Executive Committee

FROM

October 19, 1935 to October 22, 1936

Executive Committee, 1935-1936

- A. Action taken at Panhala, 18 October 1935.
- 3601. That Rev. Horace K. Wright be the Chairman of the Committee for the year 1935-1936.
- B. Actions taken at the Meeting of the Committee held in Kolhapur November 30, 1935.
- 3602. The Executive Committee met as the Board of Governors of Miraj Hospital in accordance with actions 35273 and 35275. After hearing the report of the Superintendent of the Hospital actions were taken as follows:

1. That a Central Business Office be set up to take over all

the Hospital accounts.

2. That Scales of Fees be prepared and filed in the Central Business Office, to be used for making out bills by the Office.

3. That some provision be made for reception and accommodation of patients until they can be accommodated in wards, cottages or private rooms.

4. That plans be made for the entertainment, without embarrassment to the Members of the Mission assigned to Miraj, of missionaries and others on the occasion of their visits to Miraj.

- 5. That, subject to plans being approved by the Property Committee changes and alterations in Hospital buildings be approved as follows:
- (a) That the present dispensary be removed to that part to Miller Clinical Building now occupied by the laboratory.

(b) That the Central Office be located in the rooms now

used by the dispensary.

- (c) That the certain toilets be removed from the Miller Clinical Building.
 - (d) That sanitary equipment be installed in the Cottages.(e) That a third story be built on the Mofatlal Block.
- 6. That steps be taken to set up a Central Kitchen, this to take the place of a number of kitchens uneconomically operated.

7. That towards the financing the repairs sanctioned, Rs. 600 be appropriated from the Mission's Repair Fund, if possible.

8. That the Board be requested through the India Council to sanction the appropriation of a sum up to Rs. 3,000, from the proceeds of the sale of one or more of the Mission's bungalows to meet the expend ture to be incurred in building a 3rd storey on the Mofatlal Block.

- 9. That copies of the proposed constitution for the organization of the Hospital be circulated in the Committee.
- 3603. That, with effect from December 16, 1935 Miss Agnes Faze be transferred to Nipani to be associated with Miss V. S. Strobridge in evangelistic itineration.
- 3604. With reference to 25209 and previous actions, as well as the letter from the Treasurer of the Board dated Aug. 1, 1935, that the report of Dr. A. L. Wiley, who was appointed to confer with those in charge of the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay, be amended and adopted as follows:
- 1. That the Treasurer of the Mission be authorized to renew for another year the agreement with the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay.
- 2. That the Board be requested through the India Council to permit the Mission to enter for one year and with effect from April 1, 1936, into full co-operation with the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay, on the general lines adopted by the Mission on recommendation of the Executive Committee Sec. 3553, Letter from Messrs. Blickenstaff and Moffatt dated November 27, 1935.
- (a) It is the understanding of the Executive Committee and the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay that the Provident Fund account remain with the Mission; that the estimate of expense does not include the audit of the Mission accounts; that the Mission continue to have its own Treasurer, who would be relieved of all detail but to whom questions might be referred; that correspondence with the Board and the drawing or receiving of drafts may be done by the Inter-Mission Business Office or the Mission Treasurer; that reports be made as required by the Board and information supplied as requested by individual members of the Mission; that Messrs. Blickenstaff or Moffatt or their successors be authorized to act as Associate Treasurers with full authority to operate all Bank accounts in accordance with rules and instructions.
- (b) It is the understanding of the Executive Committee and the Inter-Mission Business Office that the full financial obligation incurred by the Mission is Rs. 100 per mensem on account of supervision and Rs. 50 on account of office expense, in addition to the cost of moving the office to Bombay and the provision of office furniture.
- (c) It is the understanding of the Executive Committee and the Inter-Mission Business Office that at the expiration of the period the arrangement would be renewable on mutual agreeable terms.
- 3605. That, the Committee make record of their deep appreciation of the services rendered, without expense to this Mission, by Dr. and Mrs. G. Henderson during a part of the period of the absence on furlough of Dr. and Mrs. R. C. Richardson.

- 3606. That Rs. 150 be reserved from India Council Funds to be received during the year 1936-1937 for the publication by Dr. A. L. Wiley of the book "What the Bible Teaches."
- 3607. That the report of the Committee appointed by the Miraj Station on the situation in Islampur Hospital be returned to that Station, attention being called to the action of the Mission requesting an investigation also at Ashta and pointing out the incongruity of having as a member of the Station's Committee one whose work was to be investigated and whose transfer was also involved.
- 3608. That with reference to 35211, Dr. J. E. Napp and Mr. J. C. Kincaid and Rev. R. A. Wilson be appointed as members of the Committee on Property Holdings.
- 3609. That inasmuch as word has been received that because of the state of Dr. Evans' health, Dr. and Mrs. E. H. Evans have resigned as missionaries, the Board be urgently requested through the India Council to appoint a married surgeon for service in St. Luke's Hospital, Vengurla.
- 3610. That the Board be requested through the India Council to extend an invitation to the Poona Inland Village Mission to occupy the section of the northern part of the Ratnagiri Station Field comprised under the Chiplun, Khed and Dabhol Talukas. C. Actions taken by Circular November 30, 1935.
- 3611. That Dr. C. E. Vail be authorized to proceed to Berlin by earliest airplane for special treatment, and that the Treasurer be authorized (Board Manual 177 and 181) to advance the necessary travel funds.
- 3612. That Dr. L. Bruce Carruthers act as Physician-incharge of Miraj Hospital until Dr. Vail returns or until the Executive Committee makes other arrangements.
- 3613. That the Manager, The National Bank of India, Bombay, be notified that Dr. L. Bruce Carruthers is competent to operate the Presbyterian Hospital (Miraj) Account and the Hospital Building Account until Dr. Vail returns and unless and until other arrangements are made and other instructions are given.
- 3614. That the Manager, The National Bank of India, Bombay be notified that Dr. Theodore M. Frank has been authorized to operate the accounts of St. Luke's Hospital, Vengurla, vice Dr. E. H. Evans, and unless and until other arrangements are made and other instructions given.
- 3615. That Mr. J. L. Goheen and Rev. W. H. Lyon be named the Missions' representatives at the Regional Conference to be held under the auspices of the Bombay Representative Council March 18-20, 1936 and that Rs. 10 (ten) from the amount ap-

propriated for Committee be sanctioned towards that expenditures of the Conference.

- 3616. That, in accordance with his request, the amount of Harkness Evangelistic Fund money assigned to Rev. H. G. Howard be reduced by Rs. 98.
- D. Actions taken by the Committee at Miraj, March 6, 7, and 9, 1936.
- 3617. That the matter of the continuance of the Navlihal and Kurli Dispensaries be referred to Miraj Hospital for investigation and report at the June meeting of the Executive Committee.
- 3618. That, with reference to the request of Dr. W. M. G. Jones that he be released from service as a member of the Auditing Committee, Rev. R. A. Wilson serve in his place until Annual Meeting, 1936.
- 3619. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay Miss A. Esther Burhans Rs. 100 on account of Income Tax, from the account refunded under that head.
- 3620. That the Treasurer be instructed to collect from Miraj Hospital and St. Luke's Hospital the amounts estimated as being contributed by them towards the Mission's financial obligations for 1935-1936.
- 3621. That the Physician-in-charge of the Mission Hospitals be authorized to carry balances—credit or debit—forward into the next fiscal year.
- 3622. That the Board be requested to make a special appropriation of approximately Rs. 2,555-13-0 to meet the expenditures on account of the journey to and from Berlin on Medical Certificate of Dr. Charles E. Vail.
- 3623. That the Treasurer be authorized to advance Rs. 1,000 against the appropriations for the fiscal year 1936-1937 to Ratnagiri Station to make possible the purchase of supplies before the Monsoon.
- 3624. That the balance in India Council Funds for the fiscal year 1935-1936 be used towards meeting the deficit in General Treasury for the same period.
- 3625. That Rs. 1,800 be appropriated from India Council Funds for 1936-1937 to make possible, with effect from April 1, 1936 full co-operation in the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay, on the understanding that the Treasurer be bonded as per India Council action 35168 and Board Letter No. 99 page 6.
- 3626. That a sum up to Rs. 250 be appropriated from India Council Funds, 1936-1937 for financing the printing programme of the Women's Work Committee, as per 35376.

- 3627. That, with reference to the question of the furlough for her in the Spring of 1936, referred to the Committee by Mission action 35247, that Dr. Norma P. Dunning continue on the field until Hot Season 1937.
- 3628. That with reference to the same question as above as regards Miss Agnes Faze:
- (1) That Miss Faze continue on the field until Hot Season 1937.

(2) That she proceed to Mahableshwar as soon as possible to complete the preparation for the Language Examinations re-

maining.

- (3) That, with effect from the return to Vengurla after her Hot-Season vacation of Miss L. Faye Froese, Miss Faze proceed to Vengurla for service in St. Luke's Hospital on the understanding that she serve directly in association with the Physician-incharge and the Nursing Superintendent, have no executive responsibility and maintain her own living arrangements.
- 3629. That on the return of Miss L. F. Froese to Vengurla after her Hot Season vaction Miss Mary M. Krug proceed to Kolhapur for service in the Mary E. Wanless Hospital.
- 3630. That, with the approval of the India Council the Board be requested to permit Miss Mary M. Krug to proceed in September 1936 on regular first-term study furlough.
- 3631 That Mrs. M. W. Strahler be permitted to proceed on furlough in March 1936 on Medical Certificate.
- 3632. That, on the understanding that the Board's Medical Secretary approves of her engaging in furlough study, the Board be requested to grant the usual furlough-study allowance for Mrs. M. W. Strahler.
- 3633. That in view of the resignation of Rev. M. W. Strahler as Superintendent of Miraj Hospital, the Board be requested to sanction furlough study in the field of secondary education rather than that of Hospital Administration as per Mission action No. 35237.
- 3634. That the Board's attention be called to the matter of the furloughs of Rev. and Mrs. M. W. Strahler and Mr. John L. - 3637. That the resignation of the Rev. M. W. Strahler as Hospital Superintendent be accepted.
- 3638. That the Physician-in-Charge of the Miraj Hospital be requested to secure, through the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay, the services of an expert to undertake the effective reorganization, as soon as possible, of the financial administration of the Hospital.

- 36245. That rule 34348 be amended by addition as follows:—"In case a contributor is dismissed for no fault of his own, he shall be given the full Bonus on condition that the missionary in charge make a clear statement of the facts of the particular case.'
- 36246. That rule 34349 be amended by deleting the words "a portion or" and by substituting "the " for "a."
- 36247. That rule 36353 be amended by addition: "such cases to be dealt with by the Provident Fund Committee in consultation with the missionary concerned."
- 36248. That rule 36357 be amended by addition:"in consultation with the Provident Fund Committee."
 - 36249. That new rules providing for loans from the Fund be adopted as follows:—

That loans may be made from the Provident Fund to contributors on the following conditions:-

- 1. The Provident Fund Committee shall be satisfied that the need for the loan is legitimate.
 - 2. The loan shall not exceed one half of the Provident Fund Deposit.
- 3. The rate of interest to be paid shall be five per cent.4. The loan shall be paid back in two years in equal monthly instalments.
- 5. If the loan is not paid back within two years interest at the rate of 71/2% shall be charged.

- 6. No loan shall be made to one who has not repaid his first loan.
- 7. The loan feature shall be in operation until Annual Meeting of 1939 when it may be renewed.

(On the loan feature of the Provident Fund, at their request, the negative votes of Mrs. Simpson, Mr. Howard, Mr. Wilson and Dr. Frank were recorded.

36250. Any worker dismissed on account of immoral conduct or indisputable un-Christian shall not receive his Bonus Deposit.

36251. When any contributor's connection with the Provident Fund shall be severed, save by death, the sum due him shall be paid after three months.

36252. It was decided to refer to the Registrar of the Provident Fund, as a Committee of one, the task of making appropriate verbal changes in the rules caused by the new amendments adopted.

36291. Appeal against Executive Committee action 3682, providing for the transfer of Rev. H. G. Howard to Islampur, Rev. and Mrs. F. O. Conser to Kodoli and Mrs. E. W. Simpson

to Miraj. The action of the Committee was not sustained. Yeas 8, nays 20, not voting 5.

36292. Executive Committee action 36120 providing for the payment of two months' salary and full Bonus Deposit to D. J. Gajghat, former clerk of the Treasurer, whose release was necessitated by the transfer of the Inter-Mission Business Office to Bombay. The action of the Committee was approved. Yeas 27, nays 4, not voting 7.

36293. Executive Committee action 36124 as to the dismissal of Daulatrav Ganpat Salve by Vengurla Station, the Station being permitted to continue him in service until other employment could be secured and the payment to him of the full Bonus Deposit. The action of the Committee was sustained. Yeas 26, nays 3, not voting 9.

36294. Appeal against Executive Committee action 36128 as to Rev. V. A. Satralkar teaching in the Islampur Bible Institute. The action of the Committee was not sustained. Yeas 14, nays 19, not voting 5.

36295. As to Executive Committee action 36129 as to arrangements for Annual Meeting 1936. The action of the Committee was approved. Yeas 30, nays 1.

36296. To approve Executive Committee action 36161 as to furlough study of Miss M. Craig. The action of the Committee was approved. Yeas 31, nays 7.

36297. Appeal against the action of the Executive Committee action 36191, providing for the sale of the Pali Property. The action of the Committee was sustained. Yeas 19, nays 14, not voting 5.

36298. Votes were taken, according to the plan prescribed in the Field Manual, No. 312, on the return to the field, after their first term of service of Misses Norma P. Dunning, M.D. and Agnes Faze. The votes were forwarded to the Board.

36299. A vote was taken on nominations for Secretary-ship of the India Council. The result was as follows:

- I. Rev. J. B. Weir, Ph.D., Punjab Mission;
- 2. Rev. H. J. Strickler, Punjab Mission;
- 3. Mr. John L. Goheen, Western India Mission.

THE EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

The report of the Educational Committee was amended and adopted as follows:

36300. That the report of the Ad-Interim Committee be approved.

36301. The report of the Special Committee on the Merging and Co-ordination of certain educational institutions was

taken under consideration. It was decided to approve the objectives to be attained as presented by this Committee as follows:

- 1. Primarily to educate Christian children into a knowledge and experience of the Christian way of life.
- 2. To train leaders and teachers for the Christian community.
- 3.To help the Christian community to a better economic and social position.
- 4. To educate a larger proportion of village children and to provide the type of education which will fit them for leadership and life in the villages, since that is where a large percentage of the Christians in this area live.
- 36302. That this Special Committee on the Merging and Co-ordination of certain institutions be continued for another year.
- 36303. That certain recommendations made by this Committee be referred again to the Committee as follows:
- 1. That the Theodore Carter Memorial School be made a primary day school.
 - 2. That the Gram Sevak Shala, Nipani, be considered a Station School.
- 3. That boys under the IV Standard should not be admitted to the Boarding Department of the Kodoli Community Middle School, but that the School be permitted to take older boys who have not passed the IV Standard into a foundation class to prepare them for entrance into the V Standard of the Sangli Industrial and Agricultural School.
- 4. That, beginning with the year 1937-1938, the percentage of non-Christians in the Irwin Christian High School be reduced to fifty percent of the total enrolment; and that within five years this be reduced to twenty-five percent of the enrolment.
- 5. That a Committee be appointed to examine the possibility of combining the scholastic departments of the Esther Patton and Irwin Christian High Schools and releasing funds for the Central Scholarship Fund proposed.
- 6. That, by 1938, at least seventy-five percent of the Staff of the Vengurla High School be Christian.
- 7. That, in view of the fact that Vengurla High School does not fit into the scheme of education a Committee be appointed to examine the possibility of this institution becoming financial independent or being taken over entirely—financially—by Vengurla Station.
- 8. That an orphange be established in connection with the Mary E. Wanless Hospital.
- 9. That the children of the Alice Home be transferred to this orphanage.

- 10. That Rs. 1,000 be made available for this orphanage.
- 11. That certain detailed recommendations regarding a scheme for examinations be adopted.
- 12. That this Special Committee take under consideration the question of financing the Central Scholarship Fund.
- 36304. That the Agricultural Bias Course in the Sangli Industrial and Agricultural Course be discontinued, and IV Standard passed children from the Sangli District be sent to the Kodoli Community Middle School.
- 36305. That the question of providing Scholarships for these children be referred to the Committee.
- 36306. That the regular vernacular course be continued in the Kodoli Community Middle School and that pre-vocational courses such as gardening, weaving, rope-making, carpentry, tailoring, animal husbandry and poultry-culture be introduced.
- 36307. That Mr. Kincaid, Miss Deen and Mr. Urunkar be appointed as Administrative Committee for the Central Scholarship Fund.
- 36308. That a recommendation made be tabled:—"That Mr. M. C. Gorde be made the Principal of the Irwin Christian High School for two years; that no appropriations be granted to the Scholastic Department; that the school fees of the Christian students in the Hostel and the compound receipts be paid to the School; that this does not go into operation until a special Committee to be appointed has had an opportunity to confer with the Rev. M. W. Strahler and report the results of the Conference to the Mission."
- 36309. That Dr. James E. Napp continue as Acting Principal of the Irwin Christian High School until the return of Rev. M. W. Strahler or until some other arrangement is made.
- 36310. That the question of Bible Instruction in Schools be referred to the Committee on Religious Education.
- 36311. That educational methods, suggested by the India Council, 3584, be approved.
- 36312. That, with reference to the question of an improved diet for Schools, India Council 3585, the Educational Committee take up the matter with Mrs. W. Wiser, Saharanpur, who has been doing special work in this field.
- 36313. That the question of Bible training for Christian teachers, India Council 3596, be referred to the Committee on Religious Education.
- 36314. That the following be referred to the Property Committee:—"That the Property Committee be requested to make a grant of Rs. 300 from Repair Funds to put an overhead

- room in the Science Room of the Vengurla High School and that the usual grant of Rs. 100 be sanctioned, in addition for this work, Rev. W. H. Lyon to prepare an estimate for this work and forward same to the Property Committee."
- 36315. That Miss C. Grace Deen and Mr. G. B. Ghatge be appointed a special Committee to investigate and report on the apparent inequality of the salaries of agents and workers.
- 36316. That Field Manual No. 230 be suspended to permit the Kodoli Community Middle School to charge fees for 1936-1937 and 1937-1938 at the same rate as last year (See 3538 and 35173).
- 36317. That a Special Committee consisting of Miss C. Grace Deen, Mr. G. B. Ghatge and Rev. R. A. Wilson be appointed to deal with the recommendation as follows:—That the children of Mission agents and workers be educated free in the schools and colleges connected with the Mission.
- 36318. That the new Educational Committee consider and report on the following:—That steps be taken to have the Esther Patton School affiliated with the Women's University at Hingne instead of the University of Bombay.
- 36319. That Estimates Class VIII be prepared on the old basis and that Estimates so made be approved.
- 36320. That the nominations of the Educational Committee for Chairman of the Committee, Ad-Interim Committee, Indian Members of the Committee, Deccan and Konkan Administrative Committees be accepted and the persons nominated declared duly elected.
- 36321. The Committee, as constituted for the year 1936-1937 is as follows:
 - The Chairman-Rev. R. A. Wilson
 - The Ad Interim Committee—Rev. R. A. Wilson, Miss C. Grace Deen, Messrs. M. C. Gorde, G. V. Moses and K. B. Urunkar.
 - The Indian Members—Hirabai Chopade, Prof. B. P. Chovey, Messrs. K. B. Urunkar, A. B. Phansophkar, S. S. Chavan, G. K. Ohol, G. B. Ghatge, M. C. Gorde, G. V. Moses and P. K. Gujar.
 - Missionary Members—Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Brown, Mrs. L. B. Carruthers, Miss C. Grace Deen, Mrs. R. H. H. Goheen, Rev. H. G. Howard, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Kincaid, Mrs. W. H. Lyon, Mrs. J. E. Napp, Rev. and Mrs. M. W. Strahler, Mrs. D. B. Updegraff, Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Wilson, Rev. and Mrs. Horace K. Wright.
- 36322. That Administrative Committees for Schools be as follows:
 - Deccan Schools—For two years—Mr. J. C. Kincaid, Chairman, Hirabai Chopade.

For one year—Miss C. Grace Deen, Valubai G. Chopade.

Konkan Schools-For two years-Mr. G. V. Moses, Chairman, Dr. R. H. H. Goheen.

For one year—Mr. S. S. Chavan Rev. W. H. Lyon. The Principals are to act as advisory members when dealing with their own Schools.

EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE

The report of the Evangelistic Committee was amended and adopted as follows:

- 36323. That record be made that the Ad-Interim Committee has presented its report.
- 36324. That record be made that the project as carried on by Miss V. S. Strobridge in Nipani in accordance with Mission action 35196 had been unsuccessful.
- 36325. That Mrs. H. W. Brown and Miss C. L. Seiler be requested to undertake similar projects in Sangli and Kolhapur.
- 36326. With reference to Mission action 35202, it was reported that the recommendation therein referred to, viz. "That baptism should be given the adult candidate only when he is also ready to receive the Lord's Supper" was partially followed the past year in all Station Districts and Churches. It was decided to re-affirm action 35202, this to be put into effect during the coming year. It was also decided to refer to the Church Council for consideration Mission actions as follows:—34287, 34288, 34289 and 35194.
- 36327. With reference to the recommendations of the Centenary Committee, taken under consideration by this Committee.
- 1. That the Urun-Islampur and Karad Primary Schools be closed, and classes for women, girls, young men, and children be conducted under special workers and their wives.
- 2. That the recommendation regarding the turning over of evangelistic work and schools to Miraj Church be deleted.
 - 3. That a wider use be made of Station Bible Institutes
- 4. That substitution for the recommendation that certain primary schools be closed be made as follows:—That village and other primary schools be strengthened and that the duties, responsibilities and appropriations of the Educational Supervisor be restored to the level of 1931.
- 36328. That the Mission adopt the programme of the Bombay Representative Christian Council on Evangelism, that the Ad-Interim Committee give effect thereto, and that the action

be reported to the Executive Committee of the Kolhapur Church Council with a view to full co-operation.

36329. That record be made that a brief report of the Educational Supervisor had been made and approved.

36330. That record be made that the Committee "learned with regret of the closing in 1934 of the promising effort at a part-time boarding school along the Jalna lines at Kumbhoz." It was decided that this work be re-opened as soon as possible. See Minutes 33235.

36331. That Stations be not permitted to close any primary school without first consulting the Educational Supervisor.

36332. That the standard of literacy be understood as ability to read the first Marathi Reader or a Gospel and the ability to sign one's name; that all Stations be instructed to prepare statistics on literacy and forward same to the Secretary of the Mission by September 1, 1937.

36333. That Revs. J. S. Masoji and F. O. Conser be appointed a Committee to consult with the Executive Committee of the Kolhapur Church Council as to whether a column on literacy may be added in Station record books and the Kolhapur Church Council Statistical forms.

36334. That the Committee consisting of Dr. D. B. Updegraff, A. B. Phansophkar, and Miss C. L. Seiler, appointed to prepare a certificate for the enrolment of catechumens, be continued; that this Committee be requested to arrange for printing the Certificate as approved last year; that an amount up to Rs. 25 from Harkness Funds be used for this purpose.

36335. That the Board be requested through the India Council to make a distinction in the Prayer Calendar between "Churches" and "Other Groups" instead of grouping them.

36336. That the questions of worship and stewardship, India Council Nos. 357 and 3563, be referred to the Retreat-Institute Committee.

36337. That efforts be made to secure the development of the Church in giving and stressing the payment of the tithe.

36338. That there be more emphasis on district evangelization for which the Churches should assume responsibility.

36339. That volunteer work, specially in the field of evangelism, be encouraged.

36340. That a Special Committee on the Selection of Candidates for Theological Instruction be constituted, the members being Drs. J. E. Napp, D. B. Updegraff, and Revs. J. S. Masoji and V. Bedekar.

36341. That the question of the selection of Balvantrav Mohite of the Nipani Church, Bhaskar Ishwara Gaikvad of Kol-

hapur and Hariba Rukadikar be referred to the Special Committee, that Committee to determine whether it can recommend that a Scholarship of Rs. 30 per mensem can be paid to B. I. Gaikvad and a Scholarship of Rs. 50 per mensem can be paid to Hariba Rukadikar.

- 36342. That the matter of making financial provision for these Scholarships be referred to the Executive Committee.
- 36343. That Stations and others interested be informed that all applications for appointment or approval as candidates for Theological Instruction must reach the Special Committee by February 1st of each year.
- 36344. That this Mission call the attention of the Bombay Representative Council to the urgent need of having a Literature Missionary for Marathi Christian Literature and earnestly request that body to appoint for this service someone who will worthily carry on the work done by former Literature Missionaries under the auspices of the Bombay Representative Christian Council.
- 36345. That in order to implement the action taken, as above this Mission provisionally offer Rs. 50, from the Rs. 200 reserved for publication, to the Bombay Representative Christian Council for this purpose.
- 36346. That Rs. 20, to be taken from the Rs. 200 Harkness Fund reserved for publication, be utilized for literature to be published for the Depressed Classes by the Evangelistic Committee of the Bombay Representative Christian Council.
- 36347. That where Christians are available for work in any capacity preference be given them.
- 36348. That the course on Social Physiology and Hygiene, prepared in accordance with Mission action 35190, be approved and recommended for use in Bible Institutes.
- 36349. That the Estimates for Class VII and Class VIII (b) be approved on the understanding that any salary increases will be acted upon by the Agents' Committee.
- 36350. That the distribution of the Harkness Evangelistic Fund for 1936-1937 be as below, it being understood that unless otherwise indicated the Fund be used for itineration.

- 36355. That, with effect from April 1, 1937, the agreement securing the full co-operation of this Mission in the Inter-Mission Business Office, Bombay, be renewed. (See 36004, 36105, 36107, 36108, 36109. It may be noted that complete and satisfactory arrangements for bonding the Treasurers of this Office have been made).
- 36356. That this Mission urge again upon the Managers of this Office and the Committee, presumably in charge, the necessity of formulating a constitution.
- 36357. That the first charge on India Council Funds to be received during the year 1937-1938 shall be for Rs. 1,800 to enable this Mission to meet its financial obligations to the Inter-Mission Business Office.
- 36358. That, with effect from April 1, 1936, Mission action No. 3393 (p.14) regarding the pooling of Income Tax, be rescinded.
- 36359. That, in accordance with the requirements of the Income Tax Act, the system of paying Income Tax through the Inter-Mission Business Office be approved.
- 36360. That, with reference to the refund from the Income Tax Officer, Kolhapur State, made to the Rev. M. W. Strahler, on the completion of the accounts, this be divided prorata among

those entitled to a refund from the Kolhapur State Income Tax Office.

- 36361. That the Board be requested through the India Council for permission to solicit funds in America for the Charles Edward Vail Cancer Institute.
- 36362. That, with reference to her request, the Treasurer be authorized to pay Miss Mary M. Krug Rs. 22-8-0 on account of dental charges.
- 36363. That, with reference to the request of Kolhapur Station, Dr. G. S. Krishnayya be permitted to occupy the Bungalow of the Principal of the Irwin Christian High School until his return from furlough or until required by the Mission, the rental per mensem to be fixed by the Property Committee. (See No. 36535).
- 36364. That the Secretary of the Mission be instructed to send a cable to Mr. J. L. Goheen, requesting him to cable the Mission as to his decision in the matter of his election as Secretary of the India Counc'l.
- 36365. That English-speaking Indians, in charge of units of work within the Mission, be supplied with copies of the Minutes of the Mission.
- 36366. That Indian members of Departmental Committees be supplied with copies of Departmental Committee Reports and Estimates as adopted.
- 36367. That record be made as to the extent to which effect has been given to certain suggestions regarding the financial re-organization of Miraj Hospital (See 3638; 36185).
- 36368. That the question of urgent repairs to the Mofatlal Block, Miraj Hospital, be referred to the Property Committee.
- 36369. That the Secretary of the Mission be instructed to send Dr. Robert P. Wilder a letter of appreciation for the gift of \$1000.00 for the Wilder Memorial.
- 36370. That, regarding the return to the field after the first term of service of Dr. Norma P. Dunning, the matter be referred to the Board, attention being directed to the vote of the Mission, already notified by the President of the Mission.
- 36371. That the Board be informed that it is the judgment of the Mission that the return to the field, after her first term of service, of Miss Agnes Faze, is undesirable.
- 36372. That, with reference to the question of voting on the return to the field, after their first terms of service, of Dr. and Mrs. L. B. Carruthers and Miss Mary M. Krug, members of the Mission be urgently requested to use the Pre-Furlough Questionnaire. Members who are conscientiously opposed to using this questionnaire are free to use any other method.

- 36373. That the Questionnaires and statements secured in connection with action 36372 above be turned over to Dr. A. L. Wiley for evaluation and report to the Executive Committee.
- 36374. With reference to the Islampur Problem and the India Council investigation thereof:
- 1. That, in view of the changed conditions in the Church at Isalampur where the two parties have been reconciled, the Mission request the India Council to consider whether it may not desire to rescind its action concerning the date of the furloughs of the members of the Islampur Station and state that they take their furloughs at the regular times as prescribed by the Board's Manual.
- 2. That, in order that the India Council may arrive at a decision, the Chairman of the Executive Committee be instructed to secure letters from Mrs. E. W. Simpson, Rev. F. O. Conser, Rev. Isaacrav A. Ranabhise, Rev. H. G. Howard and Danielrav Kale, arrange for the circulation of these letters in the Executive Committee, forward same, after the Committee has given approval, to the India Council.
- 3. That, with effect from Nov. 1, 1936, Rev. H. G. Howard be relieved of the responsibility for the workers and appropriations of Islampur Station. (See Executive Committee action, 3681).

4. That the assignment of Station workers and the distribution of Station appropriations be as on March 31, 1936.

- 5. That after the decision of the India Council on No. 1 above has been received, the Executive Committee make such arrangements for the work of Islampur Station as may be necessary.
- 36375. That Kodoli Station be permitted to place the Kodoli Community Middle School under Indian management, thereby releasing Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Wilson for District Work.
- 36376. That in considering what provision shall be made for the work of Islampur Station (as per 36374 No. 5 above) the Executive Committee consider the availability of Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Wilson, as per 36375 above.
- 36377. That the recommendation of the Committee that Miss B. H. Freeman be transferred to Kodoli be referred back to the Committee for decision, after consultation with Miss Freeman on her arrival in India.
- 36378. That Miss Florence E. Schafer be transferred to Kolhapur for service in the Mary E. Wanless Hospital,
- 36379. That Miss Florence E. Schafer be placed in Executive charge of the Mary E. Wanless Hospital, Kolhapur, with authority to operate the Bank accounts until other arrangements are made and notified, the Banks concerned being informed.

- 36380. That Miss Mary C. Richardson be made Superintendent of Nurses in Miraj Hospital.
- 36381. That Miraj Hospital be urged to seriously consider the matter of securing some person—not a trained nurse—to serve as a house-keeper, to be in charge of the linen and store-rooms and to relieve, in other ways, the trained missionary nurses assigned to that institution.
- 36382. With reference to the matter of securing the assistance of another Physician for Miraj, and in accordance with a cable, received from the Board by the Secretary of the India Council and notified to this Mission, assuring Board support, that Dr. I. M. Orr, Nevyoor, Travancore State, be invited to undertake service in Miraj Hospital for one year, beginning January 1, 1937, with possible permanent connection with and service in this Mission to be taken under consideration, the allowances to be those sanctioned by the Board for a married couple with the usual children's allowances.
- That inasmuch as the document presented by the Medical Committee at Panhala, October 27, 1936 and approved by the Central Committee appears to fall somewhat short, according to the statements of Drs. T. M. Frank and L. B. Carruthers, of being entirely suitable as a Constitution for the Miraj Hospital and Medical School, and

Inasmuch as it would in its present form, necessitate the setting aside or amendment of Field Manual No. 241 ("the Mission shall appoint the Physician-in-Charge of each Hospital").

Therefore, in order that the desires, as the Mission understands them, of the Medical Committee may be carried into effectat the earliest possible date, this proposed Constitution be again referred to the Senatus for further consideration, completion and presentation for approval to the Mission's Executive Committee, it possible, before Dec. 1, 1936. The Executive Committee shall then take action upon the proposed Constitution and put same into effect within 15 days, until which time actions 3635 and 3636 be continued as in effect, Dr. L. B. Carruthers to continue as Physician-in-Charge until the new organization is set up.

That the Executive Committee be empowered to suspend any provision of the Field Manual deemed necessary, to make

possible the early reorganization of Miraj Hospital.

36384. In view of the retirement from active service on Jan. 17, 1937 of Rev. A. L. Wiley, Ph.D. and Mrs. Wiley, it was decided to make provision for the work of Ratnagiri Station, with effect from Jan. 17, 1937, as follows:—

1. That Mr. S. S. Chavan continue as Principal of the Theodore Carter Memorial School, have executive charge of the dormitories and be responsible for the payment of the salaries of the Boarding Department and the allowances for the widows.

- 2. That Gangabai R. Powar be Matron of the Girls' Dormitory with Muktabai R. Karmarkar as assistant in charge of the infants and small children.
- 3. That Jijabai Ahi supervise the work of the two Bible Women and have general oversight of the Girls' Dormitory.
 - 4. That Rajasbai Hiraji have oversight of the widows.
- 5. That the Rev. V. A. Satralkar be placed in charge of the evangelistic work of the District, the Gospel Light House, the three evangelists and eight village schools.
- 6. That Yeshvant Bave be care-taker for the Ratnagiri Bungalow at a salary of Rs. 8 per mensem.
- 7. That Vengurla Station have general oversight of the work of Ratnagiri Station, this to continue from Jan. 17, 1937 to Annual Meeting 1937, the Executive Committee being authorized to discontinue the arrangement at an earlier date, if necessary.
- 36385. That, with effect from the close of Annual Meeting 1936, provided he has finished his work of producing Victrolarecords, the services of the Rev. V. A. Satralkar be placed at the disposal of Ratnagiri Station, in preparation for the responsibility indicated above, 36384, No. 5.
- 36386. That Dr. and Mrs. A. L. Wiley be permitted to occupy the Mission Bungalow, Ratnagiri, after their retirement on Jan. 17, 1937, until they have disposed of their personal effects and secured sailings, presumably about April 1937.
- 36387. That on the departure on furlough of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Brown, Principals of the Sangli Industrial and Agricultural School and the Graham Memorial School respectively, the Executive Committee make arrangements for the management of these institutions.
- 36388. That Dr. and Mrs. Fulton Stewart be located in Vengurla.
- 36389. That a very urgent invitation be forwarded to the Rev. and Mrs. Alison Reid Bryan to seek re-appointment as regular members of this Mission.
- 36390. That Rev. Horace K. Wright be made the Educational Supervisor of the Mission for the period 1936-1939, vice Dr. J. E. Napp.
- 36391. That, with effect from April 1, 1937, Krishnaji B. Urunkar be released from service in the Kodoli Community Middle School to become Assistant Educational Supervisor on a salary of Rs. 40 per mensem.
- 36392. That the Executive Committee be instructed to reserve from funds to be received from the India Council the sum of Rs. 240 to be used towards meeting the salary of Krishnaji Babaji Urunkar, Assistant Educational Supervisor.

36393. That the Board be requested through the India Council to sanction furloughs for this Missions, the necessary estimates being included, as follows:

Islampur—Rev. and Mrs. F. O. Conser, April 1937.

Mrs. E. W. Simpson, April, 1937, or date approved by the India Council.

Kodoli—Rev. H. G. Howard, November 1937. Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Wilson, March 1938. Miraj—Dr. and Mrs. L. B. Carruthers, April 1937.

Special actions, regarding furloughs, were taken as follows:

36394. That the Board be requested through the India Council to permit Mrs. J. E. Napp to proceed on furlough in August 1937 in order to enter the children in school, Dr. Napp to remain on the field until November 1, 1937.

36395. That the Board be requested through the India Council to permit Mrs. D. B. Updegraff to proceed on furlough in August 1937 in order to enter the children in school, Dr. Updegraff to remain on the field until April 1938.

36396. That the Board be requested through the India Council to permit Mr. and Mrs. Harry W. Brown to proceed on furlough on Medical Certificate about July 31, 1937, the Board being urged to inform Mr. and Mrs. Brown of their decision by a personal communication.

36397. That plans for Furlough Study be approved as follows:

Rev. F. O. Conser—Bible Study.

Mrs. F. O. Conser—Bible Study.

Mrs. E. W. Simpson—Bible Study.

Rev. H. G. Howard—Bible Study.

Rev. James E. Napp, D.D.—Semitics.

Mr. H. W. Brown—Manual Training and Engineering.

Dr. L. B. Carruthers—Internal Medicine.

36398. That the Board through the India Council be requested to sanction the necessary allowances for furlough study.

Mrs. L. B. Carruthers-Medical Social Service.

36399. That the Board be requested to make it possible for Rev. F. O. Conser to study Bible Institutes in Chosen on his way back to India, on the completion of his furlough.

36400. That the India Council be requested to appropriate the sum of Rs. 300 from funds set aside for special projects, for a project of education for Christian village women, in which, for a period of six months, small groups will be brought in to stay in the Graham Memorial Hostel, Sangli, for short courses in Bible, sewing, weaving, care of children, etc., each group spending but one month in Sangli, being replaced by another group, from

another village, the project to be continued until six principal villages of the Sangli field had benefited thereby.

- 36401. That a Committee on the Re-organization of the Mission be appointed consisting of Mrs. R. H. H. Goheen, Chairman, Mrs. D. B. Updegraff, Mrs. W. H. Lyon and Mr. John L. Goheen, this Committee to study the desirability of re-organizing the Mission reporting at the March 1937 Meeting of the Executive Committee, the Committee to review all Mission actions taken since 1930 which have the force of rules for incorporation in the possible new Field Manual.
- 36402. That Miss C. Grace Deen be made a member of the Executive Committee as the representative from Kolhapur Station from Annual Meeting 1936 until January 1, 1937, when she continues as such by virtue of being the Secretary of the Mission.
- 36403. That Rev. W. H. Lyon represent Vengurla Station on the new Executive Committee when it acts as a Committee on Nominations.
- 36404. That the application of Mr. P. J. Gujar, Nipani, that arrangements be made for admission to some Government Agricultural School, be referred to the Committee on Selection of Students for Training.
- 36405. That the affirmative vote of Rev. H. G. Howard, at his request, be recorded on a motion which was lost and was as follows:—"That the Islampur Estimates be increased by Rs. 400 to be taken *pro rata* from the appropriations of the other Stations.
- 36406. That Rs. 414, General Treasury over-expenditure not provided for, be met from India Council Funds to be received during the present fiscal year.
- 36407. That Rs. 1,021 be appropriated from the balance on hand, Rent Receipts, Class V to meet the over-expenditure, General Treasury same Class. (See Mission actions (35223, 35224, and Estimates, 1936-1937, General Treasury, Class V, Taxes Column D, p. 110).
 - 36408. That Estimates for Classes I and II be approved.
- 36409. That Estimates for Classes VII, VIII, IX, having been examined by the Departmental Committees be approved.
- 36410. That the Estimates for General Treasury be approved.
- 36411. With reference to the Power of Attorney for this Mission, following the retirement of Dr. A. L. Wiley, the present Attorney for the Board, the Board be requested to issue the Power of Attorney an Attorney for this Mission to Mr. J. C. Kincaid and Dr. J. E. Napp, both members of the Mission's Permanent Committee on Property Holdings, the Power of Attorney to be so issued

as to make possible its use by either person when the other is on furlough.

- 36412. In connection with the consideration of the letter of Dr. George T. Scott, it was decided that replies be made to certain inquiries as follows:
- 1. Inquiry, No. 1. p. 12 Dr. Scott's letter:—(a) "Fewer missionaries and more select with a view to securing missionaries, of deep spiritual experience, of broad international sympathies, missionaries capable of making re-adjustments, with ability to work with other missionaries, missionaries with extensive general knowledge but at the same time carefully trained to do some specific pieces of work desired and needed by Indian friends who have been consulted".

Inquiry, No. 1, (b). "Be very cautious about taking on any national workers who are not prepared spiritually to be servants of Christ; people should never be employed in Christian service primarily to earn a living; emphasis should be placed on volunteer service and responsibility for evangelizing the area be put on volunteer workers and the Indian Church."

- 2. Inquiry No. 2 p. 12 Dr. Scott's letter:—"Buy less property in more strategic positions with a view of bringing missionaries and future institutions into closer contact with the people, due care being taken to safeguard the health of missionaries and the efficiency of the work. With the improvement of sanitary conditions in general, such over-strict precautions as were observed in past years are not so absolutely necessary to-day. Precautions should be taken against building up isolated compounds and Christian wards. Missionaries should be ready to take more risks within reason and common-sense. Buildings should be much less expensive, decent Indian houses used where available."
- 3. Inquiry No. 3 p. 12 Dr. Scott's letter:—"The Mission advises selling as much property as is not used or likely to be used in the near future. Rent what is not used at present but may be required in the near future. Church buildings should be handed over to the Indian Church as soon as the United Church of India, North, is legally competent to hold property. Any new buildings and there should be none built except in very urgent cases—should meet the heretofore outlined suggestions."
- 36413. That Stations be authorized to restore cuts, if possible, and increases so made be notified to the Agents' Committee for record only.
- 36414. The report of the Joint Committee on Co-operation with the Kolhapur Church Council was taken under consideration. It was decided.
- 1. That, in the matter of a Central Pastoral Fund, action 32193 be re-affirmed.

- 2. That the report be recommitted for reconsideration and report to the Executive Committee.
- 3. That if the Executive Committee deem it necessary to circulate same in the Mission for votes.
- 36415. That, in the matter of requests to be made to the Board for appropriations from the Special Fund to be raised in connection with the celebration by the Church of the Centennial of the beginning of the Board's work, which requests were made originally by the several Departmental Committees and confirmed by the Central Committee, the Order of Preference be as follows:
 - 1. The Charles Edward Vail Cancer Institute ... \$10,000
 2. Special Fund for Itineration to be used at the rate of \$10,000 a year for five years ... \$50,000
 3. Laboratories and Hostel, Miraj Medical School ... \$30,000
 4. Educational Project ... \$75,000
 5. Psycopathic Hospital, Vengurla ... \$10,000
 6. Building of Churches, village congregations ... \$5,000
 7. Endowment, Physicians, Village Dispensaries ... \$10,000
 8. Miraj Medical School Endowment ... \$200,000
- 36416. In connection with the above the Rev. H. G. Howard offered a motion, as follows:—"The Mission regrets that in the Session with the Departmental Committees resolutions were passed asking for funds as listed above, inasmuch as the Mission believes that at this time no requests for money should be made to the Board." The motion being declared out of order was not put to the vote; but the following members were permitted to record their affirmative votes:—Rev. H. G. Howard, Dr. A. L. Wiley, Dr. and Mrs. D. B. Updegraff, Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Wilson, Drs. R. C. Richardson and J. E. Napp, Misses V. S. Strobridge, G. L. Enright.
- 36417. That, on the recommendation of the Joint Committee, plans for the celebration of the Centenary of the beginning of the work of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. be approved, in general, as follows:
- 1. That there be a Joint Celebration by the Kolhapur Church Council and the Mission in a final large Meeting in Kolhapur in March or October 1937.
- 2. That preliminary meetings be held in the different Churches and Stations.
- 3. That the special Centenary Committee undertake the provision of ways and means for the conduct of these Meetings.
- 4. That the special Centenary Committee prepare programmes for the different services and occasions.
- 36418. That the Secretary of the Mission arrange for the itinerary within the Mission of the Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., member of the Board, and Mrs. Stevenson.

- 36419. That matters indicated below be referred to the Executive Committee:
- 1. The financial provision for the deficit Irwin Christian High School (See 36141).
- 2. The consideration of the suggestion that this Mission seek the recruitment of four married evangelistic missionaries.
 - 3. India Council actions Nos. 35161 and 35190 and 199.

THE GUIDANCE COMMITTEE

The Report of the Guidance Committee was amended and adopted as follows:

- 36420. That record be made, with pleasure that Mrs. R. A. Wilson passed the 2nd Marathi Examinations with honours.
- 36421. That record be made that Miss Agnes Faze again failed to pass the remaining portion of the 2nd Marathi Examinations.
- 36422. That instead of making the Bombay Representative Christian Council 3rd Year Examinations obligatory for all, the Mission offer an alternate course to be prepared by the Mission's Guidance Committee, with power to co-opt others, the course to cover a wide range of subjects from which the missionary may choose according to his special line of work, one or two of the courses to be obligatory.
- 36423. That any missionary choosing the alternate course, offered by the Mission, be examined at the completion of each particular section rather than at the completion of the entire course of study.
- 36424. That this Mission request the Language School and Examination Committee of the Bombay Representative Christian Council to permit students for the regular 3rd Year Marathi Examinations to take the examination by sections.
- 36425. That, after passing their first examinations, missionaries be permitted to choose their own advisors.

THE HISTORIAN

The report of the Mission's Historian, Dr. A. L. Wiley, was adopted as follows:

36426. "The notes collected from the Mission and Board records, from the Missionary Review of the World, during the years 1876-1887, while the Rev. Royal G. Wilder was Editor, other Church Magazines and from other sources, during the 19 years, filling in all over 1900 foolscap pages, have been collated and typed in 375 pages but about 100 pages dealing with Kodoli, Islampur and Nipani Stations with a few biographical sketches,

are to be typed. If the Mission will allow me to complete the work I hope to have the work completed by Jan. 17, 1937.

"I might add that about 173 typed pages of secular history dealing with the different parts of the field, collected from many sources, have been prepared. The information collected can be had otherwise only by reading many books, some of which, like Grant Duff's History of the Marathas, are out of print.

"I have found great delight in this work and made it one of my hobbies during the last half of my service in India, and thank the Mission for giving me the opportunity to do this work. The typed Manuscript is not prepared for publication, but the material is in shape for someone to write the History without much searching of records and papers, some of which are not now available."

THE INDIA COUNCIL.

36427. The Secretary of the India Council and the Secretary-Designate of the Board, Rev. J. L. Dodds, D.D. was present and placed before the Mission for consideration a number of actions taken by the India Council at the last Annual Meeting. These matters were referred to the appropriate Committees for such action as seemed necessary.

36428. In accordance with action 36364, a cable was sent to Mr. John L. Goheen requesting him to cable the Mission his decision in the matter of his election as Secretary of the India Council as a successor to Dr. J. L. Dodds. Mr. Goheen cabled in reply as follows:—"Accept conditional on headquarters Sangli six months in year." With reference to this cable the Secretary of the Council sent a communication to the Mission as follows:—"There is sufficient doubt of the Council accepting this condition in view of the provisions of the Manual and the Constitution of the Council, (Manual, sec. 72; Constitution, para. 9) to justify me in asking you to secure from your respective Missions, (or from the Executive Committee in the case of the North India Mission) new nominations for the Secretary of the Council. Each Mission should present three names, which may be chosen from any one or from all of the three Missions, for this office."

36429. In accordance with the request of the present Secretary of the Council and following the procedure prescribed in Field Manual No. 43, the Mission made nominations for the Secretary of the India Council. In order of the number of votes received the nominations are:—The Rev. John B. Weir, Ph.D.; the Rev. H. J. Strickler; and the Rev. E. Graham Parker.

THE MEDICAL COMMITTEE

The report of the Medical Committee was amended and adopted as follows:—

- 36430. That Drs. T. M. Frank and W. M. G. Jones be medical examiners for those who have not yet been examined this year, and that these Physicians be assisted by Miss A. R. Meuttmann and Miss F. E. Schafer for the ladies at hours to be announced, Dr. O. I. Devadatta to remain in Panhala for laboratory work.
- 36431. That, although it be understood that missionaries may choose their own examiners as usual, Dr. T. M. Frank be regarded as the official examiner for missionaries in the Deccan and Dr. R. H. H. Goheen for missionaries in the Konkan.
- 36432. That record be made that the report of the Advisory Committee of St. Luke's Hospital, Vengurla, had been accepted as follows:—
- 1. That St. Luke's Hospital should be placed on the same basis as the other Hospitals of the Western India Mission, regarding the keeping up of its credit balance over the end of the year and the policy of building up a Sinking Fund for the Hospital is approved.

 2. That the improvement of the worn out and dangerous steriliz-

2. That the improvement of the worn out and dangerous sterilizing equipment and its replacement by the instalment of a steam plant which will also be available for laundry, cooking and drying be approved.

- 3. That in view of the Government requirements that there should be one graduate nurse for every 25 beds in a hospital, at least 4 graduate nurses be secured for St. Luke's Hospital.
- 4. That another missionary nurse be assigned to St. Luke's Hospital as soon as Miss M. M. Krug proceeds on furlough.
- 5. That the principle of having student nurses sign the contract on admission into the nurses' class be approved, the Staff of the Hospital being advised to draw up and put into effect such contracts.
- 6. That the establishment of separate living accommodation for the unmarried missionary members of the Hospital Staff be approved.

7. That the meeting of the Advisory Committee be held in Sep-

tember rather than August.

- 36433. That record be made that Dr. L. B. Carruthers had made an oral report on behalf of the Advisory Committee of the Mary E. Wanless Hospital.
- 36434. With reference to 35257 and the question of the continuance of Advisory Committees for the Hospitals, it was decided
- 1. That these Committees be continued for the Mary E. Wanless and St. Luke's Hospitals, to be known hence forth as Administrative Committees.
 - 2. That the duties of these Committees be
 - (1) To fill temporarily vacancies in the positions of Physician-in-Charge and Superintendent of Nurses.

- (2) To determine the appointment and dismissal of Doctors and Nurses on the Staff and to consider appeals from all who are employed.
- (3) To examine accounts and records.

(4) To inspect medicine stores and arrangements for food, laundry, housing of Staff and power plants.

(5) To inspect the arrangements for the teaching of nursing and compounding.

(6) To promote evangelistic work in the Hospitals. (7) To promote the work of Preventive Medicine.

(8) To inspect the minutes of the weekly meetings of the headnurses and the fort-nightly meetings of the Staff.

36435. That Mission action 35-276 which was "The Mission approved the substitution of the Executive Committee for the present Board of Governors" be rescinded.

36436. That the Constitution of the Miraj Hospital and Medical School be as follows:—

Article I. Name and Purpose.

The name of the institution shall be the American Presbyterian Mission Hospital, Miraj, and the Miraj Christian Medical School. Its purpose shall be the promotion of the Church of Christ in India, the practice of Preventive and Curative Medicine and the giving of Medical Education of a comprehensive nature and the highest possible standard.

Article II. Organization and Administration.

- 1. As an integral part of the Western India Mission, the institution and all its component parts shall be subject to the rules and regulations of that body.
- 2. There shall be a *Board of Governors* which, for the time being, shall be constituted of seven members; two to be appointed by the Mission which will designate the Chairman; two to be appointed by the Medical Committee of the Mission, one to be a Nurse; two be appointed by the Senatus hereinafter named, and the Physician-in-Charge. Three of these members shall be Indians.
- 3. This *Board* shall be competent to transact any business regarding the maintenance and development of the institution. It shall appoint and discipline the heads of the Departments. It shall report its transactions to the Medical Committee of the Mission. It shall meet once a year as provided for in the Field Manual.
- 4. Appeals from actions of the Board shall be made to the Medical Committee of the Mission.
- 5. There shall be a Senatus of the institution which shall consist of (a) the heads of all the Departments in the Hospital, and (b) the heads of all the Departments in the Medical School.
- 6. The duties of the Senatus shall be to administer all matters relating to the medical and surgical care of the patients of the Hospital, and to instruction in the Medical School, and to the supervision of the Branch Dispensaries which are conducted by Miraj Hospital. It shall appoint and discipline all members of the professional staff (excluding nurses) not appointed by the Board of Governors. The Senatus shall report to and be under the advisory control of the Board of Governors.

- 7. Appeals from actions of the Senatus shall be submitted to the Board of Governors.
- 8. There shall be a Nursing Department which shall maintain and include a School of Nursing. This Department shall consist of all the Missionary Nurses, the Staff Nurses and the Physician-in-Charge (exofficio). It shall meet once a month under the Chairmanship of the Superintendent of Nurses.
- 9. The Nursing Department shall deal with all matters related to nursing in the Hospital and to teaching of nursing in the Nursing School. It shall appoint and discipline staff nurses and pupil nurses. This Department shall report to and be under the advisory control of the Board of Governors.
- 10. Appeals from actions of the Nursing Department shall be made to the Board of Governors.
- There shall be an Executive Committee of the institution. This Committee shall consist of the Physician-in-Charge who will be the Chairman and who will be appointed by the Board of Governors; of the Financial Superintendent of the institution or some one else appointed by the Mission; and of one member appointed by the Senatus.
- the Mission; and of one member appointed by the Senatus.

 12. The Executive shall have charge of all the buildings and grounds, including the provision of water, light, laundry, and sanitation and food. It shall be responsible for the keeping of all accounts, including budgeting and auditing. It shall appoint and discipline all the employees for their duties. It shall report monthly to the Senatus.
- 73. Appeals from the actions of the Executive shall be made to the Senatus.

Bye-Laws.

Such Bye-Laws shall be enacted by the Board of Governors, the Senatus, the Nursing Department and the executive as may be necessary, providing only that they shall be in accord with the above Constitution and that they shall be subject to revision by the Medical Committee of the Mission in the first instance, and by the Board of Governors in the remaining instances.

Amendments.

Amendments to this Constitution shall be made only by the Mission in Annual Meeting and in accordance with its rules of procedure.

Note:—For important developments following the adoption of this action, see Mission action No. 36383.

- 36437. That the Miraj Medical School be maintained and its standard raised as rapidly as possible, every effort being made to secure an adequate endowment.
- 36438. That an effort be made to secure Dr. I. M. Orr of Neyyoor, Travancore State for service in Miraj for one year, the appointment to be reviewed at the end of the year. (For a more detailed action see No. 36382).
- 36439. That record be again made of the need of a Superintendent for Miraj Hospital, the Executive Committee being instructed to arrange for the inclusion of this item in the Order of Preference for New Missionaries to be prepared in 1937.

- 36440. That the Senatus of the Miraj Hospital take under consideration the question of the Islampur Dispensary, either with a view to making it a subsidized dispensary or arranging for the provision of adequate medical care for the poor of the District.
- 36441. That Miraj Hospital make a survey of all the Out-Station Dispensaries under its care, with a view to determining the question of their continuance or otherwise.
- 36442. That record be made of the fact that attempts made to secure additional and adequate co-operation on the part of other Missions in the work of the Wanless Tuberculosis Sanatorium have been fruitless, due to the financial difficulties experienced by other Missions.
- 36443. That the Mary E. Wanless Hospital, Kolhapur, be kept open under charge of Dr. M. Timothy. (See action taken later No. 36379).
- 36444. That the management of the Mary E. Wanless Hospital be instructed to keep expenses within income.
- 36445. That the heads of the schools be urged to arrange for yearly physical examinations or pupils.
- 36446. With reference to the question of the registration of Physicians, it was reported that there is still some hope that Physicians with National (U.S.A.) Board qualifications will secure recognition by the Bombay Medical Council through reciprocity.
- 36447. That recommendation be made to the Board that new Physicians, before entering on medical work in India, secure registrable qualifications.
- 36448. That record be made that the Mission disapproves of the principle of having dispensaries with only compounders or nurses in charge.
- 36449. That the Mission record its conviction that a great increase in the provision for the segregation of lepers in asyla and leper-colonies is indicated and that prevention measures must be undertaken to a greater extent, since dispensary and roadside treatments are on the whole not yielding satisfactory results.
- 36450. That wherever financial conditions permit medical itineration be undertaken.
- 36451. That India Council action No. 35113 be referred again to the Executive Committee to make adequate provision for dental charges through increasing the allowance under Medical Allowance, Class VI, (d).
- 36452. That the Hospitals of the Mission take steps to provide evangelistic and district missionaries with cards giving information about patients who may be interested.

- 36453. With reference to the question of the Indianization of the Mission's Medical Institutions, that record be made that increasingly heavy responsibilities are being placed upon qualified Indians and that even greater progress along this line is anticipated. The provision of the financing of advanced study for suitable candidates is approved.
- 36454. That Drs. O. I. Devadatta and W. M. G. Jones and Miss Ellen E. Connelley be appointed a Committee to investigate the sanitary arrangements at Panhala, with a view to reducing cross-infections.
- 36455. That the report of this Committee be adopted as follows:—

After the inspection of the arrangements at Panhala the Committee decided

1. The present sanitary conditions are very unsatisfactory.

- 2. The toilet refuse should be emptied into pits and each addition covered with earth, oil or lime.
- 3. The toilets for the use of Indians should be pits, open to the sky and properly sheltered on the sides and treated daily with oil or lime.
- 4. Better facilities for the scrubbing of garbage buckets, kitchen tables, etc. should be provided. Table garbage should be dumped into pits and covered with earth daily

5. Care should be taken to see that all servants scrub their hands

properly-with soap and brush-before serving at tables.

- A yearly bacteriological examination of the drinking water, which will show the necessity or not of boiling the water, should be made.
- 7. A simple arrangement which will make possible the rinsing of dishes in boiling water thus ensuring adequate sterilization should be provided.
- 8. A simple box drier for the towels which will prevent their contamination, after washing, by flies, should be provided.
- 9. A Physician, nominated by the Arrangement Committee should see that all arrangements are satisfactory before the meetings begin.
- 36456. That record be made that the Committee on Social Hygiene and Preventive Medicine had met and prepared a Course of Study for use in Bible Institute. It was also reported that during cholera epidemics several thousand anti-cholera injections had been given in some of the infected village areas. Lectures were also given in several villages. The Sangli Moveable School has done much valuable work in the Sangli field by giving instruction in child-welfare, care of children and by giving illustrated lectures on preventible diseasses. Physicians of Miraj Hospital have visited villages from time to time and given instruction on the prevention of disease, on personal hygiene and on other subjects.

36457. Certain requests for appropriations from the Centenary Fund for the Medical work of this Mission were as follows:

Medical School Endowment...\$200,000Charles Edward Vail Cancer Institute...\$10,000Psychopathic Hospital, Vengurla...\$10,000Laboratories, Hostel, Medical School, Miraj...\$30,000Fund for Physicians for small Village Dispensaries...\$25,000

These requests, with requests from the Educational and Evangelistic Departmental Committees were referred to the Executive Committee for arrangement in an Order of Preference. See No. 36415.

- 36458. That the Board be requested through the India Council to arrange for Dr. L. B. Carruthers to study internal medicine, while on furlough, and give approval to his plan to secure a British professional degree.
- 36459. That the Board be requested through the India Council to approve of Mrs. Carruthers studying medical social service.
- 36460. That the Estimates Class IX, Mary E. Wanless Hospital; Miraj Hospital, Medical School and Out-Station Dispensaries; Lafayette Hospital, Nipani; St. Luke's Hospital and related institutions, Vengurla, be approved.
- 36461. That the nominations of the Committee for Chairman, Ad Interim Committee, Indian members of the Committee, Administrative Committees, members on the Board of Governors, Miraj Hospital, members of the Committee on Social Hygiene and Preventive Medicine be accepted and the persons nominated declared duly elected.
 - 36462. That these, for the year 1936-1937, be as follows:—Chairman—Dr. W. M. G. Jones.

- 36465. That record be made of the appreciation of the Mission of the gift from Dr. R. H. H. Goheen of forty Hymnals, a gift to him from the Church supporting him, the Old Stone Church, Cleveland.

36466. That the Prayer Calendar be continued.

- 36467. That Mrs. R. C. Richardson, Mrs. D. B. Updegraff and Rev. W. H. Lyon he a Committee to consider the presentation, in association with the North India and Punjab Missions, of a token of affection and an appreciation of years of rich service to Dr. and Mrs. Robert E. Speer on the occasion of Dr. Speer's retirement from active service.
- 36468. That, for the purposes of the circularization of reports of the Executive and other Committees, etc. Ahmednagar be considered a Station.
- 36469. That in issuing invitations to the Pre-Mission Conference, the Secretary of the Mission restrict invitations to Indian members of the Departmental Committees.

- 36471. Nominations for Secretary of the India Council, elections of a member of the India Council with Alternate, elections of Officers of the Mission, members of the Executive and Property Committees, and Curators of Hill-Station property were effected in accordance with the provisions of the Field Manual No. 43.
- 36472. The newly elected Executive Committee, acting as a Nominating Committee, in accordance with Field Manual No. 48 presented their report which was amended and adopted. (For results of the elections and for action on Nominating Committee's

report see the Register of Officers, etc. at the beginning of the Minutes.)

- 36473. On the recommendation of the Nominating Committee it was decided
- 1. That the Treasurer of the Mission shall act as Registrar of the Provident Fund.
- 2. That there shall be an Assistant Registrar appointed by the Mission.
- 3. That Mr. V. R. Bhalerav be the Assistant Registrar for 1936-1937.
- 4. That the Ad Interim Committee of each Departmental Committee nominate its representative on the Provident Fund Committee and report same to the Executive Committee.
- 36474. It was decided to suspend Field Manual No. 72 to permit Rev. F. O. Conser, Senior Member of the India Council to represent the Mission at the next meeting of the Council and as such to represent his Station on the Executive Committee.

- 36477. With reference to the petition of Vishram Sahadba Borde, teacher in Rukadi, the Mission reply that he is advised to continue in service in the school and realize his desire to be of service in evangelism by using his opportunities at hand.
- 36478. With reference to the petition of Tatyaba Pandhre, asking for an increase in salary, the Mission reply that such applications are to be sent through the Station.
- 36479. With reference to the petition of Rev. Isaacrav A. Ranabhise, asking Rs. 20 per mensem and service in the Islampur District in addition to his service as Pastor of the Islampur

Strahler, the account for the building of Winsford Lodge, Kodaikanal, as submitted to the Property Committee in 1933 (See 33279), Rs. 5,142-10-4 be considered as the final account for the construction of this building and that it be thus reported to the Board.
- 36529. That record be made that the account for the construction of the Gram Sevak Shala, Nipani, has been closed and audited, the total expenditure being Rs. 7,395-2-0. (See 36519, No. 1).
- 36530. That Mr. J. C. Kincaid and Rev. H. G. Howard be appointed a Sub-Committee to investigate the possibility of equalizing certain details of the contracts between the Mission and Rev. M. W. Strahler and Dr. D. B. Updegraff, regarding "Winsford Lodge" and "Atherston" and make recommendations to the Executive Committee.
- 36531. That the expenditure of Rs. 125, by Dr. J. E. Napp, on account of the wiring of Sunset Lodge, Kolhapur, be sanctioned, this to be met from Repair Funds.
- 36532. That the plans and estimates for the proposed Bungalow for the Superintendent of Nurses, Miraj, be referred to the Property Committee.
- 36533. That Kodoli Station be permitted to relay the floor tiles of the Kindergarten Building at an estimated cost of Rs. 100.
- 36534. That the Chairman of this Committee be instructed to write a letter to Bandu Waghmare, Wardboy, Islampur, advising him that he must pay to the Mission through Mrs. E. W. Simpson, rent for the Mission rooms occupied, at the rate of Re. 1

per mensem for August, September and October 1936, (total Rs. 3), or vacate within 15 days of the receipt of this notice.

- 36535. That Rs. 25 per mensem, rent, be charged to Dr. G. S. Krishnayya, for the use of the Bungalow of the Principal of the Irwin Christian High School, Kolhapur, it being understood that Mr. Strahler's office and sufficient room for the storage of Mr. Strahler's furniture be reserved.
- 36536. That the matter of the repair and the alteration of the Mofatlal Block, Miraj Hospital, be referred to the Property Committee.
- 36537. That Kodoli Station and the Property Committee investigate the possibility of boring two wells on the Mission property at about Rs. 350 each, instead of building up the wall of the old well, No. 1, at a cost of about Rs. 1,500.
- 36538. That an addition amount of Rs. 100 be appropriated from Repair Funds for needed repairs in Ratnagiri Station.
- 36539. That, with regard to India Council 35164, the matter be referred to the Mission's Committee on Property Holdings.
- 36540. That, with regard to India Council 35220, the Property Committee undertake a yearly inspection of all Mission Property, preferably before the preparation of the yearly repair estimates, with a view to noting the condition of such property and making provision for its proper preservation and repair.

After consideration of the report of the Property Committee, other matters, pertaining to the property of the Mission, were brought forward and disposed of as follows:—

- 36541. That, in accordance with instructions received from the Board in the matter, the Property Committee be instructed to make a survey of the Mission's property, with a view to ascertaining what property may be disposed of by sale, what disposed of temporarily by rental, and with a view to determining what new property may be needed in the future.
- 36542. That the Board be requested through the India Council for permission to sell 14 guntas of land at Pali, Ratnagiri District, to Bala Gangaram Wagchoure for Rs. 200.
- 36543. That the Board be requested through the India Council to sell the property at Pali, Ratnagiri District for about Rs. 8,000.
- . 36544. That the Mission renew its request to the Board as per 35330 as follows:—"That the Board be requested for permission to sell the Board's property in the Kolhapur Bazaar, commonly known as the Church for a price not less than Rs. 22,000," and that the Board be urged to permit the Mission to use the proceeds of this sale for the Wilder Memorial.

36545. With reference to the Power of Attorney for this Mission, following the retirement of Dr. A. L. Wiley, the present Attorney for the Board, see No. 36411 as follows:—"That in view of the early retirement of Dr. A. L. Wiley, the present Attorney for the Board, the Board be requested to issue the Power of Attorney for this Mission to Mr. J. C. Kincaid and Dr. J. E. Napp, both members of the Mission's permanent Committee on Property Holdings, the power of Attorney to be so issued as to make possible its use by either person when the other is on furlough."

PROVIDENT FUND COMMITTEE

The report of the Provident Fund Committee was amended and adopted as follows:—

- 36546. That Daulatrav Ganpat Salve be retired, in accordance with B. 3451 of the Provident Fund Rules, Rs. 16 per mensem to be paid out of his accumulated Provident Fund—Bonus Deposit until it is exhausted, after which he shall be placed on pension at the rate of Rs. 16 per mensem, Rs. 8 to be paid by Vengurla Station and Rs. 8 from the Pension Fund.
- 36547. That Sakhabai Dhondabai Chopade be retired on Rs. 4 per mensem, to be paid out of her Provident Fund—Bonus Deposit and after this has been exhausted she be put on a pension of Rs. 4 per mensem to be paid out of the Pension Fund.
- 36548. That Estherbai Londhe be advised to continue in service as long she is enabled to do so.
- 36549. That Sunderbai Bhimsingh, Kolhapur, be paid Rs. 6 per mensem. (For details concerning her retirement and original action see No. 3649).
- 36550. That the Auditing Committee be requested to report (1) The number of contributors to the Provident Fund and (2) the amount to the credit of the Fund and (3) The amount of liabilities of the Fund.

PUBLICATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Publication Committee was amended and adopted as follows:—

- 36551. That record be made that inasmuch as there is a list of books and pamphlets published outside the Mission, included in another report presented to the Mission this year, no reference be made in this report to such books and pamphlets.
- 36552. There has been published this year by the Women's Work Committee an edition of 4,000 copies of the Gospel of St. Mark in large type. This book fills a long felt want in our Mission area. The different sections have clearly defined headings, a feature which makes the book especially usable by Non-Christians
- 36553. There have been four issues of the Western India Notes during the year. This little magazine which is supposed to be a bi-monthly publication has been of inestimable value in keeping the home Church acquainted with the work being done in this Mission.
- 36554. There have been four issues of Amtse patra during the year. This is a small publication of four pages in Marathi published by the Nipani Station for use among Christians in that area.
- 36555. Another edition of 1,000 copies of Dr. R. A. Torrey's "What the Bible Teaches," translated through the efforts of Dr. A. L. Wiley, has been issued. Most of these have been disposed of by sale.
- 36556. An edition of the Shastrabhaskram (Religious Education for Primary Schools) has been published by Rev. James E. Napp, D.D. the Educational Supervisor of the Mission. Of the 2,000 copies, 500 copies are for teachers only and these contain, in addition to the regular course, two sections: viz. "Six Forms for Devotions" and "How to tell Bible Stories."
- 36557. The Second Church, Kolhapur, has begun issuing a weekly bulletin for its services. Besides notices of the Church and Community this bulletin contains a summary of the sermon of the preacher of the day. People unable to attend the service receive the bulletin, thus being enabled to worship, in their homes, with the congregation at the regular time for the service of worship.

36558. Both Miraj and Vengurla Hospitals have again issued their reports in beautiful book form.

36559. The reports of the Special Committees, appointed to examine the records of the Executive and Property Committees, approving same, were adopted.

36560. The reports of the Special Committees appointed to examine the Minutes of all Stations, approving same, were adopted.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was adopted as follows:—

Charles Edward Vail, M.D., F.A.C.S.

36564. The Mission records with sorrow the passing away, last March, of Charles Edward Vail, B.A., M.D., F.A.C.S., after a year's valiant struggle to regain health. Dr. Vail came to India in 1909 and he has left behind a record of devoted service. All his life in India he spent in Miraj, working for many years in co-operation with Dr. Sir William J. Wanless and, later on, with others in the Hospital and Medical School. He loved Miraj. On returning from one of his trips to Germany he said that on

Mission for the kindness of His Highness in placing again at the disposal of the Mission, for use during the Annual Meeting, the Vikrasingh Lodge, at Panhala.

The Rev. George A. Parker, M.A., B.D.

36568. It was resolved to place on record the appreciation of the Mission of the service in the field of Bible exposition and spiritual inspiration rendered by the Rev. George A. Parker, M.A., B.D., the Principal of the Theological College, Bangalore, during the sessions of the Pre-Mission Conference of the Annual Meeting.

The Rev. Harry P. Dunlop, D.D.

36569. It was resolved to place on record the appreciation of the members of the Mission, Pastors and members of Churches of the Kolhapur Church Council of the rich ministry of inspiration and renewal and the healing and fruitful ministry of reconciliation rendered by the Rev. Harry P. Dunlop, D.D. while a guest, with Mrs. Dunlop, within the area of this Mission.

The Nipani Station

36570. It was RESOLVED that the Mission extend a most hearty vote of thanks to Nipani Station and especially to Miss Vivian S. Strobridge for the thoughtful and ample provision made for the members of the Mission during this Annual Meeting.

STATISTICS

36571. The report of the Mission Statistician was read and approved. See the appendix for the detailed summary.

36572. It was decided that in the preparation of statistics on literature production and distribution

1. That the number of pages published by the Mission

or members thereof be entered.

2. That books sold be classified as under Bibles sold, New Testaments sold, Gospels sold and other Books sold.

UNION ENTERPRISES AND INSTITUTIONS

The Dnvanodava

- 36573. After discussion of considerable length as to whether this Mission should continue its association with the Dnyanodaya, it was decided that a communication be sent to the Board of the Dnyanodaya as follows:—
- 1. That this Mission deprecates the recommendation and praise of books as "eminently suitable for translation into all the India vernaculars" (Cf. the case of Weatherhead on "Discipleship" page 250, *Dnyanodaya* Aug. 8, 1935) unless the Editor is prepared to vouch for every statement and interpretation made in the books reviewed and to defend glaring omissions of essential Christian doctrines, and

2. That this Mission give notice to the Board of the Dnyanodaya of withdrawal from co-operation one year from date unless all anti-Scriptural views, recommendations of books containing unscriptural teaching are eliminated from the publication and the paper brought into line with sound evangelical truth and teaching.

Kodaikanal School

The report of the Kodaikanal School Committee was adopted as follows:—

36574. That record be made that of the three recommendations—made by the Mission last year as amendments to the Memorandum of Association two were accepted, viz. That which would permit the School to admit Indian and Anglo-Indian children and that which looks toward the introduction of Domestic Science and Manual Training. The recommendation which advised the closing of the two upper High School Grades was not adopted and the High School continues to be carried on with such adjustments in the matter of Staff as to render the cost comparatively low. The full text of these and other changes and amendments to the Memorandum of Association is to be found on pp. 49, ff., these having been adopted by the School Council as the law of the School, the Governing Board in America having authorized this.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee was requested to investigate the possibilities in regard to a swimming pool. The matter of a Chapel having been taken up, the School Council voted to support the project of erecting the "Margaret Eddy Memorial Chapel" in memory of Mrs. Eddy, who was largely instrumental in the opening of the School. Arrangements were entered into looking toward the creation of Committees both in India and the United States of America for the furtherance of this project, and the sum of Rs. 30,000 was fixed upon as the goal. It was decided that this Mission cordially support this project.

2. In accordance with Board permission it has been the custom of this Mission to retain in the Mission Treasurer's hands any balance of the Board's annual contribution for the Kodaikanal School left unexpended at the end of the fiscal year, the reason being that the Mission's contribution to that School varies with the number of pupils sent there from this Mission and is sometimes more, sometimes less, than the amount received from the Board during the fiscal year. This year, however, by error, and through the failure of the Mission Treasurer to avail himself of Board permission, the balance on hand, Rs. 2,264-12-0 was returned to the Board, to be credited to the Kodaikanal School Fund.

It was decided to request the Board to rectify this error by returning the money to the Mission.

3. It was also decided that the Mission continue to give its loyal support to the School, which is being run with little or no margin of financial safety and which is wholly dependent upon the continued loyalty of the five supporting Mission Boards.

The Union Training College, Ahmednagar.

36575. The Mission's representative on the Governing Board reported that he had attended a meeting of the Board held Aug. 28, 1936. The Principal reported a large increase in enrolment. The Department of Public Instruction of the Government of Bombay had given permission to increase the number of students who may be admitted to the 3rd Year Class. The enrolment, at the time of the meeting of the Board, was as follows: Indian Christians 52, Hindus 43, Jains 1, Moslems 2. The distribution by classes was as follows:—3rd Year 25; 2nd Year 16; 1st Year 57. The results obtained during the Government Examinations were good. During the last nine years 335 students have been successful in the Training College Certificate Examinations. Of these 276 students were Christians, 56 Hindus and 3 Moslems. It seems clear that the saturation point in the number of trained teachers available for service in Government or aided Schools has not been reached. Practically all the Missions in Maharashtra, maintaining Primary Schools, continue to send students for training. A number of the Native States, within the area of which or adjacent to which the Mission works, are sending students for training, most of whom are experienced teachers. In recent years a number of trained Christian teachers have found openings in institutions conducted by private recognized societies and in schools, maintained by the Local Authorities, District Local Board and Municipality. There has been a marked strengthening of the Staff. Under consideration, at the present time, are proposals looking forward to extensive Property transfer and improvement.

The Wanless Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

36576. The Mission's representative on the Governing Board of this institution reported that the Sanatorium is making steady progress along all lines. The Staff and the workers are happy and the patients satisfied. A Church was organized March 8, 1936 and a Pastor ordained and installed on October 12, 1936. About 50% of the workers are tithers and the Church is self-supporting.

Patients, numbering 350, were treated during the past year and 900 from the beginning of the institution. The present capacity is 68 public and 62 private beds.

During the past 13 months gifts and donations have amounted to Rs. 40,000. At present the approximate monthly income is Rs 5,000 and the expenses Rs. 4,500. There are two items of debt amounting to Rs. 4,400, exclusive of a bill on account of travel for Sir Dr. William J. Wanless in 1931.

The Sanatorium is all full. The percentage of bed occupancy is 99.4%. The number of operations performed to date is 490. The general mortality rate has been 2.6% and for

major operations 7%.

Dr. K. K. Chaturvedi, M.B.B.S. joined the Staff in March. Dr. G. Samuel, on study leave, is expected to return in June 1937, having passed his M.B.B.S. Examinations.

The growth of the Sanatorium is shown by the following table of distribution of expenses:—Buildings 22.'5; salaries, 26%; Equipment 17.4%; Food and drugs 19.4%; Debt 3.6%; all else 10.2%.

Women's Work

The report of the Committee on Women's Work was adopted as follows:

36577. The number of women studying the Mission's Bible Course was 667. Examiners, appointed by the Women's Committee examined 279 women and 33 men and of these 291

36578. It was decided that the grant for publishing, Rs. 250, be renewed, the plan being to publish the Gospel of Luke

in large type.

36579. That members of the Committee, as nominated, be declared duly elected as follows:-Miss C. L. Seiler, Chairman (1936-1937), Miss V. S. Strobridge, (1936-1938), Mrs. R. C. Richardson, (1936-1939).

The Closing Session

36580. The closing session was held Monday night, November 2, 1936, the President, the Rev. A. L. Wiley, Ph.D.,

being in the Chair.

36581. The Minutes were read, corrected and approved. The roll was called, showing 27 regular missionaries in attendance. It may be noted that of the period October 22, 1936— November 2, 1936, four days and one Sunday were set apart for devotional and inspirational services, one and one-half days for the meetings of Departmental Committees, and four and onehalf days for deliberation and decision in the affairs of the Mission.

36582. The President offered the closing prayer and formally declared the Sixty-Fourth Annual Meeting of the Western

India Mission adjourned.
