NOTICE IN REFERENCE TO BEQUESTS.

As the kind intentions of some of the deceased friends of the Society have been rendered abortive for want of correct knowledge of the law relating to Charitable Bequests, the Committee call special attention to the following directions:—

By Statute 6 GEO. II. cap. 36, commonly called the Mortmain Act, it is enacted, Section 1, that after the 24th June, 1736, "no manors, lands, tenements, rents, advowsons, or other hereditaments, corporeal or incorporeal, whatsoever; nor any sum, or sums of money, goods, chattels, stocks in the public funds, securities for money, or any other personal estate whatsoever, to be laid out or disposed of in the purchase of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, shall be given, granted, alienated, limited, released, transferred, assigned, or appointed, or any ways conveyed or settled to, or upon, any person or persons, bodies politic or corporate, or otherwise, for any estate or interest whatsoever, or any ways charged or incumbered by any person or persons whatsoever in trust, or for the benefit of any charitable uses whatsoever, UNLESS such gift, conveyance, appointment, or settlement of any such lands, tenements, or hereditaments, sum or sums of money, or personal estates (other than stocks in the public funds) be, and be made by DEED, indented, sealed and delivered, in the presence of two or more credible witnesses, twelve calendar months at least BEFORE THE DEATH of such donor or grantor (including the days of the execution and death), and be enrolled in His Majesty's High Court of Chancery, within six calendar months next after the execution thereof; AND UNLESS such STOCKS be transferred in the public books usually kept for the transfer of stock, six calendar months at least before the death of such donor or grantor (including the days of the transfer and death), AND UNLESS the same be made to take effect in possession for the charitable uses intended immediately from the making thereof; AND BE WITHOUT any power of revocation, reservation, trust, condition, limitation clause or agreement whatsoever, for the benefit of the donor or grantor, or any person or persons claiming under him."

The third section of the statute enacts "That all gifts, grants, conveyances, appointments, assurances, transfers, and settlements whatsoever, of any lands, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, or of any charge or incumbrance affecting or to affect any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, or of any stock, money, goods, chattels, or other personal estate, or securities for money to be laid out or disposed of in the purchase of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, or of any charge or incumbrance affecting, or to affect, the same to, or in trust for, any charitable uses whatsoever, which shall at any time from and after the 24th June, 1736, be made in any other form than by this Act is directed and appointed, shall be ABSOLUTELY, and to all intents and purposes, NULL AND VOID."

Upon these enactments it may be observed:—

1st. That the Baptist Missionary Society is a Charitable Institution, within the meaning of this Act.
2ndly. Land, money arising out of land, or money secured on land wholly or partly, and whether freehold or leasehold, can be given to a charity only by deed in manner directed by the statute.

3rdly. Not only cannot a will pass to a charity any property of the above description, but no money-legacy given to a charity can be satisfied out of such property. If, therefore, a testator has only land, mortgages, rent-charges, debentures, or securities on land, the legacy will fail altogether; if his estate be mixed it will fail to the extent of the proportion of this property to pure personalty.

If A. having £1,500; namely, £500 at his bankers, and £1,000 on mortgage, gives £100 to a charity, the bequest will only be worth £38 6s. 8d. Railway and canal shares are pure personalty, and may be used to satisfy a charitable legacy, but not railway debentures.

By 1 Vic. cap. 26, sec. 9, it is further enacted, "That no will shall be valid, unless it shall be in writing, and executed in manner hereinafter mentioned (that is to say): it shall be signed at the foot or end thereof by the Testator, or by some other person in his presence or by his direction: and such signature shall be made or acknowledged by the Testator in the presence of two or more Witnesses present at the same time; and such Witnesses shall attest and shall subscribe the will in the presence of the Testator; but no Form of Attestation shall be necessary."

N.B.—Wills executed prior to the first day of January, 1838, are not affected by this act; but any alteration therein, or codicil thereto, must be executed in the manner before mentioned.

The following Form of Bequest may be safely adopted by those who wish to bequeath such property as may be left by will for this purpose:—

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give to the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being, of the Baptist Missionary Society, the sum of £ _____ sterling, to be paid exclusively out of such parts of my personal estate, not specifically bequeathed, as may lawfully be given by will to charity, and not to abate unless there should be no other fund for the payment in full of my other legacies, and in such case only rateably with my other pecuniary or general legacies.

If any friends wish to bequeath property for Translations or Schools, it is only necessary to say instead of the General Fund, the Translation Fund, or the School Fund.

It is proper to observe, that the above restrictive Statute does not extend to Scotland, Ireland, or the Colonies.

PLAN AND REGULATIONS OF THE SOCIETY.

NAME.

The name by which the Society has been and still is designated, is "The Particular Baptist Missionary Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Heathen," or, "THE BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY."

OBJECT.

The great object of this Society is the diffusion of the knowledge of the religion of Jesus Christ throughout the whole world, beyond the British Isles, by the preaching of the Gospel, the translation and publication of the Holy Scriptures, and the establishment of Schools.

MEMBERS.

All persons subscribing ten shillings and sixpence a year, or upwards, either to the Parent Society or to Auxiliaries, donors of ten pounds and upwards, pastors of churches which make an annual contribution, and ministers who collect annually for the Society, also one of the executors, on the payment of a bequest of fifty pounds or upwards, are considered as members thereof.

GENERAL MEETING OF MEMBERS.

A General Meeting of Members only shall be held annually, at which the Committee and Officers shall be chosen for the year ensuing, the Auditors of accounts appointed, and any other business pertaining to the Society transacted.

In choosing the Committee and Officers, the Chairman of the Meeting shall receive all names which it may be intended to propose. Out of the list so obtained the Committee shall be chosen by ballot, those who have the greater number of votes being the parties elected.

COMMITTEE.

The affairs of the Society shall be conducted by a Committee of thirty-six persons ; which Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener, in London, on a fixed day, for the despatch of business : five members to be deemed a quorum. The Committee to be empowered to fill up vacancies.

PUBLIC MEETINGS.

A Public Meeting of the Society shall be held annually, when the list of the Committee shall be read, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the previous year reported. The Committee shall also be empowered to summon Public Meetings in London or elsewhere, whenever the interests of the Society may seem to require.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

All Treasurers and Secretaries of Missionary Auxiliaries shall be CORRESPONDING MEMBERS of the Committee, together with such persons as it may be found necessary to add to their number.

HONORARY MEMBERS.

The Committee shall also be empowered to appoint as HONORARY MEMBERS any who have rendered important services to the Society.

MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY ENTITLED TO VOTE AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

All Honorary and Corresponding Members of the Committee, and all Ministers, who are members of the Society, who may occasionally be in London ; and also Ministers residing in London, similarly qualified, together with the Treasurers and Secretaries of London Auxiliaries, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the Meetings of the Committee.

FUNDS.

All monies received on behalf of the Society shall be lodged in the hands of the Treasurer, or of Trustees to be chosen by the Society. When the amount received shall exceed the sum needed for the current expenses of the month, it shall be invested in the Public Funds, until required for the use of the Mission.

ALTERATION OF CONSTITUTION.

No alteration in the constitution of the Society shall be made without twelve months' notice having been given at a previous Annual General Meeting.

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING,

HELD AT THE MISSION HOUSE, MOORGATE STREET, LONDON,

APRIL 23RD, 1861.

1. The General Meeting of the Subscribers and Members of the Baptist Missionary Society was held on Tuesday, April 23rd, 1861, at ten o'clock.

2. After the singing of a hymn and the reading of the Scriptures, the Rev. J. MURSELL, of Kettering, offered prayer.

3. On the motion of the Rev. F. TRESTRAIL, seconded by the Rev. J. HOBSON, of London, the Rev. Dr. ACWORTH, of Yeadon, was called to the Chair.

4. The Secretaries laid on the table the lists of persons nominated to serve on the Committee, which were distributed among the members of the Society present.

5. The Balloting Papers being collected, the Revs. J. TEALL, E. T. GIBSON, J. P. HADDY, and Messrs. KEEN, BAYNES, PHILLIPS, and TRESIDDER, were appointed Scrutineers.

6. The Secretaries laid on the table the Report of the Committee and the Balance Sheet, as passed by the Auditors, printed copies being prepared for the use of the members present.

7. The digest of the Minutes of the Committee for the past year was brought up and read, and explanations given.

8. On the motion of the Rev. C. M. BIRRELL, of Liverpool, seconded by the Rev. W. BROCK, of London, it was resolved:—

That this Society respectfully tender to the Rev. J. T. Brown and E. B. Underhill, Esq., their cordial thanks for the accomplishment of the mission with which they were entrusted to the churches of the West Indies. While acknowledging the goodness of God in the preservation of their lives, and the kind co-operation in their services of their friends and families, especially of Mrs. Underhill, whose presence with them largely contributed to their usefulness, this meeting would record its sense of the marked ability and discretion with which their arduous duties were successfully performed.

9. On the motion of the Rev. Dr. ANGUS, of London, seconded by the Rev. J. MURSELL, of Kettering, it was resolved:—

That this meeting having heard and considered the various reports with which the deputation to Jamaica have favoured them, and the practical measures adopted by the Committee, at their suggestion, for the increase of the numbers and efficiency of pastors in that island, both European and native, approve of those measures, in the assurance that they are to be but temporary, and that the expenditure will not exceed, in any one year, the estimate of from £400 to £600, which the deputation have stated as sufficient for these purposes.

10. On the motion of E. B. UNDERHILL, Esq., seconded by the Rev. W. W. EVANS, of London, it was resolved:—

That the names of J. H. Allen, Esq., of Aston Clinton, and the Rev. Jonathan Watson, of Edinburgh, be added to the list of honorary members of the Committee, having rendered important services to the Society.

11. On the motion of the Rev. W. BARKER of London, seconded by the Rev. D. WASSELL, of Bath, it was resolved :—

That the cordial thanks of this meeting be presented to Sir S. MORRISON Peto, Bart., M.P., for his past services as Treasurer, and that he be respectfully requested to accept the office of Treasurer for the ensuing year.

12. On the motion of the Rev. J. RUSSELL, of Blackheath, seconded by Rev. R. WALLACE, of Tottenham, it was resolved :—

That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the Rev. FREDERICK TRESTRAIL, and E. B. UNDERHILL, Esq., for their services as Secretaries, and that they be requested to continue them for the ensuing year.

13. On the motion of E. B. UNDERHILL, Esq., of London, seconded by the Rev. W. ROBINSON, of Cambridge, it was resolved :—

That the thanks of this meeting be given to Messrs. R. P. Spice, S. Bligh, W. Leech, and J. Hobson for their services as auditors for the past year, and that Messrs. S. Bligh, W. Leech, J. Hobson, and James Benham be requested to give their services as Auditors for the ensuing year.

14. On the motion of the Rev. N. HAYCROFT, of Bristol, seconded by the Rev. W. BROCK, of London, it was resolved :—

That this meeting strongly recommends to the incoming Committee, that no application for missionary service be finally accepted, and that no addition be made to its agency, except at a meeting of the Committee, to which all its members have been summoned.

15. The Minutes of the proceedings of the Meeting were read and confirmed.

16. The thanks of the Meeting were unanimously given to the Rev. Dr. ACWORTH, for his kind conduct in the Chair.

17. The proceedings of the Meeting were closed with prayer.

THE
 ANNUAL PUBLIC MEETING
 OF THE
BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY,
 WAS HELD AT
 EXETER HALL,
 ON THURSDAY, APRIL 25TH, 1861,
 SIR S. M. PETO, Bart., M.P., OF LONDON, IN THE CHAIR.

The Rev. J. B. PIKE, of Bourne, gave out a hymn, and offered prayer.

The CHAIRMAN having addressed the meeting, an abstract of the Report of the Society's proceedings for the past year was read by E. B. UNDERHILL, Esq., and the Treasurer's accounts were presented by Sir S. M. PETO, Bart., M.P.

The first resolution was moved by the Rev. R. ROBERTS, of London, seconded by the Rev. T. C. PAGE, of Plymouth, and supported by the Rev. J. SALE, of Calcutta:—

That this meeting desires to acknowledge with devout gratitude the goodness of Almighty God in the success which He has graciously bestowed on the labours of missionaries of the Society, and kindred institutions during the past year. Whilst rejoicing in the fields of missionary toil, especially in Northern India, it desires to express the sincerest sympathy with the myriads of sufferers from the famine which prevails in several provinces of that continent; its satisfaction at the spirit of liberality called forth by that calamity; and its fervent hope that it will be overruled for the spiritual good of the people.

The second resolution was moved by the Rev. H. WILKINSON, of Norwich, and seconded by the Rev. E. PAXTON HOOD, of London:—

That this meeting has heard with feelings of gratitude the increase in the Society's income for the past year, the more unexpected after a winter of unexampled severity and suffering. Viewed in connection with the spirit of prayer so prevalent among Christians in every land, it would regard it as an indication of yet greater good, and would fain hope, in answer to the supplications of the Church, every missionary station in heathendom may be visited with an outpouring of the Spirit like that which has so largely blessed the churches in Jamaica.

After a vote of thanks to the CHAIRMAN, the meeting was closed by singing the Doxology.

REPORT.

THE Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society have, by the Providence of God, the pleasure of laying before the constituents of the institution the sixty-ninth report of their proceedings. But, before entering on the occurrences of the year, they cannot but advert to that spirit of prayer which has been so largely manifested in missionary proceedings during the last two years. In response to the invitation of the missionaries at Ludianah, in Northern India, the entire evangelical church throughout the world assembled for united prayer in the first week of 1860. Again, in the first week of 1861, responding to the invitation of the missionaries of Bengal, and to the suggestion of the Liverpool Missionary Conference, churches of Christ of many names gathered in worship, to inaugurate the labours of the present year, to seek for the Divine blessing on the great work in which they and their predecessors have been engaged. No age of the church presents a spectacle so deeply interesting, so demonstrative of the unity of the Lord's people in every land. God, the hearer and answerer of prayer, has listened to these devout intercessions, and, in many places, has been pleased to manifest in a remarkable manner the saving might of his arm. Paul has planted, Apollos watered, and God hath given the increase. The flood of Divine blessing spread from the United States to Ireland, from Ireland to Scotland and England; thence its refreshing streams have fertilized many a barren spot in the East, and quickened the languishing piety of the islands of the West. Thus the Head of the Church re-animates and rewards the faith and patience of his people, and invites them to heartier consecration in his cause. The fields occupied by the agents of the society have not been without many tokens of the Divine favour; and your Committee proceed briefly to indicate the most important features which the past year presents.

And, first, we have to express our thankfulness that death has not entered the ranks of the missionary brethren. The Revs. J. Williamson and T. Morgan have returned to their spheres of labour in health, and resumed their very efficient services as preachers to the heathen of the everlasting Gospel. But the Committee have been called to sympathize with the loss sustained by the Rev. H. Z. Kloekers in the lamented decease of Mrs. Kloekers, whose energy of character and deep piety rendered her so highly qualified for a missionary life. A similar loss has been sustained by the Rev. L. Kälberer.

The Revs. Messrs. Rose, Ellis, and Reed, have reached the stations appointed them in India; Mr. Comfort, who should have gone with them, being hindered by the state of his health. The Rev. G. Rouse, of Regent's Park

College, has also been engaged for the India mission, and will proceed thither during the present year. For a few months, the Committee enjoyed the pleasure of intercourse with Messrs. Saker and Diboll; both constrained to make a brief visit to this country for the restoration of health. They have, however, returned to their work, accompanied by the Rev. J. Smith. Captain Milbourne, whose former services to the African mission the Committee recall with pleasure and satisfaction, piloted their little bark over the waste of waters of the Atlantic Ocean, and gives his aid to the mission.

The Hayti mission will receive this year the important accession of two well-qualified brethren, the Rev. Messrs. Bouhon and Baumann; while the institution at Calabar has already been supplied with an assistant for the Normal School Department, by the departure of Mr. Alexander Gunning for Jamaica. Two missionaries have been welcomed home for a brief sojourn, the Revs. J. Wenger and F. Supper. One event the Committee cannot pass over without the expression of deep regret. It has been their painful duty to separate Mr. Craig from connection with the society. Just as the Committee are about to submit to you this report, they learn that the Rev. W. A. Claxton has resigned the pastorate of the church at Madras, and entered on secular employment, not without the hope and purpose of aiding to the best of his ability the propagation of the Gospel. Thus, while the society loses two from its list, their services have been amply supplied by the addition of nine brethren to the number engaged.

WEST INDIES.

Towards the close of the year, the Committee gave prolonged consideration to the reports of Mr. Underhill and the Rev. J. T. Brown, the deputation to the missions in the West Indies, whose departure on this very important service was announced at the last anniversary. Their reports have been given entire to the public, and present a very satisfactory account of the social and religious condition of the islands to which they refer. With regard to Trinidad, the Committee have sanctioned the removal of Mr. Gamble to San Fernando, a town from its large and increasing population and the easy access from it to the stations in the district of Savanna Grande, more favourable for missionary labour. He is now engaged in removing thither, having purchased ground for a residence in a healthy and suitable spot. The Committee are happy to learn that the native churches are in a more prosperous condition than at any former time, and have very heartily acceded to the arrangements for their improvement proposed by the deputation. It is also pleasant to record, that among the Chinese strangers, many of whom have gone to Trinidad to labour on the estates, Mr. Law is favourably received as a messenger of Christ.

The prospects of the mission in Hayti were never more cheering. Since Mr. Underhill's visit, the congregations have largely increased in numbers, and conversions are frequent. Fourteen persons, rescued from superstition and Romish error, have been baptised. The Bible-readers are most usefully employed, and several persons have become the subjects of Divine grace as the fruit of their lowly, prayerful, and zealous toil. The peculiar adaptation of this kind of agency to the present condition of the island is such as to lead to the wish for its enlargement. "Our new agency, that of our Scripture-readers," says Mr. Webley, "is doing wonders for us." On the other hand, the changes in progress in the country, the result of the wise action of the present enlightened ruler, are most favourable to evangelizing efforts. Schools are being established throughout the land, in towns, villages, and even hamlets in the mountains. Immigrants—black men—are pouring into the country in considerable numbers from Canada and the United States of America. Every project calculated to elevate and civilize the people has the attention of the President. Protestants are found among the members of the Government. Protestant teachers are even allowed to preside over Government schools. In the Jacmel school, the influence of its instructress, a member of the church, has been such as to lead to the conversion of one of her assistants, and the reception by acclamation, among parents and children, of the Bible and Bible instruction. Mr. Webley has long laboured alone, and it is with great pleasure the Committee contemplate the immediate departure of two brethren to his assistance, to strengthen the mission at Jacmel, and to extend it, it may be, to the capital itself. These two young ministers—one a Frenchman by birth, the other of German parentage—have been educated in the institution of the Paris Society for Foreign Missions, are well acquainted with the subtleties of Romanism, and have come before the Committee with the warmest commendations of the Rev. Fred. Monod, of M. Casalis, the director, and of the Committee of the institution. A plot of land, close by the chapel in Jacmel, having upon it a house suited for the purpose, has also been purchased, where the school, so long and so successfully carried on by Mrs. Job, may be revived.

In the Bahama Islands the missionaries continue to labour with great encouragement, and to enjoy the privilege of making large additions to the churches. One hundred and thirty persons have been baptised during the year. Although the population of the group is increasing, the number of residents on the various islands is very fluctuating, especially on those islands where the only production is salt. Capable of producing little else, if the manufacture declines through absence of demand, the people are compelled to migrate. For the same reason, their progress in the arts of civilised life is, in some places, slow; and although susceptible of great religious feeling, their intelligence and mental culture do not keep pace with it. The government

schools are very useful and successful; but while the means of livelihood are so precarious and difficult to obtain, the condition of the islands cannot be so satisfactory as could be desired. The people are, as a rule, orderly, generally industrious, ready to avail themselves of the advantages within their reach, and to a very great extent indeed under the influence of religious instruction.

JAMAICA.

The Committee cannot but refer with gratification to the report of the deputation on the state of the churches and people of Jamaica. Without entering into any detailed statement of the facts their reports and speeches have supplied, it may suffice briefly to recapitulate some of the conclusions to which they have been led. Their inquiries were limited to no class of society. They sought information from all parties, and were permitted to enjoy every opportunity for the acquisition of accurate information. It is due from the Committee cordially to acknowledge the hospitable and kind attention manifested to them by the people, their ministers, the proprietors of estates, and the authorities of the island.

With some drawbacks, chiefly referable to habits and notions acquired in the time of slavery, the deputation report that the character of the people is such as to evidence the wide influence of religious truth. In the churches discipline is vigorously maintained. The ministry of the Word is valued, and a commendable zeal is often displayed for the conversion of souls. The deputation visited nearly the whole of the seventy-seven churches which have originated with the agents of the Society. Over these churches twenty-two European and fourteen native ministers preside, having under their care 20,000 members, and upwards of 2,000 inquirers. The contributions for all purposes amount to £8,000 a-year, an average of 8s. 2½d. a head for all the members. The ministers are assisted by a body of deacons and leaders, about 700 in number, who manifest a strong sense of duty, and a tenacious adhesion to those great principles of scriptural truth maintained by our denomination.

The progress of events has, however, scattered the people more widely than was formerly the case, while their improvement in knowledge and their habits of independence, render the necessity of pastoral supervision the more imperative, but at the same time, more difficult to accomplish. There is, therefore, in the judgment of the deputation, an absolute necessity for a larger supply of ministers, both native and European, to reach the people in their mountain abodes, to look after the wanderers and the sick, to gather the young in Bible Classes, and to extend the gospel to districts becoming occupied by an increasing population. Impressed with these views, the Committee have given their assent to the recommendations of their deputation, which, while on the one hand, comparatively inexpensive in character, will not in the least degree

trench on the independence or scriptural rights of the churches. They will encourage in every way the improvement and formation of an indigenous ministry, will assist in the enlargement of the usefulness of the institution at Calabar, and encourage the settlement of a few European brethren as pastors of the larger churches, capable of supporting the ministers of the Word from their own resources. The time has not yet come for the withdrawal of the intelligence and energy of the white man from the instruction and oversight of these young communities. They depend, and must for some years depend, for their elevation, on the stimulus afforded by connection with this country; and time must elapse for the production of a class of native-born men, strong in numbers and intelligence, by whom the civilization and religious instruction of the enfranchised negro may be carried to their highest point of development. It was surprising to the deputation to find how very large is the element still existing in the population derived from slave times. Quite three-fourths of the adults now living were once slaves. The generation has not yet passed away which wore the fetter and endured the scourge, and which still retains to a certain extent the prejudices, superstitions, and habitudes of that dread and debasing time. More has, however, been accomplished than we had any right to expect. Generally speaking, the creoles of Jamaica constitute a peasantry daily increasing in intelligence; deeply interested in religious truth; possessing a very considerable amount of property, the gain of their own free labour; pressing into the culture of the staples of the island; well clothed and well housed; and moved by a spirit of emulation to acquire more of the arts and advantages of civilized life. The slave of yesterday is even now a peasant of whom no country need to be ashamed, and to whom freedom has been a boon of unmixed blessedness. To employ the language of the deputation, "Notwithstanding many causes for solicitude still existing, the Society, by its agents, and under the blessing of God, has done a work in the island, both social and religious, which demands manifold thanksgivings to the Great Deliverer and Redeemer of men, and inspires gladdening hopes for the future."

Shortly after the departure of the deputation, meetings for prayer for a revival were held throughout the churches, as agreed upon at the meeting of the Jamaica Baptist Union, held in the month of March. Towards the close of the year the results became apparent in a very remarkable movement commencing at a Moravian station, and immediately communicating itself to the churches in the parishes of St. James, Hanover, and Westmoreland. Great numbers were powerfully moved by the Spirit of God to deep conviction of sin, and to its open confession and abandonment. Unlawful gains were destroyed, quarrels were healed, neglect of Divine worship was changed for crowded assemblies; and meetings were prolonged through days and nights for prayer and instruction. The most intense anxiety for salvation

burst forth in loud cries and tears. Many persons were prostrated with emotion. Physical effects, some of a painful character, followed; while numbers arose from them filled with ecstatic joy or heavenly peace. As the work extended, elements of evil were developed. Ignorant people, still hardly removed from the debasement of their former slave condition, were imposed upon by fraudulent men appealing to their native superstitions. Satan sought to mar the good work by extravagances, and the awakening of evil passions. From the most recent accounts we are, however, happy to learn that these painful exhibitions bear but a small proportion to the manifest good, and are rapidly subsiding. Thousands have been added to the inquirers' classes. Additions are being made to the churches, but only after much scrutiny and deliberation. The general face of society is undergoing a visible improvement; and for the present the prevalence of many common vices is checked. We are also informed that the people in some quarters are manifesting a more decided inclination to industrious habits, and that the planters are furnished with an abundant supply of steady labour. Making ample allowance for the evils referred to, the Committee cannot but gratefully recognise the hand of God in this wonderful movement. They prayerfully hope that multitudes will be led to the reception of the truth as it is in Jesus, and to a holy walk and conversation in the world. The churches of the Jamaica Baptist Union report this year an addition of nearly 700 members to their fellowship, not, however, the fruit of the revival, but as the result of the ordinary means of grace. It is during this year the results of the revival will appear in the enlargement of the churches from the 4,000 persons, who have been admitted to the inquirers' class.

AFRICA.

The absence from their station of the brethren, Saker and Diboll, on account of health, leaves not much to record of the work accomplished on the continent, to which, since their banishment from Fernando Po, the labours of the missionaries are confined. The two native brethren left in charge have very faithfully maintained the congregations which have been gathered. Progress has been made in restoring some who had wandered from the fold. Many villages and towns in the vicinity of the mission-station sent repeated invitations to come and impart the knowledge of the Gospel to them. The reinforcement the mission has now received will enable the brethren to a certain extent to meet these demands; and the schooner which Mr. Saker has purchased, and in which the brethren ventured, dependent on Divine Providence, to cross the waters of the great Atlantic, will be the means of improving the commerce of Victoria, and of bringing to this rising town many of our former friends from Clarence to take up their abode. The claims of the

Society on the Spanish Government still remain unsettled. Several communications have passed between the Committee, her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and the Spanish Government; and the Committee are not without hope that shortly some compensation for the losses sustained will be given. In pursuing their claim, the Committee have enjoyed the efficient services of the Treasurer, and the concurrence and support of the British Government.

INDIA.

Although the supremacy of the English power is fully acknowledged in all parts of this great empire, and every trace of a rebellious spirit seems nearly eradicated, it is every month becoming more and more obvious that the people of India will not fall back into the fatal apathy which characterised the first years of the century. If the mutiny has wrought no other effect, the quickening of the native mind in all directions is the greatest and best. In some places indeed it has called forth unwonted opposition; in others to be more than compensated by an attentive regard to the claims of the Gospel, and the conviction of the worthlessness of idols to save. On the whole, the Government deals less unfairly with the Christian faith it professes. It has relaxed the rule with regard to the Christian action of its servants in the discharge of their official duties, whether in the school or the camp; continues actively to discourage the performance of the inhuman rites and austerities which Hinduism fosters and approves; and shows itself more sincerely desirous to open the country to every useful influence, commercial or otherwise, which may tend to the elevation of its subjects. One of our missionary brethren, the Rev. John Sale, with the sanction of the Committee, was appointed by the Governor-General in Council a member of the Commission to inquire into the relations of the ryot with the planters of indigo, representing on the board the missionary body of Bengal and the peasantry, whose complaints and resistance forced the investigation on the Government. The inquiry extended over three months. The essence of the report presented to the Government is, that the complaints of the ryots, and the statements of the missionaries with regard to them, are well founded; that the cultivation of indigo on the present system is both unprofitable and irksome, and not seldom unjust to the cultivator; and that the peasantry of Bengal have exhibited great patience in so long fulfilling, or trying to fulfil, what on their part is proved to have been generally an unfair contract. The case was one of a kind which, in the progress of our missionary work, will inevitably occur. The Gospel not only directly encounters every religious error, and strives to redeem men from sin, but indirectly touches, presents in new lights, and forces the consideration of, many social questions which arise out of the state of

society in the countries where the missionaries labour. Thus, in the West Indies, we encountered slavery. In the East we have to contend with the usurped powers and oppressive exactions of a great proprietary class, generally hostile to righteousness and truth, to freedom, and to that respect for human rights which Christianity brings in its train. It is not the duty of the Committee here to discuss the action of the Government in this particular case; but it cannot be doubted that the result will be to place the cultivation of indigo on a sounder basis, and to secure a more just treatment of the peasant agriculturist. In Backergunge the Committee are happy to report, that during the past year the churches have enjoyed "rest," have been free from the invasion of the spoiler, and in several instances have added converts to the fold. Scattered over nearly sixty villages, fifteen churches bear testimony to the power of Divine grace, four hundred and fifty persons walk in the enjoyment of Christian ordinances, rescued from the foulness and sins of idolatry, while a Christian community of about three thousand souls have been gathered from among the heathen to be trained in the fear of the only true and living God. Similarly in Jessore, a numerous body of Christians is being formed by the faithful and spiritually blessed labours of the servants of Christ, notwithstanding that Romanism endeavours to turn aside the feet of many, and multitudes pass unheeding by the preachers of the Cross. In Eastern Bengal the missionaries report that since the mutiny hostility to the truth, especially among the Mohammedans, has been more than ever marked, while many persist in affirming that it is contrary to the commands of the Queen to receive the Gospel. On the other hand, in Dacca many English soldiers have been added to the church, a work still more largely developed, under the ministry of the brethren Gregson and Evans, among the regiments occupying Agra and Muttra in the north-west. In Behar the missionaries have continued among listening thousands in the towns and villages, in the crowded avenues of Benares and Patna, to proclaim Christ and him crucified, with no other result than a general assent, more or less loudly expressed, to the truth of the doctrines they hear. One missionary plants and another waters; it needs but the grace of God, the mighty energies of the Holy Spirit, to give the increase. And this increase is not withheld in the city of Delhi. The remarkable work reported last year continues in all its strength to go forward, and more than a hundred persons have in addition been baptized into Christ. In every department of this mission there has been a steady advance. The converts, now numbering nearly 250 souls, have been organised into six churches under their own native officers. Two new native chapels have been built and opened, and a third is being erected at the expence of a liberal friend of the society of Delhi. The labours of the brethren have been extended to a number of fresh villages, and in some of them converts have been made. Schools for children, and evening classes for adults, have been formed. Weekly prayer-

meetings have been well kept up, being often conducted by the new converts alone, some of whom have actively and successfully sought to bring their fellow-countrymen to Christ. As yet, cases of discipline have been very few, the churches have "walked in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, and been multiplied." The majority of the converts, as in every age, are chiefly from among the poorest of the people. Yet others of higher rank have not been passed by in this ministration of the Spirit. One convert is a grand-daughter of the Emperor of Delhi, reduced to poverty indeed by the mutiny, but now far richer as an inheritor of the kingdom of heaven. Another is the zemindar of a considerable village, and is zealously employed in pointing out the Lamb of God to the people of his estates. Several were followers of Mohammed, one of them the son of a Moulvie, to whom an Englishwoman was indebted for the saving of her life and her escape from Delhi, when the city was in the hands of the revolted sepoy. "A bright future," say the missionaries, "is opening for the north-west of India; from Meerut to Rohilkund many have visited us with the cry, 'Come over and help us;' some have been baptized and returned to their own homes, to spread the news of salvation among their neighbours. Efficient labourers only appear to be wanting in order with God's blessing to secure a large harvest." While our anniversaries proceed, thousands are perishing in these districts for want of the sustenance denied them by the parched ground. Still more urgent is the cry, "Come over and help us." By famine as well as by the sword, is God teaching these poor people to look to him. Let us in Christian charity send to them of our abundance food for body and soul.

It is with deep regret that the Committee learn at this juncture the necessary departure of their honoured brother, the Rev. James Smith, for a more healthy clime, not, it is hoped, without some prospect of return, should it please God to re-establish his failing strength. He has probably reached the shores of Australia, where he will serve the mission as he is able. Meanwhile, the Committee have sanctioned the removal of Mr. Evans from Muttra to Delhi to supply his place, and hope to strengthen much further this very attractive field during the coming year. It is more than probable that new stations will have to be formed in Meerut and some other places. The Committee depend on the liberality of the churches how far this extension shall go.

In a minor degree only the same good work has been going on in Agra. Nineteen have been baptized on a profession of their faith in Christ, and become members of the native church. Of these the larger part are converts from heathenism, and include about half-a-dozen Sikhs. One is a very interesting young man of respectable family, a Brahmin; another is a Thakur, the head man of a village. They were first met with in the bazaars of Agra. For some months the Thakur acted as a colporteur, and on one occasion having

received a number of Gospels and tracts for sale, he set out entirely of his own accord for his native village, distant from Agra some 120 or 150 miles. He not only sold all his books, but preached Christ to his people, and appears to have created a great commotion, especially in his own village. Fourteen wished to return to Agra with him; but inability hindered all but four. Several members of the native church have gone to Calcutta with their regiment, where they have united themselves with the church under the care of our venerable brother Shujaat Ali. But notwithstanding their departure, the native congregation is nearly as large as before. A great work of grace has been proceeding among the European soldiers, in the face of the prejudiced interruptions of the chaplain of the station. Thirty-five Europeans, of whom thirty were soldiers, have been baptized, and thus in this distant land many whose parents are members of our churches, or who were brought up in our Sabbath Schools, have found the Saviour they despised. May they in that heathen land testify of the grace they have received! The Committee have further the satisfaction of reporting that, by the residence of Mr. Williams at Chitoura, that interesting district has again been reoccupied; and itineraries full of encouragement have been recommenced, in company with our faithful native brother Thakur Das.

CEYLON.

Missionary labour in this beautiful island has been unable, as yet, to surmount the deadly apathy induced by the religion of Buddha. A few conversions continue to evince the power of the Spirit of God, and to assure us that even the self-righteousness, the intense worldliness, and religious indifference of the Singhalese Buddhist must give way where the Spirit of God works. But the kingdom of Christ at present expands with great slowness. It finds little active co-operation among those who profess to feel the power of Divine mercy and love. The young men turn away from the ministry of the word as being inadequately paid, and further discouragement is sometimes met with from the defection of some who promised well. Yet are there many among the converts who by their simple piety approve themselves as the children of God, and from time to time others give confident hope that they are born of God. Thirteen individuals have been baptized into Christ. The obstacle to greater success is found less in the forms and doctrines of Buddhism, than in the profound secularism they encourage. Futurity to the disciple of Buddha is a blank—a negation. Hence he lives for this life. The present, and the present only, is everything. Eternity, or an Eternal God, has no attraction, no dread to him. Still it is certain that the ideas of the people are undergoing a change. Education facilitates it. The dispersion of books aids it; and we do not doubt that the publication of

the New Testament in the intelligible yet accurate form into which Mr. Carter has thrown the version he has prepared, will be an important contribution to the spread of the knowledge of the true God and of Jesus Christ whom he has sent. The Committee have with great pleasure approved the printing of 2,000 copies of Mr. Carter's revision. It is now in the press and will be ready for issue, it is hoped, during the present year.

CHINA.

For several months after Mr. Kloeker's arrival in Shanghai, Mr. Kloekers and Mr. Hall were constrained to confine their evangelistic labours to that city, or its immediate environs. The war between the Imperialists and the Allied Forces rendered any departure from Shanghai dangerous; while the disposition of the leaders of the Revolutionary bands was not distinctly known. The peace dictated by the conquerors within the city of Peking, has released the missionaries detained in Shanghai; for, with passports, they are authorized by the treaty to visit any part of the Imperial dominions, and openly to preach and propagate the Gospel of Christ. Meanwhile Mr. Kloekers, accompanied by the Rev. Griffith John, of the London Mission, and two Chinese gentlemen, penetrated to Nankin itself, the seat of the government of the Celestial King, as the head of the Revolutionists is called. They were welcomed both by the chiefs and the people. There they obtained a document of the utmost importance. As they left, they received an edict, written, in the usual Imperial style, on yellow silk with the vermilion pencil, giving all Christian missionaries permission to travel in every part of the six provinces over which the sway of the Celestial King extends, to settle in the cities, to erect chapels and school-houses, and in every way to spread the doctrines of the Christian faith. Although there were many things in the profession of Christianity made by the rebel chiefs, which the missionaries could not reconcile with good sense or the oracles of truth, yet they found much to fill them with wonder and gratitude. The Sabbath was observed, services for preaching and prayer were regularly held. The main truths of the Gospel were clearly and firmly believed. Some individuals gave indubitable evidence that they were born from above, were genuine disciples of the Redeemer. In Nankin every idol is destroyed, and the temples are razed to the ground; there is but one exception—the temple spared has been converted into a Christian house of prayer. Sixteen churches had been built; and all the acts of the Government tended to repress idolatry in every form, together with the use of alcoholic drinks, opium, and tobacco. The Buddhist monasteries were dismantled, and the priests restored to secular life. Under these very wonderful, nay, providential circumstances, your Committee have resolved to request the brethren to commence our Chinese

Mission among the Revolutionists, either in Nankin itself, or in some favourable locality in its neighbourhood. After ages of seclusion, China is thus remarkably opened to the Gospel, and, by a series of events the most unlooked-for, the path of its messengers cleared. A local insurrection has expanded into a revolution; a poor Chinese student has become the destroyer of idolatry, the ruler of myriads, and the disseminator of the Bible. The Committee have deemed it their duty to present these interesting facts to the churches, and to invite their prayerful and liberal aid to add at least six to the number of brethren employed in the evangelization of China. The vision of the Prophet Isaiah seems at length in process of fulfilment:—"I will make all my mountains a way, and my highways shall be exalted. Behold, these shall come from far:—and these from the land of Sinim."

FRANCE.

The very interesting and encouraging Report on this Mission presented to the Committee by Mr. Trestrail on his return from a visit to Brittany, and printed in the "Missionary Herald" for February last, renders any lengthened notice unnecessary. Since Mr. Trestrail's return the repairs of the chapel have been completed. A house has likewise been purchased at Tremel; and is being transformed into a place for evangelical worship, towards which our Welsh friends have liberally contributed. With the slow relaxation of the laws which affect Protestant worship, and which continues to go on, Mr. Jenkins has, with the Divine blessing, extended his labours, and laid the foundation of a church of Christ walking in the ordinances of the Gospel. May it become as a city set on a hill in the destitute and priest-ridden district in which his evangelical labours have been so successfully carried on!

TRANSLATIONS.

Although the absence of the Rev. J. Wenger from Calcutta has prevented the completion of the Sanscrit Bible (which has advanced to the end of Isaiah), or the issue of a projected new edition of the entire Bengali Bible, the printing and distribution of the Society's versions have gone on as usual. From Jan. 1, 1852, up to Feb. 29, 1860, there have been printed in Bengali, Urdu, Hindi, and Sanscrit, not less than 244,500 copies of parts or entire volumes of the Scriptures; and the journals of the missionaries contain many interesting notices of the eagerness with which the Bible is sought for, and its contents valued. Of the edition of the entire Bengali Bible now passing through the press, the Calcutta Auxiliary Bible Society has purchased 2,000 copies of the Old Testament, and has expressed a wish to obtain an equal

number of copies of the New Testament uniform with it. Thus the local Bible Society will issue, for the first time, the whole Bengali Bible in one volume. With a view to render the Scriptures still more useful to the population of India, and especially to the rapidly increasing Christian community, the Committee have requested their highly esteemed brother, the Rev. J. Wenger, to prepare an annotated edition of the Bengali Scriptures. This he has undertaken to do; and, with Divine permission, it will have his immediate attention on his return to Calcutta. This edition will be printed at the Mission Press, and sold at as low a rate as is compatible with its cost.

The Hindi New Testament continues to make progress under the very careful and anxious labours of the Rev. J. Parsons. A volume containing the Gospels and Acts was issued in July last. Since then he has revised the Epistle to the Romans and the first fourteen chapters of 1 Corinthians. This revision of a former version is, in fact, a re-translation. When complete it will be very important that a similar revision of the Old Testament should be begun, and for this we trust our brother's life will be preserved. In addition to these labours, Mr. Parsons has issued a hymn-book in Hindi, and is engaged in preparing native tunes in musical notation for congregational and private use.

The Rev. C. Carter, through Divine mercy, has completed his valuable revision of the New Testament in Singhalese. An edition of 1,000 copies of the Gospel of John and the Epistle to the Romans, was printed in the middle of the year, and a portion of the impression has been sold. The Committee have now directed the printing of the entire New Testament, and they hope before the year is closed that it will have issued from the Press. In reference to this work, the Rev. J. Allen writes to the Committee:—"It is superior to any other version, and, best of all, intelligible to everybody, learned or unlearned, even in its most difficult chapters." Mr. Carter has also published one or two elementary works to facilitate the acquisition of this somewhat difficult language.

FINANCES.

Notwithstanding the severity of last season, and the advanced prices of food, your Committee have the pleasure to report, that, tested by the contributions of the year just closed, the missionary spirit of the churches is on the increase. At the anniversary of 1860, it was announced that the amount received for general purposes was £16,018 4s. 5d., an increase over the year previous. This year the Committee have the pleasure to report the receipt of £18,871 4s. 5d., for general purposes, a further increase of £2,853. A portion of this is due to a somewhat larger income under the head of legacies; but even deducting this, there is a decided and considerable improvement

from those sources which indicate the interest taken in the great work in which we are engaged. For the support of native preachers there has been an increase of £79 13s. 9d.; but under the head of "Widows and Orphans' Fund" there is a diminution of nearly one hundred pounds—the effect of the extreme inclemency of the day on which the gifts of the churches were taken up, and which seems to have extended to all parts of the country. The Special Fund for China has continued to receive additions, the sum of £486 2s. 0d. having been contributed. The Committee trust that a much larger amount may be gathered in *this* year to meet the extraordinary events which place the whole of this vast empire at the feet of the church of Christ.

The Committee remark with pleasure the steady increase of the contributions for the translations, from the funds of the Bible Translation Society. With the extension of the work of grace, and the enlargement of our mission in India, the demand for the Scriptures must continue to grow; while new versions, such as that of the New Testament now in the press, in Ceylon, and new fields like that of China, will require ampler means than ever to furnish the people with the word of God. The entire income of the Society has been £30,468 15s. 4d.

Under the head of expenditure, there is an increase in the cost of the Indian mission of £793 10s. 0d., owing to the greater number of brethren employed. As last year, the Committee have given in the balance sheet the entire cost of this mission; but it will be seen that the Mission Press has again largely aided the Society in the maintenance of the work. The expenditure on the China mission has also increased, as was to be expected on the arrival of the brethren in the sphere of their labour. But in Ceylon, Western Africa, Madras, and the Bahamas, less has been expended. With the present year, the cost of the deputation to the West Indies will disappear from the account; but a permanent increase must be looked for in the expenditure on Jamaica and Hayti. The slight increase in Trinidad and Brittany is owing to the arrangements being made for the expansion of the mission in those places. The only other point requiring notice is the considerable amount entered under the head of returned invalid missionaries. A larger number of brethren than usual have been obliged, the past year, to visit their native land, three of whom still remain. They will probably return to their stations during the present year. Their presence has not been without beneficial results in the interest they have awakened, and the intelligence they have communicated of the work of God, in their respective departments of missionary toil.

It will be seen that the Committee have more than expended the funds specially committed to their care for the India mission, and they, therefore, propose to close the fund opened for its enlargement. Of the special contributions for China, a considerable amount—£1,320 13s. 11d.—remains to be

employed. Deducting this from the sum in the Treasurer's hands, there is a balance of receipts of £1,880 8s. 11*d.* over the expenditure of last year. It should not, however, be overlooked that the Treasurer had incurred liabilities on the 31st of March to the extent of £1,169 5s. 11*d.* on account of the Mission Press, and a further sum of £1,449 14s. 8*d.* on the general account; not, indeed, then due, but to be provided for out of the balance in hand, and from such contributions as may come in in the interval of their arrival at maturity. The entire expenditure has been £29,684 8s. 11*d.*

It cannot but be cause of gratitude to God that the Committee are able to present so favourable an account of the year's labour. The Divine blessing has been granted both on the acquisition of sufficient means, and on the expenditure of them. For God has given an unusual blessing to his word in many parts of the field we occupy. But the experience of the year assures the Committee that they have far from exhausted those resources which the churches possess. There are still large numbers of persons in communion with the churches, and regular attendants at the house of God, who either give nothing, or a sum very disproportionate to their ability and to the claims of the perishing heathen. In many cases, this deficiency is owing to the want of information; and the Committee desire most earnestly to press upon the ministers of the denomination, upon all who enjoy the opportunity of giving instruction in the various congregations and schools, the duty of bringing the subject of Christian missions into more frequent notice, to give it more prominence in their discourses and lessons, and to encourage in every way the perusal of those papers, so easily accessible, which tell of the doings of the Lord's people in heathen lands, and of the displays of Divine grace in the conversion of the souls of men. China and the Indies of the eastern and western hemispheres, Africa and France, the numerous mission-fields of the Christian Church, abound in materials for the most interesting disquisition, calculated to awaken attention, to stir the sympathies of the Christian's heart, and to deepen the pity of the Lord's people for the myriads who are perishing without God and without hope in the world. The Providence of God invites us forward. He opens all lands to our Christian zeal. The Divine Spirit is being richly given in answer to our prayers. Let us then "abound in the work of the Lord, seeing that our labour is not in vain in the Lord."

REPORT OF MISSIONARY STATIONS.

In the following reports of the stations, an endeavour has been made to make them as complete a review of the past year's labours as the materials at hand will permit. We commence with :—

INDIA.

I.—CALCUTTA AND ITS VICINITY.

Up to the time of our going to press we have not received the usual report of the Calcutta Auxiliary. The auxiliary has, however, continued its useful course, maintaining the preaching of the word in Jaun Bazaar Chapel, in the streets and bazaars, and watching over the interests of the Benevolent Institution.

In addition to the particulars given in the body of the report respecting translations, we append the following affecting information from the Rev. C. B. Lewis.

“The payments chargeable to the Translation Fund are this year limited to the allowances given to the pundits, whom it was thought most desirable to retain until Brother Wenger returns, and again needs their assistance. One of them was quite superannuated before he left, and in August or July last he died at Serampore. He was first engaged by Dr. Carey at the commencement of the enlarged plans for translations formed by the three worthies at Serampore; and his whole subsequent life for more than half a century was spent in assisting our brethren to make the word of God accessible to the pundits of India in an acceptable form. Yet to the last he was a narrow-minded bigoted Hindu, and has died, I fear, without knowledge and without hope. What a deplorable fact! The burden and heat of his day were borne by him in close proximity to the wells of salvation, the fountain of living waters; yet he never slaked his thirst thereat, nor drank that he might live for ever.

“This solemn fact should be a stimulus

to effort and to prayer. It shows us our pitiable helplessness, and should burst our very hearts with strong desire for strength from the strong one to be sent to our aid. It shows us that it is not the annual guinea which should express the interest your subscribers take in the cause of Bible Translations. It is not a donation or subscription which, given, the claim is met and the subject done with. We want grief for the hardness of the heathen—pity for his desperate danger—and tears and cries before God for his succour, in aid of what is done for his rescue and salvation.

“The only work printed within the past year has been Mr. Parson's translation of the Acts of the Apostles in Hindi. 2,500 have been printed for separate distribution, 2,500 to be issued in one book with Luke's Gospel, while 2,500 were paged so as to bind up with the volume containing the four gospels.

“The number of Scriptures issued from our Depository this year has been small—since it amounts to 14,023 of all kinds only.”

The *Intally Institution* has continued to prosper, under the auspices of the Ladies Society, as in former years. It is now under the superintendence of the Rev. George Pearce.

II.—CHURCHES IN CALCUTTA.

1.—*Church in Circular Road.*

Pastor, A. LESLIE.

Number of members, 102.

In the early part of the year, five young men were added to the church by baptism, one of them a member of the civil service. The Sunday school continues in an efficient

state, and the church supports a native preacher, whose time is employed in preaching in the bazaars and among the native servants of European families."

2.—*Church in Lal Bazar.*

Pastor, J. SALE.

Number of members, 134.

Mr. Sale reports as follows :—

"The past year has been one of peace, and I trust of real, though not rapid progress. The congregation has increased; the Sunday School is flourishing; the teachers are becoming more earnest, united, and efficient; four have been baptized, two have been received by dismissal from other churches, one has been restored to fellowship, whilst two have been dismissed from our communion, and have joined the Circular-road Church.

"Though the actual increase of Church members has been small, yet the manifest increase of attentive hearers, and the signs of growing love, zeal, and desire for the glory of Christ amongst the people, have given me much encouragement.

"The influx of European artizans for the railway, the gas works, the drainage, and other public works, makes the Lal Bazar Church a very important sphere of evangelistic effort, whilst it is admirably adapted for a missionary station or centre of operations."

The health of Mr. and Mrs. Sale requiring a voyage to Europe, Mr. Sale at the commencement of this year resigned the pastorate. The Rev. T. Kerry for the present supplies the church during his absence in England.

3.—*Church in Intally.*

Pastor, SHUJAAT ALI.

Number of members, 41.

Of this Church no report has reached us.

4.—*Church in South Colingah.*

Pastor, GOOLZAR SHAH.

Number of members, 40.

One person has been baptized, and the Church continues to enjoy peace. The pastor occasionally fills the time which his other employments will allow, in visits to

the neighbouring country, and to the inhabitants of the district where the chapel is situated. An interesting account of one of these excursions will be found in the *Herald* for March, 1861, p. 35.

III.—*CHURCH AT DUM DUM.*

Pastor, C. B. LEWIS.

Number of members, 12.

No report has been received for the past year. Koilas, the native preacher, was, however, removed in the early part of the year to Sewry.

IV.—*TWENTY-FOUR PURGUNNAHS.*

Missionary, G. PEARCE.

Number of members, 262.

This is the name of the district in which lie Alipore and the stations so long sustained by the Society in the villages to the south of Calcutta. Owing to the departure of Mr. Kerry to Barisaul to supply the place of Mr. Page, Mr. Pearce resumed the charge of these stations in the early part of the year; but at present no report has reached us of their progress during the year. At the beginning of the season Mr. Pearce recommenced his instruction of the theological class, which consisted of five very promising young men. He has also been able to carry through the press a new edition, revised and enlarged, of his Bengali Hymn Book. This work contains numerous hymns composed by our esteemed brother himself; it is much used by all denominations of native Christians in Bengal, while his own compositions have been transferred to the separate hymn book in use among the Church Missionaries. Towards the close of the year, Mr. Pearce's sight much failing him, he took a journey to the North West, where he assisted in a conference held by our brethren, but returned without much improvement in his sight. We trust that this affliction may be stayed in its course.

Miss Packer has continued to conduct with great efficiency and usefulness, the girls' school under her charge. It contains thirty scholars.

In the *Missionary Herald* for March and

April, 1860, pp. 35, 53, will be found a very interesting sketch of the Missionary history of these stations from their origin.

Owing to the great increase of rent, the house occupied at Alipore has been given up. Mr. Pearce for the present resides at Intally, the departure of Mr. Sale allowing this removal. We trust, however, that the work at Alipore will still go on under the superintendence of our highly esteemed brother.

V.—HOWRAH.

Pastor, THOMAS MORGAN.

Number of members, 20.

Mr. Morgan has favoured us with the following report:—

“English Church.

“Three have been added to the Church by dismission, and one by baptism. On resuming my labours I found the congregation comparatively small.

“However, I am happy to inform you that there has been a gradual but steady increase, and the Tuesday night meeting has increased more than fourfold.

“The chapel had not been repaired for five years. Early in November it was closed for that purpose. In addition to the ordinary repairs there was a considerable amount required.

“The total repairs of the chapel will cost about £140.

“I mentioned from the pulpit that the repairs were necessary, and that I would not send round a *subscription paper*. The money came, and with the savings of former years the work has been done—thanks to the liberality of the Howrah people.

“Native Church.

“Both church and congregation are few in number. The attendance has been irregular and fluctuating, not so good as in former years. Apathy, as it regards spiritual matters, is the bane of our native churches.

“Native Schools.

“There are two; one of them is principally supported by a Sunday School at Pithay Meeting House, Bristol. On my return, I found that only a few boys attended one. I had it removed to another

locality, where the attendance is much better. But on account of the great demand for labour, and high wages, it is difficult to keep the boys long.

“Sunday School.

“This was established by me many years ago, and is held early in the morning in my house. From thirty to sixty heathen boys from the schools attend. The more advanced boys are formed into a Bible class, and the little ones are catechized on Scriptural subjects.

“Preaching to the Heathen.

“This work has devolved almost entirely on myself. Before my arrival here the native preacher had been suffering from pulmonary complaints, and was not able to do much beyond attending the Sunday service, and that he could not do at all times. Besides examining the schools, I have preached in and about Howrah at all seasons.

“As soon as the chapel was closed for repairs, I hired a boat for a month, to visit my district, and came back on the 22nd of December. I preached in a great number of villages, some large towns, markets, &c. I was intensely anxious to know what sort of reception I would have from the people. In the first instance, I landed at Tamluk, a populous place, and walked up one street. For some time no one recognised me. At last a shopkeeper called after me, and said, ‘Saliib, where have you been all this time? Here is a tract you gave me. Sit down.’ The people collected. I took up two subjects, the Unity of God, and the Doctrine of Merit; and remarked that whatever a man has in this world, he thanks neither God or man for it. He has merited all in a former birth; consciousness of merit produces pride, and pride destroys merit. Having placed them in this dilemma, I led them to the righteousness of Christ, which is offered to all freely; and that the imputed righteousness of Christ does not foster pride, but, on the contrary, humbles the sinner to the dust. The subject took amazingly; I never saw the Hindoos so attentive, serious, and perplexed.

"We resumed the subject next morning. I could not but feel that there were before me men who were Christians, except the confession of it. Contrast this with the conduct of the people the first time I went to Tamluk. The Brahmans rushed out of the temples shouting, abusing, and cursing. The whole town was in an uproar.

"The general results of my labour in former years may be summed up in three particulars. First, wherever I was known I received a cordial and hearty welcome, as an old friend. Often a man would be waiting at his door, with a stool in hand, and many inquiries as to where I had been so long. The people thronged about me, and poured out their complaints respecting the cruelty, rapacity, and the injustice of land-owners, and the police. All this was done naturally and spontaneously, as a matter of course, giving me credit for doing for them far more than is in my power. There are no indigo planters in my district. I mention this as an act of justice. The complaints of the people are against their own countrymen. The second result is a disturbance of the fixedness of ideas so peculiar to the Hindoos, by the introduction of Christian ideas.

"The third result is a conviction of the truth of Christianity, though not openly confessed. I give one instance. On the river Damuda there is a highly respectable family. I made my first visit in 1842, and when near I generally give a call. Those that I knew first as children are now young men. I visited them this year. I walked quietly past the house, affecting not to know them. But the young men came after me, and said, 'You are the Padre Sahib!' They took me to the garden-house. They permitted me to speak to them a long time. From the hearty welcome they gave, and their admissions, I am certain that there exists a strong leaning in favour of Christianity. They went so far as to offer me something to eat, and walked a long way with me towards the boat. There are hundreds who are enthralled by the chain of caste, and dare not profess what they

believe; at the same time they severely feel their bondage.

"I had an opportunity of seeing the difference between those places where I have been and where I have not been. In the latter men and women, on seeing me, ran and hid themselves in their houses. Here Hinduism is undisturbed, there is no foreign element.

"Learned men say the most absurd, contradictory, and wicked things, oracularly and unblushingly. In poor villages the ignorance of the people is most profound; there are no temples of any kind, and the only indication of public worship is a small plant with a garland about it, representing the goddess of snakes.

"Generally there is about the people a degree of sulkiness such as I never witnessed before. They are loud in their complaints against the present government, and assert openly that the government of the old company was the golden age compared with the present."

STATIONS AND CHURCHES IN BENGAL.

I. SERAMPORE.

1.—*English Church, Pastor, J. TRAFFORD, M. A.*

Missionary, W. SAMPSON.
Number of members, 37.

No report has reached us of the state of this Church.

2.—*Native Church, JOHNNUGGER.*

Pastor, JOHN ROBINSON.
Number of members, 79.

No report has reached us of the progress of this Church.

3.—SERAMPORE COLLEGE.

Tutors, J. TRAFFORD, M.A., W. SAMPSON.
Head Master of the School, E. DAKIN.

The large and valuable library of this important institution has received much attention from Mr. Trafford since the decease of Mr. Denham. By the assistance of friends and a grant from the Society, the destructive attacks of white ants have been prevented, the books re-

paired, and additions made, partly from the valuable collection of our late highly esteemed missionary, Mr. Denham. In addition to the usual attendance of heathen boys, there has been a class of European students from twelve to fourteen in number, and about twenty more, the sons of native preachers, who board in a bungalow on the College premises. At the last matriculation examination in the Calcutta University, ten of the students presented themselves, and six succeeded in passing. Of the children of the native preachers several have been baptized during the year.

Mr. Dakin has furnished the following report:—

“Our last report alluded to a want of sectional desks and a gallery; during the past year, I am happy to say, both these wants have been supplied, the desks, as you are aware, by a grant from the Committee, and the gallery by subscriptions raised in India, and a grant from the Council of the College. These acquisitions have enabled me to introduce a slightly modified form of what is technically called the *tripartite* arrangement—the plan on which the model school of the British and Foreign School Society is organized.

“The immediate benefits which have resulted to the Institution from these alterations are the following:—The supervision of the whole school has been rendered easier and more efficient. Along with increased facilities for teaching, and increased facilities for testing what has been taught, greater accuracy and neatness has been secured in all written exercises. A number of classes grouped together have simultaneously been instructed from the Scriptures every day in the week excepting Saturday. We have, moreover, been enabled to carry out our plan with regard to an infant class.

“The number of boys admitted into the school alone during the year was 589, forty more than were admitted last year, and above 100 more than were admitted

in 1858. (The return for 1858 is about 500, but this *included* the College classes.) The number on the books at Christmas was 459. The *average* attendance for the first quarter was 344; for the second, 327; for the third, 320; for the fourth, 312. Three things have contributed to make this average attendance for each *successive* quarter less, while the number on the books have been more, *viz.*—the recurrence of native holidays, the state of the weather, and the prevalence of sickness. The attendance since we re-opened has been very good; most days we have had between 350 and 360 present, and a few days ago the attendance rose to 386 in the school alone; so large a number have never been *present* before.

“In the education of these lads I have been assisted by one Christian and ten heathen teachers. All the heathen teachers were educated in the College. Three of them have passed the matriculation examination of the Calcutta University, and are now studying for the bachelor's degree. I have great pleasure in recording my satisfaction with the manner in which, as a body, they have attended to their duties, and endeavoured to carry out my plans. With some, at times, I have had just reason to be dissatisfied, but there are others whose conduct during the whole of the year has been highly commendable.

“The examination has been conducted periodically as last year. At the commencement of the session a tabular statement of the subjects to be taught and the portions of the books to be read in each class was prepared, and hung up in the school. The quarterly examination at Easter was based on that statement. Subsequently it was extended, and the subsequent quarterly examinations were based on those extended statements. The annual examination, which occupied about seventeen days, took in the work of the whole year.

“To the lads who occupied the first positions at the examinations, and of whom satisfactory reports as to conduct

and diligence throughout the year were furnished by their teachers, prizes were awarded at Christmas. As to the result of the annual examination, I am glad to be able to report a considerable advance in the attainments of the majority of the classes this year. A larger amount of work has been done, and increased accuracy has been secured in consequence of greater care being taken in communicating instruction.

"The arrangement of which mention was made in my last report, for more efficiently conducting the religious instruction of the school worked tolerably well till the latter portion of the year, when I regret to say, the imprudent—to use no severer term—conduct of our only native Christian teacher caused him entirely to lose the respect and confidence of the boys, and to some extent that of my colleagues and myself. About a month ago he left us, having obtained employment at Allahabad.

"Temporarily we have arranged that one of the native preachers shall attend the College two and a quarter hours every day, excepting Saturday, to instruct the lower classes in the school from the Scriptures, through the medium of the vernacular. As soon as possible we intend getting another native Christian teacher, but I expect we shall experience some little difficulty; for intelligent and trustworthy native Christians have so many lucrative positions open to them, that it becomes a very difficult matter to persuade them to stay as teachers at a comparatively small salary, if even we were always disposed to do so. Most Missionary Institutions, like the College, complain of the want of efficient native Christian teachers. It is worth while considering whether, in similar institutions to ours, it would not be wise to have one or two teacherships to be held only by native Christians, of such a value as men of distinguished merit would accept. The direct and indirect advantages which would accrue to Missionary Institutions from the conversion of

native Christian teachers, celebrated alike for their intelligence, their acquaintance with the rich mines of European knowledge, as well as the deep stores of Asiatic learning, and their spotless integrity, is almost incalculable. They would be listened to with attention, for their learning would make their opinion weighty; their uprightness would make them revered and respected, and their acquaintance with all the practices of the people; the customs by which they are ruled; the vices and sins to which they are most addicted; the character of their domestic life, &c., &c., would give them a power no European can ever possess.

"The critical lessons and the teachers' class, for instruction in method, has been continued with few interruptions throughout the year. Occasionally this year I have submitted questions on school management, the answers to which were written at home, and read and criticized in class. In this manner I have attempted to lead the teachers to carry out in practice the general principles laid down in the lessons given. Other things have also engaged our attention. Incidental circumstances led to an interesting inquiry into the origin of the grossly immoral conversation in which Bengalis, and hence Bengali boys out of school, engage; and from an inquiry into the origin of the evil, to the devising means for checking it as far as possible amongst the boys who attend the college. A subject intimately connected with this, "The Amusements of Bengali Boys," shortly afterwards received our attention. On another day a number of interesting and instructive papers were brought in on the 'Social Position and Influence of the Vernacular School Teacher,' and 'How his Position might be Varied, and his Influence increased for Good.' These meetings have been of great use.

"The meetings of my Sunday Class have not been quite so regular this year, owing partly to my residence being at some distance from the College, and partly to circumstances which I need not enu-

rate here; but now that I have prepared a room at my house for the class to meet in, I trust we shall be able to meet without interruption."

Beyond the particulars mentioned above, we have no information respecting the studies and progress of the College Classes.

II.—SEWRY.

Missionaries, J. WILLIAMSON, R. J. ELLIS.

Number of members, 37.

In the early part of the year, in company with the native preacher, Sonaton, Mr. Williamson visited all the neighbouring villages in the morning, preaching in the bazaar of the town in the evening. He reports that the people were well disposed to hear, even the Mohammedans displaying less than their usual prejudice. In July he had the pleasure of baptizing a pious young man, and was anticipating the coming forward of others. "Many," he adds, "are convinced of the truth of Christianity, have given up the practice of idolatry, and some say that they believe in Christ and pray in His name." Of an itinerary of six weeks still later in the year, and which was unhappily terminated by a severe attack of disease, Mr. Williamson thus writes:—

"In our late tour, which was chiefly in the jungles of Beerbhoom, the Gospel was proclaimed for the most part among those who had never heard it before, and who appeared much interested in what was declared. This was especially the case among the Santhals, many of whose villages were visited by us. These simple-minded people seem less distant from the kingdom of Heaven than their Hindoo and Mahomedan neighbours, among whom we have hitherto chiefly laboured with so little apparent fruit. A considerable number of them were more lately addressed at one of our annual fairs, who heard the word gladly, and invited our brethren to pay them a visit at their own villages, that they might learn more of the way of salvation by Jesus Christ.

"During the past year I had the privilege of baptizing three persons, two here

and one at Cutwa, who, we hope, will continue to walk in Christ Jesus as they have received Him. Two have been restored to the fellowship of our Church, while none have been excluded.

"The local contributions to our schools having considerably fallen off, on account of the establishment of Government schools, both English and vernacular, we have been obliged to reduce the number of ours to two only, one for boys and the other for girls, attended by sixty scholars. The former is taught by an intelligent native Christian, and the latter by one of our daughters. The highest class of the boys' school is allowed to commence English, which is an inducement to enter the school, and remain in it until they are qualified to begin their favourite study. The Government schools give a good secular education, but leave the youth who attend them entirely ignorant of Christianity, against which they generally conceive strange prejudices."

Mr. Craig's defection led to the appointment of Mr. Ellis, in order to assist our aged brother. The native preacher, Koilas, of Calcutta, has also joined this station. Upwards of £50 have been raised at the station for missionary purposes.

III.—CUTWA.

Missionary, *Vacant*.

Number of members, 20.

One person has been baptized at this station. The native preacher is reported to be an excellent preacher. The station has for some time been without a resident missionary, but the brethren from Sewry pay it frequent visits.

IV.—JESSORE.

Missionaries,

J. H. ANDERSON, W. A. HOBBS.

Number of members, 170.

Mr. Anderson reports on the numerous stations of this district as follows:—

"Owing to Mr. and Mrs. Hobbs being with us, I have been able to be out in the district a good deal, and have spent nearly six months in my boat, during which time

I have visited the stations again and again, and have found numerous opportunities of preaching to the heathen. I spent between two and three months of the rainy season, when travelling was not very practicable, in teaching a class of native preachers, and the rest of my time has been occupied in conducting services here and at Jessore, and in the abundant miscellaneous work which the superintendance of a dozen stations involves. Some of the native preachers have been diligently employed, others have not done so much as they might have done.

“The state of the churches has caused us trouble and anxiety. The two Roman Catholic priests in Jessore seem to do scarcely anything else than look after a few native Christians, whom they have induced to forsake the Church of England or our body, and in trying, through the agency of those whom they have perverted, to gain over others to their communion. They exhibit great indifference in regard to the moral character of those whom they receive. Their money has done a good deal of mischief in unsettling the minds of our people. They have gained a footing at one of our stations in the south of the district, and have there formed a church (if it can be so called) of four or five families who were formerly connected with us. Nearly every one of the men who have gone over to them bore a bad character before he went.

“The people at Cheela, in the Sunderbunds, are little more than Christian in name; I have done more for them than for our other people in the south of the district, but my efforts have been attended with little success. There are a few in regard to whom I entertain hope that they are genuine disciples, but the rest are so bad, that although there are several baptized Christians among them, my predecessor could not form them into a church. Some of the new Christians in Nuddea have also disappointed us. Although they hold the Christian religion to be true, and have turned their backs on idolatry, yet,

on account of the hardships they have had to suffer, they have separated themselves from us.

“Other stations are much as they were, except that at Kuddumdee the church has become independent. They do not *pay* their teachers, but they have by my advice elected two of their number who voluntarily undertook to be the pastors of the Church without receiving any emolument for their work. I hope the experiment will prove successful. The station of Kuddumdee is in advance of all our other stations; it has been in existence thirty years. The majority of the people have a very good acquaintance with scriptural truth, and most of the young men are particularly intelligent.

“During the year I baptized as many as fifteen persons; this is a matter for gratitude and thankfulness.

“I have closed two schools that had been conducted for a long time by heathen teachers, and have now entirely expelled the heathen element from our schools. I am very glad that in lieu of the heathen teachers, we have now three Christian teachers, one of whom is a very efficient instructor. I have been able to pay more attention than I formerly could to the education of our Christian boys. We have a few promising lads, who I trust will be useful to the Church hereafter.

“We have established a Sunday school here, at which nearly all the people, old and young, to the number of about forty, attend. Mrs. Anderson superintends it, and I am glad to say it seems to be effecting a great deal of good.

“The Jessore mission is often spoken of as an important one, and its past history certainly warrants its being thus described. It has yielded a great many converts. Their number does not now exceed 500, but if former converts had not been removed, or had not of their own accord migrated to other districts, it would probably have been double what it is. Many of the natives of Jessore and their children are usefully employed in other parts of the

Mission field. Serampore, Calcutta, Dacca, Barisaul, are all indebted to Jessore for native preachers.

“One peculiarity about the Mission is this: that here persons of a good many different castes have embraced the Gospel; Chandals, Muchees, Mussulmans, Hindoo weavers, Kaists, Brahmins, and others, have here become associated. The churches have not been formed in the same way as the Barisaul and Kishnugger churches, and the churches south of Calcutta were formed, viz.: by a large body of people embracing the gospel in concert; but from small beginnings they have gradually augmented, and many single individuals, wrought upon by the Spirit and Word of God, have forsaken their houses and kindred to embrace the Gospel and join themselves to us. There is, however, one fact that it pains me to record; some stations where formerly churches existed have been broken up. Years ago, in the north of the district there were three stations, but now we have none in that direction. There was also a large church at Backospole, south of Jessore; this I have sought to revive, but have not yet succeeded. The north of the district is almost in darkness. During the last seven years an occasional preaching tour has been made in that direction, but we have no station to which people can repair to gain knowledge of the way of salvation. This is so large a district that although we have to go southwards seventy miles to reach our furthest stations, we must go forty miles to the north-east to reach the spot which ought to form our centre of operations in that division of the Zillah.

“The church was removed from Chowgatcha to Jessore; though the Jessore station has scarcely yielded any fruit, and the church thus removed became after a while completely scattered; one old woman alone remains of the people who formed the church at Chowgatcha over which Mr. Aratoon presided.

“At present the churches may be divided into three groups:—1st. The civil station

called Jessore, and the place of our residence, Churamoncottee, four miles distant from it; *here* the flock is made up of native preachers and their families, the school children and our domestics. At Jessore there are the native preachers and some half-dozen poor people, two of whom are dependent on the church. 2nd. In the west of the district there is Jhingergatcha, where in addition to the native preachers there are only two families, and situated at a distance of two, four, and ten miles respectively, are three small feeble stations with a few converts at each. Besides these there are some nominal Christians who have discontinued attending divine worship; these people are nearly all poor. At Bonyeali a few families have fallen away, may God mercifully restore them! Sateriya presents a more cheerful picture. We have more people here, and they give better evidence that they belong to the true Catholic Church. Years ago many relapsed into Mohamedanism, but, thank God, those that we now have are staunch, and I doubt not that the Lord will preserve and enlarge this church. The people have passed through a furnace of affliction; one after another has been suffering from protracted illness; but they will, I believe, come forth from the furnace as gold purified. 3rd. The third division in which the bulk of converts live, is in the south of the district. Khoolnah is a place next in importance to Jessore, and is on the main stream of the eastern navigation of Bengal, consequently people from many districts are to be met with there. Steamers arrive there every other day for six months in the year. I propose to make this spot our head quarters for three or four months of the year. At a short distance from Khoolnah is our station of Kalishpore, presided over by Shunkar, a pious and able native preacher. There are eight or nine families at this station, but some of them embraced Christianity from worldly motives, and notwithstanding they have heard much faithful preaching and have been the subject of many prayers, they remain worldly still.

"The station we next come to is Kud-dumdee. The men who originally formed this church came for the sake of the Gospel, and their children and grandchildren have grown up in the fear of God. This station gives us satisfaction; I referred particularly to it in the beginning of this report.

At Bureedanga, owing to unhappy disputes among relatives about land, the peace and spiritual welfare of the little church has been destroyed. For the last five years endeavours have been made again and again to adjust these complicated disputes, but the strife is not yet allayed. The old native preacher, Kabul Ram, having become well nigh superannuated, I have appointed another brother to help him.

"To Malgaze I have also referred. Six families now constitute our flock there. I was much cheered during my last visit in finding them apparently of one heart and mind, and determined to keep themselves aloof from the Roman Catholic superstition. We have here a good pastor named Nilmoni. In this division we have also a small station at a place called *Raj-nugger*.

"At Cheela there is the greatest number of people, but many of them, as I have stated, are little better than the heathen. Those who are such, were partly if not wholly induced to embrace Christianity by secular considerations. They have cost us much labour and trouble, which we see in the end to have been almost in vain.

"In regard to the ability of the churches to become self-supporting, what I have remarked in the account of the Sateriya station will apply to other churches. With the exception of half-a-dozen individuals who have a little property, the converts in this district are either poor or have only a sufficiency to meet their wants; and as there are not more than ten or twelve families at any of the stations, so it is evident that the people cannot at present pay their pastors' salary; still, they should help, and I shall certainly

urge them to do so. With regard to the religious character of the people, we should not expect too much.

"There are some truly pious people among us, but the majority seem to be devoid of spirituality of mind and of strong religious affections. On the whole I do not consider the religious and moral character to be all that we might expect.

"I am glad, however, to think that a work of improvement is going on. For awhile there may be a reduction in our numbers, but when the converts shall walk more as becometh the Gospel of Christ we shall doubtless see their numbers multiplied.

"In addition to the schools for Christian boys and girls, and the Sunday school here, we have at the civil station a school for heathen boys. At four of the south stations the education of the young people is being attended to. Of the adults among our people I believe a majority are able to read the Scriptures. I wish we could have a school at every station where there is a sufficient number of children, on condition of the parents helping to the extent of their ability, and a school of a superior kind at the principal station; but the want of adequate funds interferes for the present with the realization of this plan.

"Our position then is this. We occupy a district which has been the sphere of long and persevering effort; all parts of it have furnished converts to the faith of Christ, many of whom have themselves become the heralds of salvation. Through their labours and the labours of the missionaries, multitudes have learned what the Gospel is, and have become persuaded of its excellence; and in parts of the district there appears to be a general feeling in favour of Christianity. For the further prosecution of our work, we have all the agencies that are essential—some good native assistants, mission stations, copies of the Scriptures, and tracts in profusion and schools for our Christian children.

"When prejudice shall have become so softened down and the truth applied by

the Spirit of God, be so well known and appreciated that numbers of persons in one locality will together embrace the Gospel, we shall see what we desire, and I hope the day is not far distant. The heaven has been hidden in the meal, and it is quietly and unobservedly, but not the less powerfully, permeating and transforming the whole mass.

"In regard to the number of actual conversions, the history of the Jessore Mission and the Orissa Mission show that with fewer European labourers, conversions have been much more abundant, and the number of agents raised up for preaching the Gospel more numerous than have arisen from mere educational efforts. The work of undermining Hinduism through the diffusion of true science, is being performed by Government. The youths taught in the numerous Government schools nearly all lose their faith in the Hindu religion, and a goodly number have embraced the Gospel. My ablest assistant is one of these. I must therefore give the preference to the public preaching of the Gospel—to its announcement by the help of native assistants, as far as practicable, to every creature; and I most firmly believe that in India, as well as in every other place, this glorious message of salvation when proclaimed by men filled with the Word, and baptized by the Spirit of God, will mightily grow and prevail."

We may add to the above the impressions produced on the mind of Mr. Hobbs, who has so recently entered on the work:—

"In company with Mr. Anderson, and attended by our wives, we have been continually itinerating. The everlasting Gospel has been preached to, perhaps, 20,000 people, and all the churches have been visited. I have been exceedingly gratified with what I saw, for evidently the Word of God is telling upon the convictions of the people. In many places they crowded upon us for books, and numerous were the inquiries for perfect copies of the Scriptures. Even Brahmins were anxious to receive

them, and in answer to the question, 'Speak truly, is not idolatry a foolish thing?' the answer was given, 'We cannot at present certainly tell.' The common people hear the Word with gladness, and always side with the missionary in any disputes that may arise.

"When I look at the actual results, as set forth in the number of professed followers of Jesus—1 Christian to 179 Pagans or Mahomedans—I cannot keep the tears from my eyes; but when I look at the vast amount of preparatory work that has been done, and which will not require doing a second time, I am both delighted and surprised.

"Just think of what has been accomplished; and who will dare to say that nothing has been done?

"1. Half a million of Hindoos and Mussulmans have abjured the gods and Mahomet, and bow the knee to Jesus Christ, not including Roman Catholics.

"2. The awful practice of Sutteism *abolished*, and swinging on the hook at such a discount that the voluntary principle has broken down, and the practice can only be maintained by giving money to any one who will offer himself for the occasion; seldom can more than one victim be procured.

"3. Temples abandoned and fast going to ruin are met with in every direction, and but few new ones are built.

"4. The festivals are attended by fewer people, and it is the complaint of the leading native newspaper that they are gradually losing their former religious character, and becoming mere national holidays.

"5. Faith in the Brahmins is almost gone; the people boldly speak of many of them being bad men, and seem pleased when the missionary is able to show them and their faith to be false and vain.

"6. A universal readiness to hear the Gospel, a great desire to obtain books, a ready confession that the Christian religion is superior to theirs, and will most likely overthrow them, and an avowal that if a

great many would unite and become Christians, *they* would like to do so too.

“All these things, I think, show that the year of their redemption draweth nigh.”

V.—BACKERGUNGE.

Missionaries, J. C. PAGE, T. MARTIN, F. T. REID.

Number of members, 446.

Mr. Martin has favoured us with the following copious report of each station:—

“1. *Barisaul*.

“This church consisted of twenty members during the past year. These were chiefly our own servants, living on our own premises. But this church, from various causes, is subject to frequent fluctuations, and is, for the most part, made up of members from other churches. None of the above number, however, is at present included in any other church. During the year we baptized two men and one woman at this place. Both the men were formerly Hindoos. One was a *koolin* of the *Shudra*, or fourth class of Hindoos, and would, therefore, be regarded by his countrymen as descended from a somewhat respectable family. He came among us early in the year, and has since been a diligent reader of the Bible. His relatives have, several times, come to see him, and have earnestly sought to win him back to his former practices and associations, and he has as earnestly sought to win them from their idols to the worship of the true Saviour. We have been giving him some instructions with a view to prepare him for usefulness among his countrymen; but, owing to his advanced age, we are not very sanguine in our expectations as to his efficiency.

“But we have had here, as well as at other places, a sample of the lights and shades of Hindoo life. Three men, who had long been members, were brought under discipline for glaring dishonesty. One was excluded, and the other two were suspended until further investigation should be made. One of these has since been re-admitted, but the other, who was absent

from Barisaul when his offence was discovered, has not yet made his appearance.

“2. *Dhamshar*.

“The church here consists of fourteen members, but it has been, during the greater part of the year, in a very unsettled and unsatisfactory state. Indeed, during the last six years, it has been constantly distracted by party spirit and strife. But in February last a case occurred which filled our hearts with sadness, and has since been the cause of much anxiety both to ourselves and the church.

“Ramchand being excluded for immorality, he at once began to form a party, ceased to worship with our people in our chapel, and, taking with him as many as he could, went over to Mr. Bareiro, who has a chapel close by; and Ramchand, since his dismissal, has tried to do all the mischief in his power.

“3. *Ashkor*.

“The church here is in a prosperous and healthy condition. In April last eight men and four women were added to it by baptism, and it now consists of seventy-six members, or nearly double the number there was three years ago. The preacher, Kenoram, who has charge of it, is a zealous, active, and energetic man, and he has associated with him an old man—a truly God-fearing man, ‘fervent in spirit,’ who regularly visits the people in the remote villages, and looks after the poor and the afflicted with a paternal solicitude. The church owes much of its prosperity, under God, to the joint efforts of these two men. But among the members themselves there are elements of life of a very pleasing character. For some time past they have exhibited a strong desire to have their children educated, and with a view to accomplish the wished-for object, the preacher has become teacher as well, and during the last six months has taught a flourishing school of about thirty boys on an average.

“4. *Chobhikarpar*.

“This church is the largest in the district. The number in communion is ninety-

six. Here also we baptized two men and ten women in April last, and during the year the Christian community received large accessions from the heathen. Only a few weeks ago five families in one village renounced idolatry, and embraced the Christian religion. The preacher, Shoron, who has charge of this church, is a patriarchal old man, and has 'a good report of them which are without.' His Hindoo and Mussulman neighbours, as well as his own church and congregation, respect him, and look up to him as to a father. His people are numerous and widely scattered, and for some time past the old man has had an assistant, who bears a good deal of his burden in visiting remote villages.

"5. *Dandhoba.*

"The church of this place has received no increase during the year, and the number at present in communion is twenty-three. The preacher, Roghooonath, by his ability, integrity, and genuine piety, commands the respect of his neighbours, and the confidence and affection of his own people. As a preacher, he has abilities of a very high order, and as an exponent of Scripture he has not an equal among his brethren. But his patience is often sorely tried by the opposition which he meets with from Mr. Bareiro's party, who have a chapel close by. In some respects we rejoice in the existence of these chapels. They occasionally take from us the quarrelsome and disaffected, and such characters as we are only too glad to get rid of. But on this account it is frequently found very difficult to exercise proper discipline in the church, and the moral courage as well as patience of the preacher is put to a severe test.

"6. *Dharabusail.*

"The church in this village consists of sixteen members, and has been for some time past *in statu quo*. But this part of the district wears a most forbidding aspect, and its physical condition very much impedes the progress of our work. It is a 'great dismal swamp,' and extremely difficult of access, except during the rains,

when the country is under water; but even then the long matted grass and jungle which float on the top constantly obstruct the boat. The accommodation for worship, too, has hitherto been very indifferent. For want of a better place, the people meet together in the preacher's house. But a chapel is now in course of erection, and we hope for better success in future. The preacher, Golok, who occupies this station at present, has not our entire confidence, and we keep him here for want of a more suitable man.

"7. *Ambolya.*

"The number in communion in this church is twenty; but here also we cannot report progress. Neither church nor congregation has had any appreciable increase for some time. The preacher, Motilall, is a humble, efficient, and painstaking man; always ready to sympathise with and render assistance to his brethren in their difficulties. In this respect he is 'instant in season and out of season.' He himself attributes his want of success chiefly to the counter efforts of one man, who was excluded from the church for some offence two or three years ago, and who has since then been a source of continual annoyance both to the preacher and the church. In this village there are also several families, who, in Mr. Bareiro's time, formed part of the Christian community, but who have gone back to—nothing. The position of these people is a most unenviable one. They have lost caste, and cannot, therefore, associate with their heathen relatives and neighbours, and will not associate with the Christians. They have made themselves a sort of outcasts, and they live emphatically 'without God and without hope in the world.' But their presence in the village is like a blight in the crop, and acts as a stumbling block in the way of others.

"8. *Baghda.*

"There are only six members in the church here, and the cause is not very flourishing. The preacher, Bhojon, though a good man, does not carry much personal weight. But he has had to encounter a

great deal of opposition from two or three men, who call themselves Mr. Barciro's Christians, though it is doubtful whether they have ever entered any of his chapels.

"9. *Madra.*

"The church at this place consists of fourteen members. The preacher, Panchoo, who has charge of it at present, is an old man, who possesses neither energy nor ability. He is one of those negative characters whose private life is blameless, but who do little good, and quite as little harm. But he has a large family, and knows what it is to be in want. For his own sake, therefore, as well as for that of the church, we should like, if it were practicable, to put a more suitable man in his place, and to recommend him to retire on a small pension. His influence over the people to whom he ministered has never been great, and he has never been cheered by much success; but he has now to do with men of a rough mould.

"10. *Sooagaon.*

"Number in communion, thirty. The church in this village is in a more settled and prosperous state at present than it has been for some time past. This is owing chiefly to the removal of one teacher and the substitution of another, and to the return to the old fold of a number of people who, about two years ago, took it into their heads to withdraw from us, and call themselves Mr. Barciro's people. One of these men, though not a member, having some influence in the village, has done much evil, and has been a source of perpetual annoyance to the church. But he who was this 'root of bitterness' has ceased to trouble them, and has become a candidate for baptism. The teacher, Sookhram, is an honest, kind-hearted man, and of considerable energy. He possesses, too, some knowledge of native medicine and surgery, and glories in the fact that he is able to pay a little attention to the bodies as well as the souls of the people around him. By this means he has acquired a name and a power both among his heathen neighbours and the Christians. He is often called to

the sick man's bed, and at such times his treatment and advice are considered of much value.

"11. *Koligaon.*

"Number of church members, 34. In July last we baptised five women and one man in this village. At present the prospects of the church are cheering, but for years past both teacher and people have been constantly harassed by the agents of the late notorious Ram Rutton Roy. These troubles, however, have ceased for some time, and the church is now gaining strength. In the beginning of the year several families who used to form part of the Christian community in this village, but who had, many years ago, renounced their allegiance to Christ, and who had ever since occupied the necessarily neutral position between Christianity and idolatry, came back, and we hope will no more 'err from the truth.' They are now regular attendants at worship on the Sabbath.

"This is our most remote station, being on the borders of the Fureedpore district. The preacher, Sheetol, who has charge of it, is an intelligent man, and we have observed with pleasure his painstaking and anxiety to maintain a good understanding, without compromise between the Christians and their heathen landlords.

"12. *Amgaon.*

"Number in communion, eight. The church in this village is small compared with the size of the Christian community, which consists of nearly a hundred individuals. Hitherto these people have had no chapel in which to meet for worship, and have, therefore, been confined to the limited accommodation of the preacher's house. But we hope soon to remedy this inconvenience. The preacher, Gour, is a hearty, straightforward, though somewhat inactive man. He is surrounded by a host of haughty and vain Brahmins, who respect him because he respects himself; but who, judging from past experience, are not likely to receive his message, or benefit by his counsel.

" 13. *Noagaon.*

" Number in communion, five. There is not much to be said respecting this station, except to relate an incident which occurred a few months ago, and which led to the suspension of the preacher Jagonath.

" A widow, the daughter of a Brahmin, was brought by stealth from her father's house, and given in charge to the preacher; but it was soon discovered that the man who brought her had a young wife in a village not far off. When we visited this station we had some conversation with the widow. We asked her how she would like to occupy the position of the young woman who had just been abandoned for her sake, told her that such a marriage would not be tolerated, that it was utterly opposed to the Christian religion, and recommended her to think no more of this man, and we would try to get her a suitable husband among the Christians. But we were trying to persuade her against her will, and, of course, our reasoning was all in vain. We repeatedly, however, forbade the preacher to marry them, let the consequences be what they might. But he, like the widow, despised our counsel, and *did* marry them, notwithstanding our prohibition. We were both surprised and grieved to learn this fact, and we at once suspended him until further inquiries should be made. It is astonishing how reluctant the Christians are to give up any one, in whatever character he may come among them.

" 14. *Digalya.*

" Number in communion, forty-three. It will be remembered that this is one of the villages the majority of whose Christian inhabitants were plundered in 1859, at the instigation of their own landlords. There never has existed a good understanding between the Christians of this village and their heathen landlords. The former have enjoyed rest during the past year 'from all their enemies round about, but the state of things is still far from satisfactory. In July last we had an interview with the

Talookdars, or inferior landlords, by whom the Christians were looted. Our object was to make some definite arrangement, and effect, if possible, an amicable understanding between both parties respecting the rent. The Talookdars wished to double the rent of all the Christians, or at least to make such an increase to it as would be an equivalent for the *bhet begar*, or illegal exactions, which they formerly obtained. To these they thought the ancient customs of the country entitled them. The Christians would neither consent to an increase of rent, nor would they, of course, yield to illegal demands, which often involve a participation of idolatry, and consequently our object was not accomplished. The Talookdars now refuse to receive rent from several of the Christians, because their exorbitant demands are not complied with, and for the same reason they have all along refused to take rent for the piece of ground on which the chapel and preacher's house stand. One or two attempts have been made to fix the amount of rent, but all in vain.

" 15. *Pakhor.*

" Number in communion, twenty. All the Christian inhabitants of this village were plundered at the same time with those of the preceding village, and by the same parties. The two places are not far apart. During the year there has been no increase in either of the churches, but perhaps this is not to be wondered at, considering 'the fiery trial' through which they have passed. But we have a higher opinion of the piety of most of the members of this church. The simplicity and earnestness which characterise them are very pleasing, and give promise of good fruit. They are also superior to some of the other churches in Scriptural knowledge, and here, too, it is 'like priest—like people.' In every respect the preacher, Doolai, has our confidence and esteem. He is a man of the right kind, 'patient in tribulation,' 'apt to teach,' consistent in his walk, an example to the flock, and diligent in seeking their spiritual welfare.

" 16. *Rantalbari*.

"Number in communion, sixteen. The Christians of this and two other villages—Indoorkanee and Peererpar—constitute one church and congregation. Some of the people have been Christians for many years, but the church has not been long in existence. Hitherto the accommodation for worship at this place has been either the open air or the preacher's small house, but a chapel is now in process of erection. There is every reason to hope for success here. The preacher, Sonaton, though not possessed of much energy or ability, is a steady, quiet, unassuming man, and has the welfare of the people at heart.

" 17. *Mouladee*.

"Number in communion, five. There are in this village only three families of Christians, and two of these families renounced idolatry nearly six years ago. They have remained steadfast throughout, and have maintained consistent lives. They have been without a teacher for some time, but they very much wish for one. Indeed, more and better qualified men are our great want. If we had the teachers, the stations would multiply, and the churches increase.

"We have now gone through the churches in detail, and have only to add that the journals of the preachers, during the year, show that the average attendance at worship, in most of the chapels, has been pretty fair, at least where there was proper accommodation for the worshippers. In November last we went to two large melas, at which we preached, with the assistance of five native preachers, for several days in succession, and distributed Scriptures and tracts. But with these exceptions, we have not been able to make any extensive itineraries among the heathen. Our time has been almost entirely occupied in visiting the churches.

"In 1859 we made a careful *census* of the Christian community in Backergunge, and from the facts thereby elicited, made an appeal on behalf of 592 boys, and 409 girls. That appeal was *fruitless*, and we are not about to make another of a similar

kind, which would, we believe, be equally fruitless. The facts, however, remain—1,000 boys and girls are growing up in ignorance—nay, nearly as gross ignorance as that of most of their fathers and mothers."

Mr. Kerry continued to assist Mr. Martin throughout the year, but returned to Calcutta in the month of December.

VI.—DINAGEPORE.

Missionary, A. McKENNA.

Number of members, 18.

Mr. McKenna's report is as follows:—

"1. *Itineration*.—This, the most important duty of the mofussil missionary, has been faithfully discharged, as far as health, means, and opportunity would permit. The direct line of road gone over in course of the year, excluding digressions on either side into huts and villages, has been upwards of 400 miles.

"In the early part of the year a preaching tour was made through the west of Dinagepore into the adjoining zillah, Malda, *viâ* Moypaldiggy and Purnea; all places on the road of sufficient importance or where the hope of doing good presented itself, being duly visited. Skirting south from Malda, down the western bank of the Mohananda, as far as Bolio, an easterly direction was taken to Parbutipore, when we returned northwards home. In April the Nek-maid mela was visited on the borders of Dinagepore and Purneah.

"During the intervening months of the rains, the bazaars, huts and villages in and about Dinagepore, were taken in course as regularly as the weather permitted, and as was found compatible with the due discharge of other duties. And in December, the villages to the immediate south of the Sudder station had some attention given to them; extended itineration being impracticable, government having seized upon all the carts in the district for the conveyance of troops.

"Throughout these journeys very many

tracts and Scriptures have been distributed to the people, chiefly in the towns where they are best able to read them. In cities like Malda, the Word of God being taken to every man's door; and by the living voice, 'Christ crucified,' has been preached to thousands who could be reached in no other way.

"The reception we have met with has, generally speaking, been all that could be wished for—a patient hearing, and acknowledgment of the truth of what is said—but here the favourable symptoms end. Beneath all, there is an appalling insensibility of soul, a moral obtuseness or contumacy, which grants the need of a remedy, and the fitness of what has been provided, but fails to apply it.

"2. The *Church*.—With one *grievous* exception, the moral tone of the Church, so far as I have had the means of knowing, has been healthy. But there have been two exclusions—the one above referred to, and another—the most influential member amongst us, whose very irregular attendance on the means of grace, continued now over a term of years, rendered it necessary, as well for the sake of others as his own, that he should be excluded.

"A considerable majority of our members are women; some of them very exemplary women, and their influence it is to be hoped is for good. Some are frequently absent for long periods in the Mofussil, where they have few advantages, and all have to work hard for their daily bread; and even in the station their attendance at worship is often interrupted by domestic duties, for the necessary performance of which they are too poor to provide a substitute.

"3. The *Schools*.—The schools have been carried on as usual, the girls' being amalgamated with the boys', as the teacher left to accompany her brother to an adjoining zillah. The attendance, never great at best, has been very fluctuating; but the children have learnt a little, and been preserved in great part from the mischievous influences of idleness. The difficulty of procuring

an efficient teacher on the salary in our power to offer him, has hindered our usefulness; and the changes even amongst those we have had, has impaired it still further.

"The effort on behalf of the people at Sadamahl has been prosecuted up to the present time, but the school must be closed for a season, as the children are required to assist their parents in the fields. The people are very poor; and, when I was there last, without an exception, unable to read. Several of them desired baptism, but it was inexpedient to administer it. The native brother has conducted amongst them two services on the Lord's day, and a school in the week, taking such further opportunities as presented themselves of communicating the Gospel to the surrounding heathen. For the present he will be of use here in assisting me."

The health of Mr. McKenna's family has not been good, and for its improvement a journey to Dargeeling was taken. For some interesting facts in connection with the itinerancies of the year, we must refer to the *Missionary Herald* of 1860, pp. 58, 157; of 1861, p. 33.

VII.—DACCA.

Missionaries,

R. ROBINSON, R. BION, F. SUPPER.

Number of members, 94.

The brethren have prepared the following report:—

"In the city of Dacca, and in the neighbouring markets and villages, the Gospel has been proclaimed, and religious tracts and portions of Scripture have been liberally distributed wherever they were believed to be likely to produce good. The church and congregations of the city have also been regularly cared for and ministered to.

"We are happy to be able to record our conviction that many of our people are steadily growing in the divine life. The increase to the Church within the year has not been remarkable; but neither have we had occasion for the exercise of Church

discipline. It has been a year of peace and prosperity. The Sunday congregations, both European and native, have been encouraging.

"In addition to our usual work, we have, for some months past, had the spiritual oversight of a number of the men belonging to the native Christian Artillery corps stationed in Dacca. They are, for the most part, converts of our mission in Agra. The only language they understand is Hindi, and to provide instruction for them, it has been necessary not only to conduct the Sunday morning native service partly in Bengali and partly in Hindi, but also to have two additional Hindi services, one on Sunday evening and the other on Wednesday evening. These, with the Tuesday evening lecture in Bengali, make up five native services regularly conducted every week. Besides the two English services held on the Lord's-day, we have a meeting every Friday evening for the special benefit of some of the men of her Majesty's East Indian Regiment located here. In some of the native services, the resident missionary receives valuable assistance from his native preachers, one of whom in particular thus finds scope for a knowledge of Hindi acquired many years ago. One man of the Artillery, a Muzbee Sikh, was recently baptised by us.

"The stated religious services we have here alluded to are, of course, independent of our labours among the Hindoo and Moslem population of the city and its neighbourhood. These labours have gone on as usual, with this difference, that, within the past year, we have devoted more time and strength to the surrounding villages and markets than has been customary. Some of the labour hitherto expended on the city, has been transferred to the rural population.

"If you want a Bengali to think seriously of a thing, to plan an undertaking, or resolve on a scheme, you must let him go home. He will not allow himself to reflect on anything that is novel to him, or let his

judgment be influenced by it, much less take any important step, without first consulting his relations and friends at home. He has a constitutional dread of personal responsibility, and invariably screens himself behind the 'I do what ten men do.' Such a one, unwilling though he may be, to listen to the message of Christianity so long as he is immersed in the business of the city, will, in nine cases out of ten, treat that message very differently, when the missionary happens to find him out in his native village. At home he will entertain you as far as the restrictions of caste permit hospitality; he will collect his neighbours to hear you, and will become eagerly interested in all you advance respecting Jesus Christ and Him crucified. Now, the people we preach to in villages, though few can be got together at a time, are at home, and hence we have been endeavouring to direct increased attention towards them. There is more simplicity of thought and feeling among them; and the candour with which they listen to the preaching, furnishes an agreeable contrast to the bitter animosity with which the Gospel is too often assailed in the city, and the hard, perverse natures with which it is there brought into contact.

"Not long ago the people of one of the villages that has been visited, invited a number of their friends from the neighbouring hamlets, and sent a deputation to our native preachers in the city, with the request that they would come and have a friendly *bichar* (discussion) respecting religion. The request was acceded to; the preachers spent an entire day in the village, and were most hospitably entertained. Of course they could not be invited to join the people at their mid-day meal, but a separate meal was cooked and served up for them, and every attention was paid to their wants. On their departure, the people proposed another meeting, at which all the most learned Brahmins of the neighbourhood were to be invited to meet the preachers in argument. This second meeting, however, has not yet come off.

"An interesting feature in the attitude of some of the people towards the Gospel, but one which is still but slowly developing, is a disposition to examine its authority with candour. It has occurred to us that this growing change in their demeanour, may be owing, in measure, to that increase in material prosperity, of which the rise in the rates of wages and prices of all marketable commodities, is a sufficient indication.

"The Gospel has been preached far and wide during the past year in the districts of Eastern Bengal.

"In January and part of February, Mr. Bion, with his two native preachers, Joy Narayan and Ramgoti, traversed the Megna and Surma rivers as far as Sylhet. In May they visited Comillah; in September, the eastern and western parts of Mymensing; in October, Comillah and the out station Jangalia; in November, the northern part of Dacca along the Bunsu river as far as Putterghatta; and in December they proceeded up the Megna and Kusiara rivers to a mela in Cachar.

"In no preceding year did we feel the ruth more painfully than in the last, that we may plant and another water, but *'that God must give the increase.'* We cannot, however, help bringing to the notice of our friends the impression that prevails among the natives in the country, that it is Her Majesty's command that Hindus and Mahommedans should continue in their respective beliefs. The proclamation issued by the Queen was plain enough on the point of toleration, but the verbal interpretations of it made to the country people have, in very many instances, been artfully false.

"Our experience of the past few years is, that since the mutinies the people all over Eastern Bengal have become more indifferent to Christianity, and in some instances, among Mahommedans, quite hostile to it, whereas before the rebellion, evidences were not wanting of the Gospel having taken root. Be this as it may, we

believe some results must follow in time from the widely diffused Gospel knowledge, and should the Lord visit India by an outpouring of his Spirit, as He has graciously visited other parts of the world, that knowledge, now dead and apparently useless, will be quickened, and be the means of spreading the Gospel with a rapidity to which Bengal has been hitherto a stranger.

"At Chandpur on the Surma, after preaching and conversing with a crowd for a considerable time, we asked them to give their opinion on religion. 'One said: 'We catch fish and fill our bellies. This is the only thing we understand; this we shall keep on doing till we die, and after death we shall have to go wherever God pleases to take us, be it heaven or hell.' Whatever we said about the sufferings or torments of the latter place produced no impression.

"At Etena two Mahommedan Tehsildars showed a good deal of impertinence, and spoke very angrily against the Bible. But after pressing them for proofs of what they so obstinately asserted, they said: 'We must give it up, there is no Maulavi here who is able to enter into a discussion.' One of their number, who has just returned from Mecca, and who pronounced himself *pák* (holy), would not condescend to speak. We asked some Hindus, who were near him, whether he was not as wicked now as before his visit to Mecca, and whether he did not tell lies and abuse as before; they with a shout acknowledged that he did, and the sanctimonious face instantly disappeared.

"At Bhyrub bazar, where we preached on three occasions, some hundreds heard with much attention, nor did their attention relax on our last visit. One of them, an old disputant, said: 'Show me the form of Christ so that I can see him, and I will worship him, and give up idolatry.' Another said: 'How are we to know Christ? What is his fashion? What is his colour? Where can he be found?' Our answers were, of course, not satisfactory to them.

“At Narsinghdi we made a prolonged stay. Here we found some families, who are considered by their neighbours as Christians. In conversing with them, we found them tolerably acquainted with the leading truths of the Gospel; but they still adhered to their Hindu notions about the Guru. Three of them, as they told us, came some years ago to Dacca on purpose to become Christians. They put up with the former catechist of the Church Mission here, a relation of theirs; but taking offence at the inconsistencies of some who professed to be Christians, they returned to their home with the resolution not to embrace Christianity. They spoke very highly of Doctor Green, who had taken a great interest in them. They begged us to place a preacher at Narsinghdi, or open a school, in which case some eight families would be willing to embrace our religion. This at present we have not the means of doing, nor is it likely that their desire can be speedily granted.

“On three evenings a large crowd assembled in the compound of the house, in which they lived, when we expounded to them portions of the Gospel, and concluded with prayer. There are a few others in this neighbourhood, who might join them. We have, however, some doubts as to the sincerity of their motives, and for the present must leave them alone.

“In Comillah three Hindus visited our boat several times, and gave us much hope of making a beginning in the town. Their knowledge of the Gospel and their apparent earnestness pleased us, and we hoped to have baptised them on our next visit, but, alas! they had disappeared. It is evident, however, that there are some who have convictions of the truth, but fear of losing their caste and their livelihood prevents them from avowing their faith publicly.

“At Mymensing some young men desired to know all about our religion. One of them appears a hopeful character, but the others are deists, and very much pre-

judiced against our Saviour, the arguments of some of our infidel authors having prepossessed their minds. They called on us several evenings and listened with attention.

“At Sibpur, after preaching at the ghat to hundreds, two Hindoos came to our boat, who were very anxious to hear all about our Saviour. Their inquiries led us to think that they were in earnest. They asked particularly how they were to pray, and whether there was hope of their being saved.

“On our last trip up the Megna and Kusiara rivers to Cachar, not much of an encouraging nature presented itself. The villages along the Megna are, for the most part, inhabited by poor people, extremely ignorant in religious matters, and bigoted besides. At Chattalpara, however, we met with a favourable reception. Several respectable people conversed in a sensible way about Christianity, seeming to have obtained some knowledge from our repeated visits.

“Passing by Budderpur, we heard singing in a shed, and going up to the place, found some thirty Manipuri Brahmins chanting and singing the deeds of Krishna. There was something very plaintive and agreeable to the ear in their solos and choruses, and the whole presented a curious spectacle. One of them approached us with pawn and betelnut, which, not to offend them, we civilly accepted. He spoke Bengali, and a tract was put into his hand. He no sooner entered the circle than the headman interrupted his song to chant the following with doubled energy: ‘These are books of Jesus Christ, give them back. Do not receive any,’ and then continued chanting the deeds of Krishna. It was so cleverly done that we could not help being amused. Though we waited for nearly an hour in the hope of being able to speak to them of one greater and purer than Krishna, there was no pause, and we had at last to proceed. A little way off we met another belonging to this assembly, and to him we

gave a Gospel and a tract, which he readily accepted.

"The Cachar district afforded us no encouragement whatever. In the places in which the Gospel was proclaimed, a universal dislike, and, in some instances, open hostility was manifested.

"The state of our native churches in the substations requires some notice.

"Nearly two-thirds of the land at Dayapur has, in the course of ten years, been swept away by the river, and this has compelled us to settle the native Christians at Jangalia, some eight miles west of Comillah. Six members are still unwilling to leave the old spot, and they will remain there till compelled by the inroads of the river to seek another home.

"At Munshiganj on the Megna the number remains the same—viz., five. In Comillah two have been added to the church by baptism, the number of members being twelve. There are some native Christians residing there, who have not yet been received into Church-membership. Three have died during the year, and of two we can with confidence and joy report that as they lived to the Saviour while on earth, death was gain to them. One of the assistant preachers, a young, restless man, gave us much trouble and anxiety, and we were obliged to dismiss him.

"At Sahebnuggur, east of Comillah, we have still five members, who are visited now and then by one of the preachers in Comillah.

"At Jangalia we have now a new Christian village, with the Dayapur Chapel. There are eight members residing there, besides six or seven native Christians, who had been brought up and instructed by Mr. Bion while residing at Dayapur, but who subsequently joined the Church Mission at Dacca, and after the winding up of that Mission, begged to be received again.

"We have also opened a small school

here, but time must show whether it will prove successful.

"The number of Scriptures distributed on our itineracies has been 5,000, and of tracts, 2,000; part of the former were supplied by the Auxiliary Bible Society in Calcutta.

"Our wish to occupy Mymensing permanently by native agency has not been carried out for want of funds: but should we obtain means for such an additional outlay, we should now prefer Serajganj to Mymensing, as the former affords greater facilities for spreading the Gospel."

VIII.—CHITTAGONG.

Missionary, J. JOHANNES.

Number of members, 53.

Mr. Johannes reports as follows:—

"We have had the happiness of adding to the Church by baptism six persons. We trust that God will preserve them unto the end faithful. We have reason to hope well of a few more, who will before the close of the year join the church. We feel of ourselves we can do nothing; but God, whose glory we seek, will never leave nor forsake us. When I see around me some of our old converts, with their children and grandchildren serving God faithfully, I am convinced the labour of our hands will yet be accomplished more abundantly than we can think or ask. A man and his wife who wished for months to join us, were suddenly cut off. I hope well of them, although their faith and knowledge were comparatively weak.

"About the beginning of 1860, in the month of February, I, in company with my four native preachers, visited the Seta-coond mela. We laboured for a week, and preached Christ to hundreds perishing for lack of knowledge. They paid the greatest and most encouraging attention to the Gospel; and hundreds of Scriptures and tracts were distributed among the eager applicants.

"Not a few declared in favour of Christianity; and when some felt disposed

to argue, there were others again who said: 'Leave them alone, they have truth on their side, and their religion will prevail.' We had daily large crowds assembled before our bungalow, and to whom we gave much of our attention. Our books and tracts soon disappeared. What pleased us greatly was the conversation with a few Brahmins, who said: 'We would be Christians to-day, but we lose all in embracing Christianity, and we are not prepared to encounter so much evil.'

"We have a few members at Futtuk Cherry. Here, during the year, for about four months, two of our brethren have been stationed. Some good, we hope, will result; there is some stir among the people here.

"At Runguneh there is another brother stationed, and he also reports favourably of a few weaver families.

"All over the populous districts of Chittagong the Gospel has been extensively and daily preached, and we hope to see a change, and the accomplishment of our best wishes in God's own time; for our labour shall not be in vain in the Lord.

"I have at last finished the chapel, and have worship in it. I have no more means in hand to finish the vestry, but I have persons here who will yet assist me. I have also commenced a puckah verandah in the front of the chapel, and I hope shall not lack means or sympathy where the honour of God is concerned.

"We have during the week the following services in the chapel:—On Sabbath days, four times, twice in Bengali and twice in English; and twice during the week—on Tuesdays and Saturdays. On the two latter days, after the meeting, the native preachers read their respective reports of the past week, and this is to secure the sympathy, the interest, and the prayer of God's people.

"In our educational labours we have also experienced some success, and this will appear by the statistics I enclose."

IX.—BARASET.

Missionaries, RAM KRISHNA KOBIRAJ,
CHUNDER MOHUN DEY.

We have received no report from this station up to the time of our going to press.

STATIONS AND CHURCHES IN NORTHERN INDIA.

I.—MONGHYR.

Missionaries, J. LAWRENCE, JOSEPH G.
GREGSON.

Number of members, 71.

During the past year there was no addition to the Church by baptism. One native sister was received by dismission and one native brother, Haro Das, died, upwards of a hundred years old; for more than forty years he had been a Christian. The English members of the Church, with the residents of the station, contribute very liberally to the cause of it. The sum of £351 7s. 2d. was raised last year. Mr. Lawrence has favoured us with the following remarks:—

"The most favourable items of our report are those which relate to the funds. Our expenses are greater than they used to be in former years; but I am glad to say we have no lack of means to carry on our missionary work. Some of our people have not only assisted us to carry on the mission here, but they have sent aid to other stations also. Just now our friends are making an effort to send some relief to the sufferers from the famine in the north west; and I expect we shall be able to send about 250 or 300 rupees a month for some months to come, should it be needed, which I fear will be the case.

"Our English work has continued much the same during the past, as in former years. The congregations have varied but little. Our own people have continued to manifest their usual interest in the public services, by attending with regularity.

Unity and peace have been maintained ; but, I am sorry to say, no increase has been made to the number of church members.

“In December, a young man (an European), whose father was a member of the Circular-road Baptist Church for many years, having come to reside in this neighbourhood, offered himself for baptism ; and on the 4th of this month he was baptized. Since then another young man (son-in-law of one of our members), has requested baptism. I hope he is sincerely seeking the Lord, and that he will be united with his people ere long.

“Those natives who at the beginning of last year appeared to be hopeful inquirers, have constrained us, by their unsteadiness, to decline receiving them into the Church ; and now we have only one hopeful case among the natives. One very aged native brother was removed by death ; he was baptized by the devoted Chamberlain at Dinapore, more than forty years ago, and then he was supposed to be sixty years old. From the time of his baptism until his death he continued in connection with the Mission. Part of the time he was employed as a Scripture reader. During the latter years of his life he was very infirm and almost blind, but his faith in Christ never appeared to waver, and at last death found him waiting and longing to depart to be with Christ. A distant female relation of his wife has recently joined us by dismission from one of the native Baptist churches in Calcutta. The services in our native chapels continue to be attended by the native Christians, and frequently by a number of the heathen as formerly. In the bazaars the natives listen to the preaching without much opposition ; but unless a discussion is raised the hearers seldom remain long. A warm discussion seems particularly to interest the Hindoos, but the recent policy of the Mahommedans is to be respectful and avoid discussion. On the whole, our hearers in the bazaar are not worse or more indifferent than formerly ; perhaps they are somewhat more

thoughtful. Oh ! that we could discern in them something like a spirit of inquiry after truth ! During the year we made five rather long preaching journies in different directions. The first was undertaken by two of the native preachers to Caragola Ghat, about sixty miles from Monghyr, where a large mela is held in February. The second was undertaken by Mr. Gregson and one of the native preachers, on the Gunduck and Baya rivers. The third by myself and one of the native preachers, to Darbunga, 120 miles from Monghyr. During this journey many villages were visited, which no missionary had ever seen before, and many hundreds of the villagers heard the Gospel fully declared for the first time. The fourth journey was made by Mr. Gregson and a native preacher for a part of the way only, to Mozuffurpore. The fifth journey I was alone, and spent nearly a month in going from village to village on the banks of the Ganges as far as Dinapore, where I spent two days ; on my return through Patna I heard Mr. Kalberer give his last address to the people in the bazaar. It was pleasing to hear several in the crowd express their good wishes for him and his family, and their hope that he would be spared by God to come back to Patna after he had visited his native land. Our native brethren did not go out preaching so much as usual, owing to ill health. Bandhu for four months was laid up with fever, and at one time his life was despaired of, but now, through mercy, he is slowly recovering. Santokhi also was ill for about six weeks with fever ; but I am thankful to say, he has quite recovered his health, and is now on a journey with Mr. Gregson.

“Our two vernacular schools, I hope, are progressing. We have a larger and more regular attendance than formerly. The average daily attendance at the two schools is now 150 boys. About ten of the most forward boys read the New Testament in English with the head master every day, and meet me once a week in a Bible class. In the Urdu and Hindee

departments, all the boys that can read fluently are formed into three Bible classes, and meet me on alternate days in the week. In the three classes there are about thirty boys. The native Christian girls' school, owing to the illness of the teachers, has not received so much attention as we could wish. The Sabbath and week-day Bible classes, and monthly mother's meetings, have been attended to by Mrs. Lawrence, as in former years. A Sabbath school of native Christian boys is attended to by the head master of the vernacular school. On looking back upon the past year we see much cause for thankfulness, that we have been enabled to go on with our usual efforts without much interruption, and not without some encouragement. At the same time it is painful to think that no new converts have come forward to declare their faith in Christ. But if we do not at present see fruit from our labours, it is consoling to know, that God's word shall 'not be returned to him void,' and those who labour faithfully shall not lose their reward."

II.—PATNA.

Missionary, L. F. KALBERER.

Number of members, 11.

Mr. Kalberer has continued diligently to labour in this great Mohammedan city. After 29 years residence in India, he is about to pay a visit to Europe. The decease of Mrs. Kalberer in Calcutta, on their way, has prevented our receiving the usual report.

III.—GYA.

Missionary, E. GREIFFE.

Mr. Greiffe reports as follows:—

"The Lord has graciously permitted me last year to preach his Gospel, mostly to large assemblies, and to disseminate a great many copies of the holy Scripture. Although we may be assured that not all this has been done in vain, yet I cannot say that I see at present any fruit of it.

The Lord has shown me many tokens of his favour, in the way in which He has made people inclined to support the Mission. One gentleman alone gave me 750 rupees, recommending me earnestly to extend my mission operations to Shergotty, which is twenty miles off from here on the Great Trunk Road; and to have my head quarters here. Besides this, I enjoyed the liberal support of the gentlemen of this station; so that after defraying all expenses during the past year, I have now in hand a balance of 1,000 rupees. As the mission house is too small for a married man, and as my family in consequence had suffered a great deal last hot season, I, after consulting with the brethren Kalberer and McComby from Patna, made up my mind at once to enlarge it. I have set about it already, and hope to have it finished before the hot winds set in.

"Whilst travelling in the district I met everywhere with great encouragement; amongst the population is a great enquiry about religion, and a desire for books and tracts has shown itself. From my last tour I had to return for want of books and tracts."

Upwards of 3,000 tracts have thus been put into circulation, and 1565 copies of the Gospels and other parts of Scripture. Three schools are sustained, containing from 85 to 100 boys.

IV.—BENARES.

Missionaries, J. PARSONS, H. HEINIG.

Number of members, 22.

Mr. Parsons has supplied the following report:—

"I have been permitted to continue the same course of bazaar preaching, generally three times a week—once in the morning with brother Heinig, and twice in the afternoon with one or both of the native preachers, or alone. We are seldom without collecting a considerable congregation, which usually increases about sunset, and our exercises frequently close with a dis-

cussion, which is continued till the stars are out, with great interest. Very often, however, are we heard without remark or opposition; and, though no present fruits are visible, yet these labours have been often a source of great delight, as they have presented opportunities for setting the great salvation clearly before the minds of the people, and dwelling distinctly on the claims of Christ to their acceptance, exalting his dignity, power, holiness, and saving love, and exposing by contrast the worthlessness of their idol gods, and the impurity and unmercifulness that attach, according to their own account, to the objects of their worship. It cannot but be pleasing to see the token of assent, and the smile of approbation, on the heathen countenance when the vicarious sufferings and atoning death of Christ are spoken of. True, these lead to no immediate action, they are not regarded as involving any practical obligation; but the knowledge is imparted; Christ is made known, and this will be the ground of deep conviction and saving faith when the Spirit shall descend, in his gracious influences, like fertilizing showers, and cause the spiritual seed long sown to spring up, and bring forth fruit.

“Our English services have been regularly continued, and well attended. The average number of hearers has been larger than last year, including many soldiers of her Majesty’s 19th. The Rev. W. M. Blake, of the London Mission, has regularly taken some part in our service, and has held a Bible class for the soldiers in our chapel on Friday evenings. It is pleasing to know that these services have afforded much encouragement and edification to those who have to maintain the Christian profession amid the great difficulties and temptations of the army.

“I have been steadily working at the translation. I completed the Acts, after reading them over with Mr. J. Christian, at Monghir, at the close of the last and commencement of the present year, and they were printed; and the volume, containing the four Gospels and Acts, issued

in July. I have since revised Romans, and fourteen chapters of 1 Corinthians. The revision of the Epistles has amounted to a retranslation; which I have corrected by a constant reference to the commentaries I possess, and a close comparison with three Hindoo versions, and brother Wenger’s Bengali. Also, as I have proceeded, I have had two copies made of the version, one of which I have forwarded for criticism and remark to brethren Evans and Gregson, and one to Mr. J. Christian. I hope their kind suggestions will enable me to rectify such passages as may be obscure or incorrect. But, besides that, I think it will be important for me to read the whole over carefully with a Pundit. It is, therefore, my purpose (D.V.) to go through the whole Epistles and Revelation, and then revise from the commencement, before putting any further portion to the press. This, of course, will delay the appearance of the whole New Testament considerably, because I cannot expect to go through with my present revision in less than two years and a half, and then there will be the second revision; so that, if health and life be spared, the reprint of the gospels to form part of an edition of the whole New Testament might be begun in 1864. But it is preferable for me to receive suggestions and make the necessary emendations before beginning to print, so that, after the issue, there may be as few corrections as may be, and the said edition may present the results of mature and careful consideration. To my own mind, it is more satisfactory to touch a work of such magnitude and importance with a cautious and deliberate hand. The effect of so many editions of the Scriptures speedily following one another, each differing from its predecessor, on the minds of thinking natives, is not good. I should deem myself extremely happy if I were enabled to elaborate a version which should afterwards require only slight alterations, at least, through many editions, until, under more favourable auspices, when the Hindoo language shall have been improved by cultivation, and really learned and enlightened

Christian natives, familiar with the original tongues, shall come to the work, a standard version of the Scriptures in Hindoo shall be prepared for the, not hundreds, but hundreds of thousands, who shall then reverently study them, as the oracles of God, and the glad tidings of salvation, and their only rule of faith and practice.

"The printing of the native tunes, which it was one object of my visit to Monghir to reduce to musical notation, is proceeding as fast as circumstances will permit. They have been welcomed with great interest by many missionaries, are beginning to be introduced into some congregations, and I hope may be hereafter extensively useful. The predilection of the natives for their national style of music is very strong, and not weakened, so far as I see, by a sincere attachment to Christ and Christianity; and though our own more solemn and majestic psalmody is, to our taste, vastly superior, it has little charms for them; and those, at least, who have been brought to the Saviour in adult life, never learn to sing our tunes properly. It seems to me, therefore, a very desirable step towards naturalising Christianity in the land, to supply our native brethren with hymns in their own metres, and to the tunes they admire, and when they know them, sing with zest and enjoyment, especially as the Hindoos are a people intensely fond of poetry and music."

Mr. Heinig adds the following remarks:—

"I was able daily to preach in the city, its vicinity, and at the Dadra mela, the blessed tidings of the Gospel, and in general the people listened with great attention, and showed an earnest inquiring spirit, so much so that I often returned home refreshed and cheered in spirit. Mrs. Heinig has been daily engaged with the orphans, and though her health has given way, so much so, that when in November I was at the Dadra mela, she became so ill that brother Parsons intended to send me a telegraph message to recall me; but the Lord has spared her valuable life, and as the

cold season set in, and now we have delightfully cold weather, she has regained in some measure her health, that she can attend to her duties. As our orphans have increased in number, at present we have 14—that is, ten girls and four boys—the house they occupied was found to be too small; Mrs. Heinig went, therefore, in the beginning of last year, to Allahabad and Lucknow to make a collection, in order to build a spacious and comfortable asylum. She succeeded, and I have built it, and it is now so far ready that in about a fortnight the orphans will be able to enter. It has been built with burnt and unburnt bricks, and a wall encloses the whole.

"Mrs. Smith, the widow of our late aged brother Smith, departed this life in February last, and her daughter, Mrs. Logue, followed her a few months after; yet the greatest trial that weighs down my mind is that, Christians are influenced by a spirit quite contrary to the Gospel of Christ, and that all representations and conversations prove to be fruitless. It was our painful duty to dismiss a native preacher in July last, and I am sorry to say his place has not yet been filled up again. Several people came during the year by way of inquiry; but as we desire to abide strictly by our rule not to give them any encouragement as to temporal prospects, they soon desisted from coming again. The person that was baptised belongs to the brethren at Allahabad, consequently he is no resident of Benares."

V.—AGRA.

Missionaries, JOHN GREGSON, T. G. ROSE.
Assistant, J. HARRIS.

Number of members—English Church, 45.
Native Church, 71.

The following report has been prepared by Mr. Gregson:—

"A review of the past year presents us with much cause for gratitude and encouragement. Our labours have been pretty regularly carried on, and have not

been without tokens of the Divine blessing. We regard preaching to the heathen as a work of the first importance, to which our attention should be primarily directed, and during the past year the city and some neighbouring villages have been constantly visited. In the city of Agra, there are several leading thoroughfares where the gospel has been preached many times every week. Tajganj and Shaganj have also been frequently visited. A considerable number of melás in Agra and the neighbourhood have also been attended. In addition to this, Mr. Gregson accompanied Mr. Evans of Muttra to the Goverdhan melá, and afterwards went to Deeg, and on his return visited Delhi, Meerut, and several villages. Bernard and the catechists attended the large melá at Buteshwar. Mr. Gregson has also paid several visits to Chitaura, and in company with Thakur Dass visited and preached in many of the neighbouring villages. The attendance at these services has been for the most part very good. The people listened respectfully and with attention; but there is not, so far as Agra and the neighbourhood are concerned, that enlightened conviction of the folly and wickedness of idolatry we wish to see, nor is there manifested any extensive spirit of deep and serious enquiry. Still, we are occasionally cheered by one and another falling out of the ranks of heathenism to unite themselves with the Christian Church. During the past year nineteen have been baptized on a profession of their faith in Christ, and become members of the native church. Of these, the larger part are converts from heathenism and include about half a dozen Sikhs. One is a very interesting young man of respectable family—a Brahman, another a Thakur; both these were first met with whilst preaching in the city of Agra, and after several months' instruction were baptized. For some months the Thakur acted as colporteur, and on one occasion having received a number of Gospels and tracts for sale, he set out, entirely of his own accord, for his native village, distant from

Agra some 120 or 150 miles. He not only sold all his tracts and Gospels, but he began also to tell the people what he had learned respecting Jesus Christ, and appears to have created a great commotion, especially in his own village. Fourteen men, he states, were wishful to accompany him to Agra, that they might learn more of the way of salvation; but they had not the means of supporting themselves away from home. Four, however, did come with him. Of these four, one is still with us, and, so far as we can learn, his conduct is creditable and consistent. He has obtained a situation in Agra, and comes regularly to our services. He has not yet been baptized, but is wishful to be, and before long will probably be united to the native church. Another received instruction for a while, and then went to Muttra, where he spent some time with Mr. Evans; but what has become of him lately we cannot learn. Of the remaining two, one was soon drawn aside by his heathen acquaintance, and the other, a mere boy, appears to have gone with him.

“A considerable number of tracts and Gospels have been sold during the past year, but, perhaps chiefly owing to the prevalent poverty and distress, the demand for them at melás was not nearly so great as last year.

“*The Native Church.*”

“Service has been regularly conducted during the past year in the Benevolent Institution. The greater part of the year Mr. Gregson has preached on Sunday morning, and Bernard or Mr. Harris has conducted service in the afternoon, and on Wednesday evenings. Towards the close of the year, Mr. Gregson also established a special service on Monday evening, to pray for the increase and spread of pure and undefiled religion. The Sunday services have been somewhat fluctuating in attendance. In the month of February a large number of attendants, connected with the native artillery, left with that corps for Jhansi, and subsequently removed to Calcutta, where they still are.

A few months ago a letter was received from Shujáat Ali, pastor of a native Baptist Church in Calcutta, in which he stated that from twenty to twenty-five persons, formerly attendants with us in Agra, had joined his congregation, and that of these, three Sikhs, formerly enquirers with us, had been baptized by him. It is pleasing to know that those who have left us are thus still united with other churches. In addition to these, others have been removed from Agra to seek employment elsewhere, and our congregation has suffered much in consequence. Still, we are happy to say that we have not been without additions, and notwithstanding our serious losses, the congregation at the close of the year is about as large as it was twelve months ago. In addition to these chapel services, Mr. Harris and Bernard have also conducted several weekly services in private houses, and Bernard has had Sunday evening services for the benefit of native Christians connected with the Agra Police Levy.

“ Schools.

“In reference to schools we cannot report favourably. Our only desire is to get good vernacular schools for our native Christian youth. But even in this we have not succeeded. It is our determination not to employ a Musalman or Hindu master, and we have not been successful in getting efficient teachers for the boys' school. At present one Hindu is employed, and the course of instruction is very elementary. The school contains about thirty boys.

“The Christian girls and women have occupied much of Mrs. Gregson's time during the past year. The high prices of provisions and other causes have occasioned much distress and suffering in several families, and to mitigate this in some degree, Mrs. Gregson has devoted many hours daily to instructing the women in needle and crotchet work. This has been of use to many. The native Christian

woman who was employed to teach the girls retired from her office owing to private affliction, nor have we been able to obtain an efficient substitute. For several months past the instruction of the native Christian girls has consequently entirely devolved upon Mrs. Gregson.

“ English Services.

“During the past year, Mr. Gregson has devoted a considerable portion of his time to European soldiers. There is in the cantonments of Agra, a small Baptist chapel, capable of holding about 200 persons, and at present containing seats for 170. The chapel was first built by a few pious soldiers, about twenty-eight years ago, but was enlarged to its present size in 1834 by the late illustrious General Havelock. Here he and ‘his saints’ worshipped for several years, and up to the present time Divine service has been regularly conducted in it, and it has continued to be attended by a larger or less number of soldiers and others. For some years the congregation was large, and consisted of many who were not in military service, and they supported their own minister. After the mutiny, and on the removal of the civil offices to Allahabad, the congregation was much reduced, and it has since devolved upon the Baptist Missionaries of Agra to conduct such services as their other engagements allowed. During the past year Mr. Gregson has preached three times a week in this chapel, on Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings. He has devoted one morning a week to visiting the hospitals, and on Saturday evenings has received a considerable number of soldiers to tea in his own house. There is reason to believe that these efforts have not been in vain, and in connection with the co-operation and efforts of a few friends and pious soldiers, the result has, under the blessing of God, been most cheering. The chapel has been very well attended on Wednesday and Friday evenings, and on Sunday evenings has been quite filled. On those evenings

of the week, when Mr. Gregson could not attend, the soldiers have themselves met for reading the Scriptures and prayer, and often between thirty and forty have been present on such occasions. Thirty-five Europeans, of whom nearly thirty were soldiers, have been baptized on a profession of their faith in Christ; of these a large number evince much Christian intelligence and very decided piety. The change in some has been marked and striking, and we have reason to believe that many who at one time misunderstood and maligned and opposed us begin now to see their mistake. We have been called sectarians and proselytisers, and we know not what; and that too by persons in authority, whose interest it was rather to encourage our efforts. All such charges are most unjust. Nearly all who have united with us were connected with dissenters before joining the army; many of them belonged to Baptist families, and, so far as we are aware, not one of them possessed decided piety before attending the services conducted in the chapel. This we can state, that after diligent enquiry, we cannot find that a single person of decidedly religious character has been led to forsake his former religious connections to join us.

"On the evening of New Year's Day, the 1st of January, 1861, through the kindness of a few Christian friends, tea was provided in the Benevolent Institution for a large number of soldiers. The place was crowded. Upwards of 150 sat down to tea, of whom about 120 belonged to the Rifle Brigade. All these men, through the kindness of their commanding officer, were allowed leave until 11 P.M. After tea addresses were delivered; several by private soldiers. The meeting, which seemed deeply to interest all present, broke up shortly after ten o'clock."

VI.—CHITOURA.

Missionary, J. WILLIAMS.

We are happy to be able to state that Chitoura is again occupied by a European Missionary. Mr. Williams, who went out

at the close of 1859, has been residing there for some months past, and with the sanction of the Committee is for the present settled there. He has been applying himself very diligently to the acquisition of the language, and is now able to address the natives. He goes out daily to preach in Chitoura and the surrounding villages in company with Thakur Das.

During the past year, it has been found needful to re-establish, on a small scale, the weaving shop formerly carried on in Chitoura. Through the kindness of a few friends, a sum of money has been contributed, sufficient to erect a shed large enough to contain fourteen looms. At present seven looms are at work. These are carried on by native Christians on their own account, the Missionary having no concern or responsibility connected with them. Bathing and hand towels and dusters, &c., are manufactured.

Mr. Williams himself thus describes his employments:—

"I have commenced preaching in the *Hindi* since the 19th of April last. True, my speech at the time was not very complete, but it was a beginning, and having begun to speak publicly, the mind day by day becomes more acquainted with the construction and idiomatic expressions of the language. The manner in which I arrange my time now is as follows:—In the morning at half past six o'clock I meet my pundit, and read with him until ten; after breakfast I take in hand some part of the gospels in *Hindi*, and having perused it carefully, I reflect upon the chief ideas of the inspired writer, and prepare myself against the evening, that I may without hesitation and perplexity make known unto the people in their own language the will of God concerning their salvation; after dinner Thakur Das, the native preacher at Chitoura, and myself, go out every evening to Chitoura and its surrounding villages to preach the 'glad tidings' of the gospel to the poor benighted inhabitants, who sit in darkness, and in the region and shadow of death.

"The people seem to listen attentively, and bear patiently our rebukes and admonitions. During the time we speak to them, often we hear one here and there saying to each other, 'The sahib says the truth; it is so! True, we are not without oppositions; the priests, scribes, and elders of the people do their best to oppose the truth, and defend the follies and absurdities of their own religion.

"The other day in the market at Samshabad, when I was addressing the people, and scores listening to the word of God, one man from among the audience came onward, and asked me in a loud voice and with great importance, 'What was God?' Before I gave him any answer, I in return asked him if he knew anything about the essential qualities or perfections of a true God? and in connection with this I told him that we must first settle upon this question, before we could possibly give a correct definition of the true God, because by the qualities of beings and substances as I informed him we were to understand their nature. After hesitating for awhile he said that God was holy; I replied, yes, he is holy. Then I asked him, what was true holiness? he could not answer. I asked him again to name all the attributes of Jehovah, and he could not do that. Then I pitied his ignorance, and made the people to laugh at him. He felt in his own mind that he lost the victory, and was greatly ashamed of his own ignorance. After this, I explained to the people the perfections of God, and at last said to them, that 'God was a spirit,' in whom all these infinite qualities were inherent. The whole exerted good influence upon the minds of those who were present, and many said, the sahib defeated our pundit."

Our readers will remember that during the mutiny and immediately after it, all the native Christians at Chitoura settled in Agra, partly for safety and partly for the sake of employment. There they still remain, with two exceptions. Mr. Williams has therefore to commence anew the work which under the Rev. J. Smith was so largely blessed of God. Mr. Williams has

also found four other members of the church at Futtiabad, eight miles from Chitoura, living consistently with their profession.

VII.—MUTTRA.

Missionary, T. EVANS.

Number of members, 13.

In the months of January and February, in company with our native brother Bernard, Mr. Evans took a preaching tour on the south side of the Jumna, proceeding westward as far as Delhi. The interesting particulars of this journey may be found in the Herald of 1860, pp. 156, 173. In July, Mr. Evans visited Agra, during the absence of Mr. Gregson at Lahore. During his stay Mr. Evans baptised four soldiers. In Muttra also there were several anxious inquiries among the soldiers. And from Meerut he had the pleasure of hearing that his labour among the 6th Dragoon Guards while at Muttra had not been without fruit. Large crowds of natives were also secured at the preachings in the city. In August Mr. Evans had the pleasure of baptizing six believers in Christ in the Jumna, four soldiers, and a sergeant and his wife, all belonging to the 2nd Light Cavalry then stationed at Muttra. In the evening of the day a church was formed, after which thirteen persons sat down to the communion of the supper of the Lord. A native Christian from Chitoura likewise joined Mr. Evans, to assist him in preaching in the city. He also mentions a learned Baboo, a native gentleman, as earnestly inquiring into the truth of Christianity.

In September, Mr. Evans paid a visit to Meerut, where he received a very hearty welcome from a numerous body of the Carabineers, to whom he had preached while the regiment was in Muttra. Through the kind arrangements of the colonel the whole regiment was present, with many civilians, when on the 20th two candidates were baptized in a large tank near the barracks; one of them appealing to his comrades in the most touching manner to follow him to Christ, as they had often

followed him in wickedness. In the evening there was preaching to a large assembly after which the newly baptized with two other Christian brethren partook of the Lord's supper together. Several persons came forward before Mr. Evans' departure to speak with him about their souls. During his stay Mr. Evans preached twice in the soldiers' chapel. Subsequent to his departure a notice was put up by the chaplain of the station forbidding any religious service to be performed there without his consent, and that the service must be in accordance with the rules of the Church of England. One of the men baptized had succeeded in forming a temperance society, of which the chaplain was chosen president. Having the power, he struck the man's name from the list of the committee. He has also sought to exclude him from visiting his sick comrades in the hospital. The following interesting incident happened on one of their visits. "One in particular," says this Christian brother, "watched me narrowly when I was speaking of the benefits of leading a Christian life, till at last when I went by his bed he opened his heart to me. I pointed out the Lamb of God to him. At last he told me that his grandmother was a Christian and a Baptist. The poor dear old grandmother's letter was read; and hard indeed would be the heart of that man who could witness the affecting sight unmoved. Angels saw it and were glad; for here was one more straying lamb brought back to the fold."

In the month of October, Mr. Evans had the pleasure of baptizing five more soldiers in the Jumna at Meerut from among the soldiers of a cavalry regiment. One is a well-educated man, and likely to be a useful Christian. Another was a Roman Catholic. Inquirers also were coming forward both from among the Europeans and the heathen.

After the conference at Delhi in the early part of December, Mr. Evans again visited Meerut in company with Messrs. Gregson and Parsons, when another soldier was baptised. The brethren at Meerut were formed into a church on the previous visit.

They now number about ten members, and have chosen one of their body as deacon.

During the present year Mr. Evans will labour in Delhi to supply the absence of Mr. Smith; but every effort will be made to carry forward the good work so auspiciously begun at Muttra and Meerut.

VIII.—DELHI.

Missionaries, JAMES SMITH, D. P. BROADWAY, J. PARSONS.

Number of members, 210.

From the report issued by the brethren we take the following sketch of the great work proceeding in this far-famed city:—

"At the close of the second year since the resumption of operations interrupted by the mutiny, the committee would gratefully acknowledge God's goodness in the success vouchsafed to their labours. There has been a steady advance in every department of the mission. The scattered converts have been organised into five churches, under their own native officers. Two new chapels have been built and opened, one at Shahdra and the other at Purana Killa; a third is about to be commenced at Pahar Gunge. Operations have been extended into a number of fresh villages, and from some of them fruit gathered. The native preachers and Scripture readers have continued each to occupy his own post, teaching his small school of children, and giving evening lectures to adults; they have kept up their weekly prayer meetings, whether the missionary has been able to attend or not, and from them much benefit has been realised, nearly all have been blessed in bringing converts to profess the truth and unite themselves with the church. In consequence of the famine the attendance of the schools is not good; but many adults have been taught to read the Word of God, and a general taste for improvement created. Many of the converts belong to the lower castes; in this we see no cause for disappointment or sorrow. The poor have still the Gospel preached to them as in ancient times, and it is to them

especially a message of love. There have been few occasions on which we have had to resort to discipline, and on the whole their moral standing is better than we could expect. One step has been gained worthy of especial notice—we have been able, in nearly every instance, to keep the native Christians at their own places of residence, thus forming a basis of operation and influence in many dark neighbourhoods. The Gospel has been extensively and perseveringly preached, both in the city and suburbs, and thousands have heard with gladness the Word of God, Books have been used both by loan and distribution wherever applicants appeared likely to appreciate them, and numbers have flocked to the missionaries for instruction. Many are examining the evidences of Christianity, and a spirit of inquiry is far more largely diffused than at any other time.

“The following report will give as clear a view as its limits permit of the various stations connected with the mission.

“I.—EASTERN DISTRICT.

“This portion of the field has been subdivided into three sections.

“The first in Delhi, called the Daryaw Gunge District (including Sawar Baksh ka Bagh).

“WILLIAM COLLINS, *Native Preacher*.

“GUMMANI, *Monitor*.

“The meetings have been well attended through the year. Seven have been baptised, and a few others appear hopeful inquirers.

“*Delhi Darwaza*.

“Here, in like manner, a weekly meeting has been held with a steady attendance; the inquirers are numerous, and at the last church meeting three were proposed as candidates for baptism.

“*Meer Khan Gunge*.

“RAJBI, *Scripture Reader*.

“The agent at this station died during the year, and manifested to the last his

confidence in the Lord Jesus Christ. The attendance at both prayer meeting and school is good; one man has been baptised and others are inquiring.

“*Kala Mahal and Kwazpoora Phoosa*.

“Here, too, the agent, a valuable labourer, has been called to his rest, and through grace he was enabled to witness a good confession on his dying bed. Three have been baptised, and the weekly prayer meeting and school are both in a healthy state.

“Second sub-division, Shahdra, including

“*Kureja*,

“*Chumerpoora*,

“*Gadeeuddeen Nuggur*.

“MAHAR DAS, and

“LUKE, *Native Preachers*.

“KHUSHI RAM, *Scripture Reader*.

“At the commencement of the year much coldness was manifested by the brethren at Shahdra, and a quarrelsome spirit appeared likely to mar the peace of the little church. There has, however, been a great change wrought during the past few months. The new chapel has been opened for Divine worship, eleven have been baptised, unity and love prevail, and the school is one of the best we have.

“*In Chumerpoora*

“Three have been baptised, and for the present are united to the Shahdra church; many others are, we trust, seeking salvation. A Scripture reader is earnestly sought for by the people.

“*In Ghazi Nuggur*

“Three have been baptised. The want of suitable premises and a proper agent has much retarded the work, and we hope to see more progress in this important place during the coming year.

“Third sub-division, Purana Killa, with about twenty more villages.

“BHAGWAN DAS, *Pastor*.

“HUKAMEE and LAL DAS, *Scripture Readers and School Masters*.

"The progress in this district during the year has been most satisfactory. The brethren have been formed into a church, and Bhagwan chosen and ordained their pastor. A very commodious chapel has been built and opened, twenty have been baptised, and the Gospel has been preached in a large number of villages to a distance of ten miles on the Muttra road. The prospect is exceedingly cheering. At Furreedabad, Tuglabad, and Nizamuddeen the nucleus for churches exists, and it would not be difficult to locate a dozen native preachers if we had them and the means for their support.

II.—NORTH-WESTERN DISTRICT.

"This branch of the mission contains four divisions, two inside and two outside the city.

The first, Hafiz Khan ka Phatak, inside the city, including Gundi Gulli, Khari Bowli and Punjabi Katra. These places contain a large population of all castes; among them the Gospel has been freely preached, and many have flocked to hear. God has blessed his word, sixteen men and seven women have professed their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, and many hopeful inquirers visit the missionary for instruction.

"The second, Cashmeri Darwaza, also inside the city, includes Gundi Nala, Ibrahim Khan ka Khirki and Morce Darwaza.

"LUKE, *Native Preacher.*

"This is a very interesting portion of the field. Our audiences in the streets have been large, and our evening meetings well attended; seven men and four women have put on the Lord by baptism, and many more converts are likely to be gathered.

"Luke has been sent to aid the brethren in the Shahdra district, and another labourer is urgently wanted to fill his place.

"The third, Subzi Mundi, embraces Rajpoora, Purani Clouni, Kursia Bagh, Rona and Rohtuk.

"SOLOMAN ELIAS, *Native Preacher.*

"The street congregations here have been large, and the evening meetings well attended and interesting; six men and one woman have been baptised, forming the basis of a most promising little church. At Rona there is a great movement in favour of Christianity; the Zemindar professed the truth during the year, and is labouring hard to propagate it among his brethren and other people in the village. From Rohtuk also two converts have been received. We hope to be able to labour more for the cultivation of this important field in the ensuing year.

"The fourth, Sudder Bazar, including Teliya-wara, Dhiraj ki Pahari, Haveli Palum, and many other villages.

"JOHN WARTON, *Native Preacher.*

"This is the largest, and in some respects, the most important division in the district; it is inhabited chiefly by Mussulmans, Bunnias, and other high caste people. The Gospel has been regularly preached to large audiences, from two to three hundred usually attending. We have had much opposition, chiefly from the Government Mussulman Troopers; they have seldom spoken to us, but usually harangued the people with abusive imprecations, and thus endeavoured to draw them away from listening to the religion of the 'Feringees,' as they call Christianity. No fruit has as yet been gathered in the place, but it contains a large number of convinced people, who are evidently waiting for some one to make a beginning. A few influential Mussulmans are inquiring and reading the Gospel, and we hope they will soon set the needful example.

"During a part of the year we had three schools; demolitions for the railway and other local purposes caused us to close two, and the third, under Moonshi Wahid-uddeen has been amalgamated with the central school.

"The female converts have been instructed by Mrs. Broadway and a female

relation, assisted by Elizabeth White; they have also commenced a prayer meeting, which is held once a week, and at present very well attended.

“III.—SOUTHERN DIVISION.

“This portion of our mission field has been formed into large sub-divisions, each containing several smaller ones.

“First, that within the city of Delhi, and second, that without the city. The former is bounded by the city wall from the Lahore to the Toorkman gates, by the Chandnee Chowk from the Lahore gate to the Dureeba, and by a line drawn through the Dureeba, Jumma Musjid, and Chitlee Qabr, from Chandnee Chowk to the Toorkman gate. The latter consists of all the villages and two or three small towns, extending to about twelve miles south of Delhi. We have not been able to extend our operations further in this direction as yet, but we have many calls from people at a much greater distance, and hope to extend our efforts so as to reach them before long.

“The nature of the work carried on within the city may be learnt from the following statement.

“1. Divine services have been regularly conducted twice on the Sabbath, and on every Tuesday and Friday evening. These are conducted in four different localities. The attendance at these services has averaged about sixty, of which only about one-third are Christians.

“2. Open-air preaching has been carried on every evening (Sundays excepted). I have six regular preaching stands, advantageously situated in different parts of my district, which are occupied in their turn once a week. The number of hearers average from 250 to 300 each time, and the Gospel is usually listened to with marked attention.

“3. Tract distribution is carried on every morning (Sundays excepted) by the native preacher. I occasionally accompany him. The district has been divided into six subdivisions, all of which are visited,

and the tracts, gospels, &c., changed once a week. The number now in circulation is 146.

“4. Scripture readers' visits, consisting of a series of visits amongst the native Christians and inquirers, whereby the truths of the Gospel are read, explained, and enforced at their own houses, are proceeded with daily under my own superintendence. This is a very important and growing branch of our work, and is, I trust, productive of much good.

“5. School teachers' visits. These consist of a regular routine of visiting every morning by the two school teachers, by which the Gospel is proclaimed in a familiar manner, and tracts, &c., distributed throughout the numerous lanes and alleys, where it would be impossible to convene any large assembly of people.

“6. Book Room. This department of our work promises well, and it has already been the means of bearing down opposition to the truth, and causing it to take deep root in many hearts. Copies of the Scriptures in several languages, religious books, tracts, &c., are placed in this room, which fronts on one of the principal thoroughfares, and is open four hours daily to all. In addition to the opportunity it offers for reading, questions are heard and answered, difficulties explained, doubts removed, objections silenced, and controversies conducted in this room.

“7. Day schools, intended chiefly for the education of the children of native Christians, though not excluding others, are conducted at Bageecha and Farashkhanah, where the two teachers reside. The attendance at these is but small at present, but we hope to see an increase shortly. Our Anglo-vernacular schools have recently been amalgamated, the only one of that description being now held in a hired building, not far from my own quarters.

“8. A Sunday school is conducted each Sabbath morning before the commencement of Divine service. It was formerly held at my own quarters, but is now held in the

building used as the central schoolroom. This is attended by the children of native Christians, some adult Christians, and a few heathen children.

"9. A Bible class, at which all the missionaries, native preachers, and other assistants in the mission attend, is conducted every Wednesday evening in the central school-room.

"In addition to the above, I have visited, received visits from, and lent books to a number of Hindoo and Mahomedan gentlemen, who would consider it beneath their dignity to attend the preaching stands or visit the book-room. My object being to bring the truths of the Gospel home to them in a manner least of all calculated to arouse their prejudices, or wound their pride. For the same reason, and with the like view, I have kept up an extensive correspondence with others in out stations.

"Outside the city the first place in importance, and the only one I have as yet been able to occupy permanently, is Pahar Gunge, a large suburban village and bazaar, one mile from Delhi on the Gooargaon road. Here we have a regularly organised church of thirty-five members, with a native pastor at their head, their wives and children under religious instruction, and the several branches of missionary work in constant operation.

"At Allygunge, six miles from Delhi, and at Murhowlee, eleven miles distant from the same, we have a number of hopeful inquirers, and are desirous of sending our native preachers to occupy these places immediately, the only difficulty being the want of funds for their support.

"Although I have not been able hitherto to station anything like an adequate number of native agents out in the district, yet the Gospel has been faithfully preached, and a considerable number of inquirers instructed in the bazaars and villages scattered over a superficial area of about forty square miles. This has been effected by the repeated visits of myself and assistants,

and its immediate fruits have been apparent in the addition to the Church by Christian baptism of forty-seven persons during the year.

"On account of urgent and pressing invitations from a number of inquirers in the Meerut district, I have been induced to visit those parts several times during the year in common with my esteemed brother Smith, and have had occasion to rejoice in the prospects which God in his kind providence is opening out to us there.

"On Friday evening, November 30th, 1860, the majority of Christians residing within the city walls were assembled, and after singing, prayer, and addresses, delivered by the Baptist missionaries, agreed to form, and did then and there form, themselves into a Christian Church, designated 'The Delhi Baptist Church,' connected with the Baptist Mission in that city. May the great Head of the Church vouchsafe his blessing to the same.

"On Monday evening, December 3rd, 1860, the Church assembled again, and the duties, responsibilities, and qualifications of members, deacons, and pastors having been clearly explained, and prayer having been offered for God's blessing and guidance, the members were called upon to vote for pastors and deacons; when it was decided, by a large majority, that the Rev. D. P. Broadway and J. Parsons be elected as co-pastors, and Collins and War-ton as deacons. They were accordingly elected and nominated to their offices as such. May the Spirit of Glory and of God rest upon them."

An interesting conference of the brethren from Agra and Muttra was held in Delhi on the 4th of December, Mr. George Pearce, of Calcutta, presiding, when it was resolved to invite Mr. Evans, of Muttra, to reside in Delhi during the absence of Mr. Smith, then about to leave on account of health. His removal has been accomplished. On this occasion was held a communion service, all the native Christians being present; and on the next day the new chapel at Purana Killa was opened. In reference

to this visit, Mr. Gregson says, "We spent upwards of a week in visiting the different stations in and around Delhi, before holding the conference. The impression left upon our minds was most deep and pleasing, and heartily do we bless God for what is going on there. The reports given of outstations and of remote villages, of new applications to the missionaries to enter upon new fields, were most cheering; and I am sure we all felt that Delhi has very urgent claims upon the sympathy and support of the society."

Mulliana.

This village, though near Meerut, must be regarded as forming at present a part of the Delhi Mission. It is often visited by Mr. Parsons. In December fourteen natives were baptised here, and a church has been formed of twenty-four persons. A native brother has been chosen as catechist, and he is supported by the contributions of the English church in Meerut. The Mulliana church possesses among their number several men of very superior Scriptural intelligence and piety. Some eight or ten more persons of the same village are desirous of baptism.

SOUTHERN INDIA.

POONAH.

Missionary, H. P. CASSIDY.

Number of members, 15.

Mr. Cassidy has furnished the following report:—

"The past year has been one of great grace and mercy to many, all over the world. We have shared to a small extent in the rich blessing.

"1. Sabbath engagements.—Our Sabbath engagements have increased with our spiritual enjoyments. Suddoba and I, sometimes in company with others, have for some months held a meeting every Lord's Day morning, wherein we have

supplanted the divine blessing on those who 'have put on Christ,' and on those whose enquiries and convictions lead them seriously to enquire into the doctrines of Scripture, particularly of baptism. Our prayers are being answered, and we feel encouraged in this little meeting.

"Suddoba then holds divine service in the chapel. This has been sometimes largely attended, but more frequently it has had but few hearers—sometimes no one is there at all, except Suddoba himself. On occasions of baptism in connection with this service, I have preached before administering the ordinance. These seasons have been remarked as showing the solemn interest taken by native Christians in the administration of the ordinance, and in the reasons for it recorded in Scripture.

"More generally throughout the year this hour has been engaged in my Sabbath school.

"Mr. Wells and Mr. Lacey, both members of the Church, have been for a part of the year associated with me in this work.

"The forenoon English service has been regularly sustained, except during the five Sabbaths I was absent in Bombay (April 28th to May 29th), where I preached four times on the Sabbaths there. It is in connection with this service that baptisms of Europeans and of others who speak English fluently have been performed—occasions of solemnity and interest which are never to be forgotten.

"I am under gratitude to my dear brother White, who has preached three times during the year in connection with these seasons. The evening service has likewise been kept up regularly (with the exception above mentioned), sharing in the subjects already given.

"After the evening service, for several months, a prayer meeting has been held, embracing also efforts for mutual edification. This has been a blessing to more than to myself. Subjects for prayer have been suggested, and means of usefulness set on foot. The Lord's supper has been

observed on the first Sabbath of each month, in connection with this church meeting, since July last. It had been observed only occasionally before.

"2. The Wednesday evening prayer meeting has been regularly continued. It is a refreshing season generally.

"At one time of this year we had mid-day prayer meetings, as well as daily evening meetings.

"3. For some months, my Thursday evenings have been spent at Kirkee, with some of H.M. 6th Enniskillen Dragoons, and for a good part of that time, dear Mr. White has been my companion there. We have preached together, first to the natives about, and then met with the brethren.

"4. The usual meeting with children on Friday evenings has been continued.

"The attendance has not been large this year, but the interest of those present has not flagged.

"5. A second meeting on Friday has been begun, and kept up for some months, among the members of the church and others, for scripture, knowledge, and prayer. It has been held at each other's houses. Mr. White has had some share in these communions, which have had an interest and a blessing too.

"6. On Saturday evenings a church meeting has been held since July last, for church business, when we had any, and for mutual conference, when we had none.

"7. Besides these regular services, I have occasional meetings, for enquirers, at sick and death beds, and one with a poor infidel, proud of his reasoning powers, but destitute even of mental philosophy. These meetings have lasted longer or shorter according to circumstances, from half an hour to two hours.

"8. Two cases of decision for the Lord (alluded to in last report) have been witnessed this year. In both, the means of grace in the chapel were blessed to the soul, and a holy profession publicly made.

"9. Baptisms. Total, 12.—Of Europeans, eight have been baptized during the past

year. Two of these had been part of the regular congregation, whose mental and spiritual histories had been full of striking changes for some time before. The remaining six were from H.M. 6th Enniskillens, whose spiritual experiences had been growing some months, and whose Christian graces had been shining about them. These six have been removed to Ahmednuggur. The other two are still with us here. Of East Indians, one has been baptized, Mr. Haldane Fenwick, a native preacher in the Free Kirk Mission, whose thoughts had been engaged on the subject of believers' baptism for two years. Preaching seems to be a delight with him, and he has given himself to this work with much ardour. How he is to be supported is known only to Him who hath called him. Of natives, three have received this ordinance during 1860. One of these, Gyanoba Powar, belongs to Ahmednuggur, and was in the employ of the American Mission there, as a catechist, until he spoke out on baptism; when, as the Rev. H. Ballantine states in the certificate of character he gave him,—'Having changed his opinion on the subject of baptism of infants, he is dismissed from the service of the Mission at his own request, without any stain on his Christian character, and with the hope that he may be useful wherever it may please God to employ him in His service.' He continues the work of a catechist at Ahmednuggur, to which city he belongs, and has endeavoured to support himself in the necessaries of life as he best can. I hear his labours are being blessed to his neighbours. He has not been offered nor received any money from me. It was partly through Gyanoba's example and counsel that one of the other two natives, living from twenty to thirty miles beyond Ahmednuggur, had come to Poonah (100 miles) to be baptized. The other of these two has been a Christian of sixteen years' standing, but never thought about baptism or doubted regarding it till lately. The former was a heathen who put on Christ for the first time.

"10. Services, or rather street preaching in the Marathi language generally, sometimes in Hindostanee, have been carried on in the city and one of its environs. On Tuesday evenings I have enjoyed the fellowship of dear Mr. White in this work, for some months; Suddoba has also been with us sometimes. On other evenings I have pursued my work in solitude. There is a growing interest in the population hereabouts in this work. The Gospel is sometimes listened to with attention, at other times, a few of the baser sort set themselves to deny the truth, and calumniate the propagators of it. On the whole, I think I see a change working in the native mind of a favourable tendency. The infidel education bestowed by Government, makes Reason god, and materialism is rampant among the more advanced pupils. This is balanced among the uneducated with blind superstition.

"Suddoba has preached in various quarters of the city and Sudder Bazar, of the Camp; and he has assisted dear Mr. White in the room he has hired to preach in the city. His audience has ranged from fifty to a hundred; at fairs he has had much larger numbers to hear him. He has also preached in 113 villages, some of which he has visited several times.

"Suddoba has also translated into Mahrathee two tracts on baptism, which I have revised, and in one of which dear Mr. White has also helped me. Suddoba has also written two tracts for the Bombay Tract and Book Society, during the past year. The tracts on Baptism have not yet been printed, for want of the necessary funds; indeed, several manuscripts are lying by from this cause.

"Suddoba has lost his son during the past year, a babe. Both the parents have been in great grief, tempered, however, with the life hope of the Gospel. We can sympathize with them, and shall, while memory and love are faithful to us.

"I cannot close this report without recording the facts, that there are now three distinct nuclei of native Baptist

brethren in the Ahmednuggur Collectorate—one at Ahmednuggur, another at Dewulalee, and a third at Bherdapoor. These men will doubtless be the means of turning attention to the doctrines to which they have adhered. They all continue in their several engagements as before their baptism. One of them, Gyanoba, has been endeavouring to obtain some regular method of obtaining his livelihood. The others are farmers, and pursue their callings as before.

"Besides these, two of our European brethren, a married couple, are at Maligaum, where they hold divine service in their own house; and there are six European brethren of our Church at Ahmednuggur, where, I hear, they meet with some enquiring the way of life. Several baptists are in Bombay, too, and in other places."

MADRAS.

Pastor, Vacant.

Number of members, 90.

It has been already mentioned that Mr. Claxton has lately resigned the pastorate of the Church. We have, however, received the following report, read at an anniversary meeting on the 19th November, 1860:—

"The Baptist Church, the anniversary of which we are now celebrating, has been in existence thirteen years.

"As this is the first anniversary we have held, we may perhaps be allowed to look further back than the past year, and take a hasty glance at the Church's past early history.

"It will be remembered, that until the year 1847, no agent of the English Baptist Missionary Society was ever located in Southern India, and the cause of a missionary being sent here was through a warm and liberal-hearted Christian officer of H. M.'s 84th regiment. While in Rangoon, that regiment was greatly blessed by the preaching of the American Mis-

sionaries, through whose instrumentality many officers and men were converted to God.

"Soon after their arrival in Madras, finding no minister of their own denomination, the officer above referred to, for himself and others, opened a correspondence with the Baptist Missionary Committee, requesting a missionary to be sent to Madras, and at the same time forwarding a sum of money equal to seven years of a minister's support. The committee lost no time in sending out a man full of love, and we shall not be saying too much when we add, full of power to occupy the newly chosen field of labour.

"On September 30th, 1847, Mr. Page arrived in Madras, and at once, in connection with four brethren already here, commenced his arduous and self-denying labours.

"It may appear to some that the work was commenced under auspicious circumstances, as the means of a pastor's support were guaranteed; and so it was, and we can never be too thankful to God for thus providing for us, but money is not the only article necessary to success; we had no place of meeting, and but few friends for by the time Mr. Page arrived, the very persons he expected to meet, and with whom he was to co-operate, had left. A band of five, however, was left to work as best they could.

"It is exactly thirteen years this day since the first service was conducted in a room in Black Town, of mean appearance, and still meaner dimension. There we commenced with borrowed seats, yea borrowed everything save the sermons.

"On the first Sabbath, fifty people were attracted to the place of meeting by an advertisement, to hear the Gospel from the lips of a Baptist.

"On the following Tuesday the Church was formed, some here to-night were amongst that little company, and that scene is remembered with lively emotion.

"Five brethren and nine sisters assembled for the solemn purpose of relating

to each other what God had done for their souls; then, in the sight of their Father God, solemnly covenanted together to maintain the worship of God, to bear and forbear with each other, and to help each one his brother forward to the Kingdom.

"Ere long the first place of worship was much too small, and we were compelled to seek more commodious premises. From the small room in the Broadway, we removed to the larger one on the Esplanade. But we soon realized the same difficulty, and another change was necessary. The desire was now being felt for some more permanent position; and as frugality had marked our course, and we enjoyed considerable support from Christians of other denominations, we felt satisfied that the providence of God appeared to lead us to the purchase of a house in Vepery.

"Long after our settlement in Vepery, the very desirable spot we now occupy presented itself. By God's help it was secured to us, and for some time the services of the Church were conducted in the adjoining bungalow, till God said, *Build*, and we did build, and this is the building. Now, as this may be justly regarded the anniversary of the formation of the Church, and the opening of this pretty little place of worship, which, thank God, is all paid for, from our hearts we will raise our Ebenezer, and we will say, Hitherto the Lord hath helped us.

"On the other hand, not less full of interest were the spiritual affairs of the Church. For twelve years the word of the Lord had free course and was glorified in the conversion of souls.

"The fourteen members were multiplied to ninety. But many of these are gone back to their fatherland, some to other parts of India, and others to their home—that last long home, to sit at the table of their Father, with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. But while our ranks have been thinned, we rejoice that they have gone to augment that countless multitude of the redeemed in glory.

"During the past year the voice of mercy has been heard by thousands to the saving of their souls. We have been watching for signs of that awakening and revival that have visited other lands; but while we have not been permitted to enjoy the same in degree, we have enjoyed a small measure in kind.

"We are humbled when we think that so little has been done; but it is a mercy that God has blessed us at all.

"It is with the deepest gratitude to Almighty God that we record the accession of six members to our number; six precious souls have been rescued from the fall, and have been enabled to testify their devotion to His freedom and laws. *But this is not all*; we cannot estimate success at all times by the number of professed conversions. The Church has been built up on its most holy faith, and upon many there have been impressions made, which may never be obliterated. There are now many of whom it may be said, 'Thou art not far from the Kingdom of God,' of whom we have hope.

"Again, as a Church, we have been stimulated to prayer; our prayer-meetings were never more numerous than during the past year, nor better attended; especially by a most hopeful class of young persons.

"The Sabbath school is worthy of more than a passing remark.

"The teachers, who are most, if not all of them, members of the Church, have worked with considerable zeal and devotion during the year; and although we cannot report any cases of conversion, yet we trust the seed sown in young hearts is not lost, but that ere long it will spring up and bear fruit.

"So far as attendance is concerned, the result is most encouraging.

"This Mission is supported solely by the free-will offerings of its members and Christian friends in this country.

"We receive no support whatever from any Missionary Society either at home or abroad.

"It may be necessary to state that during the past year the funds collected have been for the maintenance of the pastor of the Church, the part payment of a Scripture reader in the neighbourhood, and in defraying the expenses incurred in lighting and cleaning of the chapel, and servants' wages.

"The long-cherished wish for a school for the poor of the East Indian community in Vepery has not yet been realized; but we trust with the setting in of 1861 to see such an institution established, where, independently of the knowledge necessary for this life, the children around us may be taught the truths of divine revelation."

CEYLON.

1.—Colombo.

Missionary, JAMES ALLEN.

Number of members, 369.

Mr. Allen gives us the following account of the work of God in the district and city where he labours. Seven native brethren labour in connection with the Churches:—

"In the various stations the labourers have been occupied mainly in preaching the Gospel in the chapels and school-houses, and in teaching from house to house among the people of the district, instructing them in the things pertaining to the Kingdom of God.

"The labour bestowed in dependence on God, who alone can give the increase, cannot be supposed to have been in vain. The congregations, whether large or small, have stately met to listen to the Gospel as proclaimed by the native or the European Missionary. The ordinances have been kept as delivered by the Apostles, so far as the members of the Churches are concerned. And as they have grown in grace and knowledge, their conduct differs from that of their neighbours, who believe not in Jesus and obey not his commands. We do not say that they are what they might be, or what they ought to be, or what we hope they will be if they prove

steadfast ; but they are not what they once were. A thoughtful observer—though he might be no friend to missions—would be constrained to admit that missionaries are not engaged in a vain work, in preaching Christ crucified among the people.

“In some places, as the details will show, there has been no actual increase in numbers, but a decrease, showing that discipline has been maintained. Other places really seem as if the soil were entirely barren ; and seeing nothing year after year is a sore trial of patience, and should lead to deep searchings for the reason.

“In every case of advance, the progress has been very slow, and all experience in this country only tends to strengthen the opinion that it will be so, unless God should be pleased to work in an extraordinary way.

“At the Pettah, the Sabbath services, the prayer meetings, church meetings, have been sustained with but few interruptions from weather, &c. Mr. Dunlop has occupied the pulpit in the morning and myself in the evening. During three months, perhaps, I have had to occupy it the whole day, on account of Mr. Dunlop's absence ; and the result has been four additions and two deaths. Apart from an increased attendance in the morning every other Sabbath, there being no service at the Dutch Presbyterian Church, the congregation is about the same. The Sabbath school is pretty well attended, and the Church generally may be said to be in a tolerably healthy condition. There are a few things perhaps which need to be altered. There is not quite so much harmony as ought to exist among brethren of the same family. We hope, however, that the warm sun will speedily disperse the little clouds. On the other hand, there is a spirit of union manifested generally that augurs well for the cause of Christ, in the main. All through the year union meetings for prayer have been sustained ; and especially has it been so through the past week, in accordance with the invitation

sent forth some time ago. May the great Lord of all the churches hear the prayers that were presented with every returning day, and pour out His Spirit till the wilderness shall rejoice and blossom as the rose.

“At Grand Pass six were received, some of them from Matura, and one was restored, whilst one died and three were excluded. One of the exclusions was a case of superstition on the part of an ignorant old woman. Having recourse to charms and other heathenish ceremonies, acts as a spell on the minds of people here, and forms perhaps one of the most terrible barriers to the spread of Christianity that we have to contend with. The other was a case of immorality on the part of a clever educated young man, who might, through divine grace, have proved a good labourer in the Lord's vineyard. The minister says, in his report, that he has to complain of the want of activity on the part of some, and of negligence on the part of others, that proves a stumbling-block. He speaks, on the other hand, cheerfully of the consistent conduct of some, and their pious attempts to advance the cause. He also gives a pleasing account of a few, who in the providence of God, are removed to a distance from Colombo, with whom he corresponds. The services on Lord's day at Grand Pass and Mattakooly have been sustained, as also week-evening services in these and other places, and the attendance has been encouraging.

“At Byamville, under the pastorate of John Melder, one was restored to the Church, one died, and three were excluded ; two of the three for marrying with idolaters. In his communication there is not so much said about the Church as might have been ; there is much about the poverty—*i. e.* temporal poverty—of the people, and the opposition encountered from relatives and neighbours ; but that is all. The people of the district are for the most part Buddhists and Papists, and are exceedingly unconcerned about the

Gospel ; and yet he hopes that the Lord is blessing the Word, and that a spirit of inquiry prevails.

“ At Makawitte, Oogalboda and Yak-kodoowa, under the charge of Hendrick Perera, a student from Kandy, four have been baptized, two received, and one excluded.

“ At Oogalboda, the small chapel, commenced when Mr. Underhill was here, was opened, and since that auspicious day, the attendance has been rather better. At Kaluwalgoda there are but few members now ; many have gone back, and walk no more with us. At Makawitte there is a little life, and I do hope it will prove life in reality. At Hendelle there is nothing save a congregation of thirty to thirty-five people ; why it is that there is no conversion I cannot say, but it is very, very sad year after year to find it so. At Welisere also the people meet and hear the Word, and go apparently as they came, unprofitable hearers, unbenefited, unblest.

“ At Wailgama and Hanwelle it is much the same ; nothing has to be recorded of them but one exclusion at each place. Between the two they number forty-three members, and whenever I have been there especially at Wailgama, the people, to the number of thirty-five or forty, have seemed to be exceedingly attentive to the preaching of the Word. They also keep up their prayer meeting ; and why there is not more prosperity in those as well as in other places is often a subject of very anxious thought. Would that the good Lord would be pleased to visit these dry and barren places with a shower from above.

“ At Pittompey, six miles beyond, a member, who finds it difficult for himself and family to come to Hanwelle every Sunday, has built at his own expense, and furnished, a small neat chapel, which I opened a couple of months ago, or more. The congregation was over a hundred, and the preacher at Wailgama tells me in his returns, that fifty, and sometimes more, attend regularly, and that he really hopes

to see some fruit by-and-bye. May the good man's hopes be realized in seeing a people raised up by the Lord himself.

“ At Gonawelle, the other student, Juan Sylva, has laboured through the year with only a short interruption from sickness, during which I supplied his pulpit. There have been no additions, but the report gives eight enquirers, so that there is hope that his ministrations are beginning to tell. The congregation there is always encouraging, averaging about ninety, and the school exceedingly well attended and taught.

“ At Kottigahawatte, Whytoo Nadan has continued to labour amid feebleness of body and failing health. His report of his station is quite unique in expression ; were it not that the idiom would baffle you I would send it entire. I cannot refrain, however, from giving you a few of the utterances of the old man, revealing his deep feeling, and letting you into the secrets of his heart. Of course, I shall give it in more idiomatic English. He begins with his school-boy days, before Mr. Chater's time, and speaks also of being taught by him ; says how many of his school-fellows, high and low, rich and poor, have passed away, and how many who remain, are wandering here and there wasting their precious time, while others are in Government employ, and are only nominal Christians. He notes also how many of those who have been teachers and pastors to him—some older, some younger than himself, are gone to their rest before him.

“ Then he passes on to God's marvellous kindness to him, how he cannot understand the depth, breadth, height, and longitude of the love and power of God. He says : ‘ I am not worthy to stand before the thrice holy God of Heaven ; I am the meanest wretchedest worm in the world. My might and power are no more than the dust of the ground ; and yet God has kept me alive in this world about sixty years—praise and glory be to Him. Now my soul and life are in His hand, and I am subject

to His will. I know and believe that He will not drive out those who are called in Him through the merits of our blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The God of Heaven has abundantly loved me—a great sinner, and has been pleased to purchase me from the captivity of Satan, by the precious blood of his only begotten Son, the Redeemer of the world.

“ I feel that the merciful God has been pleased to make me a labourer in His vineyard, and has graciously delighted to provide me with every necessity which I require for my bodily support up to the present day, through the medium of the Society. My might is not sufficient to render them a reward. There is the great Rewarder who can reward them sufficiently, whilst I can only pray for them, and hope to see them hereafter in Heaven. Who can value the soul of man? Who can save the soul of man from Satan’s power, except the Son of Man, Christ Jesus? I feel and believe that God has loved and chosen me to serve him, and has provided a jungle-field of labour, and has given me strength to labour in it, and He only knows the heart of the man, and whether I am labouring for Him to the extent of my ability and talent. I believe there is a reward for men according to their deeds, whether bad or good.’

“ Then follows, in reference to the character of the people, their treatment of the Gospel, the difficulty of convincing them, and persuading them to seek the Lord, in a similar strain.

“ No changes have been made in matters there, except one removal by death. The congregation is about as usual; the schools are doing tolerably well, and fifteen are set down as inquirers.

“ At Kalany there is a small cause, superintended by Whytoo; I preached there yesterday morning, about seven miles from Colombo. The little chapel was built by the Modliar, in Mr. Daniell’s time, but the cause has not much advanced. It is in the midst of Buddhists, and nearly opposite one of the most celebrated, and

at certain seasons, one of the most frequented temples in the island. There are fourteen members, but the congregation seldom numbers more than twenty. I suspect a more sterling and decided piety is needed to contend successfully with the system fostered on the other side. Whether the apathetic character of the native can be so far transformed, is a matter to be seen perhaps hereafter.

“ At Tomboville, far in the opposite direction, Johannes, the Kottigahawatte reader, labours two days weekly, and Juan Sylva goes once a month also. Nothing is reported of the station except one death. From the account given by Johannes, it appears that he was a good man, and did all he could in the way of exhorting his fellow-members and the men of the village to follow the Lord, praying with them and for them, and that he died in the Lord.

“ You will see that most of the native missionaries are pluralists, a thing by no means desirable, yet difficult to remedy; indeed, at present quite beyond our power, for want of men and means. I, too, am a pluralist to a very wide extent. Let any one count up the number of stations, besides which there are many other preaching places, and it will be seen that one missionary cannot tend them all successfully. To go beyond seems out of the question, and yet there is a vast field before us, and there are openings which invite—but in vain.

“ More European help is needed, and so also is native help; Ceylon especially is backward in taking up the work. Young men are far from disposed to give themselves. The churches furnish next to no agents. Some having laboured awhile in connection with Missions, have given up on the plea that they could not live on the salaries given to them.

“ And what is to be done I know not, unless it be to look to the Lord of the harvest, and ask Him to raise up men who will be satisfied with what they received at other employ, and a people willing to

give of their temporal things to those who minister to them in spiritual things. The schools supported by the Mission suffice for learning to read the Bible, and to write a little, with a few other simple matters; beyond which they are not of much value as educational apparatus; but we do not profess to be educationalists. If we did we must find able teachers, or give up the attempt. It seems necessary at present to help our people to raise their children a little in the scale of civilization; and so we do the best we can with the funds at our disposal.

"The female boarding-school has also been sustained through the year with the average number of children, that is twenty, a number that might be increased at pleasure if room and means were ours. There has been the usual success in the way of mental improvement, though not altogether apart from difficulties and trials. The girls trained here are very much sought after by the ladies of the community, for various offices; but the prejudices of the country rise up in opposition to such a disposition of them, and the result generally is, that we are welcome to retain them up to a certain age, when they are taken away and remain at home till they are married.

"For the future, I hope to build all chapels—and I have three in prospect—by means of the auxiliary raising special contributions, in addition to the ordinary, which I hope will be increased. They have just now raised £50 for Mattakooly Chapel, the people to raise another £50."

2.—Kandy.

Missionary, CHARLES CARTER.

Number of members, 64.

We have received from Mr. Carter the following report:—

"The past year has been one of great things for many parts of the world, copious showers of heavenly grace having watered

them, and made them as the garden of the Lord. I wish I could report such things of Ceylon.

"Our barrenness and the many defections amongst us have made us painfully conscious of our lack of Divine influence, and our need of vital power from on high to uphold, sanctify, and save. If this sense of our need does but lead us to continued and earnest appeals at the throne of grace, all may yet be well.

"We were compelled by sickness to spend the first two months of the past year in Colombo. Whilst there I visited most of our native churches, and preached to them. The people met in every place in considerable numbers, and the welcome they gave me was very cheering. I preached also several times in English. On my return I made a week's tour with brother Garnier, amongst the coffee estates, and we preached to about 1,400 coolies. During the months of March, April, and May I was out a great deal in Kandy, preaching to the crowds who come at that season to present their offerings and worship at the temple. The weakness of my throat, however, prevented me doing all the open-air work I desired. The Sunday services in the Kandy chapel have been conducted chiefly by myself. Mr. Perera assisted me occasionally, but is now quite incapacitated for doing so again. The afternoon service has been conducted occasionally by one or other of the students.

"The students have made fair progress in preparedness for the work of the ministry. Two of them have now been here under instruction three years; but as there have been many interruptions to their studies, especially the six months during which I was finishing the translation, it is desirable they should stay until the other two have finished their course, which will be one and a half years longer. Three of them have made good progress in English, and are able to read English theological works with profit. A little attention has been given to arithmetic, and they have passed through the ordinary rules as far as vulgar fractions. They have also read

several historical and theological works in Singhalese.

"My plan has been to discuss each subject with them, and then to dictate the leading points and proofs, which they wrote down and afterwards amplified. A sermon during the first half of the year, and during the latter half an essay on one of the subjects previously discussed was read in class, once a week, by the students in turn. They have preached occasionally in the Kandy chapel, and have regularly conducted three week evening services in as many different places in Kandy. They have in every way thus far proved themselves to be disinterested, zealous, and intelligent workmen, and preachers of the Word.

"The services in the Kandy chapel have not been quite so well attended this year as usual. Many adverse influences have been at work, and as far as results are concerned, have rendered the year one of great barrenness and discouragement. Some of our members have grievously fallen, and others, who still have a name to live, have resisted our kindest and most earnest efforts to arouse them from their supineness to a sense of their duty to God, the church, and the world. Services have been regularly conducted in the gaol, both in Singhalese and Tamil. It often taxes our utmost skill and forbearance to keep the Singhalese prisoners from manifesting hostility towards us.

"In Kandy, and many of the villages of the central province, both the students and myself have preached the Gospel to large numbers of Buddhists, and though our labours have not been blessed to the conversion of any that we know of, the Word has often been favourably received.

"An edition of 1,000 copies of the Gospel of John and the Epistle to the Romans has been printed, and a portion of them sold during the past year. A large number of tracts and portions of Scripture have been distributed; great care has been exercised in their distribution, having been given only to persons who seemed anxious to obtain and read them.

"Matelle.

"The state of the church in this place has somewhat improved; there is a spirit of activity and zeal in some of the members. One of them has lately erected a schoolroom at Hoolangamma, where he lives, a village about one mile and a half from Matelle. The teacher, another member, has left a good situation in order to take charge of the school, and his salary has been paid by the Matelle church and congregation. They find some difficulty, however, in raising £2 per month, and I have applied to some friends in England to assist them in supporting the school.

"Besides the regular services in the chapel and gaol on Sunday, and in several houses during the week, Thomas Garnier has preached in and around Matelle, and in the coolie shed, and made several tours to the estates.

"Philip has conducted the service in the Kandy gaol in Tamil, preached to the coolies in the streets, and to a large number on many estates.

"Ranasinghe has had regular services in Gampola. He has spoken the Word of Life to the people in their shops, in the rest houses, and on the highways; he has visited again and again many villages for a considerable distance around Gampola. A man died last year at Gampola, who was once bitterly opposed to him, but afterwards heard the Word gladly, and had regular services in his house. There was hope in his death. From some persons Ranasinghe meets with much opposition, but others receive him favourably, and listen attentively. I have accompanied him in his labours, and can testify to the tact and kindness with which he goes to work; still nothing decided has yet been effected.

"The Mahagamma school was opened in March, and within six weeks there were no less than sixty-three names on the list, and a daily attendance of fifty-one boys. This continued until the excessive drought brought on fever and other sicknesses,

which thinned the school, and laid up both the teacher and his father, who was living with him.

"In many respects the past year has been one of great trial and discouragement; the work of conversion seems to be at a stand-still, and many of our members to be going back to worldliness, indifference, and sin.

"I trust that during the present year the Spirit of God will be poured out largely upon us, to sanctify His people, and through them to bless the world."

WEST INDIES.

TRINIDAD.

I.—PORT OF SPAIN.

Missionary, J. LAW.

Number of members, 56.

Mr. Law has furnished us with the following very brief report:—

"I have little to say except that I am well, and every day engaged in the work of the Lord. Besides my usual labours, I have had for some time a meeting every week among the Chinese, a Chinese Christian acting as interpreter. The other new work is a weekly Bible-class on Wednesday forenoon. About thirty-four young people attend, all of whom, with the exception of four, can read the Bible. This is a most interesting and promising field of labour. I look upon it as a nursery for the Church both on earth and heaven.

"There are a few candidates for baptism."

The whole number of Scriptures circulated during the year from the Bible Depository, of which Mr. Law is secretary, is about 1,000 copies.

II.—SAVANNA GRANDE.

Missionary, W. H. GAMBLE.

Number of members, 215.

Mr. Gamble has been much occupied in removing the mission house from the locality called "The Mission," into the town of San Fernando. We are without any full

report of the churches, owing, we presume, to this cause. We regret, however, to hear that Mr. Hamilton, the pastor of the church at Fifth Company, is dead. He had been a preacher for more than *forty* years. The cause of his death was small-pox, which disease has been very fatal in the colony.

BAHAMAS.

I.—NEW PROVIDENCE, NASSAU AND THREE SUB-STATIONS, AND SIX OUT-ISLANDS.

Missionary, JOHN DAVEY.

Number of members, 1,678.

We have received the following report from the missionary:—

"The year that has passed has been a year of blessing. It has been a year of work, and the Lord has blessed that work. Fifty were added to the church in May, who up to this time, as far as my knowledge extends, have walked worthy of their profession; and some sixty more are before the church for baptism. Our large chapel has been so crowded that we have at length resolved to give increased accommodation by the erection of an end gallery. The funds, too, have still increased, so that for the carrying on of the work of God in this and six other islands, not one penny has been drawn from the funds of the society beyond my own salary. And in addition to the carrying forward of very extensive improvements on our chapels and supplementary to the extent of £55 13s. 9½*d.*, the salaries of the native teachers, I am happy to say that we can give at least £30 in addition to the funds of the society. I have every reason to believe, too, that the circumstances of our native teachers are improving.

"My visits to the out-islands during the past year have not been so numerous as on former occasions; but this arose chiefly from our anticipating for some months in the earlier part of the year the arrival of the deputation. I pay several visits in the course of the year to Fox-hill and Ade-

laide, and occasionally go to Dunmore, though the members at that station belong to this church.

"Andros Island.

"I am sorry to say that this island, and I may almost say the Bahamas Missiou, has suffered loss through the death of our excellent brother Edward Hall, who was the teacher on this island. I scarcely recollect a death which more sorrowfully affected me than his. He was with us about Christmas, and on the 4th of February was in heaven. Then why weep?

'Why *do* we mourn departing friends, Or shake at death's alarms?'

"If there are any persons that missionaries love more than others, they are pious, devoted native teachers. They cheer him in his work, and lead him to hope that when he is gone, and missionaries are entirely withdrawn from the people, that the churches which he has helped to nourish will not be left without competent spiritual instructors.

"Grand Bahama.

"Our teacher at this island is a good, quiet man, but I think rather too quiet for his work. I cannot find that he has gone beyond the limits of his own settlement during the year. When I was at the island some time ago, he urged me very much to secure for him a piece of land, on which there was a dwelling-house, for 250 dollars. I did so in becoming responsible, in connexion with another gentleman, for the payment of the money to the bank from which it had been borrowed. Into the bank I have paid one pound per month from the funds of the station towards the payment of the money, he in the meantime receiving what sums are raised on Grand Bahama. I hope to visit the island in a few weeks.

"Eleuthera.

"As Mr. Underhill visited this island in his tour through the Bahamas, there will not be any occasion for me to say more about it than that matters have improved a little.

"San Salvador.

"The churches in this island are in a tolerably healthy state, and a new one is about to be formed at Arthur's Town, a settlement at the north end of the island, and one of some importance. From the letter which accompanied the returns, I make the following extract:—'I have returned from the south end; I was, however, very sick during the whole sixteen days I was out; but, blessed be God, I was enabled to perform all what I had to do in the churches up there completely. I preached the Word, settled differences; held church meetings; administered the Lord's Supper; and baptized ten candidates—three at Port Home, and seven at the Bight.'

"Exuma.

"As I have not been able to visit this island lately, and our teacher has sent no particulars about the churches, I can only state respecting it, that public worship has been duly observed at all the settlements, and the Word of God read and expounded. There has been no increase to the churches during the year.

"Ragged Island.

"This is one of the smallest and poorest of the inhabited islands of the Bahamas, and during the past year several of the most intelligent members of the church have had to leave the island for a time in quest of employment. They have now returned, and I hope to visit them soon."

II.—INAGUA, AND FIVE OUT-ISLAND STATIONS.

Missionary, WILLIAM LITTLEWOOD.

Number of members, 566.

Mr. Littlewood furnishes the following report:—

"The events of the year, as they relate to this station, are of a mingled nature, and call for humility and shame on the one hand, and for gratitude and encouragement on the other. A few of our young members, of whom we hoped well, disappointed us, either by lukewarmness

or open sin, some of whom have gone back and walk no more with us. Their places have, however, been more than filled up by others who have, as we hope, been savingly converted, thirty-two having been baptized, leaving fifty-four candidates on the list, most of whom, in all probability, will be added to the church during the year, with others whom God in his mercy may lead to the Cross. Our congregations are large and attentive, and from the more regular and steady habits of many we would fain hope that a few, at least, are more than mere hearers of the word of life. I think, too, we have evidences of utility following the visit of our deputation to the Bahamas, an event looked forward to with much interest, and will be long remembered as an instance of special regard on the part of our home friends, in whose confidence we had long confided; but from personal intercourse, sympathy, and affection, the bond of union is more tightly drawn, and our identity realized, which influences and encourages alike the missionary in his toils, and the people whom he has gathered under the gospel wing. And it is not too much, nor out of place, perhaps, to say that, although we always loved our home friends, which we believed was fully reciprocated, it was the love one has for unseen brethren; but since our eyes have seen, and our hands have handled a real representative in the person of brother Underhill, our affection is intensified. And we thank you most sincerely for this fraternal act of Christian regard. It would have been as difficult for you to have made a more suitable choice, as it would have been for any other to have given more encouragement, or greater satisfaction to us. The missionaries and their churches were delighted, and anxiously followed our brother and his beloved companion in prayer, for heaven's blessings to attend their voyaging over these seas; and it was with sentiments of extraordinary pleasure that we heard of their safe arrival in England. You will now have a more correct idea of the nature of our field of labour, and from

our brother's report of the good done through your agents in these sea-girt isles, you will be encouraged to help us in our labours of love.

"Our Sabbath-schools at Inagua have improved much since our brother was here, both in relation to teachers and scholars.

"I have just purchased the house in Smith's Town, in which we have been accustomed to conduct our religious services. It will be converted into a chapel, and be made available for a larger congregation; and as we have in contemplation the enlargement of our chapel in Matthew Town, we shall have increased need of funds, but you will see by the estimate of expenses for the current year—which is less than that of last year—we intend to relieve you by taking an additional burden upon ourselves. But we really require the help of our friends at home, and if some few boxes of useful and fancy articles were prepared and sent to us for sale, they would be of immense service, and could not possibly be more judiciously appropriated.

"Here is an outlet for Christian liberality, which will justify your recommendation, and the prompt and liberal response of our numerous English friends.

"We have suffered in the fallen character of our teacher at Long Island. Nor have we yet been able to fill the vacancy with a suitable substitute.

"During the year two native brethren have been set apart for the pastorate of churches; brother George Hall at Rum Cay, and brother Essex Wilson at Long Island. They seem to be doing well. Brother George Green, at Long Cay, writes encouragingly. These and other brethren would be greatly aided by a grant of a few pounds' worth of suitable books. Brother Underhill would have a good idea of what are required."

III.—GRAND TURK, CONSISTING OF
THREE ISLANDS.

Missionary, W. R. RYCROFT.

Number of members, 452.

2.—*St. Domingo.*

Port au Plat.

Number of members, 30

We present the following report from Mr. Rycroft :—

“We are happy in being able to inform you that here the general state of our mission is encouraging. Numbers have come to Christ, and before hundreds of men witnessed a good confession in the Lord’s ordinance of baptism. Sinners are shaking off sin, and seeking the one thing needful, while our congregations are regularly made up of a people attached to us, who, while I write, hold prayer meetings for the fulfilment of predicted events before daybreak, and at night fill the house of God, and supplicate the Divine favour.

“The esteemed visit of our beloved brother Underhill and lady will not soon be forgotten here. The only regret is that it was so short, and cannot be soon repeated. We are thankful for the mercy which conveyed them home again safely.

“Our young brother, S. Kerr, has been diligently at work throughout the year in the Caicos, and not in vain. Showers of grace have attended the ministry of the Word, and men and women converted to God. The ordinance of baptism in the Lord’s appointed way has frequently been administered in the creeks of the islands, and in the margin of the deep blue sea. Twenty-four Christian friends have given a practical illustration of the good old way.”

The native brother, S. Kerr, labouring in Caicos Island, has written the following letter:—

“At Lorimers we are grateful to say that a new spirit has appeared to come over our dear people, their conversation at the mission house, as also at their own houses during my visits at intervals, is more of an inquiring nature; there seems to be a

shaking of the dry bones, as in the valley of Ezekiel’s vision. Hitherto my time has been occupied in meeting leaders, Sunday school teachers, and inquirers for Scripture instruction, besides preaching, administering ordinances, school duties, itineratings, prayer meetings, &c.; and in proportion as the love of Christ inflames the heart, more earnest and frequent inquiries are made after truth. I need not mention the pleasure this gives me, to study more profoundly the Sacred Volume to meet earnest inquirers.

“The Sabbath school is in a flourishing condition, many of the more mature scholars attend the several classes, of whom I have sanguine expectation. On a Sabbath of this new year, four put on Christ by baptism; three were young persons, who gave much satisfaction and pleasure in their experience of the Christian religion, one a young man, and promises future usefulness; he reads well, and sustains an excellent character. I have engaged him to give out hymns in public services.

“I expect we shall have to increase the dimensions of our chapel, and add a few pews, as soon as a fund can be raised.

“At Bumbarrow our chapel is nearly finished, we are about to lay the floor; the next thing to be done is arranging seats. The cause of this hindrance to the progress of the work is owing to the failure of the crop rather than a want of spirit to go forward. Many were in straightened circumstances.

“I visited Cockburn Harbour a week ago, and scattered the seed of sacred truth both within the walls of the schoolroom, and in the highway, to a crowded congregation of all classes. There were three salt vessels lying in the harbour, awaiting a cargo, by which means I succeeded in raising £4 7s. 6d. towards San Domingo Mission.

“You will observe a clear increase of the churches for the year of twenty-one; we trust that such a pleasing state of things will continue, and the glory be ascribed to Him who sits upon the throne, and to the Lamb for ever.

"My fear is lest I should not be able to maintain this good brother here. Our dear people do what they can for his support, but their ability cannot be confided in, seasons varying, and with them their means. This has been the case this year, which obliges me reluctantly to draw upon the Society. Most of our salt rakers have lost instead of gaining this year. Money is scarce with all parties, and the inhabitants not a little distressed.

"By former letters you will have learned that nearly half the year I have spent in St. Domingo, leaving Mr. D. S. Kerr to preside over Turks Island in my absence. We have but just returned, and are happy to find all the duties of the station have been satisfactorily performed.

"St. Domingo, as all know, is a land beautiful in its scenery, but darkened and defaced by soul-destructive error, superstition, and folly. The distinction, however, between the moral character and habits of the Protestant missionaries and those of the Catholic priesthood favourably contrasts before the people. This gives us some favour, and a ready access to the inhabitants' houses, homes, and minds. I have had no door closed against me, but the contrary.

"Often it has been a grief not to have the Spanish Scriptures to give them when asked for; but having one spare copy, I have put it into the hands of a blind man, who goes from house to house, where the people read it, and he explains it.

"During my visit to St. Domingo, our congregation at Puerto Plata met in the dwelling of brother Treadwell, who kindly found room for my family, and for the church, in his house. But a dwelling house is anything but convenient to the mission, or consonant to the views of a Catholic country. We therefore tried what we could effect towards a fund for a proper building, and from our friends and Catholics, with others, realised some £27 4s. Other sums will be obtained when we begin in earnest. Every Lord's-day our friends put in, as the Lord has prospered

them, their napelettas. But a Catholic country cannot be expected to go very far in contributing to us. This is new ground, very hard, but still £27 is not very bad, out of such a soil too. This, added to by our tried and liberal friends of Bootle and Myrtle-street, Liverpool, will go far to ease our mind.

"During our sojourn in St. Domingo we had the pleasure, as well as the toil, of travelling over the country many miles, scattering the good seed of the kingdom far and wide. Mono, Batty, and Caberet received also our attention, and but for the rains and sickness other places would have had our presence.

"We found the meetings at the country stations had been pretty well kept up during our absence, and our brethren were very happy to see us amongst them. Their influence and our worship is not without some beneficial effect on the surrounding population, and would, doubtless, be much more so had they the presence of efficient agency. This must be had if at a cost. Out of a number of candidates, some were chosen for baptism. We administered the sacred rite at noon of the Lord's-day. It was indeed a lovely, enchanting sight.

"We left the island amid the tears of our Baptist friends, and the apparent regret of our Catholic friends, who had not only welcomed us to their shore with presents of the fruits of the land, but also sent us away laden with the same as tokens of their warm friendship. Acts the 28th, in some respects, may illustrate our case; for the [reputed] barbarous people showed us no little kindness. May the Lord amply repay it in the saving application of his truth.

"I had the honour of an interview with the General of Puerto Plata, who very kindly granted my request in freeing the young friends mentioned in brother Murphy's letter from military duty. The duty formerly given as soldiers to the government will now be, as to time, devoted to the service of the mission. This is something."

HAYTI.

JACMEL.

*Missionaries, W. H. WEBLEY, V. BOUHON,
E. BAUMANN.*

Number of members, 55.

The following extracts from Mr. Webley's letters will convey a general view of the encouraging prospects of this Mission :—

“Last year was with us the most prosperous it has ever been our privilegè to pass in Hayti. We had no sooner excluded from the Church those who were causing divisions, than God began to bless us. During the year, fifteen precious souls were added to us. I baptized on New Year's Eve, and on Sunday next others are to be proposed to the Church. What with Christmas service, Watchnight service, New Year's Eve, protracted prayer-meetings, all this week, our usual services, country visits, and cottage building, I am sometimes tired. Blessed be God, health and strength have been imparted for the emergency. And thrice blessed be God for the glorious work now going on here. Conversions are now comparatively frequent, and the very town seems astir. The heavenly gales from Jamaica seem to have reached our shores, and we almost seem to hear the sound of the rushing of the mighty wind. Silently but surely a great work is going on here, and our poor people appear to be alive to the special duty of the time. For many years I have not witnessed such a loving, prayerful, happy spirit as that which is now being manifested. Our trials have been blessed.

“I must beg you to thank Mrs. Underhill, as well as the lady who got up the box, for their kindness and liberality in sending us such useful and saleable articles. They were unfortunately delayed a month at the custom-house, whilst we wrote to the Government to petition that the box might pass free of duty. After the delay mentioned, this was very kindly and very freely granted. Several of the articles have been already sold at good prices, and

more would have been sold had we got them early enough for New Year's fête.”

In a subsequent letter Mr. Webley writes :—

“Some singular conversions too are now taking place, and twelve persons will, I trust, soon be ready for baptism. Diana has been the instrument of the conversion of one of her school assistants, whose conversion has raised quite a stir in the town. This young person's brother called upon me, and begged me not to baptize his sister if I wished to prevent *murder*, which would surely take place. My own life and Diana's have been threatened and placed in considerable peril during the storm that raged. The poor girl is now confined to her house, and not allowed to communicate with any of us. Such has always been the intolerance of Roman Catholicism, and such it is still. Our dear Redeemer will, however, ultimately triumph, and this new-born soul given to Him will soon be given to us. The Lord support and comfort her, cheer us, and perfect what His love has begun. His Spirit has certainly been poured out upon us, and a great work is now going on here.”

Since the above, we learn that the young person referred to has been permitted by her parents to leave, and is now a resident with Mr. and Mrs. Webley. During this year the two brethren mentioned above will have joined the Mission.

JAMAICA.

1.—CALABAR INSTITUTION.

President, REV. D. J. EAST.

Normal School Tutor, A. GUNNING.

The following interesting report will give a view of the work of the past year :—

“Under the direction of the President, and with the assistance of Mr. Steele, the young men in each department have been prosecuting their studies; and it is believed, considering their previous attainments, have made encouraging progress. During the session there have been under

instruction six theological students, five normal school, and eight lay; six of the latter have been resident, and two non-resident. The average attendance of the day school has been about seventy children. The annual examination was held at Christmas, and was kindly conducted by the Rev. W. Tyson, of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, and the Rev. J. Milne, of the London Missionary Society. The following are their reports:—

“*The Rev. W. Tyson.*”

“Having presided over, and taken part in the examination of the theological students on the 19th December last, I cannot but express my satisfaction with the manner in which they have acquitted themselves.

“The general readiness and accuracy with which they answered miscellaneous questions in ‘Wayland’s Moral Science’ (Book i.), in the ‘Rules of Biblical Interpretations,’ ‘Angus’ Bible Handbook,’ pp. 139, 308; in ‘Systematic Theology,’ ‘MS. Lectures by the Principal;’ in ‘Elliott’s Critical and Grammatical Commentary on St. Paul’s Epistle to the Galatians,’ in ‘Homiletics;’ ‘Porter’s Lectures on Preaching,’ i., xi.; in general church history, from the fifth to the eighth century (MS. Lectures); and in agricultural chemistry, ‘Johnston’s Sections, i., xi.; were sufficient to prove the very great care with which their mental culture is provided for and watched over, and also on their part great comprehensiveness and tenacity of memory. While the several essays which were read in whole or part, on the nature of justification, by Mr. Maxwell,—on the adaptation of the Gospel to men’s spiritual wants, by Mr. Burke; on the infinite efficacy of the sacrifice of Christ, by Mr. Barrett; on the demerit of sin as seen in the sacrifice of Christ, by Mr. Webb; and on the believer’s sanctification of the will of God, by Mr. Service; afforded satisfactory indication of ability to make good use of the knowledge they have acquired, and promise of future progress and usefulness. Let them but continue to be, what every conscientious

minister of the Gospel will continue to be—earnest students all through life—and they are likely to afford good help in promoting the glory of God, the edification of His Church, and the interest of their people and country.

“P.S. I also examined on the 18th, the first and second classes in English history (Milner, pp. 605, 664, and pp. 1, 248), with like satisfactory results.

“On the request of the tutor and managing committee of the Calabar Institution, I conducted the first day’s examination on Tuesday, the 18th December, 1860.

“*The theological students were examined in the following subjects:—*

“1. *Latin*.—The class had read during the session the whole of the first book of Virgil, and a portion was selected for re-examination, which presented some difficulties. With the exception of one student the reading was indifferent.

“2. *Greek*.—The first five chapters of Xenophon’s *Anabasis* had been read. In this exercise the reading was very satisfactory, exhibiting much careful instruction on the part of the tutor, and diligent application on the part of the students. Indeed, it was nearly all that could have been expected or desired, with the exception of the pronunciation; which was rather faulty.

“3. *Hebrew*.—The first eight chapters of Isaiah had been read. This exercise was also satisfactory; the grammar of the language had been carefully studied and was applied with facility during the translation of the passage selected for examination.

“4. *The History of England*, from the Norman Conquest to the Revolution. The students exhibited a correct acquaintance with the great facts of English history embraced in that period.

“Considering the number of subjects which the course of training embraces,

and the few advantages enjoyed by the students, previous to their admission to the Institution, their progress in each of the above branches of study was respectable.

“*The Normal School Students* were examined in ‘Cassell’s Latin Exercises,’ ‘Crossley’s Arithmetic, to compound proportions,’ ‘Chambers’s Geometry,’ to the 24th proposition, ‘Latham’s English Grammar,’ English composition, English history, to the Norman conquest, geography of England, Europe, and America, sacred geography, and natural history. In most of the above exercises but little progress had been made. The previous training of all the students appeared to have been of a very deficient character, and much patient labour must yet be expended on them to fit them for the teacher’s office. The exercises in natural history and geography were the most satisfactory.

“*The studies of the Lay pupils* had all been of a merely elementary character. They embraced the same subjects nearly as those in which the normal school students were examined. Their exercises in history and geography were the best, the others were indifferent. In English composition several of the pupils were very deficient in the art of correct spelling.

“*Signed*,—JAMES MILNE.”

“These reports of our esteemed brethren will sufficiently indicate the course of study in each department. The committee may be permitted, however, to offer one or two explanatory statements.

“First, it will be seen how large a proportion of the studies of the theological students have been strictly theological, and in English, so that while their attention has been directed to Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, these have been duly subordinated to the former. Thus during the greater part of the session, while they were engaged in reading the first book of Virgil’s *Æneid* in Latin once a week, and Xenophon’s *Anabasis* in Greek, and the prophecies of Isaiah in Hebrew, once; ‘Wayland’s Moral Science,’ and ‘Angus’s Bible Handbook,’ were brought up twice a week;

systematic theology from once to four times a-week; church history, once; homiletics, once; sermons and skeletons of sermons for criticism, once; ‘Ellicott’s Notes on the Epistle to the Galatians’ once; and English history once. The proportion of attention to English and theological studies thus having been *ten to three* of Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, together.

“The low standard of acquirements at which the state of education in this country has compelled the committee to admit young men and lads to the normal school and lay departments, will explain the elementary character of the instruction which it has been necessary to give. Indeed, they have sometimes hesitated whether or not to receive some applications that have been made for admission. Yet on the other hand, where friends have been willing, at great personal sacrifice, to offer their sons the moral, religious, and social, as well as educational advantages which the institution offers, the committee have been reluctant to refuse them the opportunity. They will, however, gladly hail a larger number of more advanced students, to whom the higher branches of knowledge will be available.

“Reference was made in the last report to prize essays, which had been written by the theological and normal school students respectively, on ‘the Life and Times of Luther and Columbus,’ and ‘the Discovery of the West Indies.’

“The following is the report of the deputation who kindly undertook to adjudicate upon them:—

“Mr. Brown and I have gone over the essays: we propose to arrange them as follows:—

“Generally we are much pleased with them. The composition is good and shows much care.

"Two theological students, Messrs. Facey and Maxwell, completed their term of study in the Institution at the close of the session. Mr. Facey has passed through a fiery ordeal, from which, the committee rejoice to add, he has come forth with a clear and blameless character; while his meek and manly and Christian bearing have commended him to the sympathy and affection of the committee. For the present he is engaged in preaching the Gospel at Mount Carey, Shortwood, and Bethel-town, during the absence of their pastor, the Rev. E. Hewett. Mr. Maxwell has received and accepted the cordial invitation of the church at Fuller's Field. His public recognition has already taken place, and he has entered on his labours with highly encouraging prospects of success.

"The library of the Institution has been enriched by two valuable presentations of books; one from J. Ryland, Esq., of Northampton, through the Rev. F. Trestrail, consisting of 'Malte Brun's Geography,' in ten volumes, bound in calf; the other, the 'Eclectic Review,' complete, from the commencement, from the Rev. F. Trestrail himself.

"The committee cannot close this report without referring to the great religious awakening which has happily extended over so large a portion of the land, and expressing the hope that one fruit of it may be the early consecration of earnest-minded and spiritually gifted young men to the service of Christ, either as ministers of the Gospel, or as teachers of the young. The demand of the churches for faithful men of God, to watch for their souls, is increasing with the times which are passing over us; and never was the call so loud upon the sons of Jamaica who have felt the power of God's love in their hearts to devote themselves to this work."

"The normal school during the past session has been under the general superintendence of the president of the Institution, with the valuable assistance of Mr. Steele, by whom the studies of the normal school students have been mainly con-

ducted. There have been five young men under instruction.

"The annual examination held at Christmas, was kindly conducted by the Rev. J. Milne, of the London Missionary Society, in connection with the other departments.

"The young men in this department have read and submitted to repeated examinations in the practical portions of 'Dunn's Principles of Teaching;' they have prepared in rotation, for criticism, a weekly essay on some moral and religious subject, and they have also prepared and delivered weekly an object lesson in the day school, which they have also attended during one portion of the day, to assist in the instruction of the scholars. The object lessons have been given in the presence of the tutor and of the students, and have both before and after delivery been subject to criticism.

"The day-school has continued to suffer from the want of a bridge across the Rio Bueno, and the difficulty at times of fording the river. But taking the year through, the attendance has not been much below the average of former years, having been about seventy children. A public examination was held in the month of July, which afforded great satisfaction to those who were present, and was highly creditable to the late teacher, Mr. Ellis.

"Before this report is in circulation, the institution will be provided with the second tutor from England, whose primary duties will be in the conduct of the Normal School.

"On the recommendation of the deputation of the Baptist Missionary Society, that body has agreed to render to the Jamaica committee such annual aid as is required; and the services of a gentleman have been secured, whose high testimonials warrant the assurance of his eminent competency and suitability to the position he is about to assume.

"And as they have reason to expect a considerable increase in the number of students, they hereby appeal to their friends

of education for more ample means of support. The recent religious movement in the land has brought to light a fearful amount of ignorance and superstition, which nothing but the multiplication of schools and the training of a more efficient class of teachers can overtake.

"The committee, moreover, have the means of knowing that at the present time some schools, in important and populous localities, are closed for the want of masters of a higher order. Never, therefore, was there greater need of their labours in connection with the Normal School, which it has been for the last seven years their privilege to conduct."

2.—JAMAICA.

Although the churches in the island are entirely independent of the Society, recent events have made their condition one of deep interest. We therefore append the following passages from the annual report of the churches connected with the Jamaica Baptist Union. It does not embrace the churches under the care of the Revs. J. Hume, S. Oughton, J. Reid, and J. Clarke, and perhaps a few others.

"In last year's report we had to lament that though prayer had been offered, and efforts had been put forth to promote the spiritual prosperity of the churches, yet, save in two or three instances, the results were not satisfactory. Religion did not appear to be in a healthy state. With a view to rouse professing Christians, and secure a revival of true godliness, a series of suggestions was submitted to the churches at large, in the hope that in answer to the petitions presented, at a throne of grace, the Lord would send prosperity, and visit his vine and the vineyard which his right hand had planted. Generally the plans recommended were carried out, but in many cases apparently in vain.

"He, however, who knoweth when, and how, and by what instrumentality to manifest his love and power, first allowed his people to feel their own perfect weakness

and helplessness, and to attest that it is no by might nor by power,' and then, 'in pity to His own name,' he opened the windows of heaven, and sent down his blessing in rich and abundant showers on many parts of Zion, filling the hearts of his servants with exceeding great joy. From the month of September a very remarkable revival of religion commenced in the parish of Westmoreland, and has continued exerting its influence and spreading to neighbouring districts.

Up to December 31, about forty-eight out of the sixty-one churches in the union have come under the influence which is abroad. In every instance, we believe, careless sinners and backsliders have been roused from their slumbers, and reminded of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment, whilst a revival of religion has been witnessed in many of the members of the churches. In some places the blessing has been received and enjoyed by large numbers of Christians, whilst in other places the churches do not appear to have been quickened so extensively as could be wished. Reports accordingly give corresponding statements of the work. One says, 'The great Head of the Church has graciously visited us with the outpouring of the influences of His Holy Spirit during the closing months of the year, and as the result the languishing graces of his people have been revived, and multitudes of the ungodly around have been awakened.' Another report says, 'About the month of July the class, however, began to be filled, and in the month of October, in many instances, they became crowded; but it was not until Monday, the 5th of November, that physical manifestation of a great awakening began to show itself in one of the class houses; and it continued to progress from class to class, and to the chapels. Until the end of the year there was a hungering and thirsting after the Word of God, the places of worship being crowded.' Another says, 'In the month of November a most remarkable work commenced at all the stations, and great numbers, especially

of young persons, have been aroused to a sense of heir sin and danger.' Again, 'Before the year closed, the Lord opened the windows of heaven, and poured out a blessing far beyond what we ventured to anticipate. Many were awakened from their guilty slumbers, and deeply convinced of sin. They sought the Lord and found Him, and were enabled to rejoice in his salvation. Not a few of them were amongst the vilest sinners in the neighbourhood.' 'In December,' says another report, 'we were mercifully visited with a revival of religion, in consequence of which we have had largely increased congregations, numerous additions to the inquirers and penitent classes, and we hope a deeper toned piety, and general earnestness in the churches.'

"All the reports of the churches sent testify to the fact that God has not been unmindful of his covenant, but has in much love led many to receive the salvation of their souls. Very few of the reports enter into particulars of the *physical manifestations* which have marked the revival. But in many places these have been numerous, marked, and in some places unusual. It will, perhaps, be found that in proportion to the excitement have been the prostrations and bodily demonstrations, some of which have been of a painful and humiliating character, and not to be countenanced for a moment.

"In some places Obeahism and Myallism have sought to gain ascendancy, foolish prophecies and wild statements have been uttered and believed by some. In not a few cases bodily demonstrations have been regarded as essential to and part of real religion. Here and there the idea has prevailed that the religion of the prostrated is superior to that of other Christians, and is not to be judged of by the Word of God. The utterances and doings of the stricken ones have very often been accepted as all the work of the Holy Spirit.

"We rejoice to be able to state that the *wakeful, diligent, and persevering* efforts of pastors and officers to correct some of the

evils have been attended with happy results; but continued and manful, yet kind and Scriptural care must be exercised over the movement, so that only what is good may be encouraged and cultivated.

"Whilst as Christians we must mourn over and correct evils, we must not forget to bless God for the great and incalculable good bestowed. We can exclaim, 'The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad;' and we are confident, too, that our Heavenly Father is ready to bless his people yet more abundantly. We see places of worship generally crowded, classes are well attended, great numbers are anxious about their souls, backsliders in large numbers are forsaking their evil ways, some of the most abandoned men and women have been arrested in their wicked ways, quarrels are less frequent, drunkenness and drinking are lessened, law suits have decreased, and flagrant sins are less common. May these and other happy results of this awakening be permanent, and may the people generally throughout the land become thoroughly imbued with a Gospel spirit, and eminently distinguished by Gospel life.

"As the awakening commenced late in the year in several of the churches, the pastors have refrained from reporting many as inquirers who eventually will be received, and of whom we hope it shall be said that they are as 'trees planted by rivers of water, bringing forth fruit in season, whose leaves wither not.' The number of inquirers in sixty churches, as reported last year, was 1,794. This year fifty-seven churches return 5,922 inquirers, which shows that there is an increase of 4,128 over last year—a circumstance which will fill every Christian with gratitude and joy.

"From the reports sent it appears that two chapels, one at Kettering, in Tre-lawney, and the other at Paradise, in Clarendon, have been opened for Divine service. Several places of worship are in course of erection, or are undergoing repairs. Some of the churches which are

engaged in this good work are comparatively small, and in want of aid from their stronger sister churches.

"Returns have been sent in from fifty-seven out of the sixty-one churches in the Union, but so many as nineteen of these returns showing the statistics of the stations are unaccompanied with the report asked for by the rules of the union. In thirty-four churches there have been additions by baptism. In thirteen churches no baptism has taken place. In all the churches save two, persons who have professed repentance, on account of the sin for which they were excluded, have been restored. In forty-five churches there is an increase of 739 persons, and in ten a decrease of 114, giving a nett increase of 625 individuals, or an average nett increase of nearly eleven to each church. The returns, as presented by the tabular view, give the following results—

WESTERN AFRICA.

Missionaries, A. SAKER, J. DIBOLL, R. SMITH, J. PINNOCK, J. J. FULLER.

The absence of the brethren Saker and Diboll has precluded the reception of any report this year. They did not reach this station again till the end of the year. Since their return we have received the following letter from Mr. Diboll:—

"Of our labours since we have been here I can only say, that I and our young brother Smith have been co-workers, for we have mostly gone out together. Our reception everywhere has been most cordial, and in four places we have been urged to go and build and live. In two of those places I believe some persons have received the truth in the love of it. In one of those places I thought to have been engaged this week rearing a temporary residence, with a view to my permanent residence among them; but the king fails in coming to an agreement about the ground to build upon. The only piece of land that to Mr. Saker seems desirable is the most difficult thing for the king to grant, as an unfriendly party has a proprietary right in it.

"In the other place one of the chiefs is a party concerned for the salvation of his soul, and there the ground is ready. I think the people have their eye on Mr. Smith. Should he be sent there, I shall rejoice. It is a wide field, and I think he will be useful.

"Last Lord's-day I was at a town where I had two meetings; one meeting with the king and those who usually surround his person, and a meeting in another part of the town, when several of the people seemed to drink in the word with readiness of heart. The king showed me a piece of ground, which he is ready to give us. He has showed it to me before. He would be glad of a missionary; but if it were only a schoolmaster, he will be glad. This would be as wide a field of labour as any one man could work.

"During the dry season we can do much in visiting these places with boats and men, but during the rainy season we shall be mostly confined at home. It is, therefore, desirable that we be located as soon as possible, and we are praying that our way may be opened."

FRANCE.

BRITTANY.

Missionary, J. JENKINS.

Number of members, 27.

Mr. Jenkins has favoured us with the following report:—

“Every branch of our work has been continued without interruption, and extended, while I trust much good has been accomplished. It will not be forgotten that evangelising efforts in this country are far from being free; yet we bless the Lord for what we are enabled to do. It was our privilege to receive five Bretons by baptism last year, and we have now four candidates.

“*A New Station for Preaching.*”

“An important country district has been opened to the preaching of the Gospel, which is that of Tremel. In 1847-8 I visited that neighbourhood, with the venerable Breton poet, Ricon, to distribute the New Testament. Our work was fiercely opposed by the priests. Last year that neighbourhood was visited by Mr. Guillon, the Scripture reader, who was well received. We were encouraged to hold meetings among the people, which were well attended. As some members and candidates for baptism live in that direction, it was resolved to build a place of worship there. Ground has been purchased for the purpose, and the building will be proceeded with at once. This will be the first evangelical place of worship built in a country district of Brittany, though its population amounts to about two millions.

“*The Scripture Reader.*”

“Brother Guillon has devoted himself faithfully to his work of Scripture reading and distribution. He sold last year sixty-three Breton Testaments, twenty-three French Testaments, eighteen Bibles, forty-four religious books, and 950 tracts. He lately visited carefully a small parish close to Morlaix, and sold thirteen Testaments in it. He finds opportunities to read passages from the Gospel in nearly all the

dwellings, and the conversations he has with the people are of a truly interesting and promising character. The darkness of Popery and priestly influence gives way before the light of Divine truth. The reader is cordially invited to go and read and explain the Gospel in farm houses. Indeed, the time is fast approaching when all he can do will be quite insufficient, and we trust the Lord will provide for this emergency. I intend having new Breton tracts published shortly.

“*Scripture Distribution.*”

“One of our Breton brethren is a colporteur, he took out of our Scripture depot last year 658 Breton Testaments, seventy French Testaments, and fourteen Bibles. The total number of Bibles and Testaments gone out of the depot last year is 842, of which 721 are Breton Testaments, and no less than one thousand religious tracts and books have been distributed. Boloch has a very important door open before him now in the town of Lorient, having obtained authorisation to sell the Scriptures in a part of the country where the authorities had refused it many years to the sale of the Scriptures.

“*Itinerary Teaching.*”

“Teaching to read from house to house was in a low state at the commencement of 1860. The work was carried on in two distant country districts, Cosker and Plougasnon, but the learners did not exceed twenty. Nevertheless they increased. But what added greatly to their number is the teaching carried on in the district of Tremel, where now forty-four take lessons, and whose progress is quite satisfactory. Ricon's eldest daughter opened her humble dwelling to the preaching of the Gospel. Being a very suitable person, I encouraged her to give lessons, which she did, and this is the result. She and her son, an intelligent good lad, carry on there a promising work. We intend also to teach singing to the young.

“*A Protestant Hospital.*”

“It deserves notice that we have a hospital on a small scale. Our Protestant

friends are exposed to much annoyance when obliged to go to the town hospital, as *the priests and sisters of mercy* show but very poor mercy to Protestants, especially if converts from Popery. Lady Noel and her niece, with their usual Christian liberality, have taken a convenient room and furnished it, for the purpose of receiving any sick connected with the evangelical community. It has already done good service.

“Visit of Rev. F. Trestrail to Brittany.”

“I cannot conclude without noticing another feature of last year as regards the Breton Mission. This is your hearty and kind visit to the field of the mission as one of the esteemed secretaries of the Baptist Missionary Society. This visit has given us much pleasure, and I have no doubt his report to the committee will do considerable good, by making the mission more known, and by recommending it to the more extensive sympathies of the committee, the Society, and the churches of the denomination.”

CHINA.

Missionaries, H. Z. KLOEKERS, C. J. HALL.

The course of events in China has, to a great extent, detained the brethren in Shanghai, and details of their labours there have from time to time appeared in the *Herald*. The following extracts from a letter from Mr. Kloekers will show how his time has been employed since his arrival. As China is now open to the messengers of Christ, and our brethren are about to commence their labours in Nankin or its neighbourhood; we may hope next year to have interesting reports of their proceedings to lay before our subscribers. Mr. Kloekers writes as follows:—

“As far as China is concerned, we are

still in great fears as well as hopes, for the future. We have not been in circumstances to do much since our arrival at Shanghai, because of the political condition of the country.

“It has pleased our Heavenly Father also in another way to frustrate my plans of labour nearer at home. My dear wife had a very severe attack of bronchitis in the month of September, from which, after some four weeks, she seemed slowly to recover; but on November the 23rd, whilst I was in Nankin, she gave birth to a little daughter, two months before the time, and this, together with her former weakness, left her no strength. She entered into rest fourteen days after my return, on the 16th day of December, the day of rest, whilst peacefully leaning upon the faithful arm of her Saviour. In her case the three first verses of that beautiful hymn—

“‘How blest the righteous when he dies,’ were fully applicable, whilst the fourth expressed the desire of her heart, for she often asked me not to pray for her recovery—but for patience. With her departure many plans have been frustrated, great hopes have been lost.

“I made only one trip with her into the country, of which I sent you a description at the time, and another in November to Nankin.

“I have been preaching in Shanghai, and in some of the surrounding villages. Always hoping that we might soon be able to take some decisive steps in some direction or other, I did not open a regular school or chapel, which, notwithstanding the expense, I would have done, had no other places of worship been open.

“I have nothing to fill up the blanks in the form or ‘Tabular Statement’ this year, having only distributed some 4,000 tracts and 300 New Testaments.”

THE FOLLOWING RULES, ETC., ARE RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED TO THE CONSIDERATION OF OUR FRIENDS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF FACILITATING THE FORMATION OF COUNTY AND CONGREGATIONAL AUXILIARIES, ETC.

RULES FOR A COUNTY AUXILIARY.

1. THAT the fundamental principles and objects of the Baptist Missionary Society have the cordial approbation of this Auxiliary.
2. That this Society be denominated the _____ Auxiliary, in aid of the funds of the Baptist Missionary Society, and that all the Churches in the County be requested to co-operate in promoting this important object.
3. That all persons subscribing annually Half-a-Guinea or upwards, or five Guineas at one time, shall be Members of this Auxiliary; that all such subscribers of Half-a-Guinea shall be entitled to the abstract of the Annual Report; and of One Guinea and upwards to the large Report of the Parent Society.
4. That the business of the Auxiliary shall be conducted by a committee, with one or two Secretaries and a Treasurer. The committee to hold its meetings quarterly in different places in the County.
5. That the whole amount of money received by this Auxiliary, after deducting necessary expenses, shall be remitted annually, or oftener, to the Treasurer of the Parent Society in London, with an Alphabetical List of Collections and Subscriptions.
6. That a General Meeting of the Members of the Auxiliary shall be held annually, when a Report of the Proceedings shall be presented, intelligence communicated of the operations of the Mission, and a Committee and Officers appointed for the ensuing year. [It is desirable that arrangements for the Annual Meeting should be announced at the previous Quarterly Meeting of the Committee.]
7. That the following Gentlemen be the Committee for the present year:—

RULES FOR CONGREGATIONAL AUXILIARIES.

1. THAT the principles and objects of the Baptist Missionary Society, formed in the year 1792, are cordially approved of by this Society.
2. That this Society be designated the _____ Missionary Society.
3. That all persons subscribing One Penny per week, or more, Ten Shillings and Sixpence, and upwards, annually, or Five Pounds at one time, shall be Members of the Society.
4. That the Society be under the direction of a Committee of Twelve Persons, including a Treasurer and Secretary, and that the following be the Committee and Officers for the present year, viz.—

TREASURER.

SECRETARY.

5. That the Committee meet monthly to receive the Contributions from the Collectors, and pay over the amounts to the Treasurer, to be remitted annually, or oftener, to the Treasurer of the Parent Society.
6. That a General Meeting of this Congregational Missionary Society be held Annually, on the last Tuesday of _____, for the purpose of receiving the Report of Proceedings, and appointing a committee for the following year.

RULES FOR A LADIES' BRANCH.

1. THAT this Branch be formed for the purpose of contributing to the Funds of the Baptist Mission, and of promoting a spirit of enterprise in extending the kingdom of Christ.
2. That this Branch be under the direction of a Committee of such persons as collect Sixpence per week and upwards; or are subscribers of Half-a-Guinea and upwards per annum.
3. That the Committee meet Monthly to pay over the Contributions to the Treasurer, and receive Missionary intelligence.
4. That a General Meeting of the Branch be held on the last Thursday of each year, when the accounts shall be balanced, and paid over to the Treasurer of the _____, or to the Treasurer of the Parent Society.
5. That the following be the Members of the Committee :—

RULES FOR A JUVENILE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1. THAT this Association be formed for the purpose of contributing to the funds of the Baptist Mission, and of promoting a spirit of enterprise in extending the kingdom of Christ.
2. That every person subscribing One Penny per week and upwards, be a member of the Association.
3. That this Association be under the direction of a Committee, selected from such persons as collect Sixpence per week and upwards.
4. That the Committee meet Quarterly to pay over the contributions to the Treasurer, and receive Missionary intelligence.
5. That an Anniversary Meeting of the Association be held in connexion with the annual meeting of the Congregation, when the accounts shall be balanced and paid over to the Treasurer of the Congregational Auxiliary, or to the Treasurer of the Parent Society.
6. That the following be the Members and Officers of the Committee :—

RULES FOR A SUNDAY SCHOOL MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

1. THAT this Association be formed for the purpose of aiding the funds of the Baptist Missionary Society, and that it consist of all Scholars and Teachers contributing or collecting One Penny per week or upwards towards its funds.
2. That the friends and neighbours of the Children be invited to contribute to this Association.
3. That the Superintendents and Teachers, whose classes contribute, constitute a Committee, to carry the object of the Branch into effect.
4. That the consent of the Parents be obtained before any child is allowed to become a subscriber.
5. That the amount contributed by the Association be paid over every quarter to the Treasurer of the Parent Society.

. It is requested that applications for Collecting Books, Cards, Boxes, &c., may be made through the Treasurers or Secretaries of the Auxiliary Societies, whenever convenient.

EDUCATION IN JAMAICA.

During the recent visit of the Deputation of the Baptist Missionary Society to Jamaica, the question of the education of the people received their serious attention, especially in connection with the churches planted by the agents of the Society. The statistics of the day-schools connected with the various stations show that there were existing seventy-two schools, having on their books 4,144 children, with 3,128 in average attendance. On the other hand, more than *ten thousand* children are found in the Sunday-schools of the same stations.

Pleasing as is this last fact, it shows, however, that the proportion of children under daily instruction is far beneath what it ought to be. The proportion would be found still more deplorable if the numbers of the general population were brought under consideration. The causes of this low condition of daily instruction are various. It is to some extent attributable to the great distance at which the people live from the schools, while during a portion of the year the rains render the schools difficult of access for young children. Then again, as in England, many parents are attracted by the wages the children can earn, or the work they can do, to send them to the field, and some are too poor to avail themselves of the means within their reach. There is also a very considerable difficulty in obtaining good teachers; and when obtained, they are often soon drawn off into more remunerative employments, as their salaries are both precarious and small. In some instances the schoolmasters have been partly supported from the funds devoted to the maintenance of the pastors, and in a few cases the schools have been given up because this could no longer be done without sacrificing altogether the services of the minister.

The schools in question are supported partly by the fees of the children, by very limited local subscriptions, by the contributions of a few friends in England, and, in the case of three or four only, by grants in aid from the Island Treasury. The members of the Society of Friends in this country have been the most liberal and persistent helpers in this good work. But while the European ministers have been able partially to sustain their schools by appeals to England, this resource is open to scarcely the native born ministers, who are generally unknown to the advocates of negro education here. These especially feel the want of assistance in their struggle to elevate their fellow-countrymen.

But although the want of further means of education is obvious and peremptory, the efforts of the past have been both most useful and considerable. As an illustration may be quoted the instance of Salter's Hill day-schools, under the direction of that constant and ardent friend of the education of the negro, the Rev. Walter Dendy. The number of scholars who have been admitted into that one school in the twenty-four years of its existence, is 1,023, and into the schools at the out-stations 2,052 making a total of 3,075, a number nearly equal to that reported as being under instruction throughout the whole island in the year previous to Emancipation. The influence of this on the neighbourhood may be seen in the fact, that when Mr.

Dendy first settled at Salter's Hill twenty-five years ago, he found only three persons who could read among *five thousand*. Two years ago he made inquiry among the same number of individuals, and found that over 1,700 could read.

The value of the education already given has been strikingly seen during the progress of the recent religious movement which has traversed the island. We quote the following from a letter addressed by the Jamaica Baptist Union to the Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society:—"The truth seems to have lain dead in the minds of many until the showers of the Spirit descended, and now in many places it is springing in beauty and strength. While the still greater multitudes who have received no religious training are the victims of superstition, or indulge in the wildest excitement, never were the evils of popular ignorance, nor the good effects of religious teaching, more strikingly manifested than during this great revival. Never, therefore, did we feel more deeply the necessity of placing the means of Christian instruction within the reach of our people, many of whom have no schools within eight, ten, and even twelve miles of their home."

The Committee of the Baptist Missionary Society, yielding to the wish of their friends, propose, therefore, to make themselves the medium of conveying to the schools such assistance as they may be furnished with by the friends of education in Jamaica. For this purpose they solicit contributions and annual subscriptions, to be appropriated as the wants of the schools may require.

The schools are carried on on the plan of the British and Foreign School Society, and are open without distinction to children of all denominations. The "Jamaica Day School Fund" will be kept entirely distinct from every other fund of the Baptist Missionary Society, and a separate report of its administration will be forwarded annually to all contributors. Appropriations will be limited to the amount of funds entrusted to their care.
