplicity, Christ crucified being the central theme of their preaching. Multitudes heard the Word, the preaching being listened to with unusual attention.

AT HSI-AN-FU.

"My work among non-believers has chiefly been in Hsi-an-fu. It always stirs me to see the great throngs on the streets there; the chief officials of the province, who rule over millions of people, moving to and fro in the pride and pomp of an empty pageantry; the scholars, whose faith in the great Confucius is so absolute; the aspirants to office, many of whom have been waiting wearily for an appointment for years; the keen business man and the hard-worked coolie-Mohammedan and Confucian, Chinese and Manchu, of all provinces and dialects mingling-all these and many more one meets in this cosmopolitan city. Daily preaching has been carried on in our hired preaching-room in one of the main streets to very various classes. The two evangelists who help there are prayerful, capable men, fitted by training and experience for this important work. We have begun opium-curing work. It promises to be a fruitful means of good. The process of cure is gradual, and necessitates a patient remaining with us for half a month at least. He can thus listen to Christian instruction daily without discomfort, our purpose being not simply to deliver men from the opium curse, but to bring them altogether into the possession of Christian liberty. We greatly rejoice in the advent of Dr. Creasey Smith. Medical missionary work has long been a necessity in Hsi-an-fu. There are great possibilities of service in this city; and now, with the return of Mr. Duncan, who is well known and esteemed by many leading men there, we pray that God may so work through His servants that there may be definite manifestations of His saving power among all classes of the vast population.

THE SHENSI CHURCH.

"The membership of the Shensi Church now numbers 219. Fourteen have been added by baptism and seven by transfer from Shantung. Disease has been unusually rife this year, chiefly typhus, typhoid, and small-pox. Eight members have died, besides some others connected with us. Two of our best men have been taken away by consumption. One was a leading deacon, a man of humility, patience, and sound judgment; the other was a former teacher in one of our day schools. His childlike spirit, dependence on God, and evident nearness to God in prayer were markedly developed months before the fatal nature of the disease was suspected. Two of our senior scholars—one twenty, and the other eighteen years of age—each an only son, were taken away by typhoid. By their deaths the transitoriness of life, the danger of delay in decision for Christ, the need of living for God and not for self, were solemnly impressed upon their fellow-students. Eight youths, most of whom had previously shown peculiar indifference to all appeals, have lately applied for baptism. It was the death of the two scholars that finally brought them to decision.

"In the teaching given to the church stress has been laid on the need of clearer separation from worldliness, of fuller recognition of the Holy Spirit's guidance in church methods, and of a greater willingness to witness for Christ.

"At the re-election of officers we called together the leaders and spent half a day in prayer for guidance. The eight men who were afterwards elected as pastor, elders, and deacons we felt to be just right. They are all members of a prayer rand specially formed, more than a year ago, for the purpose of seeking a more abundant spiritual life in the church and evangelistic association. With such men as officers we hope the spirit of earnest, unselfish prayer will be more abundantly poured out on the whole church.

The quarterly meetings of the Evangelistic Association have been specially helpful. At each meeting some subject or portion of Scripture fixed upon beforehand was discussed by the members; then a considerable time spent in prayer. The work of the Spirit, Scripture teaching on prayer, the Sermon on the Mount, and the letters to the Seven Churches were the subjects for the year. Each member of the association is a baptized Christian, and undertakes voluntary preaching work. They have partly supported one man during the year, and now contemplate the entire support of their own evangelist. The notive paster is also entirely supported by the Church; the money subscribed during the year for all purposes shows an advance on last year in spite of a bad autumn harvest. The church is scattered over seventeen stations. Each has its own place of worship, and no expense for maintenance is entailed on the Society.

"The services are refreshingly free from all stereotyped forms, and are conducted by local preachers. As it is impossible for us to visit these places often, we have special classes once or twice a year for the instruction of leading Christians, lasting ten days. This year they were attended by forty-six invited men. Mr. Morgan, myself, and the native paster gave. Bible expositions daily. It was good to see how the teaching was valued, especially by men who had been earnestly studying the Bible in distant stations without much help. They went back to their homes cheered by helpful fellowship and heartened for the work of God. To teach those who can teach others also is especially important in missionary work. We are very few, and must of necessity depend largely on native help. This is why we so highly value our schools.

"I have felt it a privilege to take the eldest youths and girls through the Epistle

to the Hebrews. They numbered thirty-one in all, and met in the chapel, a screen being run up in middle to suit Chinese notions of propriety. The close attention given and the grasp of the Epistle shown in the examinations lead me to hope they may be more securely grounded in the faith, and lead others to know Christ as the great Consummator of all things. Mrs. Morgan has asked me to report on the Girls' School this year. Since the establishment of the school eight years ago by funds contributed in memory of Mary Stephenson, it has been supported by special funds. The school has grown in usefulness year by year.

"In spiritual, mental, and physical well-being the scholars are far in advance of their less privileged sisters. Thirty-one past and present pupils are now members of the church. Others will be baptized before long. From the early days of the school Mrs. Duncan's clear Scriptural teaching and personal interest in the conversion of the girls have exercised a deep influence. The senior girl teacher—herself a former scholar—has proved a zealous and faithful servant of Christ. The examinations have shown creditable results, especially in Scripture subjects. The curriculum includes Old and New Testament teaching, Christian Evidences, Chinese literature and essay writing, arithmetic, geography, elements of astronomy, sewing, and singing. The situation of the school in the open country, the simple wholesome food, and, not least, Nature's unbound feet, account largely for the splendid health of the girls, The elder girls are made responsible for the order and cleanliness of the rooms, and all take part in the cooking.

"Mrs. Morgan has given a large part of her time and strength to the school work, attending to the ailments of the girls, and taking classes in Old Testament, arithmetic, geography, and singing, she deserves the thanks of us all for her carnest, self-denying work.

"Miss Beckingsale, of the Zenana Mission, is already a valuable helper, and will soon be able to take over the management of the school, for which she is so well fitted."

The Rev. Evan Morgan reports as follows:-

"The experience of the past year leads us to look forward with hope to the future, and calls for gratitude for many encouragements received in our work. In spite of the suppression of all reformers, and the prohibition of all progress, we still have evidence of an increased interest in religion. A definite testimony to this effect is supplied by the colporteurs of the British and Foreign Bible Society under our direction. This year their report has been invariably favourable. A larger number of Scriptures have been sold, and a keener desire manifested to know the truth. With a few exceptions, the colporteurs have been received in a more friendly way, and in some places have been welcomed and entertained. These things, though they indicate no definite acceptance of the truth, yet betoken an awakened interest in deep things. This general experience will also prove true in particular cases. In

SAN-YUAN,

our oldest station, much preaching has been done on the streets and in the houses, and audiences have proved attentive. The event of the year in San-Yuân is the great fair held during the last month of the year. We annually erect a mat-tent, and for days daily preaching is carried on. Addresses are given continuously for at least six hours a day. The audience varies from 10 to 200. I calculate that during these ten days, this year, at least, 10,000 people have listene to the truth. The

subject treated of varies. From a simple exposition of the error of heathenism to the profounder and more important truths of the need of man for divine things, and satisfaction offered in the Gospel for all such needs. There has been no open hostility, no contempt expressed as in former years; and whilst we cannot say that the people long for salvation, we yet may confidently hope that they desire to know the truth of things. In the words of the native preacher: 'The people are yearly more eager to know the history of the Christian religion.'

"San-Yuân is the great mart of Shensi, the emporium of trade, the centre of worldly wealth and of spiritual poverty. In such a Vanity Fair we may not expect many converts, and, at the best, can only hope that the sound of the power of an endless life may become more familiar to the ear, and hope for its eventual acceptance. This much has been accomplished here.

"A day's walk due north brings you to

YAO-CHOW,

a town situated at the entrance to the northern mountains. It lies in a fertile valley, where land is irrigated and productive, some of it bearing as much as three crops in the course of a year. Our first year's experience here was not very encouraging; but quite a different tale can be told this year. The purchase of larger premises made it possible for us to invite people to come in for the opium cure. At first but few came, but by the summer the venture had taken, and a number came in to break off the habit during the autumn and winter. Their stay of about twenty days afforded us a splendid opportunity of enforcing upon them their spiritual needs and the promises of God. As a result a good foundation has been laid. Many seem to have responded to the Saviour's invitation, and to rejoice in freedom from the opium craving. Only time, however, can witness to the permanency of the results: but, in this way, not only have individuals been brought under the power of the Gospel, but these, in turn, have passed what they have heard and experienced on to others. Many, after leaving us, not only have come regularly to worship, but have brought others with them. This form of work is a splendid help. Street preaching is also done, but it cannot be regarded as effectual as a method which permits people to have a regular course of instruction. Thus, as the Chinese say: 'we have here the material to be moulded into vessels.' If the result answers to the promise, we may look forward to an abundant harvest in this district.

"Yet another day's march, still due north, and we come to another station -- the town of

T'UNG-KUAN.

On another occasion I may give you the story which led to our definitely occupying this town. Suffice it, in a report, to say that the Baptist Missionary Society have occupied this advanced post. A suitable evangelist has been placed in charge of the premises rented there. He is living down suspicion—always the first step in work and preaching. Here, also, we look forward to indirect means to lead people to salvation. Many have expressed a desire to come for the opium cure. At present they are suspicious, but in due time we shall win if we faint not.

"Now returning to San-Yuan, and going due west about forty miles, we come to

Li-Ch'uan

town, where we have another station. But here I have nothing to report. The place is not promising, and, in the course of the coming year, we may have to remove ourselves from here to a nearer and more promising field.

"These out-stations, established in different towns, must necessarily be in charge of a native evangelist, or, if the name is preferred, an assistant missionary. Provided the foreigner can effectually supervise these stations, then his effectiveness as a worker is much increased. The difficulty will be the acquisition of reliable native Christians. When such are found they are the Church's treasure. Possessing not only spiritual fervour, but also mental culture, meekness of spirit, strength of character, these men should be diligently helped and earnestly prayed for. Hence the importance of education in this branch of mission work. Much seed may fall by the wayside, &c., but if eventually a chosen one is found, then time and money spent will not be in vain.

"Our elementary schools for boys have not flourished this year. There have been fewer scholars, and as yet these schools have not begotten many ministers; but eventually 'the boys may all be the better deacons for the attention paid them. Last year there were 109 scholars in ten schools. The financial help from the Society's funds to each school was double the payment made by parents. When the constitution and practices of missionary societies change we may bring the condition of things more in a line with self-supporting principles.

"With regard to the more advanced school, the boys have made a year's progress-Lessons in Romans and Hebrews have been given by Mr. Shorrock, and on the Scripture doctrine of sin and salvation by myself. Two young men have left us as evangelists, one in Si-an-fu, one in Tung-Kuan. These were far and away the best scholars. Two others have left us to take charge of elementary schools, and three died, within ten days of one another, of fever. Apart from teachers' fees, cooks, fuel and grinding, eight were self-supporting, and the others paid $\frac{1}{12}$ of the cost of corn. We recognise the importance of self-support, and this is a step in that direction.

"The boys have manifested a worthy zeal in preaching, and have a good conduct record. A few have been baptized and more have applied.

"We must be grateful for a year's good health and peace, and for the grace and help to enable us to 'lift up the standard of the Cross in this needy land.'"

WORK AMONGST WOMEN AND GIRLS.

Writing from Yao-chow, where Mr. and Mrs. Evan Morgan recently went for a little change, Mrs. Morgan reports:—

"Yao-chow differs from our home in many ways. First, it is a town with shops and a good deal of life. Then it is entirely peopled by natives of the province, who have different habits and speak a different dialect from our Shantung farming emigrants. They have more etiquette and less brusqueness of manner. They have also vices, from which the Shantung race, being a hardier one, is comparatively free, the chief being opium-smoking. Then the landscape is quite different. Fu-yin-ts'un has few trees and no rivers or streams, whilst Yao-chow is a land of luxuriant vegetation, plenty of fruit trees, indigo plantations, running streams, and small canals. It is situated in amongst the mountains, whilst our little village is on the open plain.

"Of course, in spite of all this, home is best, and I agree with little Katharine in having once or twice since coming, a fit of home-sickness; but the people here seem singularly prepared to receive the Gospel, and interest me greatly.

"It is also possible that after the return of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan and the arrival of Miss Law, we, as a family, may settle here, or at any rate spend a good deal of time here; and, of course, this feeling gives the place a special attraction and its drawbacks are toned down by the feeling that in the not distant future there may be a little church here which shall be a centre of light to the district.

"The house is our own. It was bought cheaply from a rich man, who had got into difficulties. The stone and woodwork are very beautiful, so unlike our cottages in Fu-yin-ts'un, and taking one back to the old days in the city of Tai-Yuan-fu, where our three little boys were born. At present it is amply sufficient for us, the work consisting in preaching and talking to those who come in at the always open door (and, so far, the inquirers have not lacked in numbers) and in helping those who wish to break off opium. Already several have been called and become regular attendants at the services, and next winter my husband and Mr. Yang, the evangelist, expect to have a large number.

"I have never seen a place which seemed so friendly, and so ready to listen to the Truth. Foreigners are a great curiosity, and especially a foreign woman, who has large feet, can read and write, and who walks freely about, and we are always followed by a large crowd every time we leave the home. But it is always a respectful crowd, and not one word of unkindness, much less of abuse, have I heard once. We have been here now eleven days. My plan has been to stay in during the morning to receive visitors-rest during the hottest time, between two and four o'clock, and soon after that sally forth with the four children, escorted by a man who knows the neighbourhood. As a rule we go outside the north gate (which is close by), and saunter down by the river. Here the children take off the shoes and socks and paddle, and I apply myself to a book or work. In a short time people begin to gather round-mostly out of curiosity-and after a few exchanges of friendly greetings, questions as to my age, children, customs of our country, &c., the way soon opens ap for the conversation to turn upon more vital topics; indeed, the people as often as not ask to be taught, and many times I have had an eager audience, both of women and men, who listen for an hour or more at a time. Sometimes we choose a spot where women are congregated washing clothes, rubbing them up and down on the smooth boulder-stones, with the ashes of the charcoal or the pod of the 'soap tree' for soap. But wherever we go, we get an audience, and it amazes me that in so conservative a custom-bound a land as China, teachers and respectable scholars in long gowns and spectacles, will stand and listen as simply as little children, asking intelligent questions from time to time, to show that they are present not only in body but spirit.

"To the women especially the first foreign lady to arrive in a district is an object of great admiration, and they say things which, if one hadn't such constant proof of one's own ignorance and weakness, would tend to turn one's head! But, though one smiles at the simple credulity of these poor people, whose 'untravelled thought,' as in the case of the villagers of Raveloe, can conceive of little above their own horizon, yet one rejoices at their friendliness and readiness to listen.

"The duty of worshipping the one true God, the same of the soul in contrast to the perishing body, the need of a sin burden-bearer, and, finally, the proof of the Heavenly Father's love, in sending His Son, the sinless Jesus, to die for them, these simple truths are readily understood; and then one tries to do away with the error that Jesus is a Western saint, no better than their own Confucius, by bringing out and explaining a picture of the raising of Jairus' daughter, the stilling of the storm, or the healing of the man born blind. But nothing other than the Spirit of

God can make these truths living realities to them, and more and more one feels one's dependence of it, and the danger of trusting to mere words of one's own.

"I have found a very kind reception in several houses here, mostly the homes of our men inquirers, who want their wives and mothers to hear the Gospel. In every case the yards have been soon filled with quiet, attentive women and girls. In one case it was the wife of an official, whose maiden home was seventy li from here, quite close to our village; when on visits to her parents she had attended my weekly class in her village, and, on hearing of our arrival, sent over to ask us to come and see her! It was pleasant to be greeted thus as an old friend, and this has happened several times. One day two men came up as I was surrounded by a little crowd, and said: 'I know you quite well, lady; you pass through my town often, either in cart or on horseback, to your meetings in the east.' And another time, on hearing baby and Claudie called by one of the bystanders in a familiar way, I expressed surprise. But the man said, 'Oh, I know baby quite well, and I know your doctrine; it is a good doctrine.' Thus seeds sown unconsciously by the wayside, now and again, take root, if not always 'unto eternal life,' to the one in whose heart it is cast, at any rate unto friendliness, which paves the way for other things in days to come.

"All who know the place are of the same opinion, that there is a good opening for work amongst women here. It is a large enough place to afford many women and a small enough one to allow both themselves and the lady missionary to visit freely. We are, therefore, thinking of securing a small yard which joins our present one at the back and enters it at right angles. This yard can be entered by us from the house, and for the women from the main street, which cuts off all communication with the men's quarters. We should like to put a Bible-woman in this yard, and possibly an old scholar to start a girls' school. Now this will need fresh funds. We have in reserve a small sum, which, together with some of our own, will be nearly sufficient to purchase this side yard.

"Will some who read this, and who know what Christ has done for them, promise to subscribe or collect a definite sum every year for the definite purpose of maintaining a Bible-woman and a young schoolmistress in this newly-opened place, and so giving to these women and girls, whose hearts God has opened, and who are, many of them, groping still in heathen darkness, and 'seeking if haply they may find Him,' a chance to learn of Christ, and so 'find rest unto their soul?'

"For, dear friends, they need to 'learn,' if ever anyone did. Conversion of a Chinese mother, wife, sister, child, doesn't come all in a moment, or rather, I should say, it takes much patient teaching to prepare heart and mind for the final joyous flash of conviction which turns the soul Godward. It needs one of their own people to live amongst them and teach them daily. Oh, what a joy to be privileged to lead one of these dark, dark souls into light and peace! And how many there are in dear old England who could spare £2, £3, £5 a year easily without missing it much! And even if it should be missed, can we not deny ourselves some little luxuries for Christ's sake? Who will help? If any, after prayerful thought, say, 'Here am I Lord, take mine,' please send the help to the Mission House, Furnival Street, under head as follows:—'For work amongst women and girls in Yao-chow, Shensi.'

"May it be said of us all, when we stand around God's throne with the Chinese women whom we have been the means of 'calling out' from heathen darkness, 'She hath done what she could!'".

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE FOR CHINA.

THE REV. TIMOTHY RICHARD, OF SHANGHAI.

The Rev. Timothy Richard, writing by a recent mail as to "Signs of Progress in China, and the Special Work of the Society for the Diffusion of Christian Knowledge amongst the Chinese," says:—

"We drew up our annual report in October last under a cloud of disappointment as compared with the high hopes which had been raised the year before. Still we worked on, fully persuaded that the sowing of good ideas in the long run would produce a harvest of good things. We published 18,000,000 pages last year. God has justified this faith in spite of the opposition of the ignorant and the indifference of the careless.

"Note how the Chinese lay hold of material benefits through new industries, railways, and new ideas of commerce. Note how they attend meetings to put down the cruel and unnatural binding of their women's feet. Note how intellectual benefits have so impressed themselves on them that three men undertake to raise Tis. 30,000 (over £4,000) for Western Education. Last of all, note how the Chinese feel the need of moral reform; how native Churches are multiplying for the regeneration of the empire. These are all remarkable signs, which ought to make the pulse of every lover of China to beat faster. Let us rejoice that the seeds which we sow are not dead dogmas but living seeds, with the omnipotence of new lifedivine and human-in them, astonishing the Chinese in every province, and making them glad in God and in Godlike friends who have come to them from afar. They also say 'How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings of peace, that publisheth salvation.' But this is only the beginning of the dawn. Let us be ever on the watch that we make the most of this marvellous opportunity whereby a mighty nation may be 'born in a day!' And when this nation is born into God's Kingdom it will be one of the noblest of the human race."

During the past year, 185,960 copies of publications published by the Diffusion Society have been issued to the public.

Mr. Richard appeals for further sympathy and help in this work, and writes:—

"To those who desire to use their money to bring about the greatest possible returns for the regeneration of China we commend our work most heartily, for although the outlook has been very dark in China this year, we know that better knowledge of Christianity and of Christian civilisation is one of the very best ways to save the country and to develop the vast resources of this great empire. It is not by violence of the Conservatives against Reformers, nor by exclusion of Conservatives by Reformers; it is not by China's persistent opposition to foreign influences, nor by foreigners forcing themselves against the will of the Chinese, that the highest good of China can be attained, but by the free play and friendly co-operation of the best elements in all these parties. It is for this we labour and pray, in full faith that God and the good will ultimately prevail."

In connection with the unique work being carried on by Mr. Richard, it

may not be out of place to record here the remarks made by the Rev. C. E. Darwent, of Shanghai, who said at a recent meeting:—

"He would venture to say that support of the Diffusion Society was an index of character: it showed an enlightened knowledge of the needs of China; the Chinese were a literary people, and a sure way to teach them was by books. He believed that in future ages men like Mr. Richard and Dr. Allen would be looked back to as we look back to the Apostles; they were laying broad and deep the foundations of Christian civilisation in China, and were secure of a very high place in the future hagiology of this great empire."

In all his arduous labour, it is only right to say, Mr. Richard has been largely assisted by his like-minded and equally devoted wife.



The Girls' School is in a prosperous condition, however. In this school the Bible is the text-book, and systematic religious instruction is daily given.

Mr. El Karey has, he reports, "carried on a large amount of itinerant evangelistic preaching in the regions afield," and he feels confident "that in many hearts the good seed of the kingdom has not been sown in vain."

During the past year several events have occurred in connection with the Congo Mission of considerable importance.

In the last report the Committee stated that: "With regard to the future base station of the Congo Mission, at the request of the Committee, Mr. Lawson Forfeitt is engaged in making careful investigations and conferring with his colleagues, with a view to arrive at a decision on this important matter, and the Committee anticipate the receipt of a report and recommendation on this subject at an early date." In October, after a very careful consideration of Mr. Lawson Forfeitt's report, and of the views of his colleagues on the Congo in relation to it, it was resolved to sanction the establishment of the base station at Matadi, one very important factor in this settlement being the absolute necessity for securing efficient arrangements for the transport of goods and stores for the stations at San Salvador and Kibokolo.

The Committee have also, through the favour of His Majesty King Leopold, the Sovereign of the Congo Free State, obtained a most

desirable site, with a good river frontage, for the erection of permanent buildings for the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Lawson Forfeitt and of Mr. and Mrs. Beedham, who, for the present, are stationed at Matadi in association with Mr. and Mrs. Forfeitt.

A second important event has been the establishment of the new "COMBER MEMORIAL STATION," at Kibokolo, in the populous Zombo country, and the settlement there of the Rev. Thomas and Mrs. Lewis, of San Salvador, and the Rev. John Pinnock, from Tumba.

Readers of the Missionary Herald will doubtless remember the remarkable manner in which the way was opened up for the establishment of this new and interesting advance—the very people who, on the occasion of Lewis's pioneer journey, would not permit him to remain in their town, subsequently sending ambassadors pleading for his permanent settlement amongst them—and to-day the needful mission buildings are being put up, and the blessed Gospel—the good news of a Saviour—is being proclaimed, to the great joy of the people.

Little wonder Mrs. Lewis should write soon after her settlement there:—

"Last Sunday we had a very good meeting, when we tried to explain our message, and in the afternoon eight of us sat down together at the Lord's table for the first time in that dark land—one a Zombo mau, who had been working with Mr. Pinnock at Tumba, and while there had been brought to Christ. He was accepted at our last church meeting at San Salvador, and sat with us for the first time at Kibokolo. May he be but the earnest of many more. It was a hallowed time. We spoke and thought of those who have gone before, and remembered Him who died for us and for all those thousands of dark souls around us in this vast continent."

In response to a very earnest appeal for a third missionary for this station, and in view especially of the home-coming on furlough, ere long, of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis, the Committee have accepted the offer for this special service of the Rev. George Hooper, of Bristol College, who will leave for Kibokolo very shortly.

Other gratifying incidents of the year have been the publication of a Grammar and "Dictionary of the Bobangi Language" by the Rev. John Whitehead, of Lukolela Station, and Mr. Bentley's important book, entitled

"Pioneering on the Congo," published by the Religious Tract Society, which will doubtless take rank as a standard work on that part of the Dark Continent.

When, in October last, the Secretary had the pleasure of presenting to King Leopold a copy of Mr. Whitehead's Bobangi Grammar and Dictionary, his Majesty, in graciously accepting the gift, stated that he regarded the splendid efforts of the missionaries of the Baptist Missionary Society in the Congo Free State with admiration and surprise, specially mentioning to Mr. Baynes his cordial appreciation of the signal services rendered by Mr. Grenfell in the uplifting and training of the native races of the Congo Free State.

The re-establishment of the health of the Rev. W. Holman Bentley, and his return to the land of his adoption, is also an event that calls for devout thankfulness and joy.

While there has been much to rejoice over during the past year, there have been also keen sorrows and sad shadows.

In March last Mr. and Mrs. Grenfell lost their eldest daughter, Patience Elizabeth Grenfell, in the very morning of her life. Mr. Stapleton, of Yakusu, where Miss Grenfell had been actively engaged in school work, wrote:—

"Miss Grenfell impressed those with whom she spent most of her Congo life as possessing not only marked ability in the acquisition of languages and a marked capacity for loving and winning the love of the natives amongst whom she moved, but in addition a quality absolutely essential to the success of a pioneer worker—the happy habit of keeping personal convenience and comfort in due subordination to the pursuit of those 'things that are eternal.'

"Her ideal of missionary life and work was a very high one, and we were expecting great things of her by the grace and favour of God. In the youth of her days, and to our great grief, God has translated her to the higher service. May I solicit the sympathies and prayers of the Church for our revered leader and for his wife in this dark hour of sorrow and loss?"

In the following month of April, Mrs. Ross Phillips, of San Salvador, was called to the higher service of the Father's House, leaving a great blank in the company of workers at San Salvador, a sorrow-stricken husband, and mourning motherless children.

Mrs. Phillips was ever a quiet, unobtrusive, faithful worker, and will be sorely missed by those who, for more than ten years, have had the joy of her companionship and the inspiration of her devotion, and by all the peoples of San Salvador, by whom she was most warmly loved, and for whom she endured so much and worked so unselfishly.

The death in December of Mrs. Weeks, of Monsembi Station, removed from the Congo Mission one of the most tender, true, and devoted missionaries Africa has ever had.

"The memory of the just is blessed." That heritage of blessedness will be shared by a very wide circle, and to all whose privilege it was to know her will the memory of what she was and what she did remain as a living force to sanctify, inspire, and uplift.

The death of Mrs. W. H. White, the widow of the late Mr. White, of Yakusu Station, has been a further loss to the Congo Mission, on the behalf of which she rendered loving service since her return to this country.


LOWER CONGO RIVER.

MATADI.

The Roy. Lawson Forfeitt, Secretary of the Congo Mission, writes :-

"Secretarial and official work, transport matters and the like make large demands upon time and strength day by day. Missionaries belonging to each of our stations have passed through Matadi during the past twelve months, and we have had a busy year as usual. My duties as secretary have taken me on a tour of all our stations on the Upper River; and I also visited San Salvador, just as the new chapel was approaching completion, an occasion of deep interest and gladness. Investigations with regard to the important question of the future base station involved interviews not only with our missionaries, but also with the Governor-General in reference to the new site, and he displayed a most kind and friendly attitude throughout towards the B.M.S. Through God's mercy I completed in December last ten years as a Congo missionary, and I am now the senior legal representative to the Congo Free State of the Protestant missions.

"The report which I prepared by direction of the home committee recommending the establishment of our base station at Matadi, was, I have been glad to learn, approved and adopted, and the work is now in progress on the site indicated in that report and as shown in the plan beneath and the frontispiece to this issue of the Herald.



"For postal purposes (for the convenience of the postal authorities) our address will be simply B.M.S., MATADI, Congo State; but for local reference and distinction we call the station 'New Underhill,'

"In November, after Mrs. Forfeitt and I had been alone for nearly eighteen months, we had the great pleasure of welcoming our friends Mr. and Mrs. Beedham (who had spent three months at San Salvador after coming out) as our co-workers here. Mr. Beedham is working hard at the new base station. The work includes the removal of the buildings now standing at Underhill for re-erection, and we hope shortly to settle at the new place. Meanwhile we continue to occupy the premises rented from the A.B.M.U. Mr. Beedham also labours right heartily in the more directly spiritual work—Congo services, and services in English for the coast people being regularly held. The distribution of helpful literature on the ocean steamers, and among the English-speaking residents in the town, has been continued. There is a lending library in connection with the coast people's chapel which is greatly appreciated, and we also have a kind of savings' bank, where the coastmen may deposit their wages and so avoid risk of waste and loss, and thus ensure the money being taken home to their families when their period of service is finished. Of course. we accept no responsibility of any kind, but simply place the money in the Mission safe at depositor's own risk.

"Medical work is carried on daily; and since her arrival Mrs. Beedham has joined Mrs. Forfeitt in the school, which has two departments—one for Congo children in their own language, and one for the children of English-speaking coloured people from the coast. A number of such coloured men hold good posts as clerks and store-keepers for the State, railway company and trading houses, and as carpenters, masons, fitters, engine-drivers, &c., &c.; and many of them attend the services on Sundays, and constantly come to us during the week when in need of counsel and help of any kind.

"I am hoping soon to go to St. Paul de Loanda, at the request of our brethren Mr. Lewis, of Comber Station, and Mr. Graham, of San Salvador, to see the Portuguese Governor-General with reference to title-deeds for our station sites in Portuguese Congo. I sent last year certificates relating to our stations in the Congo State, and I know the Committee are anxious to have all the Mission lands and properties definitely secured by official deed and title,"

SAN SALVADOR STATION.

The great event of the past year has been the building and opening of the new chapel. Mr. Lewis writes:—

"The inside measurement is 37 ft. by 70 ft. When the seats are put in, it is calculated to accommodate about 500 adults, but at present the building has no pews or fixed seats, and we can easily find room for 900. During the opening services our congregation averaged about 800. Whether at some future date the chapel will be seated depends on circumstances.

"The present chapel is built of native stone, the greatest part of which was obtained from the ruins of the old Catholic Convent, on the site of which our station is built. Instead of lime-mortar we had to use old ant hills, with a little clay and ashes, not by any means a bad substitute. The timber used is also native, and has

been brought from a long distance from here. The roof is of galvanised sheet-iron, and obtained from Europe. With this exception, and also the sashes for front windows and glass, our chapel is all of native work and material.

"I wish to emphasise the fact that the whole of the work has been done by lads brought up in our Mission at San Salvador, so that the building of this chapel has been of much service in training our young lads in carpentry, blacksmith, and mason work.

"You know that the native Christians here have been collecting money for some years towards the chapel. It has cost in English money something like \$300. There is a small balance, which we fully expect to disappear by the end of the year. The pulpit and baptistery (which is situated under the Communion table) are erected at the personal expense of the missionaries at San Salvador, in memory of those who have been called home, and who had been settled here for a time. A suitable brass plate appears in front of the pulpit,"

Few who read the graphic record of the opening services in September last, as written by Mr. Bowskill and printed in the MISSIGNARY HERALD for February, will soon forget the inspiring addresses given by the native Christians on that occasion, or the closing Communion service.

"There yet remained one more meeting, doubtless the happiest of them all. At 3,30 on that afternoon all the church members, to the number of about 160, assembled in the chapel to celebrate the dying love of our Lord. I cannot describe this meeting; I can only say we felt the presence of God in our midst in a marked manner. The station was now quiet, the majority of the people having left for their towns. The peace of God seemed to fill our hearts, and we were glad.

"And now this meeting was over; the night had closed in; we were again in the seclusion of our own rooms, and thinking over the events of the past few days. Had our prayers been answered?—Yea, verily. Had our expectations been realised?—We had not dared to expect so great blessings. Were we grateful to God?—Ay, we were, and still are."

The Rev. R. H. Carson Graham sends the following report:

"Perhaps there has not been a year since the founding of this station more full of changes than 1899.

"Besides losing a true friend and teacher in our dear sister, Mrs. Phillips, the people here have suffered more than usual from the inroads of death amongst themselves. Our little church has lost no less than fifteen members by death during the year, and some of the inquirers who were on the point of being baptized have also been called away. I could wish that death had been the only way in which the church had lost members during the year; but, sad to say, a few have had to be cut off from fellowship because of walking disorderly and unworthily of their profession. But in spite of all losses we have still a net increase of seven, as our membership now stands at 131.

"The two great progress-marking events of the year were the founding of the 'Comber Memorial' Station at Zombo, and the opening of the new chapel here. Of both of these events you have already had full reports. The former robs this station of two most capable workers, and the latter is a lasting evidence of the skill and patience of Mr. Lewis. Not that either Mrs. Lewis or he needed such a monument to

remind the people of their work amongst them, for they are never forgotten in the prayer-meetings, and folks here feel that the Zombo work is a child of San Salvador.

"The acceptance of Mr. Bowskill and Mr. and Mrs. Wooding for work at this station is a great cause for gratitude, since it gives us at last our complement of workers, and we may henceforth hope to have at least three men always on the field.

"The fact that Mr. and Mrs. Wooding had already some acquaintance with the language made us feel less than we should otherwise have done the absence of Mr. Phillips on his well-earned and much-needed furlough, for they were able to enter at once into the work in the vernacular.

"Since we have all settled down together we have been very happy in our work, and have divided the various duties after this fashion: Mr. Bowskill takes the boys' school and attends to transport, besides working away at the language; Mr. Wooding superintends the workmen and boys, and does the medical work amongs' the men; while I see to station-books, stores, and most of the palavers, besides doir g my best, with Mr. Bowskill's aid, to supply Mr. Phillips' place in the printing work. We visit the surrounding towns, and conduct in turn the regular Sunday and weekday services, &c., on the station. Mr. Wooding takes the class for native preachers, and I have a class for male inquirers and two classes for male church members.

"Mrs. Wooding and Mrs. Graham do the work amongst the women and girls, or rather, as much as two ladies can do of a work that would tax the energies of five. Mrs. Graham does the medical work among the women, and has Bible-classes for the station children and the Christian women from other towns, as well as a class for the training of female Sunday-school teachers. Mrs. Wooding works hard at the language, and shares with Mrs. Graham the work of Sunday-school, girls'day-school, and women's meetings, also conversing with inquirers and visiting in the town.

"As to the work of the native church, it will be evident from what I have said of the preachers' class that the church still carries on the work of evangelising in the surrounding towns. They have also continued to entirely support their own three evangelists, who, with their wives, carry on the schoolwork in the sub-stations.

"The regular contributions for the evangelistic and other work of the church amounted to 66,700 strings of beads, and the chapel building fund has been increased by 55,273 strings through the contributions at the opening services.

"The building of the chapel and the changes caused by the opening of Zombo station have prevented several branches of the work receiving all the attention we could have desired; but considering the circumstances we have every reason for gratitude in reviewing the results.

"The monthly magazine, Nyonde ya Nyonde, has been issued regularly during the year; containing, amongst other matter, translations of 'Pilgrim's Progress,' Holy War,' and 'Follow Jesus.' As was anticipated, Mr. Lewis's translation of the 'Pilgrim's Progress' has now all appeared in the magazine. Several booklets and the hymns and readings of the 'Pilgrim's' service of song have also issued from the press.

"The old chapel is being used as a schoolroom, but it cannot last long, as the white ants have put it past repair. In the meantime, Mrs. Wooding takes the infants' department of the Sunday-school (there are about sixty of them in it); and the main body of the Sunday-school meets in the new chapel."

KIBOKOLO STATION, ZOMBO.

By a recent mail the Rev. Thomas Lewis writes:-

"In writing the first annual report of the work at this station, my first thought is that of heartfelt gratitude to our loving Father for preserving the lives of my wife and myself for so long a time in this land to labour for Him, and for the continued health and strength He has vouchsafed to us in this land of fever and pestilence. God has indeed been very gracious to us, and has led us in the way with many tokens of His Divine favour.

"It was naturally a trial to both of us when the time came to say 'Good-bye' to San Salvador after over twelve years of happy service with our colleagues there; but we felt that the call to new work in the Zombo country was so decisive and clear that we had no doubts as to our duty and no fears as to the future. God has opened the way for us in a marvellous manner, and given us an entrance into a land full of heathenism and sin, and whose people are, in a marked manner, in terrible darkness, I have never seen such degradation and superstition as are to be seen in towns around us. The witch doctors, of course, are not favourable to us, and are doing their best to keep the people away from us. When anyone shows special kindness to us or attends our services, he is told that if anybody becomes ill in the family or dies, he will be held responsible for it. The people are consequently very shy and timid. On this point we shall have to exercise considerable patience and perseverance, but when they get more accustomed to our presence among them their fear will pass away. Indeed, we feel that already we are making headway, and many are getting quite friendly. The women are more timid than the men in this respect, for the latter go about a great deal and see white men on the coast when they go for trade purposes. For this reason it is a great help to have a white lady here from the very beginning to go among the women and talk to them. Mrs. Lewis will have her work cut out for her to reach these Zombo women and win their confidence.

"Public prayers are held on the station twice daily for our boys and workmen, and sometimes a few of the townsfolk come and join us. Sunday morning service is also held on the station. In the afternoon Mr. Pinnock and I go across the water to the opposite towns, where we get a good hearing, our congregations varying from twenty to one hundred. At the principal town we hold service every Sunday afternoon; other towns we visit in turns. At present our evangelistic work is almost exclusively confined to Sundays, as both Mr. Pinnock and myself are busy all through the week with building and station work. We hope to be able soon to give more time to visiting and preaching.

"SCHOOL WORK.

"Mrs. Lewis has charge of the school work. Up to last month she had only the six children brought with us from San Salvador. She did not attempt to have Zombo children, as there was no room to receive them. Last month we made it known to the chiefs that we were then ready to start school, and asked them to send their children. All the chiefs of Kibokolo, to the number of fifteen, came here to talk the palaver, and they agreed that their children should come to school to 'learn book.' However, as we partly expected, when they returned a few days later, it was only Kapela—the head chief of the Kibokolo district—who brought us boys. He came with three lads from nine to twelve years of age, and two grown-up young men, but

as the latter had each of them wives and children in the town, we did not accept them as boarders, but we arranged that they should come to school every day, and live with their families. The three lads are here with us, and are very proud of their new position. It is highly amusing to see other lads coming around, looking curiously at their three more fortunate friends, evidently longing to see the day when they can come, too. If the choice were left to the children themselves, we should soon have a crowded place, and I do not think they will succeed in keeping them away long.

"The other chiefs of the district say that they are going to bring their boys too, but they want to see first what becomes of the lads we have. If they find all as we say, and not as they fear, then they will bring their children. We have not pressed them, but let them take their own time. When they come we shall be glad to receive them.

"So the sum total of work done so far is, we have commenced work, and for this we are devoutly thankful. Last Sunday week we held our first Sunday-school. We had some from the town in addition to our ordinary school children. This is held before our Sunday morning service,

"We are particularly pleased with Kapela, our principal chief here. generally comes to our services on the station and always attends with many of his people at the evening service at his own town opposite. In the matter of the five scholars he brought us he found much opposition. Several of his advisers wanted him not to send his boys to us, but he continued firm in his resolve. He said that they had sent asking the white men to come and build in their town, and now that they were asked to send their children to school he would do so, even if everybody else refused. And he has done so. He says that these five are only to begin with and that more shall come later on. In this, as in almost everything else in this land, we have to move quietly and be content with slow progress. Although as yet we have not done great things. I have no fear whatever for the future. We are catting up the fallow ground, and as yet the sowing has been very little, but it is not a difficult task to look forward to the time when 'he that tilleth the ground,' 'he that soweth the seed,' and 'he that gathereth in the ripened fruit,' shall all rejoice together. What the Gospel has done for the natives at Wathen and San Salvador, it will also do for these Zombos; and our earnest prayer is that soon the Gospel of Christ will change their hearts and fill the land with the voice of praise and thanksgiving to God.

" Mission Buildings.

"This year will be largely taken up with building. The materials for our permanent buildings are now at Matadi, but being the rainy season we cannot get them here before June or July. Our present houses are of grass and cannot last long. Mr. Pinnock preceded us by six weeks, and had a good grass house ready for us on our arrival. He had to work very hard, for there was very little native help available, and had to do most of it himself. The three of us shared this house between us until last month, when the second grass dwelling was completed, and Mr. Pinnock is now living in that. A house for workmen had also to be built, and now we are putting up another for school boys, sufficiently large to accommodate twenty children.

"It is with grateful thanks to God that we enter upon this year's work. Our health has been exceptionally good, considering the rough life we are compelled to live while starting a new station and constructing buildings, &c. The general comforts of a long-established station we have none, but we are doing all we can for ourselves, and in a year or two we shall be through the roughest part of our work and be fairly comfortable again."

WATHEN, OR NGOMBE, STATION.

The Rev. George Cameron sends the following report:—

"In Congo it is the rule rather than the exception for the staff at a Mission station to be incomplete; but Wathen has been more than usually short-handed during 1899. Mr. Frame left on furlough early in the year; Mr. and Mrs. Bell only returned in December after fifteen months' absence; while Mr. and Mrs. Bentley are not yet returned, though they are expected soon, Mr. Bentley having happily recovered from his long and severe illness.

"Owing to the absence of these brethren, it has not been possible to carry on the work as well as could be wished; but we have sought to give attention to things of first importance, at the risk of neglecting minor matters. Miss Brindal has been untiring in her care of the girls and of the station school. Mrs. Stephens has busied herself with mothers' meetings and children's meetings, and has been a true mother to the little orphan boys on the station. Besides helping in the services, Mr. Stephens has undertaken the medical work and a large share of routine work, leaving me free to itinerate and to attend to the work of the church.

"The continued unhealthiness of the natives has caused us much anxiety. Last year I reported the death of sixteen church members, giving a death-rate of about 125 per thousand per annum: this year the deaths are twenty, being rather over 100 per thousand. We earnestly hope that this improvement will be more than sustained during the New Year, though the outlook is not cheering, cases of the dreaded sleep-sickness being found in every village. A still greater sorrow is the necessity for expelling from the church members whose conduct is inconsistent with their Christian profession. This has had to be done in five cases.

" PROGRESS.

"There has been joy as well as sorrow. Our hearts have been made glad by the consistent life of most of the believers as well as by their earnest testimony. The number of evangelists supported by the church has doubled during the year, there being now eight; and the number of voluntary workers has increased with an increased membership. Every member is urged to become a worker, and though perhaps not all can be truly so described, a much larger proportion is worthy of the name than at home.

"In places where there are Christians, daily service is held in the morning and school in the afternoon, while on Sundays, neighbouring villages are visited. Occasional efforts are also made to carry the Gospel to more distant places. On several occasions deputations of twenty or more have visited heathen villages, and their preaching and singing have excited great interest and led to more attention being paid to the Gospel.

"The blessing of God has been on the work. There have been baptisms nearly every month, the total baptized being eighty-nine, the great majority being untrained adult heathen converted through the preaching of their Christian fellow-countrymen. The net gain is sixty-four; the year having begun with 149 and closed with 213 members.

"The amount raised by the church has been very satisfactory, current expenses being met, and a debt of 2,626 brass rods paid off, so that 1900 begins with a clean sheet, besides a reserve fund of 10,000 rods equal to £40 of English money. Much labour in building and repairing chapels has also been given freely. In one village,

a brick building for school and chapel has been erected at the expense of the chief and people, helped by Nlemvo, Mr. Bentley's assistant, who neglected his own house and spent two months and a half working at this building, giving up his pay from the mission for that time. This is the second village chapel built of bricks, and others are likely to be begun before long.

"Many of the heathen are much displeased by the spread of the Gospel, and considerable hostility has been shown by some of them, although our most bitter opponent died early in the year. The two women spoken of in last report as being under the protection of the Government have been baptized, and are now living consistent Christian lives. Several others from the same village have also been baptized.

"There have been other sufferers. As recently as November a woman who had shown interest in the Gospel was stripped naked, beaten, and carried off, bound, to be sold to a man who was supposed to be powerful enough to force her to remain heathen. By the help of a Christian headman we succeeded in freeing her by a payment of cloth, which she is to repay as she is able. Traces of ill-usage were on this poor woman's body long after she was set free.

"Owing to the absence of other brethren, I have spent much time itinerating. Apart from visits to places near the station, I have travelled probably from 600 to 700 miles—500, at least, on foot. The missionary's reception varies between that experienced at a Christian village, where the whole population shows the greatest pleasure at his coming, and that met with in a hostile district, where not even a hut to sleep in can be got, but shift must be made in the open air beside the most convenient stream. This last only happened to me once; the former is now a frequent experience.

"With the increase in out-stations there is a large increase in the number of scholars. This is chiefly at the voluntary out-stations, those supported by the church being in districts more or less unfriendly. The numbers at the close of the year were 120 at the station school, and about 476 at the out-schools.

"It is interesting to note in this year of the establishment of the Comber Memorial Station that two old scholars of T. J. Comber's time at Wathen, have been baptized. Both were thorough heathen for many years after leaving school. Of such very old scholars I think about ten in all have been baptized.

"A very hopeful start has been made with special classes for young men who have begun their education at an out-station, or perhaps in their younger days at Wathen. When such young men tecome Christians they sometimes seek to qualify themselves to be teachers, and a course of a few months at Wathen helps them greatly.

"WATHEN STATION STATISTICS FOR 1899.

"Missionaries, 5; female missionary, 1; teacher evangelists—supported by church, 8, voluntary, 9; day school teachers (exclusive of above) 20; stations and substations, 18; baptized during the year, 89; decrease by death, &c., 25; church members, December 31, 1899, 213; day-school—girls, 206, boys, 272; Sunday-school—girls, 176, boys, 245, teachers, 33."

MEDICAL WORK.

The Rev. J. R. M. Stephens reports on the medical work at Wathen:—

"The medical work for the past year has been carried on as usual, and over 10,000 patients have been treated in dispensary hours. This does not include serious cases

where special visits have to be made to the sufferers. There have been several bad gunshot wounds, some of which needed small surgical operations, but only one case where it was necessary to amputate an arm. In all these cases, thanks to God's blessing, good recovery has been made. One of these patients came from a village long opposed to the Gospel. The man, who was the chief, had his thumb blown off. He stayed under our care for nearly two months, and the healing was progressing splendidly. He attended the services of the station regularly, and was beginning to manifest an interest in spiritual things. One morning, however, he did not come to have his wound dressed as usual, and on inquiry I found his people had heard that he was getting to 'like God's Word,' and so used persuasions and threats, doubtless to make him leave at once. We pray that in this and many other cases the seed of the Kingdom may have found a lodgment in his heart, and germinate, even if after many days.

"The death-rate in this country is fearfully high, but it would doubtless be still more so if the people had not the advantage of obtaining medicines from us.

"Of course, a great number of the cases are trifling ailments, but there are many where remedies and advice taken in time have saved from serious illness and death. Many of the evangelists and school teachers on their monthly visits to the station, to give their reports of the work, and to attend the monthly Communion, come to the Dispensary to buy medicine to take back to the villages, and there sell or give it to the people.

"The medical work is a very valuable adjunct to our other labours, and by showing sympathy and rendering aid as far as possible to all classes of sufferers in their time of need, we are trying to exhibit the Christ-like spirit and win the people to seek Him who is the Great Healer of their souls,

"WOMEN'S WORK,

"Mrs. Stephens started last August a mothers' meeting, which is held every Wednesday afternoon, and is attended regularly by some thirty women, Christians and unbelievers, from the towns near by. A short opening service, a few simple words about God's great love, and then they fall busily to work cutting-out, stitching, and chatting. (It must be remembered that the custom is in this country that the woman does the garden work, and the man is far more expert with the needle than she is.) The women are very clumsy to begin with (except, of course, those who were old school girls), but many are now progressing well and making clothes for themselves and children. It is hoped that this meeting may be very useful in helping the mothers to understand their duties to their husbands and children, and leading those to the Saviour who are not yet trusting Him.

"Mrs. Stephens has been the latter part of the year also superintending the work of the Christian Endeavour Society.

"The meetings have been well attended, and much interest shown. Divers and many topics have been discussed, all to make the young folk realise their duties and responsibilities as those who now are in the light and not in the heathen darkness.

"Mr. Cameron was able, before he left for home, to complete his series of addresses on the 'Pilgrim's Progress,' which has been translated into Kongo. These have been very helpful, and much interest has been manifested in the journey of Christian heavenward.

"It is hoped that much practical work may be done by the Endeavourers in this coming year by helping the sick and small boys and girls, and comforting and cheering folk in distress, and rendering service in many ways."

SCHOOL WORK.

Miss Brindal sends the following report of school work at Wathen:-

"In commencing a brief account of our school work of 1869, my mind goes back to my first attempt at teaching our little coloured folk. My vocabulary was very limited, for I had been at Wathen only a week, and I hardly knew how to commence in a tongue so new and strange to me; but happily the blackboard helped me out of my difficulty, and the afternoon passed off with knowledge gained by myself, if not by my black pupils.

"The year has been one full of interest to me, as I have watched the progress of the different classes. As in our schools at home, so here, there are some who work at their lessons well, and others who are quite indifferent; but the brightest side is always the best side uppermost, and it has been cheering to see with what earnestness some of these African children have won their way from class to class; and at last, but not least, some have won their way into the Church of Christ, having lived lives worthy to be called 'Christian,'

"Sounds of laughter and merriment are heard from boys and girls as they assemble in the schoolroom day after day. But alas! too often one may mark a boy or girl came in alone and sit apart from the rest. There are no signs of joy in the young life, for it has just been discovered that he or she has fallen a victim to the dread disease of sleep-sickness, and for the sake of the other children these have to return to their towns—that is, if they have friends to care for them—or they have to be isolated by being sent to a little spot not far from the station, where two native-tuilt houses serve as a substitute for Wathen Hospital. There they are cared for day by day, until the Saviour Himself comes and bears them away to the Home where there is no more disease or death.

"With regard to our girls, several have come and gone during the year, staying with us only a few months. Five have married; three of the number to evangelists, and the remaining two to old station boys.

"One, Diafwa by name, who looked such a bright and promising girl at the teginning of the year, died after a long and painful illness.

"Death and disease continually thin our groups of black faces, but in the Home above they behold the King in His beauty, and praise with those of every tribe and nation their own Redeemer."

STATIONS ON THE UPPER CONGO RIVER.

STANLEY POOL, OR ARTHINGTON STATION.

During the past year the Rev. S. C. Gordon has had entire charge of the work at this station. He reports:—

"As this is principally a transport station, much time is taken up with the receiving and shipping of goods, but this year the regular routine work will be made easier by the advent of the railway and the opening of a new station at Kinchasa instead of Ndolo. Then, owing to the great increase in the number of trading factories, many more natives come into the district, and we shall be able to do more itinerating work among the many natives who are on this side of the Pool.

"In the building department we have completed a small workshop, and our boys

have just built a very nice brick house for our workmen. I only assisted in the measurements, and gave instructions as to how best to proceed, and they did all the rest during my absence from the station.

"We have also done some repairs in bricks, and have earned some 3,700 francs in our industrial department, besides supplying our thirty or forty children with food from our own gardens for nearly three months.

"My wife has been unable to give all her time to the school during the year, but she has been ably assisted by one of our senior lads, by name Batoba.

"Many of the scholars have done creditably, and are making good progress, especially when one thinks of the influences by which they are surrounded.

"The Sunday-school is left entirely to the care of our evangelist, and about thirty scholars have been in regular attendance.

"To come to our more directly aggressive Gospel work, we have, of course, our station service every Sunday morning. We sometimes get a good many at the services, and during the earlier half of the year we had quite a number of coast people, for whom a separate service was held.

"We have only baptized three during the year, and though several of our lads have come to me for personal talks, I feel that one cannot be too careful before urging them to make a public confession of Christ by baptism.

"At the same time, it is pleasant to find that the seed of life sown in days past is bearing fruit. Some of those who left us are endeavouring to disseminate the truth in their own towns, and one tells me that he is persecuted for his teaching. In a letter received from another, he says: 'Do not think I will forget my Saviour. I love Him and will serve Him with all my heart; and there are others, too, in my town who are believers in Jesus.'"

BOLOBO STATION.

The Rev. A. E. Scrivener sends the following report:

"Looking over last year's Report, I find I gave expression to a hope that we should soon be able to begin work in the outlying districts, and establish in one or more places evangelists supported by the church. This is one thing about which we are disappointed. The State officer stationed here has, in his efforts to induce the people to recognise the sovereignty of the State, naturally come more than once into collision with them, and had to administer punishment more or less needed. This created a feeling of animosity against all white men and their employees, and compelled us to stop a series of expeditions into the interior, which we were hoping would lead to the establishment of a sub-station.

"But there are other reasons why the longed-for advance has not been made. Perhaps the most serious is the very low tone of spiritual life evinced by some of our church members. That, and consequent falling away on the part of some, made us think it more necessary to turn our attention to the purifying of the church before we could think of sending any of them out as messengers to the regions beyond. From what has been already said, you will not be surprised to learn that, although we had the joy of baptizing five young women about the middle of the year, our numbers do not show any increase, but a small decrease.

"THE MISSION PRESS.

"In other directions we have a more pleasant report to present. Mr. Clark can tell of increased attendance at the school, and this also applies to the Sunday-school.

The printing office has been busy, and supplied reading matter in the shape of books and lesson cards to all our Upper River stations, and also the stations of the C. B. M. Work done for the Government has enabled us to very largely increase our plant, adding a fount of brevier and other small founts, besides imposing surface and other necessary tools for our growing work. Many will be interested to know that the old printing press used by Mr. Saker and Mr. Fuller years ago at the Cameroons is now erected here, and as capable of work as ever. Passing down the west coast in 1886 it was seen by me in a rather forlorn condition, and very readily handed over to the Congo Mission by our old friend Mr. Fuller, who was then closing our work there. For a long while it was at Underhill. As soon as the railway was completed through to Stanley Pool Mr. Forfeitt sent it along to me, and, after a thorough overhauling and repair in our steamer shops, it is now ready for any amount of work. When I remember that the whole Bible, the "Pilgrim's Progress," and any number of other up-lifting books were printed on this press, I cannot help but regard it with a good deal of affection, and hope that by it the Bobangi Bible may be issued.

"Building work has been proceeding, as usual in this part of the world, with many delays. Mr. Clark's house was finished early in the year, and proves to be a very cool, comfortable house, and one calculated to outlive many of the wooden erections which have been put up in the past. Another brick building (Mr. Howell's house) has been finished, and adds very much to the beauty of the station as viewed from the river.

"Medical work has suffered somewhat owing to Miss de Hailes' return to England for furlough. But Mr. Adams is taking it up, and is very painstaking in his care for the sick. Sleep-sickness is obtaining a hold here, and already this year two of our church members have died from this cause. It is very much to be hoped that the efforts being made to find a cure for this scourge will be successful. At present it bids fair to decimate this part of Africa.

"The building in our colony has been going on, and the place is fast taking on the appearance of a township. There are many interests at Bolobo. Will our friends all join in the prayer that all may conduce to the advancement of the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

"I have not spoken of Bible-classes and other work of a similar character. The good health which we have almost uniformly enjoyed has enabled us to carry on these and the regular work of the station with little or no interruption.

"Mr. Grenfell has gone to Stanley Pool to fetch up Mr. and Mrs. Stonelake, and will take them to Yakusu to give Mr. Stonelake some idea of his work in connection with the running of the steamers, and then will proceed to England for his muchneeded furlough,"

SCHOOL WORK.

The Rev. James A. Clark reports on school work as follows:-

"Another year has flown and the time has come to send you some account of what has been done, and yet I am sadly conscious that it will seem very little after all. I suppose there is less variety about school work than in almost any other kind of employment, and although, of course, my time is not exclusively occupied by the school, yet as that is my special department, and as you will hear from my colleagues with regard to other branches of work, I am largely restricted to writing on that subject.

"The attendance at the day-school has been on the whole better than ever before. Those children who do not live at the station but come from their villages to school.

are the uncertain quantity. Perhaps many of them will come fairly regularly for few weeks and then suddenly drop off again. When they next put in an appearance they have naturally forgotten a great part of what they knew. In fact, we have quite a number who are perpetually beginning again, and this is trying to the teachers. But towards the close of the year the attendance became much more steady and averaged 165 per day. Since this new year has begun it has been better than that 180 being about the average for the first fortnight of this year.

"Many of the scholars have made good progress. Mrs. Howell and my wife, who returned from England in May, teach regularly in the school and so render immense help. On the other hand, we lost the valuable services of Miss de Hailes in July when it was deemed necessary for her to return home on furlough.

"During the year, I have maintained as regularly as possible my Friday evening class which I started for the help of the members of our church here who go to the villages around, more particularly on Sundays, to preach to the people. The young men, I believe, find it useful to them and they generally bring me questions or difficulties they have met with in their reading or in other matters.

"In connection with the Sunday-school I have had, as in previous years, a Bibleclass consisting of young men and elder lads."

Mrs. Clark reports as to the Girls' School:-

"In Miss de Hailes' absence from Bolobo, I thought I would send a few lines about the work here amongst the women and girls. We have a very fair attendance of girls from the towns, and some of them are able to read very well; they also come every Saturday to the sewing class which Mrs. Howell and myself have held since Miss de Hailes left, and which is very popular with them

"Sunday afternoons I try to get the girls to come from 'the towns to teach them. Some of them are very attentive, others are just the reverse. They are all very fond of singing, so we have plenty of music, at least plenty of noise, as they all sing very much out of tune. One woman comes with her baby, which generally joins in very lustily; as she cannot come unless she brings her child, we have to put up with the noise. I have sometimes as many as twenty girls, sometimes as few as eight, but I find twenty quite as many as I can manage.

"The girls from the towns are continually asking to come and live and work on the station, but as it is impossible to take on all that ask, we try to help them all we can in other ways. Several of these girls were telling me that they always ask a blessing on their food; they say the townspeople laugh at them very much for it, but that they continue to do it. I do not know how far their hearts have been really touched, but when I visit their homes the girls who come to school generally want to have some singing, and are always eager to hear what I have to say. They are very different in that way to the older people. Their lives in the towns are full of temptation, and one wishes they could be taken away from a great deal of the wickedness, but it is difficult to see how. The girls are ready enough to say they want to come and live here to learn about Christ, but how real the desire is I cannot tell. Several of the girls we have taken on are living very real Christian lives; one in particular, named Bonkoso, I should like to tell you about. She was baptized last June with several other girls. When I first came to Bolobo she was living in a village near here, but was very desirous of coming to work, so Miss de Hailes employed her. Since Miss de Hailes left she has been most helpful to me. The younger girls are very fond of her; they say she never loses her temper. Not only ise shuseful with the children on the station, but she is doing her best to bring her

own people to the Saviour. She very often goes into the towns and gets the girls to come to school, and when I go to visit the people in their homes she is always ready to come and help me with my work. The other day she came to carry the basket of medicines, &c., when we saw in one of the houses a child in a most filthy condition; the poor little creature was very ill indeed with dysentery, and as her mother was dead the people had neglected her. I saw it was no good to give her medicine and leave her there, so I asked Boukoso if she would look after her if I brought her to the station. She said, 'Oh, yes, she would be quite willing.' So the child returned with us, and Bonkoso washed her and tended her, and she is rapidly getting better. Many of the natives dislike attending to children when they are ill, and they certainly would not do it to a strange child. I believe Bonkoso was supported by Miss Freeman's Bible-class at Falmouth. I am sure they will be delighted to hear that the girl they supported is helping to bring others to the Saviour."

BOLOBO HARBOUR AND MISSION STEAMERS "PEACE" AND "GOODWILL."

The Rev. John Howell writes:-

"In view of the home-going on furlough of our dear brother the Rev. George Grenfell, he has handed over to my charge the accounts of the mission steamers. The new boiler tubes for the *Goodwill* and the new engines for the *Peace* have involved a very heavy outlay; but it was absolutely necessary, and we now have the satisfaction. 'knowing that both steamers are in a thoroughly good condition and both fit for act... service."

Mr. Howell reports further-

"That the *Peace* has steamed 3,950 miles and the *Goodwill* 5,200 miles during the year, although the repairs were all the time in active progress, and that they carried 2,000 loads and thirteen passengers,

"Mr. and Mrs. Weeks went with us" (he writes) "for a health trip to the Falls; now she is no longer with us, save in spirit. What a beautiful and sweet character she was, so gentle, so kind, so thoughtful in presence and act—a living sermon."

By the last Congo mail the Committee received tidings of the safe arrival at Bolobo of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Stonelake.

Mr. Stonelake writes :-

"Mr. Grenfell has very considerately delayed his departure for England in order to go with us 'up river.' Of course, we are only too delighted to have the benefit of his knowledge and great experience.

"We have been unavoidably delayed at Bolobo, though it has given us a good opportunity of becoming acquainted with our adopted home. Even many years of deep interest in our Congo Mission at home fails to give a correct idea of the work here. We were simply astonished and delighted to find how much has been accomplished, and were greatly cheered by the hearty welcome we received. Bolobo must surely be on the royal road to civilisation. One part is named Rome, another Jerusalem! On Christmas day Rome attacked Jerusalem and put her to rout. That was only, in military language, a sham fight. But a very real piece of business was

settled here a few days ago, being no less ithan the first Town Council meeting of Bolobo. Mr. Grenfell took the initial steps in this affair, and when matters came to a head the native householders—not 'hut-holders'—met at his house and had the advantages of amalgamation brought before them, and their liberties and rights clearly defined. Those who agreed to obey the Congo Free State Laws, to discountenance plurality of wives, the importation and sale of spirituous liquors, afterwards signed this Declaration of Independence. There were seventeen names enrolled.

"We could not follow their discussions, but it was amusing to notice how conscious they were of the new importance of their position and new dignity, and the way they laid down the law to each other. I don't know whether tickled or thrilled best described our feelings as Mr. Grenfell compared this 16th February to the American 4th of July.

"Those who took the most prominent part are all members and active workers in our native Christian church, and have a great influence for good in the town. May God richly bless them and raise up many more like them.

"My wife and I feel full of hope about our future here, and trust it may be our blessed privilege to rejoice exceedingly in the ingathering of precious souls into the Redeemer's Kingdom,"

LUKOLELA STATION.

After a season of furlough in England Mr. and Mrs. Whitehead have resumed work at Lukolela.

During their absence the work at this station has been in the hands of Lusala, and Mr. Scrivener and Mr. Clark, of Bolobo, have both rendered valuable assistance and advice.

MONSEMBI STATION.

Of the work at Monsembi Station during the past year the Rev. C. J. Dodds writes:—

"Here at Monsembi the work of the past year has been of a steady and hopeful character. Varied efforts have been made to leaven the people of our district with the leaven of the Gospel. We fondly believe the work has not been in vain in the Lord, notwithstanding we have no definite additions to the church to report.

"The greater interest of the people in the services, as reported last year, continues. Our Sunday services are held in a usually well-filled school-chapel, and at the week-evening service the place is crowded.

"There are many signs indicative of the influence the work done here has upon the neighbourhood—e.g., the weakening hold of witchcraft, the abolition of cannibalism; the decreasing number of fetish palavers, and the self-improvement of many in relation to their houses and persons. But, beyond these things, we rejoice to report that there are those who are inquiring longingly about the 'palaver of God,' from among whom, we trust, before long some will come out to bravely acknowledge their Saviour Christ.

"The two schools (morning for boys, afternoon for girls) have been held regularly during the year. There are over 100 names on the registers. Many more have thus

astered the mysteries of the symbols A, B, C, &c., and are now able to read for themselves in their own tongue the Wonderful Story, and still many others are following in their footsteps.

"In our schools we have several boys from towns many miles away. We engage them to work for twenty months, in order that they may be able to maintain themselves while under instruction. Hence, returning to their towns, they are able to read and relate the Evangel to people with whom we cannot often meet.

"Three mornings a week a short service is held for the boys and workmen. Also all who desire medicine are expected to attend.

"During the year there have been also several lantern exhibitions of scenes instructive and interesting—biblical, local, and foreign. These, of course, are very popular with the natives.

"Itineration work has taken up a share of our time and energy. The towns both up and down river are being regularly visited by us. We are waiting till the road inland is passable, and then we hope to visit again the towns in the hinterland which Mr. Jeffery saw some time ago.

"In the early part of the year a book of the 'Doings of Five Countries' was printed for us at Bolobo. It is illustrated, and interesting as containing a graphic account of the impressions received by a native, Buntungu, on his visit to England with Mr. Weeks.

"The Gospel according to Luke is almost prepared for the press by Mr. Weeks who is also at work preparing a consecutive selection of 'Biblical History and Narrative,' such as would be serviceable to youths leaving the station and returning to their towns. Mr. Stonelake is translating the Acts of the Apostles. Thus soon we shall have the Four Gospels and the Acts as a literary foundation for our work at Monsembi. Several hymns have been added to the number of Gospel songs, which are always a delight to the natives.

"The year so full of joy and work has closed in deep shadow. Mrs. Weeks, who had shared the work of this station almost from its founding, passed unto her reward on December 11th. Her work, so faithfully and lovingly performed, is done, and significant evidence of the respect she had won was shown by the women and girls when they learned that she who had loved them and lived for them had gone to the Father's house above.

"We are saddened, and our loss is great; yet, still hopeful and trustful in God, our Sufficiency, we go forward on the New Year, believing that the seed so sown shall yet spring up into a glorious harvest."

BOPOTO STATION.

The Rev. William L. Forfeitt sends the following report of work at Bopoto Station:—

"Although there have been no additions to our church membership, yet there are many waiting anxiously to be admitted, and many more who are beginning to inquire the way and seem honestly to desire to walk in it. I am persuaded we shall not have to wait much longer without being able to record in the pages of the Missionary Herald that our little band of Christians in church fellowship has been greatly strengthened, and our hearts greatly cheered thereby. It has been a year full of work and happiness for us in seeing this increasing thirst for good

things, and not the least source of our happiness is in the fact that some of the girls and women are amongst those who thirst for that knowledge which brings light and life to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death. In the prayer-meeting on Monday evenings their voices may now be heard praying for themselves and their friends, and in the inquiry class some are seeking to know the 'truth.'

"We have been favoured with the best of health throughout the year, for which we are deeply grateful. At the end of August we had the pleasure of welcoming Mr. and Mrs. Kirkland here, a pleasure to which we had looked forward for some time. I am glad to say they are both in good health and have heartily taken up their share of the work, which was a great relief to us after being alone so long.

"The attendance at both boys' and girls' schools has kept up all the year without flagging. An average daily attendance of 150 scholars is a healthy sign, and the girls are very proud to have two white ladies now to teach them. Many of the children have made big strides in knowledge. They are hungry for more books to read, and we are doing our best to satisfy that very desirable hunger. Luke's Gospel, which was put into their hands at the beginning of the year, they seem to know almost by heart. Towards this end Mrs. Forfeitt has just completed a translation of both volumes of 'Line upon Line.' I have translated some 'Stories from the Acts,' which are now being printed at our Mission Press at Bolobo by our brother, Mr. Scrivener. John's Gospel I have also just finished, and it will go to press by the next steamer, so we are beginning to collect a small library at Upoto.

"Since the return of Mr. and Mrs. Kirkland, we have been able to more systematically visit the villages around. The people everywhere are very willing to give us a quiet and attentive hearing, and we wish we could go to them more often, but that is impossible just yet. We generally start early in the morning, taking with us in the boat a small organ, which of course is a great attraction. We spend about a couple of hours in the village, part of the time occupied with a service under some spreading tree, and the remainder in chatting with the interested villagers; then we return to the station in time for Sunday-school in the afternoon. After school, two bands of Christian lads and inquirers walk out to the neighbouring villages, and conduct short services. In this way we hope to establish friendly relations with the people, so that before long we may be able to start one or two schools in different directions.

"We were glad to receive a short time ago the small vocabulary of the Ngombe language which our late brother, Mr. White, had collected and which we shall find most useful. I feel that the time has now come when I should give attention to the study of this extensive dialect, and to this end have engaged a lad of the tribe to assist me therein.

"With two large military camps near to us and several trading companies we have many more European officials and others in the district than formerly, with all of whom we are on terms of cordiality. This I consider to be a matter of some importance, and is an indication, to some extent at least, that they have a measure of appreciation of the work we are doing for the benefit of our fellow men, and we pray that some 'leaven' may find its way even into their hearts, as well as of the native population.'

YAKUSU OR SARGENT STATION

On the return to England of the Rev. W. H. and Mrs. Stapleton in consequence of impaired health, the Rev. J. L. and Mrs. Roger, of

Stanley Pool, removed to Yakusu. After some months of earnest work Mrs. Roger's health entirely gave way, and for some time her life was despaired of, the only hope being her immediate return home with her husband. Since their arrival in England, we are thankful to report, a considerable improvement has taken place in the condition of Mrs. Roger, and she is now regaining strength, although somewhat slowly.

Mr. Millman was thus, for a short time, left quite alone at Yakusu, until the arrival of Mr. H. Sutton Smith. It is now probable that Mr. and Mrs. Kenred Smith, of Bopoto, are at Yakusu, and will remain there until Mr. Stapleton's health will admit of his resumption of work.

The Rev. W. Millman writes :-

"After the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton and Mr. Jeffery in April, Mr. and Mrs. Roger set to work to fill their places, and in a few months Mr. Stapleton's house was completed and bricks were being made for the second house and the new chapel. The attendance of girls in Mrs. Roger's classes was fully maintained, though teacher and scholars alike suffered a sore shock from the unexpected news of Miss Grenfell's death.

"Meantime we made repeated excursions to the neighbouring villages endeavouring to make the message plain to these poor souls born subject to evil and superstition and the influence of the medicine-man, prophet or priest, and unable to see the light because of the thick crust of evil surroundings, ignorance and opposition of those who pretend to be able to stand between man and the power that controls circumstances. For a time the work lies in removing these adverse conditions, and this we have tried to do by associating with those near and visiting those afar off; by tacitly assuming that their trust in magic and fetishes was an appeal to the unknown God whom straightway we have declared unto them, and by getting boys from distant towns to come and live with us, attend our school and learn to read the book that declares unto us God's love and will in all things.

"It was more than five months before our mission steamer came again, and by that time our provisions had nearly run out. Of flour, sugar, biscuits and butter we had none, and we were greatly rejoiced at this extremity to see the *Peace* steaming up one fine morning in September. We had been living for more than a month on native supplies exclusively.

"Everything was ready for the reception of Mr. and Mrs. Beedham, but, to our disappointment, we learned that they had been called to help the brethren down country. May God's blessing abide with them. But Mr. Sutton Smith had come, and very soon he substantiated the many fine things we had heard of him.

"As, however, no lady had come, Mrs. Roger was anxious concerning the girls, and doubtless would have stayed here on their behalf, and Mr. Roger too to help on the chapel building, but a serious illness was laid upon her, and although the *Peace* had been allowed to go down without our friends, when the *Goodwill* arrived in October it was necessary that, for a time at least, they should return to their home at Kinshassa.

"Since they have been gone our efforts have been confined to brick-making and building and to the effectual maintenance of the school. Mr. Sutton Smith has taken over the last work and it is prospering in his hands, the daily attendance

having reached the glorious figure of 100 and over. Salamo, Mrs. Stapleton's girl, has been very helpful with the girls; indeed, at this juncture the girls of Yakusu would be without a day-school teacher but for her.

"It is with great thankfulness to all concerned that we record the fact that in our need for workmen every river station contributed to our help. Mr. Roger brought with him from Kinshassa some boys who taught our Yakusu boys how to make and burn brick. Bolobo sent us two bricklayers who are training four Yakusu boys, and will do more when sufficient tools arrive. Monsembi has supplied us with a very efficient carpenter, under whose eye another Yakusu man is working, while from Bopoto hail six good sawyers. With such resources the founding of a new station in the future will be less expensive and infinitely less dangerous for the missionary than formerly. The success in this direction must be great cause for praise to God.

"During the last three months sickness has been very prevalent in the district. The white men have suffered heavily from Hematuric fever, while small-pox has raged amongst the natives. That our mission has so far escaped is marvellous in our eyes. We know whose hand is with us; in very fact 'a thousand have fallen at our side.'

"We have no church at Yakusu yet; believers there are, in a sense, but no professed followers of the Christ. Yet, with such evidence of our Master's continued presence who would dream of shrinking? And we are reminded continually of His saving power when once a month we gather at Communion with the native Christians from the other stations who are living with us and before this people as children of God."

Referring to one of the Communion services at Yakusu Mr. Millman writes:-

"It is Sunday evening. We have been celebrating the Lord's Supper with two native Christians from Monsembi, and the service seemed even more impressive than usual. At such a time one is very forcibly reminded of the services in the homeland, and of the Christ who is holding communion with His members far and near, and of the cloud of witnesses gone before. And now it is over, and we linger yet a little while before retiring to our rooms.

"Outside in a rude shelter are some twenty men from Bepoto, who came up in the Goodwill three weeks ago to help us in clearing the ground, and across the darkness of the night come sounds of singing. Twenty strong men's voices, many by no means unmusical, singing in the Bopoto tongue the translation of Miss Havergal's consecration hymn, to the tune of the opening part of Mozart's 12th Mass.

"These men, singing there around their big wood fire, are three hundred miles from their homes; and as the missionary thinks on these things, surely he may be forgiven if his eyes become moist with tears of gratitude to God for the signs of the times.

"Soon, God helping us, both hymn and tune shall be sung right across the continent. A few hundred miles only separate us from the missions coming from the Eastern side.

"The Congo people seem to love singing, and the missionaries have not failed to take advantage of this by teaching translations of many of our best hymns. Even

as I write this, a new tune rises from the company in the shed, 'Come to the Saviour, make no delay.' Or, in their tongue:

'Yaka mboka Jesu, lako mongo Katuma njela o mokanda mwa inde.'

Do they understand, or is it all a fairy song? God knows."

THE REGIONS BEYOND.

The Rev. George Grenfell, who has been fittingly named "the African Missionary Pioneer," has recently made a very important exploratory journey in the direction of Lake Albert, and has sent home a graphic account of his experiences, observations, and discoveries on the route, which the Committee hope to publish in the June issue of the MISSIONARY HERALD.

It may, perhaps, be known to some that it is in the direction of Lake Albert that Mr. Robert Arthington is anxious to assist in the opening up of missionary work, and as Mr. Grenfell, it is anticipated, may reach England for a season of much-needed rest and refreshment during the coming summer, he will doubtless be able to supply valuable and reliable information as to the practicability of giving effect to Mr. Arthington's desires for sending the Light of Life into the dark regions that lie between our Yakusu Station and Lake Albert.

Referring to the native peoples Mr. Grenfell met with on his recent journey, he writes:—

"I could not help being very sad as I realised the sorrows of these peoples, and all the more sad when I remembered that, as these are, so are they that remain of the tribes between this and the Bahr el Gazal in the north, and on the Nile in the east. My heart aches for these poor survivors of the Arab sway. They must be a vigorous and resourceful race, or so many of them would never have survived the terrible cruelties and the nameless horrors under which they have been so long subjected. They certainly belong to no decadent race, and it seems to me that they are just at that stage when they would be readily susceptible to the influence of wise-minded and sympathetic followers of the Master, who would have a grand opportunity to help in the moulding of a people evidently destined to play no small part in the future of the country."

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THE BAHAMAS MISSION.

NASSAU, NEW PROYIDENCE, AND OUT ISLANDS,

The churches in the Bahamas Group are now quite self-supporting and independent of pecuniary help from the Society at home.

The Rev. C. A. Dann, of Nassau, sends the following report of the Bahamas Mission for the past year:—

"This year has been, on the whole, a sad one for our Mission. The hurricane of August last has destroyed several of our buildings, rendered many people homeless, and killed a number of our members. While the kind contributions of friends in England, for which I wish to return warmest thanks, have been a real help, yet the damage is so widespread that many of the settlements affected will take years to recover from the disaster. The people at Mastic Point old settlement and at Red Bay, both on Andros Island, intend to live in other places that are less exposed; and I fear that the church at the latter settlement will become extinct through the change. The church at Man-of-War Sound, on that island, which has been tottering ever since the death of its head a few years ago, exists no longer. The inevitable effect of my prolonged absence from Nassau last year was a partial going back of the church here, but I am hopeful of making up the lost ground before long. Before

leaving for England last year I was happily able to set apart Mr. James A. Hanna as paster of the church at Bimini.

"My colleague, Rev. A. Cooke, settled down in the Inagua District at the beginning of the year. Although I was sanguine of his success, he has had more blessing in his work than I had dared to anticipate. I am imitating him here in the matter of cottage meetings, with happy results."

The Rev. Albert Cooke, writing from Inagua, reports:-

"We have reasons to be very thankful to God for His mercies during the past year. Throughout the whole year we have been steadily advancing. Our members have increased in fervour, which has led them to take work of an aggressive kind; we have had additions to our members, both by baptism and transfers.

"Our congregations are steadily increasing. I believe that the whole tone is higher. For the future we have a brighter outlook than ever known before. In our candidates' class we have fifteen members, and others are anxious to join with us. We are sorry to have to record that three of our members have been called away by death. We have had six cases of discipline, some of which were very sad and painful. Re the other islands under my care, some I have not been able to visit; those I visited are, on the whole, progressing favourably. At Saline Point and Trueblue they are building new churches; we hope soon to open them, when a greater work will be possible."

TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS, AND SAN DOMINGO.

As in the Bahamas Group, so in these islands, the churches are now self-supporting and independent of the Missionary Society.

The Rev. J. H. Pusey, the pastor of the Baptist Church at Grand Turk, reports:—

"The year now under review has been one of exceptional hardships, aggravated by a rapid decline in the salt trade. This state of continued general depression makes our outlook in a place like these Salt Islands gloomy, and grave fears are entertained for the future of our Union. Our public services and special meetings have been most inspiring. The work has been carried on in the main by the deacons of the several churches in these islands and San Domingo. Their united efforts have not been without much of the Divine blessing."

In association with the Turks and Caicos Islands Baptist Union there are thirteen churches with over 1,100 members, several hundreds of inquirers, 1,090 Sunday-school children, and 100 Sunday-school teachers.

TRINIDAD.

In this island, also, the charches have been thrown gradually upon their own resources for pecuniary support. The Rev. R. E. Gammon reports:—

"In the Port of Spain Church during the year the work has been carried on as usual in the various departments, and although there is much room for improvement, still there is no reason for discouragement. There have been twelve baptized, and it is exceedingly gratifying to state that eleven of the twelve were from the Sunday-school, three of these being the children of our deacon, Mr. L. O. Inniss.

"A 'Women's Meeting' is held every Monday at the Belmont Hall, under the superintendence of Mrs. Smith, Mrs. A. J. Hamlyn, Miss Darwent, and Mrs. Gammon; the Sunday and Tuesday evening meetings at Belmont being conducted by the members of the Port of Spain Church, as well as by the missionary.

"The Christian Endeavour Society in connection with the Port of Spain Church holds its meetings every Monday evening, and its vigorous work is largely due to the energy of Mr. M. D. Forsyth, who is a red-hot Endeavourer. Towards the end of the year we suffered a great loss in the removal of Mr. W. H. Gamble (who has been promoted by the Government to be Sub-Receiver in Tobago); he was a most indefatigable worker in the church and Sunday-school, as well as a most efficient preacher.

"I am glad to be able to state that the Treasurer's Report shows that we closed the year with a balance in hand of \$4.83 (or £1 0s. 1d).

SOUTHERN DISTRICT CHURCHES.

"The work in this district has entailed a number of journeys during the year, and there have been a larger number of baptisms than in any year since 1889—namely, 91; in 1839 there were 100. Seven of the churches report a net increase, and four show a small net decrease. The largest numerical increase has been in Third and Fourth Company churches, the number being respectively 28 and 19; and the baptisms in those two churches were for Third Company 29, and for Fourth Company 25. The rebuilding of Fifth Company church is almost completed, and, when finished, it will be a very substantial cedar-wood building. Since the re-erection of San Fernando Chapel at First Company (or Mount Elvin), the work under Pastor Antony Elvin appears to be progressing most encouragingly, and on January 8th I baptized nine candidates there, who, of course, are not included in the statistics now sent for last year. Marriages in Southern District, 12. The total membership for these churches is 934; and for the whole island 1,100, making a total net increase of 66.

"STATISTICS (Port of Spain).—Missionary, 1; out-stations, 2; increase by baptism, 12; increase by transfer, 2; by restoration, 1—Total, 15. Decrease by death, 1; by exclusion, &c., 10; by dismissal, 1—Total, 12. Net increase, 3. Total number of members on roll, 166. Marriages, 18; Sabbath-school scholars, 120; teachers, 15. Belmont Sunday-school.—Scholars, 43; teachers, 6. Chaguanas.—Members, 12; death, 1; excluded, 1; not decrease, 2; scholars, 25; teacher, 1."

JAMAICA.

CALABAR COLLEGE, KINGSTON.

President, The Rev. ARTHUR JAMES, BA.; Tutor, The Rev. LEONARD TUCKER, M.A.

"The annual public meeting of the College was held in connection with the session of the Jameica Baptist Union in Kingston on February 7th, the chair bring occupied

by Mr. McFarlane, Principal of the Mico Institution, who bore high testimony to the great work the College had done in the training of both ministers and teachers, making special mention of our Normal School students, who in the last Government examination took the first position in the honours list.

"Four new Normal School students were admitted, making the number twelve, notwithstanding the withdrawment of Government aid. The trustees of the William Taylor Trust Fund, however, continued to supplement this department with their usual grant. Contemplating the close of the Normal School at the end of the present year, the Jamaica Committee hope to see their way to extend the educational advantages in substitution for it in a direction greatly needed by the growing intelligence of the peasant cultivators of the soil, who form so large a proportion of the population of the island, and on whom its future prosperity so largely depends.

"The Theological Department, for the education of pastors and missionaries, continues in successful operation. The annual examinations of the students, as in former years, by written papers in the subjects specially taught by the President, the Rev. Arthur James, B.A., and in others by the Classical and Normal School tutors, were kindly adjudicated by gentlemen in England. And while the results were generally satisfactory, one student was specially distinguished by the award of the highest number of marks that could be given.

"The Rev. L. Tucker, M.A., after a brief furlough in England, returned in September, accompanied by Mrs. Tucker, and to each was accorded a hearty welcome.

"During the year the College was called to sustain a great loss in the removal of the Classical tutor, the Rev. James Balfour, M.A., with his family, to the United States of America. He carries with him the high esteem and affection of the many teachers and ministers, whom, by his life as well as by his teaching, he has helped to prepare for their life-work, as well as of a large circle of friends and fellow-workers; and the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society have recorded their warm appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by Mr. Balfour to the Jamaica churches in a special resolution."

With regard to future arrangements for the conduct of the College, this important question is at present under the very careful consideration of the Committee of the Society.

THE JAMAICA CHURCHES.

The Fiftieth Report of the Jamaica Baptist Union supplies the following interesting information:—

"The Jamaica Baptist Union has now completed its round of fifty years. Though the union does not appear to have taken its present name, but retained the title 'Western Baptist Union,' until 1855, yet throughout the half century past, without intermission, the annual meetings have been held, and the union has continued to aim at the fulfilment of the purpose for which it was established, viz: 'To promote unity of exertion in whatever may best serve the cause of Christ in general and the interests of the Baptist Denomination in particular.' Without departing from the fundamental principle, that 'every separate church has, within itself, the power and authority to exercise all ecclesiastical discipline, rule and government, and to put in

execution all the laws of Christ necessary to its own edification'; the union has often guided and helped particular churches, and has banded them together for the common good, and for the advancement of the Kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ.

For two years past the membership of the churches in the union has shown a decrease. Happily the tide has turned again, and the statistics supplied for the year now under review show an increase in both members and inquirers; and in the number of candidates haptized, and backsliders restored. There were baptized, 1771 restored, 1108; received, 402; total, 3281. Died, 579; excluded, 1292; dismissed, 278; withdrawn, 63; erased, 924; total, 3136. The not increase is 145, which is less than one per church in the union. Ninety-four churches have an increase of 967, and 76 a decrease of \$22, while 13 are stationary. The total membership of the churches is 33,952; the number of inquirers, 4145; local preachers, 461; deacons and leaders, 1755. Chapel accommodation is more fully reported than usual, and is now given as \$4,344, to which must be added the space provided in 48 outstations and 532 class-houses, making the total not less than 90,000.

"CHURCHES BEYOND THE SEA.

"Reports have come to hand from all of these except Belize. The returns show that 144 have been baptized, 32 restored, and 43 received. The churches have lost 16 by death, 28 by exclusion and 26 in other ways. There is thus a clear increase of 149 in fellowship. The membership (including Belize) is 1,092, and the inquirers number 123. The churches have raised as much as £221 4s. for building purposes. At Bocas-dci-Tovo the church has maintained a stern conflict with intemperance, gambling and impurity, with manifest signs of the Divine blessing.

"In Costa Riva five new churches have been reported, and two new chapels have been built. A genuine work of grace appears to be progressing, and the clear gain in membership is 117.

"The Rev. J. S. Sobey has resigned his pastoral connection with the churches, to engage in more direct missionary work, and the Rev. S. Witt, of Cayman Brac, has been appointed to succeed him. The Rev. J. Hayter has also arranged with the Missionary Committee to relinquish his work amongst the English-speaking churches that he may labour as a missionary to the Spanish-speaking people of that Republic."

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Reviewing the experiences of the past year, the Rev. Alfred L. Jenkins, of Morlaix, writes:—

"From a political point of view—and this, in France, has no small bearing on evangelistic work—the year that has closed leaves ground for much thankfulness.

"When it began, the country was in a very unsettled state, as if on the eve of some revolution; the Church and the Army had joined hands in an attempt to overthrow the Republican Government, and we felt very anxious, as we knew that their victory would be followed by a military dictatorship, and an immediate curtailment of civil and religious liberty.

"This danger has providentially been averted; the Government has come out of this ordeal strengthened, and is now turning its hand against its focs. The Assomptionists, a religious order very similar to the Jesuits and quite as dangerous, whose hand was traced in this plot, have been judicially condemned and dissolved; five bishops, who threw in their lot with them, have been deprived of their salaries: and a new set of laws is being prepared to enable the Government to deal effectually with seditious ecclesiastics.

"This energetic action of the Government has borne immediate fruits, the rabid tone of the clerical press has moderated, and its attacks on Protestants and Jews alike have practically ceased. The Church of Rome, however, is not likely to become reconciled with the Republic, and the struggle is sure to be renewed, until the nation understants, at last, that the Gospel alone can save it from the power of Rome, and secure its hard-won liberties. There are signs that the number of those who see this is largely on the increase, and that the general conditions under which missionary work is carried on in this country will become still more favourable.

"In taking a survey of our work during the past year, I propose to give the names of our fellow labourers in the Mission, and to say a few words on what they have been able to do in their respective spheres,

"LANNEANOU.

"This brother (Mr. Collober), who for the last thirteen years has had the charge of the station at Lanneauou, gives an interesting report of his work. The attendance

at the Sabbath service in Lanneanou has been good all the year round, the hall being frequently quite full. In connection with the work at Lanneanou there are three hamlets where services are regularly held during the winter season, and five or six other places which are visited at greater intervals. At each of these, groups varying from fifteen to fifty come under the sound of the Gospel, and interesting cases are met with.

"THE GUILLY.

"Mr. and Mrs. Chopin, who are at the head of the Guilly School, have also written a very encouraging report. Last year was a very prosperous one for the school. The number of pupils reached eighty-two, including fifty-eight boys and twenty-four girls. An important part of the time has been given to religious teaching, the day's work beginning by a Bible lesson and an explanation of a portion of Bunyan's 'Pilgrim's Progress.' Thirty-nine of the pupils have regularly attended the Sunday-school. In addition to the day classer, Mr. Chopin has had evening classes for adults who wished to learn. A man who was forty-six years old has thus been taught to read, a performance that needs no small patience. Under Mr. Chopin's able direction the Guilly School has attracted the notice of the inspector of schools, and through him that of the Educational Department, who have shown their appreciation of Mr. Chopin's work by awarding him their bronze medal, and appointing him to sit on the board of examiners for our county. The Protestant Society for the Encouragement of Primary Schools has also given the Guilly School a grant of £8, which I trust they will continue.

" CARTRAIX.

"This brother (Mr. David), who for several years has laboured as an evangelist and schoolmaster in another part of Brittany, joined our Mission last October. Being a native of Cartraix, I asked him to devote his attention more particularly to that centre and its neighbourhood. He has done so, and has worked with much acceptance since that time. Under his care the meetings at Cartraix have revived, and new openings have been found in different villages at some distance from the town. In two of these our friend and his companion, Colporteur Hersch, have been particularly well received.

"Roscoff.

"This Jersey friend (Mr. Messervey), who is settled at Roscoff, and has the charge of the Sailors' Rest in that town, has attended to this work as in the past. I have held services on the Sabbath at the Rest as often as it has been convenient for me to do so. During the winter season, when the fishermen are on shore, the Sailors' Rest has been opened to them, and they have been provided with books and papers and all that was necessary for them to spend a quiet and pleasant evening.

"TRIMEL,

"This friend (Mr. Lohou) who is a rope-maker by trade, and is self-sapporting, removed to Trimel nine years ago, in the hope of being able to further the cause of the Gospel in that small fishing village. He has largely succeeded in this, he and his large family of nine children, most of them now grown up, having been a bright example, and a great moral support to the cause there. His daily work left him very little spare time for evangelistic effort, yet during all this time he has taken alternate services with me, and held during the winter week-night meetings in a neighbouring village. My sisters, who habitually reside at Primel, have also done their part in visiting the people, and using in this way their opportunity of enlightening them.

In this manner a considerable amount of influence has been brought to bear on the people, and it has not been without some good result.

" MORLAIX.

"The superintendence of these various stations and sub-stations, visiting some of them regularly and others at intervals, whilst carrying on the work in Morlaix, such is the part that has devolved upon me. In Morlaix itself we have continued to hold the French services in our place of worship, and the Breton meetings in the hall at the Madeleine. The latter have been well attended through the year.

"Our friends, the colporteurs Hernet and Morvan, have continued with much zeal their most useful work of selling the Scriptures. Morvan being required for the preparation of meetings, has a more limited sale than his colleague, who is constantly covering new ground; but, between them, they have sold 1,670 copies of the Holy Scriptures."

NORTHERN DISTRICT.

TURIN.

The Rev. W. K. Landels sends the following report relative to work in Turin:—

"The year 1899 brought about considerable changes in the conduct of the Mission in this city. In the first place we were joined in the work by Mr. Robert Walker, formerly of Naples. It was with the greatest pleasure we gave a warm welcome both to him and to his family. To me, personally, and also to Signor Cesano, it is a great privilege to have another colleague with whom to take counsel in the direction of the work, especially in moments of doubt and of difficulty.

"Ecangelisation.—One of the most important developments in connection with Mr. Walker's settling in Turin was the opening of a new centre of evangelisation. In seeking for and in deciding on a new hall, the one object we had in view was to

get at the people. We had to face the usual difficulties. Landlord after landlord refused to let their property for the use we contemplated. At length, however, after much searching and much prayer, we were able to secure, on a lease of three years, the most desirable of all the places that had come under our notice. This new hall is situated in an areade in the very centre of the city, and is so placed as to attract the attention of passers, large numbers of whom are induced to enter. Never, since I settled in Turin, have we had so good an opportunity of evangelising as we have at present. The hall is seated for eighty persons, and other thirty or forty can crowd in. Ever since we opened in the month of May, we have been having most encouraging meetings. Even during the month of January, notwithstanding the fact that nearly all our people have been ill with influenza, and that the death-rate in the city has risen from an average of twenty to sixty, one day having been as high as seventy-six, the services have often been crowded. The Sunday evening meeting has had an average attendance of over a hundred, and that of the Friday evening of over eighty.

"The opening of this new hall had, at first, a damaging effect on the attendance at the Sunday evening evangelistic meeting in Via Maria Vittoria. It was hardly to be expected that our own people would, in any number, attend a meeting at six o'clock in the areade, and another at half-past eight in the other hall. By degrees, however, things have righted themselves; strangers have been so much interested in the earlier meeting that they have willingly accepted our invitation for the other, and we have now excellent services in both places,

"During the greater part of the year we have been holding services in a third hall, which has been provided at the expense of the local church. This place was taken for only a year, and we should have preferred to have rented it on a short lease of six months, our idea being to go from quarter to quarter of the city, only settling permanently where a strong and self-supporting work is developed. months the work here seemed most promising. We had crowded meetings, and it was evident that a number were being influenced for good, some even giving in their names as inquirers. But that part of the town being occupied almost exclusively by the very poor classes, the priest is well nigh omnipotent. He lost no time in setting all his machinery in motion. Every house and family was visited. Those who had taken no interest in our services were instigated against those who had come under the influence of the Gospel, and little by little we saw the attendance at our meetings diminish until they were virtually destroyed. Here is a case in point. A young woman had been attending regularly, had been greatly impressed, and seemed to have laid hold of the truth. Suddenly she left off coming, and for a time we lost sight of her. Later on she told us that much as she longed to come she could not do so, because her husband, under the influence of the priest, threatened to leave her if she ever put her foot in our hall again.

- "The above illustrates one of the great difficulties we have to meet in Italy.
- "Altogether, our purely evangelistic services have numbered two hundred and twenty; these, of course, are in addition to the public worship of the Sunday morning, meetings for the study of the Bible, Sunday-school, classes, &c.
- "Our church membership shows a slight increase on last year, the number of names on the roll being seventy-two, or five more than before. At the present time we have nine applicants for membership.
- "Our Sunday-school, which is admirably conducted by Signor Cesano, and also our Bible-class, have made substantial progress during the year. The average attendance

for November was fifty-six and for December sixty-four. The teachers now meet regularly once a week to go over the lesson and for prayer.

"The outlook for the future is bright with hope. We begin to see signs of that revival for which we have prayed so long. On the last night of the old year we had a watch-night service, which was one of the most remarkable meetings I have ever attended in Italy, and which will long live in our memories. The service began at half-past eight and continued until twenty minutes to one. We began with the usual Sunday meeting for evangelisation, and I preached to some eighty persons on the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Later on our numbers grew to about a hundred, who remained until the end. At 9.45 we partook of refreshments and passed some time in friendly Christian conversation. At 10.30 the third stage of the meeting was reached, when reports of the work were given, and Mr. Walker delivered an earnest address. At 11,15 the last stage of prayer and praise began, midnight the power of the Spirit was most manifestly felt in the meeting. Things were allowed to take their own course; men spoke and prayed as they were moved; appeals were made to the unconverted to give themselves to Christ, with the result that nine stood up and declared that then and there they had yielded themselves to Him, and had found peace.

"With such an ending to the old year, and such a beginning of the new, we have good reason to look forward with hope."

The Rev. Robert Walker reports with regard to evangelistic work in the Susa and Meana Districts:—

SUSA.

"Of the Sura Mission there is not much to report. The work in the town has been carried on regularly, with some increase in the attendance at the meetings since they were transferred to the new locale, which is more accessible and more comfortable than the old one. There have been two additions to the church, and the members are more united, and, therefore, stronger. Owing to advancing years and uncertain health, Signor Baratti has not been able to do so much work in the mountains as formerly, so there has been no breaking up of new ground. We hope, however, to be able to make some arrangement that will make this Mission more aggressive than it is at present. Meantime, we are glad to note the improvement in the tone and attendance of the meeting. Once a month one of us goes up from Turin and visits the missions here and at Meana and neighbourhood."

MEANA.

"Here the work is carried on by Signor John Baptist Scrajber, and the Mission has continued to prosper and to enjoy a large measure of the Divine blessing during the year; and it is with profound gratitude that we are able to report to encouragingly of it. The commun, or parish, of Meana includes seventeen hamlets, and the influence of our Mission extends to them all. During the summer months the great majority of the people go with their cattle high up on the mountains, or else go over into France to work. Then the attendance at the meetings is necessarily small, and opportunities for direct aggressive evangelistic work comparatively few. But the absentees are not neglected, for Signor Scrajber keeps in touch with all of them by writing to every one who sends him his address. When winter returns, so do the people, and then the meetings and the Sunday-

schools present a most encouraging aspect. Opposition on the part of the priests never ceases, and the clergy have been changed with the hope of putting a stop to our work; but hitherto the Lord has helped us, and never have the prospects of the Mission been more promising than at present.

"This year one of our friends is the Mayor of Meana, and in the parish council there are others whose sympathies are entirely with us. This fact is especially comforting in view of the opening of the new chapel, which is to take place in March, as we can confidently rely on the sympathy of the local authorities on an occasion which will attract a great deal of attention and draw a large concourse of people from all the surrounding districts. The meetings and Sunday-school are always well attended, and will be still more so when, from the low room in which they have hitherto been held, they are removed to the comfortable new chapel. We hope to have several baptisms as well as the Lord's Supper in the new chapel on the opening day.

"For some time several people from the neighbouring comune of Mattie have attended the Meana services, and three of them have accepted the Saviour. Their great desire was to see a locale opened for evangelistic work in their own comune; but for a long time no such place could be found. Suitable locali were very few, and the priests did their utmost to keep us from getting one of any sort; but about three months ago our prayers were answered, and Sig. Scrajber's efforts were crowned with success. During these three months a meeting has been held in Mattie every Sunday evening, with an attendance of seventy to a hundred. The hearty singing and close attention were remarked by both Mr. Landels and myself on the occasions of our visits."

GENOA.

Signor Nardi Greco, the evangelist in charge of the work in Genoa City, writes:—

"There are some who seem to think that it is an easy thing to preach the Gospel in Italy; but I am convinced that this is one of the most difficult fields to cultivate, so much the more that our adversaries are intelligent and cunning, educated at the school of the Jesuits, and under the powerful protection of the Pope. We are still in the power of the Romish priest. Is proof wanted? I have just been turned out of my house by command of the parish priest. The rumour has been spread abroad among the lower people that since I came here frightful ghosts and phantoms have been seen wandering about. And if in six months' time we are to be turned out of the hall where we have been meeting for twenty-two years, that, too, will be through the influence of the priest. Where we shall find another hall so well adapted to the preaching of the Gospel I know not. Our hope is in God.

"Notwithstanding all this the Lord has been with us, He has helped us and comforted us continually. We have had the sorrow of seeing ten of our brethren emigrate to America, and of following other four to the grave; but on the other hand we have had the joy of receiving twelve new converts into the church, six of whom have already born witness to their faith by the sacred rite of baptism. We begin the year 1900 with 143 members,

"Our Sunday-school has improved both as regards the number and quality of our children.

"The church has raised during the year for all purposes Lire 1001'34 (£40 1s. 03d.).

In this sum is included Lire 100 contributed to the Meana Building Fund, being the first instalment of Lire 500 promised.

"I would also like to add that our members never let an opportunity pass of manifesting their gratitude to their Baptist brethren in England who have done and are doing so much for them. Often do I hear such expressions as the following:— 'If it had not been for the brethren in England should we have known Christ? Should we have been saved?' And these words are sufficient to show what are their feelings towards the friends in Great Britain.

"Finances.—The total amount raised by the churchestin Northern District during the year 1899 was as follows:—Turin, £56 9s. 9½d.; Susa, £11 12s.; Meana and district, £12 7s. $5\frac{1}{2}$ d.; Genoa, £40 1s. $0\frac{3}{4}$ d.; Mall, £120 10s. $3\frac{3}{4}$ d. This is an increase on last year of £18 11s. $9\frac{3}{4}$ d."

THE TUSCAN DISTRICT.

TUSCANY.

The Rev. N. H. Shaw, of Florence, writes :-

"Thank God that, notwithstanding all hindrances, we are not without encouragement in our work for Him. It has been, and is, like fighting our way up-hill in a country covered by fortified kepjes; but if I cannot say, 'I think we have made satisfactory progress,' progress there is, and it is encouraging. The work proceeds slowly, and our patience and faith are sorely tried; but we are not in despair or without signs of usefulness, which comfort us,

FLORENCE.

"We have never done harder work than during the past year. Signor Besesti has laboured with an intelligence and zeal worthy of all praise. Many thousands of tracts have been distributed. Several of the young men belonging to our Young Men's Club have gone every now and then into the surrounding villages to evangelise, and have met, generally, with an encouraging reception. My English classes, though not yet equal to what they were in Rome, have been attended by a good number of persons of both sexes, who would not otherwise have come under any Biblical teaching or evangelical influence. On several special occasions we have had crowded meetings, but the ordinary attendances have fallen somewhat below the average of former years. It has been a year of much sickness. Two of our most reliable members have been smitten down by apoplexy, and although they have partially recovered, they will never be the same men again. Several valuable members have removed to distant parts of Italy, and circumstances have combined to make it specially difficult to keep together a Sunday-school.

"What, after all, are the ascertainable results? Six persons have been baptized. We have added eight new members to the church, and lost four. There are others in whose manifest conversion we have been the instruments used by God, some of these having become members of other churches, and many persons have regularly and respectfully listened to our arguments and appeals who have not yet made any confession of their thoughts or their faith, but who must have been influenced for good. The offerings of the church are (very naturally, in view of all the circumstances) somewhat less in amount than they were last year. We have collected for

all purposes Lire 691.29, of which Lire 261.90 were for the poor of the church, Lire 10.47 for the Italian Baptist Union, and Lire 418.92 for the general mission funds, the whole of which has come from the church, without a single donation from any outsider."

LEGHORN.

"At Leghorn we have baptized five persons, one of whom has gone to preach the Gospel in America. The congregations, though yet small, have improved, and the work in the city continues to be difficult. Signor Allegri, meanwhile, is much encouraged by his work in the country districts. Nearly a page of the Report would be required merely to mention the names of the places he visits periodically. While many of the inhabitants of Leghorn seem to him like pieces of granite on which the chisel can make no impression, he finds in the villages and small towns—until the priest steps in to spoil the work so far as he can—a very general and often a joyful acceptance of the Gospel message."

PRATO.

"There is nothing new to chronicle concerning Prato. We continue to visit the few brethren there, and others, and try to stir them to appropriate action; but we have not yet been able to obtain a suitable hall to which to invite the public, though we are not yet without hope of succeeding in this.

"The statistics for Tuscany are as follows:—Members, 81; baptized during the year, 11: received otherwise than by baptism, 3; loss by death, &c., 4. Offerings for all purposes: Lire 780.89 (or £31 4s. 8½d.). Besides these offerings of the church, Lire 847.80 (or £33 18s. 2¼d.) have been offered to the Mission by individuals in Florence and elsewhere."

THE CENTRAL, OR ROMAN DISTRICT.

THE CITY OF ROME.

Reporting on the work of the past year in the City of Rome, the Rev. James Wall writes:—

"The past year, 1899, has certainly been the most varied of all the thirty years of our missionary life in Rome. The horizon has been very changeful, the shades tending to darken. The concentration of Catholicism has brought out its full strength, while its alliance with the extreme parties has rendered evangelical work more difficult. At the same time, this state of things has brought us nearer to the liberal middle class, whose future is doomed unless it succeeds in uniting itself with the quickening and preserving forces of religious reform. The idea that this union is of vital importance has long existed in the Italian mind, and now the feeling that it must be so is fast revealing itself: the desire for it and the effort to bring it about will follow. The period, however, required for the process will probably be longer than our impatience would suppose. The Vatican, instead of learning from its

disasters during the last thirty years, has gone from bad to worse, and is thus hurrying the work of its own dissolution in Italy.

"During the past year I have noticed an increase of public interest in everything that concerns Protestantism. Evangelical funeral processions through the streets of Rome have sometimes been followed by large numbers of people and regarded with respect equal to that shown to Roman Catholic funeral processions. On the occasion of the funeral of our esteemed brother and colleague, Sig. Nesi, the chapel was crowded, and the impression made seemed to be very profound.

"Both in the Legislative Assembly and in the administration of the affairs of the country, the references to Protestantism have been marked by greater appreciation and equity. One of our most bitter enemies, the libellous slanderer of an evangelical pastor near Rome, was prosecuted, and notwithstanding the most strenuous efforts of the clerical party to shield him, was sent to prison for thirteen months.

"While on the one hand the Roman clergy seem to have become more bitter against us, on the other a change has certainly taken place among them. opposition to Protestantism has become more clandestine and more bland. methods of operation have nearly all been adopted by our adversaries, and this on a very large scale. A fine critical edition of the New Testament, Greek and Latin, has been published, in which the labours of our best Protestant scholars are recognised and their names given. A small edition of the New Testament, similar in form to one we brought out some years since, has been published by a bishop, and offered to Italians at a very low price. It contains the offer of an indulgence of 300 days for all those who will read it for a quarter of an hour, and plenary indulgence to all who read it for a quarter of an hour daily for a month! It is not quite clear what the meaning is of this change in Vatican procedure and all the more because its antagonism to Protestant versions has increased, but it is evident that for some reason or other the Pope seems to desire the reading of the Scriptures by the laity. The sad thing is that the Pope's effort will probably have little or no influence on Roman Catholics generally, who in Italy, as far as spiritual needs go, are down to zero.

"In various ways we are helping the circulation of the Scriptures in this part of Italy. The church here supports its own colporteur, and another has now been taken up. We have printed at our own press some 10,000 copies of a special edition of the Epistle to the Romans, prepared for a special class of persons. By these means we are brought into practical acquaintance with Bible circulation in every class of Italian society, and the result is a profound conviction that the Written Word is the one great means of regenerating a people; it is certainly the principal if not the only one where that people have been brought to lose faith in any mere human testimony, as seems to be the case in some priest-ridden, down-trodden Catholic populations. Our Mission has always been, and is, first of all a Bible mission.

"Our work has suffered much during the year from illness among the workers. The wife of Signor Petocchi was called home early in the year, and towards the end of the year, after a very trying illness, our beloved colleague, Signor Nesi, left us for the better land. Others have been repeatedly down with influenza or fever. This has had a very disturbing influence on our work, which is so various and continuous that the absence of one of our workers from his post is immediately felt. I have embraced the opportunity of throwing greater responsibility upon the brethren in the various districts who have responded heartily to the call, but we are far from the realisation of our ideal, which is that of meetings able to edify themselves, and therefore able to do everything else in the way of self-government."

WORK IN THE PROVINCES,

"The work in the Provinces, while in several cities giving signs of real life, gives evidence that in most of the places visited the few local brethren are not sufficiently strong in faith to sustain a regular public meeting. Their spiritual state is such that they prefer walking in the shade, and when brought out under pressure into the light of public confession of Christ's name the temptation to return to the eclipse is often too great for them, so much so that in some places where the number of the baptized is considerable, solid Christian testimony is as low as it can be. These believers, instead of crystallising into one bright testimony, remain hidden in solution among the population; like in Corinth, when in that city God had much people, but as yet no church. This state of things makes me very anxious. It would seem best to dig deeply about the tree by extensive evangelistic work as the best means of reaching outsiders and of encouraging those who believe. Some plants seem to flourish more under reflected than under direct light."

ROME, YIA URBANA.

The Rev. J. Campbell Wall reports on the work carried on at the Via Urbana and the Via degli Equi:—

"A glance at our work in Rome during the year 1899 may not give rise to any feeling of satisfaction, but it will not prove discouraging to anyone acquainted with the difficulties and limitations of this missionary field. We can only express our heartfelt gratitude to God who has enabled us to maintain the position which we hold against all the attacks of His foes. The various branches of our activity have continued to influence thousands of souls, constant opportunities of Christian testimony being gladly utilised for the spread of Christ's Kingdom among this people. Spiritual growth, also, has been the privilege of not a few in our midst, and faith still finds the fields 'white already to harvest.' The hall in Via Urbana, although not on one of the principal thoroughfares, and in spite of its serious defects, continues to be well frequented, and promises to become a valuable centre for work in the higher parts of Rome.

"Sunday-school work is especially encouraging. The children show an intelligent interest in their Scripture lessons, and the increased attendance leads us to hope that

much is being done which must bear fruit in the near future. Our teachers have proved themselves willing and self-sacrificing, giving an example to church members, and meeting with many signs of affection and gratitude on the part of their scholars.

"The church itself continues the greatest problem of our work. The most faithful are often among the poorest of our members. They receive nothing in the way of material advantage, but win our hearts by their simple faith and love to their Saviour. A young man, who is totally blind and earns his living by selling matches on the street, gave this year one of the most touching testimonies to the truth as it is in Jesus. Abandoned by his relatives, and persecuted by the priest at St. Lorenzo, who denounced him falsely as a Socialist to the authorities, and had him removed from Rome to his native place on the eve of his baptism, he is now a living witness to the Lord, constantly praising Him, who, from a double darkness, has called him forth into His marvellous light.

"The station in Via degli Equi, outside Porta S. Lorenzo, continues to encourage us. There we obtain some of the most evident spiritual results, and there our Sunday-school is a constant source of blessing. Throughout the year our workers have been in contact with large numbers of that poor, degraded populace, and have been as a lamp shining in a dark place. The fact that this, one of the worst slums of Rome, has contributed a large proportion to our membership in Via Urbana is on the one side a wonderful testimony to the saving power of the Gospel we are sent to preach; on the other it may indicate what we firmly believe to be a fact—that in Via Urbana, among the so-called better classes, our work must be equally effectual but not equally manifest. Present conditions make it much easier for a poor workman to profess his Christianity than for one who, through his profession or social relationships, is obliged to be constantly dependent upon clerical favour if not material support."

FINANCE.

THE receipts for the past year for the general work of the Mission, and excluding all special funds, have amounted to £66,593 118.5d.; and the expenditure, excluding all special funds, amounted to £73,716 118.11d., leaving a deficiency of £7,123 68.6d. This debt is due to a reduction in certain items of receipts during the year just closed, as compared with the previous year—viz., decrease in legacies, £2,499 198.7d.; annuity capital fallen in, £1,200; and the absence of special donations to avert deficiency, £1,210 118.11d.; while the expenditure for the year just closed exhibits an increase over the previous year of £2,415 58.5d.

The Committee have decided to reduce the deficiency by the transfer of £3,000 from the Legacy Reserve Fund, leaving a debt of £4,123 **Os.** 6d., and to make an earnest appeal for special gifts for its immediate extinction, so that the New Year's work may begin with a clear balance-sheet.

With regard to the increase in expenditure, this is wholly accounted for by the large addition to the staff of missionaries that has taken place since the Centenary celebration.

It will be doubtless well remembered by our supporters that one very important part of the Centenary scheme was the sending forth of 100 additional missionaries, a certain proportion of the Centenary funds being allocated to the payment of their passage and outfit expenses, and their two years' probationary course, with this most gratifying effect that to-day there are on the mission-field forty missionaries. in those who WATA addition at the date the scheme was propounded. And this happily does not represent all the new forces created for spiritual blessing, as nearly all these additional missionaries have married, and thus a large number of devoted Christian women have gone forth with their message of comfort, joy, and hope to thousands of heathen women and children. By this one fact—the increase of the mission staff—in fulfilment of the mandate of the churches at the time of the Centenary Commemoration -and surely a fact over which we may rejoice with an exceeding joy-the whole of the increase in the expenditure is fully and satisfactorily explained, inasmuch as the permanent maintenance of almost all these forty additional missionaries has now become an annual charge upon the ordinary income of the Society.

The total receipts for the past year, including special funds and the special gifts in response to the appeal on behalf of the famine stricken in India, amount to

£77,642 2s. 9d.,

This total being an increase of \$2.310 138. 7d. on that of the previous year.

With regard to the receipts it is encouraging to note that the gifts by the churches for our general work have not fallen back, but exhibit a small increase of \$741 138. 104. notwithstanding the fact that with a 7iew to facilitate to the fullest extent possible the success of the present canvass of the churches in the interests of the Twentieth Century Fund, the special efforts for increasing the income of the Missionary Society upon the lines of the Centenary celebration scheme have been held largely in abevance.

CENTENARY FUND.

With regard to the Special Centenary Fund, the following is a statement of the remaining and allocated balances: -

What is most urgently needed to-day to meet the growing demands of our work is the speedy accomplishment of one of the main objects contemplated by the Centenary scheme: the increase of the ordinary annual

income of the Society to the sum of One Hundred Thousand Pounds.

With the marvellous opening up of the whole world to the messengers of the churches, the numerous offers now before the Committee of earnest, gifted, well-equipped young men longing to engage in this noble enterprise, and the pressing appeals brought by almost every mail for immediate and large reinforcements—the harvest plenteous, the labourers few—all that is wanted is a widespread spirit of consecration of money to this service of the Saviour, so that a further forward movement may be made and the glad time hastened "when the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

If every church in the denomination were deeply interested in this great campaign, and every church member a subscriber to the Society, the extension so ardently longed for could be carried out, and the needful outlay provided for.

To secure this, we all need a deeper personal sympathy with the Lord Himself, and a more constant realisation of His presence and power in our own hearts.

Given an intense and deepening love for the Saviour, the needed gold will not be lacking when "the incense and myrrh" are offered. For money is, in a sense, part of ourselves. We have incarnated the results of our toil, and it is only natural, therefore, that we should render that to the Lord as a part of "ourselves." "The love of Christ constraineth us" are the words of the Apostle Paul, and the measure of that constraint will inevitably determine the measure of our self-sacrifice and our self-denial on behalf of that sublime enterprise which is nearest and dearest to the heart of our Divine Lord, and for which He gave His life.

In the words of the late Dr. Gordon, of Boston:

"Let each individual Christian ask himself how much he owes to the heathen, because of what he owes to Christ for redeeming him with His precious blood, and let him remember also how it will go with him when his Lord comes to reckon with him if he finds his money invested in superfluous luxuries or hoarded up in needless accumulations, instead of being sacredly devoted to giving the Gospel of Hope and Life to the benighted and the lost."

At the dawn of the new century, and echoing down the past centuries, come the last words of the Master which have fired and inspired all true service and sacrifice in the past, and which with new force and emphasis and in tones louder and clearer appeal to us to-day in the face of world wide openings and Macedonian plaints:

[&]quot;GO YE, THEREFORE, AND MAKE DISCIPLES OF ALL THE NATIONS . . AND LO, I AM WITH YOU ALWAY, EVEN UNTO THE END OF THE WORLD."

APPENDIX I.

Obituary Resolutions of Committee.

MISS GRENFELL, OF BOLOBO, UPPER CONGO RIVER. DIED, 18TH MARCH, 1899.

THE Committee report with feelings of the deepest sympathy the death of Miss Patience Elizabeth Grenfell, eldest daughter of the Rev. George and Mrs. Grenfell, who died at Bolobo on the Upper Congo, in her 19th year.

The Committee desire to express their deep sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. Grenfell in this heavy and sudden sorrow. They thank God for the record of their daughter's life, and for the valuable work she did so faithfully at Yakusu, and they pray earnestly that both Mr. and Mrs. Grenfell may be supported and strengthened by the presence and grace of the compassionate Saviour.

MRS. ROSS PHILLIPS, of SAN SALVADOR. DIED, 26th April, 1899.

The Committee regret they have a further loss to record in connection with the Congo Mission, in the death of Mrs. Ross Phillips of San Salvador Station, Lower Congo River. They feel the deepest sympathy with Mr. Phillips and the motherless children in this sad bereavement. They earnestly commend them to the prayers of their colleagues on the Committee, and trust that in this season of sore trial and loss Mr. Phillips may be supported by Divine solace and comfort.

REV. J. A. DE CRUZ, LATE OF CHITTAGONG, AND MRS. J. W. GILBERT, OF SERAMPORE COLLEGE.

Died, August, 1899.

On the 25th September, 1899, the Secretary reported the decease of the Rev. J. A. De Cruz, late of Chittagong, and Mrs. J. W. Gilbert, of Serampore College, and stated that he had already written to Miss De Cruz and Mr. Gilbert, expressing the sympathy of the Committee, and commending the bereaved to the comfort and support of the compassionate Saviour. It was resolved that the Committee confirm the action of the Secretary as now reported.

MRS. YARROW WHITE, LATE OF YAKUSU, UPPER CONGO. DIED, OCTOBER, 1899.

On the 17th Ostober, 1899, the Secretary reported the decease of Mrs. Yarrow White, widow of the late Rev. W. H. White, of the Upper Congo River, and was requested to forward to Mr. Yarrow and the bereaved members of the family a sincere expression of the sympathy of the Committee in the heavy loss they have suffered.

REV. JOHN G. KERRY, OF BARISAL. DIED, 19TH NOVEMBER, 1899.

The Committee heard, with feelings of deep sorrow, of the death of the Rev. J. G. Kerry, of Barisal, East Bengal (son of the Rev. George Kerry, formerly Indian Secretary in Calcutta), which took place, at Eastbourne, after a long period of weakness and suffering.

Mr. Kerry has laboured most faithfully for many years in Eastern Bengal, beloved and trusted by all the native Christians in the Backergunge and Barisal districts, and by the native peoples with whom he came into contact, and his death has removed a devoted and capable worker from the Bengal mission-field. Mr. Kerry leaves a widow and five children to mourn his early decease.

The Committee commend them very earnestly and affectionately to the sympathy and prayers of the churches, trusting that in this season of sore bereavement they may realise the presence and support of the compassionate Saviour, and the protection and blessing of the God of the widow and the Father of the fatherless. The Committee are devoutly thankful for the consecrated life of their departed brother, and for his earnest and faithful labours as a missionary of the Cross in Eastern Bengal.

Mrs. WEEKS, of Monsembi Station, Upper Congo. Died, 11th December, 1899.

The Committee report with feelings of the deepest sorrow that they received tidings by the last Congo mail of the death of Mrs. Weeks, wife of the Rev. J. H. Weeks, at Monsembi Station, after four days' illness of homaturic fever.

The Committee feel that by the translation of Mrs. Weeks to the Father's House the Congo Mission has lost one of its noblest workers. Loved by all, trusted by all, lamented by all, she was ever ready by tender and gentle ministry to nurse the sick, to tend the dying, and to lead to the Saviour all who came within her reach. "Her death," writes

Mr. Dodds, "has produced a profound impression upon all the natives round about, who crowded to witness the funeral of their friend, their guide, and their teacher." For her bereaved husband the blow is simply overwhelming, and the Committee most affectionately commend their sorely afflicted brother to the sympathy and prayers of their colleagues, assuring him of their earnest supplication at the Throne of the Heavenly Grace for Divine succour and comfort, and for the two motherless children, that they may be specially guarded and protected by the compassionate Saviour their mother loved so well and served so faithfully,

REV. J. TURLAND BROWN.

DIED, 11TH JUNE, 1899.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, in placing upon record their deep sense of the loss which the Baptist denomination and the whole Christian Church have sustained in the death of their beloved and honoured colleague, the Rev. J. T. Brown, of Northampton, devoutly thank God for the many and valuable services which he rendered to the Baptist Missionary Society during an exceptionally long and pre-eminently useful life. They gratefully recall the fact that from 1854 Mr. Brown served on the Committee of the Society. From then till the present year he was a constant attendant at its meetings, efficiently assisting by his wise counsels in the conduct of its business. Missionaries ever found in him a sympathetic friend, while his brethren on the Committee never had a more genial colleague than he was. In 1859 Mr. Brown, with Dr. Underhill, was sent as a deputation to Jamaica, and in 1884, with the Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., he went on a similar visit to Norway. On both occasions his helpfulness and sound judgment enabled him to perform a difficult task to the advantage and satisfaction of all the parties concerned. Mr. Brown took a deep interest in the annual missionary meetings, especially in the villages of his own county. Year by year he spoke at these meetings recently as the first day of this month of June (1899), he pleaded for the Society at Blisworth, thus closing his public ministry by the advocacy of the missionary cause. The Committee glorify God for the grace which was not bestowed in vain upon their friend. He lived a Christlike life; he endeared himself to all who came under the influence of the charm of his character, and wrought nobly and unselfishly and successfully in extending the Kingdom of God amongst men. They commend the bereaved relatives and the Church over which Mr. Brown presided for more than half a century to Him who "comforts all who mourn," and pray that the

county in which the Baptist Missionary Society was formed may always be represented in the future by brethren as devoted to the missionary enterprise as were the distinguished and consecrated men who have represented Northamptonshire on the Committee in the past, foremost among whom have been Andrew Fuller, John Ryland, William Robinson, and John Turland Brown.

REV. WILLIAM LANDELS, D.D. DIED, 7TH JULY, 1899.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society place on record, with profound sorrow, the great loss which the Baptist denomination, and the Christian Church in general, have sustained in the death of their beloved brother and colleague, the Rev. William Landels, D.D. They devoutly and reverently thank God for the manifold gifts with which he was endowed; they recognise the Divine Grace which sustained him during a long and arduous Christian ministry; the courage and faithfulness with which he discharged its duties, the fruits of which are found wherever the English language is spoken.

Dr. Landels was elected on this Committee in the year 1854, and after forty years' service, on his retirement from the pastorate, he was elected an honorary member. He took a deep and earnest interest in the deliberations of the Committee, and in the most anxious times he ever cherished hopeful views of its work and prospects. He had such faith in the adaptation of the Gospel to all mankind; such deep convictions of the duty and privilege of the Churches to send that Gospel into all the world, and such confidence in the promises of God, that he was always in favour of every "forward movement." In advocating the claims of the Mission, he visited every part of the land. By his enthusiasm and powerful appeals, he sought to stir up the Churches, and he uniformly placed the duty upon the highest grounds, the love and sacrifice of Christ. The Mission never had a warmer friend or a more earnest advocate.

The Committee gratefully record the special interest which he took in the Italian branch of our work, and the invaluable service which he rendered to it. He gave to it the richest gift he had to bestow. Two of his sons were devoted to that service, one of whom has been taken to higher work, and one remains faithfully pursuing his vocation in the midst of ignorance, superstition, and priestcraft. Dr. Landels more than once visited Italy on behalf of the Mission, and it was his joy to witness the blessing of God upon the labours of his sons.

The last public service which Dr. Landels rendered to the Society was at the Autumnal Meetings in Bristol in 1896. Seventeen brethren and sisters were returning to their work, and three were entering upon their mission for the first time, and he delivered the valedictory address. No one who heard that address will forget the tender sympathy which he evinced towards our missionaries in the difficulties and discouragements they have to encounter, the inspiring motives which he presented to sustain them, and the assured faith which he expressed in the success of their labours.

The Committee tender to his children, and grandchildren, their affectionate sympathy in the great bereavement which they have sustained; they rejoice in the heritage of a godly and noble life, which their Father has left them; and commend them to the grace and guidance of the Saviour whom he so faithfully served. "He being dead, yet speaketh" to the Committee, and to the Churches.

HOWARD BOWSER, Esq., J.P. Died, 8th September, 1899.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society desire sorrowfully to record the loss which the Society has sustained by the death, on the 8th of September, of Mr. Howard Bowser, J.P., of Glasgow. They acknowledge with gratitude to God the influence of his lofty Christian manhood, his devoutness of spirit, and his devotion in the service of Christ's Kingdom at home and abroad. He was a warm friend of the Society, cherishing as he did an intelligent and fervent missionary spirit. Its interests were continually upon his mind and heart: he was proud of its history and grateful to God for its successes: his advocacy of its claims, especially in Scotland, was earnest and persistent, and his example as a large and generous contributor often "provoked" others to similar good works. For eleven years he served on the Committee as one of the representatives for Scotland, and was in 1891 elected an honorary member. His brethren were frequently indebted to him for wise counsel, both by voice and pen.

The Committee would offer their respectful and affectionate sympathy to his family in their bereavement, praying that they may realise the sustaining grace of Him who is "the Resurrection and the Life."

REV. JAMES CULROSS, D.D.

Died, 29тн Остовек, 1899.

The Committee desires to place on record their thankfulness to God for

the life and work of their beloved friend and colleague, the Rev. James Culross, D.D.

For between fifty and sixty years, as a Minister of the Gospel, he rendered to his generation a service remarkable for its energy, its unselfishness, its exquisite lowliness, and its spiritual power.

As head of the Bristol Baptist College, he developed still further the intense missionary spirit that has happily marked that institution, and cherished a faithfulness, alike of intellect and heart, in his students that will be a long enrichment of our Mission.

For twenty-seven years, as a member of this Committee, he devoted himself to the interests of Christian Missions, and by his loving wisdom, his powerful pleading, and his generous help, greatly furthered the extension of the Gospel.

As fellow-workers with him, the Committee are thankful for the blessing of his friendship, and the stimulus of his example; and they affectionately condole with Mrs. Culross and her children in a loss which would be insupportable were it not that the memory of his life and the bliss of his great reward will be a solace that will soothe every sorrow that their loss may bring.

THOMAS H. OLNEY, Esq. Died. 17th January, 1900.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, in recording the death of their much esteemed friend and colleague, Mr. Thomas H. Olney, of Clapham Common, while deeply deploring the heavy loss they have sustained, desire to magnify the Grace of God in their brother's long, useful, and devoted life. Warmly attached to Denominational agencies for Christian work, he was at the same time the generous supporter of manifold forms of Christian and philanthropic effort. Ever giving as unto the Lord, the extent of his benefactions will never be fully known to the public. Deacon and Treasurer of the Metropolitan Tabernacle Church, Treasurer of the Stockwell Orphanage, and member of the Executive Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, he rendered noble, yet ever unobtrusive, service to the Master he loved so well, bringing to his work a sympathetic nature, a ripe experience, a well-balanced judgment, a generous heart, and a devout spirit. As a personal friend and a tried adviser, he will be long missed by his brethren and colleagues on the Mission Committee, to whom the memory of his bright example will long be warmly cherished.
