Thirty-Eighth Annual Report.

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THE ANGLO-INDIAN EVANGELISATION SOCIETY is a continuation of the ANGLO-INDIAN CHRISTIAN UNION. The former name marked its catholicity, which still remains, the latter indicates its work. It also includes the ASSAM MISSION, associated with the name of its founder, the late Colonel Foquett; and the "WINTER MISSION," first suggested by the late Lady Kinnaird.

OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

- I. The maintenance of an unsectarian itinerant evangelisation among the widely scattered groups of Europeans and Eurasians in India, otherwise destitute of Gospel ordinances, at Railway Stations, on Tea Estates, &c. This is the chief object of the Society.

- II. The appointment of gifted Evangelists to visit the chief centres of population and influence, bringing the Gospel to bear, apart from denominational distinctions, on all the Churches and Missions, and on the educated English-speaking Natives. This was the special object of the "Winter Mission."

The following is a form of Bequest or Legacy, which may be adopted.

"Item, I give and bequeath the sum of
to the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society, and the Receipt of the
Treasurer of the Society, for the time being, shall be a sufficient discharge
therefor."

GENERAL REPORT FOR 1908-9.

THIS introductory statement must be an appeal rather than a report. The accounts given by the evangelists themselves describe, much more vividly than any secretary's statement can do, the work which the Society has been carrying on during the year under report. There is, however, one omission in these local reports, which I should like to supply. Those of us who do our Christian work in comfortable circumstances and within easy distance of our homes cannot well appreciate the toilsome nature of the evangelists' duties. No doubt we have our difficulties to overcome, difficulties to which perhaps they are strangers. But it is due to them that we should acknowledge their toil and patience. Even in the best of India's weather, constant travelling is exceedingly tiring, leaving the traveller in a grimy and dusty state, which must be experienced to be understood. In the hot weather, when station platforms are almost too hot to stand upon, and the wind seems like a blast from the mouth of a furnace, it must be difficult in the extreme to conduct religious services with freshness and vigour.

The faith of the evangelists is put to the test also by the smallness of the congregations to which they minister. They lack the inspiration of numbers. Twenty-five may be a good audience. A gathering of three or four is all that can be expected at some small stations. It needs real earnestness and faithfulness to keep one's zeal at a high temperature in such circumstances. Let us pray for them that their faith fail not. Let us recognise with gratitude the work which they have done. Of course the fewness of their people in any one station in their extensive districts is not an unmixed evil. It permits of real personal work being done. It gives the worker an opportunity of pressing home the Gospel of Christ in the quiet of an evening talk, or round the family altar, when parents and children gather to worship God.

In the firm belief that the work of the Society is a good and necessary work, I would appeal for assistance in it from all into whose hands this report may fall, especially from those who have the privileges and ordinances of the Christian Church at their very door. It is not easy for home people to think themselves into circumstances

where the Church is not for ever knocking at their gate. Let the reader imagine if he can how much he would lose, were all the churches around him to close their doors, and leave him to his own guidance in religious matters. Even if he estimated this loss correctly, he would still be unable to appreciate what the ministrations of the Church mean to men in India. Our countrymen in that land are deprived of the ties of home as well as the restraints of the Church. The Christian public opinion which used to act as a safeguard has been left behind. The position of authority in which most of them are placed puts a severe strain upon the moral fibre of the best. In sending them a messenger of the Gospel of Christ, the Society is sending them help in the whole round of their life. The simple way-side service has a large part of its power from the breath of home that blows from it; for the home-like and the divine are, for not a few, so closely allied as to be almost convertible terms. The service, and all the ministrations of the evangelist, also remind the Anglo-Indian of the great principle of the brotherhood of man, on which the religion of Christ is founded, and to which he finds it so hard to be faithful. Moreover, the evangelist represents to his scattered community in some degree that Christian public opinion, which is such a safeguard of righteousness.

The need of the scattered European community in India is great. The methods employed by the Society are calculated to meet that need. But only a very small proportion of the ground is covered. There are whole districts where communities and isolated individuals are entirely unprovided for. It is pleasing to record that during the year plans were maturing for sending out new workers. The solution of the problem lies in greatly increased contributions. Those who are interested in the Society and its labours earnestly hope that the Christian public both at home and in India will rise to their privilege and responsibility in this matter, so that by the time another report falls to be written a great advance may have to be recorded.

A FORWARD CALL.

The three leading Committees in India met early in the present year, in Calcutta, Bombay, and Madras, and they urge the Directors to carry out much needed changes in the staff.

The Calcutta Committee, in consultation with the Rev. W. E. White, South Sylhet, recommend that a man be sent to Assam, and that his work be both among the Planters and European employees on the Assam Bengal Railway. They also recommend that a man should be sent to assist Rev. S. J. Jones, on the East Indian Railway and certain of the coal districts. This, while making the work easier for Mr Jones, after twenty-four years' hard work on the railways of India, would leave scope for all the efforts of a minister sent out by the United Free Church of Scotland.

The Bombay Committee recommend that a man be sent out for work on the Great Indian Peninsular Railway. Rev. A. S. Crichton, Indian Secretary, writes:—"It is the Bombay Committee's strong opinion that the Directors ought, as soon as possible, to send out the very best man available to work on the G.I.P. Railway."

The Madras Committee recommend that another man be sent out for work on the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway, and that Mr M'Dowall, who has been out for nine years, be allowed to return home on furlough.

These are just a few of the changes in the staff which are much needed. It surely constitutes a call to prayer and increased effort on the part of all interested in the highest welfare of our countrymen in India, and it is earnestly hoped all who have friends in India, or are commercially interested in that country, will do what they can to help.

WORK AT HOME.

A large number of meetings were held during the year in various parts of the country. The Lantern and Cinematograph continues to prove a great attraction, and though the proceeds this year were not quite so large as before, a considerable sum was realised, and fresh interest awakened. Perhaps the most interesting meetings during the winter were held in Sheffield, and arranged by Miss Dyson, our energetic Lady Collector there. Mr Charles T. Studd, one of the Directors of the Society, kindly accompanied the General Secretary. The collections at the Drawing-room meeting in the afternoon, at Brincliffe House, and the Victoria Hall in the evening, amounted to about £25. Rev. E. Palgrave Davy, the newly appointed Honorary Evangelist for the Simla District, rendered valuable help while at home, in addressing meetings at Liverpool, Sheffield, and other places. Mr Davy has just returned to India, and hopes during the year to visit some of the Stations within reasonable distance of Simla, where the work is not fully overtaken by other agencies. The Directors are much indebted to Mr C. T. Studd, Mr Davy, and the many friends throughout the country who have helped to make these meetings successful.

In October, Mr Arnold Thomas was appointed Travelling Secretary for England. He has visited quite a number of places in the North of England, Lancashire, and elsewhere, and recently has been working in London and the Suburbs. Mr Thomas was for nearly eight years in Southern India, engaged in work similar to that done by our Evangelists, and is much impressed with the great need for the work which the Society is doing.

SALES OF WORK.

Mrs Frame, and the Glasgow Ladies' Committee, held a Drawing-room Sale of Work, at 11 Great Western Terrace, Glasgow, on March 18th. The Sale, which was opened by Sir Archibald Campbell of Succoth, who was accompanied by Lady Campbell, realised £27. The attendance was small owing to the wet day; had the weather been fine there would probably have been a much larger gathering. Cordial thanks are due to Mrs Frame and her daughters, for the very great trouble they took, and excellent arrangements made, and also to the many friends who helped with contributions of work and in other ways.

Mrs Orr, Hon. Secretary of the Anglo Indian Ladies' Union, 12 Pembridge Place, Bayswater, London, W., is kindly arranging for a Drawing-room Sale of Work in November, and Mrs Cumming is also arranging for a Sale of Work at Hubli, S. India, in September. It is hoped the friends at home and in India will do what they can to make these Sales of Work successful.

HELPERS.

The Directors desire to record their grateful thanks to the staff of Lady Collectors, who have so nobly helped in gathering in the funds. Notwithstanding the great depression in trade, much success was met with, many of the collecting books were returned with a larger amount than the previous year, which is most encouraging to the Treasurer. Death has been busy again in carrying away a number of the old supporters of the Society. The places of some have been filled by generous friends, and it is hoped that this year many more will be enlisted, so that the work may go forward and some decided advance be made.

The Directors are also indebted to Mrs Orr, and the members of the Anglo-Indian Ladies' Union, for their valued help; also to the Railway Companies in India for passes granted, and assistance afforded to the Evangelists in carrying on their work; also to the Honorary Auditors, both at home and in India, the Hon. Treasurer in India, and the many other friends, too numerous to mention, who have done what they could in the furtherance of the cause.

GLIMPSSES OF WORK FROM THE FIELD.

Mr JOHN M'DOWALL, Podanur.

"In the District in which I work we have a condition of things which I think is uncommon on most of the other railways in India. I refer to the existence of a number of small railway communities at a distance of three or four miles from the neighbouring town. This idea of keeping away from the centres of population, in the construction of the railway, was considered the better method then, from military considerations, it being undertaken during the troublous times of the Mutiny. This has caused a number of railway people to be located in the vicinity of the Railway Station, and separated from the neighbouring town by a distance which is considerable in a climate like India, and deprives them of any provision for Divine Services in the town itself, that may exist.

"The need of such work as the Society seeks to undertake is apparent to all who are acquainted with the District, not only in providing facilities for hearing the Word, but by visitation, seeking to create an interest in Divine things, where none exists. There are many here at all the Stations who need to be *sought* and won. As habit may be given as the explanation of the attendance of many in the Homeland at places of public worship, started in early years and continued in after life, so a lack of opportunity in the past, may also be given as the explanation of the indifference of many here. It is painful at times to meet people, otherwise intelligent, whose minds are a blank concerning the things of Christ. Their expressed ideas reveal influences of heathenism upon their whole outlook on life, and the total absence of the counteracting power of the Truth. Such incidents produce a fresh conviction of the need of the Society's work. Much of this might be obviated by early Bible teaching, and to this end, at Podanur, we have a largely attended Sunday School as well as a Children's Meeting during the week, in the former of which the District Locomotive Superintendent gives his valued help.

"At all the Stations I visit, the Services were never better attended than now. At the smaller Stations I have often every available person present, and in Podanur and Jalarapet an attendance of from forty to sixty persons. I fully recognise that the success of the work is not to be ascertained by the number who attend, but by the measure in which the Truth of God has been taught, and the extent of its reception, by those who have heard. Looking back over the past year, and recalling to mind the many who have heard the message, with others who were personally dealt with, in what proved to be their last illness, I rejoice to think of the measure of evident fruit. I have had personal testimonies given of blessing received, and have seen those testimonies supported by subsequent conduct. After one of the meetings a man spoke to me of the blessing he had received. His conversation and manner revealed how real it was. He was in that condition of glad and wondering surprise which the awakened soul first experiences when light on the way of salvation is received, glad that it was given, and surprised that he had never understood it before. Speaking particularly of Podanur, where I reside, and consequently have better opportunity of work, quite a number of voices can be heard in our Prayer Meetings on behalf of the work here and at other Stations, which before were silent, and but for the effort here would probably have remained so. And beside all this, I rejoice at the increased attendance also, which reveals a growing interest in Divine things."

Rev. S. J. JONES, Dinapore.

“In reviewing the year’s work I have much cause for rejoicing and thankfulness—thankfulness to God for abundant opportunities for usefulness, and rejoicing that in spite of many difficulties so much was accomplished.

“I have spent more time, conducted more services, and collected more money than ever before during my connection with this Society.

“On an average I have spent twenty-seven days per month away from home in the various stations which I have visited, or in travelling thereto.

“In every Station where I have gone for spiritual work, I have been received with cordiality and thankfulness, and I am sure the people have been cheered and helped by the message of the Gospel, and generally have expressed an earnest desire that I should come again. In one out of the way place which I visited, I met an old Scotchman, who said, ‘Well, I have not seen a minister step over that threshold for seventeen years.’ In another isolated district I was told that no minister had been there for fifteen years. In this place I have established a regular monthly service with an average attendance of twelve. I have done my best throughout the year to find out the most lonely and spiritually needy.

“During the year I conducted 138 Services in seventeen different Stations. Some of these were regular monthly services, some only occasional visits, and sometimes two and even three Services were held in one day. If time permits, I always make a practice of visiting all the people in the different Stations where I go.

“During the early summer, my experiences were sad, particularly in and about the coal districts. We were visited by a terrible outbreak of cholera and smallpox. Some with whom I was acquainted, and to whom I had ministered, were suddenly stricken down and called away. One good man—Mr Roach, the Stationmaster at Sitarampore—an earnest Christian, and convert from Romanism, who regularly held Divine service in his bungalow when no minister was available, was suddenly called home, to the great loss of the Station. A writer in the newspapers described a portion of the coal-fields at that time as ‘like a battlefield after a great engagement,’ corpses and skeletons on every side. It was awful, and a scene never to be forgotten. Several thousands of poor natives died.

“Before closing this brief review I wish to express my deep gratitude to many friends for kind hospitality and helpfulness in many ways. Also, I desire to thank the members of our ‘Ladies’ Union’ in London, for a generous gift of Bibles and Testaments, which were distributed among the young people who attended my services in several Stations.”

Rev. H. RYLANDS BROWN, Darjeeling.

“During the first half of December I was able to visit a number of tea-planter friends round about Darjeeling. The weather being fine, the travelling was enjoyable, though at one time, when crossing the bed of the Balasun, the altitude was only a few hundred feet above sea level, and at another point of the journeying 7,400 was reached.

“Services were held at Lebong, Tukvar, Pussimbing, and Ghoom.

“It is one of the pleasures of these cold weather tours to look up, and pastorally visit the folk at the different railway centres on the Eastern Bengal Railway. In the latter half of December, Damookdea, Sara Ghât, Rajbari, and Goalundo were thus visited. As a rule two days or three were spent in this way, and a service held, usually attended by most of the railway and steamer employes. Perhaps more real good might be accomplished if two or three visits could be paid in the course of a year instead of one.

“It is difficult to relate incidents, since much that we might like to speak of is obviously of too private and intimate a nature to be printed, but one or two jottings may be given in the hope of increasing prayerful interest in the work.

“Here is a family containing several young people, some in their teens and others nearing them. A service is improvised and Scripture Union Cards given to

those who undertake that the portions will be daily read. 'The entrance of Thy Word giveth light.'

"At another house, where the news of my arrival in the Station had preceded me, it was pleasant to find myself looked for and a Bible produced in the expectation of reading and exhortation and prayer, which were clearly appreciated.

"In former years the Brahmaputra worked such havoc with successive Goalundos that those whose work made it necessary for them to live there, have for some time now taken to living on steamers and in house-boats. When visiting in this place we came across so many children home from school that we sent out invitations to a Young People's service on Sunday morning, with the result that quite a number gathered on one of the boats. They seemed much interested and took to the singing of old and new hymns quite heartily. In the evening of the same day the room in which the public service was held was crowded out, several of the children being again present.

"A number of the 'Tracts for Mohamedans,' by our good friend Dr Rouse, were circulated when on tour; also copies of '*The Inquirer*' and booklets by Mr Meyer and others.

"While in England last year I was glad to receive from Mr Stephen Menzies a number of bound copies of 'Traveller's Guide,' compiled by Mrs Menzies, for free distribution, and some of these too were given away.

"I am also very grateful for a gift of Bibles and Testaments from the 'Ladies' Union' of the A.I.E.S., through their Secretary, Mrs Adolphus Orr, and ask prayer for guidance as to their distribution.

"Just now the Dooars is being briefly visited. In other days we devoted more time to visiting and holding Services among our planter friends. Changes are the characteristic of life in India, but they are more frequent here than in many parts. We only know of one man who is here now, who was here when we visited the district some twenty-eight years ago. Through the railway and other causes conditions have greatly altered. The present Church of Scotland Chaplain is most energetic, aiming at holding a service in some part of his wide district every Sunday of the year, even in the rains. May God prosper his work.

"It was a great pleasure to hold a service at Matelli. Mr W. Alston's, on January 24th. There were fifteen present. We sought to exalt Christ Jesus, as He through whom is preached the Forgiveness of sins. May God raise up in the planting and other communities of India more men who in their calling will be faithful witnesses for Christ.

"On January 31st another service was held at Dr Brown's, Rangamatti, at which twenty-three were present, the text being, 'Be ye reconciled to God.' It was a pleasure to see so large a number gathered. A young planter fresh from England led the Psalmody. It was quite a lively scene when this large Dooars congregation broke up and got away in tum-tums and on horses.

"We take this opportunity of expressing gratitude for much kindness and hospitality received during this recent tour."

Many will have heard that the American Methodist Church has taken over the work of the Union Church at Darjeeling, and that Mr Rylands Brown is on his way home, thus bringing to a close his twenty-eight years service as a part-time evangelist of the Society. Much regret will be felt throughout a wide circle at losing such a faithful and devoted servant of Jesus Christ.

Rev. F. W. ADAMS, Ahmedabad.

No special paragraph has come to hand from Mr Adams for the Report, but during the year he has continued work on the Bombay, Baroda, and Central Indiau Railway, visiting and holding services at the various stations along the line.

Rev. JOHN REDMOND, B.A., Chickmagalur.

The Directors desire again to thank the friends who have so generously and kindly helped in support of this special work, and made it possible for them to continue the arrangement with the Wesleyan Missionary Society, whereby Mr Redmond has been retained for the District of Mysore. The following is a brief and touching extract from one of Mr Redmond's reports :—

“Out in the jungles here the hand of death has been unusually exacting. Within nine months four of our European community have been taken away. In all four cases the circumstances were particularly sad. In one case the poor fellow was just about to go home after a continued residence of twenty-seven years in India; in another, death was due to cholera, and in less than two days after the nature of the disease was discovered all that was mortal of our friend was committed to the earth. In the third case death was due to an accident—a fall from a horse; and in the fourth, a young man of thirty years of age, who was married about eighteen months ago, and who was just beginning to reap the fruit of some years' work on his estates, was suddenly taken by black water fever. We laid his body to rest in a little cemetery here in the presence of about a dozen of his friends, some of whom rode many miles in the heat of the day to be present.

“In at least one of the four cases it is possible that if skilled medical aid could have been procured in time life might have been saved. One of the disadvantages of the Coffee Planter's life in the Mysore is the difficulty of getting skilled medical aid when it is urgently needed. In some places, a road journey of over sixty miles, and a rail journey of a hundred and thirty miles, must be travelled before the services of a man with an M.B. qualification can be procured.

“In October I paid a visit to Coorg, both North and South, and held Divine service in both places. I was only a couple of days in N. Coorg, and had not time to see much of the people, but the four families I saw gave me a very hearty invitation back again. In S. Coorg I stayed a week, and saw most of the people. They asked me to hold service in a nice little Church they have, and though it was very unfavourable weather, twenty-six were present, which is a big congregation in the Jungles in S. India. The welcome the people gave me was very cordial, and they offered to post horses any distance to help me on my way back, if I would come again. This was not bad considering I would have to ride a hundred and twenty miles to go from here. What I liked about it was that it was evident they welcomed me for the work's sake.”

Encouraging letters have recently been received by the Secretary from some of the planters, speaking of the good work done by Mr Redmond during the past five years. Mr Redmond's time is up, and he had intended leaving after about as long a period as most men could stand of this kind of work. The constant riding and exposure and trying nature of the roads and climate are only some of the difficulties to contend with. It is hoped, however, that he will remain on until it is seen whether arrangements can be made for continuing the work. Considerable difficulty has been experienced in financing the matter, and it will be esteemed a favour if those interested in this special work, and willing to help, will communicate either with the Secretary at home or in India. It is encouraging to state that several of the planters have offered to help if Mr Redmond remains on or a successor is appointed.

Rev. JAMES SHAW, Quetta.

"You will see from the Railway Guide where Quetta, Sibi, Mach, Sharigh, and Chaman are located, and the distances. The time table will show you that our train service is not convenient, and in order to carry the Gospel Message to any of the places named, there is of necessity much time lost. This is especially so at Sharigh, and I have only paid about half the number of visits to that Station during the year that I have been accustomed to do. I have so acted because the recently appointed Wesleyan Chaplain, having occasion to go to Sharigh frequently, has supplied my lack of service. The remainder of the District has been visited regularly. At Chaman, the services have been much appreciated, and well attended. By none have they been more valued than by a Hindoo Doctor, who is doing duty as Civil Surgeon to the Colony. Chaman, our extreme frontier Station, has a very small community, but the services held in the Waiting-Room have often been very encouraging, and for Chaman the attendances have generally been very good. Sometimes I have been able to induce people from considerable distances to attend.

"At one of the Stations I have been much encouraged by the regular attendance of one in particular, and I have good reason to believe that this one has come to know Him, whom to know is life eternal."

Rev. J. PARKER, Bellary.

"Being offered a temporary appointment on the staff of the A.I.E. Society, I was glad of the opportunity of taking up the work again which I was compelled to lay down by failing health some four years before. I soon found my love for the work revive and increase, and was happy to meet with old acquaintances at most of the Railway Stations in my district, and was cordially welcomed by all.

"I have held services at some of these Stations every month, and visited the people in their homes, where precious opportunities were often found of speaking of God's wondrous love and power to save.

"Many times an opportunity has offered for religious conversation with English-speaking natives in the train and on station platforms, and in some instances I have been encouraged by being asked for Christian literature, and copies of the Bible."

Mrs. CUMMING, Hon. Worker, Hubli.

"Miss Omond and I are back from Darjeeling again, and are living together as before. The people are always so glad to see us, and we are as glad to be back among them. There have been many changes, especially at Dharwar, owing to the amalgamation of part of the Madras Railway with the Southern Mahratta, and the head office is now at Madras and many of the officials changed to there. Some have been moved from here also, but the railway workshops are still here, and new foremen have come from home to fill up any gaps made by removals.

"On my way here from Darjeeling I stopped at Guntakal, and stayed three days and a Sunday. I visited all the railway people, finding old friends among them, and on Sunday had a nice meeting for children in the morning, and in the evening a meeting for the grown up ones, in the Railway Institute. I had to stay in the Station waiting-room, sleeping on a long chair, with a mosquito curtain pinned up somehow to protect me from the mosquitos who are too fond of me. It was *not* very comfortable, and so noisy day and night, but I was glad I went, and I believe some were helped. Another day, Miss Omond and I went to Gadak, and stayed three days with a friend, and visited the people there, most of whom we knew, and who welcomed us very kindly. We had a meeting on Sunday morning, in the Railway Institute. Quite a number came and were most attentive. The new locomotive foreman there is ready to help in any good work.

"I have started my Men's Weekly Class again. We had a good beginning of quite young men, and we hope for more. We do ask for your prayers for this. There are many temptations in Hubli, as there are everywhere, but especially in these heathen places. I am sure the people at home do not realise the deadening influence

of daily living with heathen surroundings. We Christian ones feel it even, and need your prayers also.

"I was up at Darjeeling during the season taking charge of the Y.W.C.A. Holiday Home, and when there had now and again opportunities of giving an address at the soldiers' meetings."

Mr H. T. SLADE, Hon. Evangelist, Hubli.

"I have pleasure once again in submitting my report for another year in the Master's service here.

"It is very gratifying to record that the Lord's work has been well sustained during the year. Evangelistic Services have been regularly held each Sabbath morning, and Sunday School each evening, and each have been exceptionally well attended, which is a source of great joy to us, and must, I feel, be a pleasure to all interested in the work of the Society.

"I again wish to record our deep gratitude to the Madras and Southern Mahratta Committee, for so kindly granting us the continued use of their Reading Room each Sabbath. Our Young Peoples' Christian Union is regularly held each week, and I am glad to say our Weekly Prayer Meeting has been very largely attended, thus proving that a deeper and truer interest in God's work is being taken more generally by our people; and we earnestly desire that the prayers of God's people at home may unite with ours, that God's Holy Spirit may come with convincing power here.

"I am very pleased to acknowledge the kind and loving help of the Society's Agent in this district, Rev. J. Parker. On the occasion of his visits here we have the opportunity of partaking of the Holy Communion. I have known Mr Parker for many years, and rejoice that he is now able to come occasionally and help us in our work. I also wish to thank most sincerely, Mrs Adolphus Orr, and the members of the Anglo-Indian Ladies' Union, for their kind gifts of Bibles for our Sunday School children. I have also to acknowledge the untiring efforts of my wife, who is the Honorary Treasurer of this District."

Rev. M. B. FULLER, Hon. Worker.

"As requested, I have pleasure in writing a little concerning the Anglo-Indian work done by our Mission. For several years, before joining the Alliance Mission, I was at work in Berar, and lived at Akola. For a time I was the only male Missionary in Berar. I used to visit Badnera twice a month, and Amraoti frequently; Khangaon and Shegaon usually once a month, and Bhusawal and Yeotmal occasionally. In 1891 we joined the Alliance Mission, and in four or five years we had Stations at Amraoti, Chandur, Murtizapur, Shegaon, Khangaon, Baldana, Bhusawal, Jalgaon, Pachora, and Chalisgaon, and our custom at these places is to hold services for Europeans wherever we find them willing to attend. For some years we had regular Weekly services at Amraoti and Badnera, and also at Akola and Shegaon. At Bhusawal, we purchased a Church from the M. E. Mission, and have regular Church services and Sunday School. At Baldana, services have been regularly held most of the time. In all these places the European and Eurasian population is very fluctuating, and sometimes it is difficult to keep up regular services, when they are dropped for a time. When I was alone a monthly allowance of Rs. 20 per Mensem was given me, and it has been continued up to the present time, not to me, but to the Mission. Sometimes Bhusawal, and always Badnera were supplied by our Missionaries from other Stations, and there has been some expense in travelling. I now feel that as the A.I.E. Society has so many calls for money in other places, this allowance should be discontinued. Will you please, therefore, instruct your Treasurer as to this, as I feel it is not right for us to take it. We are glad, as a Mission, to do all we can for the Anglo-Indians in all our Stations."

The Directors are grateful to Mr Fuller and his co-workers for what they have done during these past years, and hope they will be able to continue the services for the Europeans and Eurasians in their district. Also for kindly foregoing the grant, which can now be devoted to work elsewhere.

Rev. A. E. COLLIER, Hon. Evangelist, Gaya.

“It is with deep gratitude to God that we look back upon another year’s work for the Master. We rejoice in having been permitted, not only to preach the Gospel to the heathen, but also to minister the Word to our fellow countrymen in this land.

“Services have been held on Sunday evenings, at the Railway Institute, Gaya, and the attendance has been fairly good. Owing to the transfer of the guards and drivers of mail trains from Gaya to Gomoh, we have lost many of our most regular attendants and best Christian workers. There have, however, been some additions from the Civil Station, compensating to some extent for this loss.

“The new Chapel, now in course of erection, will supply a great need, and be much more convenient and suitable for the services than the Railway Institute. We are, however, deeply grateful to the committee for granting the use of the Institute, free of charge, during the past four and a half years.

“The new Chapel, while intended for Mission work amongst the natives, will also be utilised for English services. The site, being very central, is easily accessible to all.

“I have visited Dehri-on-Sone frequently. The small European community greatly appreciates the services, and there have been signs of blessing upon the work.

“As a Missionary, whose work lies chiefly amongst the natives of this country, the urgent need and great importance of evangelistic work amongst the Europeans and Eurasians is strongly impressed upon me. They represent Christianity to the people, and their example has immense influence either for good or evil. The people form their opinion of Christianity very largely by what they see of the lives of Europeans, and are attracted or repelled accordingly. Especially in these days of political unrest and social ferment the Christ-like example set by Christian men and women is the greatest power for good, and the permanent peace and well being of the people. May the Holy Spirit lay this great responsibility and opportunity deeply upon the hearts of us all, and work in us for more earnest prayer and effective service.”

Mr D. M’LEAN, Hon. Evangelist.

Mr M’Lean regrets that he has had to sever his connection with the Society as Hon. Evangelist, and Member of the Bombay Committee, as he is leaving India and may not return. He was able to do a little work at Poona and Lanouli in the interests of the Society, and to receive the annual collections at these places. The Directors regret the loss of Mr M’Lean to the Staff in India, and are indebted to him for the work he has been able to do.

OBITUARY.

MR E. H. AITKEN.

The Directors have to record with deep regret the removal by death of Mr Edward H. Aitken, one of their number. Born in India, the son of a Missionary, Mr Aitken spent the greater part of his useful life in the service of the Government there, and was conversant with the country and its varied population as few men ever become. After a brilliant career in the Bombay University he was Latin Reader in the College for six years. He joined the Indian Civil Service in 1876 as Assistant Commissioner of Customs. He became Assistant Commissioner of Salt Revenue in 1881, and Assistant Collector of Salt Revenue in the same year. He was Superintendent of the Gazetteer revision in Sind in 1906, and retired in April of the following year. Mr Aitken was a man of a genial and kindly nature, which was manifest not only in intercourse with his friends, but in the productions of his pen. Under the name of Eha he was well known as a most interesting writer on Natural History in India. He was also conspicuously a thoughtful and earnest Christian man, deeply interested in the welfare both of the natives and Europeans in India, and ready to promote it in every way he could. His removal is a distinct loss to the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society. The Directors desire to express their sincere sympathy with his widow and family in their bereavement.

Mr Stewart Thompson, the General Secretary, who was present, also took part in the meeting. The second meeting was held in the Lecture Hall of Trinity Presbyterian Church when Mr Arnold Thomas gave an address, pointing out the very great importance of the work which the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society seeks to carry on in the highways and byways of that distant land. Rev. Joseph Rorke kindly presided at this meeting, his opening and closing remarks showed deep interest and much sympathy in the work. Sincere thanks are due to both General Grove and Mr Rorke for their hearty support.

Very touching letters have been received from India, acknowledging the receipt of Bibles and Testaments sent for Christmas Prizes to the Sunday Schools. More help is needed for this branch of the work.

Mrs Orr is arranging to hold the usual Bi-Annual Sale of Work at 12 Pembridge Place, W., in November 1909, and will be grateful for contributions. It is hoped the friends will do what they can to make this a success.

APPENDIX.

The Thirty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society was held on Wednesday afternoon, May 5th, in the All Souls' Church House, 54 Great Titchfield St., London, W. William Coldstream, Esq., I.C.S., in the absence of Lord Kinnaird, presided.

The following gentlemen accompanied the Chairman to the platform:—Sir Andrew Fraser, K.C.S.I.; Sir Frederick Lely, K.C.I.E.; Rev. F. S. Webster, M.A.; Major-General H. L. Grove; E. G. Glazier, Esq., I.C.S.; Colonel E. Swinton Skinner; Mr J. Morris; Mr Arnold Thomas, Travelling Secretary; and Mr W. Stewart Thompson, General Secretary.

The proceedings were opened by prayer by Rev. F. S. Webster.

It was not surprising that the meeting was not attended by a crowded audience considering that a great number of other societies were celebrating their anniversaries in the Metropolis on that day. Nevertheless a representative company assembled, and the proceedings were full of encouragement and stimulus.

After reading extracts from the Annual Report, Mr W. STEWART THOMPSON, the General Secretary, made the gratifying announcement that the year had closed with a balance on the right side, which was encouraging. At the same time he pointed out that the Society is anxious to extend its activities, and this is only possible if greater support is forthcoming, so that the number of agents at work in the field may be increased.

Mr W. COLDSTREAM, occupied the chair in the absence of Lord Kinnaird, who was laid aside with illness, and who sent a cordial message of goodwill to the meeting expressive of his Lordship's continued interest in the work. Referring to the report the Chairman said he was sure it had been listened to by all with feelings of satisfaction, and the fact that there was a balance on the right side was proof that their supporters appreciated the importance of the efforts of the Society. Much of the success of the year was due to the energy of the Secretary. Mr Stewart Thompson had been making tours through many of the towns throughout the country, holding Drawing-room and other meetings with lantern and cinematograph illustrating the work, and in this way had added materially to the income of the Society. They welcomed Mr Arnold Thomas, who had spent eight years in India, as a new worker in the capacity of Travelling Secretary for England, and hoped his labours would be crowned with success. The Society was fortunate in having a strong platform for that meeting, which included those who had held the reins of administration in India—Sir Andrew Fraser and Sir Frederick Lely. It was an indication that the Society's

efforts were appreciated by high officials who had seen the work that was being done amongst our fellow-countrymen and Eurasians by the agents of this Society. Throughout his distinguished career Sir Andrew Fraser had borne testimony to the Gospel, and had done a great deal of work among our own countrymen in India. It was a joy to all concerned that Sir Andrew had accepted office as Vice-President and Director of the Society. "The Chairman moved that the Report, of which extracts had been read, be adopted as the Thirty-Eighth Annual Report of the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society, and that it be printed and circulated, and that the Directors and Office-Bearers be re-appointed, with power to add to their number."

The Rev. F. S. WEBSTER, Rector of All Souls, Langham Place, warmly commended the work of the Society. Although he had not yet been to India, his knowledge of the needs of that great country caused him to be profoundly convinced of the importance of the work undertaken by the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society. It is a sad thing that many of our fellow-countrymen in India should drift away from a sense of their responsibility, and give themselves up to a life of pleasure. The native is a distinctly serious character, his religion has an ascetic tendency, he appreciates earnestness and devotion, but sometimes gains a poor impression of Christianity, by reason of the low level on which some of our countrymen are content to live. Concerning some of the perils of an Englishman's life in India, Mr Webster spoke of the trying climate, which affected the nervous system, then there was the spiritual and moral atmosphere, being constantly in the presence of heathen people there was a great temptation to relax the hold on the standards of living which prevail at home. In such circumstances it was easy to forget God and become careless and indifferent to the claims of religion. On this and other accounts the work of the Society was of supreme importance, but it was exceedingly difficult, and had to be undertaken with peculiar delicacy and tact. Above all there was need for humility and brokenness of spirit on the part of those who would reach men and women who have wandered away from God, and have closed their eyes to their Christian responsibilities. He had much pleasure in seconding the resolution.

The report was adopted.

Sir ANDREW FRASER, K.C.S.I., J.L.D., moved "That as those of our countrymen in India who were removed from the ordinary means of Grace had a strong claim on the sympathy and help of the people at home, and as their number was constantly growing, the objects of this Society, which was founded to provide for the spiritual welfare of such persons, were deserving of a generous and increasing measure of support," and in the course of an eloquent and forceful survey of the conditions and needs of India, said no one could live long in that country without realising how important was the work accomplished by the Society. An Indian newspaper, a few weeks ago, Sir Andrew said, quoted the reply of an officer who had been asked how it was, that with so many missionaries in the country, so few heathen embraced Christianity. The officer's reply was, that he was not surprised that so few heathen became Christians, but that more Christians did not become heathen through living in India. The Hindoos are beginning to question their own religion and are watching Europeans to see if Christianity has that vital force which they find their own religion lacks. It is especially the people in solitary places that are being sought out and helped by the Society's workers, those who seldom see one of their own colour, the people whom God thinks about. How do we know that God thinks of such? It is clear from that wonderful passage which grips our hearts and shows us the heart of God. "I will be to them as a little sanctuary in the countries where they shall come, I will even gather you from the people and assemble you out of the countries where ye have been scattered." It was not because he considered our fellow-countrymen in India a disgrace to Britain that he advocated the claims of the Society, continued Sir Andrew, but because he felt strongly that it was marvellous so many led upright lives in the midst of so many temptations to fall. In the majority of cases there was no minister or clergymen to go amongst them and remind them of the old associations they used to love and the old lessons they used to learn. Even when men fall lower and lower can they only be blamed? Was it not the natural law? Why were disciples sent forth by Christ? Because of the necessity of

the case, therefore Christians are sent because their fellowmen must have men to draw them to Christ, and enable them to follow Him. Proceeding to show that the work of the Society has not been in vain, Sir Andrew said, that while it was often the case that only the two or three assembled together, they were never without the presence of God. This promise to meet with His people was as sure in the East as in the West. Before the Society was founded the speaker's father journeyed to lonely stations, gathering people together for services. He was welcomed as a brother, and was honoured by the people because they were anxious to have such services, and to hear the old story which they had forgotten, and were glad to have its memory revived. Recalling his own experiences in the work he described the readiness with which settlers in solitary places welcomed the preacher of the Gospel. He had never found anything but the keenest enthusiasm concerning these services. His observation and experience had strengthened his conviction that men who go out to India from this country are disinclined to sink down to the level of heathenism, but they need a brother's hand to be stretched out to help them and keep them from falling. We are our brother's keeper, and our Brother the Lord from heaven will one day ask us how we have discharged our trust.

Sir FREDERICK LELY, K.C.I.E., in seconding the resolution bore warm testimony to the far-reaching influence of the Society's activities. In the course of a long residence in India he had many opportunities of observing and assisting in the work. Sometimes the meeting would be held in a railway station waiting-room, at other times a drawing-room was available for the purpose. But wherever the gathering took place no difficulty was experienced in getting people to the services. Men who know India realise that its great burden is not the heat or the mosquitoes, but the isolation, physical, mental, and spiritual. Foreign was found the greatest need for a ministry such as the Society exercises.

Mr J. MORRIS proposed "That cordial thanks was due to the Hon. Secretaries, Treasurers, and Lady Collectors, and to the Members of the Anglo-Indian Ladies' Union for their devoted labours during the year, and for all they have done to help forward the work," and said they were under a deep obligation to these ladies and friends for their valued help, and very especially so to Mrs Adolphus Orr, Hon. Secretary of the Ladies Union.

Major-General H. LESLIE GROVE, in seconding, spoke of his long residence in India of over forty years, and of the great need for the work of the Society in little sea-port towns, dotted along the thousands of miles of coast, where the lonely trader lives, who seldom sees a Minister or Christian friend. He told of how the workers in India valued and appreciated the work which the lady friends are doing at home.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

After votes of thanks to the speakers and the Rev. F. S. Webster for granting the use of the Hall, the meeting was closed by Mr Webster pronouncing the Benediction.

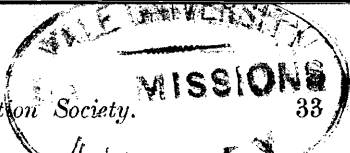
