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NOTICE IN REFERENCE TO BEQUESTS.

As the kind intentions of some of the deceased friends of the Society have been rendered abortive for want of correct knowledge of the law, the Committee call special attention to the following directions:—

REQUISITES FOR VALIDITY OF WILL.—It should be remembered in the first place that, (a) A will must be in writing, and signed at the foot or end thereof by the Testator or by some other person in his presence and by his direction; (b) Such signature must be made or acknowledged by the Testator in the presence of two Witnesses, who must be present at the same time, and (c) Such Witnesses must attest and subscribe the will in the presence of the Testator.

GIFTS BY WILL TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.—Gifts by will to the Baptist Missionary Society and other Charitable Institutions were formerly subject to restrictions stated in the "Notice in Reference to Bequests" contained in previous reports. But the effect of the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891 (54 and 55 Vict. c. 73), Secs. 3 and 5 and 9, is that no gift in favour of a Charitable Institution, made by the will of a Testator dying after August 5th, 1891, can be void by reason of the subject matter of the gift being land or an interest in land. The distinction formerly drawn between personal property which is an interest in land (that is, in any way secured upon or payable out of land) and pure personalty is abolished, and even land may now be lawfully given by will to a Charitable Institution. But lands so given must be sold within one year from the Testator's death, or such extended period as may be determined by the Court or the Charity Commissioners, and if not sold within such period it will vest in the official Trustee of Charity Lands, and the Charity Commissioners will order it to be sold, and the net proceeds of sale to be paid to the official Trustees of Charity Funds in trust for the Charity in favour of which the land has been given (Sec. 8).

1.—Bequest of an Ordinary Prountary Legacy to the Society.—In this case there is no need for the provision formerly inserted in wills directing the legacy to be paid exclusively out of such parts of the Testator's estate as might lawfully be disposed of for charitable purposes. The bequest may be in the following form:—

"I give to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society the sum of \mathcal{L} , free of duty, for the general purposes of the said Society" (or, if so desired, "for the Translation Fund of the said Society," or "for the School Fund of the said Society").

2.—Bequest to the Society of a Pecuniary Legacy made Payable out of the Proceeds of Sale and the Conversion of the Testator's Real and Personal Estate, of a Share of such Proceeds.—Very frequently a Testator gives his real and personal estate or his residuary estate to Trustees on trust to sell, and out of the proceeds of sale to pay the legacies previously bequeathed, which may include a legacy to the Society. And a Testator may now bequeath a share of such proceeds to the Society. In these cases, although perhaps not essential, it is considered prudent, at all events until the interpretation of the abovementioned Act has been settled by judicial decision, to add to the gift of the pecuniary legacy or share to the Society the following direction:—

"And I direct that in case all the real and leasehold estate comprised in the devise and bequest in trust for sale herein contained shall not be sold within one year from my death, then the said legacy (or share) herein bequeathed to the said Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society, and the duty thereon shall be paid out of the proceeds of sale and conversion of my personal estate and the proceeds of sale of such of my real and leasehold estate as shall be sold within one year after my death in priority to all other legacies (or shares) payable thereout,"

3.—GIFT BY WILL OF LAND TO THE SOCIETY.—If land or a house of any tenure or a freehold or leasehold ground-rent is intended to be given to the Society, it should be given to a Trustee or Trustees on trust to sell within one year after the Testator's death if practicable, and to receive the net purchase money and pay it to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Society. The Testator will probably desire that the Succession Duty on the gift and also the cost of any application which may be necessary to extend the period of one year within which the sale must be made under the above-mentioned Act shall be paid out of his general estate. A gift by will of freehold land or a freehold house or a freehold ground-rent for the benefit of the Society may be made in the following form:—

"I give unto and to the use of (names of Trustees), their heirs and assigns, my freehold (description of land or house or ground-rent) upon trust to sell the same if practicable within one year from my death, and to receive the proceeds of sale thereof and thereout, and out of the rents and profits until sale to pay the expenses of such sale and all necessary outgoings, and to pay the residue of such proceeds and rents and profits to the Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society for the general purposes of the said Society. And I direct that the Succession Duty payable in respect of the above gift and also the costs of any application to extend the period for sale under the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891, shall be paid out of my general estate."

A gift by will of leasehold land or a leasehold house or a leasehold ground-rent for the benefit of the Society may be made in the following form:—

"I give to (names of Trustees), their executors, administrators, and assigns, my leasehold (description of land or house or ground-rent) upon trust to sell the same if practicable within one year from my death, and to receive the proceeds of sale thereof and thereout, and out of the rents and profits until sale to pay the expenses of such sale and the rent reserved by the lease under which the same premises are held and all other necessary outgoings, and to pay the residue of such proceeds and rents and profits to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the Baptist Missionary Society for the general purposes of the said Society. And I direct that the Succession Duty payable in respect of the above gift, and also the costs of any application to extend the period for sale under the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Act, 1891, shall be paid out of my general estate."

METHODS FOR FREQUENT AND REGULAR GIVING.

THE following are some of the methods now in operation, with a detailed description:—

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

A Missionary Treasurer and Secretary having been appointed, the chapel is divided into sections, more or less according to size. Each section is placed under the superintendence of a collector, chosen, if possible, from those sitting in the section itself. The collectors are provided with books, in which are entered the numbers of the pews the name and address of each seat-holder and of other attendants, according to their respective divisions. These books also contain columns ruled for each month in the year. The contributions are collected by means of small envelopes. Monthly giving being desired, these envelopes are placed in the pews on a certain Sunday in each month. Should there be any individuals who prefer to give less frequently, their envelopes are supplied at the appropriate intervals. The contributors, having enclosed their subscriptions, deposit their envelopes in the weekly offering boxes (should any be in use) or return them to the collector. Once or twice a month, as may be thought well, the Secretary meets the collectors at the close of a week-evening service, handing over the envelopes unopened for them to enter the sums they contain in their books. The money may be paid in by the collectors monthly or quarterly, their books being initialed whenever payments are made. The Treasurer remits to the Mission House four times in the year. In some instances receipts are given month by month to every subscriber, these being enclosed in the new envelopes; in others receipts are given once a quarter, with a reminder of arrears, should there be any; whilst in other cases receipts are deemed unnecessary.

In adopting this method the distribution of a circular, signed by the pastor and officers, explaining and commending it has been found of great service. With these circulars slips are issued, upon which subscribers may enter the sum they propose to give, and state how frequently—whether monthly, quarterly, half-yearly, or annually—they would prefer to give it.

THE DISTRICT METHOD.

This method divides the congregations not into sections according to the seats occupied in the chapel, but into districts according to residence. One collector or, as may be preferred, two collectors are appointed to each district. After a circular, signed by the pastor and officers, has been distributed, and a statement has been made from the pulpit, a general canvass is made to secure promises of help; the collectors then call for the contributions monthly, or less frequently, as the subscribers may choose. If thought desirable, the small cash envelopes may be also used in working this plan. At least once in three months the collectors should hand over their money to the Secretary, so that as often it may be forwarded to the Mission House. If this scheme, or the one already described, is to prove successful, the smaller sums as well as the larger should be sought. To those who may resolve to attempt this method of securing frequent and regular giving books will be forwarded on application to the Secretaries of the Society.

Another plan to which attention may be called consists in the general circulation of

MISSIONARY BOXES.

The plan adopted by some churches is as follows:—

- 1. The boxes are definitely family boxes, and not intended to supersede or interfere with any existing annual subscriptions or any public collections at the chapel.
- 2. The boxes are numbered consecutively, and have on one side a short address to stimulate missionary zeal, and the suggestion that the boxes should be placed on the breakfast-table every Lord's-day morning to receive the family offerings for the work of God among the heathen (in accordance with 1 Cor. xvi. 2). This is a cardinal feature of the plan.
- 3. The boxes are called for *quarterly at the houses* of those who have taken them (unless they prefer to bring them to the chapel) by collectors appointed for that purpose, as soon after each quarter as possible, who give receipts for the amounts received.
- 4. The collectors hand in the total amount received from the boxes in their districts to the Mission-box Secretary, who initials their receipt-book counterfoils, and gives out the names of any new families to be called upon with the view of getting more boxes taken.

Boxes can be forwarded from the Mission House for this use in Christian families.

THE PENNY-A-WEEK SYSTEM.

As the first step in the adoption of this as of every other method, let the church appoint its own Missionary Secretary. Then let this officer select as many collectors as may be required to collect the pennies from an aggregate of eleven—not more than eleven—subscribers, which sum, with the penny of the collector, will amount to a shilling. These pennies might be obtained at the chapel services or at the home. They should be paid in monthly to the secretary, who should remit quarterly to Furnival Street. This method is equally adapted for the gathering in of larger weekly sums than a penny. The apparatus for putting this plan into operation will be readily supplied from the Mission House. This system is commended as being especially suited to Christian Endeavour Societies.

A PRAYER UNION

has recently been instituted, of which full particulars may be obtained.

As the circumstances of churches vary, it is necessary to be prepared with a variety of methods. It is hoped that in one or other of the above, every church will find a plan of regular and frequent giving suited to its own particular requirement.

PLAN AND REGULATIONS OF THE SOCIETY.

NAME.

The name by which the Society has been, and is, designated is "THE BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY," including "The Particular Baptist Missionary Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Heathen," which was formed in 1792, and "The General Baptist Missionary Society," which was formed in 1816.

OBJECT.

The great object of this Society is the diffusion of the knowledge of the religion of Jesus Christ throughout the whole world, beyond the British Isles, by the preaching of the Gospel, the translation and publication of the Holy Scriptures, and the establishment of schools.

MEMBERS.

The following persons shall be considered Members—viz., pastors of churches making an annual contribution; ministers who collect annually; and all Christian persons concurring in the objects of the Society, who are donors of ten pounds and upwards, or subscribers of ten shillings and sixpence annually to its funds.

GENERAL MEETING OF MEMBERS.

A General Meeting of Members only shall be held annually, at which the Committee and Officers shall be chosen for the year ensuing, the Auditors of accounts appointed, and any other business pertaining to the Society transacted.

In choosing the Committee and Officers, the Chairman of the Meeting shall receive all names which it may be intended to propose. Out of the list so obtained, forty-two Members of the Committee shall be chosen by ballot, those who have the greater number of votes being the persons elected, and the Members so elected shall be empowered to fill up the number to fifty-four Members, as required by the following rule, from the list of nominations presented at the Annual Meeting. No name shall appear on the Nomination List for Election to the General Committee at the Annual Meeting without the consent of the owner.

COMMITTEE.

That the affairs of the Society shall be conducted by a Committee of fifty-four persons, two-thirds of whom shall be residents beyond twelve miles of St. Paul's; the Committee to meet monthly, or oftener, in London, on a fixed day, for the despatch of business; seven Members to be deemed a quorum; the Committee to be empowered to fill up vacancies.

PUBLIC MEETINGS.

A Public Meeting of the Society shall be held annually, when the list of the Committee shall be read, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the previous year reported. The Committee shall also be empowered to summon Public Meetings, in London or elsewhere, whenever the interests of the Society may seem to require.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

All Treasurers and Secretaries of Missionary Auxiliaries shall be Corresponding Members of the Committee, together with such persons as it may be found necessary to add to their number.

HONORARY MEMBERS.

The General Meeting of Members shall also be empowered to appoint as Honorary Members of the Committee any who have rendered important services to the Society; provided the nomination of such Honorary Members of Committee shall proceed only from a resolution of the General Committee of the Society, or from six Members of the Society who are combined therein.

HONORARY MEMBERS (EX-OFFICIO).

Presidents or Principals of Denominational Colleges shall be ex-officion Members of the Committee of the Society.

Presidents for the time being of the Baptist Unions of England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales shall be ex-officio Members of the Committee of the Society during their respective terms of office.

MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY ENTITLED TO VOTE AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

All Honorary and Corresponding Members of the Committee, and all Ministers, who are members of the Society, who may occasionally be in London; and also Ministers residing in London, similarly qualified, together with the Treasurers and Secretaries of London Auxiliaries, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the Meetings of the Committee.

FUNDS.

All moneys received on behalf of the Society shall be lodged in the hands of the Treasurer, or of Trustees to be chosen by the Society. When the amount received shall exceed the sum needed for the current expenses of the month, it shall be invested in the Public Funds until required for the use of the Mission.

ALTERATION OF CONSTITUTION.

No alteration in the constitution of the Society shall be made without twelve months' notice having been given at a previous Annual General Meeting.

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING

HELD IN THE MISSION HOUSE, FURNIVAL STREET, HOLBORN, E.C., TUESDAY, APRIL 29TH, 1902.

- 1. After singing a hymn and reading the Scriptures, the Rev. M. M. Thompson, of Oswestry, offered prayer.
- 2. On the motion of the GENERAL SECRETARY, JOHN C. HORSFALL, Esq., J.P., of Crosshills, Keighley, was unanimously called to the chair.
- 3. The Digest of Minutes of the Committee for the past year was brought up and read by the GENERAL SECRETARY.
- 4. The Officers presented and read the Report of the Committee, together with the Balance-sheet and Abstract of Accounts for the past year as passed by the Auditors.
- 5. On the motion of the Rev. R. GLOVER, D.D., of Bristol, seconded by W. PAYNE, Esq., of Clapton, it was resolved:—

That, in adopting the report now presented for the year ending March 31, 1902, together with the duly audited balance sheet and statement of accounts, the subscribers in annual meeting assembled express their devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the abundant blessings that have followed the labours of His servants, the missionaries, in all parts of the mission-field during the past year.

With regard to the debt, this meeting pledges itself to heartily co-operate with the Committee, in an immediate effort to secure its extinction, and confidently anticipates that such action will commend itself to the practical sympathy and support of all friends of the Society and to the churches of the Denomination.

This Meeting also rejoices to learn that their beloved and trusted brother, the Rev. Charles Williams, has undertaken to devote twelve months to the visitation and canvass of the churches with a view to secure enlarged permanent support for the work of the Mission, assures him of a most hearty welcome, and confidently anticipates a most gratifying result.

6. On the nomination of the Committee, moved by the Rev. Samuel Vincent, of Plymouth, seconded by the Rev. J. Jenkyn Brown, of Birmingham, it was unanimously resolved:—

That the Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., of Leicester, Rev. J. R. Wood, of Upper Holloway, Rev. E. Spurrier, of Colchester, and Mr. Charles Price, of Hampstead, be elected Honorary Members of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, having rendered important services to the Mission.

7. On the motion of G. LEECHMAN, Esq., of Ceylon, seconded by S. B. Burton, Esq., F.R.G.S., of Highworth, it was resolved:—

That the following gentlemen be requested to act as Scrutineers, to report the result of the examination of the balloting papers to the officers of the Society for publication—viz., Messrs. W. D. Howieson, W. W. Parkinson, C. H. Chapman, T. W. Smith, C. E. Smith, H. H. Collier, W. Lepard Smith, H. W. Pewtress, and T. Denman.

8. The lists of nominations of Members to serve on the Committee having been supplied, the voting papers were collected and referred to the Scrutineers.

9. On the motion of John Marnham, Esq., J.P., of Boxmoor, seconded by the Rev. Charles Brown, of Ferme Park, it was resolved:—

That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be given to William R. Rickett, Esq., J.P., for his valuable services as Treasurer during the past year, and that he be respectfully and earnestly requested to continue them during the year ensuing.

The Members of the Baptist Missionary Society, in Annual Meeting assembled, desire respectfully and affectionataly to assure their beloved friend, the Treasurer, of their deep sympathy with him in his recent illness, to express their devout thankfulness at hearing of the improvement that has taken place in his health, and of their earnest desire for his speedy and complete recovery.

10. On the motion of the Rev. J. G. GREENHOUGH, M.A., of Leicester, seconded by the Rev. J. W. EWING, M.A., B.D., of Peckham, it was resolved:—

That the best thanks of this Meeting be given to Alfred Henry Baynes, Esq., for his efficient services as General Secretary during the past year, and that he be eatestly requested to continue them during the year ensuing.

11. On the motion of the Rev. Benwell Bird, of Plymouth, seconded by the Rev. Charles Jordan, of Calcutta, it was resolved:—

That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be given to the Rev. J. B. Myers, the Association Secretary of the Society, for his valuable services in connection with the deputation and association work of the Mission during the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services in the ensuing year.

12. On the motion of the Rev. J. T. BRISCOE, of Bristol, seconded by R. GODMAN, Esq., of Flitwick, it was resolved:—

That the best thanks of this Meeting be given to the Auditors for their efficient services during the past year, and that the following gentlemen be requested to act as Auditors for the year ensuing—viz., Messrs. W. W. Parkinson, E. H. Keen, Jas. Everett, T. W. Smith, and W. Lepard Smith.

13. The Rev. Chas. Williams, of Accrington, gave notice of the following motion, which he intended to move at the Annual Members' Meeting, in April, 1903, viz.:—

That the clause in the Plan and Regulations of the Baptist Missionary Society entitled "Honorary Members (ex-officio)" be amended by adding after the words "Denominational Colleges": "in the United Kingdom and on the Missionary Field"; and by the addution of the following paragraph, viz.: "and a Representative of each Missionary Conference, to be appointed by the Conference at its Annual Meeting, shall be ex-officio Members of the Committee."

- Mr. WILLIAMS proposed that this motion should first be considered by the Missionary Committee, and that the Committee should report thereon to the next Annual Members' Meeting, and this proposal was approved by the Meeting.
 - 14. The following resolution was passed unanimously:-

- 2. The GENERAL SECRETARY (Mr. Alfred Henry Baynes) presented and read extracts from the One Hundred and Tenth Annual Report, and, in the absence of the Treasurer (Mr. W. R. Rickett, J.P.), through illness, presented the duly audited Statement of Accounts for the year ending 31st March, 1901.
 - 3. The CHAIRMAN addressed the Meeting.
- 4. The following Resolution, moved by the Rev. Charles Williams, of Accrington, seconded by the Rev. William Carey, of Dacca, East Bengal, and supported by the Rev. E. C. Smyth, of Chou Ping, North China, was carried unanimously.

That this meeting is devoutly thankful for the remarkable success which has rested upon the labours of God's servants in the Mission field, as recorded in the report of the past year, just issued, and it finds in such tokens of blessing a most encouraging call to larger effort. This assembly also rejoices to know that at the Annual Members' Meeting on Tuesday last the Committee resolved upon a visitation of the churches, to begin next September, with a view to the increase of the income, such increase being imperatively necessary if the present work of the Society is to be even maintained, not to say extended; and it is confidently hoped that, as the Twentieth Century Fund has now been happily secured, the churches will be ready to give their earnest attention to the claims of the vast heathen world.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

THE WORK OF THE YEAR.



N reviewing the work of the Society's one hundred and tenth year the Committee thankfully recognise many striking proofs of the Holy Spirit's presence and power. It has been a year marked by many signal mercies both at home and abroad, as the accounts given by the workers on the field, and set forth in the following pages, abundantly

During the past year there have been important extensions of the work of the Society, especially in India and Central Africa. the former a forward movement has taken place by the opening up of a new permanent station at Rungamutti in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, and by the occupation of Fort Lunglegh in the centre of the South Lushai country, funds for which are hoped for from the "Arthington Bequest"; in the latter by the important pioneer exploration now being prosecuted by the Rev. George Grenfell, of the stretch of country, some five hundred miles in length, between the Society's furthest interior station of Yakusu, on the Upper Congo, and the Lake Albert, the intention being to occupy this territory by Mission Stations, probably at Banalya, Mukupi, and Avakubi, and to join hands with the Church Missionary Society at Mboga, near the southern end of Lake Albert, thus providing a chain of Mission Stations right across the Dark Continent, from the Atlantic to the Indian Ocean. The completion of the Revision of the Oriya Old Testament, and the increasing interest taken by the native Christian Churches in the work of the Indian Baptist Missionary Society, are cheering facts.

There has been a large increase in the number of baptisms in India and on the Congo.

In China during the past year our missionaries have been able to resume their work in the interior provinces, and have been warmly welcomed back, under circumstances of great encouragement, not only by the native Christians who escaped massacre, but by Chinese officials and the people generally, while the opportunities for largely extended missionary work were never before so numerous or so promising.

From the Congo the tidings from the various stations are most inspiring, and the story of what has been and is being done by the native Church at Wathen Station cannot be read without feelings of wonder and praise.

At this one station there have been 116 Baptisms during the past year, the native church numbering 355, notwithstanding the loss of 41 by death; there are 44 out-stations; in the schools 1,507 day scholars and 807 Sunday scholars; 15 native Christian evangelists are entirely supported by the gifts of the native church; and there are 1,512 members of the Temperance Society.

The translation of "The Pilgrim's Progress" into the Congo language by the Rev. Thomas Lewis, of Kibokolo, will be a great boon to the large number of Congo-speaking peoples.

The reports from other parts of the Mission-field are also specially inspiring; particularly from North Italy, where the growth of the churches in aggressive work and self-support is most hopeful.

The Committee record with grateful appreciation the valuable services rendered to the Society by the Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., in connection with his visit to Ceylon, and for his suggestive report on the work of the Society in that island, and to the Rev. Charles Williams for his visit to both Ceylon and India.

They are also glad to report that Dr. Habershon, of Harley Street, has accepted the post of Medical Referee to the Society in the place of Dr. Biss, who has felt compelled to resign that office in consequence of failing health.

Not the least of the encouraging features of the past year has been the establishment of the Medical Missionary Auxiliary, largely due to the earnest efforts of Dr. Percy Lush. With the example of Christ and His Apostles before us we are surely fully warranted in regarding medical work as an essential part of mission work in heathen lands, and not merely as a separate and distinct kind or class of work that does not fall within the proper sphere of a missionary's ordinary duty.

Both Christ and the Apostles wrought these deeds of healing so commonly and constantly as to show clearly that they regarded them as an inseparable part of their Gospel work and message.

In the graphic words of Dr. Post, on "The Physician Evangelist Missionary":—

"There is a language which all can understand, and which carries a message which every man cares sooner or later to hear. From the moment the medical missionary sets foot on his chosen field he is master of this universal language, this unspoken tongue of the heart, and is welcome to the home of strangers.

"The simple Arab lifts for him the curtain of his goat's-hair tent, and bids him enter. The Mandarin calls him to his palace, the peasant begs him to come to his lonely cabin, the Brahmin leads him to the recesses of his zenana.

"He stands before kings, and governors escort him with squadrons of cavalry, or take him to and fro in their gunboats or their barges of state.

"Kings build hospitals for him, and the rulers of the earth aid him with their treasures and their power.

"You take the Bible to the heathen, and he may spit upon it or burn it, or throw it aside as worthless or harmful. You preach the Gospel to him, and he may regard you as a hireling who makes preaching a trade. He may meet your arguments with sophistry, your appeals with a sneer.

"You educate him, and he may turn from a heathen to an infidel,

"But heal his bodily ailments in the name of Christ, and you are sure at least that he will love you and bless you, and all that you say will have to him a meaning and a power not conveyed by other lips."

In India, Bengal and the North-West provinces demand prompt reinforcements; the new and promising extensions in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, amongst the interesting aboriginal Hill Tribes, and the hitherto unevangelised peoples of the great South Lushai country urgently need at least three missionaries for immediate service; while in the Island of Ceylon two Brethren are absolutely necessary to fill vacancies that have been long left empty.

In China, the vast Province of Shansi, where all our missionaries, save one, sealed their testimony with their blood during the terrible massacre of two years ago, demands at least four new missionaries to take the places of the martyred workers; in both the Shantung and Shensi provinces, the toilers, with passionate earnestness, appeal to the Home Churches to rise to the present magnificent and unparalleled opportunities for largely extended effort, while from the very heart of long-neglected, slave-hunted Africa rises the piteous cry—"Come over and help us!" and the marvellous successes of our recent work all along the banks of the mighty Congo river surely constitute a powerful motive to press forward with increasing earnestness and vigour this Christ-like crusade.

And yet, in the presence of all these world-wide opportunities involving, surely, the Christian Church at home in solemn responsibilities, the Committee have had during the past year to refrain from sending out candidates longing to be thrust forth, because of the lack of needful funds.

Opportunities unequalled! Missionary candidates waiting! because the money to send them forth and maintain them is wanting, and yet to-day the coffers of Christ's disciples contain so much of wealth that a small percentage only of their contents would at once supply all the needful funds for the world's emancipation.

We plead with our Churches to come to the aid of this blessed enterprise, and in responding they cannot fail to reap a rich reward.

How vastly richer and fuller of life has this foreign mission enterprise made the Christian Church at home!

It has widened her intellectual conceptions of truth, enlarged her sympathies, strengthened her habit of prayer, enriched her hymnology, and expanded her conception of Brotherhood until it embraces every man upon the face of the earth.

And the great missionary enterprise is becoming more and more the true pulse of the Christian Church, the true test of her vitality, her character, and her service.

And just in proportion as the Church is drawn into fuller fellowship with God's eternal purpose, will she propagate her own life, and so the world be ultimately transformed into her own beauty and likeness. His Kingdom shall come, and His will shall be done.

"He expecteth, He expecteth!

Down the stream of time,

Still the words come softly ringing

Like a chime,

"He is waiting with long patience
For His crowning Day,
For that Kingdom which shall never
Pass away.

"And till every tribe and nation Bow before His throne, He expecteth loyal service From His own,"

YOUNG PEOPLE'S MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION IN AID OF THE BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The following is the Report of the Young People's Missionary Association:—

"The last phrase in this title indicates the general purpose of the Association and the reason of its existence. As summarised in the printed Constitution, its objects are:—

"(1) The diffusion of a missionary spirit, especially among young people, by the dissemination of missionary information through the publication, periodically, of a Journal and of such other literature as it may be able to issue from time to time, through the establishment of missionary libraries, and through the delivery of addresses and lectures. (2) The formation and encouragement of Sunday-schools, Christian Endeavour, and other missionary auxiliaries. (3) The promotion of systematic effort on behalf of the Baptist Missionary Society.

"At the time of writing there are in affiliation with the Association the following Christian institutions:—

"This affiliation means that all these associations of young Christian people are united through the Y.P.M.A. as local auxiliaries in aiding the work of the Baptist Missionary Society.

"It is interesting to record that whilst most of these schools and societies are within the bounds of Greater London, there are a few country affiliations, namely at Peterborough, in the North, and Taunton, West, and a Bible-class affiliated in Coleraine, Ireland.

"This list includes, in addition to those residing in London, personal members subscribing regularly, and in other ways taking part in the Association's work, resident in Yorkshire, Gloucestershire, Somerset, Ireland, at places on the South Coast, in the Channel Isles, and at Morocco, N. Africa. And hardly a week ago there came to the secretary a subscription from Yakusu, Congo, from a dear missionary brother, who, amidst the toils and perils and absorbing interests of African missionary work, desires to maintain his membership, as he does his loving interest, in the Yeung People's Missionary Association.

"The President of the Association, elected to office in April, 1901, is Mr. H. Ernest Wood; the treasurer Dr. Percy J. F. Lush; and the business is managed by an

executive committee of eighteen gentlemen, all earnest] workers for the Baptist Missionary Society, as well as in Church and Sunday-school and various Young People's societies. Officers and committee are elected annually.

"The secretaryship has recently changed hands. The Rev. R. Wright Hay, sometime of India and earlier of the Congo Mission, after having been used of God to develop the Y.P.M.A. into its present prosperous condition, felt called to accept the earnest invitation to the pastorate of the Church at Notting Hill Tabernacle. He gave up office in December of last year, leaving with the regret of all his colleagues, but also with their affectionate esteem and earnest prayers for God's blessing on his new ministry. On the recommendation of the Committee of the B.M.S. (who provide the secretary's salary), the Rev. L. Tucker, M.A., of Serampore College, India, and more recently normal school tutor at Calabar College, Jamaica, W.I., was appointed secretary.

"The monthly meetings of delegates and members, held on the evening of the third Tuesday in each month, have proved interesting and helpful.

"The Association's lantern-slides on life and work in India, China, and Africa are in frequent requisition, and recently excellent new slides on the Congo Mission, prepared with type-written readings by Mr. Scrivener, have been purchased and are already in use. Additions are also about to be made to the Y.P.M.A. Library.

"Whilst thankfully recognising the growth of interest and effort amongst the young people at home, the members of the Association have recently had again the special joy of seeing one of themselves called, accepted, and sent to the foreign service. Mr. Mayo, who for three years was the Association's delegate from the Pastor's College, was present at the March meeting to bid farewell before setting sail for West Africa, en route for San Salvador.

"There is yet, however, here at home much land to be possessed; many Baptist churches giving little, if anything, to Baptist missionary work; many Sunday-schools and societies not taught to know or care about this greatest of Christian enterprises. To inform these of the facts of heathen life and worship, to lead them into active obedience to the command of the Master, and to aid them in obeying it, seems to be the appointed missionary work of such associations as the Y.P.M.A.; and in taking it up for another year the officers and members earnestly bespeak the goodwill, co-operation, and prayers of all who, loving Jesus, love also the souls for whom He died."

OUR WORK IN INDIA.

The Rev. Herbert Anderson, of Calcutta, the Indian Secretary of the Mission, writes—

"'Steadily forward.' These words characterise the work of the past year in India. We may apply them to the statistical table. Our total staff of workers has increased by thirty-five, mostly in school teachers. We continue to realise the supreme importance of work among the young and desire still further to strengthen our stakes there. The baptisms for the year show the pleasing figure of 530 against 371 of last year, the increase being connected not with any one or two special fields, but over the mission generally. These definite spiritual tokens of the Divine approbation should prove as inspiring to our brethren in the home-land as they are encouraging to us. Specially bright are the prospects of much larger reaping in one or two sections of our field—but not everywhere. Patient effort—continued persistent sowing in tears has still to characterise much of the work in our Indian field, but, taking a general view, we may praise God that progress definite and encouraging has been made.

"The Indian Church has done more than in past years. I am convinced there is a steady growth in grace and in the knowledge of Jesus Christ among the scattered communities of Christians connected with our mission. The tokens of this are manifold. More thought for others, larger gifts for evangelistic and church purposes, a deeper cultivation of prayer life, a closer walk with God have characterised the year's record. A somewhat large increase to the total Baptist community, which now numbers over 20,000, is shown by the statistical table, due perhaps to the obtaining of more accurate figures rather than to anything else; and this would apply also to the increase under local contributions, which have reached the very gratifying total of Rs. 22,701, for all purposes. To anyone intimately acquainted with our community's social status and its material possessions these figures are most encouraging. There is sacrifice in England for the foreign field service; there is sacrifice in India among our Indian Church members just as true and great, for which God be praised.

"The continued progress of the Indian Baptist Missionary Society calls for remark. There is now a small church of six members—converts from Buddhism—at Ranghor where three years ago few had ever heard of the Saviour, and the supporters of this effort, almost entirely the members of our Indian churches, are taking a deeper interest than ever in its success. The visit of our esteemed friend, the Rev. Charles Williams, of Accrington, was characterised by one great fault. It was far too short. We made the most of the time he spent with us, and he left our shores a brother beloved—even more than when he came. The mission to the South Lushai country is in its inception an accomplished fact, and the committee have wisely determined to open up extended work amongst the aboriginal tribes of the Chittagong Hill Tracts.

"The changes of location of our missionaries, necessitated by furlough or the exigencies of the work, have been too numerous to detail. It is one of the sad features of our experience that our staff is too weak to do the work apportioned to it. If only the churches would determine to fulfil their obligation made when the Centenary Fund was collected and send us our full share of the 100 new missionaries there would be fewer of these lamentable changes. We may trust that when the noble ambition of setting the home work on a safe financial basis has been attained the churches will again bestir themselves to reach the mark our beloved Home Secretary has urged so often—as yet without avail—a sufficient annual income to maintain those 100 new missionaries when found and sent.

"We look back on the past year conscious of the failure that our Lord has seen, and humble ourselves before Him in contrition on account of it. May He graciously pardon the past, give us a double portion of His spirit for the present, and teach us in ever deeper measure the great lesson of absolute reliance on His wisdom, absolute dependence on His strength, absolute trust in His love."

In pursuance of the plan adopted for some years past, we print extracts from the reports of several of our missionaries in India * as to the various agencies in operation in connection with their work, and first as to

YERNACULAR EYANGELISTIC PREACHING.

The Rev. W. R. James, of Calcutta, reporting upon some special features of his work during the past year, writes:—

"The words of Paul are applicable to many parts of the mission field in India to-day: 'A great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries.' The waters were greatly troubled in this city last hot season, but every angel that troubles the water is not necessarily good. Demetrius, the silversmith, succeeded in stirring the whole city of Ephesus, but it is not said that anyone was healed in consequence. It may be doubted whether a bitterer opposition was ever shown to Christianity in Calcutta than this year. A man, giving himself out as a preacher of the Arya Samaj, came here from the Punjab, and delivered lectures in English almost daily for several months against Christianity and Christians, especially the latter. Our brethren in the North-West have known by bitter experience, for many years, something of the depth of the hatred of the Arya Samaj

to every kind of Christian effort, but we in Bengal had not been troubled by the Aryas till lately. The spirit of the Brahma Samaj is very different. The latter often sympathises with mission work, but the disciples of Dayananda Sharswati, the founder of the Arya Samaj, are a very different sort of people. Three-fourths of their zeal is nothing else but a spirit of opposition to Christian missions. They thrive on that. When our opponent was asked why he did not preach positive truth instead of indulging in vituperation day after day, he was candid enough to confess that such preaching would not be popular. It is only fair to the Arya Samaj to state that it disclaimed all connection with the man, while, it must be confessed, however, that the spirit in which he usually spoke was not very different from that which generally characterises the speeches and writings of their acknowledged leaders when they deal with Christianity. But our Punjabi opponent overshot the mark. His coarse denunciation disgusted many Hindus and greatly scandalised our Brahma friends. Although very trying to our temper, yet the large attendances at the meetings held by the Punjabi did not injuriously affect ours; they were often more numerously attended than they would have been had there been no such opposition. A Buddhist speaker also appeared on the scene, but he kept to his own anvil, and often gave his hearers salutary advice. He never attacked us openly, although, as might be expected, his speeches were not always free from covert attacks. These ebullitions, however, disappeared ere the end of the rains, and the sky has now been clear for some months. But the Mohammedan meetings are still kept up, and have been held almost uninterruptedly for many years."

The Rev. T. O. Ransford, of Narayangunge, writes:—

"Hill-climbing is tiring at times, but it is always a matter of satisfaction to turn and trace out the path by which one has come. How it winds and twists! We see probably more of its beauty, realise more of its dangers from a backward look than we did as we plodded along. Yet so long as it has led upward and onward what matter the anxious days and sometimes troubled outlook? We have been toiling uphill this year. We are still toiling. We can see in dim distances the men we have met, look back into their faces, some proud and hard, some supercilious and uninterested, but many alive with eagerness, and some (and these the best to think about) anxious and thoughtful. The infinite possibilities of human nature, when touched by Christ and divinely renewed, are written there. Sometimes a look, a momentary expression of the face, will reveal much of the soul within; and as often as we can pierce the foreign exterior, we find that the heart of man does contain an answering chord of sympathy and desire. There are longings after a true peace that Hinduism and Mohamedanism cannot stifle: cravings deep down in men's hearts which cannot be satisfied except by the Christ. Beneath all the outward show and apparent callousness as regards the claims of Christ, this year's work has at least proved the inability of anything but the Gospel of God's love to rescue and save the wandering sheep. I seem once more to see before me a little thatched house. Within is a young man, an ardent Sunday-school scholar. He is dying of cholera, We have done all we can, and I can hear this Hindu lad say he is loving and trusting Jesus, and asking us to pray for him. I knew he learned with avidity, but never realised till then that the Old, Old Story had really touched his heart. How many there are in these crowded villages, or living closer to us, who, yet unknown, have put their trust in the Saviour who taketh away the sin of the world only that last great day shall reveal. Undoubtedly, God's Spirit is abroad. The leaven is at work. Slowly but surely, in spite of all the sneers and unbelief of those who at

least are not friends of missions, the process is going on with more and more vigour. Here our street preaching attracts larger numbers than ever. Our mission services in the hall, almost without exception, are well attended, and the thoughtful and educated are brought under the influence of Christ. Interest in the Bible is being awakened to an increasing degree amongst the young. Our opportunities for work daily grow in number. The doors are open, and invite an entrance, and the strenuous opposition we have met with in some directions has only served to emphasise the fact that progress is being made, and to render us more thankful to God for every encouraging sign.

"In a station like this bazaar preaching must always claim a full share of attention. The streets are busy and crowded throughout the year, but from July onwards there are numbers of strangers in the place who have come in from the surrounding district on business connected with the jute trade. Stand where we will, under the welcome shade of a leafy tree, crushing ourselves up against a wall by the road-side to make room for the congregation, out in the open sunshine, the preacher never has to complain of a small audience. Our two evangelists here have been most active all through the year in carrying on this work. Regularly morning and evening, with but few exceptions, the Gospel has been preached and the message distributed. We have been well received. On several occasions local shopkeepers have voluntarily brought out boxes or stools for us to sit upon, which are readily converted into serviceable, though insecure, pulpits. At other times we have been invited when our preaching was done to sit down and talk over what has been said.

"The power of the Gospel to touch men's hearts has been amply shown, sions as to the superiority of Christianity are not infrequent. At one of our preaching places a Hindu admitted that this was indeed true religion, but that nowadays men's one desire was money. 'If we don't tell lies, if we don't cheat, our business would be a failure.' This is a common sentiment, and expressive of men's opinion of Christianity and its demands for a purer life. I have seen a crowd listen with eagerness and appreciation as the cardinal truths of faith have been presented to them, have heard them assent as the impossibility of salvation by works has been enlarged upon, have watched their faces glow as they have listened to the story of the unspeakable love of Christ-and then! A glance towards the basket or the bundle that has been put down for a time, some intruding thought of the work which calls with its temptations, uncertain fears of what their society would say, the loss of friends, loss of caste-and they go away. To them heaven has been opened for a moment. But the way is narrow. And yet they are not just the same as they were before. No one with whom Christ has once come in contact can ever be. Not to-day, not to-morrow, but at last resistance is broken down and Christ comes to His own.

"Besides street preaching the steamers afford many an opportunity for work. Preaching is out of the question here, but books command a ready sale. Prasanna Babu has been regularly visiting these boats again this year, and many a quiet word, many a hurried conversation, many an earnest question has helped to spread the news of God's infinite love. Travellers are glad to purchase literature for whiling away the unoccupied hours of the journey, and so the effort to circulate the Scriptures is largely helped."

The Rev. C. H. Williams, who is stationed at Kalka, at the foot of the Himalayas, describing his audiences in the bazaar, says:—

"In my hearers I have Hindus, Mussalmans, Sikhs, and Buddhists in religion, and

as for types and races, they come from Calcutta in one direction and Afghanistan in another, besides queer, uncouth peoples from dimly known Tibet in the interior, and wandering mendicants from all parts of India. This work throughout the year has been carried on with increasing influence. The regular residents of Kalka, who at first came to interrupt or cavil, now often come and listen attentively to our story. Not that there is no opposition, but better a living opposition than a dead indifference.

"We have had fourteen baptisms in Kalka and its out-stations, and of these ten were converts from Mohammedanism and Hinduism. There has been a growth in our Sunday-schools, the day schools have kept up well despite changes, removals and other adverse influences, and the total number of our Christian community is larger this year than ever.

"We wish some of our friends could learn by experience what a missionary's day is. They would be surprised if they found he had to be preacher, counsellor, lawyer, doctor, gardener, builder and a great many other things all in one. And as for Sunday being a day of rest, yes it is rest, but it is rest in activity and service. Yesterday, to take just one day, opened with an early morning preaching service for the native church. It was my privilege to conduct the meeting and preach the sermon. Then followed a visit to the Government rest-camp, where several hundred soldiers were halting for the day. We were able to find the little band of Christian men and secured the Commandant's permission for them to attend the evening service. In the afternoon the usual Sunday-school for native Christians was held. The other schools had been held in the early morning and at mid-day. Just after five we had our tent, which we use as a church, filled by an overflowing congregation of soldiers and civilians, and we had what the preacher felt to be an enjoyable service together.

"Then to close the day we had an open-air moonlight preaching service in the midst of the camp, and as this was attended by a fairly large number of men who were most attentive, we felt we were amply rewarded for our task. And so we came home at night ready for rest but glad of a Sabbath of service.

"Are not all these open doors, whitening fields, coming harvests, abundant reason for grateful praise and adoring prayer? We have been blessed, and the truest way to insure further blessing is to acknowledge mercies already received. Praise must blend with petition, and if we are all anointed afresh for service, great will be the triumphs of our faith."

The Rev. Daniel Jones, of Agra, carries on a deeply interesting work amongst the sorely stricken inmates of the Leper Hospital. He writes:—

"Our work among the lepers is not the least item of work that we thankfully record. There are some twenty candidates for baptism. And among them are nine of the women lepers. This will be the first baptism among the women. One is a very old inmate of the asylum, who was there when I first visited the asylum some fifteen years ago. She has repeatedly told my wife, who has taught her of Jesus, that she no longer sings the praises of Rām, but the praises of the Messiah, the Saviour of her soul. We had a most helpful visit during last cold season from Mr. Jackson, the organising secretary of the Leper Mission. As a result of this visit, I have heard from the Rev. Wellesley Bailey, Edinburgh, the financial secretary of the Mission, offering us £10 annually towards the support of an evangelist to be set apart for this work, and also money to put up a small chapel near the asylum. We are now on the look-out for a suitable man who can give his whole time to this

work. I have spoken to our collector on the subject, who does not think there can be any objection to our having a chapel—really only a roof, and pillars on which to rest it. This asylum is altogether the work of the Agra Government, and we only go there to attend to the spiritual needs of this poor suffering people."

THE NATIVE CHRISTIAN CHURCHES.

Our native Christian churches are most numerous in the Backergunge District of Bengal, where in two of the main sub-divisions of that large district (Barisal and Pirojpur) our brethren are at work.

In the Barisal District there are twenty-nine native Christian churches and a Christian community of 3,037 persons, in the adjoining Madaripore district, seventeen churches and a Christian community of 3,435,* and in the Perojpur district six churches and a Christian community of 250; in all, fifty-two churches and a Christian community of 6,722 persons.

At several of the stations the native Christians are striving earnestly to build new chapels, the old ones being past repair, and the churches needing larger and more substantial buildings.

Referring to this the Rev. Robert Spurgeon writes:-

"Friends at home will, perhaps, be interested in the way in which new places of worship are built. Suppose a chapel is to cost Rs. 300. When the people have given one-third or one-half, as the missionary decides, the project is taken up. The extra Rs. 200 or 150 have to be raised by a special appeal to the other churches. The subscription list is headed by ourselves and sent to our few personal friends, who are likely to show an interest in the work. After that an evangelist, or the pastor, is entrusted with the appeal to take to every church in this and the Madaripur district. When such an appeal goes round once in two or three years the response is good, but just now requests for chapels are numerous; it has therefore become a heavy burden to me; and a great desire to hurry through the work, thus relieving myself of the incubus and the churches too, has taken possession of me. If any friends who read this send me a donation of £10 or £15, it would help me to put a chapel in hand at once. It would also set funds free for other projects, for a church with a chapel built and paid for will soon need outlets for its liberality. We never incur a debt for building, but we do wait, as we are waiting now, for God's stewards to help in this great work."

The Rev. W. Davies, reporting on the churches in the Madaripore District, writes:—

"I paid several visits to our native churches during the last cold season On most of them I was accompanied by my family. I believe that the presence and help of Mrs. Davies tended to cheer and encourage the women of our community. I was out nearly the whole of July, August, and September. During these months the beel country is under water, and the churches therefore become more accessible. It is

difficult to get the people to come together for worship to their chapels except on Sundays. This is also the case in England. They have to work in their fields, to attend markets, to catch fish—in fact, to earn their daily living. But I have always been able to get a good audience at each church every time I visited them. I made it my custom to remain at each place from two to five days, according to the size of the church and the importance of the centre; and every morning we went to as many homesteads as possible, to visit the people in their own homes, to hear all they had to say, and to conduct a service at each place. In this way we have been able to visit a very large number of our Christians, and to get to know them and their needs. I also made it a point to visit all the Mission schools, to examine the pupils in Scripture, and to encourage the teachers to put more stress upon religious instruction, and to devote more time and energy to that branch of their work."

The Rev. Khristanga Biswas, who has charge of the work in the South Villages, situated in the district of the Twenty-four Pergunnahs to the South of Calcutta, containing a population of nearly two millions, writes:—

"The first four months of the year I was engaged in repairing and re-building the houses of the mission damaged or destroyed by the disastrous floods at the close of the year before (1900). The work of the churches has, therefore, been carried on in the face of great opposition and persecution. Though the brethren were placed in an awful position owing to the inundation, yet their zeal for the improvement of the churches did not in the least abate. Thank God that He has given them a very high idea of their work, and they have helped me in my duties, overcoming all the obstacles that stood in our way. 'We went through fire and through water, but Thou broughtest us out into a wealthy place.' It is by His great blessing that all the churches have more and more advanced towards independence; and it is very hopeful to note that the members nowadays show great diligence in acquiring more knowledge of the Scriptures, holding prayer-meetings and Bible-classes at which they raise subscriptions for various good purposes. These results give gratifying evidence that a good foundation of Scripture knowledge is being laid by the brethren. At present the churches are living in peace and unity. I am extremely glad to say that last August, a brother, Mathar Nath Naskar, presented a portion of his land to the mission at Machkhali, with the necessary legal documents. Here I built a chapel by means of the Church Fund. I also erected another at Bolakhali. During the year eleven have joined us by baptism at Bishtapur. The total number of the Christians is 1,534. There has been an addition of 112, of whom 61 have been baptized. I am glad to add that there are two Hindu women inquirers."

The Rev. M. N. Nath, Pastor of the Entally Native Christian Church Calcutta, reports:—

"We have baptized twenty-seven persons during the year. Five of them were Hindus and worshippers of idols. Ten belong to Miss Dyson's Entally Baptist Boarding School. They appeared to be truly converted Christian girls, and worthy of receiving believers' baptism. I have every reason to believe that they will shine more and more as children of light, and will set a good Christian example to others, when they go and live in their village homes. Two girls belonging to the Scotch Mission Girls' School were also baptized by me, as their parents belong to our church. They have also proved themselves worthy of being disciples of Christ. We have received thirteen persons into the church by transfer from Mofussil churches

but on the other hand ten members of our church have gone from us and joined other churches."

Referring to the Mugh Native Christians in the Chittagong District, the Rev. George Hughes, who, in company with the Rev. D. Donald, made a special visitation to these Christians in February of last year, writes:—

"We found the Christian community living in as many as thirty widely separated villages. During the six months which separate seed time and harvest, the people are for the major part quite inaccessible, for they have left their village homes and are living in rude huts, in the centre of their cultivated area, on the jungly hill-side. During the other months it is difficult to get them together in any numbers for they must considerably add to the fruits of harvest, if they would keep the wolf of want from the door all the year through. The consequence has been that our converts have had to be content with very little Christian instruction. As an evangelistic movement it has continued to spread, but our difficulty has been and yet remains—how can we consolidate this work, and bring and keep under definite instruction those whom the Lord hath called out of darkness into the kingdom of Jesus Christ?

"It seemed that our purpose could best be effected by forming these small communities into churches, and that the best man in each should be selected for special instruction, and made responsible for such work and services as his limited attainments would permit. A re-arrangement of our evangelistic work without affecting its scope has enabled our brethren to visit every Christian village in one circle twice in each month. Services are held on these occasions, and special lessons taught to the brother made responsible for carrying on the work. The communal feeling is strong in these people, and there is every reason to hope that from these small beginnings rich results may be obtained. These little Churches draw the people closer together, and create that esprit de corps which is absolutely necessary to Christian life and service amidst surroundings so material and gross. This assembling of themselves together is also a drawing away from the world. It makes significantly clear the line of demarcation between the church and the world, and mpresses upon the church that it has a name to honour, and a life to live demanding crupulous attention and care. The sense of personal and federal responsibility is taking root, and wisely directed and carefully fostered will, under God's blessing, yield the highest good, at a minimum charge upon foreign funds. Three little chapels are now being erected at the people's cost, and we have had thirty-seven baptisms.

"They are slowly learning the difficult lesson of giving from their substance to maintain and extend the cause of Christ in their midst. Hitherto the rule has been to send the evangelists around after harvest for their annual contribution, and the amount has not been worthy of so generous a people, nor is it a fair indication of their love to Jesus Christ. Believing that systematic giving is a duty that will greatly enrich the doer, we have urged the practice upon our Christians with neouraging results. Already two villages are contributing monthly one-fourth of the total gifts of the community for last year. If nothing more is done, the total will be increased threefold. But the example will be copied, and the spirit will spread. People whose doors are always open to the friend and the stranger, will in due time prove worthy of the best traditions of the Church of Christ—Philippians indeed to gladden the heart of any missionary."

The Rev. T. R. Edwards, writing from Soory, reports :-

"There are one or two items relative to the native Christian church that are encouraging. The roof of the building has been entirely re-thatched at the expense of the church funds. And the other repairs, comprising repairs of walls and floor and white-washing inside and out, were also done by the members of the church themselves. Young and old collected together, and for the better part of two days engaged in the work with their own hands. The joy and enthusiasm all manifested was a pleasure to behold. Those who could not join in the manual labours contributed the materials required for the repairs. Thus all participated in the good work, and the floor and walls of the building were put into thorough repair, without the slightest cost to the funds of the church. This instance of spontaneity and enthusiasm in repairing their own house of worship has greatly encouraged us.

"During the year we had the joy of baptizing five persons on a profession of their faith in Christ. Two of these were converts, one from Mohammedanism, and the other from Hinduism. The remaining three were from amongst the native Christian community. One of them was a sen of our faithful evangelist, Babu Umacharan Nath."

The Rev. Doli Patra, the Pastor of the Cuttack Native Christian Church, writes:—

"During the past year, through the mercy of God, sixteen have publicly professed their faith in Jesus by baptism, and have been added to the church. Three have been restored, and three have been received by letter. There are at the present time more than twenty candidates for baptism. Amongst those baptized one was a Mussalman; his name is Kasim Sahib. He was first met by our brother Poornanand Mahanty, at Russell Konda, who gave him religious instruction; but at that time Kasim did not recognise Christianity as true. Soon afterwards Poornanand was transferred to our mission station at Bilipada, and Kasim, with a view of opening a shop, removed to a village quite near to Bilipada, where there is a largo railway station; thus the two were again brought together, and opportunity for friendly intercourse and conversation afforded. Again Poornanand was transferred to Kendrapara, and Kasim, whose mind was attracted towards religion, sought him out there; as a result of further instruction, he was convinced that the religion of his father was false, and that Jesus Christ was the true Saviour; he expressed his faith in Christ and his desire to be baptized. Because he was a Mussalman we appointed several reliable brethren to see and test him again and again; they gave satisfactory testimony, and we baptized him with much joy."

The Rev. Daniel Jones, of Agra, reports on the Native Christian Church:—

During the year twenty have been baptized; all were from among the Christian community.

"For years past our native church building, which occupied a very central position, was in poor condition of repair. We were very desirous of carrying out several improvements, especially of putting on a new and substantial roof. This we desired to do without any help from the funds of the B.M.S. In 1898 our kind friend, Samuel D. Wills, Esq., of Bristol, was on a visit to India, and stayed with us at Agra. He and Mrs. Wills were most kind, and on his return home he very kindly interested himself on our behalf, and sent us the generous sum of

£36 6s. towards this church renovation fund. Daniel Thomas, Esq., a dear old friend of ours in Wales, sent us £10, and a few other friends also helped. But the great bulk of the money needed has been obtained here in India. The members of the Havelock Baptist Church, Agra, resolved at one of their church meetings to make up the deficiency. We have now a building that looks like a place of worship. The walls have been raised, and a good roof of corrugated iron put on, and inside a substantial ceiling of pine wood. By degrees the old benches also will be replaced by suitable new ones. Our good friends, Mr. and Mrs. Potter, who for years were so intimately connected with this church and people, very kindly presented the church with a new pulpit. Our dear friend and brother, Mr. Bird, of Plymouth, also helped us. When he saw the old place in January, 1899, he said it was no credit to our Mission. We had felt this for some time, but he would rejoice with us to see it as it is to-day."

The Rev. G. J. Dann, reporting from Bankipore as to the past year, says:—

"The year under report will be remembered for many years as the year of the great plague in Patna and District. When the census was taken in March, 1901, it was found that, in spite of years of prosperity and steady increase, there were 30,000 less people in Patna City and suburbs than in the corresponding date in 1891. A large number of people who had run away from fear of the plague have since returned, and the city no longer looks like a city of the dead, as it did from December to March. I joined a volunteer plague committee, and visited from house to house every morning until the plague disappeared, seeing that patients were supplied with milk, medicine, fuel, &c., and, in the case of the very poor, with small sums needed for funerals. The wild terror and panic fear of the people, their superstition, and the terrible so-called religions which dominate them in many cases frustrated all our efforts. In fact, at first, until the people found that their religious ceremonies and sacrifices, charms, and gifts to lazy Brahmans and professional beggars were all useless, they repelled our proffered help and only asked us to let them alone. Later on the people began to regard us as their only real friends and helpers, and we had our reward in day and night demands on our time. In spite of many saddening failures, our efforts were by the Divine blessing made successful in helping many to grapple with the disease, and, after many long anxious, weary weeks of constant nursing, they recovered.

"The native Christian community has, I am glad to report, shown signs of increase and prosperity. I am thankful to say that our baptistery has been used for immersion during the past year."

NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTIONS AND SCHOOLS.

I.

SERAMPORE COLLEGE.

Principal—The Rev. Ed. S. Summers, B.A.

Tulors—The Rev. C. E. WILSON, B.A., and the Rev. J. W. GILBERT, B.Sc.

The Principal reports:—

"Our Theological Classes have consisted of what I may call the Anglo-Vernacular and Vernacular students. We have had three students during the year in the

Anglo-Vernacular class, which has consisted of young men who have not passed the Entrance Examination of the Calcutta University, but are qualified by their knowledge of English to study to some extent in English. This class has studied Bible introduction under Mr. Wilson's tuition, both in the Cambridge Companion to the Bible, and in notes supplied by Mr. Wilson.

"Mr. Gilbert has taken them through Stalker's 'Life of Christ,' with a view to giving them a connected idea of the Gospel history and some insight into its setting. I have taken them in Adeney's 'New Testament Theology' (the teaching of Christ) and in Stalker's 'Life of Paul.' In the study of the latter book, I have constantly kept them in close touch with the history in Acts and the commentary supplied by the Epistles. In addition, I have taken them through the Epistle to the Galatians with the commentary in T. & C. Clark's Handbook Series. They have also studied the two Books of Samuel by themselves, and I have tested their knowledge by frequent examinations. They have learnt by heart the Epistle of James and the Epistle to the Colossians in the Revised Version. Mr. Wilson has taken them for two hours a day in English and English grammar with the entrance class.

"The Vernacular Class is still not in a satisfactory condition. The numbers are low and the calibre poor. We have fallen upon a time possibly when there are few students to be found, and perhaps some of the brethren have been so full of fear lest they should encourage young men who were not worthy that they have hardly taken the trouble to discover and encourage young men who would have turned out suitable for the work.

"The wives of several of the students have formed a small but interesting class, presided over by Mrs. Summers, which has met regularly from 11 to 1. Of course these women are seriously hampered with domestic duties and have to bring their children with them to the class. During the year they have carefully read 1 Samuel and Acts, and learned by heart many passages of Scripture. Besides, they have read some useful books in Bengali, and one of them has prosecuted studies in English with great enthusiasm.

"The following are the subjects taught during the year in the Anglo-Vernacular Theological Class, together with the names of teachers and examiners:—

"The Boarding School has been fuller than usual during the past year. condition has been very healthy, and a good spirit seems to pervade it. During the year seven lads have been baptized and give promise of considerable usefulness in the future. There were others anxious for the same privilege, but we have preferred to keep them waiting for a time until they give clearer proof of a change of heart. The boys have gone up for the usual public Scripture examinations, and have met with the success which seems now to have become so much a matter of course that it scarcely strikes one as remarkable. Another of our Sunday-school teachers, Prasad, has taken the place of Amrita who is now an assistant missionary, and has passed at the head of all the Bengali Sunday-school teachers with a good percentage of marks. Two students passed the last Entrance Examination, one, a Hindu, in the first class, the other, a Christian, in the third. The careful discipline maintained by Mr. Gilbert is moulding the boys for good and preparing them to be intelligent and earnest Christians, The Sunday-school has been conducted by Mr. Wilson. Summers has, as usual, taken the top boys in an English class. followed the course of the International Lessons.

"The Normal Class has about thirty young men and lads connected with it. Its course this year has been an even one. Two of the students have been baptized, and one of them aspires to join the Theological Class after a period of further probation. Mr. Ghose and myself take Scripture classes with the Normal Class students, and I take the higher division of it on Sundays in the Sunday-school, as I have felt that it was highly important to be in touch with these young men, many of whom will become teachers, and it is difficult to do so except through the medium of a regular class. The English service has been very satisfactory during the year. The attendance of Europeans and educated Indians (including our own staff and boys) has been considerable for Serampore. An interesting feature has been the Wednesday evening prayer meeting. Its time was changed, and we meet in a nicely prepared room connected with the chapel, and we have had a very pleasant attendance of young people during the year, giving us a strong assurance that a younger generation is growing up which will be strong in its attachment to the Lord Jesus Christ."

Mr Wilson reports on the Vernacular (Normal) Department:-

"We have admitted twenty-five new students into the Vernacular Classes since January, seven of whom, however, dismissed themselves after a brief stay.

"All the students have had regular Scripture study in class in addition to a class on Sunday with Mr. Summers in Christian Doctrine,

"Two Normal Class students have been baptized during the year. The discipline of the class has been satisfactory. We are anticipating considerable changes in the arrangements for the whole of our vernacular work, in accordance with the new Educational Code of the Bengal Government."

Mr. Gilbert reports on the Boys' Boarding School:—

"It is generally known that the Boarding School was established for Christian boys belonging to our Baptist community. A few Hindu and Mohammedan boys are admitted as day scholars into the classes, but they are only admitted when it appears that their admission will increase the educational efficiency of the class in question, and in return we utilise the opportunity by giving them daily Bible lessons. That they profit by these lessons is proved by the fact that one of our Hindu boys, who passed the Entrance Examination of the Calcutta University this year, succeeded also in gaining the first place in a public Scripture examination for free scholarships

offered by the three missionary colleges in Calcutta. The examination was on the Gospel of Matthew, and the successful candidate is now entered as a University student at the General Assembly's Institution belonging to the Church of Scotland.

"But the great majority of our boys belong to the Christian community, and most of them come from a grade of society that for ages enjoyed no educational advantages, and it would be idle to expect at the present stage a very high standard of educational excellence from them. In view of all the circumstances, the results obtained are by no means contemptible.

"During the past year, the school curriculum has been widened and improved by the introduction into all the classes of Natural Science and Drawing.

"But our most earnest efforts are directed to the moral and spiritual improvement of the boys under our care. We realise that it is by this we stand or fall. And judged by this test, I am deeply convinced of the very great importance, from a missionary standpoint, of our work in training the Christian youth of the land.

"One of the most encouraging features in connection with our work this year has been the very considerable amount of spontaneous Christian activity amongst our boys. A number of them have joined with a few of the Theological students and two or three Christian youths outside the college in forming a branch of 'The Indian Christian Workers' Union,' a young society similar in its aims to the S.V.M.A. Readily obtaining our permission, they have gone out one evening in the week to do evangelistic work; they have gone to the railway station to sell Gospel portions to the passengers, or to the hospital to distribute tracts and speak to the sick, or to a village school, where they might tell the children of Jesus, the Saviour of the world. Perhaps even more remarkable is the daily prayer meeting, from 9 to 10 P.M., originated and carried on entirely by the Christian boys. We are kept informed of the meetings and give them our heartiest encouragement from the outside, but we think it better to let the meetings develop in their own hands. I have only once been present; the meeting was largely attended, and I was highly pleased with the spontaneity, sincerity, and reverence of the whole proceedings.

"The Sunday morning classes for Hindu and Mohammedan boys have not been so well attended this year; indeed, my senior class in English for the study of the life of Christ broke up altogether in September. But even this disappointment is not without its silver lining, inasmuch as it was caused by the baptism of a Brahman youth, who had been attending the class for a time. His case is a most interesting one. His family is held in high respect in Serampore, and no member of it has hitherto dishonoured the name by yielding to Christianity. As an illustration of the manner in which joy and heaviness mingle in a missionary's life, it was on the day of the Jagannath car festival, when I returned home from the sickening scene of idolatry in the midst of which we had been preaching, that I found this young man, Kalachand, waiting to tell me he had made up his mind to be a Christian and boldly confess his faith by being baptized. He had been reading the Bible for two years, and we were all greatly impressed and gratified in our conversations with him to find how clear was his apprehension of Christian truth, and how earnest a spirit he showed. I had the joy of baptizing him in the College ground on a public profession of his faith. He has met with the all too common treatment to which Hindu converts of high caste are subject. His relations have secured him and removed him to a distant town where he is not at liberty, and any communication with Christians is prevented as far as possible. We have good ground, however, for believing he is still faithful to Christ, and we continue in prayer for him that after a few months of trial in this way God will bring him out strengthened and fitted for noble service in Christ's cause."

II.

ORISSA NATIVE CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTION.

CUTTACK.

Principal—The Rev. THOS. BAILEY.

Tutors—The Rev. Geo. Howells, B.A., B.D., and the Rev. Shem Sahu.

Assistant Tutor—The Rev. Niladri Naik.

The Principal, the Rev. Thos. Bailey, reports:—

"The new session opened with ten students, who were joined in April by another, making in all eleven, all being candidates for the Christian Ministry. This is the largest number I have known to be in the Institution at the same time. The whole class has read with me in Edwards's 'Handbook of Christian Baptism,' pages 55 to 78; in Professor Adeney's Church History, 'From Constantine to Charles the Great,' the first three chapters; and the Epistle to the Ephesians, in the Cambridge Bible Series, Introduction—chapters i., ii. and vii., and Commentary, chapter i., to v. 20. All have not equal gifts, and all have not studied with equal diligence, but all have made good progress; absences from class have been few, and several of the young men give promise of more than ordinary usefulness.

"The Assistant Tutor, the Rev. Niladri Naik, has exercised the usual supervision, and has also taken classes in the Book of Revelation and on Mohammedanism.

"Five of the young men have completed four years of study. Two of these, Nathan and Nityanand, are warmly recommended for acceptance by Conference as evangelists on the usual probation. They have proved themselves to be diligent and capable students, and will, we trust, render useful service in the interests of the Mission. The remaining three have some knowledge of the English language, and have also shown special aptitude as students; they will, we believe, do justice to a more extended oourse of study, and we recommend that they be retained in the Institution another year.

"Three of the young men have completed three years of study, and we recommend that two of these, Dayanidhi Singh and Padmanabh Sahu, be accepted by Conference as evangelists on the usual probation. We trust they will make useful and effective preachers of the Word."

Mr. Howells writes :--

- "The following are the studies taken during the year in classes varying from one to eleven:—
- "I. Apologetic Theology.—(a) Flint's 'Theism' (pages 131-321). (b) Flint's 'Anti-Theistic Theories' (pages 1-73). A class of one.
 - "H. Systematic Theology.—The Work of Christ. A class of eleven.
 - "III. OLD TESTAMENT EXEGESIS.-Isaiah (Chaps. I.-X.). A class of eleven.
- "IV. Hebrew. (a) Davidson's 'Hebrew Grammar.' (b) Deuteronomy (Chaps. 1.-XII., XXXII.-XXXIV.). A class of one.
- "V. Gerer.—(a) Huddleston's 'Essentials of New Testament Greek' (Lessons I.-XXV.). A class of two. (b) Acts of the Apostles (The whole). A class of two.
- "VI. HISTORY.—(a) History of Religions. Religions of India, Persia, and China, and Mohammedanism. Studied in the works of Monier Williams, Mitchell, Hardwick Grant, and Muir. A class of one. (b) History of the Reformation—Lindsay (pages 1-69). A class of two.

"The more experience one has in theological teaching in India, the more urgent appears the need of theological text-books specially prepared and adapted for Indian students. Such books are at present not available, with the result that we are seriously disadvantaged in our work. The only hope of such a literature being forthcoming is that the different Evangelical Missions at work in India co-operate for this purpose. This much is certain, that theological education in India to-day is in a very backward and unorganised state, and that the most effective method of remedying this defect is by co-operation. The hope of India lies in her consecrated Christian young men, and for these the very best theological training possible should be secured. There are a few young men among our present theological students of considerable promise, but the conviction grows upon me that we are not doing anything like what we might as a mission to develop the splendid material in our Christian communities. There could in my view be no better channel for the expenditure of missionary energy and enthusiasm."

Mr. Shem Sahu reports:-

- "All the students have read with me the whole of the first Epistle of Timothy. While studying it we have drawn the attention of the students to various important subjects pertaining to the preacher, his character, preaching, and pastoral duties. They have read also with me in 'Wayland's Moral Science' the first three sections of the second chapter with intelligent appreciation.
- "In addition to the above the students have in turn read a sermon week by week, and I have pleasure in bearing witness to the evident promise which some of the sermons have shown.
 - "The discussion class, which was begun last year, has been regularly maintained."

III.

THE NORTH-WEST CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITUTION.

DELHI.

Principal—The Rev. STEPHEN S. THOMAS.

Assistant—The Rev. JOEL WAIZ LALL, M.A.

The Principal reports:—

- "The year under report has been signalled by no striking events. For an institution like this perhaps the greatest blessing is a year of steady, uneventful work, unruffled by internal or external disturbance, the students quietly laying the foundations, in acquirements and character, on which their life-work shall hereafter be built. May the great Builder Himself train and perfect them that on the edifice of their lives the Holy Spirit of Light and Truth may inscribe:—To the Glory of God.
- "During the year Domingo has gone to Dinapore to work as an evangelist under the Rev. B. Evans, and Nathu Mall is for the present working steadily as such in Delhi, circumstances rendering it undesirable for him to take up work in Bhiwání. Isá Dás, not proving himself possessed of the gift of preaching, is, with the hearty good wishes of the Consulting Committee, working in the orphanage at Agra.

Kukru Sinh, a somewhat uncouth but most promising young fellow from the Kharar district, was prevented by his parents from returning after the long holiday. Naphtálí Sulimán was with us for some four months' study, but I fear his stay was as little profitable to him as gratifying to us, and I think the Home Committee was wise in removing him from evangelistic work. The remaining six students worked hard with very varying success.

"Class Work.—A larger number of books than usual has been got through during the session, as the list will show. The subjects were:—'O. T. History'—Joshua—2 Samuel. 'N. T. History' with Notes: 'Gospel Harmony' (Robinson's). 'Companion to the Bible.' 'N. T. Exegesis'—I and 2 Thessalonians. 'Apologetics'—Both in Urdu and Hindí. 'The Tenets of Islám' (Sell). 'Church History.'

"My sermon class has been maintained and a great many mornings I have devoted to the reading of the Scriptures aloud. My experience (not confined to Indian evangelists!) is that the public reading of the Scriptures is a direction in which improvement is eminently and urgently desirable but difficult to secure.

"Bazaar-preaching has been pretty regularly engaged in, and the Bhiwání pulpit has been filled mostly by student-supplies, with, I believe, a fair amount of acceptance. The work of the session was well begun by Mr. Lall taking the men into the Barout district, where, as previously, they had a warm and cordial reception in the villages and did most encouraging work.

"The work of the Bearding School has proceeded steadily with Abdur Rahim (the Servant of the Merciful) and Tom, the Peaceful (how beautiful and consolatory are Eastern names!), as masters. The conduct of the boys has been good, and the elder boys have continued to enjoy the advantages of attending the Cambridge Mission High School. One gratifying feature has been the steady maintenance of two voluntary devotional services, a Christian Endeavour meeting on Saturday nights, and a general meeting for all on Sunday nights. These meetings the boys themselves conduct. At the close of the school year there were thirty-one boarders.

"At last the desire of years is I hope in the way of being fulfilled by the sending of six of our boys to Saharunpore Presbyterian Industrial School to be taught carpentering, smithy, and boot-making. I hope certainly that some of them will turn out master-hands, able to return and teach those trades here. The Industrial problem for native Christians is a difficult and a pressing one."

CHRISTIAN ELEMENTARY YERNACULAR DAY SCHOOLS.

The Report for last year gives the number of Christian elementary vernacular day schools connected with the Mission as 236, with 6,501 boys and 981 girls in attendance, but these totals must not be regarded as final as the returns from several of the schools have not as yet come to hand.

The Rev. W. W. Milne, who is in charge of all the Eastern Bengal Schools, reports:—

"At present there are 55 schools in full working order. During the year there

have been 50 schools working the whole year, 2 for 10 months, 3 for 8 months, 2 for 7 months, 5 for 6 months, and 1 for 5 months,

"It will again be seen that by far the greater portion of the schools have gone on steadily the whole year, and that only a few have been dropped or opened. These mushroom schools I hope in course of time still further to reduce; but there will always be a few places where, through local and other conditions, it will be necessary to open and close schools. In the meantime I am aiming at establishing schools in places where they will be appreciated, and doing all in my power to foster such schools.

"Examination Results.—Passed in—Chhatra Britti, none; upper primary, 8 Christian boys and 1 Hindu boy; lower primary, 14 Christian boys, 1 Christian girl, 15 Hindu boys, and 3 Mohammedan boys; fourth class, 33 Christian boys, 6 Christian girls, 56 Hindu boys, and 1 Mohammedan boy; fifth class, 31 Christian boys, 11 Christian girls, 34 Hindu boys, 4 Mohammedan boys, and 1 Mohammedan girl.

"It will be remembered that towards the end of September of last year we had tremendous storms of wind and rain. Unfortunately, that was examination week, so some scholars could not go, and some who bravely set out arrived at the examination room too late. For this important reason the passes in the higher classes are probably fewer than they otherwise would have been. During the year also eight boys have been sent to Serampore for higher education.

"With regard to Religious Instruction, I am glad to be able to report a very gratifying improvement in this subject. During my recent examination of the schools there were only three that were unsatisfactory; at all the other schools it was very evident that the teachers had taken varying degrees of pains in the preparation of their scholars. I did not always confine myself to the 'Question and Answer' of the Catechism, so I was thereby enabled to ascertain to what extent their intelligence as well as their memory had been exercised. As the result of this teaching, two young men who formerly read in our schools have renounced Hinduism. Indeed, one of them, Chandra Kumar by name, was a teacher in one of our schools at the time. To show the fear that takes possession of a Hindu when one of their number becomes a Christian, it is only necessary to mention the fact that immediately it became known that he had renounced Hinduism the number of Hindus in that school at once fell from 35 to 13. But it is not only fear that is engendered; it is accompanied with hatred of the deepest and darkest kind, shown first in the convert's own home, as the following indicates. About a month after he had come right out the following conversation took place between him and one of the inspectors :-Chandra: 'I am going home to-night to see my father and brothers.' Inspector: 'No, don't; you know that if you do they will try to poison you: they tried it before.' Chandra: 'Oh, I have no fear! I'll take good care.' Latterly I heard that they had poisoned him, and that he was out of his mind some days. He is now in Serampore College; Bhagya, the other convert, is there also. How strikingly in contrast is the practice of the Christian who, when a fellow creature, not to say a brother, falls into the path of error, resorts to prayer | The difference between prayer and poison just about represents the difference in action between Christianity and Hinduism.

"I wish to say a word about an important matter brought up at one of our Conferences this year. At that meeting a Literary Committee was appointed to try by various means to encourage the cultivation of a taste for a pure and elevating literature among the teachers. Two speeches on 'Our School Reading Books' were

given, one by the Chairman, the other by one of the inspectors. This subject, which had been brought up and discussed at a previous Conference also, was spoken to by several. The essence of the discussion may be shortly put thus: 1. That our teachers, recognising the necessity of a sound and healthy literature for the scholars under their care, set themselves to cultivate their own tastes first of all both in reading and writing. 2. Seeing that our school books are almost entirely composed of non-Christian iterature, an effort be made to get introduced some Christian teaching.

"In all our home public schools ever increasing attention is being paid to supplying adequate apparatus as a means to efficient results. In addition to what is supplied by school authorities for the education of British children they have the advantage of great public exhibitions (such as that at Glasgow), museums, art galleries, &c., &c., which may be visited, and more learnt there in one day than the children out here could learn in a year. All the things that go under the general name of Apparatus,' and which are considered a sine quâ non at home, are out here practically non-existent.

"As my report is already somewhat beyond the usual limits, I beg in conclusion to express the hope that a large response will be made to my appeal some time ago in the MISSIONARY HERALD for special gifts in the way of school apparatus to encourage and help along those whose minds are only slowly awakening to the value of education."

Reporting upon the Schools in the District of the South Villages, the Rev. Khristanga Biswas writes:—

"There are 14 day schools under my supervision in the district, which are supported by the Society. They are regularly examined by me and my colleague, Babu R. K. Ray. The children have been regularly taught the Scriptures, as well as other subjects. There are 400 boys, of whom 168 are Christians and 232 are non-Christians. I am greatly pleased to add that during the year under review nine boys from Rashkhali appeared at the Government Primary Examination, three of them passing creditably in the Upper Primary, and six in the Lower. Besides, five boys passed from Narsikderchok, seven from Kauradangi, five from Bolakhali, and five Machkhali. From this I cannot help observing that the teachers are taking every possible means to improve the schools, and that there is every hope of still greater improvement in the future."

BISHTOPORE BOARDING SCHOOL.

The Rev. Khristanga Biswas reports also on the Bishtopore Boarding School:—

"This year eight boys have been transferred to Serampore College. Seventeen boys have been admitted from different churches. The present number on the roll is twenty-five, who are supported by the 'Birmingham Young People's Missionary Association Fund.' The boys are divided into three classes: three are in the first, en in the second, and the rest in the third class. Most of them are very young and have been recently taken in. They have been examined by me regularly in the various subjects they study. Special care has been taken to impart religious instruction. In the year under report, eight boys appeared in the third grade of the Soripture examination connected with the B.C. Conference. Six of them passed and

gained prizes. I am extremely glad to note that though the boys are young, yet they have a strong zeal for Christ. Every Sunday morning they go out in the Christian para to collect rice and pice, and whatever they can collect throughout the year they give at the end for some good purpose. They also go out to hold prayer meetings with the preachers every Sunday evening in the Christian para, and encourage the Christians by their singing and praying. Besides, they have a C.E. meeting every Saturday evening, when they speak on the subject appointed by me and Babu R. K. Ray, by whom and myself the meeting is generally conducted. God bless these young lads that they may grow up to be true disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ!"

THE CUTTACK HIGH SCHOOL.

The Rev. A. H. Young, M.A., reports :-

"This school continues its useful work, and, though the numbers on the roll have not been so large as in some recent years, they have been very satisfactory. At the end of the year the number on the roll was 205, the highest number during the year 208, and the average 197.6. Six pupils passed the recent Matriculation Examination of the Calcutta University—three in the second, and three in the third division. The Hon. M. S. Das again gave us Rs. 30 for Scripture prizes. In accordance with the Government educational changes, as published in the Gazette, considerable changes will likely be made during the coming year. The Government desires that the kindergarten system should be introduced into all the schools as soon as possible, and that in high schools, as well as in others, in the four lowest classes all teaching should be given in the vernacular, and that English and English textbooks should be used as little as possible till the fourth highest class is reached.

"It is a pleasure to us to record from time to time the number of pupils who matriculate and continue their studies in the local college, but it is a greater pleasure to report that, of the eleven students now studying in our mission college, five are former pupils of the Mission High School, and we hope that before long they will all be actively engaged as evangelists in the Lord's vineyard, and proving themselves to be workmen that need not to be ashamed. Some of those already at work are also old pupils."

BANKIPORE BOARDING SCHOOL.

The Rev. G. J. Dann reports:—

"The Boarding School has been a cause of much solicitude, care, and prayer during the year, the responsibility of thirty boys belonging to parents at a distance pressing most heavily on us when the wailing for the dead was heard on all sides around the Mission compound, and as many as a hundred corpses a day could be counted as they passed along the road in front of our premises on the way to the burning-ghat. But our only case in the school turned out favourably, and the health of the boys has been above the average for native boys. The tone of the school, too, seems to be gradually growing better and better, and the boys seem to be paying good attention to their lessons, the Government Sub-Inspector of Schools having reported on the school very favourably. Best of all, four senior boys have presented themselves for baptism, and are now members of the Church; two of the elder boys have recently been appointed assistant teachers in the Sultangunj and Dujra Schools, so that they may obtain thorough practice in the art of teaching before they are appointed to take entire charge of schools. As the Sultangunge master is a young

man of our own training, I think I can now report that our Christian Boarding School is making a beginning in supplying the trained Christian teachers we need for our bazaar schools. It is as yet only the day of small things; a day, however, which we are told not to despise. The Home Committee have increased their guarantee fund for part maintenance of the school, and have thus lightened the financial responsibility which has been so burdensome to the missionary in charge, but I am glad to report that this liberal policy has resulted in increased local support. The Monghyr and Jamalpore friends have given us collections, and Mr. Collier has induced friends in Gulzarbagh to send us down some welcome donations and subscriptions."

THE KHARRAR BOARDING SCHOOL.

The Rev. G. Anstie Smith writes:-

"The Boarding School has progressed very favourably this year, notwithstanding the serious drawback of our having neither boarding nor school-house, both of which the floods destroyed in July, 1900. A hired house, away from our personal supervision, in the city, has done service as a boarding-house, and the head master's residence has been used as a school. The fees paid during the year have amounted to nearly Rs. 300.

"I have to report that the Government have recognised the school this year, and we shall in future have the advantage and incentive of the public examinations of the Educational Department of India.

"At the time of writing we are ready to lay the foundations of the new memorial church, which will be used as a school on week days. This should make teaching a more pleasant task and learning a more easy acquirement; while for our worship the idea of meeting in a suitable building, where, undisturbed by the distractions of the open air, we may worship God, seems too good to be true. It has taken us three and a half years to collect the needful (Rs. 2,500), but we can boast of having done this without aid from the funds of the B.M.S."

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND SOCIETIES OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAYOUR.

During last year there were connected with our work in India 238 Sunday-schools and 410 Sunday-school teachers, with an attendance of 7,052 scholars—boys 4,582, and girls 2,470.

Reporting upon the results of the recent examinations of the Indian Sunday School Union, Mr. Milne writes:—

"The results are most encouraging. Of the 370 who passed, 148, or 40 per cent., belong to our mission. Serampore gained the first place in the first division, and the first four places in the second division. A girl in Miss Finch's school (B.Z.M.) Barisal, gained the first place in the third division with a percentage of 98, Serampore taking the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth places. Serampore is also the first of the fourth division. One of Mr. Jewson's scholars (Calcutta) takes the second (equal) place in the lowest division—oral, for those who cannot read or write—and one of Mr. Ransford's scholars (Narayanganj) the third (equal) place. Results such as these tell their own tale of work done during the year. In the Barisal and

Madaripur districts about 170 tried the various examinations: 62 of these passed, of whom 26 were successful in the middle division, 25 in the lower, and 11 in the oral. There were 20 passes from the excellent school conducted by Miss Finch. Dhamsar supplied 23 passes, leaving 19 for the Beel schools. We hope to be able to report better results in this part of the field next year, as extensive preparations are being made to get more in touch with our scholars.

"Let me add here a very interesting item. The Hindu Sunday-school under Mr. Ransford, Narayanganj, has undertaken the upkeep of a bed in the public hospital there. A completely-equipped miniature cot, with collecting box attached, is passed round every Sunday, and into this the little folks drop their pice. The value making children thus early look beyond themselves cannot but have the most beneficial effect upon their character.

"Special Mention.—The girl in Miss Finch's school (mentioned above) is first for all Bengal. Her name is Priyabala Singh."

The Rev. R. J. Grundy, reporting on the Cuttack Sunday-school, says 52 out of 84 scholars passed the Scriptural examination of the Indian Sunday School Union. This result is certainly creditable alike to teacher and taught. At Berhampore also 18 passed the same examination out of 20.

The Rev. W. J. Price, reporting upon Sunday-school work in the North-West Provinces, writes:—

"Comparison shows that the progress reported last year has been maintained. There has been a falling off in the number of schools 9, of teachers 7, of scholars 150. The decrease calls for inquiry, as naturally this work should grow. As far as our stations in Bihar are concerned, the retrogression is due to plague, owing to which not a few of our scholars died, and schools had to be temporarily closed. Happily, we are still well in advance of previous years in numbers of schools, teachers, and scholars, and it is earnestly hoped that this temporary check will be followed by greater success in this most important branch of the work."

With regard to special work amongst children, the Rev. W. S. Page, B.A., B.D., who has succeeded the Rev. William Carey in Dacca, writes:—

"In this department of work I am both unfortunate and fortunate in having to succeed Mr. Carey, whose fame as a children's missionary is in all the churches : unfortunate in that I cannot hope to emulate his success in dealing with children, and fortunate in that I found already organised a children's service, more largely attended, I believe, than any similar service in East Bengal.

"Every Sunday morning as soon as it is light numbers of children may be seen wending their way to our compound, and by the time the service begins we have from 150 to 300 children packed into our small building. A large part of the service is devoted to singing. It is not easy to teach Hindu and Mohammedan children to sing Christian hymns, but both they and we try our best, and many of them can really sing quite nicely. The special value of this part of the service is that the children carry the songs they learn with them to their homes, and we often hear how they sing them over and over in the hearing of their parents and their playmates. Who can measure the influence thus exerted through these little ones upon the Hindu and Mohammedan families from which they come?

"During the five months that I have been conducting this service we have studied the International Sunday School Lessons Sunday by Sunday, with the help of the large coloured pictures published by the Providence Lithograph Company of Pennsylvania. The children have also learnt a considerable portion of a little Christian Catechism in Bengali.

"Since Mr. Carey's departure for England I have been acting as editor of 'Snehamayi,' the children's paper started by Mr. Carey, and so long edited by him. I regard my position as editor of this paper as a merely temporary one, which I shall be very pleased to vacate on Mr. Carey's return. I cannot give details as to the financial condition of the paper until the end of 1901, but I hope that the balance sheet will not show a greater deficit than last year, though we have not succeeded yet in making the paper pay its way."

Referring to work in Chittagong, the Rev. Geo. Hughes writes relative to Sunday-schools as follows:—

"In my judgment Sunday-school work is without doubt and without exception the most important to which we are called; so when our staff had been generously augmented we set ourselves to revive and, if possible, to extend it. Children in India can always be got hold of for a Sunday or two, and this hold can be retained if the right means are employed. Hoping to give the work a good start I personally superintended it for a few weeks, and saw at once that, if we would have it succeed, the teachers themselves must be taught. Lessons were given on the Art of Teaching, and our brethren have succeeded beyond my most sanguine expectations. They threw, themselves heartily into the work, and diligently sought out the best means to convey the Gospel message to the young. The roll has increased month by month; girls have been induced to attend; and adults, both men and women, have sat around listening attentively to their children singing Gospel Hymns and reciting Scripture Texts with evident great pleasure.

"Two classes for Christian parents have been regularly held. Four new schools have been added. The average attendance in the town is 170. Surely this must have a far-reaching influence. We labour not merely for present results, much as we long for such, but are laying foundations for the future, and there can be no better way to disarm prejudice and to undermine superstition than by a generous expenditure of toil and strength upon the boys and girls of this vast land."

SOCIETIES OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOUR.

"For Christ and the Church."

No special report in relation to the progress of the Christian Endeavour movement in Bengal has as yet been received, but from the general table of statistics it appears there are at present, 41 societies in Bengal and 8 societies in Orissa.

With regard to the statistics from the North-west Provinces, the Rev. W. J. Price writes:—

"Comparison with the returns of the previous year shows there has been an addition of two societies and of thirty-three members. So far this is encouraging, and we still hope that societies will be started in all our stations if practicable."

Of the Senior society, Agra, the Rev. D. Jones writes:-

"Recently a very encouraging work has been commenced by our young men who, as an evangelistic band, have gone out into local mélas, to markets and villages."

The Rev. C. H. Williams reports:—

"The Kalka society has helped the fund for supporting local Mission Evangelists,"

Bábú Piyari Lál, Secretary of the Kharar societies, reports:—

"Some of the members engage in Bazaar-preaching every Tuesday and Friday. Similarly, we hope that each society will endeavour to take up some direct Christian work."

The Rev. Khristanga Biswas reports from Bishtapur:-

"There are eight C.E. Associations. One is a boys', three are women's, and the other four are young men's. The total number of members in all these Associations is 250. I am greatly pleased to note that by the efforts of the members forty-seven, both men and women, were baptized during the year. The C.E. of Bishtapur is generally conducted by me and my assistant, Babu R. K. Ray. Christian Endeavours of Lakhikantapur and Dhanghatta are conducted by Misses Bergin and Williamson, and the Khari C.E. is conducted by Babu D. N. Ray, the new preacher. On the whole, the C.E. Meetings were conducted regularly and have done much good. The young people are actuated by a strong zeal for Christ and His teachings."

ORPHANAGES.

GIRLS' ORPHANAGE, CUTTACK, ORISSA.

Superintendents: Miss Leigh and Miss Thompson, B.Sc.

Miss Leigh writes:—

"The past year has not been without its vicissitudes and anxieties. In February an epidemic of measles appeared in the villages, and it spread to our Orphanage. Forty-nine girls succumbed to the complaint. Twenty-five were illust the same time, and the rest went down in batches.

"During the year one girl has been married. One left and went to her mother; she is now in a home in Calcutta, placed there through the exertion and kindness of Miss Thatcher. Eight have been received into the Orphanage. The youngest, Sarala, a baby, is placed with a Christian widow until she is old enough to come to us. Esther, a delicate child, passed away suddenly after a brief illness. She regularly attended Miss Thompson's Children's Meeting, and from a conversation she had with one of the elder girls shortly before she died there can be no doubt that she is 'Safe in the arms of Jesus.' 'I am going to the Lord,' 'He is calling me,' 'I am not afraid,' 'Tell my mother,' were some of her last words. 'Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven.' There are at present eighty-two boarders in the institution.

"The prospect of leaving the work with which I have for so many years been connected for a season of rest and change, brings with it much regret. The Lord has through all the past year been our Helper."

Miss Thompson reports:—

"There are 111 scholars in the day-school, 68 being children of the Orphanage, and 43 day-scholars coming from the Christian villages. Fourteen girls passed the

Government examinations in the vernacular standards and two passed in English. In our Sunday-school, where teachers and taught are all Orphanage girls, we study the International lessons and sometimes take the same lessons again in the day-school: as a result 28 of the girls passed very creditably in the India Sunday School Union Examination. The Girls' School in the Christian village of Chaga is in a satisfactory condition, and we have lately opened schools for girls in several villages in that neighbourhood, and the attendance and progress of the girls is very satisfactory. The teachers visit the children's homes and Miss Leigh has a Bible-woman working in the district in the hope of reaching the mothers. The Low-Caste School in Cuttack is well attended and some of the children have made very good progress, Many thanks to the kind friends who have helped to support these schools,"

THE BOYS' ORPHANAGE, CUTTACK.

The Rev. Thomas Bailey reports:—

"Last year we reported twenty-three as residing on the premises. Two of these Lave left us. One is working at the Press and well able to maintain himself; the other was sent to be trained as a domestic servant by a lady friend in Calcutta, but has since returned to live with his mother in Cuttack. Four boys have been received, all of them orphans indeed. We have twenty-five now residing on the premises; of these five are working at the Mission Press, and two are in domestic service. Four of the very small boys attend Miss Thompson's Girls' Orphanage Day School, and one, who is making good progress, attends the Mission English High School for native boys; the remainder are provided for by the Boys' Orphanage Day School held on the premises. Nine receive help while residing with their friends,"

INDIAN FAMINE ORPHANAGES.

THE BOYS' ORPHANAGE, BERHAMPORE,

The Rev. F. W. Jarry reports from Berhampore:—

"As the result of the famine in the Central Provinces last year, the Government handed us over a number of orphaned waifs. Twenty-eight boys reached us in November of last year, and what a sight they were! Some of them could scarcely stand, let alone walk; but with good food and proper attention an improvement in their condition was soon apparent, and to day, with three or four exceptions, they do not look much like famine children. My wife devoted much of her time to them, and was looking forward with pleasure to the work of mothering them; but in August, under the imperative orders of two doctors, she was obliged to leave for England at once on account of the serious illness of our little girl. The oversight of the boys now falls to my lot, but there are joys which more than compensate for much of the time and care needed. In April we received an addition of 14, in May two, while early in October I welcomed five more. The new boys very quickly settle down to our ways and seem to be very much at home.

"But death has been busy among them. Some never recovered from the effects of the famine; the sufferings through which they passed left an indelible mark on their constitutions, and gradually they succumbed to dropsy, dysentery or pernicious anamia. Seven were taken from us in this way during the year, while two died of cholera in July after an illness of a few hours only. In June and July cholera was raging in our midst. The Christian community was attacked and 24 taken off in a

few days. Early one morning I found two of my boys down with the dread disease. They were the two youngest of the family, and two of the brightest, but in spite of all our efforts, they died in a few hours. It was an anxious time for my wife and myself, for some 20 boys had been in the same room all night with the two who were seized, but the Lord was gracious and spared the rest. Another boy was in hospital with an abscess in his back; he was convalescent, and we were expecting his return home within a few days, but one morning he was missing, and all inquiries, both privately and through the police, failed to discover his whereabouts. At the time of writing my family numbers 39, two of whom are in hospital.

"Boys are much the same all the world over. These love a good game, and are capable of enjoying a little fun, as well as showing a propensity for mischief. The development of this faculty was an interesting study. On their arrival there was no fun, no merry laughter; but gradually things changed, games were introduced, and, out-of-school hours, their merry laughter rings throughout the compound.

"Their behaviour is excellent; and while I cannot say that all are Christians, I can say that all of them know something of Jesus, and some of them have really given their hearts to Him.

"We meet together every morning for prayer, and usually a short talk on some Biblical subject. The boys manifest an interest in all Bible stories,

"I am grateful to the friends in Berhampore and in England, who have come forward offering to support a boy. In this way the support of twelve is guaranteed. There are still 27 more needing support; and I shall be pleased to hear from the Secretary of any C.E. Society or Sunday-school who would like to support a boy of their own."

GIRLS' FAMINE ORPHANAGE, BERHAMPORE.

The Girls' Famine Orphanage is under the charge of Mrs. Long, wife of the Rev. A. Long, one of the missionaries at Berhampore. He writes:—

"My wife has devoted herself whole-heartedly to the service of the children, and it has been grievous for her to see seventeen of our dear little famine orphan girls taken away, in spite of every effort to save them. The terrible effects of the famine had undermined their constitution, and one by one they succumbed to dysentery or kindred complaints. However, we still have forty-one girls, and Mr. Jarry has thirty-nine boys. They have learned a number of children's hymns, and are always ready for some Bible story. Miss Ottmann (lady doctor) and Miss Dawson, of the Zenana Society, have been exceedingly kind and helpful to the children. So far eight friends in England, India, and Rangoon have undertaken the support of individual orphans. To these we tender our warmest thanks, and trust that others will follow their example. I shall be glad to correspond with any C.E. Society or Sunday-school that may be willing to undertake the support of an orphan."

WORK AMONGST ENGLISH-SPEAKING NATIYE STUDENTS.

Very interesting and specially encouraging work has been carried on during the past year amongst the native students in Government and other colleges and other educated young men,

Mr. B. A. Nag, who is stationed in the capital city of Calcutta, writes:-

"As I look back and think of the many manifestations of His goodness to me during the year just closed, my heart is full of joy and gratefulness to the Lord. He has greatly cheered me and encouraged me by bringing at least one soul from the darkness of heathenism and thraldom of sin into His Kingdom. The story of this brother's conversion from Hinduism is an interesting one, and it shows what a mighty Saviour Jesus is. Not long after this brother had begun to study the Word of God with me he felt deeply stirred in his soul about his sins and their consequences. Several were the passages on sin and salvation that we read together every morning. Often did we go down on our knees beseeching God's mercy, but my young friend seemed to go away as restless as he came. One evening, however, he came to see me with a bundle of photographs, and, on being questioned about them, he said that he had brought them on purpose to tell me all about them. 'Two years ago,' said he 'I, as a senior student of the Government Art School, was engaged by the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal to stencil his rooms. I found these photographs in one of his rooms and stole them. I now learn from the Bible that in order to be reconciled to God I must be right with the Lieutenant-Governor, whom I have wronged. And so I have brought these photographs to you that you may help me to return them to him.' Such a frank confession on the part of our brother brought us at once into the presence of God, and we both knelt down and I thanked God for the glorious working of His Spirit in our brother's heart and for such a proof of the genuineness of his conversion. After prayer I said to him, 'Do you know, brother, that Sir John Woodburn, the Lieutenant-Governor, may send you to jail? Are you prepared for that?' He said, 'Yes, I will not mind that if it will bring relief to my conscience.' I dismissed him after this, and went and saw Mr. Anderson, our secretary, and told him everything. He felt deeply interested in the case, and on the next morning sent to Sir John the photographs with a letter telling him all about them. Though with me it was a time of very anxious prayer, this dear brother seemed to have perfect peace, and was prepared to be apprehended by the police and sent to jail. But a very kind letter of pardon from Sir John brought much joy and comfort to our hearts. Sir John wrote :-

"'DEAR MB. ANDERSON,—I am sorry young yielded to the temptation—but I can understand it. The photographs were never missed, so his confession is altogether spontaneous. Tell him I completely forgive him, and am quite sure from the frankness and honesty of his admission to you that there is no real harm in the lad.—Yours sincerely, (Signed) J. WOODBURN.'

"Soon after this I was privileged to lead this brother through baptism into fuller discipleship of Christ. For a time after his baptism his father tried in every possible way to persuade him to recant, but when he failed he cast him out from his home. His father did not allow him to have any coat or shirt or shoes on, but drove him naked out of the house. He is a well-connected young man. He is a near relative of the late Keshub Chunder Sen, the great leader of the Brahma Samaj, and one of his first cousins is a Judge of the High Court of Calcutta. He, I am glad to say, though cut off from father and mother's love, and the joys of home, is rejoicing in the salvation he has obtained in Jesus.

"I never realised half as much as I did this year the great responsibility that is ours in dealing with souls. I remember a very pathetic case of a Hindu young man who used to read the Bible with me. He also was a graduate. On the New Year's Day when I returned home in the morning very tired after taking three services, one after another, I found this young man waiting to have his Bible lesson. I said to

him: 'I am very tired now and hungry, for I have not had my breakfast yet, so please come to-morrow.' 'Sir,' said he, 'this is New Year's Day, and shall I begin this year without any lesson from the Word of God?' I was very much impressed by the way he spoke, and I did not want to show him that a Christian preacher was less anxious to give lessons in the Bible than he was to have them, and so I let go my breakfas and had a very solemn time together with God. He prayed as he never did before, committing himself to Christ. When he rose from his knees he looked a different man, and we parted with great joy in our hearts. But, oh, how sad! I did not see him any more. For on that very evening he was down with fever, and got small-pox and died within a few days. I trust Jesus accepted him on New Year's Day, and that he was right with God. But I have often asked myself, 'Would God have forgiven me if I had refused to give him any Bible lesson on that day?'

"The spirit of inquiry seems to be rife amongst the people just now. I have been agreeably surprised to find many elderly men anxious to know more about Jesus. I sometimes have had men as old as my father come and read the Bible with me. I do not mean to say that there is no opposition now, but if the opposition is strong the spirit of inquiry is stronger still."

The Rev. W. S. Page, who has succeeded the Rev. W. Carey in charge of the work in Dacca City and district, reports:—

"Following the plan adopted by Mr. Hay and Mr. Carey I have devoted the greater portion of my time to work amongst the students, of whom there are about six or seven thousand studying in the various institutions in the town.

"Every Sunday evening during the College session an English lecture has been delivered to an audience of students in the chapel, which has frequently been inconveniently crowded. Courses of lectures have been delivered on 'Primitive Christian Missions,' 'Bible Study,' and 'The Contents of the Bible,' besides single lectures on such subjects as 'Idolatry,' 'Sin,' 'Faith,' 'Heaven and Hell.' Mr. Summers, of Scrampore, and Mr. Ransford, of Narayanganj, have also lectured several times.

"For a long time I have felt the need of a newspaper for students, to be conducted on Christian lines. It is true that there already exists The Epiphany, a weekly paper edited by members of the Oxford Mission, which aims at bringing Christian truth before students. But by its sacerdotal tendencies it does a great deal of harm as well as good. And, further, it is almost entirely devoted to correspondence and questions. It contains very few articles and no news. For these reasons it can never become selfsupporting. What I have felt to be needed (especially in East Bengal) is a Christian paper of an evangelistic tone, that shall contain school and college news and articles on matters of general interest to students, so that it may be able to command a sale both amongst boys and young men now studying in the various colleges, and also amongst those whose college days are over, but who wish to keep in touch with student life. With this in view I have started a students' paper, which is called The Students' Chronicle. The first number appeared at the beginning of September, and I have already been greatly encouraged by the interest which has been manifested in the paper. I have secured fifteen regular correspondents in as many different schools and colleges, and the list of subscribers is steadily growing. Of course, for the present, the paper is an experiment. I hope to continue it for one year at least, and by that time I shall be able to form an idea as to its usefulness, and the probability of its becoming popular amongst the class it is intended to reach.

"We are not without ample evidence of the Spirit's working in the hearts of some who have not as yet had the courage to boldly confess Christ. There are two young men, in particular, for whom we are praying that grace may be given them to take this decisive step. We are convinced that they are sincere believers in Jesus Christ, and they both recognise that it is their duty to be baptized, but they shrink from all that baptism will mean to them from a social point of view. There is need that God's people should earnestly pray for these, and such as these, that they may be made strong to bear hardness as good soldiers of Christ Jesus."

The Rev. W. D. Millar, reporting from Barisal, writes :-

"The main impression which remains with me of this my first year in India is that of the remarkable opening which seems to be prepared for us in the work among the educated classes of this country. When I say this, I would specially emphasise the great opportunity, which is ours, for reaching the young life of Bengal—the native students whom we meet everywhere. In all three places— Barisal, Madaripur, and Pirojpur-I have found golden opportunities for laying a good foundation of Christian truth. What strikes one is the readiness with which you can find access to the minds and hearts of the youths. In Barisal the work opened up very easily and very quickly. Many of the students remembered and spoke of the work done by Mr. Page, and also by Mr. Carey. A very simple and ready method of reaching the students I found was that of individual and personal contact with them. There was no difficulty in obtaining this. Each afternoon numbers of students used to come to see me at the mission house, and I adopted the plan of taking them out in companies together for walks. In this way I had many talks with the students, and tried as far as possible to get them to express their difficulties and open their minds. Of those who thus saw me, some became like close personal friends, and with these one was able to enter more deeply into those subjects to which one had devoted his life. It was often like recalling the early apostolic days, to begin expounding simply, and in easy language, the plain, fundamental truths of Christianity. The doctrines of the Cross, of the Divinity of Christ, of the love of God and forgiveness of sins, had all to be gone over carefully and in simple speech.

"Another feature of the work at Barisal was the Sunday evening lecture. Our preaching-hall, situated in the centre of the town, was admirably suited for this. By dint of visiting the students week by week in their own lodgings, and advertising the meetings well, we were able to have the hall pretty well crowded every Sunday night. Lectures were given on various topics Sunday by Sunday; our special aim always being to clearly emphasise the first principles of the Gospel of Christ. In this work my fellow missionaries, brethren Spurgeon, Watson, and Milne, lent much valuable aid, as opportunity afforded. In the larger public meeting, of course, one had a wider sphere of influence; and it was frequently a means for further personal discussion of the topics with students who came to me afterwards. Besides the Sunday evening lectures, a general Bible-class was formed for the students. The class was open to all the students, and boys came from all stages in the curriculum, but chiefly from the more advanced classes."

The Rev. A. E. Collier, of Patna City, reporting upon student work in the large and important centre of Patna, writes:—

"On the outbreak of plague in November of last year, the people became panicstricken, and all the students fled from the place. We tried to open a temporary hostel and induce the students to remain, but it was of no avail: they hastened to leave this plague-infected town. The Government college had twenty-eight students for about three months, but the other college and schools closed entirely. All our work was suspended, there was no one to attend the Bible-classes or meetings. The people from Bankipore and Patna scattered all over the district, carrying the plague with them. It was not till July, when the plague had disappeared, that the colleges and schools re-opened, and then with greatly diminished numbers, owing to the fear of a fresh outbreak of the disease this cold season. In the meantime we had removed to Gulzarbagh, and I have not been able, owing to the distance and other work, to do so much amongst the students as hitherto.

"The reading room opened in Bankipore five years ago has been greatly appreciated, and increased in usefulness; but we found that the increasing expenditure for books, papers, &c., was beyond the means at our disposal. I also felt that a larger sum of mission money should not be spent in this manner. For some time I tried to collect money locally, but without much success until the 'Behar Young Men's Institute' was formed last year. Some of the officials and local gentry have taken an interest in this society, and it promises to do a very useful work amongst the students. As secretary of the institute I come into touch with a larger number of students and teachers, many opportunities are afforded for evangelistic work, and the influence over the young men is, I trust, beneficial in many ways. The students are always welcome at my house, and I meet with them there and elsewhere for Bible study and religious conversation.

"The institute has now taken over the entire expense of the library and reading-room, a saving to the B.M.S. of Rs. 400 a year."

TRANSLATION AND LITERARY WORK. MISSION PRINTING PRESSES.

CALCUTTA.

Dr. Rouse sends the following report:

"On my return from England I found that the reprint of the two editions of the Bengali Bible—one in the usual type and one a little larger—was going on; but it was clear that at the rate at which it was progressing the reprint would not be finished by the time that the edition of 1897 was exhausted. I therefore urged that the printing should be expedited, and this is being done. I hope the new edition will be out by the end of 1902, perhaps a little earlier.

"One of the first things I had to see about on my arrival was the final revision and stereotyping of the Bengali Bible. The carrying out of this has been delayed by various things; but I hope preliminaries are now so far settled that we shall be able to carry on the work steadily, and at a fair rate, from the beginning of the new year. We have selected a new kind of type, which is not only clearer than the old, but will also, we hope, save about sixty pages in the bulk of the Bible. We have stereotyped eleven pages; and with the increased fount of type, new arrangements to avoid delay, and the help we expect to receive from Mr. Norledge, I hope the work will progress at a satisfactory rate. It is satisfactory that, four years after the issue of the Revised Bible in 1897, we should still feel that so little needs to be changed, and that we have so little adverse criticism from any quarter. We propose to put parts of the Prophetical Books in lyrical form, like the poetical parts of the English

Revised Bible. The idea was suggested by Dr. Moulton's 'Modern English Bible.' The nature of Hebrew poetry makes it very easy for the lofty prose of the Prophets to slide over into what is really poetry; and passages like Is. xii. and liii. seem more beautiful and forceful when put in lyrical form.

"In the 1892 edition of the Bible we put very brief references and notes at the foot of the page. These were not inserted either in the 1897 edition or in the one now passing through the press. Many have expressed regret at this, and we are therefore reprinting these notes and references separately, in larger type, and on paper of the same size as that of the Bible, so that they can be bound up with the Bible if desired.

"We are bringing out new stereo editions of Matthew and of Genesis i.-ix., taking the Revised Version as the basis.

"Some years ago the Bengal Conference passed a resolution that, instead of issuing Ruth and Esther, we should make a compilation of teaching regarding Old Testament women. This has now been prepared by Mrs. Summers and the Serampore Bengali brethren, and the printing of the book will shortly commence.

"Apart from B.T.S. work I have to report the completion of the Commentary on Exodus and Leviticus for the Calcutta Tract Society. The notes up to Lev. xv. had been prepared by 1898; the remainder has been completed since my return. These books cover most of the Levitical ritual, and I have sought to bring out its spiritual significance.

"I have brought out two more English tracts for Mohammedans, which are published by the C.L.S., Madras. They are called 'God, our Father,' and 'The Nature of God.' The first has as its central thought to teach the Divine Sonship of our Lord, but it is connected with the general subject of the Fatherhood of God, and the special subject of our adoption as children of God, in Christ the great Son of God. This tract, of course, is intended for general distribution. The second tract is on the Trinity, and is intended for use only with inquirers or objectors. Both tracts are to be put into Bengali and Urdu. I have also heard from Cairo that the missionaries there wish to put 'God, our Father' into Arabic. I have also written two leaflets in Mussalmani-Bengali, on 'Who will Intercede for Us?' and 'Is the Gospel Abrogated?'

"I am preparing in English something on the lines of the Oxford or Cambridge 'Helps to the Study of the Bible.' I hope in time it may be put into Bengali.

"A new edition of 'Pilgrim's Progress' is passing through the press, under the editorship of Babu H. C. Raha. I see the proofs and make suggestions to him."

CUTTACK, ORISSA.

COMPLETION OF ORIYA OLD TESTAMENT REVISION.

The Rev. Thomas Bailey has been able during the past year to complete the Revision of the Oriya Old Testament, an undertaking commenced by the late Dr. Buckley, assisted by the Rev. Shem Sahu, many years ago. Mr. Bailey writes:—

"We present this our last report of the Revision of the Oriya Old Testament with feelings of unspeakable relief, and with devout gratitude to God. For some years it has been practically impossible to purchase a complete copy of the Bible in the Oriya language. Applications have been many and frequent, and it has been with

great regret that we have had to reply in every case that none were available. We shall henceforth be able to meet all the demands likely to be made upon us in this direction, and we fully trust that the result will be a more general and devout study of the inspired writings through the length and breadth of the Oriya-speaking Province.

"A review of the history of this version suggests many sober and instructive reflections. The late Dr. Buckley, assisted by Brother Shem Sahu, began the work and had proceeded as far as Psalm lxxxiv. when Dr. Buckley was called to his rest and reward. It was then entrusted to Mr. Miller with Brother Shem Sahu assisting as his colleague, and was carried forward by them to Ezekiel, chap. xv. It was then committed to the writer of this report with Brother Shem Sahu as his assistant and colleague, and was continued to near the end of Ezekiel; after which it was made over to Mr. Pike, with Brother Shem Sahu as assistant, and Babu Soda Sebo Praharaj as Pundit, and was carried forward by them to the end of Hoses.

"In the meantime the nature of the work had undergone an important change. The merits of the Revised English Version had come to be generally recognised, and it was ultimately accepted as the standard of interpretation, so that practically the whole of the work had to be done over again; at the same time, all that was available in the former renderings was carefully utilised. Printing was begun by Mr. Pike, Mr. Vaughan carefully examining each proof as it passed through the press, and was carried on to 1 Samuel, chap. xx., ver. 9, with copy prepared to the end of 2 Samuel; from which point it was taken up by the present writer on his return from furlough at the end of 1894, and by direction of the Home Committee. Mr. Vaughan continued his assistance, Brother Shem Sahu and Babu Soda Sebo Praharaj also continued their services till the death of the latter in 1898, when Sridhara Das, a Hindu Brahmin of mature experience and competent scholarship, was engaged as Pundit, and has continued to work with us to the end. At the Orissa Mission Conference held in 1897, on Mr. Vaughan being transferred to Sambalpur, Mr. Pike was requested to assist in the work, and has rendered valuable service. Proofs have also been supplied to the Revs. A. H. Young, M.A., Niladri Naik and Doli Patra, who have made useful and important suggestions.

"As to the merits of the work, it is for others to speak. It may, however, be said that in the case of such books as have been printed separately, to be distributed as portions, it has proved acceptable to the people generally. Our constant endeavour has been to use such language only as is understood by the common people, current idiomatic Oriya, neither too colloquial on the one hand nor too scholarly on the other, more learned expressions having been at all times rejected when the idea could be suitably and adequately expressed in simpler forms.

"It will be seen from the foregoing that such merits as belong to this version can be claimed by no single individual, but the largest share of the actual labour involved has fallen to the lot of my much respected colleague, the Rev. Shem Sahu, who has been identified with it from the beginning and has, with myself, been intensely anxious to see it carried through to the end.

"It should be noted that the paper for this edition was specially selected and sent out from England by the British and Foreign Bible Society. Great care has also been bestowed upon the printing, the type used having been specially cast for the purpose. The cost of the printing has been borne by the same Society, who have, in addition, made us an annual grant, amounting of late years to Rs. 600 towards the work. We cannot express our gratitude too warmly for the patient and persevering liberality displayed by this great Society in connection with the whole undertaking."

TRACT CIRCULATION.

During the past year there has been a large increase in the number of Tracts printed and circulated, and a marked readiness on the part of the people to receive these quiet messengers of Gospel truth.

The Rev. W. R. James reports:

"I have written four tracts, three in English, and one in Bengali. Two of them were written with reference to our late beloved Queen. 'Our late Queen-Empress' was the title of one, and 'The Sympathy of our Late Sovereign' that of the other. These were published by the Tract Society, and two editions of each were issued, the total being, if I remember rightly, forty thousand. 'The Plague' was the title of the third. This was a small tract of only two pages, and published at my own expense. It was a summary of the eighteenth chapter of Deuteronomy, a chapter which should be read and carefully studied by all English people, especially by our rulers. Only five hundred copies were printed. 'Christer Paphihinata,' 'Christ's Freedom from Sin,' is the title of the Bengali tract. Years ago I wrote another on the same subject, which has passed through twelve editions, and has reached a total of about ninety thousand. Ten thousand copies of the new one have been issued, and both it and the old one are published by the Tract Society. The tract which I wrote last year, 'Christianity Compared with other Religions,' has reached its fourth edition with a total of thirty-three thousand. It has also appeared in half-a-dozen or more of the religious journals of India, and has been translated into Hindustani. Besides, it is to appear shortly in Bengali dress, and one of the Baptist missionaries of Burma lately asked me to supply him with an English copy, saying that he wished to put it into Burmese. Thus it will be seen that it has already obtained a very wide circulation; and considering that it consists of about eighty propositions, and that everyone of them is really a challenge, though, of course, I do not say so, it is not a little remarkable that no paper, as far as I am aware, has called any one of them in question. One had to be extra careful in composing a tract containing about four-score challenges, and every proposition was weighed again and again before it was allowed to appear in print. The fact that no one has attempted to deny their accuracy inspires the writer with the con fidence that they are all well within the bounds of truth and cannot be gainsaid. Another old tract, which was a little altered and re-issued, is entitled 'The Uniqueness of Christ's Character and Work.' This is the third edition, with a total of sixteen thousand.

"During the early part of the year K. N. Mukerji, John Stephen, and myself made it a point to meet once a week at each of the crossings of the tramcars at the west end of Dhurrumtollah and the northern end of Bentinck Street for the purpose of giving away tracts. The above crossings are most advantageous for this purpose. Thousands of clerks and others return every evening from the offices. This work was most encouraging. It was very seldom that anyone refused a tract. Thousands received them gladly, many thanking us heartily for the leaflet put into their hands. I judge from the readiness with which our tracts—Bengali, Hindustani, and English—were and are received that the truth is slowly stealing into the minds of the inhabitants of this great Indian city. Large bundles of tracts were given away each time in the tramcars, and although the distribution was simply a labour of sowing, yet we had not a little joy in the work, though not unmixed with disappointment. 'Truly the kingdom of God is as if a man should cast seed into the ground, and should sleep, and rise night and day, and the seed should spring

and grow up, he knoweth not how.' The seed is sown broadcast, and in a moment it goes out of the hand of the sower, but God always watches over it, for He is much more interested in the coming of His Kingdom than we can possibly be.

"I cannot conclude this report without a reference to the Hindu papers of this Presidency. Considering the great influence they wield over Bengalis, their attitude towards Christianity, whether hostile or friendly, must be of great interest to the Christian missionary. Two changes I have noticed with regard to non-Christian journals. First, they are often contradicted by Bengali Christians whenever they contain false statements about missionaries and converts. Formerly it was too much the fashion to allow such statements to go unchallenged. That, I am happy to observe, has greatly altered of late. Now, if a vernacular or an English organ gives currency to any gross falsehood it is immediately pilloried; and this has made many editors more cautious than they would otherwise have been. Christians are coming to the front, and many of them are attaining to positions of trust under Government and of influence in society, and it is a good omen that many of them are fully alive to the fact that any reflection on the community to which they belong is injurious to themselves. Secondly, notices of the progress of Christianity in India are frequently characterised by a tone of despair for the future of Hinduism."

CUTTACK PRINTING PRESS.

Superintendent-Rev. R. J. GRUNDY,

The Rev. R. J. Grundy reports as follows:-

"The beginning of April, 1901, marked my arrival in Cuttack to take over charge of the Press from Mr. Harvey, who now superintends the Mission Press in Calcutta. It was a most agreeable surprise to find an office so well adapted to the work, and a method of management that left little to be desired. This, no doubt, was due to the untiring exertions of my predecessor, and I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without putting on record my high appreciation and sincere thankfulness, work has gone steadily on during the year. The amount of Christian literature printed has been considerable, as will be seen from the subjoined list. It is gratifying to note that the end of September sees us well on towards the completion of the demy 8vo edition of the Old Testament. This work (translating and printing) has been in hand several years, but it is now highly probable that the first copies will be ready by the end of November. The New Testament is also well in hand. Printing is now completed to the end of 2 Corinthians, and it is our hope to have the whole finished and ready for sale early in 1902. The 'Life of Christ' in Oriya, which has been extended to 204 pages, still continues to be a great favourite, and a further edition of 20,000 has been printed. This work is now in its 66th thousand. We cannot estimate what great good the extensive distribution of this book may accomplish, as it sets forth the life of the Saviour simply, yet forcibly, and as nearly as possible in the language of Scripture. Surely the seed thus sown must bear fruit. 'My Word shall not return unto Me void,' saith the Lord, and 'He is faithful that promised.'

"While there are many books and tracts specially adapted for non-Christians there is a great lack of literature calculated to build up the Christian life of those who have professed Christ. It is, therefore, gratifying to record that two books have now been printed, through the generosity of friends connected with the Australian Mission (conducted by Miss K. R. Allanby in Morbhan), especially for the use of our Christian communities. These are 'Daily Light on the Daily Path,' and a 'Holy Life and How to Live It.' The latter is a translation from a work by the late Rev. G. H. C. Macgregor, M.A. Again we would call the attention of friends at home to this particular branch of work. The resources of the society are such that they find it impossible to do more than provide tracts for work among the heathen. But surely if at home books are needed for help in the Christian warfare, much more so will they be needed in a country like India. Are there not, therefore, those who would be glad to help in this work, by providing the means for publishing some of the books which have proved their worth in building up Christian character? A translation of 'The Teachings of Christ' from Adeney's New Testament Theology has been printed, more particularly for the use of Bible students; and during the coming year a translation of Dr. Newman Hall's work on the Atonement' will be published. ANGLO-INDIAN BAPTIST CHURCHES.

The Society has always exhibited the fullest sympathy with the good work carried on by the Anglo-Indian Baptist Churches:—

The following Reports from Missionaries in various parts of India indicate very clearly that the Society, in addition to vernacular work, is doing all it can to help and foster the spiritual welfare of Europeans.

The Rev. W. S. Page, of Dacca, reports :-

"We have held an English service regularly on Sunday evenings for Europeans, and the fact that our congregations have seldom numbered less than twenty, and have more than once risen to forty, shows plainly that there was need for such a service. As an outcome of this service we have formed a small English church, and we are hoping before long to welcome into fellowship with us some of our own countrymen in whose hearts God's Spirit seems to be working. One other noticeable effect of this special effort has been the greater willingness of European residents to subscribe to our local funds and the greater interest taken by them in our general mission work."

The Rev. T. O. Ransford, of Narayangunge, writes :-

"Our English service is an inspiration. One fights all the week and then on Sunday evening is transported into an atmosphere of sympathy. 'Social worship—an everlasting necessity'—how true that is! The attendance has again been good—the subscription list if not 'a thing of beauty' yet 'a joy'—so far. The warm welcome one receives, the kindly word of appreciation—these amply repay for all added labour, if, indeed, reward were needed. The Rs. 100 a month subscription to the Mission has been maintained. The sum of Rs. 85-2 was sent as the fruits of a collection one Sunday for starving Mugh Christians in the Chittagong district. We are all one in Christ. Help of any kind has always been forthcoming. Some of it we cannot measure. Who shall ever tell the value of a kindly thought or a sympathising word? Yet a cup of cold water in the name of Christ is not a little thing."

The Rev. B. Evans, of Dinapore, reports:-

"We have maintained the English service; this, instead of being a hindrance to us, has been helpful—there is rest in change and refreshment in variety. Though the membership is very small, yet, having a Protestant regiment in the station, our

evening services are well attended. Many of our army men, having served their time with the colours, settle in India, and so become in the social life of the land either a power for good or evil; and if there is aught we can do to help them towards all that is best and true and noble in life, it is ours to do it: hence the joy we have in their service. I feel thankful to the many friends who have aided me with books, magazines, and papers, which I have been able to place on the tables in the vestry for the men to read or distribute in the hospital."

The Rev. W. J. Price, of Monghyr, writes :-

"At the English services conducted by the missionaries at Monghyr and at Jamalpore, two persons have professed conversion, and have since returned to England and been baptized. Others have received uplifting. The congregations at Jamalpore have been unusually good."

The Rev. T. H. Barnett, of Howrah, reports:-

"The English services have been conducted in the church throughout the year. Four persons have joined the Church by baptism. The church has raised Rs. 1,323-0-9 during the year. This sum includes subscriptions for church expenses, for the mission, for the Sunday-school and the Sunday-school picnic, for the cemetery, and for the poor. As heretofore, the church has supported a vernacular preacher, Dinanath Sarkar."

The following English Baptist churches are able to maintain their own Pastors and meet all the expenses of conducting public worship:—

CALCUTTA CIRCULAR ROAD CHURCH.

Pastor-The Rev. A. North.

"The work of the Circular Road Church has been carried on through the year under the pastoral care of the Rev. A. North, who entered upon the pastorate in the November of 1900. There is nothing of special moment to record. The membership of the church has been fully maintained, and the organisations connected with it have steadily fulfilled their functions. The constituency is not a large one; and the difficulties hampering the efforts of the church during the year have been serious, but the members with their officers are confronting the new year in the spirit of unity and with hope.

"The number of members now upon the roll is 148, of whom 39 reside at a distance from the city."

HAYELOCK BAPTIST CHURCH, AGRA.

Pastor-The Rev. J. DRAKE.

"A good congregation, an earnest, inner circle of members and friends, a record of fruitful work, and an expectation of further mercies and victories—these were the elements present, and in progressive operation, when, some eight months ago we first entered the substantial and stately building that bears the name and is intimately associated with the honoured memory of Havelock. Since then, not-withstanding the drawbacks of exceptionally hot and rainless seasons, during which many of our people, both soldiers and civilians, have been absent at the hills, the congregations have been encouragingly constant; and now, with the approach of

the cold season, it is quite an inspiring spectacle to look upon the large assemblies that attend the Sabbath services of our up-country church.

- "The soldier-converts who have been gathered during the past two or three years are maintaining, with but rare exceptions, a steady and consistent profession. Two or three, who had wavered and wandered, have recently returned and renewed their yows.
- "Our Temperance Association is a good auxiliary in the work among the soldiers, as too often the drink is *the* stumbling block to the British soldier in India, both in its immediate, baneful effects, and in the part it plays as a minister to other forms of vice.
- "Our branch of the Soldiers' Christian Association has continued its good work, creating an atmosphere of Christian fellowship, where the soldier of Christ can breathe the air of heaven, and again return to his common duties and the often profane air of the barrack-room, strengthened to walk in newness of life.
- "Our mid-week preaching services and Saturday evening prayer meetings have also been to many as 'the brook by the way,' where the pilgrim could drink, and 'lift up the head' refreshed."

As no reports have been received from the following churches we are unable to do more than mention their names: Calcutta, Lal Bazaar Church; Bombay Baptist Church, and Allahabad Baptist Church.

In the annual report for last year the Committee stated that the Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., of Leicester, had kindly consented, in compliance with their earnest request, to visit Ceylon on his contemplated voyage to New Zealand, and report upon the condition and prospects of the work in that island.

Mr. Greenhough, soon after his arrival in Colombo, reported to the Committee the serious condition of the health of Mrs. Lapham, which, in the judgment of her medical advisers, demanded an immediate return to England, it being absolutely needful, in their opinion, that Mr. Lapham should voyage with his wife.

Under these circumstances, and in view of the prospect of Mr. Bruce Etherington being left quite alone in Ceylon, the Committee earnestly requested the Rev. F. D. Waldock to return to Ceylon for a short term of, say, twelve or eighteen months, with a view to carrying on the work in the Colombo District until further and more permanent plans could be made for reinforcement of the staff. Mr. Waldock's long experience of Ceylon work and the affectionate regard in which he was held by all the workers rendered such an arrangement supremely desirable.

In view of the emergency, and with an earnest desire to relieve the anxiety of the Committee, Mr. Waldock generously consented to leave England at once, and the Committee recorded their grateful thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Waldock in the following minute:—

Resolved.—"That the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society have received Mr. Waldock's acceptance of their request with cordial pleasure, and desire specially to record their warm appreciation of the self-sacrificing spirit in which Mrs. Waldock has consented to the departure of her husband; a further proof of the deep personal interest she takes in the work of the Society in Ceylon, on behalf of which she has so faithfully and efficiently laboured for a long term of years."

Early in the autumn Mr. and Mrs. Lapham reached England. The Committee are thankful to report some improvement in the health of Mrs. Lapham, and they earnestly trust she may be fully restored. The Committee deeply sympathise with both Mr. and Mrs. Lapham in this affliction. Mr. Greenhough paid a second visit to Ceylon on his homeward voyage, and since his return to England has presented a valuable report, which is at present under the careful consideration of the Committee.

At their meeting in March the Committee unanimously passed the following resolution:—

Resolved.—"That the grateful thanks of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society be given to the Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., for his kind compliance with their request to visit the mission stations in Ceylon, and for the valuable report which he has presented to them."

They further determined to send out at the earliest date practicable two new missionaries to Ceylon, and at the same meeting they cordially accepted the offer for service in that island of Mr. Ewing, of Rawdon College, who will leave for Ceylon in the early autumn.

Referring to the work of the Society in Ceylon, Mr. Greenhough writes:—

I am pleased to report, as the result of careful inquiries made in all parts of the field from friendly or independent but entirely disinterested witnesses, that our Mission has an exceedingly high reputation in the island. The missionaries of other

societies speak of it with genuine respect, and even unstinted admiration, and their testimony is endorsed by Christian laymen of all denominations. Some of the past workers are referred to in terms of almost affectionate reverence, and the men at present in the field are regarded as their worthy successors. I have heard no hint in any quarter that our labours have been unproductive, or even disappointing, as compared with the general result of Christian Missions in Ceylon. The universal verdict is that the work has been good and profitable, but that there has been far too little of it. Everywhere I heard the wish and hope expressed that our scanty forces might be largely augmented. On this point I trust that an opportunity may be given me of pleading with the Committee, and would only say here that three new men at least should be immediately sent out: one to relieve and support Mr. Etherington in his terribly lonely post at Matale-lonely in a degree which only an eye-witness can understand; a second to superintend and push forward the work in the Sabaragamuwa District, of which more will be said further on; and a third for the Colombo District, which is imperative if Mr. Lapham should not return, and preeminently desirable if he does. Everyone who surveys our work and its possibilities will be painfully impressed, as I have been, with the numerical feebleness of the Missionary Staff."

And in closing his report Mr. Greenhough says:—

"Everywhere there are indications that Gospel truths are slowly filtering through the dense mass of ignorance and obstruction, and the minds of the people almost unconsciously opening to the heavenly doctrine. The missionary is nearly everywhere received with respect, and even with a kindly welcome, and he never preaches n building or open air without securing a company of silent and interested hearers. He makes a few converts, but he scatters beams of light through thousands of nquiring minds, and lips that once knew no magic sound save Buddha are beginning to repeat familiarly and even reverently the sweetest and highest Name of all. The night of waiting has been long in this beautiful island, but there are now sure signs of the dawn, and it may be that the dawn will be hastened by the immense advances which are being made in the education of the people. It will be no long time before every child is brought to school.

"In any case, this is not the time to turn back or speak to ourselves the language of doubt. It is a time to be more persistent and hopeful. The work is tremendously difficult. Buddha, in this his stronghold, is the hardest of all heathen foes to fight; but the courage of Christ's servants is not to be dismayed by that. We shall not grow weary in well-doing because the waiting is painful and tedious; we shall see the fruits of our labour and the rewards of patience, perhaps, before some of us taste of death."

The Rev. F. D. Waldock, who only reached Colombo in November of last year, has been unable to do more than send home a brief summary of the reports received from the Evangelists, and from the Pastors of the Native Christian Churches.

THE COLOMBO DISTRICT.

REPORT OF COLOMBO NATIVE CHRISTIAN GIRLS' BOARDING SCHOOL.

Lady Principal-Miss Helen Moodie.

The following report has been written by Miss D. M. Lapham, who,

during the absence in England on furlough of Miss Moodie, has been acting as Lady Principal.

Miss Moodie contemplates returning to Ceylon in June next, having derived much good from her stay in England, and on her arrival in Colombo she will resume her previous work.

Miss Lapham writes :--

"Miss Moodie proceeded to England on furlough in April, 1901, when I was put in charge of our Colombo Boarding School, and school work began as usual at the new term, June.

"It was found necessary to make one or two small alterations in regard to school hours, and we diminished our school staff by a pupil teacher.

"After the death of Mr. Brumpy, our former pundit, Mr. de Saram, the mission literary adviser, undertook the Singhalese teaching, and under his tutorship the girls made good progress.

"The average attendance daily during the year was about forty-two, and at the end of the year we had forty-nine names on the roll. This term we have not had such a large school, in consequence of some of the girls having left after the examination, but I have no doubt that in a little time we shall have just as large an attendance.

"The yearly examination was held on November 18th and 19th, and out of thirty-eight scholars examined only one girl in the sixth failed to pass her standard. We got ninety-one per cent. passes, and the examiner's report on the school and its work was a very satisfactory one.

"A great number of the girls come from Christian homes, but we have also not a few whose parents are Buddhists, and yet are willing that their children should be taught the Christian faith. Most of the English-speaking girls take a great interest in the Band of Hope, which is held in connection with the Cinnamon Gardens Baptist Chapel.

"On one afternoon in the week Mr. S. R. Perera comes to the school and holds a meeting in Singhalese, and on Saturday evenings we hold a short prayer meeting with the elder girls, whilst on Sundays they have Sunday-school, Singhalese service, and as many as wish attend the English morning service. Several of the girls, though they have not professed their faith by baptism, are by their daily lives in school and out showing that they are followers of Christ."

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Evangelists have been working during the past year in the following Colombo districts—viz., Colombo, South; Avisawella, 28 miles inland; Chilaw, 50 miles northwards on the sea coast; Diyagama, 25 miles to the south of Colombo; Kanduboda, 15 miles inland from Colombo; Kandana, 10 miles from Colombo; Ranala, 16 miles inland from Colombo; Rayigam Koale, 17 miles south and 8 inland; Veyangoda, 20 miles from Colombo; and North Colombo and Waragoda, Welipenna, and Agalawatta, 33 miles south of Colombo and 8 inland; and Wisidagama.

The inhabitants of most of these districts are Buddhists, but in two or three cases there are a few Roman Catholics,

With regard to Colombo South Mr. Waldock reports:-

"Up to October, Mr. Aponso, who has now removed to Rayigam Koale, was our agent here. Before leaving he had the pleasure of baptizing two young men who were regular attendants at his Singhalese Sunday morning service in the old Pettah Chapel, and also four other young persons, who came from Stendala. Mr. S. R. Perera, formerly of Kandána, is now stationed here, and continues the Bible-class at the Boarding-school and the service in the Pettah, besides visitation and open-air services."

From many of the other stations the reports indicate strong Buddhist opposition, a few baptisms, and some cheering signs of coming blessing.

THE KANDY AND SABARAGAMUWA DISTRICTS.

The Rev. Bruce Etherington, B.A., reports as follows:-

"In presenting my first report, I am constrained at the outset to express my deep sense of gratitude for what God has done for us in the year that is now past, and, secondly, to place on record the one outstanding impression of our work in Ceylon that seems to overlie everything, and to outweigh every other consideration, namely, the pressing, over-burdening need of immediate reinforcements.

"Next to the ever-present and ever-fundamental need of the presence and power of the Divine Spirit to energise our workers, the one supreme need, humanly speaking, of the Ceylon Mission, for the present and for the future—more needed than the money to finance our continual-increasing work—is the imperative want of missionaries.

"On every hand calls to work-calls to join the native brethren in direct preaching work, heathen audiences at our very doors, heathen within short distances by foot, by road, by rail, heathen far away in the interior amongst tea estates, hills, valleys, and jungles, in fields even yet scarcely touched by the Gospel; calls to visit and encourage and help the struggling native churches (great instrument of evangelisation), spiritually as needy and spiritually as rich in possibilities as any over which Paul yearned in Asia Minor; calls to examine and foster and evangelise in schools, in towns, and hamlets, and villages, and to endeavour to rouse the teachers to zeal for souls, as well as keenness for the secular instruction that earns the Grant-in-aid, and all the while to have to turn a deaf ear to these calls to work, that one would so gladly respond to, that are so much the essence of a missionary's vocation; to have to forego the quiet study and reading, without which one is scarcely fit for such labours; to have to give up almost all further study in the vernacular in which one has to work, and to spend most of one's time in the office at headquarters, keeping accounts, writing letters, and trying to keep the mere machinery going-this has, so far, made up a large part of my experience.

"For the first half of 1901 I was studying Singhalese, living at a village outside of Colombo. In June I took the second vernacular examination, and proceeded to Matale to take charge of the Kandy District, Mr. Lapham having already left and gone to Colombo.

"In August Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., came to Ceylon and spent a fortnight visiting and studying the work of our Mission here.

"In September Mr. Lapham had to go home on furlough, and sailed for England with Mrs. Lapham on September 9th. Towards the end of November Rev. Charles Williams visited Ceylon, and he, too, spent a fortnight here.

"Almost simultaneously with his arrival, Rev. F. D. Waldock, to our intense relief, arrived in Ceylon to take charge of the Colombo District.

"Just at the end of the year Mr. Greenhough paid his second visit to Ceylon on the return journey from New Zealand to England, and I accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Greenhough on a tour right through the province of Sabaragamuwa, visiting our stations and schools,

KANDY DISTRICT.

"The work in Kandy town, except the two day schools, is now handed over to the Baptist Church there under the pastorate of Rev. J. S. Perera. We rejoice with the church in having now once more a pastor at their head, but would like to see more tokens of life and activity in Christian service evidenced by the church members.

"There is an excellent work going on in the Christian Endeavour Society, which was started by Mr. Lapham two years or more ago, and re-organised this year, and has now a Singhalese and an English section, which hold meetings in alternate weeks,

"The day-schools are doing well, especially the boys' school under Mr. S. de Silva.

MATALE.

"In this important centre and large district Mr. D. W. Abayaratna has been at work since September, up to which time the station was vacant after the death of Mr. D. R. D'Alwis.

"From the first Mr. Abayaratna has thrown his heart and soul into the work, and has earnestly and energetically coped with the needs of the station.

"Regular open-air preaching services are held in the bazaar and elsewhere; at places where our advent for the purpose of preaching is coming to be expected, systematic school visitation and children's services are held, both on Sundays and week days; Raltota and Hunukate, six and nine miles out, are regular evangelists' stations worked from Matale. At Hunukate the work is distinctly hopeful; Mr. Lapham did much good work there, of which we are reaping the fruit. There is one earnest Christian convert, of several years' standing, at whose house meetings are held, and amongst whose people—all Buddhists—there are more than one who may be termed inquirers, if not definite seekers after Christ. We hope to establish before very long a native missionary in residence at Hunukate, whence a large and as yet all but untouched field for evangelisation could be worked.

"The Singhalese Church at Matale is very weak. Numerically, it is fairly large in membership, but the majority of its members, especially a number of earnest Christian young men, are scattered about the island. Some of them are engaged as evangelists, teachers, &c., in connection with the B.M.S. or other missionary societies, some in independent work. Mr. Abayaratna is of great assistance to the work of this little church, much of whose best blood thus goes to strengthen other work.

"The English services held on Sunday evenings have been distinctly encouraging. The congregation, as is to be expected in a small community such as this at Matale, is not large. But the friends have evinced much practical interest in the work, as is shown in the well-sustained attendances, the amounts of the weekly offerings, the

special contributions made for the purchase of new lamps and other requisites, and the heartiness with which the lately started choir practice has been taken up, to the great improvement of the singing. The collections are mainly devoted, after paying current expenses, to the gradual wiping off of the debt on the chapel building.

"The Kumbiyangoda (girls') and Raltota (mixed) schools are both in satisfactory condition.

"Maligatenne (boys') is less so, being within Matale town and too near to the larger S.P.G. and Roman Catholic schools, with which it cannot compete.

"At Kumbiyangoda and Pannegama, both villages within a few minutes' walk of this mission house (and at numerous other villages in this district), there are magnificent openings for the work of lady missionaries, were such available. At the one village a large number of high-caste Kandyan families, at the other an equally numerous low-caste community, at both a great many women and girls all but inaccessible, especially the former, to any but women workers—a splendid field for the energies of two or three earnest lady missionaries. If only the B.Z.M.S. could send some workers to Ceylon! Here are fields white indeed to the harvest, so easy of access, so safe and so suitable for lady workers—surely as worthy of consideration by would-be workers as the distant interior of China or the Congo!

"Much of my own time has been taken up in the Colombo district. Between Mr. Lapham's departure and Mr. Waldock's arrival I spent eight or ten days on each visit in the low country, travelling about to as many as I could of the stations in that district. I thus visited Ranale, Hanwella, Madampe, Chilaw and Kandana, and was only prevented by rain from reaching Avissawella, which, however, I have visited since the New Year, to open the rebuilt school.

SABARAGAMUWA DISTRICT.

"At the end of 1899 Mr. Lapham wrote in his Annual Report concerning this district:—'The sphere of work is a magnificent one; tangible results will appear but slowly, but work challenges us on every hand; a permanently resident missionary (European) is not essential at present, and a mere novice would be worse than useless.'

"Unfortunately, when Mr. Lapham left in September, 1901, the mere novice, with only three months' experience to go upon, was the only missionary left in the island, and had perforce to take charge.

"Since then two tours have been made in the district, visiting every station and school. And we heartily endorse the verdict as to the value and difficulty of the work here, the need for prosecuting it vigorously, and the scope for further developments. Tangible results are already in evidence, though but few, and 'work challenges us on every hand.'

"Purella, our new station, has proved our most fruitful one. The earnest evangelisation for the past two years of Mr. Lewis (native missionary) has provoked determined opposition from the Buddhists, but has been blessed of God to the ingathering of four converts—direct converts from Buddhism—who are now candidates for baptism, but are still being kept on probation and under instruction. Mr. Lewis and these young Christians, who are in the midst of considerable persecution, need our sympathetic and earnest prayers. There are others also, both at this and the other stations, who are definite seekers after Christ.

"At Ratnapura, Balangoda, Madampe, Pelmadulla regular evangelistic work, preaching, visitation, work in day and Sunday-schools, distribution of tracts and Scripture portions, &c., have been regularly carried on, and much good, hard work has been done by our evangelists.

"Writing at the end of 1901, it is obvious that the Ceylon Mission has of late been passing through a period of exceptional trial and difficulty.

"Every one of our missionaries, who was in the work when I first came out in 1899, is now at home in England. To be left hopelessly short-handed seems to be a chronic condition with us. Yet, perhaps, we were never so badly off as we have been this year.

"But still God has never failed us, and the work has gone on. But the opportunities that have to be passed by, the open doors that have to be left—perhaps to close—the work that is languishing for want of mere supervision—the pity of it all!

"The work, as a whole, is deeply interesting, full of joy, and supremely worth the devotion of one's life.

"And with hopefulness and joy and gratitude we close the record of 1901, and take up the work of 1902."

The Rev. J. G. Greenhough, M.A., in his Report to the Committee, thus describes the district of Sabaragamuwa:—

"It is a wild, picturesque, and surpassingly beautiful region, little visited by the European, save in those parts of it which are devoted to the tea plant, and comparatively little touched by the hand of civilisation. From a missionary point of view, it has peculiar claims on the resources of our Society. First, because it is regarded as an impregnable stronghold of Buddhism; secondly, because actual Buddhism is here seen in its most sluggish and corrupt form, and the people are literally steeped in darkest ignorance and grossest immorality; and thirdly, because it is the one district in which, save for the presence of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and Romanists, we have the field to ourselves. No other evangelical mission competes with us for the occupancy and enlightenment of it. Our occupancy, alas! is of the slenderest kind. We have in the city of Ratnapura one small church assembling in one fairly large and well-built sanctuary under the ministry of an aged native preacher, an estimable Christian, who has done good service, but is now far from equal to his burden. In addition to this we have in sunary other places two or three boys' schools, and one rented room for the sale of religious and other publications. We have also three native evangelists carrying on itinerary work, and that is the sum of our operations. Mr. Hankinson spent some time in residence at Ratnapura, but since his departure there has been no European missionary. The district is supposed to be superintended by Mr. Etherington, from Matale, and he has done all that is possible to limited human powers to keep it under his survey. But a journey from Matale to Ratnapura can only be accomplished by 120 miles of expensive railway and coach, or by 60 miles of bicycle or bullock waggon over mountain roads. A supervision of this kind can at best be little more than nominal."

THE CINNAMON GARDENS BAPTIST CHURCH, COLOMBO.

The Rev. W. R. Peacock, the Pastor of the Colombo Baptist Church, writes:—

"Mr. Waldock has requested that I should give him a few lines with reference to the past year's work at Cinnamon Gardens Church, and I gladly comply. The hearty reception given to Mrs. Peacock and myself on our arrival in October, 1900, has been followed up by continued kindness and unstinted co-operation, so that personally we have had much joy in our ministry in this semi-missionary sphere. From the first we were cheered by indications of God's blessing, and it is with profound gratitude that we record the addition of sixteen to our membership, ten of these by baptism. An earnest, prayerful spirit prevails too, which makes us hopeful concerning the future. There must always be a peculiar attractiveness in the work here, for its history embraces a singularly rich record of consecrated endeavour and denominational loyalty, and the congregation is of quite a cosmopolitan character. Moreover, the double opportunity is presented of doing something to help our own countrymen abroad, and of having a share in the actual work of evangelising the heathen—and here it may be mentioned that once a week we combine forces with Mr. S. W. Perera, the B.M.S. native agent in Colombo, for an open-air preaching service.

"The site of our church premises is highly advantageous, and the buildings, erected under the direction of the Rev. F. D. Waldock, whom all our friends have been delighted to welcome back again to the island, are at once beautiful in appearance and carefully adapted to our requirements and the conditions of the climate. The church is regularly used on Sundays for services in both Tamil and Singhalese, in addition to our English services.

"Among the friends whose visits have refreshed us recently, we mention only the names of two of our ex-Presidents—the Revs. Charles Williams and J. G. Greenhough, M.A.—and that of the venerable toiler in the New Hebrides Mission, Dr. J. G. Paton."

The latest word from China is:

"If there is any crisis in China to-day it is the crisis of a most unparalleled opportunity: never before in the history of this marvellous empire has the opportunity for Christian Missions been so remarkable or so full of promise."

Another of our Missionaries writes: "The influences to which China is subjected during the next few years will doubtless make or mar her whole future, and, inasmuch as one of the most important and far-spreading influences which reach China comes through the agency of missionary societies, it is much to be hoped that the Church at home will be able to intelligently grasp the supreme importance of the present time, and make not only more material sacrifices for this great people, now at the parting of the ways, but devote more spiritual force than in the past to the cause of Chinese missions—by personal consecration to the work on the part of those who are free to come here, and by more earnest, continuous prayer on the part of those for whom life in China is impossible. What China needs most of all is a large immediate reinforcement of God-sent well-equipped Christian missionaries—the very ablest and best men that can be found. Shall the Baptist Missionary Society take its part in this great crisis? Will the churches at home resolve that a powerful movement on behalf of China shall be at once inaugurated, or is the splendid opportunity of to-day to be lost by coldness and indifference?"

"China for Christ, though it takes a thousand years," cried John Angell James more than half a century ago. "China for Christ" is still our cry, but we believe that if the Church is faithful to her opportunities, it will not be a tenth part of a thousand years before the Gospel has been preached throughout the whole great empire of China, and in every town and village of the land there shall be companies of men and women who have been redeemed by Christ,

OUR WORK IN THE SHANTUNG PROVINCE.

Our staff of missionaries in the Shantung province at present consists of Mr. and Mrs. Forsyth, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce, Mr. and Mrs. Medhurst, Mr. Wills, Mr. Harmon, Mr. and Mrs. Nickalls, Mr. and Mrs. Burt, Mr. and Mrs. Greening, Mr. and Mrs. Shipway, and Mr. and Mrs. Whitewright, and during the current year we hope the staff will be increased by the return to China of Mr. and Mrs. Smyth, Dr. and Mrs. Watson, Dr. and Mrs. Paterson, Mr. and Mrs. Couling, and Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Jones.

Mr. and Mrs. Forsyth and Mr. Wills will be leaving Shantung during tle current year for much-needed furlough in England.

CHING CHOU FU CITY.

Ching Chou Fu City is near the main road from Chefoo to Chi-nan Fu, the provincial capital, and is distant from these places 250 miles and 120 miles respectively. Chou-ping City lies on the main road half-way between Ching Chon Fu and Chi-nan Fu.

From Ching Chou Fu are worked the four counties of Liu-k'u, Shou-kuang, Lin-chih, and I-tu.

The Rev. R. C. Forsyth, writing of the experiences of the past year, says:—

"OUR RETURN TO TSING CHU FU,

- "Early in the spring we succeeded in getting leave from our consuls, and a party of us, sixteen in all, returned to work in the interior of this province.
- "Mr. Bruce and I finally arrived in this city on the 23rd March last, and began the work of reconstruction.
- "We found that the descriptions we had received of the looting were much exaggerated, though extensive theft, especially of the goods of the missionaries, had taken place.
- "Evangelists were set to work in the first instance visiting all our village churches, and getting the Christians heartened and encouraged; and gradually the work was extended in the usual lines amongst the heathen. The Sunday services in the city here were resumed, and even evangelistic work begun in a new centre in the north suburb of this city, which, however, owing to want of proper accommodation, has not been maintained.
- "On returning from the coast in September last my wife has been unremitting in her work amongst the women in the country, and has made seven trips, varying from a few days to over a week, visiting different stations, and rejoicing the hearts of the women, who received her most gladly. Most of these trips have had to be taken alone as my other duties would not allow of my going with her.
- "On two occasions, however, I went on a tour with her, and had in every place evangelistic services in the villages and in fairs and by the way-side, scattering everywhere the good seed of the Kingdom, and always received respectfully by the heathen and joyfully by the Christians.
- "My wife has invited some women to classes in the city, and they will com, bringing their own food, and be under instruction, in rotation, for the next two months, and in this work I hope to assist.

"THE PRINTING DEPARTMENT

has been again resumed, and a fresh edition of a book previously issued by Mr. Richard in Tai-yuen-fu has been printed. The book is entitled 'Fabiola,' and relates to persecutions in the second century of the Christian Era.

- "A book shop has been opened by some of our Christian people in the north suburb, and I have assisted them in procuring suitable stock from Shanghai, besides supplying them with our own publications.
- "A new hymn book is being printed in Shanghai, and we expect will soon be in stock.

"OUR NEW AGENTS.

- "Owing to the failure of Messrs. Fergusson and Co., we have decided to shift our base to the new German port of Tsingtau, and have given our agency there to Messrs. O. Rittshausen & Co.
- "We have been extremely hampered by being so short handed, so many of our staff being away, and the work has, of course, correspondingly suffered. On the

whole, we have, however, abounding reason for thankfulness that we have passed through the painful period of the last two years, and have as a mission and as individuals suffered so little real damage to our work or material loss ourselves.

"We have been favoured under God in having a statesman so able and energetic as the late Governor Yuan-Shih-Kái, and our re-settlement in the province has been made comparatively easy under his vigorous rule. There is also a new spirit infused into the fossillised official life of the past. Younger and abler men are now in positions of influence. The new railway is at our doors, and the whole atmosphere is favourable to change and decided advance in every direction.

"We trust this opportunity will be seized by the home churches, and the Gospel of the Kingdom pressed by all possible means."

The following report from the Rev. C. Spurgeon Medhurst gives his impressions of the present condition of affairs in Shantung. Mr. Medhurst writes:—

THE CITY OF TSING CHOU FU.

"As the Committee are aware, we believe we have a mission to the wealthy in the city as well as to the poor in the country, and with the county magistrate of our city, who was transferred to another post a few months before the troubles began, we had acquired considerable influence. He is nearer the Kingdom than many of his fellow officers, and had he still been our official during the crisis, he would undoubtedly have protected our property and the Christians, as he did the property of another mission in a far less friendly district.

"His successor was a weak man of no ability, and, though not personally unfriendly, allowed his subordinates to have their own way, and even descended to receive a fair share of our goods. He is now anxious to be on good terms with us all, and has apologised to me and to others for last year's pilferings, but has never offered to return any of the stolen goods. After the Chinese New Year he will be transferred. It was only through bribery that he was permitted to remain as long as he has.

"His superior, the Prefect, was too aged to perform his duty, and was dismissed from office after the troubles. He is now living in retirement in the city. His successor is an exceedingly able man. I have had two interviews with him since my return, and have seldom been so favourably impressed with a Chinese official. At the time of the Boxer outbreak he was an under-secretary in the Tsung Li Yamen, and used what little influence he had to prevent the outbreak. He is shrewd, intelligent, and progressive. The last time I saw him he told me that he was planning to circulate a Christian paper among the leaders of the Prefecture, that there may be no misunderstandings between them and the Church. This does not, of course, mean that he is himself personally inclined towards Christianity, but that, as a matter of policy, he considers it wise to dispel ignorance of our aims, and he is far-seeing enough to perceive that this can best be done by circulating one of our papers. Needless to add, we shall heartily welcome this co-operation. With such a strong man as Prefect, a weak magistrate can do very little harm, even if so inclined.

"As to the city in general, it feels towards us as before, neither more hostile, nor less friendly. H.E. Yuan Shih K'ai so settled the indemnity claims that they have to be paid by the guilty and responsible parties; the innocent have in no way been made to suffer, so that there is no ill-will towards us on the part of the general public on account of the indemnity moneys that have to be paid.

THE PROBABLE EFFECTS OF THE BOXER INCIDENT ON MISSION WORK.

- "(a) As to Educational Matters.—Although the new reform movement of the Imperial Government will doubtless prove very disappointing in many ways, those at the head of affairs having had no experience in steering the ship of State in these waters, a great change has taken place. The abolition of the 'Eight-Legged Essay' has created a great demand for Western books along certain lines, and has opened a door for dealing with Confucianists that did not exist before. Yet, while eager to receive all the instruction we can give them in arithmetic, history, and science, this class, the least spiritual and the most influential of all the Chinese, will probably be slower than ever to seek for the kernel of Christianity, on account of the persecutions of 1900. If they are to be won for the Master, it will be more than ever tarough the medium of schools, and all missions will have to pay more attention to educational matters or hopelessly fall into the background with the prospect of an ever-decreasing usefulness. Nothing but the regenerative power of the Spirit of God can reform China, but it will be the teacher rather than the preacher who will bring China's scholars to the feet of the Lord. Another effect of the change that has taken place is that our educated Christians are more and more occupying positions of influence, and, as time goes on, this will become more and more true. The authorities will for some years be able to look hardly anywhere else for help. Even when the pupils of the newly-established Government colleges begin to graduate, the members of the Christian Church who have been educated will be able to exercise a far wider influence than was possible previously. Under the new régime they will have a better chance than formerly to obtain degrees and a higher social standing among their fellows.
- "(b) As to Evangelistic Work.—A higher and more educated class of evangelists will have to be employed. The evangelist of the future will have to know something of Western civilisation, political economy, scientific subjects, and so on, or he will lose influence through being dumb when asked pertinent questions on these matters. In proportion to the accuracy of his knowledge of Western nations, their customs and their books, will his influence with the Confucian scholars, the real leaders of China, be increased. This has always been more or less true, but it will be more emphatically true in the future,
- "(c) As to our Assistants.—The establishment of Government schools, the need of the authorities of trained men to act as teachers and in other capacities, will, because of the larger salaries that will be offered, be a great temptation to many of our people. Already we are beginning to feel somewhat this effect of the new order which has been established, and in the near future shall probably have to face the question of paying more to our assistants than we have been in the habit of doing in the past, and that, not from this cause alone, but because of the steadily increasing price of living. One result of the Boxer movement has been to bring the West nearer China, and to make China more like the West. Wherever Western civilisation goes prices rise, the railway, with all its consequences, will soon be at our doors, and sooner or later we shall certainly be compelled, by the force of circumstances, to revise salaries.
- "Summary.—The Chinese Government is very anxious to keep on good terms with the Powers, for it realises that it is much weaker at present than they are, and it will therefore probably give better protection to foreigners than it has ever done. Intercourse between Chinese officials and missionaries will be more easy and more frequent and wrongs will be more readily righted. The history of foreign missions in China is punctuated with riot and assault. The future will not be without these, but the

troubles will, for a number of years to come, be local. There is no immediate danger of a universal rising, unless some unforeseen revolution should take place in the palace. The future will probably see less obstructions placed in the way of preaching the Gospel, and a greater readiness to receive it, but China missions will demand a much larger expenditure, and therefore greater sacrifices on the part of the Churches,"

THE GOTCH-ROBINSON CHRISTIAN TRAINING INSTITU-TION AND THE BOYS' NORMAL BOARDING SCHOOL.

During the troubles and anxieties of the past twelve months the work of these Institutions has been in abeyance.

Mr. Whitewright, the Principal of the Gotch-Robinson College, has now returned to Shantung, and Mr. Couling is on the eve of his departure for China, so that the special work of both these most important educational foundations will, during the current year, be resumed with renewed vigour.

THE CHOU-PING DISTRICT.

From Chou-ping thirteen and a half counties are worked by our missionaries. The Rev. E. C. Nickalls, who has charge of the work in one half of the following counties—viz., Chou-ping, Chi-tung, Po-hsing, and Ching-chêng—reports:—

"The months we have spent in the interior since our return to Shantung last spring have been full of almost overwhelming work. There are signs of strain on several of us; it is a matter for much thankfulness that no one has broken down—God Himself has graciously sustained us.

"It would be useless to amend the tables of statistics this year. We have not sufficiently reliable data.

"The more we examine the conduct of the Christians amid the perils of the year 1900, the clearer we become that recanting Christians were a very small minority, though the number of those who denied their Lord from fear was not inconsiderable. The weakness that has been made manifest in the Church need not leave us despondent about the future of the Christian Church in China. But it certainly is leading us to more reliance on God, and to a careful consideration if our methods of work have been the best.

"OUR NEW CHAPEL.

"One most encouraging event of the year was the opening of our new chapel in this city. Our congregations are already as good as they were before the Boxer troubles. We have good hope that the building will be filled with a regular congregation. A Sunday-school has also been started. It is too early yet to pronounce it a success, but we have about fifty men on the books. The women of the city have met in a class, generally taught by Mrs. Drake, for many years. Since the return of Mrs. Nickalls from the coast this class has met regularly after Sunday morning

service. The attendance is almost as good as of old. During the next year a day-school will be opened, and probably a book-shop for the spread of Christian and general books. All the latter and most of the former will be sold at a price to cover full cost."

The Rev. W. A. Wills, reporting from Chou-ts'un, writes:

"In looking back on the past year, I see much to inspire thankfulness and hope, Think of God's goodness to us in Shantung!

"Returning from our exile last March, we were received by the officials and gentry with kindness, and the people seemed glad to see us back. Large numbers of our own members came long distances to meet us, their eyes filled with joy and gratitude that God had permitted us again to meet on earth.

"Since my return I have visited all my stations, and the Christians in their own villages. I moved among them freely, as I used to do before the troubles of 1900 but I never heard a curse or angry word from any one. It is wonderful how things have quieted down after so great a storm.

"The Dispensary was opened the same day I reached Chou-ts'un, and patients have since then been daily treated. The Museum was opened as soon as the repairs to the broken glass, &c., were finished, and, as before, continues to attract many visitors especially on holidays, when great crowds attend, giving the evangelist and our Christians grand opportunities of preaching to the people of Jesus.

"I am also glad to report that whilst the old scholars were scattered, nearly all have returned, and many more have joined us, so that the schools are now in a flourishing state, and God is blessing the work amongst the young.

"The attendance at our services on Sunday has so increased that it is difficult to find accommodation for our regular worshippers, and often many outsiders cannot even find standing room.

"The preaching of the Gospel has been blessed to the bringing in of several persons from the dark paths of heathenism, whilst others there are whose eyes are opening to the truth, and whose weary hearts are yearning for rest in the Lord. I have now somewhat over a hundred inquirers and candidates for baptism.

"The Christian Endeavour in October held its annual convention, nearly one hundred delegates attending; they reported three new branches opened during the year, making a total of sixteen societies in connection with Chou-ts'un.

"This year was made a special occasion, being held on the 25th anniversary of my arrival in China. Many loving messages of congratulations arrived from several friends, and we had great cause, like one of old, 'To thank God and take courage.'

"A new departure has been made this year at Chou-ts'un by starting a missionary society. There are now over seventy quarterly subscribers and sufficient money has been raised to support our first native missionary. These and other evidences of Divine favour are unspeakably encouraging, and come to us as so many proofs that God is establishing the work of our hands.

""While it may be the day of persecution is not over, I feel sure that the Church that has stood the past trials so steadfastly will be equal for all the future, for God is our strength, and in the spirit and power of the promise He has given us we again go forth, for to us, as to the whole Church, He speaks, 'I will make them and the place round about My hill a blessing, and I will cause the shower to come down in his season."

The Rev. S. B. Drake sends the following report:—

"After a long and depressing stay at Chefu we were able to return to our inland

home during the month of March last. Upon our arrival every mark of respect was accorded us by the Chinese authorities. Even the dogs in the streets seemed fully aware that great changes had come into existence since our departure, for they ceased to bark as we passed them. Even to this day the canine species are deeply impressed with the fact that the Allies are in possession of Peking.

"The reception accorded us by the native Christians was of a most affectionate character. They had passed through fiery trials in consequence of their connection with the Christian Church. But they rallied round their missionaries. Before returning to our stations one could not help speculating upon the probable effect the recent persecution might have upon the minds of the native Christians. Would they stand aloof, or would they dare to continue openly to maintain their connection with it? They stood by the Church, and their conduct gave the lie to our fears. This conduct is cause for great thankfulness to God, and strengthens the hope that the Christians of China will become stronger and purer Christians as a result of their recent hardships.

"During the reign of terror in my district thirteen Christian men and women were killed, and about the same number of families suffered the loss of all things, life excepted. There were also several cases of plundering of houses.

"The cases of murder, burning, and plundering were brought before the notice of the officials, and moderate compensation asked for. The local officials, with one exception, were at first unwilling to recognise the Christians' claims, although Yuan Shih Kai, the provincial governor, had repeatedly instructed them to pay fair compensation. It was, therefore, necessary to ask the governor to compel his subordinates to deal with native Christians' losses in accordance with his previous instructions. After much vexatious negotiation and a delay of seven months, all cases of murder and of serious loss had been amicably settled.

"The claims of native Christians were settled in the following manner:—The local officials appointed a man or men of local reputation to act as middlemen between themselves and the local Boxers. These middlemen imposed a fine according to the number of acres owned by the said Boxers. In this way the amount claimed was collected and then paid to me on behalf of the Christians. Had I not acted on behalf of the Christians they would have gone to law with the Boxers, which would have resulted in endless litigation, and have brought many known murderers to the block. My action prevented litigation, and saved the lives of many men,

"Human nature being what it is, the murderous conduct of the Boxers could not be entirely passed over. On the other hand, the general peace of the community and the reputation of the Christian Church required that the punishment meted out should not be unmixed with mercy. Moreover, it was highly important that the gulf separating the Christian and non-Christian part of the community should be bridged as speedily as possible. With these objects in view I acted as above indicated, and I hope not without success. At the close of the proceedings the Boxers, through their middlemen, conveyed their thanks to me; the officials did the same, for they had been helped out of a great difficulty; while the Christians that received compensation voluntarily contributed substantial sums as a building fund for the erection of memorial chapels. This is the best evidence that, to say the least, all parties to the cases at law were fairly satisfied with the result."

The following report from the Rev. Frank Harmon contains a very earnest appeal for immediate reinforcements:—

[&]quot;Report on the work in the counties of P'u T'ai, Pin Chou, Li Chin, and half the

county of Ch'ing Ch'eng, in the province of Shantung, for the year ending December 31st. 1901.

"I think I reported last in 1900 that in the month of May I held baptismal services, receiving in all 142 new members. The last of the series of services was held on May 30th, and less than a month from that date we were all on our way to Chefu.

"Since my return in April of this year, I have been almost exclusively occupied with official and legal business.

"Thanks to the generosity of G. W. Macalpine, Esq., and a substantial donation from the fund raised by the New York *Christian Herald*, I have been able to meet every case of pressing need amongst our people, and have still a sum in hand to assist those who cannot hold out till the gathering of the wheat crop in the spring.

"My great anxiety for some time has been lest the Christians who had relatives murdered last year (especially those who lost father or mother) should, in despair of anything being done by the officials to bring the offenders to justice, or to give the survivors 'face,' proceed to acts of violence by way of reprisal, and to prove that they were not without the 'filial piety' which they are taunted with having utterly discarded. May God avert any such calamity.

"In many instances last year's experiences have resulted in a great revealing of character. The people have been tried as by fire, and while the pure and true have come through the ordeal purer and tempered for better service, the worthless elements have been made manifest, and in some instances removed.

"I do not doubt that, to the majority of our Christian brethren, Christ is an infinitely greater possession than before this trial came upon them. They have suffered for Him and His Gospel, and they will cling closer to the One, and value more highly the other all the remainder of their earthly pilgrimage.

"It remains for us to recognise our responsibilities to the work which has grown with such exceptional rapidity these last fourteen years, to give ourselves to the shepherding of our people with greater wisdom and self-devotion, and to take our share in the great work of evangelising the unreached millions of Shantung with more intensity of love and greater simplicity of heart.

"THE APPEAL FOR IMMEDIATE REINFORCEMENTS,

"Much may be done in these directions with a better disposition of our present forces, but we cannot expect to make a lasting and sensible impression unless we are reinforced from home. I am sure the Society are doing their best for us, but what that is appears from the fact that within the past nine years only two new men have been welcomed by us to this great promising and needy field.

"It is certain that China has actually entered upon a new era in her long history. While I write, and within ten minutes' walk of my room, about a hundred picked young men are earnestly engaged under the superintendence of a Protestant missionary in acquiring the rudiments of a Western education, and everywhere there is a spirit of inquiry and readiness to learn which in the past have been conspicuous by their absence.

"The authorities are particularly friendly to American and English Protestant missionaries, and the whole position of things presents certainly the most favourable opportunity for removing prejudice, and for the preaching of the Gospel, which has existed since I came to China, now nearly nineteen years ago.

"A few days ago I preached for an hour to a large, intelligent, and greatly interested gathering in a street chapel connected with the American Mission in this

city of Chinanfu, and at the close of the preaching there was a good deal of informal talk of a most friendly and appreciative character.

"This is a time, not only for showing an academic interest in the spread of education, and all that concerns the well-being of the people, but also for the direct and earnest presentation of the truth as it is in Christ. May God give grace to the Church at home, as well as to the missionaries on the field, to know what they ought to do, for truly 'the harvest is great, and the labourers few.'

"As I was not able to send a report at the end of 1900, the statistics stand in the report for 1901 as in 1900-i.e., In the counties of P'u T'ai, Pin Chou, Li Chin, and half the county of Ch'ing Ch'eng there were—Evangeliste, 6; school-teachers, 27; stations and sub-stations, 84; total of Church members, 888; to these have to be added as baptized in 1900, 142; making the total membership, 1,030.

"These numbers, however, do not represent the actual church membership as it now stands, as no allowance is made for loss of ife in last year's troubles, nor for the application of discipline which we have not been able to apply effectually."

With regard to educational work in the Chou-ping District, the Committee have recently resolved, in compliance with a very earnest and unanimous request from the Shantung Local Committee, to establish a Boarding School for the boys connected with the Christian community in that District and to send out at the earliest date practicable an additional missionary to take up the work of the brother who shall be set apart for the conduct of the new school. Referring to the great importance and value of such a school the Rev. J. P. Bruce, B.A., of Ching Chu Fu, Secretary of the Shantung Local Committee, writes:—

"Some years ago I felt and expressed the conviction that we needed boarding school accommodation for sixty or seventy boys from Ching Chou Fu Church alone. I feel it much more keenly now, when I look into the future and see how here in China, as it is already in Japan, the time is near when those who are to have influence with their fellow countrymen will be men of education, and men of Western education. It is our great anxiety that our people should be able to make use of this influence in whatever walk of life they may be; that they may have not Western education merely, but Christian education, so that with trained intelligence, and with devout heart, they may be 'fitted for the Master's use.'

"We can speak and plead from this point of view now, more than ever before, not only because of the new opportunity which presents itself, but because of the proved value of such work, as shown in the boys who have in the past two or three years left Mr. Couling's Ching Chou Fu school. 'Couling's boys' could be picked out of a crowd. The education they have received has been such as to produce a type peculiar to itself, which is characterised by intelligence and independence of thought; quickness to take hold of the foreigner's ideas, and intelligence in carrying them out; together with a brightness and enthusiasm that makes it a pleasure to work with them. This, I believe, is the experience of all those of us who have had to do with them. Mr. Shorrock wrote to me years ago from Shensi to the same effect. I feel sure that when they experience the Divine call to preach, whether as evangelists or pastors, they will do a work of far better quality than any we have yet seen. Already as school teachers they have proved their

efficiency. Three years ago, when we first began with these young men in village schools, I had great difficulty in overcoming the Chinese prejudice against such young teachers. At the present moment we are arranging next year's schools, and there is a wide demand for these very men, not simply because they possess certain knowledge, but because their method of teaching is so effective."

The Rev. E. W. Burt, M.A., reports on work in the counties of Changch'iu, Li-ch'êng, Kao-yuan, Hsin-chêng, and Chang-shan as follows:—

1.

"With regard to the work in Chang-ch'iu and Li-ch'eng, which was under Mr. Smyth's charge during my furlough, the state of things is better than I had dared to hope for. For in this district there were only some 45 baptized Christians, and most of these had come but recently into the Church. Then, when I left for England in the autumn of 1899, there were also some 400 inquirers, who had mostly become interested in Christianity after the relief given to the famine-stricken in that year. Altogether there were about 20 different villages where these new 'Doctrine Learners' as they are styled, were just beginning to meet for worship. Had the Boxers come into the district in any force I fear little of this work could have survived, but it so happened that these 'babes in Christ' got off very much more lightly than the Christians in other parts of our district. Their infant faith was not put to any very severe strain, and all but one of the village stations remain to this day, though the number of worshippers is very much smaller than in 1899. The one fact to be thankful for is that the foundations remain, and on these, by God's mercy, a church may yet be built up. The remnant are showing considerable zeal and earnestness, but I shall be slow to receive them as yet in any large numbers into the Church. Besides visiting the stations, I have had a class, extending over a fortnight. during which some twenty-five of the most promising learners received careful consecutive teaching in the fundamentals of the Christian faith.

II.

"Since Mr. Drake's temporary absence I have also had charge of the three counties of Kao-yuan, Hsin-chêng, and Chang-shan. Here the work has been established for many years, and the conditions are very different from those in Chang-ch'iu. In these counties thirteen Christians were killed by the Boxers, including the Elder Li. of whom an account has already appeared in the HERALD. Houses and property were also destroyed, and much real suffering was endured by the Christians. Some few openly joined the Boxers, others went to the temples and burnt incense, while many, under official pressure, made a forced recantation. As I hear from Mr. Drake that he expects to be back again in March, I shall leave the matter of church discipline till his arrival. The county of Kao-yuan has again been flooded by the Yellow River. making it difficult to get round the stations, and intensifying the poverty and sufferings of the people. I quite hope and expect that in the spring there will be a real revival throughout our churches. It would not be true to the facts to say that public worship has yet been resumed in all the villages where it was formerly held. After all they have gone through it is not to be wondered at that the Christians in many cases hesitate to re-open services in their homes. This would at once make them marked men again, and they are not unnaturally slow and cautious to take such a step till their confidence is once more restored. I believe we are passing through a mere temporary transition stage—timidity on the part of the Christians.

and fear, in place of the old suspiciousness, on the part of the outsiders. There is no open insult or assault as in days gone by, but a general standing aloof. If my interpretation be correct it will take time before the people will recover from the shock of recent events, and learn to adjust themselves to the new order of things. The spirit of fear is, I verily believe, the inevitable half-way house between the old attitude of utter contempt and ignorant suspicion, and the new feeling of friendliness and quickened interest, of which we already have signs in the action of Yuan Shih Kai in establishing a college on modern lines at Chi-nan-fu. No doubt that is the fact of capital importance in the history of this province for 1901, but it will take time for this radical change to permeate all ranks of the people, and work out its full effects.

"OUR NEW CHAPEL.

"In our local mission the chief event has undoubtedly been the opening of the New Chapel, which owes its existence chiefly to the generosity of Mr. T. S. Penny, of Taunton, but as Mr. Nickalls has already written to the Herald in full about this great improvement, I need do no more than refer in passing to it, and again express our gratitude to God that this new conspicuous building should have been preserved unharmed amid the disturbances of 1900."

THE PROYINCE OF SHANSI.

TAI YUEN FU AND HSIN-CHOU.

Through the monthly issues of the MISSIONARY HERALD our friends have been fully informed of the departure of Brethren Sowerby and Turner for China in September last, of their being joined at Chefoo by the Rev. S. B. Drake, of their arrival in the City of Tai Yuen Fu in November, and of their meeting Dr. Edwards, who had most kindly consented to remain in Shansi until their arrival.

These three Brethren were requested by the Committee to confer with Dr. Edwards, to make careful inquiry into the circumstances connected with the terrible massacres of the 9th of July and the 9th of August, 1900, at Tai Yuen Fu and Hsin-Chou, to report upon property destroyed or damaged by the Boxers, to recover, if possible, any personal property and papers that might remain belonging to the massacred missionaries, to inquire as to murdered native Chinese Christians, and the present circumstances of such as had escaped death, and generally to advise the Committee as to the best steps to be taken for the re-opening of mission work in Shansi. As these pages were passing through the Press the joint Report of these Brethren arrived.

This report is, as the Committee anticipated, an earnest and urgent appeal for large and immediate reinforcements—and surely there should be no hesitation in the hearts of our friends and supporters throughout the

country as to our duty and privilege to promptly respond—for this Province of Shansi has been specially consecrated by the love, the toil, and the martyrdom of those who were massacred in 1900, and demands redoubled efforts and sacrifice on our part to at once fill up the vacant places.

THE PROVINCE OF SHENSI.

Our missionaries who have returned to the Shensi Province are Mr. and Mrs. Moir Duncan, Mr. and Mrs. Shorrock, Dr. Creasey Smith, and Mr. Madeley, and the Rev. Evan Morgan, at present in England on furlough, anticipates returning to his work in this Province in a few months.

Reporting upon the work of the past year, Mr. Moir Duncan writes :-

"The period covered by this report is one of the most memorable and melancholy in the history of missions in China. Its history has been written in characters of blood. The empire nearly tottered to its fall, and the Manchu dynasty has been indelibly disgraced. The reign of terror has, for the time, given place to strenuous efforts at reform. It is unquestionably evident that the national corruption and native conservatism must disappear before drastic measures for enlightenment and progress. If the violence and vicissitudes of the past year end in some permanent benefits to the race, those who have most severely suffered will most surely rejoice. It is the prayer of all interested in the welfare of China, that she may suddenly emerge, even from the depths of her calamities, to lay the foundations of a 'towering and endurable greatness.'

"For the Christian Church the period has been a baptism of fire. The 'dust and ashes' of our heroic dead are not dead and done with. Although the victims of the infamous crimes of Boxerism, they live again. They live in deathless deeds, in the energy of the truth for which they fell, and in the gratitude of many hearts. The native Church has been purged and purified. If the members, at the present crisis, would only extirpate the spirit of vengeance, they have the opportunity of manifesting a nobler life, exercising a wider influence, delivering purer testimony, and gaining a larger membership than in any previous period. With a groaning country bleeding at every vein, patriotism and Christian charity alike demand a generous exhibition of the laws of Christ. May the present trial of their faith be found unto praise and honour and glory when He appears!

"Six weeks after my arrival in Shensi from furlough in England, it became evident that with rampant anti-foreign feelings and the approach of famine, it were as useless as unwise to remain in Hsi-an-fu. In August I went to Peking as interpreter to the British forces, feeling that there would be some opportunity of serving my country and assisting the Chinese. I was in turn engineer, intelligence officer, inspector, press correspondent, and protector of the oppressed—a multiplicity of duties that will indicate the scarcity of men and the opportunities for service. It was my privilege to assist all ranks and classes of Chinese from the Emperor's brother, Prince Chue, and high mandarins to the coolie on the street and defenceless widows. The ruthless and unrighteous looting—in some cases even shared in by missionaries—roused a righteous wrath. 'Who,' asked Burke, 'could think of seizing on the property of men unaccused and unheard?' That was the tyranny that reigned in Peking after the siege. To have been a factor in redeeming property and redressing wrongs, I regard as worthy service.

- "After I had been eleven months in Peking the road was opened to T'ai-yuen Fu. The public already know the Governor of Shansi, like many other governors and leaders, appealed to Dr. Richard for advice and assistance in settling affairs. That the name of Li-t'i-mo-'tai should be held in such esteem is a splendid testimony to his work and worth and an honour to the society he represents.
- "After consultation in Peking, a party including Dr. Edwards, Dr. Smith and myself, started for Shansi on the 22nd of June.
- "On the 9th August, the anniversary of the fatal day last year when the blood of our martyred colleagues ran down the streets, we reached the city. Of the public receptions, funerals, and meetings you have already fully heard.
- "The condition of the church and the prospects of the work will be fully reported by Messrs, Sowerby and Turner.
- "Owing to sickness and the urgency of the famine in Shansi, we did little more than arrange a settlement of affairs and attend the funerals of our friends. It was very heartrending to meet with bereaved Christians and hear the terrible tales of suffering, privation, and anxieties they told. Their spirit of resignation, fortitude, and hope was astonishing. Of the evangelist Chao, the teacher Kao, and the preacher Liu I could not narrate how pre-eminently they have served the cause of Christ and the interests of the mission in the crisis passed through.
- "The Tao-t'at Shen spoke in terms of sincere appreciation of their tact, Christian spirit, and character. I expect that you will hear of some official recognition of their services.

"THE FAMINE IN SHENSI AND SHANSI.

"Dr. Edwards kindly arranged to await the arrival of our brethren from England and to undertake the oversight of the affairs of our mission meantime. His kindness made it possible for Dr. Smith and myself to leave for Hsi-an-fu on the 6th of August. Despite the heat we made the journey with a minimum of discomfort, and reached the western capital on the 26th. Seeing that I had been appointed a member of the Christian Herald Famine Relief Committee, the purpose of our visit had been announced in the Government Gazette, and the officials were enjoined by Imperial edict to treat us with respect and afford us every assistance. The fact that we were accompanied by an officer of the British Army, Major Pereia, may have given additional dignity and importance to our arrival; but whatever the reason, we had a splendid reception, as unexpected as unusual. They soon left for Hankow and Dr. Smith and I tackled the question of relief. The total funds at our disposal amounted to 75,000 taels, or about £12,000. Of this sum £11,000 were contributed in America, and only £1,000 in Britain—a fact that made one feel at once both glad and ashamed. One was glad to be the representative of Christian philanthropy that broke down all barriers of race and place and gave relief without the slightest regard to creed or caste.

"One was equally ashamed that in England there should have been so little response to the appeals of a distress that carried off 30 per cent. of the entire population of the Province. Even a Confucian official—our friend, Governor Tuan, contributed in grain and silver the equal of £310 towards the relief of the Christians. We administered relief in the centres of greatest distress, to Confucian, Christian, Buddhist, Taoist, Mohammedan and Catholic according to need. From the first the officials energetically and efficiently assisted, and but for their help we could not have covered so much ground or overtaken the relief in time—in all, some 82,507

individuas. The following is an extract from a letter by the Governor asking me to convey his thanks to the American people:—

"'The calamities of Shensi have been exceedingly heavy. After the relief here we further received the various contributions from the West, magnanimously brought from there to here, and abundantly affording relief. Truly, the anxiety you, from afar, exercised on our behalf has lessened our sorrows here. All this is a proof of disinterested friendliness, and of a spirit of benevolence that knows no distinctions, regarding neither near nor far, nor the barriers between. The destitute black-haired people have been refreshed (like land after rain), so that they greatly cherish feelings of gratitude, which are a speaking tablet of ineffaceable testimony. When I think of the advent of your chariot to this Western place, to give relief with such discrimination and exhausting toil, I feel very great unrest because we here have not fully fulfilled the obligations of host to you as guests from the West. Kindly excuse us. Further, may I request your good offices in conveying my thanks to all those benevolent and learned persons who so generously contributed these funds, and relieved the calamities of the people here? Now that the distress is gradually disappearing, and there is hope of the ordinary prosperity, I hope that in this our hearts will imprint their mutual seal, and there be no more concern.

"'On this account I respectfully present my compliments, and wish you truth's peace, love's light, and every benefit.

"'LI SHAO FEN.'

"Temporarily the famine has been arrested, but the autumn crops will not suffice for bread for the people till the spring wheat be reaped. There will be distress again in the winter and spring. The fact that Boxerism was stamped out in the province of Shensi saved the Christians from persecution, but they had to face the horrors of famine, that scattered the populace, and practically closed our work. Now that rains have fallen, and the spring crops have been sown, the little centres of worship have been revived. The services are well attended. Never before in my experience has there been a better opportunity for work, or a more widespread and awakened interest. May the Spirit of Truth so operate on the hearts of multitudes that they may enter the citizenship of the Kingdom and the service of the Saviour!"

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE FOR CHINA.

THE REV. TIMOTHY RICHARD, Litt.D., D.D., OF SHANGHAI.

Probably few people in England realise at all adequately the vast amount of good effected by the publications of the Society for the Diffusion of Christian Knowledge amongst the Chinese (better known as the S.D.K.), of which the Rev. Dr. Timothy Richard is the able secretary.

At length it seems to be dawning upon the Chinese mind that the future prosperity of China largely depends upon education.

As Dr. Richard states, the answer to the question, now so frequently asked: "Will the Chinese again attempt to exterminate the foreigners as they have just done by means of the Boxers?" must be: "Yes, they will again and again attempt the same thing unless their ignorance and pitilessness are removed—ignorance which," says Dr. Richard, "in spite of their possessing

one of the richest countries in the world, lets millions perish from actual want every year, and pitilessness which, in spite of the high ethical teaching of their sages, attempts to exterminate all foreigners within their country, and which actually put to the most cruel death three of their noblest statesmen—one, Hsü Yung-Yih, who was not forgiven for objecting to the execution of six of the Reformers without any trial in 1898, and the other two, Hsü Ching Cheng and Yuen Chang, for daring to change the edict for the extermination of foreigners into one for their protection."

"Our aim," continues Dr. Richard, "from the formation of the Society until now has been nothing less than the removal of this ignorance and pitilessness which hinder all progress in China, and the substitution for them of knowledge and good-will, so that there may be peace and harmony between the white and yellow races. Till that is done, with China looking to the past for its ideals and to the West for the future, all attempts at harmonious action are as futile as would be an attempt to plough with two oxen yoked, one with its head forwards and the other with its head The highest truths, whether found out by discovery or revelation, are the wonderful laws of God in nature, in human life and in God's own perfect character; and the highest inspirations to service, peace and progress are derived from the knowledge of these divine laws in all departments (2 Peter i. 2, 3). To make known these laws is the aim of our Society. By linking man to the Divine, which underlies all laws, we place him on eternal foundations, and set in motion the mightiest forces known for the reconciliation and regeneration of man."

Probably no European in China is better trusted by the Chinese than Dr. Richard is to-day.

In May last, one of the leading gentry in the Province of Kiangsi called upon Dr. Richard inviting him to go to his province, and also the Governor sought his advice in the settlement of missionary troubles there.

In the same month the Governor of Shansi wired Dr. Richard that he would like him to go up to Shansi for the same purpose, as there were no Protestant missionaries left alive in the province with whom he could consult. As a result of this, the Governor of Shansi sent a special Commissioner to Shanghai to consult with Dr. Richard about setting apart half a million taels (£66,000) for Western education in Shansi.

At the same time came a request to Dr. Richard from the two Chinese plenipotentiaries, Prince Ching and Li Hung-chang, to go up to Peking and arrange about the Shansi troubles. As a consequence, a very hearty reception was given to the missionaries returning to Shansi by the officials and gentry,

and a scheme of modern education suggested for the whole province in order to remove the cause of trouble—viz., ignorance and superstition. And in June Dr. Richard was asked by Li Hung-chang in Peking to draw up an outline of the manner in which religious peace was attained in other parts of the world. In accordance with this request a monograph on "Religious Liberty" was drawn up in Chinese and circulated amongst the leading viceroys and governors in the various provinces throughout China.

During the past year 35 new works and 50,000 copies have been printed and published by the Society in Chinese, and 22 additional works are at present in the press.

PALESTINE.

Missionaries.—The REV. YOUHANNAH EL KAREY and MRS. EL KAREY. Chief Station.—Nablous.

Sub-Stations.—Samaria, Beit-Mreen, Rafidia, and Nus Jebeen.

As reported last year, Mr. and Mrs. El Karey have been severely persecuted by the Turkish Government authorities in Nablous. Mr. El Karey writes:—

- "Our work is very uphill work, and the Government is trying to hunt us down; but the Lord is with us, and has kept us in safety. Our boys' schools are well attended, and doing a blessed work. The text book is the Bible. Our girls' school is also progressing, although the police will not allow Mohammedan girls to attend.
 - "Our mothers' meeting is well attended, and much good is the result.
- "We are much encouraged by our work in Rafidia. We have thirty in our school. In September last we opened our chapel in Samaria, and we had a most encouraging service.
- "We much need a bell for this chapel. I am praying for some kind friend to send us one.
- "At Beit-mreen we sadly need a room to meet in. A good work could be done there if we only had a little chapel to meet in. We meet every Sunday in a very small and uncomfortable room.
- "The statistics of the mission are as follows:—6 day-school teachers, with 80 children in regular attendance; 6 Sunday-school teachers, and 95 scholars. There have been 4 baptisms during the past year, and the membership now stands at 116."

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It has been well said there is nothing in the world so broad and deep as the Christian's solicitude for all mankind.

A great many besides Christians have worked hard and nobly for their own generation, and to make the world a little better before they left it. But those amongst this band who have not confessed Christ have never worked for what are termed inferior races. No superior race has helped an inferior by sacrificing its men or its wealth on the pure ground of benevolence except on Christian principles.

Sometimes even high-minded men are apt to say when a great missionary dies on the mission-field at the hands of savages, "What wicked waste!"

The hardest work in the world, it will be seen, is, therefore, left absolutely to Christians who really believe: for it is certain that to reach the heart of a race differing from our own in every point except in our common humanity, to change its springs of action, to give it an altogether new motive in life, reduces the action of a government over the same race to child's play in point of difficulty. Such Christian conquest is always a

miracle of the Holy Ghost, and the more so because Christ our only Master has chosen for this work not angels, but *fallible men*, who have to make their blunders first before they succeed, thus giving the critics (if they are not Christians and disdain the work) a fine field for their abilities.

Surely the story of the Congo Mission for the past year as told in the Reports of the missionaries in the following pages, especially the Wathen Report, should convince all that in the light of Christ's redemption it is possible to believe that there is not a tribe of men, however debased, on the face of the earth out of which Christ cannot make saints of the first rank of purity and glory. Dr. Stewart, of Lovedale, was asked: "Do you civilise, or Christianise first?" "We avoid doing things twice over," was his reply. "When the African is converted, when the one great change of heart and life has been wrought in him, he is civilised"—and it is abundantly clear that the converted African in the Congo country becomes himself a devoted self-denying missionary to his benighted fellow-countrymen.

MATADI, LOWER CONGO RIYER.

The Congo Secretary, Rev. Lawson Forfeitt, who expects to leave England shortly with Mrs. Forfeitt, to resume work at Matadi, writes:—

- "The return to Congo after furlough of several well-tried and experienced missionaries during the year, as well as the addition of much-needed reinforcements, has given much joy to their colleagues, and the history of the year is made notable by the outgoing of our honoured brother, the Rev. George Grenfell, the Chairman of the Congo Executive Committee, especially in view of his expedition in the direction of Lake Albert.
- "The whole of that part of Central Africa will soon be brought into closer touch with civilisation by the railways, which a company has already been formed in Brussels to construct, the one from Stanley Falls to Lake Albert, and the other from Nyangwe to Lake Tangyanika. These projects may well interest all concerned for the welfare of the Dark Continent, for it is well known that these railways will only be used for legitimate commerce, the drink traffic being excluded by law from the Upper Congo, and, indeed, from almost the whole of the vast territory of the Congo Independent State.
- "In January, the first general missionary conference was held at Stanley Pool, when members of all the Protestant missions working in the Congo region were present. Our own Society was well represented, and those whose privilege it was to attend express the earnest hope that the gathering may be repeated in future years.
- "Very kind expressions of appreciation of the work of our Society have been received during the year at several of our stations from His Excellency the Governor-General and other high officials of the State, as well as from the Central Administration in Brussels.
 - "Another noteworthy incident has been the fact that our brother, Rev. Thomas

Lewis, has, during his furlough, read papers by special request before the British Association, the Royal Geographical Society, and other learned societies, on his journeys in the little-known Zombo country, where he recently founded the Comber Memorial Station.

"The publication by the Religious Tract Society of Bunyan's 'Pilgrim's Progress,' translated into the Congo language, by Mr. Lewis, is a welcome event in connection with our mission since the last report was issued, while the Rev. Holman Bentley is making good progress with his translation of the Old Testament."

When Mr. and Mrs. Forfeitt came home on furlough, the Rev. H. Ross Phillips very kindly became acting secretary of the mission and representative to the Congo State Government during Mr. Forfeitt's absence, and our first B.M.S. missionary of the new century, Rev. R. L. Jennings, became his colleague.

Soon after his arrival at Matadi, Mr. Phillips wrote:-

"May I say how pleased and surprised I am at the large amount of work which has been done on the new site? When I left fifteen months ago it was absolute bush, and now to-day I find a station which is most admirably suited for the purposes for which this station has been established. Knowing the difficulties here I appreciate more thoroughly what has been accomplished. If you had been at the service on Sunday when Mr. Jennings and I were welcomed and farewell was said to Mr. and Mrs. Forfeitt, you would have rejoiced to know of the spiritual work which our brother has been able to do in connection with Sancel Chapel. There was real grief at the parting, and it was evident that all the congregation looked up to him as their spiritual father."

In a recent letter, Mr. Phillips writes :-

"There is not much to report for the past twelve months beyond the ordinary routine of the station, with the addition of the building operations. The new house for the Secretary has been exected, thus completing the buildings at our new base station. Mr. Jennings has had the English school for the children of English-speaking coast people, and he has assisted the Swedish Missionary Society brethren in their school for Congo natives. We have also carried on the work at Sancel Chapel as usual. We thank God that we have been permitted to work at the foundations here, so that our brethren may be able to build up the spiritual temple at our other stations on the Congo. Nothing has failed, and for the future our faith is firm."

Mr. Phillips has rendered valuable service to the whole mission during his stay at Matadi, which will be gratefully remembered long after his return to his own station at San Salvador, on Mr. Forfeitt's arrival at Matadi.

SAN SALVADOR STATION.

The Rev. R. H. Carson Graham sends the following report of the work at San Salvador and the district:—

"In closing the report for 1900, I referred to the bitter opposition of the king— Dom Henrique Nteyikenge—to our mission, and his lending himself as a 'oat'spaw to the padres of the Roman Catholic Mission. I have now to report a continuance and increase of the same unreasoning hostility during the first four months of the year 1901.

"The priests not only instigated the rabble to persecute our adherents, but one of them actually attacked them himself on several occasions, until, fearing our people might be provoked to retaliate, we requested the Resident-Governor to put a stop to such illegal proceedings. When Senhor Leal knew of the circumstances he was very indignant, and reported the priest's conduct to the Governor at Kabinda. Since that time the priests and their followers have been content with high-sounding threats.

"Towards the close of April the king died, and even his evil counsellors came to the conclusion that his attitude towards us and our work had brought him no good, and ever since they show much anxiety to secure our goodwill, although they may hate our teaching as much as ever. They leave us alone, however, and that is much to be thankful for.

"The appointment of the new king caused considerable rivalry, there being two chief claimants—one an ignorant tyrant, and the other a partially educated one. The Resident got over the difficulty, however, by setting both aside, and appointing another, who happens to be one of our lapsed members, Dom Pedro Mbemba. Since his accession we have had no active opposition from the native powers that be; the king often asks our advice, and acts upon it, too. This has enabled us to act as peacemakers on two important occasions. The best of this king is that he does not drink, as his predecessors did, and although others may not know it, he says he cannot forget that he once was one of us.

"Our relations with our white rulers have been of the most cordial kind. I received a very grateful acknowledgment from the Governor, through the Resident, for the assistance we rendered to one of the Government officers in his last illness.

"The people of the outlying towns have been greatly oppressed by young men (generally adherents of the Roman Catholic Mission), who, on the plea of recruiting carriers for the Resident and traders, demand food, fowls, and drink, and act most tyrannically in other ways. When complaints reached Mr. Leal, he appointed five or six official recruiters of carriers, and it speaks well for his opinion of the influence of this Mission that he chose only our adherents for these posts. If not all Christians, they are all true Protestants, and hate slavery and oppression in every form.

"Captain and Senhora Leal lost their little son Vasco in April, and I trust our sympathy was helpful to them, and when, in November, Mr. and Mrs. Wooding lost their little one—Walter Grenfell Wooding, who was born on August 18th, 1901—the Resident and his wife, and, indeed, all the traders, as well as the king and the natives, were most kind and sympathetic.

"The death-rate in the Native Church, although not so high as the previous year, was still very severe, no less than eighteen having been called away. Several of these left a bright testimony concerning the power of Christ to save. We shall especially miss R. Elau, H. Elembe, and S. Nsafu. Elau was chief wife of the old king, Dom Pedro V., and ever since her conversion she has been one of our most faithful helpers. Elembe had been for many years an evangelist of the Church. He was brought up by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis, and was a most willing and capable assistant. S. Nsafu was one of the deacons who lived at Mbadza Mputu, where he was a power for good; he carried on the school work there for more than a year without payment, when Elembe had to resign the work through illness.

"Our own work in and from this station has gone on much as usual during the year. The attendances at the Sunday services, Sunday-schools, and C.E. meetings

have kept up well, and in our evangelistic itineration we have generally met with a good reception and an intelligent interest in our message. The medical work makes us many friends, and helps to destroy the people's faith in charms and their fear of witchcraft.

"The industrial training department has received considerable attention. Owing to the kindness of a friend, we have now a good fan-forge and anvil, as well as other blacksmith's tools, and Mr. Wooding has made good use of these, especially in fitting up the stand for our new bell which we hear is on the way in response to my appeal in the MISSIONARY HERALD. Besides overseeing the boys' school and attending to transport, Mr. Bowskill was able to teach a lot of lads to make bricks to be used in his house; which also gave Mr. Wooding the opportunity of training several others in stone-cutting, mason's work and carpentery.

"We have had 'The Free Church Catechism' issued by itself, and besides cards and booklets for school use, the printing press has continued to issue our monthly magazine 'Ngonde ya Ngonde,' to which the natives contribute as well as the missionaries.

"Our week-day services and classes on the station have been very little interfered with. Our every-morning meeting for worship is held in the chapel at 9 o'clock, when we have singing, reading, with generally a short address, and prayer. We often have a large congregation of strangers on 'medicine' mornings. Then we have church classes and preachers' classes, besides the regular Wednesday evening service and the Friday evening women's prayer meeting. But perhaps the most remarkable meetings are the inquirers' classes, especially those held by the ladies for the women; to which they come up regularly from at least eighteen different towns, some of which are between two and three hours distant.

"As to finance, the Native Church contributions for evangelistic work and current expenses during 1900, together with the balance from the previous year, amounted to 68,318 strings of beads, and the new year thankoffering towards the chapel building fund was 20,400 strings, which covered the sum due to the Society on that account, and leaves the new chapel free of debt.

"We have arranged to hold our anniversary services in September, as travelling is not difficult then, and food is plentiful (important considerations, as many of our members come from afar, and all our visitors must be shown hospitality, at least to some extent, by the members living here), and, besides, the chapel was opened in that month, and it was in that season that Messrs. Comber and Grenfell first visited San Salvador. The anniversary services last September extended from Saturday, 14th, till Tuesday, 17th, and all the meetings were well attended, and most enthusiastic.

"Our hopes, expressed in last report, concerning the districts of Mbwela and Mayanda have been realised, for we have had the joy of sending teachers to each of these important centres. Nekaka, with his wife and family, went to Mbwela at the beginning of the year, and Diakenga, with his wife, was appointed to Mayanda towards its close.

"Mrs, Graham and I visited both those districts a few months ago, and were much encouraged by what we saw of the progress of God's work. As I have already sent an account of the whole trip, I need not repeat myself, but merely add that in Mbwela the congregation gathers from seven different towns, and often numbers hundreds. While Nekaka was at Wathen, helping Mr. Bentley with the revision of his translation of the Old Testament, Bukusu volunteered to go and carry on the work at Mbwela till his return. In the Mayanda district there are some seventeen towns in which the Gospel is being preached by the native Christians. Besides the

parent school in Lula they have branch schools in two of the neighbouring towns, and also two others in towns more distant. Diakwga will have a busy time visiting and over-seeing such a large work. We have had several additions to the Church from Mayanda and Mbwela, as well as from Mwingu, Nkaba, Nkoko, and our other less distant sub-stations.

"The work grows steadily, and we ask especially for the prayers of our home helpers that we may have grace to guide wisely, and that the native Christians may be kept faithful to their profession, and zealous for the honour of their Lord, and the progress of His Kingdom.

"SAN SALVADOR STATION STATISTICS FOR 1901.

"Missionaries—3 till September, 2 last quarter (1 at Matadi); missionaries' wives—2; evangelists—5, supported by native Christians, also many unpaid helpers; day-school teachers—5 paid teachers, besides the above, and many honorary workers; stations and sub-stations—9; baptized during the year—54; received otherwise—1 by transfer, 8 restored to fellowship; decrease—18 by death, 4 exclusion; members at close of year—192 natives; girls in all day schools—387; boys in all day schools—404 (several small intermittent schools are not included); girls in Sunday-schools (San Salvador only)—187; boys in Sunday-schools (San Salvador only)—133; teachers in Sunday-schools (San Salvador only)—20; boys' Y.P.S.C.E.—75; girls' Y.P.S.C.E.—50.

"Medical Statistics, 1901.—Out-patients visited—195 recorded; dispensaries—2; women attended at dispensaries—4,651; men attended at dispensaries—5,148."

The Committee report with much thankfulness that Mr. Bowskill, who was compelled to return to England to undergo a surgical operation, has had it most successfully performed by Mr. Alfred Pearce Gould, of Queen Anne Street, is rapidly recovering his strength, and hopes to return to his work at San Salvador in the course of a few months.

Mr. and Mrs. Wooding have also had to return to England in consequence of broken health, and the Committee, with a view to reinforce the staff at that station, have designated and sent out to San Salvador a new missionary, the Rev. Arthur Mayo, of the Pastor's College.

KIBOKOLO, ZOMBO COUNTRY. THE COMBER MEMORIAL STATION.

The Rev. John Pinnock writes:—

- "I am pleased to be able to report steady progress throughout the year in every branch of the work.
 - "We have been blessed with good health, neither of us having had a day's illness.
- "We have been able to erect the first permanent building on the station—my house, a picture of which Mr. Hooper has forwarded. (See Engraving.)
- "We had some difficulty in getting the Zombos to work for us at first, but now no difficulty exists. We have had to refuse several who have applied for work.

"Early in June, a Portuguese trader passed through the district in search of carriers. He was driven out from the Nsungi district, and he and his men had to run until they were well in Kibokolo district.

"The Nsungi people accused the people of this district of sending the trader to them, and unless the palaver was properly settled, and pigs and goats paid to them, they would fight the Kibokolo people.

"On June 13th both parties met on the Nsungi road to settle the palaver. There were about one hundred Nsungi men, armed, and over two hundred Kibokolo men and boys, all armed.

"I took up my position between the two parties (being invited). It was interesting to watch their faces—some full of mischief, others of fright and indifference. Some sat down on the grass, others knelt; but the majority stood.

"Nkila Nkosi (Lion's Tail), a prominent Kibokolo chief, stood up to prove to the Nsungi people that the trader was not sent by them. He spoke for one and a half hours. There were several interruptions. Some of them I had to call to order, as they wanted to fight.

"After they had settled the palaver, and the Nsungi people were found to be in the wrong, I was asked to speak. I took the opportunity of telling them what we came here for. I also told the Nsungi folks how wrong it was of them to drive people away from their towns. The Nsungi people had to pay pigs and cloth to the Kibokolo people. The palaver is now settled.

"Towards the end of June, the Resident at Makela sent soldiers after carriers. The people were all afraid, for they had heard that if they gave no carriers their towns would be burnt.

"In July I visited the Resident at Makela. He appeared to be angry because he failed to get carriers where we are successful. He visited us early in August, and told us (the chiefs being present) that we were not to recruit carriers in this district, but should the men come to us of their own accord, we were to accept them.

"We are very loyal, and carry out the Resident's instructions, and, notwithstanding his threats, we were able to get sufficient carriers to bring up our building materials from Matadi Station. We were somewhat anxious at first, but all anxiety has been dispelled, and things move on as smoothly as one could expect in the midst of heathenism and tyranny.


"We have kept up our visits to the near towns on Sundays; at times we have very encouraging gatherings. We try to get the workmen to attend regularly the Sunday morning services on the station. During the week they attend the morning prayers, together with the sick folks who come to us for treatment.

"The seed is being sown, and we look to the Master who has blessed us with health and strength, and privileged us to serve Him throughout the year; we look to Him for still greater privileges this year, and, if it be His will, for fruit from the seed sown in the past. We are confident that we are not labouring in vain. We shall reap if we faint not.

"Mr. Hooper reports progress in school. The boys are attentive, and are anxious to learn. Some of the Zombo boys can read, and one of them can write his own letters to his friends, and to Mr. Lewis in England.

"There are thirteen boys in school, and all are boarders. Three are from San Salvador, three from Kimfuti, three from our chief here, one from Tumba district, one a waif, and two from outside towns, staying here for treatment of sores.

"We pray that the children may learn to love the Saviour who died for them, and who kindly said: 'Suffer the little children to come unto Me.'

- "One encouraging feature in the work is the increase of patients from the outside towns. Men, women and children come from the surrounding districts—places, we have never visited. We have had to refuse several as we have no accommodation for sick folks. Others are fortunate enough to find friends in the town, and remain with them while under treatment. Many who are unable to walk, send to us for medicine. We do what we can for them, and while they are here, they hear of the Gospel of Salvation.
 - "When we are able to itinerate, we shall find many friends ready to receive us.
- "The country all around is open to us. We pray for the time when we shall be able to visit all the districts and tell the people of the word of Life.
- "I may mention before closing, that Mr. Hooper and I had no help whatever in putting up our new house. We had to do everthing ourselves, from beginning to end.
- "The people, and we on the station, are gladly looking forward to the return of our friends, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis,"

WATHEN, OR NGOMBE STATION.

The following report from the Rev. W. Holman Bentley gives a most striking record of work for the past year, and of growth in spiritual power, aggressive earnestness, and large-hearted generosity on the part of the Native Christian Church at Wathen Station, which cannot fail to call forth praise and thanksgiving to God.

Mr. Bentley writes :-

"The work at Wathen and in its wide district has been marked by steady growth and consolidation during 1901. The Church has largely increased, in spite of a terrible death rate. 1900 saw the centres of work doubled, and the attendance at the station and outpost schools trebled. We have not shot ahead as fast as that again this year, but we have held and developed that great advance, and have commenced work in nine new centres during this year.

"THE STAFF.

"It is very rarely that all the staff are together at Wathen. At the close of the year Mr. Cameron arrived, bringing a wife with him to share his work. He had been absent all the year, as also Miss Brindal, who is still on furlough. During Mr. Cameron's absence Mr. Stephens managed his district, and has worked hard also in the school and other station duties. Mr. Bell has been in charge of the medical work and the afternoon school, and Mr. Frame has busied himself with the heavy building operations which are now on. Besides this, there has been the management of the districts in our charge, which is considered more properly to be 'missionary work,' if such distinctions can be drawn.

"Missionary work here is a great deal more than preaching and the supervision of the Native Church. The management of this busy station sorely taxes our energy and strength. The provisioning and care of the 270 people gathered on the station, the many patients at the dispensary, the making of 100,000 bricks, a school of 230 boys and girls, boarders all; this, with the evangelisation of 3,000 square miles in such a country, is a task for which four men only are very inadequate. Happily, we have had the help of the ladies. My wife, Mrs. Bell, and Mrs. Stephens have worked very

hard—too hard, indeed—and have thus made the work possible to us. They have helped in the school and in many other ways. After two and a-half years Mrs. Stephens's health necessitated a change, and she has been about six months now in England. Mr. Stephens left on furlough in February.

"In November we lost a valuable helper in Mrs. Bell, one whose strong sense of duty often impelled her to work when she should have been resting. In the afternoon of Saturday, the 16th of November, she was attacked by a fever which caused no great anxiety until on the Monday morning following hemoglobinuria appeared. At noon she passed away. The suddenness of this call was most bewildering; it is a terrible loss to us all. Her devoted earnestness and deep interest in the work, as well as her own abilities, made her a most efficient helper.

"THE NATIVE CHURCH.

"The Wathen Church is the church of a district; our members are scattered over an area of 3,000 square miles, and form one Church,

"At the beginning of the year the Church numbered 280. To our great joy 116 have been added by baptism, 1 by transfer from Arthington, and 1 by restoration. This gain of 118 is reduced, however, by 2 expulsions, and 41 deaths, leaving us a net gain of 79, so that at the close of the year we have a membership of 355. This terrible death rate of 14 pericent, has been due in 26 cases to sleeping sickness; many others have been carried off by pneumonia, resulting from the so-called 'influenza,' We are happy to learn that some definite knowledge of the nature of the sleeping sickness has been gained. A Portuguese doctor has discovered the bacterium which produces the disease; it is a polyform occous. It has yet to be studied, and the manner of obtaining an effective antitoxin has yet to be elaborated, but it is a great step made when we know so much. The Congo State bacteriologist at Leopoldville has also found bacteria in post-mortem cases, has isolated and cultivated it, and has fulfilled with it Koch's postulates, thus fully establishing the discovery. We hope that this terrible scourge will become amenable to treatment.

"It is expected of all our native Christians that they engage in Christian work, A goodly number fulfil these expectations, and carry on evangelistic and school work, which will be noted in its place. Their efforts have been blessed, and the 116 added to the Church by baptism this year are largely the result of the earnest work of the native Christians. The field is wide and the labourers But while the magnitude of the work makes us sometimes all too few. impatient of the efforts put forth, there is much call for thankfulness and encouragement. There is an appreciation by the native Christians of the duty incumbent upon them, an alertmess for opportunities, an eye for new points which may be occupied, and in every way a growing intelligence, activity, and aggressiveness in their efforts for the extension of the Master's Kingdom. Some of our Christian people have entered the service of the railway company and of the trading houses; others are employed in one of the State plantations. Many of them seek to conduct an evening service, to do a little school teaching and to lead others There is much seed, to spring up a little later, good influences are exerted, prejudices removed, a desire for instruction created, and many of the lads in our school have been thus led to come to us. We do not have it all our own way, however; there is still much active opposition, some of it bitter and very determined. Some of those most hostile go out of their way to urge the people not to receive the Gospel, assuring them that we and our Christian people only seek to bewitch and destroy them; indeed, in the French Congo if our people go to trade, they are not allowed to sleep in the town, and are obliged to spend the night in the

jungle, wet or fine. Our enemies have told the people there, 'If you find people come to you from our side, offer them palm wine; if they refuse, they are Christians. Have nothing to do with them; they only seek to destroy you. Drive them away.' And so they do.

"A NOBLE EXAMPLE.

"Fifteen evangelists have been supported by the Native Church during the year, and their expenses, amounting to £80, have been fully met. At the close of the year a debt of £11 was outstanding, and in the annual Church meeting we suggested that it should be at once wiped out. Time was given to consult, and little groups formed inside and outside of the building. After a while all gathered again to give the results of the deliberations; those present made their individual promises, and many undertook to raise amounts in their respective towns or districts. The amount, however, was still some two guineas short. We felt that the natives had done well, and considered that, by way of example, we missionaries ought to do something; accordingly, we would find what was left between the seven of us. Two deacons rose at once and thanked us, but desired respectfully to decline the help. They said: 'No! that would be a disgrace to us all; we must clear the debt off ourselves. Give us a little time at the close of the meeting, and we will find all that is necessary.' They found more than was wanted, and the new year opens with a balance in hand.

"This generosity is very encouraging, while the incident reveals what is possible to the Church: it will also be an incentive to more liberal giving from time to time lest another debt occurs. The Church has a reserve fund of £40, plus accumulated interest, to help in case of need; but, as there was nothing critical in the financial condition, the money remains untouched. Besides this, one of our members, Lutunu, formerly a boy of T. J. Comber's, who is a great trader, and a local magistrate under the State, presented the church with barter of the market value of from £22 to £24; but as that is to be used during the new year in opening up new outposts, that money could not be touched. Towards the end of the year we were hesitating as to whether we should keep open one of our outposts. An active native trainer among our members said, 'Do not give it up; I will support it personally, besides what I do regularly'; so the work is continued, and the chief of the town, a very intelligent man, is the best scholar. We have not by any means reached the limit of the possibilities of the Church's generosity; our anxiety and prayer is that more earnest, gifted natives may be thrust forth into the work. The Mission pays nothing whatever in support of the native evangelistic or school work beyond the supply of school stationery and books.

"EVANGELISTIC AND SCHOOL WORK.

"There has been a steady development of the evangelistic work and extension made into some important districts. In one place the work has ceased for the present, because the young teacher died; in another place—a quarry worked by the railway for ballast—the young man who was doing well among some 200 quarry men, is no longer in the service of the company. In nine new places, however, work has been commenced, two of these, at 60 and 70 miles from the station (by road), are the means of opening new districts previously untouched by us, with great possibilities of further extension.

"The periodic visitation of these widely scattered outposts involves a great deal of time and travel; indeed, there is much more to be done than is possible to the present staff, with the heavy work on the station requiring so much of its time. It is very evident that some addition must be made to the Wathen staff if this rapidly

growing and most interesting work is to be carried on. As it is, only the bare minimum of superintendence of the work of the natives is possible, but it is very encouraging to see how much they are doing, and the intelligence and energy which are being brought into exercise. The districts around our older centres of work are planned out among the Church members, and the whole work is in charge of the local deacons, who, in the remoter districts, manage affairs, pay the evangelists their monthly allowances, and account with the treasurer of the Church when they send in the balance of the contributions to him quarterly. In some districts there is evidence of steady work; in others there is a tendency to grow weary where the opposition is strong, and no result seems to follow the efforts; but the steady persistence is telling, and time is slowly bringing round great changes. Perhaps it is hardly correct to say 'slowly,' for the change in the general condition of the country during the last five years is very remarkable. The older men of the country, who hated all innovations and light, are disappearing. Many of the chiefs who opposed our work are dead; sleep sickness has carried off many of them. The principal men of a district meet frequently over their palavers, and drink palm wine from the same cup. If one of them happens to be in any stage of the disease, the others stand a good chance of catching it from him. Only just recently such a case has occurred in a district far away near the Southern frontier.

"I have been trying for two years to sett e a teacher among those people, as some of their young men wished it. The four leading men of the district, however, would not have a teacher among them. Two have recently died of sleep sickness, another has for some time been getting slowly worse, and now the fourth, a hard, wicked man, has been attacked, and the disease is progressing very fast in his case. One of the young men most anxious for the teacher, will, in all probability, soon succeed to be paramount chief. The Christian people of a town five hours away, who are connected with that district, are watching for the chance, and have long had a good teacher ready. Many of the young men of the towns have worked on the railway and elsewhere, and even though heathen, have lost many of the old prejudices and superstitions; many have heard some Christian teachings somewhere, and so the change is steadily coming over the country.

"OUTPOST SCHOOL WORK.

"The outpost school work is improving in quality, but the attendance is not yet as regular as it should be. The absence of all discipline and regularity in the native life is a great difficulty. The scholars are of all ages, and some make good progress. The paid evangelists are in charge of the school work in their towns, but in the many outposts where the work is purely voluntary, and the school is large, many of the church members unite to teach the schools, the deacons being responsible for the steady maintenance of the work.

"At the foot of this report a table is given presenting the statistics of these various centres of work; they are forty-three in number. It will be seen that we have in our day-schools at Wathen, and at the outposts, some 1,507 scholars. At Wathen we have 263 scholars boarding on the station; of these fifty-eight are girls. Many of these had learned to read, and some to write, in the village schools, and have come to us for further teaching and training. The boys who an read have one and a-half hours of school teaching in the morning, as well as attending school in the afternoon for two hours; besides this they have an hour's work of preparation to do in their own time. This latter is a new feature, and is rendered possible by the more intelligent appreciation of their privileges by the scholars. French has been

taught by my wife; the advanced boys have three lessons weekly. Besides this regular school work there is a service every morning, at which all the religious instruction is given by the station staff in turn, day by day. There is a good work going on among our scholars at Wathen, and a large number of them are seeking to follow the Saviour.

"TRAINING WORKERS.

"We feel greatly the need for some higher training for some of our best evangelists and teachers, and for the most advanced among our native Christians. Many would gladly come to the station for a special course of two years if we were able to give them the opportunity; they are dissatisfied with their present attainments and are anxious to learn more. We feel that with our present staff the stations and evangelistic work press now already far too heavily. To add to the strain would be impossible; but in some way the need must be met. All that we are able to do now is to gather these most advanced native Christians together quarterly for a week of special teaching. Four classes per day are conducted in Theology, Homiletics, Church History, and Exegesis; at these classes we have had from eighty to 100 present At the close of the week the Communion Service follows, and to this are gathered our members from twenty miles round us; on the Monday and Tuesday following conferences are held on matters touching native customs, home life, village life, personal cleanliness, comfort, hygiene, social duties, industries, duties to the State and to their country, and the various aspects of applied Christianity.

"These conferences have caused heart-searchings, shame, and diesatisfaction with the present state of things, and a desire for improvement. There is more industry and rightmindedness on the part of the men; the women generally work hard, and need no further pushing in that direction. In a town four hours to the south of Wathen there are eight well built brick houses and a chapel; four hours further on is a brick chapel three years old. This year two very neat chapels—17 by 34 feet, inside measurement—have been built, and all this is entirely their own work without a hint or design from us. One of these chapels is sixty miles south of Wathen, and the Tungwa and Mokuta people are intending to build their own chapel in brick very shortly. What changes we are seeing! Eight years ago all was the darkest heathenism.

"SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.

"At Wathen the Sunday-school during this year has been largely occupied with memorising the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the Beatitudes, 1 Corinthians xiii., 1 John iii., some Psalms, and other portions. Mr. Stephens has had this work in charge, and has had great success with the scholars. Some have memorised a great many portions, and with singular correctness. The Sunday-schools in the villages are carried on on the same lines, and have been very useful. In many of the outposts there has been no Sunday-school as vet. but for nine schools last year we have seventeen this year, so there has been progress.

"TEMPERANCE WORK,

"Our Temperance Society is affiliated with the Belgian section of the Blue Cross which has its centre at Geneva. The year opened with 1,000 members. Most of our outposts have branches, and this year there has been further extension, so that the year closes with a roll of 1,512 members. Total abstinence is not made a sine quâ non of church fellowship, but so strong is their sense of the fitness and necessity in this country, that all our church members are total abstainers. The introduction of alcohol is wisely prohibited by State law, and the members of the Temperance

Society are so keen in their feeling on this point, that it would be almost impossible for alcohol to get into this district without their knowledge, and if it did it would be at once reported. Our temperance roll numbers just five more than the scholars in the day-schools of the district, but a glance at the table at the foot of the report will show that they are not by any means identical columns,

"TRANSLATION WORK.

"My own special duty is the translation of the Old Testament, and I can only regret that I have been unable to do more of it. The visitation of my own particular district, and a great deal of work which it seems impossible to avoid, station duties, palavers, conversation with inquirers, and those needing help and advice, these things take up much time and energy. Notwithstanding, I have been able to finish the translation of the books of Genesis and Proverbs. Genesis is now in the Wathen Press. I hope to commence shortly on the book of Psalms. After having translated with Niemvo, a very intelligent native from the San Salvador district helped me in the revision of the work.

"The increase in our schools, and consequently in the number of our readers, has caused us to run short of books; the editions of our New Testament, and of three other books which the Religious Tract Society kindly printed for us, have nearly run out, so that we must reprint at once. My wife has now completed her translation of Foster's Story of the Bible (Old Testament portion), and that will be ready for the press as soon as the press has finished what is in hand now.

"MINOR DETAILS.

"The Christian Endeavour Society at Wathen has been continued and the weekly meeting is attended by 150 to 200 of our young people. Its varied programme, and homely character are attractive to them, and has been helpful to many.

"The week evenings are fairly full of engagements, prayer meetings, catechumens class, choir meetings, &c., have their time and place.

"The Wathen Press has been busy with binding and other work, and is now at work on Genesis and a French grammar in Congo prepared by my wife.

"The cattle given us by the Congo Government have been well broken in, and have done a little ploughing and carting. We were to share the animals if we had success, and shall shortly be ready to send back four trained animals. We have been very unfortunate in the rearing of the calves, and we are not yet sure that a herd of cattle is to be one of the sights of Wathen. The State has made a road for ox traffic from Tumba to a point on the river 30 miles to the west of us, and meant to make a proper experiment with the oxen for draught. Another road is being made from Songololo on the Congo Railway to Ntumba-mani and the Kwangu River for 2 ton automobiles.

"NEW BUILDINGS.

"Our last report spoke of the need for new buildings. We had provided accommodation for 120 boys, and considered that it would be a great thing to get so many, and still more to find food for them. We have now nearly 200 boys, and yet the food comes in for them, just enough, seldom more or less than our need. So faithfully has our Heavenly Father cared for us all these years that we have almost forgotten to be anxious for the morrow, yet we are often struck with the way in which He proportionates His supply with the actual need of each day. The growth of the school and the large gatherings for the monthly communion service and at the quarterly meetings were quite beyond the possibility of the chapel part of the building given us by Sir Charles Wathen for dormitory and chapel. Neither chapel

nor dormitory were any longer adequate; we have been, therefore, obliged to use the whole building as the chapel, and build new dormitories. The chapel is now 80 by 37 feet. We could seat 1,000 on benches and floor. It is floored throughout with brick. The changes were made in time for our last great Christmas gatherings, which were much larger than anything which we have seen before. They lasted a week. One morning we counted one meeting at 750; that afternoon at least 50 more were present. How inconceivable such meetings were to us a few years ago! Now we can take the great crowd into the chapel in comfort and with nearly 200 running feet of open windows we can breathe and keep awake. We had to find sleeping accommodation for 220 women, some of them from long distances.

[&]quot;Two dormitories in brick with iron roofs are in construction for our boys, and a boys' hall; the dormitories to sleep 100 each. We made and baked 100,000 bricks last senson for these buildings, and have from 80,000 to 100,000 more to make this year to complete what we need. Mr. Frame is in charge of this work. We are very grateful to the committee for the readiness with which they supplied the roofs necessary for these buildings."

The Rev. J. R. M. Stephens has written the following supplementary report:—

"Mr. Bentley has written the general report of our year's labours at Wathen, and these are but a few supplementary remarks, mostly in reference to the school work.

"It was felt early in the year 1901 that more hours should be given to teaching the boys and girls on the station, so that their stay might be shortened, and in the case of the particularly intelligent ones, a more advanced education given. Accordingly, in January, a morning school (lasting from 9.30 to 11 a.m.) was commenced, in addition to the afternoon school of 2 to 4 p.m. The upper classes, only numbering some 90 scholars, were allowed to attend the morning school, and our attempt has been successful, for they have really appreciated the increased opportunity of learning, and we have not found it too much for them.

"As our school has so largely increased, now numbering over 250 boys and girls, it became necessary to use a considerable number of the advanced boys as teachers. They were at first not at all pleased with this, as they felt they would be deprived of the benefit of continuing their own studies. To meet the difficulty I held a teachers' class at the close of the morning school, 11 a.m. to 12.30, and these lads have certainly tried to do well, and the fact clearly emerges that the Congo native is capable of being educated. Of course, in a large school like this, where the children are drawn from every side of the large districts we work, we get some 'duffers,' but the great majority make good progress in the three R's, and some do exceptionally well.

"There is now a more general recognition by the natives of the advantages of education and a greater readiness to let their children come to the station to be taught, and on the part of the children themselves a greater desire to learn, and, taking the work of the school for the past year as a whole, a very satisfactory progress has been made.

"We rejoice also that a good number, after they have resided on the station some time and have begun to understand the meaning of the Gospel, become inquirers, and nearly all the boys who are the teachers and evangelists in our forty-one outposts have been trained on the station and have become Christians through the teaching they have received there.

"We are convinced that the methods we are pursuing are right and wise, and will lead by the quickest and surest way to the entire evangelisation of the country for which Wathen is responsible.

"Our scholars having so largely increased in numbers, we were compelled during the year to enlarge our school, and it is now a really fine building, and when the new dormitories and hall are finished we shall have a good set of premises in which to carry on our work.

"And we are confident it is a work which will grow, and we are now feeling the time is very near when we must make provision for an advanced education for our native evangelists and teachers. Several schemes have been mooted, and we trust in the near future to make some definite arrangements for starting students' classes.

"I have been greatly gladdened by the progress of the work in the north-western district for which I have been responsible the last two years, and I am happy that Mr. Cameron comes back to take up his old work when the prospects are so hopeful.

"We believe that in all our districts there is a crumbling away of the old oppositions, and an awakening by the natives to the realisation that the Gospel is for them and will bring blessing and joy. "We thank God for the great results of the past year, and are full of hope for the coming days,"

STATIONS ON THE UPPER CONGO RIVER.

STANLEY POOL, OR ABTHINGTON STATION.

During the furlough in England and America of Mr. Gordon, the transport work of our missions at this station has been kindly undertaken by Messrs. Morgan and Wilkes, of the Congo Balolo Mission, for which we are very grateful. Mr. and Mrs. Gordon are now on their passage to Africa, and on reaching the Congo Mr. Gordon will resume the management of the work at Stanley Pool.

BOLOBO STATION.

In the absence of the Revs. A. E. Scrivener and J. A. Clark on furlough in England, the Rev. John Whitehead sends the following report for the past year:—

"During 1901 3 have been baptized, 1 received from another church, 3 have been suspended, and I has died. Present number of communicants, 36.

"The work at Bolobo has been sadly checked this year through the enforced absence of the brethren who comprise the usual staff. Mr. Scrivener had already left the previous year, and in April Mr. and Mrs. Clark and Mr. and Mrs. Howelltook leave of us and returned to the homeland for needed rest and change, Mr. Alfred Stonelake has rendered good service by taking the part which Mr. Howell took in the school work, while Mrs. Stonelake and Mrs. Williams have ably assisted when they have been present on the station. One of the young men, Nkosi, has put aside his comforts and fine house, which he has built near the station, and has taken up an interesting work about twenty miles away, at a place called Bongende. We were rejoiced to see him at work the other day at the place. He is doing a good work; the people are able to repeat several hymns, and the first twenty verses of the first chapter of Mark's gospel. The way in which they did it, too, seems to evince that they understood the meaning. We wish the native Christians would rouse themselves to this work. The attendances at the evening services have been moderate, but the Sunday morning and afternoon services have been well attended. The health on the station among the white folk has been on the whole very good during the year. The Lord has given us many mercies.

"In the printing department there has been completed—250 Hymn Books for Monsembe, 250 of a Collection of Native Stories, 250 Primers, 250 Tales and Wonders of Jesus (illustrated), 350 Arithmetics, 250 Acts of the Apostles (these for Monsembe), 560 Hymn Books for Bopoto, and also 250 Tales and Wonders of Jesus (illustrated), 1,000 Hymn Books for the Congo Balolo Mission, and also 500 Mark's gospel, and a small quantity of miscellaneous printing and bookbinding. There is also nearly completed the printing of St. Matthew's gospel for Bopoto; the Free Church Catechiam for Monsembe is in type, and the gospel of Matthew for Monsembe is partly in type, too."

The Rev. A. E. Scrivener, who has just left England to resume his work at Bolobo, writes:—

"During the year the press has received very valuable additions to the plant. Our founder, Josiah Wade, Esq.. has added one of his own machines, an 'Arab' treadle platen machine, and the generosity of numerous friends has enabled me to purchase a Wharfedale demy cylinder machine. Both these machines will be a great help to us in our work of publishing the Gospel and kindred literature in the languages of the Upper Congo. We hope before long to add a guillotine cutting machine, the money collected for the cylinder machine being almost sufficient to purchase a small one."

Miss Lily de Hailes forwards the following review of the past year's work:—

"Although during the past year we have had disappointments, there is now a good deal that is encouraging. Among the Christians some who have caused much trouble have turned from their sin and are living consistent lives. A few weeks ago I started a Saturday evening class for Christians taking up subjects likely to help them in their daily life; it is well attended, and all seem thankful for it.

"There is some light in the darkness at last. At Litimba, a village about five miles off, where I go and spend the day once a week, three men have come out on the Lord's side. It is wonderful to see the way God is working among these people. Those who only a few weeks ago ran away as soon as they saw me coming, now gather together and listen eagerly, and ask questions. They are very anxious to have a teacher to live amongst them, but as we have no one at present to send, they asked if it would be right for them to have a little prayer meeting themselves, and talk together of what they had heard. Of course I told them it was the best thing they could do, so there are from twelve to twenty who meet together every evening. May the Holy Spirit lead very many to follow the Saviour! A few in the villages near us are also beginning to listen more attentively. In my girls' Bible-class two have been converted.

"At my Sunday afternoon Bible-class and week-night school for men five have trusted Christ as their Saviour, the last one last Sunday was one who had small-pox very badly at the beginning of the year. When he was ill and thought he would die he told me he felt he would like to be saved, but when he recovered he was unwilling to give up his sins. Lately he has come to the class, and begun to feel his need of the Saviour, and he said, 'I know I tell you the truth: now I do want to forsake my sins, and I do believe Jesus has died to save me.'

"When there is time I go to the villages on one side of the station, sometimes having talks with a few in their homes. In one shed I have a few girls for a reading class; several usually gather there, and we have a little meeting. In the afternoon I go in an opposite direction, and get a few here and there to have a talk with. I prefer a few who will listen and ask questions to a large meeting, where often there is little attention, and no one likes to speak.

"The first part of the year I was far from well, and then I had a sharp attack of influenza, after which I had a trip up river to Yakusu, and since my return have been quite well and strong again.

"Mr. and Mrs. Grenfell received a very warm welcome on their return, but they are now leaving us again for up-river. The work is great and the labourers are few, though we have often more workers here than at other stations, yet there never seem enough for the work, and many within reach never hear of the Saviour."

BOLOBO HARBOUR AND MISSION STEAMERS "PEACE" AND "GOODWILL."

The Rev. Alfred Stonelake, in the absence in England on furlough of the Rev. John Howell, writes:—

"When we came here two years ago we were welcomed by eight brethren and sisters belonging to this station. To say that for eight months of this year not one of that number had been with us will give some idea of the changes which have taken place. We have missed them very much. It is difficult to fill the places of those who, by long residence and familiarity with the work and people, have won the affection of those gathered around them. For instance, the personal boys and girls of those who have left us have been committed to our care. Now, it is a well recognised characteristic of the children here that, however devoted they may be to their own 'Mondele' and 'Mamma,' they rarely strive in the same way to please those with whom they may be temporarily placed. Of course, their mondele is in no way responsible for this.

"But we have some splendid exceptions. It has been a constant joy to watch the progress of some. Their conduct has shown the presence of the longing, 'Oh, that I knew where I might find Him!' We were especially touched with two girls left in our charge by Mrs. Roger. Soon after they came they said to my wife, 'Mamma, Mamma Roger used to talk and pray with us every evening; we want you to do so also.' This desire to know 'The Truth' is felt by others also, and the cheerful, willing, consistent life of such brings a blessing to our own souls. But that is home life.

"Now for shop life, or shore work, as we term it, in connection with the Steamer Department.

"Do not be frightened, please, when I tell you we have had the even tenor of our way disturbed by some exciting incidents—having, for instance, been on the verge of two separate 'strikes' into period of three days! On one of these occasions steam was up on the *Goodwill*, and Mr. Williams had everything ready for his trip to the Falls, when the men decided to 'strike.' But it speaks for the justice of our cause that we talked the matter over with the men, and the trip was only delayed three hours, without our having to abate our position in the least. Would that they were as easily settled elsewhere out of the Congo!

"It was our sad duty last June to suspend from Church membership and steamer work our native chief engineer for misconduct. It was a painful affair, especially because of his prominence and influence; but he has long since expressed what we trust may prove to be a godly sorrow that worketh repentance to salvation, not to be repented of.

"Unfortunately for ourselves, just at this time we are losing another of our experienced engineers. He is a native of another part of this great river, and is desirous of going back to his people to start evangelistic and school work amongst 'them. We can ill spare him, but we rejoice in such a spirit, and pray he may be made a great blessing in a region wholly untouched as yet by Christian influence.

"We are glad to have the new boiler tubes for the *Peace*. Twice this year whilst running, the *Peace* gave us anxious moments, owing to the old boiler tubes bursting under very inconvenient circumstances. The work of retubing and refitting the *Peace* proceeds apace, and it is hoped she will be ready to proceed up river with the *Goodwill* early in February. She will be largely used by Mr. Grenfell in the work of opening up new stations.

- "Now as to steamer running.
- "Mr. Howell took the first trip for the year with Mr. Williams, but since Mr. Howell's return to England last April, we have only been able to keep one steamer running, practically—the other brother being left in charge of shore work.
- "Nine trips to the Pool have been made to carry down passengers and bring up passengers and cargo. Three trips have been made to the Falls, besides two minor trips. Altogether 9,000 miles have been covered, and 2,760 loads carried, weighing over 80 tons.
- "Mr. and Mrs. Clark, Mr. and Mrs. Howell, Mr. Weeks, Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Stonelake, have been carried down river for home, whilst we have had the joy of welcoming back to the work Mr. Kempton, Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton, Mr. and Mrs. Grenfell, Mr. and Mrs. Millman, Mr. Kirby, and Mr. Meore. Mr. and Mrs. Forfeitt and Miss de Hailes have taken trips for rest and change, and three passengers of the Congo Balolo Mission have been carried by the Goodwill.
- "Mr. and Mrs. Williams have done the bulk of the steamer running, and certainly seem much 'at home' with it.
- "The health of Mr. and Mrs. Williams, my wife, and self has been very good indeed, for which we are very grateful.
- "We have endeavoured to sustain the services on board whilst running each Sunday, and a short prayer meeting has been held each evening when convenient. In this way we try to keep the love of God before their eyes and rejoice to find how eager many are to attend the means of grace.
- "No record of the steamer work for the year would be complete without some reference to the work being carried on by Miss De Hailes in connection with our workmen. Miss De Hailes received such encouragement during her trip to the Falls this year from those who used to attend her evening school that she determined on her return to restart the school for workmen. In this way several who were very difficult to reach have taken an interest in the palavers of God. We earnestly pray the work may grow and prosper, and indeed all work which has for its object the glorifying of our Redeemer and the uplifting of the peoples unto our God."

LUKOLELA STATION.

The Rev. John Whitehead reports :-

"We visited Lukolela in August last, and found everything as well as one could expect. There is one busy worker at Lukolela, and it is Death. In much weakness of body and distress of soul, Bikango has been holding the little fort; his dear wife seems to be passing away with that fearful sickness, sleep sickness; also the wife of another of the Church members. Four of the first batch of converts to be baptized at Lukolela have passed away with this sickness. Bikango, with what little physical strength he has, attempted a little itineration work inland, and reported good times, but he had to give in through lack of bodily vigour. I understand the people are congregating more than they did in recent years in the riverine towns, and that they get good open-air meetings among them. The people inland are very anxious to have a school. When we went up for a visit many were the intercessions they made that we would come often to see them and teach them; we hope soon to be able to arrange for something of the kind on our return to Lukolela, when Mr. Scrivener sets us free by his return to Bolobo."

MONSEMBI STATION.

The Rev. J. H. Weeks is at presentin England on furlough, as are also Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Stonelake, the bad health of Mrs. Stonelake compelling her to leave the Congo.

The following report is from the Rev. C. J. Dodds:-

"Our report for the closing year may be conveniently delineated by the word 'change' and without being unduly pessimistic, one might quote the old lines, 'change and decay in all around I see'; still, there is a brighter side which it may be wise to look more and more upon. For our changes are twofold—viz., those we look upon as for the better and those which to our near-sightedness appear to be otherwise.

"To begin with the latter first. Our staff has been subjected to severe changes.

"During the first three months of the year my wife and I were sharing the loneliness of Mr. and Mrs. Forfeitt at Bopoto. On our return to Monsembi, we had but three or four months of united work when just as Mr. Stonelake was recovering from an attack of fever, Mr. Weeks left us for his furlough. Mr. Stonelake and myself were just settling down again when severe sickness befell Mrs. Stonelake and deprived the work of their efforts. Eventually, as you are aware, they had perforce to leave us alone and proceed to the dear homeland. Many regretting their departure sympathise with us and hope it will not be long ere we see them again at Monsembi.

"Another change of dark portent (as it seems to us) is with respect to our schools. Attendances are diminishing and the number of possible scholars is also decreasing owing to the terrible securge of sleep sickness which is depopulating our district so rapidly. Among our schoolboys alone, since our arrival, two and-a-half years ago, over twenty who were then in attendance have died, and whereas we had then eighty names on our boys' register, we have now only thirty. The girls' department has suffered likewise, so that now ten or a dozen is about the full complement my wife can get to attend her afternoon school.

"We would that someone of skill in these days of medical science and investigation would come out and study this hidden plague! Cannot the B.M.S., the largest Mission on the Congo, have a medical representative here who will devote his time and energies to the discovery and, under Divine blessing, to the cure of this dire malady which threatens these poor people?

"We have also lost by death and removal two of our most experienced members. Lotoba and Salamo left us for Yakusu with Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton, but by the return of the *Goodwill* we had the sad news of the death of Lotoba.

"But now we turn to the other side of the picture.

"Here we find much to encourage in the increasing sway of Christ and His Gospel over the hearts and minds of these people. Not that there is any very marked evidence of the triumph of the Gospel over sin that could be noticed by anyone coming on a trip to Congo, but still the leaven is working. A few weeks ago, on visiting one of our nearer towns, I was requested to destroy the fetishes which were believed to guard their town. They said they no longer believed in them, only they were rather afraid to destroy them, and would be relieved if I would undertake the dangerous task. After kicking some of the more rotten ones over and pulling others up, my boys enjoyed the task of throwing them into the river. I visited that town on the following Sunday, and was pleased to be asked to do the same for some house fetishes. There are others, of course, who are strongly averse to this

procedure, and one such abused his fellows most vehemently for requesting me to destroy their saviours, saying, 'that they will soon all die!' Of course, we did not do this before clearly showing them that the true God is a Spirit, and that they who worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth.

Early in the year four youths were baptized by Mr. Weeks, and last June another youth, who was Mr. Stapleton's 'pundit' in the translation work he so ably accomplished when at Monsembi, was baptized.

"These young men are very enthusiastic in the work of evangelising the surrounding towns and villages. Every Sunday some of them go out to herald the good tidings. They also in turn conduct a Sunday evening service in the school, to which many come who do not care to come in the day time.

"We have not been able to make many long itinerations this year. Mr. and Mrs. Stonelake visited all the towns between Monsembi and Lulanga last March. A little later on I went up river for a week-end, visiting the towns in the Bolomba district. Last June my wife and I had a very pleasant time in the towns between here and Lulanga. Sunday by Sunday we have visited the nearer towns as usual, and thus sought to spread the good news.

"Another 'change for the better' is in an advance station, which we have recently opened at Bonjoko. This school used to be carried on intermittently, and was supported by Bourton-on-the-Water Y.P.S.C.E. One of our young members, Yoka by name, has gone down there to live in a good house we bought for 450 brass rods (10s.). He is much cheered by the number of boys who are coming to school. The girls as yet are shy of coming.

"Lantern services have been held frequently, and have been much appreciated.

"We have received many of the books printed at Bolobo last year, and found them of great use. The Acts, translated by Mr. Stonelake, has been printed, and at present in the press we have the gospels of Matthew and Luke, translated by Mr. Weeks, and also the Free Church Catechism, translated by Mr. Stonelake. Several new hymns also are being printed.

"Our services are being well attended, but not as they were last year; yet there are hopeful signs of an awakening to deeper interest among the people, and we are hoping for much from the efforts of our evangelists among their own folk.

"Thus, if with something to depress, we have much to cheer us as we enter upon the new year with a new colleague, who is due to arrive soon."

BOPOTO STATION.

The Rev. William Forfeitt sends the following report of the past year's work at Bopoto:—

"The year 1901 opened very darkly for us. In January Mrs. Kirkland, after a little over twelve months' labour with us here, died at Bolobo, and in April Mrs. Kenred Smith, after about the same spell of service—spent, however, at Yakusu—laid down her life and entered into rest. These losses have been a heavy blow to the work among the women and girls at Bopoto, and we cannot understand the mysterious ways in which our Father works; still we acquiesce in His will, knowing that He has the key to all mysteries.

"In May we had the pleasure of welcoming Mr. Kenred Smith back from Yakusu, though our joy was mixed with much sadness for the heavy affliction through which he had so lately passed. The welcome from all the people, as well as ourselves, was

a very real and heartfelt one. May God spare us to each other and the work for many a year to come!

"Our school goes on with unabated interest, and is a most encouraging feature of the work. The girls gather at 7.30 a.m. daily until 9.30, when they disperse to make room for the boys. We had an interesting gathering some time ago for the distribution of prizes to those who had been most regular in attendance. The children were allowed to choose one of the several books which compose our little Bopoto library, and it was most gratifying to see their pride and delight in possessing these books. Those who were still struggling with the alphabet very wisely chose the school primer in spite of the fact that it is a much smaller and more insignificant. looking book than the others.

"The services on the Sabbath are well attended, and the people seem to listen with intelligent interest. One morning at the end of the service a chief, who has often expressed his belief in our message, came up to the front of the building, and said he would believe no longer in his fetish, for he knew that our words about God were true. He added that he prayed constantly to God to be kept from the temptation of Satan. As a proof of his sincerity he took off the fetish he was wearing round his neck, and said he would throw it away. I asked him to give it to me as a remembrance of his words, and he did so at once.

"A short time ago the way seemed to be open for starting a branch school at a riverside town about an hour by cance from here. One of our first converts, Likundu, is, with the help of a few boys, preparing the site for a school-house, and a house for the teacher, with the desire of taking up that position himself. We feel that if we do not quickly enter the many doors that are open around us our opportunities will be gone, for the Roman Catholics are busy in the district, and have already established themselves in a large town below us to which we had often made itinerating journeys, and in which we had much hoped to establish a school,

"There is now such a spirit of inquiry and anxiety evident in many of our young people that we are full of hope for the future. The following letter written to me by a young man living in the town will be an illustration of the working of the Spirit among them:—

"'I want to tell you that in my heart is a very great joy. I am thinking of the words of God day and night, and my heart rejoices. In the past I did not rejoice in the things of God, but only those that are bad, but light has come into my heart, now that I have repented of my evil ways. I remember that Jesus shed His blood and has taken away my guilt, and that He confesses us before His Father. He spoke to His Father, saying, "I will go and save the people," then He came, and they slew Him on my account. Now I will confess Him before men and not hide the matter in my heart. Jesus said, "If ye love Me keep My commandments," and now I long to obey that command.

"Early in the year we sent my translation of Matthew's gospel and Mr. Kenred Smith's 'Illustrated Book of the Parables and Miracles' to the press at Bolobo; we are expecting to receive both these books by the Goodwill in a few days. I have now completed the translation of Mark's gospel, which will be sent to the press at once; that will complete the four gospels in the Lifoto language. Both my colleague and I hope to devote more of our time this next year to the interior language than we have yet been able to do. The arrival of our new brother, Mr. Kirby, in a few days is looked forward to by us all with much eagerness, and his presence and help, where we have been short-handed so long, will, we hope, be the means of quickening us in all the departments of our work, and set us more free for

itineration and language study which are so much needed. I have already commenced a translation of Matthew in the Ngombe language, and Mr. Kenred Smith is engaged on portions of Genesis in the same tongue.

"The usual medical work has been carried on throughout the year, and judging from the numbers who avail themselves of our help, our efforts are appreciated. The dreaded scourge of sleep sickness has unfortunately made its appearance in our immediate villages. It may be, as one of our senior lads suggests, a visitation from God to arouse the people from spiritual sleep. We seem to be powerless to do anything for the poor sufferers, and can only urge upon the people the necessity of guarding against contagion.

"The health of the missionaries on the station has been exceptionally good; in fact, not a single day has been lost on account of sickness.

"We are commencing the new year with a week of special services, and have already seen signs of God's blessing. We pray that He may give us a plenteous shower, and that we may have the needed wisdom and grace to guide these dark souls into the light of life."

YAKUSU STATION.

The following Report from the Rev. W. H. Stapleton, revealing the singular advantages of the Yakusu settlement, cannot fail to deeply interest all friends of the Congo Mission, producing, as it surely must, a vivid sense of the strategic wisdom of selecting such a unique centre for influencing so many influential tribes and peoples:—

"It was on October 16th that my wife and I stepped off the s.s. Goodwill on to the beach at Yakusu, so that the brunt of the year's work has fallen upon my colleagues, Messrs. Sutton Smith and Kempton, and I have asked them each to write a report. Mrs. Stapleton is writing something of the work amongst the girls.

"It remains for me to emphasise one or two matters they have touched upon and to point out for your encouragement some hopes, long cherished, which seem well on their way to fulfilment.

"I,-Note the cosmopolitan character of the school as shown by Mr. Kempton's figures. You will remember that Yakusu is situated at the eastern limit of the Lokele territory, and is at the point where the Lokele, Baila, Foma, Turumbu, and Bamanga tribes meet. When, in 1897, the question had to be decided whether or no we should build our station at Yakusu, this was the situation which confronted us. From Yakusu as a centre we might adopt the bold policy of attempting to influence five tribes, or, on the other hand, we might choose a site in the heart of the Lokele country, and give ourselves up to the evangelisation of that one tribe. As it was quite certain that the Baptist Missionary Society could not plant a station amongst each of the five tribes of this district, we decided to attempt the greater task. We felt that the wisdom of this choice depended very largely on the success that would attend our effort to get the boys of the several tribes into our station school. The unwillingness then manifested by these people to leave their villages did not augur very well for our plan, but we adopted it in the confident hope that God would encourage us in our enterprise. The realisation of our hopes has outrun our expectation-surely a cause for deep thankfulness. We have in the station school boys belonging to eight tribes and from sixteen towns. Whilst they are with us they learn to sing the praises of Christ, they hear the Gospel story, learn to read God's Word, and as they go back to their homes may carry some influence for good, and will certainly gain for us a welcome on our itineration journeys; and after Wathen experience we have every reason to hope will in years to come be our outschool teachers and evangelists. We find work in the brickyard for nearly all the boys who come from a distance and are living with us, which easily enables them to earn their support. Mr. Kempton has the charge of these lads.

"II.—I should like to mark the excellent work done by Mr. Sutton Smith amongst the lads. Our boys (youngsters of 10 to 15 years of age) are making bricks by the thousand, which we are proud to show to our visitors and to put into our buildings, and the lads of a little older growth who are bricklaying have done work under his training and superintendence of a character which must surprise those who realise that these lads had never handled a brick three years ago.

"We have the foundations in of a large station store which we shall, all being well, finish this year. And the foundations, too, are laid of the school chapel, delayed so long by the necessity for house building. We hope to have the main structure up by the end of 1902. The whole of the brick-making, tile-making, and laying will be done by native lads trained on our own station. Mr. Sutton Smith has had by far the largest share in the training of these lads, and is to be highly congratulated on the result of his efforts.

"Mr. Smith takes furlough immediately on the arrival of Mr. Millman, whom we expect in January or February.

"Building work will take up much of our time for the next few years, not a surprising thing, considering that we have to fell all our trees in the forest and cut up all our timber by hand, dig our clay, make and burn the bricks and tiles, teach lads how to lay them, and supervise them whilst doing it. Our friends who may be inclined to think our progress slow, must be patient; we are trying to lay the foundations of our station buildings well, so that they will bear a substantial permanent superstructure. No less are we seeking to lay the foundations of our spiritual work broad and deep, that upon them we may build with gold and precious stones a building which will stand the great testing of the day which shall reveal our work what sort it is. We are seeking in this district to 'attempt great things for God.' May you with us be led to expect great things from God, and to wait patiently for Him!

"III.—I would note a movement of the forest folk on the opposite side of the river to the river bank. We heard of towns of the Baila folk some ten hours inland, but had not been able to visit them. These people have now cleared three sites for villages immediately opposite the station, and one village is nearly built. The building of the three villages will give us probably at least another 1,000 people within half an hour's canoeing of the station. A movement like this is likely to grow, and we hear of plenty of people still in the forest.

"IV.—The services are still very encouraging, both in point of numbers and interest. We cannot say that any have yet decided for Christ, but we feel confident that several are very near the kingdom. One of the young married men in the town greatly cheered my wife the other day by saying, 'You know, mamma, I always pray for your kittle girl in England when I pray to God for my own child at night, and He will take care of her, won't He? In this connection I may mention that Mr.

Smith is holding a week-evening class for those desirous to hear more of the good news. He has a large number attending.

"We are still very short of school books and literature generally, but Mr. Smith has the story of the patriarchs ready for the press, and I have just begun a translation of the 'Tales and Wonders of Jesus,' which will be printed and illustrated at our mission press at Bolobo.

"It was a great joy to me to find that the hard work and difficulties of a frontier station had in no wise damped the ardour of my young colleagues, but rather increased their enthusiasm, and we enter upon the new year in a spirit of great hopefulness.

"The prospect before us grows brighter as days pass by, and the time to avail ourselves of the increasing opportunities seems the one thing lacking.

"I cannot close without calling attention to the obligation this station is under to Mr. Kenred Smith, who so cheerfully came to its aid last year. Our brother has given more to Yakusu than any of us, and we all feel keenly his terrible loss. May the Father still comfort and support him!"

The following is the report of the Rev. H. Sutton Smith referred to by Mr. Stapleton:—

"It falls to my lot once again to send some news of events that have happened here throughout another twelve months. Before the end of last year we said good-bye to Mr. Millman, so that Mr. and Mrs. Kenred Smith and myself began the year together. Those happy days of service and fellowship were destined to end tragically. In April the call suddenly came to our brother's wife, and the joy of ministry below was changed to the greater joy and privilege of the heavenly ministry. She died on Saturday night, April 13th, and was laid beside their infant son. Mrs. Kenred Smith left a wide circle of friends in the homeland to unselfishly devote herself to brightening some lives in 'darkest Africa.' Only one brief year was given her, but in that time she endeared herself to many, and won from the people an eloquent tribute of love and respect. That was a sad Sunday, and a heavy blow for our brother; but, strong in faith, his heart was strengthened, enabling him to recognise that the Father worketh in love,

"In March we had had the great pleasure of welcoming the Rev. S. O. Kempton, who immediately afforded us considerable relief by throwing himself with much heartiness and goodwill into the work that he found going on. When, two months after his arrival, circumstances arose compelling the return of Mr. Kenred Smith to Upoto, Mr. Kempton was able to take over the management of the school, and all the labour involved in superintending the work of the boys in the brick and tile yards.

"Our shoka currency has involved quite as much labour as previously to obtain. We have measured out thousands of yards of cloth, and offered umbrellas and shoes, felt and straw hats, spoons and forks, plates and dishes, saucepans and pudding-pans, shirts and vests, white jackets, and a multitude of less bulky things, with varying success, in order to obtain the heavy, rusty shoka in sufficient quantities to enable us to keep our work going, and pay our way with a respectable margin.

"During all this time our hearts were greatly cheered by the continued and growing interest manifested by the people for 'truths Divine.' The morning and afternoon Sunday services for young people and adults have been splendidly attended. We have never lacked an audience, and the gatherings have been far more promiseuous

than we have seen before. On these occasions we have spoken to people from all the Lokele towns. One Sunday perhaps twenty or thirty would be stopping on their way to or from Stanley Falls, and would attend the service. On another Sunday half-a-dozen or so. Once or twice we have had the *élite* of a Lokele town, some sixty or seventy strong, on a visit of four or five days for wreatling contests, and these have come to hear the word of the Gospel. For those who thus but casually hear it is at best only an introduction; an introduction, however, that will prove of real worth to us when we begin a regular visitation of their towns.

"The school is breaking the strength of opposition and suspicion, and we can recall with gratitude several events this year which have exalted the people in our eyes, proving that they can sympathise and help free from the love of reward, which is so detestable, because so marked, a characteristic of these people. It would be easy to speak of their faults, but, putting them all together, they go up in the balance when weighed against the two or three actions that have brought tears of joy to our eyes.

"October was the red-letter month for Yakusu, in that it brought us again Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton. How we shouted with pleasure that wet Wednesday morning when the Goodwill hove in sight! How pleased we were to find them well after their long journey! What a happy meeting, too, was that with the people who had been thought of and prayed for all the long furlough! How the girls rejoiced to see their 'Mamma' back again; and how the mother of Bolamba stared to see her boy whom she had thought would never return, so fine and bonny!

"Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton are the first to return to Yakusu, and it is an omen, we trust, of better, brighter days for this station. We say with full hearts, 'Thou hast crowned the year with Thy goodness.'"

The Rev. S. O. Kempton also sends a most encouraging report :-

"The first thirteen months of my missionary life have been far happier than ever I expected. The joy of service in the foreign field has been mine to the full, especially during the ten months spent at my ewn station. This is principally due to the realised presence and blessing of Christ, and also to the helpful brotherliness of my colleagues. How much of blessing which has come to me, both in personal life and service, is due to the prayers of friends in the homeland I cannot say. But I know my home folks and the churches at Rye Lane, and Canterbury, and Colchester were constant in their prayers, and God was constant in His remembrance. The saddest moments of 1901 were those in which Mrs. Kenred Smith was taken from us, and when we said good-bye to Mr. Kenred Smith as he left us to return alone to Bopoto. Among the gladdest were those in which we welcomed Mr. and Mrs. Stapleton, as once more they took up their missionary labours.

"Now, I suppose, I must say something of the work in which I have been chiefly engaged—brick and tile making, medical and school work. It is neither possible nor desirable to divide our work into water-tight compartments, and so, as need arises and we are able, we help one another. In the three departments I have named, assistance has been given by each member of the staff. Of the making of bricks there is no end; but there is nothing of interest for an annual report in the cutting of anthills and mixing of clays. However, good bricks and tiles mean much to us, and when a leopard chooses to walk over them (as he once did) and thus stamp a new pattern, or tornadoes wreck the brick sheds, a certain variety is imported into the daily routine. Unfortunately, these things rather lessen the output, as we have found lately to our cost.

"Possibly the most important work in which I have taken part is the school work, for this should yield the most permanent results. Figures are notoriously dry, but if friends realise our 180 scholars are drawn from more than sixteen different towns and represent eight different tribes, they will see the widespread nature of our work. Not that we are actually evangelising these eight tribes by means of regular itinerations and sub-stations. We long for the days to come when this will be possible. At present, we are working almost exclusively among the Lokele people, and using their language in the day school supplemented by a little Kiswaluli. However, by one means or another these girls and boys have come to us, and we are confident when they return to their towns it will mean at least a welcome for us and our message whenever we are free to visit them. There is a certain pathos in the incompleteness of these figures, for some of the children are unable to give the names of their parents or towns or tribes. Carried away in infancy as the fruit of some cruel slave raid, and sold and bought in turn according to the will of their owners, they have lost all knowledge of father and mother and home.

"Though in some instances their present masters may be kind and considerate men, yet they never cease to regret having to bear the stigma of slave. The ordinary Congo lad, albeit not sentimental, is proud of his tribe, his town, and his chief. When a lad cannot answer inquiries respecting these I have seen the cheek flush and the tears gather in the eyes. One of the best things the Congo State has done in this neighbourhood was that of crushing the power of the Arabs at Stanley Falls—thus checking, if not wholly putting an end to, slave dealing.

"It is gratifying to be able to report improvement in the punctuality and regularity of those attending school. Their numbers have also increased, in fact, we regret that for the last two months we have daily turned some little ones away as, until we manage to train more native helpers, we cannot teach all who come.

"Of course, all boys who work on the station attend school; and, speaking generally, they have been diligent both in the school and brickyard.

"In these boys and girls lie our hopes for the future evangelisation of this district. Keen, therefore, is our interest in their spiritual welfare. Real is our regret when some who have been seeking to live uprightly and break with bad habits suddenly lapse into their old ways and live as the heathen around them.

"Other lads, through their constancy and faithfulness throughout the year, have been a joy to us, and when they return to their own towns, we pray that they may so live the new life and preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ as to win many converts. In after years we hope to write of many a one in relation to his work among his dusky tribesmen: 'He lured them on to brighter worlds and led the way.'"

WORK AMONGST GIRLS.

Mrs. Stapleton sends the following very cheering report as to her work at Yakusu amongst the girls:—

"It has been left to me to give a short account of work amongst the girls. It was a very great joy to us to reach Yakusu after so long an absence, and to be greeted by so many familiar faces. We received such a warm welcome, flags were flying, and there was a motto over the steps of our house bidding us 'Welcome home.' In a week it seemed almost impossible that we had been away at all, and at the end of a fortnight I took over the girls, and commenced school duties. Some of the older

scholars had married, and gone to live in other towns, but the majority were still with us.

"They gave me most hearty greetings, and have not lost any of their interest in learning to read and write, and are quite unhappy if we miss school for a day. I was very glad to gather them round me, and to find that some of them had greatly improved in their studies. They are a wild, high-spirited lot of girls, but same of them give us good reason to be hopeful. Those who married in our absence have been to pay us a visit, and have shown real pleasure at seeing us again, and have asked for reading books and slates, so that they may not forget what they have earned. One girl has promised to teach the little girls to read in her husband's town, and I believe she will do so. She was our most promising pupil. At several of the towns we shall always receive a welcome, because of Yakusu girls who have been in our school having left us for other homes. One of the best of them has just left us for a home at Yalocha. There was great excitement about her marriage, as two young men were both eager to possess her, and as soon as one of them had struck a bargain with her relatives, she was hurried into their cance, and taken down river by night to her new home. In a few days a piece of plantain leaf was brought along on which she had written to me, 'I am with sorrow to have left without bidding you farewell. Will you send my slate and pencil? I do not want to forget what I have learned. I will try to do right.—Achaka.'

Fig. She had written this little note with a piece of charcoal, and I am keeping my first letter from a Yakusu girl.

"Last week two girls told me that they had refused to be married until they could read well. These are indications of increasing interest in their school, and greatly encouraging to us.

"On the arrival of, Mr. and Mrs. Millman I shall be free to do more for the women of our town. I am often asked by them to spend more time with them, and my welcome amongst them is always pleasantly sineere. The other day a group of mothers were asking me various questions about 'Yakusu,' as they call our little girl, and one woman said, 'Truly, my friends, Mamma Manguête must love us to leave her ohild to come back to us.' Then we had a quiet little talk about Jesus, whose love for them far exceeds ours, although truly we do love them, and seek not to miss opportunities, knowing how short life may be for us out here.

"There are fifty girls in attendance, beside a number of little ones in the infant class, who have not yet had their names registered. One of our first scholars is now helping me in this department, and is proving very useful."

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THE BAHAMAS MISSION. NASSAU, NEW PROVIDENCE, AND OUT ISLANDS.

The churches in the Bahamas Group are now self-supporting and independent of pecuniary aid from the Society in England.

The Rev. C. A. Dann, of Nassau, supplies the following report for the past year:—

"In spite of discouragements in some places, the work as a whole has substantially progressed. The illness which had prostrated my colleague Rev. A. Cooke, at Inagua, and the breakdown of Mrs. Cooke's health, have issued in their leaving us for a more invigorating climate. I hope soon to see another European missionary in charge of that needy district. In Nassau we have added to our European staff Rev. W. M. Jones, who is entirely supported out here. I cannot estimate the help that his godliness, earnestness, and ability have been to the cause, just at a time when the strain of the work was beginning to tell seriously upon me. Before he left Inagual Mr. Cooke was happily able to visit the stations on Mayaguana, Acklin's Island, Crooked Island, and Fortune Island, and to baptize a large number of candidates. He was also able to report the opening of two new chapels; viz., at 'True Blue' (Crooked Island) and Chester (Acklin's Island). Mr. Jones has visited Long Island and Exuma, and I have been able to go to Inagua, Eleuthera Andros Island, and Cat Island. Some of the churches on Andros are in an unsatisfactory state, but my visit has been made useful to them, and is likely to lead to greater stability and more fervent zeal. Mr. W. D. Scott was elected and ordained as pastor for the Nicoll's Town district of Andros Island. Our membership is now 3,819, a clear increase of 138. New chapels have been opened, in the Northern district, at Tea Bay (Cat Island), Lower Sound (Andros Island), and Rolle Town (Exuma).

"The Mother Church at Nassau is still vigorous. The increase of the Sundayschool is very encouraging. The net increase of Church membership is 11."

THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT.

The Rev. A. Cooke, in consequence of the state of Mrs. Cooke's health, and her inability to live in the climate of the West Indies, has been compelled to relinquish his work in the Southern District and return to England.

Mr. Dann writes: "I am arranging for Brother Jones to occupy the vacant position for a time, at any rate."

TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS, AND SAN DOMINGO.

The churches in these islands are also self-supporting, and independent of any assistance from the Baptist Missionary Society.

The annual Report from the Rev. J. H. Pusey, the pastor of the Grand Turk Baptist Church, has not, as yet, been received.

THE ISLAND OF TRINIDAD.

In this island also the Committee have practically withdrawn from pecuniary aid, throwing the maintenance of Christian worship and work upon the friends associated in church fellowship.

During the autumn of last year the Rev. R. E. Gammon, Pastor of St. John's Church, in Port of Spain, suffered from a very severe attack of malarial fever. After taking a brief change to Barbadoes, resulting in no improvement, he was advised by two medical experts that the only hope of recovery would be an immediate change to England. After reaching this country he was for many weeks so ill that his life was despaired of. In March, however, the fever abated, and he is now slowly recovering, but will never again be able to live in a tropical climate, the doctors stating that a return to Trinidad would simply mean a fresh attack, with almost the certainty of a speedy and fatal termination. The committee have, therefore, very regretfully felt compelled to inform the St. John's Church officers that Mr. Gammon must relinquish the thought of resuming work in Port of Spain, and remain in England.

Mr. Gammon has been able to send the following report:—

"It is with great regret that at the close of fourteen years' work in Port of Spain I cannot report more progress. During the past year my sickness has prevented me from doing the amount of pastoral visitation which is so necessary to the welfare of the church. Nevertheless, there have been tokens of the Divine presence and blessing—there has been a net increase of twelve members, and but for my being obliged to leave Trinidad for a change, five or six of our youths who have grown up in the Sunday-school would have been baptized, in addition to the five reported.

"There have been three losses by death, the last being that of the wife of our worthy deacon and treasurer, Captain Hamlyn. She will be greatly missed by the church, and we all deeply sympathise with our treasurer in his sorrow.

"The women's meeting at Belmont has been kept up by Mrs. Smith, Mrs. A. J.

Hamlyn, and Mrs. Gammon, and good work has been done in the Sunday-schools at St. John's and Belmont under the superintendency of Mr. L. O. Inniss and Miss Darwent. Although the C.E. Society has not grown much of late, most of the old members remain steadfast in their adherence to it.

"At both the missions at Belmont and Chaguanas the services have been conducted by our members from St. John's Church—Mr. W. Cook being chiefly responsible for the work at Chaguanas—for this mission I baptized four candidates during the year.

"SOUTHERN DISTRICT.

"The reports from the various churches in this district tell of much uphill toll with a certain amount of success,

"Pastor James Saunders, of Princes Town, died at the end of last June. He was an earnest evangelist, and had great influence over the people with whom he had to do.

"There were 29 baptized in this district during the year. I had the pleasure of opening a fine new church of cedar wood at Fifth Company early in the year; this has been built by the people themselves, and is practically, if not quite, out of debt.

"Since illness has driven me to England in search of health, the respected pastor, Charles Webb, of Fourth Company, has had superintendence of this district, and from the various reports sent through him I am enabled to make up this short account and the statistics.

"May a richer divine blessing rest upon the work in Trinidad for 1902 is my earnest prayer."

THE ISLAND OF JAMAICA.

THE CALABAR COLLEGE, KINGSTON.

President—The Rev. ARTHUR JAMES, B.A.

The following is the report of the college for the past year:-

"The year 1901 was one of great changes in the history of the college; some of a permanent and others of a temporary character. Of the former the chief was the reduction of the institution to a single department. With the close of 1900 the Normal department ceased to be, and the work of the college was limited to the training of students for the ministry. This change was rendered inevitable by the action of the Government in withdrawing all monetary aid from Normal Schools that were under denominational management, with the exception of two, in which women teachers were being trained.

"In the month of May the Rev. Arthur James, B.A., President, and Mrs. James went on furlough to their native land. This step became necessary on account of the state of their health, especially that of Mrs. James. The committee are thankful that the change has been beneficial; and although it has not been deemed wise for Mrs. James to return to Jamaica yet, the committee have had the pleasure of welcoming the return of the president, and it is confidently expected that Mrs. James will be able to come back at an early date.

"While Mr. James was in England the committee gratefully report that he interested himself greatly in the institution, and sought to promote its welfare in every possible way, both by interviews with the committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, and by appeals to friends of the college in England for pecuniary aid towards

the erection of new college buildings. While the committee of the Society cordially endorsed Mr. James's appeal, and consented to receive any sums that might be sent to the Mission House on behalf of this special fund, they also consented to the old premises being sold, and the proceeds being devoted to the erection of the new buildings.

"During the absence of Mr. and Mrs. James the committee record with thankfulness the fact that the Rev. W. Pratt, M.A., and Mrs. Pratt kindly consented to take charge of the college; Mr. Pratt undertaking tutorial work and other duties pertaining to the presidency, and Mrs. Pratt making herself responsible for the domestic arrangements. The committee have much pleasure in expressing their cordial appreciation of the whole-hearted and efficient service so freely given to the institution by Mr. and Mrs. Pratt for a considerable part of the year.

"The Rev. Leonard Tucker, M.A., who had been Normal tutor for twelve years, resigned his position in connection with the college, and returned to England with Mrs. Tucker in May. The committee expressed in a resolution their appreciation of Mr. Tucker's services, and their good wishes for himself and Mrs. Tucker in their future sphere of labour, wherever, in the providence of God, that might be.

"The great subject that presses upon the committee, and that is commended to the cordial sympathy and practical assistance of the friends of the college is the provision of new buildings for its future work. This is an absolute necessity if the college is to be maintained at all. The present buildings are unsuitable for various reasons, and the committee, confident that all who know them agree with this judgment of them, make a pressing appeal for help in providing better. A most desirable piece of land, about eleven acres in extent, has been secured and paid for; a loan of £200 from the Jamaica Baptist Union Jubilee and Twentieth Century Fund having been effected to complete the purchase. The buildings to be erected, according to plans which have in general been approved by the committee of the college and the committee of the Baptist Missionary Society of England, will involve an immediate outlay of not less than £2,000. Towards this amount the committee have, available, nearly £700, the balance of legacies to the college, in the hands of the English Committee, and £220, the amount sent to the Mission House in London in response to the president's appeal. It is hoped that further help will be received from this source. In addition to this, the committee will have the amount that may be realised by the sale of the present premises. There will still be a large balance to be provided, and to secure this, pastors and churches, and old students (ministers and teachers) are earnestly invited to give their aid, as they value an educated native Christian ministry, and desire to promote the interests of the Jamaica Baptist churches in years to come."

The Committee warmly commend this appeal to the generous sympathy of their friends and supporters in the home churches.

THE JAMAICA CHURCHES.

The Fifty-second Annual Report of the Jamaica Baptist Union does not supply very encouraging accounts of the churches. The following are extracts:—

"STRESS AND STRAIN.

[&]quot;The dominant feature, from which there is scarcely any escape, is the bitter cry

of 'hard times.' 'Stress and strain have marked the year' is a sentence that may be taken as summarising the majority of the reports, in so far as they refer to the temporal circumstances of the churches.

"By almost universal consent it is admitted that the spiritual condition of the churches is very low. By the side of the small number of instances in which the report speaks thankfully or hopefully of the spiritual aspects of church life and work, may be found many in which it is deplored that the signs of spiritual life and activity are few and feeble,

"The statistics which have been sent in for the past year are the most depressing which have been presented for many years, with the exception of those for 1897, to which these furnish an approximate parallel. Omitting that year, we must go back as far as 1876 to find so few baptized, and the number of back-sliders restored to church fellowship is much below the average.

"The total number of additions to the churches was 2,690, as against losses reaching an aggregate of 3,507, thus showing an apparent decrease of 817. The actual decrease, however, is 694, as 123 members were 'dismissed' from two churches for the purpose of forming two others. The members thus transferred have, in no real sense, been lost, though they represent a decrease in the churches to which they formerly belonged, and cannot be included in the membership shown in last year's tabular statement.

"The totals, added and lost, are made up in the following manner:-

The total membership is 32,208.

"CHURCHES ABBOAD.

"There are now fifteen churches in other countries which are affiliated to the Union, from all of which reports have been received.

"The statistics from the foreign churches show that they have chapel accommodation for 3,630 persons, with place for 1,000 more in their out-stations. They had additions by baptism 134, by restoration 55, by receival 58, making a total of 247. They had losses by death 32, by exclusion 50, by dismissal 23, by withdrawal 6, by erasure 50; total 161. There is thus a clear increase of 86. Their membership numbers 1,132, their inquirers 118, and they raised £266 18s. 10d. for building purposes.

"In reviewing the records of the past year a certain measure of disappointment will surely be experienced by all the members of this Union, as there have been so many indications of retrogression. A falling off in the number of conversions, restorations, members and inquirers, and in contributions for ohurch purposes, buildings and missionary objects; the increasing love of the world, and indifference

to the claims of spiritual religion; and the apparent lack of real power on the part of the churches generally to overcome these evils, are circumstances that call for the most earnest thought, fervent prayer, and diligent heaven-directed action. Let pastors, officers, and members exert all their power, in unreserved reliance upon the Holy Spirit, to counteract the evil influences that abound. And by faithful proclamation of 'the things most surely believed among us'; by discreet and conscientious maintenance of New Testament church discipline; by the 'full and glad surrender' of life, with all its powers, possibilities and possessions, to God and His service; and by the manifestation of the 'sweetness and light' of the Gospel in the daily citizenship, seek to commend the churches 'to every man's conscience in the sight of God'; and thus be the means of stemming the backward flow, and of causing the tide to turn and usher in a period of spiritual prosperity."

BRITTANY.

PRINCIPAL STATION AND MISSIONARY.

BRITTANY .- Morlaix .- Rev. A. L. JENKINS.

"With regard to our progress during the year, I am glad to be able to report favourably.

"As to the general state of France it is in a more satisfactory condition than it was. As compared with the unrest caused by a succession of political upheavals in which the hand of the Roman Church was clearly visible, we are now sailing in smooth waters. The Church's interference in the realm of politics has been visited by a sore punishment; a law has been passed suppressing all unauthorised religious orders, and placing all the rest under the supervision and control of the State. What is worse still is that the privilege they had of having primary schools is about to be withdrawn, and a million and a half of children will thus be snatched out of their hands. It looks as if things were making fast for separation of Church and State in France.

"The clergy, on the other hand, is straining every nerve to keep abreast of the times, and to strengthen its position. I never knew it so active or so aggressive as at the present time. In Brittany it seems to have awakened to the danger from Protestantism. Hardly a Sabbath passes without a word of warning or some denunciation against it from our Breton pulpits. The cause is not the increase of

Protestants, as such, but the unquestionable spread of the spirit of Protestantism among the Breton rural population. Everything tends to foster it: the diffusion of knowledge in the Government schools, the universal influence of the press, barrack life, through which every young man has to pass, and the constant wrangle on political, social, and religious topics—everything breeds that spirit of independence which is the dread foe of Romanism. There was a time, which I remember well, when Church, State, and people were all in direct antagonism with our aims; the clergy alone confront us now with determined hostility."

Reporting upon the work at the various stations of the mission, Mr. Jenkins writes:—

"Morlaix.—The French part of the work has been carried on as usual in this town. The services have been faithfully attended by our small Protestant community, and the Bible-class has been followed by a small band of ten children. In connection with this part of the work there are one or two cases that may be mentioned. One is that of a former Roman Catholic theological student. This young man, whilst in the institution at Nantes, had his previous doubts intensified by a Protestant controversial book which was placed in his hands, together with a Jesuit Father's answers to it. His views underwent such a change in consequence that he began a correspondence with the Protestant pastor of Nantes. This was discovered, and it led to his leaving the institution. Circumstances brought him to Morlaix, where he remained a whole year, and decided to consecrate himself to the work of evangelisation among his own countrymen. He is now engaged as a colporteur by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

"La Madeleine.—The Breton meetings in our mission hall here have been regularly held every Sabbath evening. The attendance has varied very much, as we depend largely on outsiders, whilst the opposition from various quarters is ceaseless. I trust, however, that there will be an improvement, as our good friend Lohou, who was till lately at Primel, has become the manager of the rope factory on which the working class of this neighbourhood very much depend. His influence among the men will, I am sure, work for good. The former manager was a bigotted man, bitterly hostile to our efforts. He it was that had an altar erected in the workshop on which stood a statue of Magdalene in gorgeous array. Lohou's first act was to remove this cumbrous piece of idolatry out of the place.

"Primel.—I have continued to visit this small fishing village at regular intervals. The meetings have been followed by an average of forty persons, most women, the men being most of the time out at sea fishing. The Sunday-school is followed by about fifteen boys and girls. Another fishing village, about three miles further west, has also been visited at intervals, and with encouraging results. A great and good work has been done at Primel. Our friend Lohou's long residence in the place, my own sister's visits in the fishermen's homes, together with the meetings in the mission hall, have broken down the old bulwarks of prejudice, and the sympathy of the people has been drawn out, whilst their understanding has been enlightened, and their hearts softened. The consequence is that at Primel, where, some years ago, our effects were looked upon with suspicion and ill-will, we feel we now stand on friendly ground, that the enemy has here lost its hold, and looks upon these people as having gone over and become decidedly Protestants.

"In the neighbouring village of *Plougasnou*, that interesting woman of whom I spoke in my last report, Jose, has continued to work on her own lines. Eccentric, mystical, beyond herself, as some deem her to be, to us she is beyond a doubt

possessed with the Spirit of Holiness. Cross in hand, she has on several occasions stood beside the churchyard, and addressed the people as they came out of mass, denouncing the corruption of Church and people, and prophesying dire calamities. Although she has been refused absolution and communion on this account, she still attends the village church, considering herself still a member of the Roman Catholic Church, and hoping against hope that a reformation will take place from within; but whenever she can do so she also comes to Primel to our service, after which she likes to have a talk, and to unburden her heart, feeling that she is in the midst of friends who understand her spiritual longings.

"Lanneanou.—The work under Mr. Collober's direction in this place and its extensive district has progressed favourably, despite opposition from several quarters. Several houses where he used to preach, in the parish of Scrignae, have been closed not through any change of feeling in the people themselves, but owing to threats on the part of the vicar. In one place, at Kergor, where for years meetings have been held, and where a good number of people used to come together, we are at present without a suitable place to hold the meetings for the same reason, because the vicar threatened to exclude from the sacraments the child of the people in whose house the meetings had hitherto been held, should they continue to receive us. Our friend Collober suggests, therefore, in his report that some movable small iron rooms should, if possible, be erected in places where a congregation has been brought together.

"The Guilly School.—Mr. Chopin writes very favourably about the school under his direction The number of our day pupils, he says, has been about sixty. The evening classes have been followed by thirty young men and grown-up people. The Sunday-school numbers twenty-five pupils, who have all been faithful in their attendance. The Sabbath services have also been well attended, all, or nearly all the families in the hamlet being represented at the meetings. The temperance society is in progress, having thirty-six members. This society of the Guilly led the inspector of primary schools in the district to start similar societies in all the Government schools under his direction, and they have adopted the temperance songs composed by Mr. Chopin himself. In the course of the year Mr. Chopin has been awarded the silver medal for educational work done after school hours.

"When we remember that the Guilly people used to be known by their neighbours as the 'Guilly wolves' these instances show, as Mr. Chopin says, that the Lord has been in our midst.

"Roscoff.—Mr. David has continued his labours in this harbour giving his time to the Sailors' Rest and the work of evangelisation in the surrounding district. The reading room at the Sailors' Rest has been open every other day in the week, and services have been held on the Sabbath mornings. During the week days our brother has visited the farmers in their houses and sold, wherever he could do so, copies of the Scriptures, or given away tracts. As a rule he has been received politely, but the sway of the priest and squire are supreme in this part of the country, and you cannot talk with the country people without seeing that they stand in perfect dread of them both.

"Our friends the colporteurs Herret, of Cartrain, and Morvan have faithfully carried on their work of selling the Scriptures, and they have sold about 2,000 copies between them. They both testify to the increasing facilities they meet with in their work, and to the feeling they both have that the time is ripening for some great change in the religious state of the country."

THE NORTHERN DISTRICT.

The Rev. W. K. Landels, reporting upon extension work carried on in the North Italian District during the past year, writes;—

"In order to get a true idea of the progress and prosperity of a mission, it is well from time to time to look back some ten years, and to compare the state of the work then with its present condition and development. In doing this in connection with our work in the North of Italy, the one feeling that stirs our hearts is thankfulness to God for what He has wrought. Our efforts have often been weak, blundering, and inadequate, and yet there has been substantial progress.

"In the year 1892 we had only two stations in the district; we have now eleven. Of these, four came to us by arrangement with the American society, but five represent the natural growth of the mission. Ten years ago our membership was 119; it is now 310. Of these members 35 have come to us in connection with the stations taken over from our American brethren. The net increase, therefore, by the natural development of the work has been 156, which represents a growth of 131 per cent. Now it is well to note that this progress has been made in spite of exceptionally heavy losses by emigration. Last year, for instance, our Church in Genoa lost no less than ten members by this cause alone. Happily these are not lost to the cause of Christ, but year after year our total membership is greatly reduced by our converts leaving for far-off countries.

"Coming now to the question of finances, this retrospect must limit itself to the funds of the Turin church, as I have not the figures for the whole district by me.

"In the year 1888, the first of my sojourn in this city, the amount raised by the church was £9 3s, 9½d. In 1892 the sum collected was £32 3s. 0d. Last year the total amounted to £81 3s, 9½d. Here too, we have substantial progress not only as regards the total sum raised, but also in respect of the amount contributed per member. Ten years ago it was 15s. 8½d.; last year it was £1 0s. 0½d. In judging of these figures it needs to be remembered that the church is composed exclusively of the poor. Many of them earn scarcely enough to hold body and soul together; there are only two among them whose wages amount to 25s. a week,

"Before passing on, to speak in detail of the work, I may here add a summary of statistics. The total membership, as before stated, is 310, a net increase on last year of fifteen. The children in the Sunday-schools number 203, with 19 teachers. The amount raised in the whole district has been £139 6s. 1d.; in Turin, £81 3s. 9½d.; in Meana and Susa, £12 5s. $7\frac{1}{2}d.$; in Torre Pellice, £14; in Cuneo and Castelletto, £3 16s.; in Genoa, £28 0s. 8d."

OUR WORK IN TURIN.

The Rev. Robert Walker reports:-

"Since July the work of the church has been carried on in a temporary hall, arranged on the new premises, to which reference was made in last year's report. As it is only a temporary hall we do not complain of it, but hope it will soon be replaced by a suitable and commodious chapel, the need of which we all feel to be increasingly urgent. Our experience thus far tends to confirm our conviction that the locality is well chosen, and that when the new chapel is erected the work will enter on a new and much more prosperous stage. The present locale is too small and not well adapted to our purpose, yet the removal from Via Maria Vittoria has involved no loss, except that of a few scholars from the Sunday-school, for whom the distance is too great. This loss, however, we hope to more than counterbalance in the near future. As soon as we have a suitable home for our mission we expect a large increase in the attendance of both adults and children from the neighbourhood.

"During the year we lost four members by death, and fourteen were received into membership, of whom nine by baptism. The total number of communicants at the end of the year was eighty-one. Among the additions we are very pleased to have our old friend Leonardo Schieda and his wife from Naples. Through the kindness of Miss Emery, the sister of the lady who, when alive, used to help all our missions very generously, Leonardo has come to labour here as a colporteur. We expect good results from his work in many directions, both in the city and the neighbourhood. By distributing tracts and handbills, by the sale of Scriptures, and by his conversations with the people, the Gospel will reach many, and our mission will be well advertised.

"The Galleria Hall continues to furnish abundant opportunities for sowing the seed of the Kingdom. The attendance at the meetings was well sustained throughout the year, and the attention was all that could be desired. Many times people who come in from sheer curiosity begin to listen and remain to the end of the service. Some of them come again and again with evident pleasure and interest. Yet we must confess to a feeling of deep disappointment that, while large numbers hear the Gospel invitation, very few of them accept it. They are interested and intellectually convinced, but they refuse to 'take up their cross and follow' the Saviour in the holy life. In this hall we have held an English service on Sunday morning throughout the year, except during the summer months. The Church of England used to have a chaplain here, but for the last two years the English residents and visitors have had practically no opportunity of enjoying any service hut ours. We tried to get the residents to attend the Italian services, but without success, so decided to begin an English one for them. Of course, the congregations are small, but we know that the service is appreciated. Mr. Landels and I take this service in turn, as we now do all the Italian services in Turin."

MOUNTAIN WORK.

The Rev. W. K. Landels reports:—

"Our mountain work is being carried on in three districts: (i.) In the Valley of Susa and Meana to the West; (ii.) In the Valleys of Torre Pellice and San Germano to the South-West; (iii.) In the Valley of Cuneo and Castelletto to the South.

SUSA AND MEANA.

"During the past year the whole of this district, comprising five different centres of work, has been under the care of our indefatigable brother, G. B. Scrajber. The only outside help that he has received has been rendered by two of the brethren of the church in Turin, who once a fortnight have gone up to Susa to conduct the services there, and occasionally to take the Sunday meeting in Meana.

"Signor Scrajber has been nobly doing far more than one man ought ever to attempt. Every week he has had meetings and Sunday-school to conduct in four different parishes, and in halls rented for the purpose. In addition to that he has held numerous cottage meetings in far-away villages, gathering the people together, now in a stable, now in a granary or hay-loft, or, indeed, in any other place that came handy. His average weekly number of meetings has during the winter months been not less than eleven or twelve.

"All this it would have been impossible to overtake had not the Lord raised up a little band of willing helpers. One of these is a convert in Susa, a shoemaker by trade, and the other two are the fruit of the work in Mattie. These men have been trained to assist in the Sunday-schools, and even to take a service in case of need. But even with their help Signor Scrajber has had far too much to do.

"Happily, through the kindness of Mr. Joseph Russell, of Port Glasgow, we have been able to appoint a temporary assistant, who has been stationed in Susa, and who will undertake the work there and in Gravere, leaving the parishes of Meana, Mattie, and San Giorio to the care of Signor Scrajber.

"The young man appointed to Susa is a Waldensian by birth, his father being an evangelist schoolmaster in a little town on the shores of Lago di Garda. Some twenty years ago the father was himself stationed in Susa; and so, in the strange providence of God, it has come about that our young evangelist, Silvio Buffa, is now bearing witness for Christ in the town of his birth. He is a young man of some education and considerable attainments; he is a great student, and full of zeal for the cause of Christ. He joined the church in Turin in May, 1900, was baptized in the same month, and since then has been an active worker in connection with the Sunday-school and the Society of Christian Endeavour, and, moreover, is one of the two who from time to time have been sent up to assist in the mountain work. After having tried him in every way, we feel sure that there is in him the making of an evangelist far above the average in ability and usefulness, and we therefore trust that the means will be found for securing his services permanently for the Mission. Our desire is that he may be appointed as student-evangelist for this district. I may add here that he has been for some years in business in connection with an English house, and that he gave up a considerably larger salary than he is now receiving in order to devote himself to Christian work.

"Regarding the work in Meana, Susa, Mattie, and Gravere little needs to be said here. The work has been going on steadily, and while there has been no actual growth in the membership of the church, the brethren have been making progress in the Christian life, large numbers of persons have listened to the preaching of the Gospel, and there are now a number awaiting baptism, some of whom are striking cases of conversion.

"In Meana the whole population has rejoiced at the erection of the clock and bell; the property has been otherwise improved, and the debt on the chapel has been reduced by about £55 sterling, of which the greater part was raised in the country."

EXTENSION AND OPPOSITION.

Mr. Landels reports the following experience of opposition in connection with evangelistic work in the Meana District:—

"A hard walk of about four hours across Means in an easterly direction brings one to a village called Re (pronounced Ray), the only approach to which is by a number of bridle paths. The village belongs to a district called San Giorio, which comprises two small towns and a number of hamlets. The administration of the district is in the hands of one municipality, but ecclesiastically it is divided into two parishes -- the Upper and the Lower. The village Re belongs to the former, and is the highest part of the parish. Two men living there had on several occasions been in the meetings in Mattie, and had then invited us to go and preach the Gospel in their own village, and so at length we decided to hold a service there on the first Sunday of June last. Our intention having reached the ears of the priest, he immediately made arrangements with the communal and political local authorities to prevent the meeting being held. In consequence of this, a few days before the time fixed for our visit we received an official intimation from the mayor, which was afterwards confirmed by the sub-prefect, that he would not permit any evangelical meeting to be held. Feeling that this prohibition was illegal, we determined to hold the service at all costs, taking the precaution, however, to act in such a manner as not to infringe the law. The meeting was held, the whole of the population listened eagarly to the preaching of the Gospel, the presence of the Spirit of God was manifest, and a desire was aroused in the people and expressed by them to hear more. Before leaving we promised to hold a second meeting on the 29th of the same month.

"The wrath of the authorities may be imagined. They immediately took proceedings against us, and on October 18th we were called before the magistrate in Susa to answer the charges: (i.) of having held a public meeting without first informing the local authorities at least twenty-four hours before; (ii.) of having held the meeting in spite of the prohibition of the mayor and of the sub-prefect. It would take too long here to go into all the details of the case. Suffice it to say that the verdict was entirely in our favour, declaring that we had done nothing contrary to the law, and once more affirming the great principle of liberty of conscience and of worship. The verdict was received with applause in a crowded court.

"Since that time the work in San Giorio has been going on with every sign of blessing. A hall has been taken, regular services have been established, and at least 90 per cent, of the inhabitants of the village Re have ranged themselves on our side. To show how the wrath of man is made to praise God, I may add that the movement is beginning to spread beyond the one village. The priest of the lower parish has been putting his colleague of the upper parish to ridicule because he has allowed the Protestants to gain a footing in his domain. He, poor man, smarting under the ridicule, and still more moved by the fact that his income has been considerably diminished, has been persuading some of the people below to invite us there, in the hope that if we gain a footing in that parish, which is much easier of access, we shall

withdraw from the village Re. We are hoping, therefore, before long to invade the lower parish of San Giorio; not only so, but we have been informed that we are to receive invitations to preach in four other places.

TORRE PELLICE AND SAN GERMANO.

"As pointed out in the report of last year, the mission in Torre Pellice, on its being taken over by us, had virtually to be begun anew. Signor Cesano has now been labouring there for about fourteen months, and I believe has put his whole soul and strength into the work. Nor has he been without blessing. The attendance at the several services has greatly increased; five persons during last year confessed Christ in baptism; the Sunday-school is better attended than formerly; and Signor Cesano has been able to establish cottage meetings in several directions. The prospects of the work are now most hopeful, as may be gathered from extracts of a letter addressed to me under date of January 21st last.

"'I can now send you news which will cause you and brother Walker, and indeed all those who love the Lord, to rejoice. On Sunday last we had two baptisms. There were to have been three, but one of the friends was delayed, and arrived too late. . . . The baptisms of these two ladies were quite an event in the place. Never have I seen the chapel so crowded before. People came from all directions, some of them having walked more than two hours in order to be present. What a blessed and solemn meeting it was! . . . We have had many blessings of late. Four of the Long's children have given their hearts to Christ. The Sunday-school is growing in numbers week by week, and we are glad to see an increasing number of Catholio children among them.

"'We have been holding the Tuesday evening prayer meeting in our own parlour, and that with the idea that the people would be more ready to take part when the service is held in a private room. The meeting, however, has so grown in numbers that we shall be obliged to go down into the chapel.

"'I have been asked to conduct services in a remote part of Villar Pellice, and yesterday a brother in Pramollo, who will be baptized before long, wrote asking me to hold meetings in his house.

"'In San Germano things are much more promising than they were; a number of new people are coming about us, and the future is bright with hope.'

"These extracts are the more interesting and encouraging as coming from Signor Cesano, the last man on earth to paint things in too glowing colours. I last summer had the pleasure of holding several special meetings in our chapel in Torre Pellice, and I then learned how much Signor Cesano is esteemed by the people.

CUNEO AND CASTELLETTO.

"It is too soon to say much about the work in this district, Signor Tum-molo only reached Cuneo towards the end of March, and three months passed before he was able to find a hall of any kind, and when at length he was successful, the place we rented, while during the summer months it answers its purposes tolerably well, is too far out to be of much use as a centre of evangelistic effort during the winter. There can be no doubt that Cuneo is one of the hardest fields we have ever occupied; the one thing needed in order to give the mission a fair chance is to find a hall in a central position.

"The work in Castelletto, on the other hand, is bright with promise. The brethren there are full of love of Christ and of zeal for the work, and it is a pleasure to meet with them and to work among them. Unfortunately, Castelletto is so far away from Cuneo that it is impossible to visit it more than once a week.

"We have at present twenty-one members in this district with thirteen children in the Sunday-school."

SELF-SUPPORT.

The following remarks by Mr. Landels clearly indicate the policy of self-support and self-propagation which has been so successfully carried out by the brethren working in North Italy:—

"In the conduct of mission work in this country, one thing that I try always to keep before my mind is the necessity of aiming at the self-support and self propagation of our several stations. Notwithstanding the great difficulties that have to be overcome, something has been done in this direction in the Turin District. The whole of the mountain work in the valley of Meana and Susa has been the outcome of this development in the church in Turin. But for the generosity of the brethren here, that work would never have been begun or brought to its present state of efficiency. In Meana, in Mattie, in Gravere, in San Giorio, in Susa, when the local brethren have not been able to pay the expenses of the work, the Turin church has stepped in, and not only provided the rent of the several halls, but also supplied the necessary furniture for the work. Last year it paid the rents in Mattie, in San Giorio, in Cuneo, and in San Germano, and partly in Susa. It, moreover, met the travelling expenses between Turin and Susa, and between Cuneo and Castelletto, and also paid for the chapel keeper in Cuneo.

"May God in His grace enable us to still more develop this spirit of independence and self-sacrifice!"

GENOA.

Signor N. Nardi Greco, the evangelist in charge of the work in this most important city, reports as follows:—

"The fact of our being put out of the hall where our work began, and which we had occupied for so many years, was at first somewhat detrimental to our services. I am glad to say, however, that by degrees this has been got over, and that our meetings are now well attended, the new hall being sometimes crowded to excess.

"I rejoice to say that all the relations between our own church and other evangelical bodies are most cordial.

"During the past year we have suffered many losses. Eight of our members, after bearing witness to Christ, have been taken away by death. Ten have left us to settle in America. We rejoice that these, though lost to us, are not lost to the cause of Christ. From time to time we receive news of them, and hear from the ministers of the churches they attend that they are leading consistent Christian lives.

"We have had the pleasure of receiving ten new members into our communion, three of whom have borne witness to Christ in baptism, and we have every reason for hoping that the in-gathering this year will be much more abundant.

"Our Sunday-school, too, is slowly growing, and is becoming a blessing to the

"The collections during the year amounted to Lire 700.85 (£28 0s. 8d.). This figure is certainly far below what it ought to have been. The difficulties we meet with in

training our friends to give are great indeed. May the Lord awaken the people to a sense of their duty in this respect!"

THE TUSCAN DISTRICT.

TUSCANY.

The Rev. N. H. Shaw, in charge of the work in Tuscany, writes:-

"Our position in Tuscany for the past year may be described generally as that of Holding the Fort.' Advances have been made and victories have been won, but the aggressive work does not at present admit of our tabulating its results. It is matter for thankfulness that we can report so cheerfully, and that we have been able to hold our ground; for besides the usual difficulties of this field, which have been mentioned in former reports, and which, like the poor, we have always with us, we have had to contend against extraordinary efforts of the priests, who, by means of special preachings and functions, and newspapers established for the purpose, have displayed great energy in counteracting Protestant effort and influence. And, moreover, the thoughts of the people have been so distracted and absorbed by economical questions that it has been difficult to secure attention to higher matters. It has been a year of strikes, and the struggle between capital and labour has seemed almost universal. We have done what we could to turn to good account the prevalent thought and feeling, with what results the future must be left to say; but we know at least of one or two souls who, while not yet united with us, give signs of having been made new creatures in Christ Jesus.

FLORENCE.

"At Florence we have had a very trying year, but with consolations. Early in the year I had a sharp attack of illness, and I had only just recovered when my wife was seized with an attack of pleurisy, developing shortly into pneumonia, which by its obstinacy and unusual symptoms alarmed the doctor. He asked for a consultation, and one of the ablest physicians was called in, who gave little hope, and seemed to think the patient had about three days to live. For some days and nights we were engaged in a hard fight with death, using all the means we knew of, and praying carnestly. Our brother, Signor Besesti, convoked the brethren for prayer, and a large meeting was held for that purpose. In other churches in Florence, without our having requested it, prayer was made on our behalf, and we were cheered with assurances that brethren in Genoa and in Turin were also praying for us. It pleased God to hear these prayers, and in doing so He has laid us under an additional obligation to labour carnestly and thankfully in His cause. This sickness did good to us all, while it called forth the most gratifying expressions of sympathy from all parts, demonstrating the existence of a tender regard for us in other churches for which we shall ever feel grateful, and also on the part of Roman Catholics, many of whom went to read the daily bulletin which my colleague had affixed to the door of the church, some of them sending to make kind inquiries and express their hopes for the patient's recovery.

"Of course, this illness for a time interfered with our work, and other hindrances have not been lacking, but on the whole we have much reason to be encouraged.

Although we have only baptized four persons, there are others seeking baptism, and some who have not arrived at that point have manifestly received something good from the Lord.

"As Socialism so occupies the minds of the people here—much more so than in England—advantage has been taken of that circumstance to show the relation of the religion of Christ to the social problems of the day, and seven sermons, which it is proposed to publish, have been preached on that subject to large audiences.

"My English classes have been well attended—more than 80 persons being enrolled in them—without any of the irreverent or disrespectfu behaviour of which we had to complain (even in the case of young men of education) in former years. Much Bible instruction is given in these classes which evidently at times evoked surprise and makes a favourable impression, and some of the students come to our religious services, one or two having already taken a liking for them.

"Our branch at Ponta Alle Mosse has been well worked, and has began to yield us encouragement. One man from there has been baptized, and others have confessed the power of the Truth, while several come now and then to our meetings in Borgo Ognissanti, and the children of the Sundsy-school (the most undisciplined and difficult to deal with that I have ever known) begin to yield to our influence for good over them.

"The offerings of the church at Florence have been this year very cheering. Notwithstanding the great poverty the brethren have contributed on Sundays Lire 39.93 more than in 1900 and Lire 46.86 more than in 1899. But in addition to this they have made a special effort—which, of course, cannot be counted upon in other years—to discharge a deficit of past years, and have subscribed altogether Lire 268.36 (equal to £10.14s, 8d.) for that object. For all things they have contributed Lire 963.69, of which Lire 219.08 has been for the poor and the rest for the work of the mission.

LEGHORN.

"There is little or no change to report in the condition of things at Leghorn although Signor Allegri has been encouraged by some signs of improvement following special efforts of his. The few brethren remain faithful, and now and then succeed in leading someone else to share their faith in Christ (one person having been baptized during the year); but we have not yet made our influence felt very much in that city, whose inhabitants, more than those of any other city known to me, seem to be described by the Apostolic phrase: 'Who mind earthly things.'

"But Signor Allegri continues to be greatly cheered by the results of his visits to the many small towns and villages of the Maremma, where he sells Scriptures, distributes tracts, holds many conversations, preaches here and there where a room is placed at his disposal, and does a good work which we cannot tabulate, but whose results will be known in heaven. In these places there are now many here and there who have found freedom and life by believing in Christ, and to whom the visits of your evangelist are like those of an angel.

PRATO.

"Two of our little band of believers in Prato are sick in the hospital, where they have been for some time, with small hope of ever meeting with us again on earth. They are regularly visited by us. The other brethren continue to meet together, and are visited periodically by us from Florence. There are one or two persons who are

desirous of baptism, but for the moment are hindered by domestic considerations. These brethren, however, left to themselves, are not of a kind to exert much influence on the city. They need a leader constantly among them. If only we had a suitable mission hall there is just now in Prato a state of public feeling which might be used in our favour. The present Sindaco (mayor) recently refused on a certain anniversary to go, according to custom, to the cathedral, pay homage to the priests, and kneel and kiss the Virgin Mary's girdle, which is the chief object of veneration in Prato, and is at certain seasons held up before the kneeling populace. Instead of going himself, he sent the secretary (or town clerk), and this has given great offence, and has been followed by much controversy.

SANSEPOLCRO.

"Early in the spring Signor Lopresti left Sansepolcro to accept a business post offered him in Greece. Since then we have visited the city at irregular intervals from Florence. The priests have preached against us from the pulpit of the cathedral, saying things which were false and calumnious to prevent the people from coming to listen to us. Recently Signor Besesti stayed there for ten days, holding meetings every evening.

"I will close this report with a sample of what God is doing in individuals whose names do not swell our statistical rolls. A few months ago a gentleman, who is an accountant in the employ of the railway, saw a New Testament on a second-hand bookstall, and, carelessly opening it, found certain passages marked with blue pencil. These interesting him, he bought the book for half-a-franc, and took it home. He read it with keen relish, for he was not indifferent to religion, but had turned with disgust from Roman Catholic beliefs and practices. He confessed afterwards to me that his life had not been free from grave faults—sins of the flesh and profanity—but he was of good reputation, except that he was taken for a freethinker, and had once had a long conversation with a well-known bishop, in which this prince of the Church took his part, but was disappointed at his refusal to kneel and receive his blessing.

"After reading parts of the New Testament he became aware that there are evangelical churches where the doctrines of that Book are preached, and he resolved to come and find one. He came into our meeting at Ponte Alle Mosse, where Signor Besesti was preaching, and was very pleased with what he heard. Then followed conversation with us, and an invitation to our other meetings. Although much hindered by engagements and habits, he came, and seemed much moved. He bought a copy of my book: 'Faith and Practice; or, Conversations with Enquirers,' and for weeks carried it about with him in his pocket, reading parts of it to men in his office, and finding in it, according to him, just what he needed and what he had thought, but had not known how to express.

"One evening he called on me at my house and we talked for two hours. I say we, but he did most of the talking, for he had to unburden his soul, and he had not tne gift of doing that easily. At the end of that conversation we prayed together and he sobbed aloud. I shall never forget the outburst of emotion with which he embraced me before leaving, and he left on me the impression that he had, according to his light, become a disciple of Jesus Christ.

"He disappeared for many weeks, and the other day came to our Sunday morning service, after which he told me an interesting story. He had been away, it seems, at Naples, and while there went to visit the bishop with whom he had talked some years before,

- "After the ordinary salutations and references to his former visit, my friend said: 'Monsignore, I have good news for you. I have found the light that I was groping after when I had my last conversation with you.'
- "'Indeed,' said the bishop. 'I congratulate you. Tell me where you have found the light.'
- "'In the New Testament,' replied the other. The bishop was silent, but must have felt uncomfortable, for he had to listen to a strong condemnation of Roman teaching and practice, especially the worship of the Virgin, and to an original setting forth of the doctrine of salvation by faith in Christ alone.
- "The conversation over, the bishop very courteously accompanied him to the door, pressed his hand, and said: 'Write to me!' He replied: 'Monsignore, I thank you, and will write, but I have no longer any need of your counsels because I have received the grace of God in my heart, and it has wrought a wonderful change. I was an awful blasphemer [in Tuscany the habit of profane swearing is so common that few men are free from it, and it distinguishes the Tuscans even from the other Italians, who are by no means free from the vice], but since I understood this book [pointing to the New Testament], I do not blaspheme any more. No one but Jesus Christ could have cured me of that habit. It is a real miracle,'
- "And so the interview ended. The promised letter has been written, and I was privileged to see one or two sentences of it, which will not console the bishop, but did console me.
- "Now this man may or may not become a member of our Church or of any other It sometimes takes years in Italy after a man has received the Truth before he comes to those consequences of it which are natural with us. All his habits have been formed by other ideas of life than those which prevail with us. But he may be taken as a specimen of not a few men who are outside our organisations and do not figure on our statistical rolls, but are nevertheless saved from sin and error, live according to their light a Christian life, and, under God, owe their salvation to our missionary operations.
- "The statistics for Tuscany are as follows: Members, 94; baptized, 5; children in Sunday-schools, 70; teachers, 6; contributions for all purposes, Lire 1904.79, as against, Lire 747.37 in 1900."

THE CENTRAL, OR ROMAN DISTRICT.

In consequence of the lamented death of the Rev. James Wall it has been needful to effect some re-arrangement of the staff of missionaries in Italy. The Rev. N. H. Shaw will remove from Florence to Rome, and the Rev. J. Campbell Wall will be associated with Mr. Shaw in the work of the mission in the city of Rome and the Roman provinces. Mrs. Wall, senior, will continue the special mission amongst the Roman poor, so long associated with her name, making the new building in Trastavere the centre of her operations, and the Rev. Robert Walker will leave Turin for Florence, to take charge of the Tuscan work hitherto under the superintendence of Mr. Shaw.

It seems wise and fitting that Mr. Shaw, one of the senior mis-

sionaries of the Society in Italy, and formerly stationed in the City of Rome, should return to that important centre, his ripe experience and organising power specially qualifying him for that difficult position. He will also have the advantage of the valuable assistance and co-operation of Mr. Campbell Wall, who for the past twelve years has been associated with his beloved and honoured father in Roman work, and also of Miss Yates, who for many years past has devoted herself to mission work in Rome.

The Rev. J. Campbell Wall sends the following report of work in Rome and the Roman district during the past year:—

"To record the history of this mission during last year is to me an almost impossible task. It is as though one great shadow had been cast on the scene, and all detail seems to have vanished in its darkness. Indistinctly the new year's festivities, the special services of Lent, the spring excursions into the outlying provinces, and my summer furlough in England are recalled to memory; but then the strain of anxiety, the blow of bereavement, and the heavy responsibilities of the closing year crowd out all those impressions which I should most gladly have conveyed in this brief report.

"How much has been done may be gathered in part from the statistics; but the life of this year's efforts seems to be blighted by the terrible loss which this mission has sustained. Evangelistic services have been constantly held at all the stations here in Rome, and the two churches in Lucina and Urbana have received as much of our attention as circumstances would allow of. The Sunday-schools have been maintained in spite of constant and organised opposition on the part of priests and nuns. Work, also, in the provinces has been almost continuous, our evangelists having visited fifty-four towns and villages where we have no locale, and the agents of the Forward Movement having carried the Scriptures for sale into 198 different places,

"The baptisms in Rome have been 26, or 16 in Lucina and 10 in Via Urbana; those in the province are 29. The total of baptized believers at present on our Church rolls is 554. The attendance at our services has doubtless suffered somewhat during the last half-year owing to the necessity of temporary arrangements; but on the whole it has been satisfactory, and the public has responded to every effort put forth in a way which promises much for the future. The total of attendances, comprising those of schools and classes, is for the Lucina branch 95,390, and for the Urbana branch 44,405. The number of children attending Sunday-schools in Rome is also significant, 397 girls and 178 boys being on our books at the close of the year. In this province Signor Baratti has also maintained a continuous work at Viterbo an important centre, and, in spite of great difficulties, has achieved important progress. Still more, however, are the results obtained by the Forward Movement agent at Foligno, Signor Pasella, who settled there as a centre of work in the Province of Umbria at the beginning of the year.

"The number of church members has been raised from 12 to 21, and there are at present 22 catechumens who will shortly be admitted to baptism. During a recent visit, I found the greatest encouragement in personal converse with these new converts; and on both evenings our little hall was crowded with about ninety attentive listeners. Sig. Pasella has also a Sunday-school of over forty children, and

the fact that he has gained in a remarkable degree the respect and confidence of many in fortunate oircumstances, adds greatly to the influence and success of the work in Foligno.

"Another most interesting station is that of Monteverodomo in the Abbruzzi, where the poor brethren have already collected among themselves £10 with a view to building their own chapel, and are most anxious to support at an early date a colporteur evangelist who may preach to them the Word of Life and extend God's kingdom in the neighbouring villages."

APPENDIX.-No. I.

THE MEDICAL MISSION AUXILIARY.

"As has been already reported, a Medical Mission Auxiliary was formed in December of last year, in connection with the Baptist Missionary Society and the Baptist Zenans Mission conjointly. This was the outcome of a meeting held at the Mission House in October, to which the members of the committees of both societies were invited by a circular signed by two friends of the societies and by Dr. Russell Watson, of China, and Miss Farrer, M.B., of India, representing the medical workers of each society respectively. A draft scheme approved by this meeting was submitted to the General Committees of the two societies, and with certain slight modifications was, after careful consideration, adopted by them; and the Medical Mission Auxiliary is now a part of the machinery of the societies, which are in this department acting together.

"This step has been taken with the aim, as already stated, of strengthening the medical part of the work of the societies; for while there is a large amount of healing work carried on by our missionaries, there are on the staff of the Baptist Missionary Society only five qualified practitioners—viz., in China, Br. Russell Watson and Mrs. Watson, M.D., and Dr. Paterson, in Shanting, and Dr. Creasey Smith in Shensi (none in Shansi); in India only Dr. Vincent Thomas; on the Congo none—as yet—though the committee, at its meeting in March, formally resolved to send a qualified medical missionary to Bolobo as soon as one can be found. On the staff of the Baptist Zenana Mission there are four: Miss Farrer, M.B., and Miss Shepheard. M.B. (temporary), at Bhiwani, Miss F. Butcher, M.D., at Palwal, and Miss Ottmann, L.M. and S. (Madras), Berhampore.

"Thus, our societies are not largely represented, as compared with other great societies, in respect of qualified medical workers on the mission field.

"In taking this step, we are but following a strikingly successful example: that of the Church Missionary Society, which inaugurated a Medical Auxiliary ten years ago, and has in that period increased its staff of qualified practitioners from twenty-five to fifty-eight, the Auxiliary now having an annual income of about £13,000. Similarly, in the last twenty years, the medical missionaries on the staff of the London Missionary Society have increased from three to thirty.

"Hence it will be seen that in the important step now taken our societies are not without either example or encouragement; and hence also it will be inferred that one great aim—the great aim, indeed—of the Auxiliary is to raise additional funds for the prosecution of medical work.

"This statement may suggest the criticism that a rival organisation has been instituted, which will compete with the two 'parent' societies, and perhaps damage them by withdrawing for a special object some of the funds, which they can ill afford to part with. But there is a complete and absolute answer to this objection in the Constitution (which is set out below) of the Auxiliary (III. n), where it is stated that the object of the Auxiliary is to raise funds for the maintenance of the medical work (the hospitals in the first instance) now carried on by the societies. So that, until the whole of the money now being expended annually on medical work has been raised by the Auxiliary, every shilling so raised only goes to relieve the funds of the 'parent' societies. If this is once understood, all fear of competition between the societies and

the Auxiliary must vanish, and the new organisation is seen to be absolutely what its title implies—a helper, a handmaid to the 'parent' societies.

"It may be asked: Where are the additional funds to come from? The answer is: In part from present subscribers. It is not unreasonable to hope that many subscribers, say, of one fuines, will be willing, when the claims of the work of healing are properly set before them, to add another five shillings for this special—and, as it appears to many, specially attractive—work. In part, also, the funds will come, it is hoped, from others, who may not be enthusiastic about mission work in general, but who are willing to contribute to the philanthropic work of healing among uncivilised or half-civilised peoples, whose only alternative is the cruelly dangerous and repulsive 'art' of the native doctor.'

"The Committee of the Auxiliary, which has so far held only one—a preliminary—meeting, is sensible of the fact that, in order to make the organisation a success, one addition is indispensable, and that is, the assistance of some enthusiastic advocate of Medical Mission work, who will give his (or her) services as Organising Secretary of the Auxiliary, to make the department widely known, and to represent its claims at meetings and attract financial support. When such a helper is found, the Committee is confident that the formation of this new department will, by the blessing of God, speedily justify itself. In this earnest hope the Committee commends the work to its supporters and friends."

CONSTITUTION OF MEDICAL MISSIONARY AUXILIARY.

- "I.—That a Medical Mission Auxiliary be formed in connection with the Baptist Missionary Society and the Baptist Zenana Mission jointly.
 - "II .- That the Medical Mission Auxiliary be composed of :-
 - "(A) The officers of the Baptist Missionary Society (treasurer and two secretaries), and of the Baptist Zenana Mission (president, treasurer, and three secretaries), ex-officio.
 - "(ii) Members of the General Committee of each society to be nominated by each committee respectively—viz., thirteen members of the Baptist Missionary Society Committee and three of that of the Baptist Zenana Mission.
- "[Thus, the Auxiliary Committee will be composed of twenty-four members, sixteen representing the Baptist Missionary Society and eight the Baptist Zenana Mission
 - "And, in addition :-
 - "(c) The medical referees of the two societies, the Baptist Missionary Society and the Baptist Zenana Mission, and all fully qualified medical practitioners being members of either the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society or the Baptist Zenana Mission.
 - "(D) That the Auxiliary Committee have power to co-opt six additional members, not being members of either the Baptist Missionary Society or Baptist Zenana Mission Committees, preference being given to qualified members of the medical profession.
 - "III .- That the main objects of the Auxiliary be :-
 - "(a) To create, maintain, and extend an intelligent and generally practical interest in the medical mission work of the two societies among the churches of our denomination.
 - "(B) To raise funds for the financial support of the hospitals at present maintained by the two societies, and ultimately for the adequate maintenance of their entire medical agencies. That for the present all funds raised by the Medical Mission Auxiliary, excepting money specially marked for distinct purposes, be allocated in the proportion of three-fourths to the Baptist Missionary Society and one-fourth to the Baptist Zenana Mission.
- (c) To develop these agencies by sending out additional and fully qualified medical missionaries, either to open up new work or to set older work on a more satisfactory footing.
 "IV. That every candidate offering for medical mission work be referred, in the first instance, to the Medical Missionary Auxiliary Committee.
 - "V .-- (A) That the Auxiliary meet quarterly, or oftener if necessary.
 - "(B) That the secretary of the Baptist Missionary Society (as the senior society) be the secretary of the Auxiliary; all resolutions passed being brought up as a report to the next meeting of the General Committee of each society, as is the case with the sub-committees of each society at present, all such resolutions being subject to the approval of the two general committees.
 - "(o) That the Auxiliary deal with all matters connected with the medical mission work of the two societies, including financial matters, questions of medical missionary policy, etc.
 - "(p) That all moneys specially contributed for the Medical Missionary Auxiliary be earmarked for medical work, and paid into a special fund."

REPORTS OF MEDICAL MISSION WORK.

INDIA.

Reporting on the Medical Mission work during the past year in the City of Delhi, the Rev. H. E. Crudgington writes:—

"Though we have had no special epidemios, there have been the usual cases of a very mixed character, fever playing the largest part. Chest diseases, rheumatism, eye and ear diseases, sores, and ulcers, necrosis with minor operations, and the usual large number of spleen cases. Some of our medical men at home would be surprised to see the cases of enlarged spleen. It is no exaggeration to say they are often about as hard as a board, and nearly as large as a man's head.

"For various diseases people come from far and wide, and this should be some proof of the appreciation of the work. I have lately been making slight alterations in the arrangement of things in the dispensary, which I hope will prove of value to the more effectual working of the dispensary, and enable us more effectively to give systematic Bible teaching and explanation.

"A part of the college building adjoining is now set apart as a waiting room, and I have had a number of tin tickets prepared.

"All those gathered at the opening time are given numbered tickets, and admitted to the dispensary. Then, in turn, Saul David and I read a short portion of the Gospel and explain it. We always open with prayer. The patients then come up in rotation according to the number of their ticket, are examined and prescribed for, receive their medicine, and go out by another door. By this time another batch has collected, and they are dealt with in the same manner. In this way each party has the whole benefit of the little service, and they do not come in in a desultory manner in the middle or end, or get only a few words, as was previously the case. It means longer work somewhat, but no one has to wait long, as I restrict each talk to five or ten minutes at longest, and one can give as much Scripture teaching in that time as these people can take away with them. We are taking the Gospel of Mark, read the same portion to each batch, repeat the same talk, and as we follow up each portion day by day, each gets the same consecutive teaching, though coming at eight o'clock one day, and nine or ten o'clock the next. I think my working plan will be clear from this, and I pray that blessing may rest on it.

"In the following returns for the last twelve months, made up from October 1st, 1900, to September 30th, 1901, the total numbers will appear less than in previous years. This is owing to the dispensary being practically closed during the months of October, November, and December, 1900, owing to the severe illness of Saul David, when I could not possibly find time to see to more than just a few urgent oases, about 900 instead of, say, 2,000.

"The returns, therefore, are not much more than for nine months.

"Since the beginning of 1901, the dispensary, I am thankful to say, has not been closed at all except on Sundays, and at the time of writing now we are getting from eighty to nearly one hundred patients daily.

"I hope for the people's sake that this will soon slack off as fever and accompanying results. decrease.

From Palwal Dr. Vincent Thomas reports:

"In order that the medical work might not cease during Mr. Hale's absence on furlough, I was asked to come here and carry it on for the time being. The old school-house has been utilised as the dispensary, one room serving the purposes of consulting, dispensing, and store rooms, while the courtyard is used for the surgical work, and a few in-patients have been accommodated under canvas in the compound, weather permitting. The scope for my medical work has been, as regards accommodation, a trifle freer fan heretofore, but the limitations imposed on one's efforts by these makeshift arrangement are still trying enough. Until a hospital is provided, I shall always have to send away the greater number of patients who comprequiring operative treatment.

The Rev. C. H. Williams, of Kalka, reports on medical work :-

"Of this exceedingly useful missionary agency we have but little to report. There is a Government charitable dispensary in Kalka to which we have sent many patients.

"Some few have come to us, and in several instances we have been glad to be of service. The people seem to take it for granted that a European is an encyclopædia of all knowledge, and certainly when missionaries are able to prove their sympathy with the poor natives by a little practical medical help, it goes a long way towards winning their confidence and interest.

"It should also be stated that a very considerable amount of simple medical work is carried on by many of our missionaries, who, having had a short course of medical training, find themselves quite able to deal with many common ailments, and by so doing secure a warm welcome from large numbers of people who otherwise would refuse to listen to the Gospel message.

CHINA.

"With regard to medical missionary work in connection with the Society's Shantung field, there is nothing of importance to be reported for last year, as both Dr. Russell Watson, Dr. Paterson, and Mr. Smyth are at present in England, Dr. Watson and Dr. Paterson on furlough, and Mr. Smyth, who returned home, under medical advice, to undergo an important surgical operation, which the Committee are thankful to report was most successfully performed by Mr. Alfred Pearce Gould, of Queen Anne Street.

"All these brethren will return to their former sphere of labour in Shantung during the current year, and resume their special medical missionary work, so sadly interrupted by the late disastrons Boxer revolution.

"In Shensi Province Dr. Creascy Smith has been constantly engaged in most beneficent famine relief work, and has rendered noble service."

AFRICA.

San Salvador Station, Congo.

The Rev. R. H. C. Graham sends the following statistics relative to medical mission work:—

Wathen Station.

The Rev. John Bell is in charge of the medical mission work at Wathen Station, and during the past year reports:—

"Some 11,000 out-patients have presented themselves for medical treatment. The 270 people on the station alone are a daily charge. Some nine of the more intelligent of the young men

take their turns in the dispensary, and thus obtain some medical and surgical knowledge which will be very useful to them on their return to their homes. Many natives now keep their own little stocks of quinine and a few simple remedies. The purchase of these and the fees from many of the patients have brought in £22 10s. during the year, so that the medical work goes a long way towards paying its own expenses."

Bolobo Station.

Miss Lily de Hailes reports from Bolobo :-

"The first thing every morning, immediately after prayers at six o'clock, I go down to the dispensary and see after the sick folk. During the year I have seen over 19,000 patients. The largest number in one day was 143, but the numbers usually vary between seventy and a hundred. There are many who beg to remain while they are ill, but I am obliged to turn them away till the hospital is built. I have specially cared for 107 of the very worst cases. The only place I could put some has been under the house. Some have been either in the girls' or boys' houses, but this is not at all satisfactory, and the boys and girls often object. One poor man settled himself for the night under my house, and nearly set it on fire. I did not know he was there, having told him to go away, as I had nowhere to put him; but he crawled in, and made a large fire, as it was a cold, wet night. He had to sleep on the floor in the boys' house, but he made the sixth sick one in there. The next day he went away; but no one would take him in, and in a few days he died. The death rate out here is very high. I have no idea of the number of deaths in the towns, but I have had to see to thirty-six being buried. Some were from small-pox, some from sleeping sickness, some from starvation and neglect till help was too late, and others from various sicknesses. One seems sometimes to live in the midst of death; but it is a pleasure to see many get strong and well again. The 'Melbourne Hall' is almost finished, and as soon as it is I hope to have a short service every morning for the patients before giving them their medicine. This has been my wish ever since I have been in Congo, but I have never had room for it before."

Yakusu Station.

The Rev. S. O. Kempton writes from Yakusu:-

"In the ten thousand cases dealt with in the medical department, there have been some of considerable interest; but of these I had better write some other time. Suffice it to say, the people are placing confidence increasingly in our medicines. Whenever visitors come to the town, the Yakusuites bring them along to be physicked, sometimes without inquiring whether they have ailments or not! As we have doctored several chiefs and one medicine-man during the year, I think we can truly say we have knocked a few more nails into the coffin of witcheraft."

The Receipts from Legacies exhibit an increase of

as compared with the previous year, this increase providing for a very similar decrease in Miscellaneous Receipts.

There has been a reduction of £3,901 13s. 8d. in the China Expenditure consequent mainly upon the loss of the Martyr Missionaries in the Shansi Province, and the re-occupation of the other two Provinces of Shantung and Shensi during only a part of the year; but, on the other hand, there has been an increase in the Indian Expenditure of £1,735 16s. 11d. consequent upon increased allowances and enlarged educational work.

The other heads of Expenditure are practically the same as in the previous year.

The Widow and Orphans' account as to both receipts and expenditure exhibits very little change, as compared with the previous year.

The receipts for special funds during the past year have amounted to

£2.463 16s. 1d.

It was clearly stated in the Report for last year, and should be distinctly understood by our supporters, that the annual excess of Expenditure over Receipts is entirely due to the sending forth of 40 additional missionaries in obedience to the mandate of the churches and constituency at the time of the Centenary celebration; the permanent expense of maintaining 31 of these brethren, with their wives and children, having now become a charge upon the ordinary income of the Society, and the remaining 9 will also come upon the ordinary income in

two years, which has not increased in proportion to the augmented expenditure, and from this it follows that unless there can be secured a permanent increase in the annual income of the Mission of Ten or Twelve Thousand Pounds, there must be annually recurring Debts, the only alternative being withdrawal from some portion of the Society's present work, and consequent retrenchment in present expenditure.

The Committee cannot believe that such an alternative will for a single moment be seriously entertained by our ehurches.

With unparalleled opportunities for extended work, with numerous offers from specially well-equipped young men earnestly longing for Foreign Mission service, and with the last great commission of the Saviour ringing in our ears appealing to us in louder and clearer tones than ever before in view of world-wide openings, it cannot be that our churches can possibly think of withdrawal from any fields of present work.

It is surely well for us to remember, as has been well said, that "We are trustees, and not proprietors, of the blessed Gospel of Jesus Christ, an that we cannot appropriate it selfishly without being guilty of felony against the rest of mankind."

The mighty reflex power for good of the Foreign Missionary enterprise upon the aggressive work of our Home Churches is simply incalculable—not one of them has suffered the remotest weakening for its zeal for Foreign Missionary work, nor is there one of them which is not richer in gifts, more fruitful in works, and stronger in heart because of its efforts to send the Gospel into the "regions beyond."


TO SECURE INCREASE OF ANNUAL INCOME.

In view of the present financial position of the Society, the committee feel deeply that the time has now arrived for a thorough and systematic visitation and canvass of the Churches throughout the United Kingdom with the earnest endeavour to raise the additional sum needed to not only secure an equilibrium between income and expenditure, but to permit of the extension of the work, so urgently needed in the three great continents in which our missionaries are working to-day.

The Committee contemplated prosecuting such a canvass last year, but finding that such a movement would injuriously affect the appeal of the 20th Century Fund, they postponed the canvass for twelve months. The committee are rejoiced to report in relation to this campaign that their much-esteemed brother, the Rev. Charles Williams, of Accrington, has promised to devote a year from the 1st of September next to visitation of the churches, with a view to promote deepened interest in the work of the Society, and securing enlarged annual support, and they are confident that this announcement will be warmly welcomed by all the churches of the Denomination.

Mr. Williams has just returned from visiting the native Christian churches in Ceylon and India, and will be able to give his own estimate of the work carried on in both these fields by missionaries of the Society.

The Committee earnestly hope also that many other brethren will render much appreciated assistance in the proposed canvass of our churches, and they confidently rely upon the hearty sympathy and cooperation of all our pastors and church officers in connection with this movement.

APPENDIX II.

Obituary Resolutions of Committee.

REV. JAMES HENRY AND ERSON, FOR NEARLY FORTY YEARS
MISSIONARY IN INDIA

DIED, 27TH JUNE, 1901.

THE Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, having been informed of the decease of the Rev. J. H. Anderson, desire to record an expression of the affectionate regard and esteem in which they ever held him, for his long-continued and laborious service in the Mission in India, and for his high Christian character maintained to the close of his life.

Mr. Anderson, when a student at Stepney College, was accepted as a missionary by the Committee in December, 1853, and in the following year, accompanied by his wife, sailed for Calcutta, and proceeded thence to Jessore to be associated in work with the late Rev. John Sale. With characteristic zeal Mr. Anderson applied himself to the acquisition of the Bengali language, in which he made rapid and distinguished progress, and entered with delight into all the departments of village mission work. Bazaar preaching, itineration through the villages, superintendence of vernacular schools, and ministration to the little bands of converts in different places, fully employed his time for many years. This work was an ever-increasing joy to him, for he had cheering indications of the Divine Master's presence and blessings.

For two Sessions, in the absence of the late Rev. John Trafford, he officiated as Principal of Serampore College.

Incipient lung trouble at the beginning of 1870 caused his return to England; the change of climate and rest enabled him to overcome the weakness of the lungs, and he was permitted to return to India, but not to Bengal. He was sent to Allahabad in the North-West Provinces. Here he quickly acquired a new language, and for several years was engaged in active evangelistic work. After a time the exigencies of the Mission called for his services in the important district of Backerguage, in Eastern Bengal. Here

he did much to further the independence of the Native Churches. Patient kindly persistence was the quality needed, and this he happily possessed.

After nearly forty years of service, the Committee welcomed him to England on his final retirement from active duty in the Mission field.

Throughout his whole course of service the converts loved and trusted him; his missionary brethren had long looked up to him with respectful affection. He was a man of varied excellence—gentle and true, firm and persistent in all that he felt to be right, loyal to the faith of the Gospel, and devoted to his Lord and Saviour.

The Committee, while honouring the memory of their departed brother, reverently and thankfully recognise the Grace of God which made him what he was. They commend the widow, and sons, and daughters to the care and love of the God of all Grace.

REV. JAMES WALL, OF ROME. DIED, 29TH OCTOBER, 1901.

With the deepest regret the Committee report the decease of their honoured and beloved brother, Rev. James Wall, which took place at 35, Piazza, in Lucina, in the City of Rome. As is well known to the Committee, for some months past Mr. Wall had been in a very precarious state of health in consequence of weak action of the heart. The doctors hoped on his return to Rome that his condition might show improvement, and for the first few days after his return this was the case. He, however. rapidly became weaker, paralysis extending to his limbs, and a few days before his death causing him to lose the sight of one of his eyes. On 29th October he passed to his rest, his last words being :- "Christ needs Italy. Christ loves Italy. Fear not, Christ will conquer Italy for Himself," and his last message to his colleagues consisted of these words :-- "Communion higher, higher, ever higher." The Committee feel that in the passing of their dear brother they have lost an exceptionally devoted, gifted, and powerful worker, a noble Evangelist, a Missionary Apostle of the truest type. For nearly forty years he has preached the Gospel of salvation to the peoples of Italy, and for years to come, in the hearts of very many, his name will be affectionately remembered throughout the Italian kingdom. The Committee desire to assure Mrs. Wall, and the members of the bereaved family, of their deep and profound sympathy, and of their earnest prayers for their solace and support. They feel that for Mrs. Wall, who

during all the years of her husband's Italian work has been his self-sacrificing helper and devoted companion, the loss can never be made up. But they rejoice to know that she has the sacred heritage of a life wholly devoted to the Saviour's service, and the good of Italy, and that she can look forward to a blessed re-union with her husband in the Everlasting Home. The Committee earnestly pray that in the evening of her life she may have the great joy of seeing much fruit resulting not only from the labours of her husband, now at rest, but from her own loving, unselfish, and long-continued toil for the benefit of the outcast and wretched, who, but for her, would have been uncared for and left to perish.

MRS. KENRED SMITH, of Bopoto. Died, 13th April, 1901.

The Committee report with profound sorrow that by the last Congo mail they received the sad intelligence of the death of Mrs. Kenred Smith. at Yakusu Station, on the Upper Congo, on Saturday, 13th April. The following letter with regard to this sad event is from the Rev. H. Sutton Smith, dated Yakusu, April 15th :- "This sad event has been so sudden, so overwhelming. Last Wednesday Mrs. Kenred Smith seemed in splendid health, and, indeed, for five or six months past she appeared to have quite overcome the weakness which followed her serious illnes of last June. So bright, so energetic, so devoted to her husband, and to the work to which she had consecrated her life, it is little wonder that she quickly endeared herself to us, and made the life of the station brighter and pleasanter by her presence. With what intense desire she was looking forward to her work at Bopoto was manifest in many conversations over the table. But it was not to be. Her Master had other service for her to perform, and in perfect, all-conquering faith, she yielded her will to the will of her Saviour. She fell peacefully from the tender, clinging embrace of her husband into the strong, kind arms of her Lord and Saviour. Though often disappointed in her work for the girls of Yakusu, it was manifest yesterday how she had won their hearts, and it must have been to her a source of intense joy to know that these erstwhile cannibals felt that they had lost a friend, and to have seen their reverent, sympathetic attitude at the grave-side. being dead, yet speaketh. By her brief term of loving, sanctified service here she has hastened the dawning of the day in the hearts of the people, and by the strength of her faith in the hour of death she witnessed for the

hope and the truth of the Resurrection with no uncertain voice. Our hearts are very sad for him who loved so well, and has lost awhile, and we commend him affectionately to the care and mercy of the God and Father of us all, praying that grace and strength may be given to him to use with all the more zealous energy the years that shall be given to him before he, too, answers the call to the more glorious service above."

Mr. Kenred Smith himself, writing from Yakusu, under date of April 14th, says:—"A bewildering sorrow has just come into my life; my beloved wife and our little baby boy are both gone. On the anniversary of our arrival at Yakusu God has called my beloved wife to the Heavenly Home. It was only last night that she passed from me, and I am at times nearly blind with grief. To-day we committed the body of my wife to the ground. Yesterday we buried our little one, and they are both near the grave of Mr. Wherrett. Four of the Yakusu Chiefs carried the coffin of my wife to the grave, and all her school girls followed, together with a great crowd of natives from the town. Mr. Sutton Smith and Mr. Kempton conducted the service, and nothing could exceed the tender kindness and attention of my colleagues. Notwithstanding all that medical skill could do, my beloved wife has passed away. You will, I know, deeply sympathise with me."

The Committee deeply sympathise with their sorely bereaved brother, Mr. Kenred Smith, and they most affectionately commend him in this season of bitter trial to the solace and sympathy of the Divine Saviour. They thank God for the work of his devoted wife, and for the beautiful memory she has left behind of whole-hearted consecration to the truest interests of the peoples of the Congo. They thank God, too, for the brightness of her faith, and for her unabated trust in the Saviour she served. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord: they rest from their labours, and their works follow them."

MRS. BELL, OF WATHEN STATION, LOWER CONGO RIVER.
DIED, 18TH NOVEMBER, 1901.

By the latest Congo mail Mr. Baynes received the following letter from the Rev. W. Holman Bentley, dated Wathen Station, Lower Congo River, November 18th, 1901, conveying the sad tidings of the sudden death of Mrs. Bell, wife of the Rev. J. Bell, of Wathen Station:—

"DEAR MR. BAYNES,—It is six years ago, all but a month, since I had to write to tell you of the death of Philip Davies; now after this lapse of time I have a like sad duty to perform. Death has again visited us, this time to call away our dear sister, Mrs. Bell.

"Late on Saturday afternoon a slight fever came on; she finished off her letters-for it was mail day-and went to bed, half wondering whether it was worth the while. At about two o'clock in the morning there was a slight rigour, and her temperature ran up to 105. In the morning it dropped to 101, and we thought but little of it. During the day the usual treatment was employed; she was bright, as usual. In the evening she slept comfortably until midnight, when the rigour returned, and the temperature went up again to 105. At 5.30 o'clock Mr. Bell came to call me; a little later we all consulted, gave her more quinine, sudorifics, &c., but were somewhat alarmed that the temperature still kept up. Mrs. Bell felt the seriousness of her condition, but we hoped that the means employed would be blessed to her recovery. The desired relief did not come, and at 11.30 the temperature was Then homoglobinuria appeared. Occurring on a temperature of 105 this was a very serious symptom, but as there seemed to be no further distress than the temperature was causing, we hoped that relief would come. At noon the temperature had risen to 106, then to 107, and with that she became unconscious. At one o'clock the temperature was 109, and she passed away peacefully.

"This is the most sudden death from fever that we have known, and comes to us as a great shock. Her poor husband is stunned; indeed, it is hard for us to realise what has taken place. Mrs. Bell joined us as Miss Feisser in August, 1896. The work had become too heavy for my wife, and she had to return home the next spring. In the Autumn, Miss Feisser became the wife of our colleague, the Rev. John Bell, A.T.S. It is a great loss to us all. With our ever-increasing burden of work we can ill spare such an experienced and devoted worker. Mrs. Bell worked hard, and willingly, sparing herself no pains. Often she would be impelled by her strong sense of duty to work when she ought to have been resting. Our great Master knows what He is doing in calling her away; His dealings are very mysterious, but we know that He cannot err. We are writing very hurriedly and late in the bare hope of overtaking the mail at Boma, the chance being "Yours sincerely, very remote.

The Committee desire to bow in humble submission to this sudden and mysterious dispensation of Divine Providence, so overwhelmingly sad to the bereaved husband and relatives, to all associated with Mrs. Bell in missionary service, to the members of the Missionary Committee at home, and to a wider circle of attached friends. They affectionately commend their sorrow-stricken brother, Mr. Bell, to the tender mercy of the Divine Father, praying earnestly that in this hour of darkness and loneliness he may realise the near presence and support of the compassionate Saviour, enabling him, even in the midst of his bewildering loss, to rest calmly in the assured conviction that "He doeth all things well," and that what is so mysterious now shall be made clear in the light of the hereafter. The Committee thank God, in the remembrance of the beautiful life of service and consecration now closed for their sister's loving and self-sacrificing ministry among the Congo peoples, by whom she was so universally beloved and trusted, and for her widespread and potent influence as exhibited today in the altered lives and conduct of so many with whom she was brought into contact.

REV. ROBERT ROBINSON, OF CALCUTTA.

DIED, 23RD NOVEMBER, 1901.

The Committee report with feelings of sincere sorrow the death of the Rev. Robert Robinson, of Calcutta. The Rev. Herbert Anderson writes under date of Calcutta, November 28th, to Mr. Baynes:- "I believe you are aware that for some months past Mr. Robinson has been suffering from some internal trouble. A few weeks ago he went to Mussoorie, trusting the change there would set him up, but when he returned he was no better and soon became prostrate. His medical advisers strongly urged an operation, and on Friday he was taken to the General Hospital. No member of his own family was allowed to stop with him at night, but Mr. Bushnell, a young fellow engaged to his daughter, Miss Robinson, stopped with him. At six o'clock in the morning, seeing he was very low, Mr. Bushnell hurried off to the members of his family, but within half an hour of his leaving all was over. Our brother had passed away with no single member of his family near him at the last. The funeral service was held on Saturday evening. Our brother, Mr. James, conducted a meeting in the house, and our brother, Dr. Rouse, conducted the ceremony at the graveside. A large number of friends were present, including Justice Sale, Mr. Robert Belchambers, and others. Of course, I attended the funeral, and wrote to Mrs. Robinson on behalf of the Mission."

The Committee deeply sympathise with the sorrow-stricken widow and the sorely bereaved children, and they suggest that the Secretary, by the next outgoing mail, be requested to convey to Mrs. Robinson and the family an assurance of the sincere sympathy of the Committee with them, and of their earnest prayer for their solace and support in this season of sorrow and loss. They thank God in the remembrance of the valuable and faithful services rendered by their deceased brother to the work of the Society in India during a long term of years, and for the deep interest he always took in every movement that had for its object the enlightenment and uplifting of the peoples of that vast Empire. The Committee further suggest that at their next meeting the Secretary be requested to present a Memorial Minute, relative to the services rendered by Mr. Robinson to the work of the Society in India, for record in the proceedings of the Committee.

DR. LAZARUS, OF BENARES.

The Rev. Herbert Anderson, the Indian Secretary of the Mission, writing in the "Indian News Letter," says:—"It is my sorrow to record the passing away of as true a friend as the Mission ever had, Dr. Lazarus, of Benares. To many he has been a personal friend, with a large, liberal heart, and possessed of a home the genial, gracious hospitality of which so many have often enjoyed. We shall all unite in prayerful sympathy with the members of his family, especially thinking among them of our coworkers in the Mission, Mr. and Mrs. Price, of Monghyr. His life was noble, and his end was peace."

MRS. W. MILLMAN, OF YAKUSU.

DIED AT MONSEMBI, 18TH MARCH, 1902.

The Committee report, with feelings of deepest grief, the receipt of a telegram from the Rev. W. Millman, dated Brazzaville, the capital of the French Congo, to the following effect:—"Wife died on the 18th March, give early information to Langleys."

Mr. and Mrs. Millman were only married in the summer of last year, and they left England on 22nd November last in company with Mr. and Mrs Cameron, Mr. Moore and Mr. Kirby, for the Congo. The last letter received by the Secretary from Mr. Millman was dated Bolobo Station, February 3rd, Mr. Millman writing "Letters from up-river give tidings 'All well.' Mrs. Millman is at Monsembi, having had her first fever and recovered." Mrs. Millman, with Mrs. Whitehead, had gone on to Monsembi Station in order to assist Mrs. Dodds, and the latest tidings from Monsembi come through the Rev. H. Ross Phillips, who, writing from Matadi under date of March 17th, the day before the death of Mrs. Millman, says:—"I received a letter from our brother Dodds yesterday telling me that his wife had a little son, and that mother and baby were doing well."

Mrs. Millman had specially prepared herself for Missionary life in Africa, was a trained nurse, and had great experience in connection with fevers, and she looked forward to a long life of service in connection with the Congo Mission.

The Committee can only bow in humble submission to the Divine Will praying earnestly on behalf of their sorely sorrow-stricken brother that he may be specially sustained and comforted by the presence and help of the compassionate Saviour. And they also deeply feel for the bereaved families in this country, and desire to assure them of their profound sympathy with them in this time of bewildering sorrow.

DR. EDWARD BEAN UNDERHILL.

DIED, 11TH MAY, 1901.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society desire to place on record their affectionate appreciation of the long and invaluable services of their lamented colleague, Dr. Underhill, the Honorary Secretary of the Society. They are conscious, seeing that his official relation to the Mission began as early as the year 1849, and, so far as active duties are concerned, formally closed twenty-five years ago, how few there are living to-day who had the privilege of personal association with him in the management of the affairs of the Society; but whether we have known him in the busy activities of full responsibility, or in the retired and less onerous position of an honorary secretariat, we are all alike deeply sensible that with the passing away of Dr. Underhill this Mission, not to speak of the Missionary enterprise generally, has lost a leader whose rare intellectual abilities and

fine spiritual sympathies were most devotedly consecrated to the service of Jesus Christ in connection with the furtherance of the Gospel in heathen lands. The Committee call to their remembrance the very important services their esteemed friend rendered by his deputation visits, especially to India, Africa, and Jamaica, by means of which he was able to bring to a satisfactory settlement many questions of a difficult and delicate nature, and they desire to record the fact that amongst those who were ever ready to acknowledge this indebtedness were the Missionaries and the native Christians themselves. It is not forgotten how tenderly he could sympathise with the oppressed and the suffering, and with what righteous indignation, when occasion required, he could lift up his voice against injustice and wrong. The Society is also laid under obligation to Dr. Underhill for his contributions to Missionary literature, thus perpetuating the influence of the lives and labours of faithful servants of Christ whose biographies he wrote.

In all that he was in these and many other important respects to the Church of Jesus Christ, and to this Society in particular, the Committee ascribe fervent thanksgiving to God, upon whose Wisdom and Grace he was himself always so anxious to rely.

In paying this sincere and affectionate tribute to the memory of their late colleague, the Committee are thankful to know that his last days were comparatively free from suffering and pain, that his keen intellect remained unclouded to the last, and that his end was calm and peaceful, and they cannot conclude without expressing their heartfelt condolence with his widow, to whose gentle companionship and ever-thoughtful care the lengthening of his years was, humanly speaking, so largely due. Of 1)r. Underhill it may truly be said "he served God in his day, and even beyond his generation," and doubtless now he has received the blessed words of approval and welcome from the Lord Himself, "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

SAMUEL ROWLES PATTISON, Esq.

DIED 27TH NOVEMBER 1901.

The Secretary reported the death of S. R. Pattison, Esq., of Kensington, in the 92nd year of his age, and stated that Mr. Pattison for many years was not only a Member of the Committee of the Society, but rendered special and important services as its legal adviser. He always took the

warmest interest in the work of the Mission, and to the last followed the proceedings of the Committee at home and of the Missionaries on the field with unabated sympathy. It was unanimously resolved:—

"To request the Secretary to convey to Mrs. Pattison and family a very sincere expression of the sympathy of the Committee in this season of bereavement and sorrow, and of their earnest prayers for their solace and support."

The Committee gratefully remember the signal services rendered to the Society by their late colleague, Mr. Pattison, during a long term of years, by his sound and wise counsel and his ever intelligent interest in the work of the Mission.

DIED, 18TH JUNE, 1901.

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, desire to express the sincere sorrow which the death of their colleague, Mr. William Wilberforce Baynes, has occasioned. They record with much thankfulness their deep sense of obligation for the many services which during the thirty-two years of his membership he has so cheerfully and unostentatiously rendered. Especially are they grateful for the cheerful readiness with which from time to time he was ever willing to assist the Executive at the Mission House in the financial administration of the Society, his skilled ability and his sound judgment, particularly in any case of emergency, being always at their command. REV. SAMUEL HARRIS BOOTH, D.D.

DIED, 7TH APRIL, 1902.

The Secretary reported the decease, at Bournemouth, of the Rev. S. H. Booth, D.D., formerly Secretary of the Baptist Union, and for thirty-three years a valued member of the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society. On the motion of the Rev. J. R. Wood, of Upper Holloway, it was unanimously resolved:—

"That this Committee records its sense of the great loss sustained by the Baptist Missionary Society in the death of the Rev. S. H. Booth, D.D., for many years one of its Honorary Members, and the esteemed Secretary of the Baptist Union of Great Britain and Ireland. The absorbing duties of his important office left him little time or strength for active service on the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, but the Society had no warmer friend or more generous helper than Dr. Booth. He followed the progress of the Society's work with deep interest, and gave it a constant place in his prayers. Age and infirmity compelled him, some time since, to retire from his usual activities; and the end which was neither unexpected nor unwelcome, was one of perfect peace."

In recording this Minute, the Committee expresses its gratitude to God, the Giver of all good gifts, for a life so long, so useful, and so much honoured, and will ever cherish the memory of Dr. Booth's loving spirit, sound judgment, unvarying courtesy, and efficiency in the management of affairs. In paying this tribute to a beloved colleague, the Committee tenders its respectful sympathy to the members of the bereaved family, commending them to the "God of all comfort," till the "day break and the shadows flee away."
