REPORT OF THE TREASURER

AUDITOR'S CERTIFICATE

To Woman's Union Missionary Society of America:

We have examined the accounts of the Woman's Union Missionary Society of America for the year ended December 31, 1930.

Cash in banks has been verified by certificates received from the depositaries; securities owned were examined January 19, 1931, and check made of transactions affecting the security accounts from January 1, 1931, to that date. The note payable to Bank of Manhattan Trust Company was verified by a certificate received from that bank.

The income and expense accounts as reflected in Exhibit 2 are stated on a cash basis. Income from securities owned during the year has been accounted for; direct confirmations were not obtained in verification of donations and legacies received. Recorded disbursements, including disbursements for property accounts of \$28,345.40, were checked to statements of expenditures approved by three officers of the Society.

As instructed, we have accepted the accounts of the Society as of December 31, 1929, without verification; and we have not undertaken to determine that the provisions governing the application of various funds have been observed. No reserves for depreciation of buildings and equipment have been provided.

Securities received from the Ezra P. Hoyt Estate were entered in the books at market values as of November 8, 1930, date of actual receipt, and Doremus School Building Fund securities were entered in the accounts at market values as of December 31, 1930, except 100 shares of Consolidated Gas Company of New York common stock valued at sale price September 9, 1930, in the amount of \$11,171.00. Deferred losses on securities of \$12,473.78, as shown in Exhibit 1, represents the reduction of securities from book to market values at December 31, 1930, of \$62,175.46, less the reserves for depreciation of securities at that date, which included net profits on security transactions during the year, amounting to \$3,970.97.

Subject to the foregoing, we certify that, in our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and statement of income and expense fairly present the financial position of the Woman's Union Missionary Society of America at December 31, 1930, and the results of its transactions for the year ended that date.
