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

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1919

HEREWITH is submitted to the Church, as is required by canon, the report of the Board of Missions for the year last past, together with the reports of the several bishops of the work committed to them. Though it will be observed that a few of these are lacking, it ought to be understood that if the missing reports could have been added these would have showed the same marks of health and fidelity that are abundantly evidenced in those published. The bishops all have much to do and are always obliged to work with insufficient help. If therefore this report goes to press without them, it is because it has already been delayed too long, and the Church will be disposed to sympathize with rather than to blame those who are deprived of the advantage that would come of their work being known. Let the story of the rest illustrate the needs and burdens of the silent ones, lest these lose the help that comes in response to the prayers of the faithful.

During the past year the Board lost but one of its members by death, the Right Reverend David Hummell Greer, D.D., Bishop of New York. A note on Bishop Greer's death and a Minute concerning it were included in the last report.

The report of the treasurer will be a source of new courage for every one as it shows that the Mission intrusted to the Church has never ceased to be the object of loving solicitude to those who love our Lord in sincerity; so that in the days of anxiety and unrest these have still made it possible for the Revelation to be proclaimed which will presently show the people the way out of their distresses.

Though he never shrank from any work which would advance the cause to which he had given himself, Mr. George Gordon King felt constrained to surrender the office of treasurer at the meeting of the General Convention held in Detroit. For ten years Mr. King rendered the arduous service demanded by that office with no other remuneration than the satisfaction of being used in an office where his faith and love of men might find expression. During his term of office the work of the treasurer received an entirely new interpretation; so that though the result for Mr. King was that he was obliged to ask to be relieved of his burden, the dignity and importance of the office had been so manifested that one of the foremost financiers of the Church was able to realize the challenge of it and to see the high honor of being called to be Mr. King's successor.

Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, who was elected to fill the vacancy in the treasurer's office, would be the last to understand the value of the service he rendered when he placed the Church's call ahead of the promotion which his ability assured him. But all thoughtful men will realize what it means to the country as well as the Church when men of his value in the commercial world have been reminded that the highest patriotism is expressed by using all means to help men to understand that in the Revelation wrought by the Incarnate One is the real security of the Nation.

The reports of the bishops telling the story of the growth of the work intrusted to them are as always witness that the only reason that all men have not the knowledge of God in Jesus Christ our Lord, is because of the half-hearted effort on the part of so many to give them the support they have a right to expect. At the same time these reports are abundant return for all the prayers and self-denials of the people who have neither been confused by the clamor of the ignorant nor lulled into indifference by the abundant blessings of God.

In presenting its final report the Board of Missions feels that it may felicitate itself as well as the Church in America on the proof given at Detroit that the Church has finally realized itself as a Living Body to which has been intrusted a momentous task to be administered with intelligence as well as self-forgetting devotion. The way has been long and heart-breaking for some of those who at the front were overwhelmed by the load which the Church's lacking system compelled them to bear. To read the records of this Church at work and thus to gain glimpses of the dreadful loss it has suffered, simply because there was no working organization which could profit by the splendid ability of the leaders with real understanding—and this Church has always been rich in these—is enough to make the most heedless comprehend the significance and value of the action of the Convention at Detroit when the old order was finally disposed of and a rational method of work adopted.

There will never again be hindrance of the work through the people's not knowing whose is the responsibility, nor will there be the painful exhibit of parishes failing in their obligation because the priest did not know that the Church was sent to be the Living Witness of the Incarnation among all peoples. There will be trouble still because men are mortal yet, but the unnecessary obstacles have been removed. The Church may expect to see Her work steadily advancing.

Not the least token that this is more than a pious hope, was the hearty acceptance by General Convention of the recommendation made by the Board of Missions that the Convention approve and authorize the Nation-Wide Campaign. The Board of Missions has no doubt that the Convention's action in this matter meant a revolution in the mind as well as the work of the whole Church.

To some that undertaking meant nothing except a new means of "money getting." To these of course the Campaign meant nothing of importance. But to those who understood, the Campaign meant putting an end to the horrible crime of the Church's seeming to ask servants to do their Master a kindness. No man had desired this but the effect of the methods used to find means to finance the Lord's work had always resulted in the Church appearing as a beggar. Everybody knows what the situation was. The richest and most generous men in America seemed to be indifferent to the Cause they should have delighted in.

Long years of observation made the Board of Missions certain that if men knew the facts they would provide the means for the work which they valued more than was supposed. It was this conviction that brought about the suggested

change in policy—for the Campaign was nothing else. Instead of asking people for money which was theirs, it was proposed to explain to them the needs of the work for which they were responsible in order that each one might decide what part of his income should be devoted to this, his highest obligation.

The Board's faith was entirely justified. In every part of the country where the people were given a chance the response was in keeping with our people's general reputation for intelligence and serious-mindedness. The offerings from these has made it apparent that whatever else may retard the setting up of His Kingdom this will not be due to the lack of generosity on the part of God's people. It will be the high privilege of the Presiding Bishop and Council to tell the

It will be the high privilege of the Presiding Bishop and Council to tell the Church of the rapid development of the work now set free from the toils which only experience could make the Church realize were hindering its progress. The Board of Missions rejoices with the whole Church that these are a thing of the past and has joy in being able to bid the whole Body look forward with certain hope for the great things the American Church will surely do for God and our Country.

The purpose of these deposits is to meet the payments in those months of the fiscal year when the contributions are always small. It is the rule of the Board, and required by the terms of most of the gifts, that all moneys withdrawn from them be returned to the Reserve Deposits within the same fiscal year as taken, or as soon thereafter as possible. During the past year \$393,000 of these Reserves had been withdrawn, in addition to the \$230,000 not returned on December 31, 1918, making \$623,000 in use December 31, 1919.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF ALASKA

The Missionary District of Alaska includes all Alaska. It has an area of 600,000 square miles. The population is estimated at 90,000. The district was established by the General Convention in the year 1895. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Peter Trimble Rowe, D.D., consecrated St. Andrew's Day, 1895.

The appropriation of the Board to Alaska is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$21,475; (3) For work among natives—Indian and Eskimo—\$38,875; (4) Additional \$3,595.

Report of the Bishop—1919

A GAIN and again one hears Alaska spoken of as the "Empire of the North." It is not that as yet, unless its great area, its resources, may justify the term. What is wanting to make it an empire is a population. And the latter comes slowly. Strikingly small at the best, for a country so vast, it has decreased the last four years. Now the pendulum seems to have begun to swing in the other direction. It is hoped that with the completion of the new government railroad—the wish being father to the thought-many people will come to Alaska with the hope of finding some of its hidden resources and making homes in the great valleys where agriculture is possible. And homes are scarce in the congested sections of our country. They are needed. They can be made in Alaska.

Highly promising as the railroad is for the development of Alaska, yet some different policy must be adopted by the government so that auxiliary industries may be fostered and settlers may be encouraged, or the railroad will have no business to speak of. And this policy, it is expected as a logical and reasonable consequence, will be adopted by the government. The great forests will be utilized for lumber and the manufacture of paper. The oil and coal lands will be made free for development. Thereby business will be

created for the railroad, and transportation, which now handicaps the whole country, will become more adequate and less expensive.

Even as it is, in my opinion, it is a wise adventure of faith on the part of the Church to be active in laying foundations for the "Empire" that is to come.

Under the prevailing conditions the prosecution of the work of the Church is especially difficult. The towns of Alaska are small and few of them. Juneau, which is the capital and the largest, has at best a changing population of about 3,000. These centers are widely separated from each other so that it is not possible to combine them under one clergyman. And some day you waken up to find the town which began with a rush, had prospects of permanency, in which you enthusiastically built a church, a rectory and placed a clergyman, has dwindled down to a few hundred people. Such are Skagway and Nome, not to mention other places. In each of these places we have a good church and rectory. But they are closed. There is no clergyman. What portion of the community made up the congregation left and the clergyman was without work. Not without work, though. He was without a congregation perhaps. But there still remained in such a section, souls, several hundreds

of them, members of no church, it may be positively indifferent as to whether there was a church or not, but all the same, they were in need of the Word of Life, and were accessible to the loving, interested, sympathetic visit and ministrations of one of God's ministers and messengers. And this raises the ques-Why could not a shepherd of souls center in such a place as Skagway or Nome and travel about from hill to hill, creek to creek, visit the scattered people in their cabins, seek them out, have prayer and godly conversation with them as individuals, proving his personal zeal and interest in them? I am sure the man of God would be welcomed. I am sure that he would find more happy encouragement than oft is found by ministering to congregations, and maybe realize the experience of our Lord "Who sat by the wall and gave the water of Life to the woman of Samaria."

In view of this, for such conditions my suggestion would be as follows: To maintain a clergyman in some central place with the understanding that instead of giving all his time and all his services to a handful of a congregation he should travel and go throughout the wide district, making every individual cabin a temple of the Lord during his visit, at least. Alas! there are two difficulties in the way of this plan. One is that we de not seem to have the men who have the will or desire for such work; the second is that we unwisely do not consider it important enough to meet the expenses necessarily involved. Only, however, by some such plan can the work be done in Alaska, as at present, thoroughly, wisely, economically, successfully.

The Southern Coast of Alaska.—Along this coast, in small towns such as Ketchikan, Wrangell, Juneau, Skagway, Sitka, Cordova, Valdez, Seward and Anchorage, you find the greater portion of the white population. In all of the above places, excepting Skagway, our

missions are established. None of them is self-supporting. The towns are small and the population is ever changing. The fishing business gives an activity to Ketchikan, Juneau and Cordova which is lacking in the other places.

Anchorage depends upon the railroad work and the coal output. Little of the latter is as vet mined. Upon my visit to Anchorage in April I found the town quiet. For want of funds railroad construction was simply marking time. From an estimated population of 10,000 it had decreased to 3,000. Along the railroad are some new camps, such as Chicka Loon, MaTamusha, etc. As the road extends towards Broad Pass and the interior, the population will extend and more community camps arise. The missionary at Anchorage, the Reverend Edwin W. Hughes, gives what time he can spare in visiting the present outlying places. A travelling missionary for this work is desirable, for the vast country towards Broad Pass is promising in mining and agricultural possibilities. Mr. Hughes is held in beloved esteem in all the Anchorage section. I married him upon this visit. He presented seven candidates for confirmation. A residence should be built for the missionary as soon as possible.

Seward will become an important shipping point in the near future. At present the population is about 500. Under the Reverend G. J. Zinn a new rectory was built. It needs a furnace to complete it. The rectory and church make fine equipment. Mr. Zinn resigned in November and our people are now without the services of the Church.

Cordova is the coast terminal of the Copper River Railroad which extends into the country to the Kennicott mine, 176 miles. On this line are such places as McCarthy and Chitina. The Reverend E. P. Zeigler from Cordova visits all these places and holds services. Everywhere he is royally welcomed by the hearty public. This is the work which ought to be done, where it is possible, by the missionary resident at

a center where the community is not large. The consecration of the picturesque church, Saint George's, on Easter, was a monumental day in Cordova. The church is greatly admired. A number of candidates were presented for confirmation. The work is progressing.

Nothing special in regard to the other missions calls for any comment. The usual work goes on in the usual way with the patience, fidelity and zeal of the workers in charge.

The Yukon Section. A thorough visit of the Yukon Valley, including the Tanana and Koyukuk, was made in June to September. A request to visit Dawson, hold an ordination and confirmation, having been made, was responded to. This visit occupied ten days. Dawson is but a relic. Its glory seems to have departed, and its present condition of decreased population and activity is but an illustration of the condition of every white community in what we call the "interior."

Eagle, which is just seven miles over the international boundary line on the Yukon, was next visited and services held. I advised Mr. George B. Burgess, our layworker in charge of this mission —for white people as also for Indians—to leave at once for the outside. He looked very ill. Besides it was his year for a furlough. Happily Mr. Wood Gaither came in August to care for this

Owing to the inability of fitting out the *Pelican* for service, and the lack of other transportation, I was forced to satisfy myself with a passing call at Circle City. This old camp simply exists. There are not more than fifty white people here. The Indians have been greatly reduced owing to sickness and removal elsewhere. Old Joseph Kwulwull, though nearly blind, holds regular services among the Indian people, which he has faithfully done for over twenty years and on a salary of \$200 a year.

My next stop was at Fort Yukon. Here one is struck with the marvellous change in a native community as the result of wise, patient, faithful ministrations of the Word and Holy Sacraments, under real shepherdly leadership. For some time the people were the prey of evil white men; they were shiftless, drunken and poor. What a fight Archdeacon Stuck and Dr. Grafton Burke put up against the evil forces! They succeeded in getting the Indian people to stand together—and for the righteous cause—and since then a village of Indians, increasing in size, happy, peaceable, united and prospering. From darkness to light has been the change. It can be so everywhere under the right leadership. It is a religious community. The Church is the center of their lives. Men, women and children vie with one another in their love and service for the Church. Every woman in the place is a member of the Auxiliary. Proportionately, their gifts for missions, the United Offering, the Red Cross, average as high a per cent as in any part of our country. The members of the council accept seriously their responsibility. It was a pleasure to meet in Mrs. Burke's large living room: first, the women, all of them members of the Auxiliary; second, the council; third, the Red Cross Society; lastly, a reception for the whole community. The substantial new mission house lends itself well for such gatherings and Mrs. Burke, without thought of self, is always ready to use her house for such meetings. At one service was unveiled the painting over the altar, the subject being the Crucifixion, and which was painted by the Reverend E. P. Zeigler of Cordova. This was a memorial to our Walter Harper who, with his wife, lost his life on the Princess Sophia, October 24, At another service was received and blessed the moose skin embroidered altar covering, the handwork of the Indian women. Confirmation was administered to nineteen persons. At the close

of a service in the church, clergy and congregation set out for the new cemetery. On the way, hymns were sung. Around the grave of our Indian deacon—faithful, beloved William Loola—was blessed the concrete headstone made and given by the Indians to his memory and the "acre" for the dead solemnly consecrated in the Name of the Lord.

The church hospital at Fort Yukon is a busy place. Within are patients; without in tents are also patients. Many of these are young children afflicted with tuberculosis. From far and near have they been brought. To this hospital came Steffanson, the Arctic explorer, from far away Herschel Island. And here he recovered from pneumonia and typhoid. Daily its doors open to new patients entering and the departure of others who have recovered. boon is such an institution in this great wilderness! Visitors have been deeply impressed with this sight of the Church's activity on this far-flung border of civilization. At first many thought that it was a government institution. was the surprise in learning otherwise. Would that men and women whom God has made stewards of wealth could see the blessedness of giving and endowing such institutions where their good work goes on while they live and after they pass into the spacious field of eternity. Such an institution is an adventure of faith. It is a glory to the Church.

Dr. Burke and his devoted wife give themselves to the uttermost for the good of this work. One would imagine that there would be no difficulty in giving them the assistance in workers and means they need. And yet there is difficulty. For a long time we have sought for a woman matron but in vain. It is so with nurses. At the present time, it is without an experienced matron and without nurses. In spite of this Dr. Burke was determined to keep the hospital open even should his only help be hired Indian women. With substitutes

he is carrying on now. But how long must he wait for the trained helpers such a work demands? The Indians help in every way they can for they know the value of the hospital.

Every effort had been made to repair the *Pelican* but to no purpose. Having waited as long as possible I hired a man and his boat and then proceeded on my way. It was back again to the old-time method of transportation. It has one advantage, even if it spells work, and that is that you can stop where you wish and visit every camp along the river.

In time we reached Stephens Village where Miss Harriet M. Bedell serves as the lone missionary. She is minister and teacher and physician and friend to every soul. She is held in great love by all. Great changes for improvement have resulted from her labor and sacrifice. Arriving at three in the morning, after a short rest, the day was spent most busily in services, conference and the settlement of accounts, etc.

Leaving Stephens Village at midnight, we renewed our journey. A strong head wind made rowing hard. Camps were visited and the sleepers routed out. All night we travelled and called at Rampart about ten in the morning. This old camp is deserted save for fifteen or twenty men. Battling with rain and head winds, we finally made Tanana about midnight, but just in time to send man and boat home again to Fort Yukon by a steamer while I caught one for Fairbanks.

I was in time at Fairbanks for a reception given for Mr. and Mrs. Lumpkin, who were leaving the country after a stay of five years, and to the universal regret of all the people. The reception was great. Everybody in Fairbanks and vicinity seemed present to honor Mr. and Mrs. Lumpkin, who had won the confidence and love of all. The quaint Church of Saint Matthew's was taxed for room with the great congregation at every service. Twelve candidates were presented for confirmation. It was a

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matter of deep regret that not only was Mr. Lumpkin leaving but there was no one to take his place, though for more than a year every effort had been made to find one. These vacancies are surely a hindrance to the continuous and progressive work of the Church.

Nenana was then visited. Though it was vacation time, yet most of the children of the school were as usual at home in the dormitory. Seven prepared for confirmation were held pending my visit. Pleasant days were spent in this attractive mission. Services and conference were held. The time has come when the old dormitory should be replaced by a new one. The present one is beyond repairing. It was built of logs and as well as could be done with five thousand dollars. It has served well for fifteen years. But it has always been without room and conveniences sufficient for thirty children. Nevertheless, the results have been very satisfactory and have been effective in the uplift of the people in general. The school, through gardening, has raised, yearly, potatoes sufficient for its needs. It has caught the fish used by it. Wood is convenient and it has provided its own fuel. Owing to the unexpected growth of a white community within a mile of the mission, a new site for the school is thought desirable, though it is hard to give up the present one, which we have found so satisfactory. But if we are able to rebuild this will have to be seriously considered.

From Nenana we hastened to Tanana. Here Archdeacon Stuck with the Pelican was waiting for me. Through the kindness of the U. S. A. Inspector the Pelican had been towed to Tanana and repaired. The affairs of the Tanana mission were attended to. Mr. Brown was re-appointed as caretaker of the prop-Deaconess Mabel H. Pick was transferred to this mission where she now ministers as far as she is able among the people, and especially on behalf of the women and children.

Soon we were sailing down the river on the Pelican. Travelling was now pleasant. We called at Ruby and spent the night here. Ruby was practically a deserted camp. There were still a few people here. But everywhere the cabins were empty and the whole place looked forlorn.

We made Anvik on Saturday afternoon. Dr. Chapman welcomed us. He has been in this mission since 1887. We found him very busy. Our visit here was one of five days. In addition to the services, visits, care of the fuel and water supplies for the mission and the school, he is endeavoring to build a residence and a dormitory for boys. He is fortunate in having Mr. Chase to help Otherwise there is here no labor other than that which is given by the natives. The season is a short one. Hence the work goes slowly. In spite of all these difficulties a dispensary has been built and the residence so far finished as to be occupied this winter. Never have the people here been so responsive and attached to the mission as they are now. In the confirmation class was the old "medicine man" Nicolai, who for all these years worked in opposition to the mission. Just before he was confirmed, in the presence of the congregation, he told them why he was going to be confirmed and that he forsook "Shemanism" for good. This was a matter for great joy and thankfulness.

The children of the school showed in many ways the splendid work and influence of Deaconess Anna G. Sterne. The school could become much larger, had we the proper equipment and staff. From far and near Dr. Chapman receives urgent entreaties from parents that he should take their children. He has to refuse boys altogether. Without a sufficient staff to look after them properly, he is right in refusing them. There was serious danger that the school would be without a matron this winter but I was fortunate in being able to secure a woman in Fairbanks to act as

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such. In addition to more helpers, the maintenance of the school will have to be increased. More scholarships are necessary and a scholarship should be at least \$200, and not \$100 as has been the case for over twenty-five years. With the increased expense of everything this is but reasonable.

After a happy visit at Anvik we headed upstream for the Koyukuk and our mission of Saint John's-in-the-Wilderness, Allakaket. The season was getting late and the water low. We had frosts at nights and we struck on many "bars." But after nine days we made the mission. Miss Ridgeway and Miss Koster were delighted and relieved to see us. The people were scattered far and near at their usual fish camps. But learning of our arrival, daily some kept coming to the mission—some with children to baptize—some for healing. To get up the swift river they would attach a line from their boat to the dogs on the shore and thus they would come—they and their families.

The log church, built at the time Deaconess Carter came to this mission, is sadly in need of repairs. It is so with the log house. These log buildings do not hold their own very long, in spite of careful watching, and how to meet the ravages of time and weather, by repairing them and replacing them when there is no fund for the purpose, is always an anxious question. Among people of the white race it is different. They can do much for themselves. It is not so with natives who live in a wilderness where the best they can do is be ever hunting for the elusive game upon which depends the uncertain food that will keep body and soul together.

It is a great advantage in having the *Pelican* that we can stop wherever and whenever we please, now to visit a "fish camp" and now a lonely prospector's cabin. By canoe or small boat the same thing can be done. So at every camp where there was any sign of life, by day or night we would call, hold services,

baptize and marry, comfort and minister to the sick and the dying.

It was a pathetic sight this year to find at every camp the people waiting for the usual run of fish and wondering why it did not take place. Without fish they go hungry. It cuts you to the heart to see the patient suffering-little children hungry, emaciated and still suffering patiently. Perhaps they would catch a fish or two a day-enough to alleviate their present hunger. they caught very little in excess to dry and put up for winter use-use for themselves and dogs. And this perfectly describes the situation at every camp we visited on the Yukon, Koyukuk and Tanana rivers. This is not hearsay—it is personal observation. We feared that distress, hunger and destitution would follow this winter. To what extent these prevail now I am not able to say. I know that for lack of food the people have had to kill their dogs. And their dogs mean much to them in winter to visit their traps, hunt for game and pack the latter to their camps.

Whether "cannery fishing" on the lower Yukon is responsible for the failure of the fish this year, I am not ready to say. That it is, is the opinion of many locally. Whether it is or not, I believe that canneries should not be allowed to operate upon rivers where so many lives along these rivers and their tributaries are dependent in so great a measure for the food that supports life. The law, as I am told, has nothing to say in regard to this matter. In other words, there is no law preventing canneries on any of the rivers. I believe that there should be such a law enacted. To say nothing about humanitarian reasons, for economic reasons this should be done. Already the unlimited cannery fishing along the coast threatens the extinction of salmon, while cannery work on the rivers may soon finish what seems now threatened.

Workers. The Reverend A. R. Hoare, after a furlough of two years, returned

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to his work at Tigara, or Point Hope. The Reverend Wm. A. Thomas was transferred from Tigara to Fort Yukon, there to take up the work of Archdeacon Stuck who is "outside" on furlough.

Mr. Wood Gaither came to carry on the work at Eagle while Mr. Geo. B. Burgess was "outside" on furlough.

The Reverend H. H. Lumpkin left August 11th on his furlough. I regret to say that, on account of his family, he may not return.

Archdeacon Stuck is also "out" on furlough.

Miss Alice Wright, principal of the Tortella Hall School, Nenana, had her furlough coming, was on the point of leaving when she met with a serious accident, was dangerously burned and since then has remained as a patient at Nenana. Her recovery is taking place, but very slowly. She has our deepest sympathy.

Miss L. B. Nuneviller, nurse, left her work at Fort Yukon.

Miss Myrtle Rose came about September 1st as nurse at Saint Mark's Mission, Nenana, and her sister Miss Fern Rose, as teacher to the same mission.

Mrs. Olsen was appointed matron for the school at Anvik.

Mr. and Mrs. Leo McConnell, who had retired for a year, were reappointed and assigned to Saint Timothy's Mission, Tanana Crossing.

Mr. McGuire was appointed teacher at Tigara, relieving Miss Virginia Thomas, who served one year, having promised but one year.

The Reverend George J. Zinn resigned his mission at Seward, November 1, 1919.

Needs. Two nurses and a matron are needed for Saint Stephen's Hospital, Fort Yukon. A doctor and nurse are needed for Saint Thomas, Tigara. The same, as well as a clergyman for the Mission of our Saviour, Tanana. A layworker and a matron are needed for

Christ Church Mission, Anvik. In the spring of 1920 there will be needed men to relieve the Reverend Messrs. John W. Chapman, D.D., F. B. Drare and E. P. Ziegler and Dr. Grafton Burke, during their furlough. A clergyman is needed for both of the vacant missions, Fairbanks and Seward.

Funds are needed to build a new dormitory or school at Nenana and also at Anvik. Also for a residence for the missionary at Anchorage.

The schools at Anvik and Nenana can no longer be maintained without increased support. The scholarships of \$100 for each child are no longer sufficient. This was never equal to the need. For the past four years, when the cost of food, fuel, freight, has more than doubled, we have failed to meet the expenses. If we are to continue this work, the maintainance, by scholarships or otherwise, will need to be largely increased.

In conclusion, I feel that our greatest difficulty in the Alaskan Mission is to obtain the workers needed. When furloughs occur, when workers resign, unless there are others to fill their places there is the danger that the hospital or school will have to close. A mission vacated and left unfilled means largely the collapse of all that has been accomplished. Had we some system or bureau in the Church, looking after the supply of workers—which we have not—therein would be the remedy, I think. Going on in the old haphazard way is not going at all. That some plan may be devised whereby this great difficulty may be overcome, is devoutly prayed for.

I submit the following statement of my official acts, statistics and accounts:

During the year I baptized seven children, administered confirmation to seventy-four persons and to five outside the diocese, ordained one priest outside the diocese, admitted one postulant, accepted one candidate for Holy Orders, solemnized one marriage and travelled within the diocese about 10,000 miles.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF ARIZONA

The Missionary District of Arizona includes the State of Arizona. It has an area of 113,000 square miles and a population of 204,000 people. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1892. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Julius Walter Atwood, D.D., consecrated in the year 1911.

The appropriation of the Board to Arizona is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$6,400; (3) For work among Indians, \$300; (4) For united Offering work among Indians, \$1,400.

Phoenix. The most notable recent achievement of the Church in Arizona has been the raising of a large sum of money to complete the building fund for the cathedral, which now amounts to \$100,000. Strictly speaking this achievement should be credited to the year 1920.

For several years there has been no Episcopal church in the city, since the old church building was abandoned in 1915. The Cathedral House with an auditorium seating 300 or 400 people has been inadequate in size and not conducive to a devotional spirit, as during the week days and night this hall, as well as the other rooms, has been required for all the many organizations connected with Trinity Parish.

Prescott. The work at Prescott has been going on steadily without any startling advance. Mining conditions

have been such that the city itself has not grown appreciably. The establishment of the Soldiers' Tuberculosis Camp at Fort Whipple with a large number of convalescent patients and a large corps of military and civilian workers required for the administration of the work has added to the business life and the Church work of Prescott. Our rector there has been devoted in ministering to the inhabitants of the camp and also through the parish house which has been a social and educational center for the men. Here they have come for amusement, for games, for social intercourse, when the large hall is frequently crowded. The rector and his co-workers deserve great credit for the fine, patriotic work which they have done in a noble spirit of unselfish service. The rector is also looking to the smaller towns and communities in Yavapai County to see whether he can serve them

in the way of religious services and pastoral care.

Tucson. Like Saint Luke's at Prescott, the work is going on steadily in Grace Church with the assistance of one of the most devoted laymen in Arizona. The rector has been able to accomplish a fine work not only for the parish and community, but also for the diocese in the oversight of the work at Saint Luke's-inthe-Desert and the unorganized missions at Oracle and Fort Lowell, which are examples of practical Church unity in two small communities where there is the only one religious service held attended by members of various religious bodies and opinions. The people of Tucson realize fully what they owe to their rector and his wife, socially, spiritually and in every other way. An illustration of this was a gift from a lady of the Jewish faith of a Ford automobile, which is proving a most valuable assistant. But the work in the parish and the community has not prevented him from responding to the call of the General Church, notably in the Church Pension Fund Commission and the Nation Wide Campaign.

The work has gone on Douglas. serenely and effectively as usual in Douglas and the long rectorship of the present incumbent has shown what length of service when it is done in a consecrated spirit can accomplish both for the Church and the community, This accounts in a large measure for the leading position which our Church holds here, and for the fact that our clergyman ministers to the whole city. Douglas needs a parish or community house to serve the Church and the people of the city, and it ought to come as a part of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

Bisbee. Bisbee, which for various reasons unnecessary to mention has never developed as it should from its promising beginning when it had the devoted noble service of a consecrated layman, Dr. Sweet, who founded the Episcopate

Fund in Arizona, and whose memorial is Saint John's Church, had begun to take on new life under the devoted care of the Reverend Jacob M. White. The services were more largely attended and the financial condition had improved and a better spirit of cooperation was seen. Two epidemics of smallpox and influenza interfered in the beginning of his ministry and then illness, followed by his death on the first week in January, 1920, put an end to the immediate realization of our hopes. But Bisbee, which after Phoenix is the largest city in the state, ought to become one of our strongest parishes, and will be we trust some day. The opportunity for mission work all around is large. In Warren, a residential part of the community, at the military post of Fort Huachuca, and in the old mining camp at Tombstone. where our first mission was established and where there are still a considerable number of Church people requiring the ministrations and pastoral care of the Church. In this great mining community of perhaps 30,000 a guild or club house to serve both parish and community is sadly needed, but more than all is the demand for a strong, consecrated minister of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Nogales. Saint Andrew's Mission has gone on its usual course of work and progress under the administration of its present missionary, who has now become canonically resident in the district. I rejoice to think that now we have not a single clergyman connected with the Church in Arizona, who is not actively at work and a member of our convocation. We are few, but fit, and many of our number are doing the work of two men cheerfully and happily. We have a vestry or bishops committee in Nogales which represents the foremost business and public spirited men of the city. These men are full of ambitious projects for the future of the Church. They have negotiated the sale of the rectory and have in mind the

securing of new lots on which to build a church, parish house, and rectory. The present building is too small for the congregation, and unless a new church is secured soon we ought to enlarge the present building if it is feasible.

Clifton and Morenci. These flourishing missions under the immediate charge of the archdeacon, and which have never had a settled clergyman, have continued in as prosperous a condition as is possible with only a service every other week. We hope soon to acquire a rectory at Clifton, to be ready for the coming minister. Rectories are always assets in our work as they are not taxed, and can be rented, when not required by the clergyman, at a good rental. They are, therefore, a form of endowment and also often make it possible to secure a minister which would not be possible if the parish was without a house.

Mining conditions, owing to the decrease in the price of copper, are not very favorable, and so we are deferring for the present the erection of the guild house to combine a chapel and club house on the fine central lots leased to us by the Phelps, Dodge Copper Company in Morenci.

Saint Paul's Mission has been one of our failures thus far, yet we have one of the best church buildings in Arizona, and Yuma is destined to be one of the most important towns or cities in the state. It has recently grown more rapidly and is more prosperous than any other community in the state with the exception of Phoenix and perhaps Mesa. It has an ideal climate for the growth of cotton and citrus fruit, and the development of these two industries is already productive of prosperity and will be increasingly so in the coming years. The archdeacon and general missionary are in charge of Yuma with occasional visits from the bishop.

Mesa. Saint Mark's is the youngest of our parishes, organized during the

past year. Its progress has been marked since the establishment of it as a mission by the bishop, then rector of Trinity Church, Phoenix, twelve years ago. It has a well equipped plant consisting of church, rectory and parish house. The bishop's committee and a committee representing the people of Mesa asked last June for the organization of the mission into a parish, having declared their ability to pay off all indebtedness and to raise a living salary for a rector with a hope that the former missionary, the Reverend Francis Bloy, might accept a call and return to them. This was accomplished. Mr. Bloy, with true missionary spirit, holds a monthly service in the organized mission at Wickenburg, which has developed finely under his care; another monthly service at Chandler within the parish limits of Mesa; and he also has charge of Saint James' Mission, Tempe. As president of the Mesa Chapter of the Red Cross and in innumerable other ways the rector has become one of the leading citizens of the community.

What was Mesa's gain was Globe. Globe's loss, but the archdeacon jumped bravely into the breach and with undaunted courage faced the prob-Services have been maintained every other week not only here but also in Miami where the Mission of the Transfiguration has been revived and services regularly held in the gymnasium of the Y. M. C. A. building through the courtesy of its officers. There are perhaps ten thousand inhabitants in this great mining city, and outside of the Roman Catholic Church there are only two churches to minister to the rest of the people. There are probably one hundred confirmed members of our Church living in Miami who need to be looked after. As Globe is only seven miles distant, the work here can easily be looked after for the present by its rector, provided he can have a Ford car as an assistant.

Through the energy of the people of

Globe the valuable corner lot next to the church building has been bought and there, as soon as possible, we must erect a parish and community house. This important center and county seat has no Y. M. C. A. building. Church has been making use of the wretched little old house in the rear, once used as a rectory and now as a substitute for a parish house. But it is totally inaadequate and unfit. It cannot house for example the prosperous branch of the Girls' Friendly Society with a membership of 100 or more. But an even more important need is for a settled clergyman.

Ray. The general missionary has been in charge of the work at Saint David's Mission which has been going on as usual with good attendance and interest in the services. When we get a clergyman here he can look after the unorganized mission at Hayden where the archdeacon has begun holding services with a large attendance.

Jerome and Verde Valley. No progress in our missionary work has been more marked than that in the Verde Valley. Three years ago the present missionary took up the work at Jerome. and since then the well equipped and attractive guild house has been erected in Clarkdale. The parish rooms at Jerome have been renovated and a new mission, to be known as Saint Matthew's. organized in Verde, which is destined to be a very important smelter town. With a Ford automobile the missionary can unite and minister to the whole valley. On a recent visit the bishop confirmed fourteen candidates, held services in four different places, and gave talks and addresses and sermons long and short, amounting to ten in number.

Flagstaff. Under the rectorship of the Reverend L. B. Moore, who was ordained to the priesthood at our last convocation, the Church of the Epiphany has received the gift of a new organ as a memorial of the late Prof. Percival Lowell. The house in the rear

of the church has been bought and thoroughly renovated and partially furnished for the rector.

The Normal School in Flagstaff places our Church there in a strategic position. Mr. Moore adds to the care of Flagstaff that of Saint John's Mission, Williams, where services are held every Sunday afternoon. The heating apparatus of the guild house has been renovated and the rectory repainted. We are now considering removing the guild house to a more central location. Mr. Moore also visits the Grand Cañon for occasional services. The woman's guild in Flagstaff, having assumed the debt of \$3,000 on the church, has reduced it recently to \$2,800.

Winslow. The Reverend Harold S. Brewster adds to the care of Saint Paul's Mission, our oldest church in Northern Arizona, the oversight of the unorganized mission at Holbrook. Holbrook is destined to be an important town with the opening up of the White Mountain region with its rich treasures of timber and coal. A branch railroad is now being built. For the development of our mission we should erect a guild house on the fine lots already owned by us in Holbrook. new worlds to conquer, Mr. Brewster has revived services at Kingman with a fair attendance and considerable interest already manifested. Soon we shall need another missionary in Northern .Arizona.

Institutions. The Hospital of the Good Shepherd has lost by retirement after twenty-five years of noble, unflagging and unselfish service, its first and only superintendent, Miss Eliza W. Thackara. What Miss Thackara has meant to this work and to the Navajos no one can adequately tell, but she retires with the profound gratitude and affection of all who have been associated with her. We are fortunate in having as her successor her co-worker for several years, Miss Anne Cady, who is also fortunate in securing as head

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nurse, Mrs. Laffin, who is familiar with the Navajo country and its people during a former residence. Dr. Wigglesworth has retired as medical director, but again we are fortunate in securing a worthy successor to him.

Through the generosity of a friend we are able to thoroughly renovate and restore the chapel. Another friend has given a Ford automobile to the hospital. This is a great boon, enabling us to secure our supplies from Gallup, the nearest railroad station thirty miles distant, and it also helps on the work in other ways. The hospital is overcrowded and never was the future more promising if we can have sufficient funds to carry on the work. We hope to establish a day school for the children and to erect a new building to house them if the Executive Council of the Church will see fit to heed our request and devote to it some of the funds from the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The Tuberculosis Homes. Saint Luke's-in-the-Desert, Tucson, has had a good year, closing for the summer months. A new porch has been added to the original wing and when we finally complete this wing—which is now made possible by the gift of a friend not of our communion of \$2,500—we can accommodate several more patients. But the other wing ought to be built as soon as possible.

Saint Luke's Home, Phoenix, has had a prosperous and busy year. Its enlargement by the addition of four new bungalows accommodating twenty or twenty-five patients has made it possible to extend its work especially among sick soldiers, many of whom have been gassed, thus making them especially susceptible to tuberculosis. The original administration building, including the present dining-room and kitchen, has been thoroughly renovated and largely rebuilt. Our next need is a central heating plant which would cost about \$10,000, and a vocational training school where the patients might be

trained to earn their living in the future and by means of such teaching and work would be both mentally and physically helped. The endowment fund of the home has been increased by additions amounting to about \$3,000. The endowment now stands at \$50,800. Our ultimate mark is \$100,000.

I spoke in my last convocation address of the proposed new summer camp near Prescott. The fund for building purposes now amounts to about \$7,000. Double this amount is required. We are negotiating for a large tract of land, consisting of more than sixty acres, which has been offered to us at an extremely low price. We require only \$300 to complete the amount necessary for the purchase of this whole tract of land. Sufficient land was given for the site for the summer camp but we want the larger tract for other purposes. We hope to see established upon it a little later a holiday house under the auspices of the Girls' Friendly Society, where tired young women can come for rest and refreshment and return from their vacation benefited physically, mentally, spiritually. I hope we may have a camping place for the Boy Scouts and perhaps other young boys and men. Then we ought to have a rest house for our clergy and their families and other Church workers who cannot afford to spend either the money or the time to go at a distance for their holiday, which is sadly needed and which too often is gone without. This tract of land among the northern hills has pine trees scattered over it and through one part of the ground there flows a brook which ought to make possible a swimming pool. If all our Church people will get away from their narrow parochial and local ideas and realize the solidarity and unity of the Church in Arizona. this dream will speedily be fulfilled, or at least in part. I am sure that organizations like the Girls' Friendly Society. the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew, the Boy Scouts, will gladly do their part.

District of Asheville

Conclusion. From this hasty review of the achievements and opportunities of the Church it is evident that we have not accomplished as much as ought to have been done during the past year. This failure is mainly due I believe to the shortage of clergy. In spite of persistent effort I have failed to obtain the men we wanted and needed. This must be done this coming year and we must go on to greater things.

Next year will mark the completion of ten years of my episcopate. I hope it will also mark the completion of the cathedral and parish church of Phoenix, entirely equipped and with no debt resting upon it. I hope it may also mark the beginning if not the completion of some of the many new enterprises of which I have been speaking. There is only a slight indebtedness resting upon the Church in Arizona, less than \$3,000, and even that debt. small as it is, must be removed.

We hope to assemble next year, after Easter, with joy and thanksgiving in our hearts to consecrate the cathedral to the worship and praise of Almighty God and the service of all His children. We must dedicate ourselves more

earnestly to our work, God's work, the work of the Church and of a suffering world, and by prayer and service seek to make this Church of ours a tremendous power in the great task of building up the Kingdom of God here in Arizona, the youngest of the commonwealths, which rightly demands our affection and allegiance, our faith and our works.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF ASHEVILLE

The Missionary District of Asheville includes that portion of the State of North Carolina lying west of the eastern boundaries of the counties of Allegheny, Wilkes, Alexander, Catawaba, Lincoln and Gaston. It has an area of 11,710 square miles and a population of 487,500 people (census of 1910). The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1895. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Junius Moore Horner, D.D., consecrated in the year 1898.

The appropriation of the Board to Asheville is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$5,000; (3) For work among Negroes, \$1,100; (4) For United Offering work among white people, \$2,760.

Report of the Bishop—1919

T HE missionary work in the district has been most satisfactory for the year in spite of the shortage in our clergy force. We have not felt justified

in increasing our force with the present available funds for salaries, but we have been forced to use the general funds released by the vacancies to in-

crease the stipends of clergy now in the field, or many of them would have been compelled to go elsewhere because of inadequate support where they are. As soon as the N. W. C. funds are available for salaries, we hope to increase our corps of workers. It is necessary that we have at least a salary of \$1,500 and house for a clergyman with family.

The N. W. C. was entered into with enthusiasm by our clergy and the result has been most satisfactory. Many parishes, as a result of the enthusiastic efforts in the Campaign, have become entirely self-supporting, besides doubling or trebling their gifts to outside objects. We will continue the policy of the Campaign and keep our Campaign committee in full force and in efficient activity.

We estimate that sufficient strength and interest have been developed in the district to justify our organizing into a diocese before the next General Convention that we may apply for recognition as an independent diocese. Most of our clergy and laymen seem to be willing to assume their part of the responsibility and labor incident to such an advance.

We will continue to concentrate more and more upon the strengthening of strategic points without opening new mission points until we can have a larger force in the field.

Sunday-School Work. The Sunday-schools of the district under the wise and active leadership of our committee on Religious Education have developed remarkable strength and efficiency. This is indicated by the large Lenten Offering made by the children for missions, which is more than three times what it was a few years ago. We regard the children of these schools as a very important part of the active army of the Church in the mountains. They are already soldiers of the King, and not merely in a course of preparation therefor.

Industrial Schools. Two of our schools suffered serious losses by fire during the year, but both have started actively to replace the burned buildings. In addition to the destruction of the building at Valle Crucis School, the loss of two lives in the flames was a very serious blow to the school. required a long time for the school to recover from the terrible shock of this The sympathetic interest of friends of the school was most valuable at this time, not only in a material way, but in the prayers offered and in the kindly words expressed. The rebuilding is going rapidly forward.

The loss of the dormitory at Christ School, Arden, was also very serious, but the rector and principal of the school were able to crowd most of the boys in nearby houses and only a few boys had to be sent home for lack of accommodation. It is hoped that both buildings will be ready for the opening of the schools in the fall.

The Patterson School, Ledgerwood, has had the money given for a memorial hall by Mrs. Gard of Lenoir, who has been a frequent visitor at the school, and who knew of the great need of a dormitory for the boys. They have been too much crowded in small quarters heretofore for efficient work. It is hoped that this dormitory will be ready for the fall opening of the school.

If it were not for the building material which these schools have in lumber, stone, and sand, it would be a most inopportune time to build, but they can put up these buildings at less than half what it would cost if these materials had to be bought in the open market.

The Appalachian School at Penland has had many improvements made in the building and will open with an efficient corps of workers this summer.

Special contributions from without the district have been: For general objects at discretion of the bishop, \$5,516.68; for schools specially designated for rebuilding, etc., \$16,756.89.

District of Eastern Oregon

On account of the N. W. C. efforts, the specials sent in to be used by the bishop have been much less than usual and a large deficit for the year has been the result, as obligations had been assumed that had to be met.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF EASTERN OKLAHOMA

The Missionary District of Eastern Oklahoma includes that part of the State of Oklahoma east of the west lines of the following counties: Osage Nation, Moman, Okfusgee, Seminole, Pontotoc, Johnston and Marshall. It has an area of 30,000 square miles and a population of about 1,000,000 people. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1910. General Convention of 1919 united the Districts of Oklahoma and Eastern Oklahoma. The bishop is the Right Reverend Theodore Payne Thurston, D.D., consecrated in the year 1911.

The appropriation of the Board to Eastern Oklahoma is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$6,155; (3) For work among Negroes, \$600; (4) For United Offering work among white people, \$840.

[No report has been received from the bishop.]

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF EASTERN OREGON

The Missionary District of Eastern Oregon comprises that section of the State of Oregon east of Cascade Mountains, including the counties of Baker, Crook, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Klamath, Lake Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Wheeler. It has an area of 65,683 square miles and a population of 150,000. The district was established by the General Convention in the year 1907. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Robert Lewis Paddock, D.D., consecrated in the year 1907.

The appropriation of the Board to Eastern Oregon for 1917-18 was: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900.

[No report has been received from the bishop.]

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF HONOLULU

The Missionary District of Honolulu includes the Hawaiian Islands, consisting of Niihau, Kauai, Oahu, Molokai, Maui, Lanai, Hawaii and the smaller islands. It also includes Midway; and, in addition the American islands of the Samoan group—Tutuila, Olusinga, Manua, Ofu and Rose. It has an area of 6,649 square miles and a population (1910) of 192,109, an increase of 24.7 per cent. in ten years. A conservative estimate now is that the population is 217,660, not counting the men of the army and navy stationed here. These figures do not include the Samoan Islands. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1901. The Samoan Islands were added in 1904. The Bishop of California, acting for the Presiding Bishop, took over the Church and its property, worth \$101,000, on April 1st, 1902. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Henry Bond Restarick, D.D., consecrated in the year 1902.

The appropriation of the Board to Honolulu is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, Hawaiians, Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, etc., \$23,370.

Report of the Bishop—1919

THE past year has been one of advance despite peculiar difficulties. During the whole time of the war so many ships of the Pacific were taken to the Atlantic that these Islands suffered greatly from lack of means of transportation of freight and passengers. After the armistice there was no relief and it is only now that we have begun to resume normal conditions. the workers engaged had to wait six weeks in San Francisco for a boat. This inability to get workers threw additional responsibility upon those here and cost my General Fund, which is contributed by friends here and elsewhere, a large sum of money.

In spite of this every institution of the Church is crowded so that we have to turn many away and at the present writing not one of them is in debt for current expenses incurred during 1919—although there are debts of about \$1,000 for deficiencies of 1917 and 1918, represented by notes due to the First National Bank. We raised the prices in our institutions from twelve to twenty per cent and cut out everything possible.

How we shall come out in the Summer when our income from students is cut down I do not yet know, but I suppose I shall have to do as I did last year—get the money to pay bills.

We have made progress in many directions though we have not erected any buildings because of the prohibitive cost of material and labor.

We suffer from unrest here as well as elsewhere and at this writing Japanese agitators have led their countrymen to strike although the laborers received last year house rent free, water and fuel and doctor free and with the bonus system based on the price of sugar, monthly wages of \$117. No wonder they send millions of dollars yearly to Japan. The Buddhist priests and societies are behind the strike and the newspapers here declare it is part of a plan for the Japanese to gain control of the great sugar industry. The strike has followed the proposal at the last legislature of the territory to abolish the Japanese language schools which are most of them Buddhist; the design of the schools being, it is generally believed, to keep the children Japanese, and that certainly is their tendency.

The Japanese children go to their language schools at 7 a.m. and (due to compulsory education) to the public schools from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. where they go again to the Japanese schools.

District of Honolulu

The result is bad for the health and learning of the children.

We have never had Japanese schools connected with the Church. Our instruction is given in English and the design is to make the Hawaiian-born Orientals, Christians and Americans.

We do give from the Board the small sum of \$20 a month to a Korean language school and \$20 to a Chinese language school. I have long considered dropping them but the Reverend Kong Yin Tet, in whose judgment I have great reliance, said that if we did so the children could not join in worship with their parents but he said: "This will soon end, for all our services will be in English."

It is so with the Korean schools. But I have come to the conclusion to drop even these small payments because the public feeling against these Oriental language schools is very strong. If the parents want their children to learn their language they must pay for it themselves as the Chinese and Koreans do partially.

The different races here which have heretofore lived amicably together are now in a disturbed condition, the Koreans and Chinese having no dealings whatever with the Japanese.

These circumstances have affected all Christian work among the Japanese. Congregations of Christian denominations and some night schools have fallen off in attendance in a distressing way. We have suffered also, but not in the same degree as others because we have always stood for Americanization, but I am sorry to say that one of the agitators in the present trouble was once a catechist.

Now as to progress: On the Island of Hawaii, Hilo has become a self-supporting parish under the Reverend J. Lamb Doty. It is true that this is not due to the increased ability of Church people as much as it is due to the business concerns making pledges which are most reliable assets. At Hilo there are

two English-speaking congregations, our own and the Union or as it is still called "The Foreign Church" as during the monarchy it was the Church of the Foreigners.

The Japanese work at Hilo is under Mr. Doty and such assistance as he engages and it is holding its own, pending the obtaining of a trained Japanese priest or catechist.

North of Hilo there are two English-speaking stations and a Japanese mission. The priest-in-charge, the Reverend F. N. Cullen, is paid by several plantations and provided with a house. We have had good Japanese catechists in the past at one of these stations—Paauilo—but one died and the other, lured by high wages in California, slipped in under the pretense of continuing his studies. This has been done by a large number of young Japanese who are now making fortunes by raising potatoes in the Sacramento Valley.

At Kohala, still further north, there are four missions under a candidate for Holy Orders, a priest going there every two months. There is a white congregation, two mixed English-speaking ones, and a Korean mission. They are all doing well but the candidate has no time to study for his examinations and I am about to move him to Honolulu and try to get some one for Kohala.

On the west of Hawaii we have two stations and practically minister to all the white people on that side of the Island. There are not many of them because the population is largely Japanese, Korean and Hawaiian.

On Maui, the four missions continue their work. Their difficulty is that their young people move to Honolulu so that they do not increase in numbers. But they act as feeders to our schools and churches in this city. No one away from here can imagine the difficulties which we face. At Wailuku we have one man—the Hawaiian Board has in the district of Wailuku twenty-four

men and women workers well paid, and with seemingly unlimited means for any project launched. Yet we keep up the Church, and its influence is strong. There is no hostile feeling but on the contrary most kindly relations and the Congregationalist planters help support our Church by liberal gifts, acknowledging its work.

Lahaina has a congregation of Hawaiians who are working people and here again the planters contribute generously to the support of the Church. Because of their generous giving I have been able to increase the salary of the priest at each place \$300 a year.

The mission at Kula is composed of Chinese small farmers whose children move to Honolulu; so the work does not grow locally.

On the Island of Kauai the Reverend Marcos E. Carver has for two years been carrying out the experiment of ministering to Christians of all kinds. One service which he holds on Sunday is congregational in character, the other three which he conducts on Sundays and week-days have Church services. He has four schools for religious instruction which meet for an hour once a week on various days. The people are satisfied with the arrangement and have requested me to continue it.

In Honolulu the work goes on in a way which elicits the wonder and admiration of Church people who pass through or visit the place. It will bear inspection from anyone and an excellent spirit prevails.

The Reverend James F. Kieb at the Epiphany, Kaimuki, has the only place of worship in the district in which the Church is situated and he is doing a fine work among the children and adults.

At Saint Mary's we are gradually working up an orphanage for little girls under the devoted women workers.

At Saint Andrew's Priory, Sister Olivia as principal has the confidence and high esteem of the entire community and the school is in excellent condition.

Iolani, turning away pupils for lack of room, waits longingly for the results of the Nation-Wide Campaign in the hope of getting a new building.

For the Cluett House we have purchased during the year an adjoining piece of property which has upon it three cottages. These were at once filled with young women who earn their living or are students in the normal school. The cost of this property was \$15,000, towards which a Congregational missionary's son gave \$5,000.

Saint Elizabeth's goes on steadily. We have suffered from the inconvenience of change in workers but the people remain faithful and the spirit is excellent.

I did not attend the General Convention because the going of Canon Ault as a delegate would have left the work in bad condition for services.

During the past year I have done as much work as I ever did but find that thirty-eight years of hard work in a semi-tropical and tropical climate have worn me down so that I sometimes feel I cannot go on. I am blessed with as loyal a set of clergy and workers as any bishop has ever had and it is due to this that the work is in good condition. Despite the large increase of salaries in all directions our workers have had as a rule no increase. They have gone on uncomplainingly because of their devotion to Christ and His Church. I am often blamed by unthinking laity for paying workers so little. Those concerned know that it is not my fault that they are underpaid and they know also that I frequently supplement stipends from funds which I manage to get from friends. Few missionary districts can show so few changes in the clergy list as Honolulu can in the past fifteen years. As to lay workers it is only those who just come "to see the Islands" who leave us.

District of Idaho

The Japanese question is the most difficult which confronts us and I thank the Board of Missions for making provision that Dr. Motoda may come here and make a survey of conditions, though a survey is of little use unless it is followed by men and money to

carry on the necessary work.

This year in April is celebrated the centennial of the landing of the missionaries of the American Board on these Islands. Many noted men from the mainland are coming. It is with a feeling that it is a great honor that I record that I have been asked by the children and grandchildren of the missionaries to contribute to the book which is to be published, an article on the value of the work begun in 1820. The request was accompanied by the statement that I had always made the fairest statements known to them.

We are doing our best to "carry on" the warfare of the Kingdom of God and we can do no more than this.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF IDAHO

The Missionary District of Idaho includes the State of Idaho. It has an area of 84,290 square miles and a population of 425,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1907. The Presiding Bishop placed the Bishop of Spokane in charge of this district until the General Convention of 1919, when the Right Reverend Frank Hale Touret, D.D., was translated from Western Colorado.

The appropriation of the Board to Idaho is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$5,150; (3) For work among Indians, \$2,600; (4) For United Offering work among Indians, \$900; among white people, \$1,000.

AT the request of the bishop of Spokane, I am making a report of the missionary district of Idaho for 1919. After the death of Bishop Funsten, Bishop Page assumed charge of the work in Idaho and remained in charge until I took up my residence in Boise on the first of January, 1920.

During the temporary administration of Bishop Page, Idaho presented many difficulties. Perhaps the greatest of these arose because of the limited number of men on the clergy staff. The whole southern part of Idaho was undermanned and the bishop of Spokane encountered the same difficulty that we all have experienced, namely, the scarcity of clergymen who are willing to make sacrifices in the missionary field. No new men were brought into Idaho, and, as I look ahead, I am wondering how long it will be before some of these important vacancies will be filled. Present conditions do not warrant great optimism in this direction. The most important thing that could happen to Idaho would be the coming of six or eight well-equipped, courageous missionaries. The great problem of Idaho is the problem of men. We used to say it was a two-fold problem, both men and money. Now, under the budget system, the problem has been reduced to that of the right kind of material.

Soon after the death of Bishop Funsten occurred the death of Miss Emery, superintendent of Saint Luke's Hos-This necessitated a change in management at the hospital. Bishop Page called Miss Sarah Smith from an army hospital on the Pacific Coast to take charge. During the past year the hospital has been full to overflowing and, as reported in the previous year, it has outgrown its present building and is ready for the new fire-proof structure which we hope soon to build. For this worthy enterprise, we should have a quarter of a million dollars, and I cannot conceive of a finer memorial to Bishop Funsten.

Our school for girls, with accommodations for about thirty boarding pupils, has had in it nearer fifty. Here again the Church needs a substantial sum of money for the expansion of the work. Bishop Page very wisely constructed a recitation building which has very considerably helped the situation. This new building, however, is only the beginning of new equipment which is absolutely necessary unless we are going to be content to have this splendid school just mark time. Hardly any progress can be made unless we have more buildings. We need a gymnasium and we need an infirmary. We also need more dormitory space. I am convinced that under the present high cost of living, the school can never be maintained at the present rate of tuition and so I propose during the coming year to increase the rate at least 33 1-3 per cent. I am laying plans to bring into the school several new teachers, as wellequipped as those to be found in any boarding school in the country.

The Indian mission at Fort Hall I find in splendid condition, due to the consecrated service of the two women workers who are in charge. At this school we are caring for and educating twenty-two Indian girls. The new building erected in 1918 seems inadequate to our need, and it is my earnest hope that within a short time money may be forthcoming for an addition to this building.

Business conditions in Idaho were never brighter than at the present time. There is a progressive spirit in all the small towns in the state and I meet no one who does not feel sure of Idaho's coming prosperity. The great irrigation projects now being considered present a most hopeful aspect, and there are thousands of acres of sagebrush which, within a few years, are likely to be green with alfalfa. The state of Idaho, now with a population of about 400,000, will not have to wait many years before being credited with

twice that number of inhabitants. Any clergyman who has zest for building and has in him the spirit of adventure need not hesitate to become a member of the clergy staff of Idaho.

I cannot close this report without expressing deep gratitude to the bishop of Spokane for the service which he has rendered to this missionary district during his administration as bishop-incharge. I am glad to accept work from the hands of a warm friend. I realize the most devoted service of Bishop Funsten extending over a period of twenty years in this western country. And with such a background of loyalty to the Church and devotion to the Cause, one feels the challenge to measure up to one's opportunity.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF NEVADA

The Missionary District of Nevada comprises the entire State. It has an area of 110,690 square miles and a population of about 100,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1907. Its bishop is the Right Reverend George Coolidge Hunting, D.D., consecrated in the year 1914.

The appropriation of the Board to Nevada is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,600; (2) For work among white people, \$4,920; (3) For work among Indians, \$1,200. For United Offering work among Indians, \$600.

Report of the Bishop—1919

A T the urgent request of those in charge of the Nation-Wide Campaign the bishop gave about half of his time during the year to that cause in the Eighth Province. This was done at the expense of some progress of the work in Nevada. It is felt that results will amply justify the sacrifice.

Two new men came in 1919. The Reverend Charles S. Mook came to Carson and its nearby missions, where the field seems ready for the formation of a rural parish, as it might be called, with Carson as the centre and the whole work to become self-supporting within the year. The rector at Carson has grasped the opportunity presented at Stewart, a non-reservation school for

Nevada Indians, to use the two hours a week allowed by the Government for religious instruction. Here we have about thirty children, nearly all confirmed, from our Agency Church at Nixon.

The Reverend Henry R. Sanborn, after his discharge from the army with the rank of major, was ordained deacon in September and placed in charge of Saint Paul's Mission, Sparks, where a rectory is to be built or purchased soon. He is also chaplain at the state university at Reno, where over 25 per cent of the enrollment express a preference for the Episcopal Church. It is hoped that this year will see the erection of a student chapel nearby.

Our first Summer School for Church workers was held this year at Lake Tahoe with a good attendance and excellent class work. A good friend was so impressed with it that she promised four acres of land in the vicinity of our camp for a Summer Church Colony. Here we will build an outdoor chapel in which services will be held for the hundreds of tourists who throng the resorts. A holiday house will also be erected for the use of the clergy who can have a vacation at nominal cost and conduct the chapel services. We will establish a Church colony, leasing ground to Church people who will furnish the nucleus for our Summer School each year.

Trinity Church, Reno, has sold its land. The building will be taken down and rebuilt as the chapel at the university. A new site for Trinity will be purchased and there is a movement on foot to offer the church to be crected to the bishop for a cathedral. The church, parish house, and rectory will be built with money on hand, the money received from the sale and to be subscribed and from the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The Nation-Wide Campaign at Fallon is expected to find fruition in a rectory, very much needed, and for which assistance has been given by the Board from undesignated legacies.

Within a week of this writing a new man will come for Tonopah and adjacent missions. This place has not had a resident minister for over a year. It is a most important mining camp and presents a great opportunity for constructive work.

We have started a mission on the Moapa Indian Reservation which was abandoned by the Mormons after a little religious work had been done. Here are about 115 Shoshone Indians. One of the archdeacons will go there twice a month and it is hoped the Nation-Wide Campaign will enable us to put a woman worker here.

The bishop was able to have the legislature at its last session pass three laws which should help much. The marriage law was changed so that now all applicants for a license must answer all questions under oath, with a very heavy penalty for perjury. Among the questions asked are those concerning previous marital condition—have you been married before, is your husband (or wife) dead, are you divorced, if so, when, where, and why?

Also provision was made that Indians and whites might marry. Unquestionably the ultimate solution of the "Indian problem" is assimilation with the white race. This provision makes all such unions legal, even though it be only a "common law" marriage, legitimatizes the children and makes them heirs of their parents' estate.

It was enacted that school census marshals shall enumerate all Indian children. This means that state and county money will be paid for their tuition and that school boards can be compelled to admit them to the public schools and enables the 500 Indian children in the state, and not on reservations, to get an education.

The apportionment for general missions was overpaid about 20 per cent and every parish or mission paid in full or more.

Avery Winnemucca, a full-blooded Pah-Ute Indian boy, seventeen years of age, desires to enter the ministry of this Church. A native priest would mean the salvation of the 2,500 Pah-Ute Indians in the state. Two good women of the Church, splendid friends of Nevada, one East and one West, have promised to provide the necessary funds for his education. He will enter an Eastern school next autumn. He will come back to his own people on the reservation each summer, so that he will not get out of touch with them nor forget his own language, and so greatly lessen his opportunity to serve.

High wages, the high price of steel and powder, and the excess profits tax have wrought havoc with the metal mining industry in the western states; and Nevada has felt the effects which have greatly cut down production and depleted the population of some of the camps.

We hope 1920 will be an effective year in the work of the Church in Nevada. We will not make any promises except to be faithful to our task and go forward to the limit of our ability.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF NEW MEXICO

The Missionary District of New Mexico comprises the Territory of New Mexico and the counties of El Paso, Reeves, Jeff Davis, Brewster, Presidio, Terrell and Pecos in the State of Texas. It has 153,340 (New Mexico, 122,460; Texas west of Pecos, 30,880) square miles, and a population of 399,608 (New Mexico, 327,000; Texas west of the Pecos, 72,608). The Missionary Jurisdiction of New Mexico and Arizona was created in 1874. The Territories of New Mexico and Arizona were separated and formed into independent missionary districts for convenience of administration in 1892. Texas west of the Pecos was added to the Missionary District of New Mexico in 1895. The present bishop is the Right Reverend Dr. Frederick Bingham Howden, consecrated January 14, 1914.

The appropriation of the Board to New Mexico is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$4,500; (3) For work among Indians, \$800; (4) For United Offering work among Indians, \$900.

Report of the Bishop-1919

DURING the past year I have visited all of the forty-one parishes and missions at least once with the exception of the missions of Organ, Estancia and Santa Rita, where the conditions seemed to warrant my going at another time, and have held services at many of our organized stations.

To some of these places, where there seemed special need, I have made as many as five or six visits during the year, and as the radius of my journeys

on these visitations involves from 500 to 1,400 miles, the traveling has been fairly incessant. My diary shows the following summary for the year:

Officiated at 166 services; meetings, 59; celebrations of Holy Communion, 58; confirmations within district, 230; in diocese of Chicago, 12; in Massachusetts, 1; sermons, 93; addresses, 108; burials, 2; marriages, 4; baptisms, 10; ordinations, 1.

My official records show also:

Clergy received, 2; clergy licensed without letters dimissory, 1; ordinations, 2; clergy transferred, 1; additional lay-readers licensed, 8.

Survey. Reviewing the General work of the district as a whole, and dwelling in detail only upon such items which, for obvious reasons, should be noted, I would report that we have been handicapped somewhat by several of our stations being without the services of resident pastors a large part of the year. Tucumcari, Clovis and Silver City and the missions in connection with these places have been particularly unfortunate in this respect. For about two months the parish at Silver City had the services of the Reverend Howard Ziegler of the diocese of Bethlehem. but, owing to the effect of the altitude upon a member of his family, Mr. Ziegler felt obliged to retire from the work. The parish activities were retarded by this misfortune, especially in Sunday-school and choir, so that for several months no services were held. I am happy to record, however, that Reverend Thomas A. Schofield, formerly archdeacon of Colorado, is now in charge of this parish and the missions adjoining. The vacancy at Saint James's, Clovis, is also now filled by the Reverend William Brander. Saint Michael's, Tucumcari, has been without a resident clergyman for the past eight months, and, as yet, I have been unable to supply the vacancy. In all of these places the work has been carried on to some extent and I have personally given services as often as possible.

At Fort Sumner a favorable opportunity to sell the guild hall was accepted by the trustees of the Missionary district, and the property disposed of. This leaves us, at present, with several lots in Fort Sumner, but no building. The fact, however, that this sale of property has provided a substantial fund for the erection of a church would seem to compensate for

the temporary loss of the building which was not adequate for our purposes and which was unfortunate in its association with undesirable secular The experiment in Fort conditions. Sumner of establishing a social center for the counteraction of demoralizing town influences has not altogether, in my judgment, proven a success, due to the fact that for most of the time the work was necessarily outside the direction and guidance of a clergyman. But the experiment was entered into in good faith and whatever lack of success it has had will prove a valuable lesson in the work of our mission field. I am convinced that social service work, however important it may be in our communities, should never be allowed to grow up apart from the regular Where it beservices of a church. comes a choice of erecting one of two buildings, either a church or a hall for various secular purposes, the former should be chosen, unless a combination can be provided in which the sanctity of the altar can be conserved.

At Carrizozo and Alamogordo, missions that were formerly in connection with Tucumcari, we have been very fortunate in being able to provide regular services and supervision during the last half of the year, this work having been under the charge of the Reverend F. M. Johnson, Jr., who came to the district about a year ago as assistant in Saint Clement's Church, El Paso, and camp pastor at Fort Bliss, under the appointment of the War Commission. Since this particular war work at the camp has ceased, Mr. Johnson has been acting as secretary of the American Legion, El Paso branch, and in connection with his duties as secretary, he has been able to hold regular services every Sunday in Carrizozo and Alamogordo, with the result that there has considerable development Church life in these places.

Another sphere of noteworthy change is that of the group of missions with

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Marfa as the center. The Reverend Clarence McClellan, during the past year, has succeeded in strengthening these several missions by holding frequent services and the organization of bishop's committees, so that the time has come when this field is ready for an additional clergyman, and it is hoped that a new center may be created at Alpine.

The work of Mr. McClellan has included numerous visits to army camps stationed along the Rio Grande River to protect the border against the raids by roving bands of Mexican bandits. This work involves considerable traveling over an enormous extent of territory, and this fact also makes an additional clergyman essential if all the towns and villages and camps are to be adequately ministered to. There are some 32,000 square miles in this section of our district, for nearly all of which this missionary is, at present, responsible.

There have been material improvements in the property at Marfa, several memorials having been given, among which should be noted a handsome pulpit given by one of the officers of the district Woman's Auxiliary, in memory of a son who made the supreme sacrifice in the recent war.

A change has also taken place in the work at Belen, Socorro, San Marcial and Magdalena, by the necessity of relieving the rector of Saint John's, Albuquerque, of outside missionary work, and the appointment of the Reverend Edward S. Doan as missionary-incharge of Saint Andrew's, Las Cruces. This enabled a new combination whereby these missions could be ministered to from the south rather than from the north, and also meant the creation of a new unit where it was possible to place a resident clergyman.

There has been some development in the group of missions now being ministered to by the Reverend Hunter Lewis, which includes Hillsboro. Lake Valley, Hatch, Rincon, Engle, Organ, and La Mesa, besides the central point, Mesilla Park. A request from persons in the village of Hill for the establishment of a mission there is now under consideration, and as soon as possible it is hoped that we can inaugurate work at that place. The most signal achievement in this group of missions has been the erection of the new Grace Church, Hatch, which I dedicated last summer, and which now has been completely paid for and is ready for consecration. Regular services at all these points have been held during the year.

At Gallup, in the extreme western part of the state, the Reverend Cyril Boodington began his work as missionary-incharge of the chapel of the Holy Spirit in July last, after graduating from the Pacific Divinity School and completing his term as a candidate for Holy Orders in this district. The mission at Gallup had been without the services of a resident clergyman for six months and the work there and at the mining camps near by had necessarily suffered, but under Mr. Boddington's guidance there has been gratifying progress and a renewal of courage and enterprise on the part of our Church people. The plan which I proposed for the sale of the present rectory, which is somewhat remote from the church, and the erection of a new rectory and parish house on the lots adjoining the church, has been acted upon favorably by the local congregation, and this change is now being made. When completed should mean a decided improvement to our church property and enable us to administer more effectively and conveniently to the community life of a growing city where the field for social service is of great importance, and at present practically untouched either by the churches or secular agencies. missionary car has been provided for this field, through the cooperation of the local congregation and the district, which will enable the missionary to

reach the several coal mining camps situated in this part of the state.

At Tucumcari, it has been thought best to use funds on hand, originally intended for a new church, to enlarge our present building and so complete a suitable parish house and rectory. This will enable the mission to arrange for the proper accommodation of the clergyman in charge, and use the present parish hall for the services, pending the erection of a church at some future date.

In El Paso, Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Las Vegas, our parishes continue to grow. The rapid increase in population in El Paso and the present extent of the city demand the inauguration of at least three new centers for church work. Accordingly property has been acquired by Saint Clement's Parish, and plans drawn for the erection of a new church plant in a section known as Manhattan Heights. Saint Clement's proposes to bear the expense of this undertaking, the initial part of which has been estimated at \$12,000.

As an evidence of the present growth of the Church in the district, it will be noted that the number of confirmations during the year considerably exceeded that of any previous year. The number of clergy, both active and non-parochial, is greater than ever before, and there have been decided increases in the number of communicants, lay-readers, missionary contributions, value of property and mission organizations.

The area of the district is so immense, and many of our towns and villages so remote, that the task of supplying missionaries and chapels is necessarily a difficult problem, yet of the greatest necessity, if the field is to come under the Church's influence. Many crying needs, such as the building of a church sanatorium for the care of tubercular patients who come to New Mexico from all parts of our country, many of whom are members of the

Episcopal church, and the beginning of some constructive missionary work for the Mexican immigrants and Spanish-Americans, who still probably outnumber the so-called white population. have been obliged to give way to what seemed even more pressing demands upon our limited resources of missionaries and funds. But on the other hand it is encouraging to recognize that the district was never before so well equipped with clergy and, in spite of several vacancies which I am seeking to fill, the larger circles of missionary activities which formerly existed have gradually been drawn in by the creation of new centers and units, until in almost every considerable section of territory our people may have the ministrations of the Church, occasionally at least, and hardly any section can be considered to be outside the reach of one of our own clergy.

With a view to future development it should also be noted that the district endowments have grown considerably and that our people are imbued firmly with the diocesan ideal. Every member of the district Woman's Auxiliary is now asked by the various branches to make an annual subscription for the endowment of the Episcopate, so that on a conservative estimate of realty value, we can report a valuation of district property, independent of all parish or separate mission funds, of \$35,000 as against \$54 six years ago.

Indian Work. Our Indian work has had a successful year marked by continued usefulness, as the work obtains the confidence and interest of those to whom we are ministering. Our women missionaries in charge of the San Juan Mission have shown a most heroic and self-sacrificing devotion, under conditions which during the winter of 1919 proved most trying. The weather was the coldest known to the oldest inhabitant and this, together with a second outbreak of the influenza epidemic, caused great suffering among the In-

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dians. It is significant that the government Indian agent in charge of the New Mexico portion of the Navajo Reservation makes special mention in his official report to the federal Indian office of the valuable work done by our workers at the San Juan Mission in the following words: "If true religion consists of visiting the sick, ministering to them, comforting the dying and burying the dead, and the missionary is one who performs that duty, then the greatest missionary effort during the period under discussion was by the Episcopal Mission Hospital near Farmington under Miss Peters."

The agent then proceeds to give a graphic description of what our women missionaries accomplished during the influenza epidemic; how the lives of many of the Navajos were saved by the nursing and care which they received at our hospital, and how, when some patients died, these women dug graves for them, and gave them decent burial because no white men were anywhere near, and the Indians were too overcome with superstitious fear to touch the bodies of the dead.

The field work of the mission has been considerably extended during the year through the visits by Miss Ireland and Miss Olcott, the nurses, to our outlying hogans. This work has helped to secure the friendship and confidence of the Indians, and proven beneficial in the treatment of trachoma and in dietary and nursing instructions to the mothers of babies and small children.

During the summer a Sunday-school was started. It took a little time to impress the Navajos with the purpose of such religious instruction, but gradually this was accomplished and Sunday after Sunday the young and the old, men and women, others with their babies, all came, some bringing their flocks of sheep or goats, which grazed about the mission while the instructions were going on. Sometimes the sessions lasted almost the entire day, for the

Navajos are glad to linger when they feel that they are wanted, and can be told something. Successful Thanksgiving and Christmas celebrations were held, about two hundred Navajos coming from various parts of the reservation to take part in the Christmas festival. All this seems to indicate the growing influences and effectiveness of our missionary work among these nomad Indians.

Whatever problem there may be in Indian evangelization must I think be regarded as tribal or individual rather than racial. Given a fair chance the American Indians have, as a whole, proven their ability to qualify for citizenship and service in Christ's Kingdom, but certain tribes have, through past neglect, not been given this chance and as a consequence are far behind their brethren in more favored sections of our country. Among these neglected ones the Navajos, which comprise the largest tribe of our American Indians and which have greatly increased in population during recent years in spite of hardship and various handicaps of environment and ignorance, are perhaps the most conspicuous.

The missionary work among these people must therefore require considerable patience, and technical results in the way of baptisms and confirmations must necessarily for a little while yet be meagre, but excellent foundations have now been laid, age-long superstitions and prejudices are being laid aside through the steady establishment of confidence and affection in the hearts of the Navajos, for the mission and its women workers. Through the interest of the members of Mrs. Pilsbry's Bible Class of Philadelphia, funds are now on hand for the new chapel and this, with the new school building which the Woman's Auxiliary has provided for, should enable us to extend our Indian work along lines of worship and religious education which up to this time has been greatly needed.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF NORTH DAKOTA

The Missionary District of North Dakota includes the whole State of North Dakota. It has an area of 72,000 square miles and a population of over 650,000 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1883. Its bishop is the Right Reverend John Poyntz Tyler, D.D., consecrated January 6th, 1914.

The appropriation of the Board to North Texas is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,600; (2) For work among white people, \$6,600; (3) For work among Indians, \$2,280; (4) For United Offering work among white people, \$1,000.

Report of the Bishop-1919

THE Church has surely done a wise thing in having all reports and accounts closed with the ending of the calendar year. I presume this is the first time in the history of the Church in this country that this is the case. It will be a little inconvenient until we get accustomed to it, but in the end will be of tremendous advantage.

We failed to announce in our last report the death of the Reverend H. T. Sockett on Saturday morning, October the nineteenth, 1918, in Saint James's rectory at Grafton. Mr. Sockett was in charge of the church at Grafton and several adjoining places in all of which he was doing exceedingly good work. He accidentally wounded himself in his hand and died from this injury. He was a kindly, big-hearted man of broad sympathies and unfaltering devotion to particularly his calling. He was adapted to the kind of work which he was appointed to do. He is survived by his wife and three small children.

On Epiphany, I celebrated the fifth year of my consecration to the episcopate. These have been five very happy years of work with the people of North Dakota. Almost all of them have been spent in the shadow of the great world war; but notwithstanding this, I am gratified to know that our common task has gone forward with fine spirit and accomplishment. This district was established by the General Convention in This is, therefore, the thirtysixth year of its organized life. This is a short time compared with the age of most of the great dioceses of the Church. Growth and stability require time. When God wishes to raise a frog stool He does it over night. When He desires to raise an oak, He takes decades to accomplish it. Work in a new country is like working upon a procession. People come and go with such rapidity and constancy that you scarcely know from one year to the other what you have to count upon, but this great state

is becoming more permanent all the time. It is establishing its institutions with efficiency and building for the future.

The Church has made fine progress during the years of its life here with the men and money at Her disposal. There have been very few mistakes made in the building of churches and in the establishment of the work of the Church. We have reason to thank God, take courage, and press forward.

We have tackled during the year the matter of self-support with splendid accomplishment. We propose to press this matter with increasing emphasis. It is very remarkable when all things are considered that we have attained the progress we have along this line. No work of the Church can grow and become solid that does not seek to support itself. It may be compelled to be nurtured during its infancy and early years, but all the time it must be looking towards the time when it will support itself and become a helper to others.

This is an agricultural state. Fully nine-tenths of its wealth, I presume, comes from the soil. When the season is a poor one our people suffer from lack of crop. The entire western part of the state for the last three years has suffered tremendously from this cause. The people out here are a generous people and respond readily to calls made upon them.

We have made some very fine progress in improvement and development of our work in many places during the year. Saint Peter's Church, Williston, has been moved, enlarged, and a fine concrete basement put under the entire building at an expenditure, with the necessary furnishings, of more than \$4,000. Two-thirds of this at least has been paid for by the congregation.

Near Guelph, a few miles out in the country, among a splendid set of country people, Saint Mary's Church has been built costing more than \$7,000, all

of which has been paid except \$3,000 by this congregation. This work has been done under the faithful and efficient leadership of Archdeacon Martyr. It does one good to see the presence of this church among these people who love it and value its services.

The congregation of All Saints', Minot, have disposed of their inadequate church and rectory and bought a new and up-to-date rectory and have laid the foundation for a \$40,000 church, more than half of which sum they have subscribed. Minot is one of our growing and coming towns. The rector and people seem alive and awake to the place the Church should occupy in such a community.

The congregation of Saint Matthew's, Linton, have bought a valuable property for the rectory and with help have paid half of its cost. This we hope to make, as soon as possible, the headquarters of an interesting missionary field.

The church and rectory at Devils Lake have been painted inside and out and a very useful morning chapel erected in the wing of the church. The debt on this property has been materially lessened. The congregation of the Church of the Advent, Devils Lake, is a fine one and has pressed forward under very adverse conditions with splendid zeal and a fine spirit of self-help.

Gethsemane Cathedral has been painted and other improvements are being provided for.

The rectory at Lisbon has been painted inside and out and the debt on the church materially lessened.

Saint Stephen's Church, Casselton, has been painted inside and needed exterior repairs put upon it. The debt on this property has been very much lessened.

The debt on Grace Church, Jamestown, has been almost extinguished.

Very great improvements at considerable cost have been made in the par-

ish houses of Saint Paul's, Grand Forks, and of Saint George's, Bismarck. There are a number of minor improvements and enlargements which have been made.

Apart from these physical improvements to our property all of our places have accomplished splendid results in increasing the stipends of the clergy. The good work is still going on. The desire to increase the support of the clergy is not only present but a genuine realization of responsibility on the part of the people themselves is manifest. This we consider promising. We speak of this growth with great satisfaction.

In addition to their recognition of duty to their own clergy, all of our places, with only two or three exceptions, have made splendid progress in giving for the extension of the Church throughout the world. The apportionment for missions was exceeded by more than one-third and every place in the district paid its apportionment, with two exceptions.

Our Church-schools, which up to this year have held first place in per capita giving, in all probability will have to surrender this place of honor to the schools of the diocese of Pennsylvania. We want it distinctly known, however, that our schools have given more during 1919 than ever before. We have grown, but Pennsylvania seems to have grown more.

Our three branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and forty-four guilds, besides several other associations of women workers, have done a tremendous amount of work during the year for their own home needs and for the Church at large. It is our great desire to get all of our guilds interested in the extension of the Church throughout the world. This will mean greater efficiency at home. Our delegates to the triennial meeting of the women of the Church in Detroit in October were the happy bearers of \$1,500 for the

United Thank Offering. We are glad to note that the interest of the women of the district is steadily increasing in this fine piece of work.

Our ten branches of the Junior Auxiliary and three branches of the Girls' Friendly Society are doing very efficient work.

Under the efficient management of Mrs. Margaret Helferty our Church Hall at Valley City has done admirable work during the year. The reputation of the Hall for its comfortable table and sweet home spirit has been maintained. The salary of Mrs. Helferty, which is \$600 per annum, is paid from the United Thank Offering. In addition to this salary Mrs. Helferty receives board and rooms for herself and her little boy. She is splendidly fitted in every way for the responsible position she is filling so acceptably.

The Reverend Albert E. H. Martyr has accomplished splendid work during the year as archdeacon. He serves between twenty-five and thirty places in the northeastern and southeastern parts of the district with a remarkable degree of regularity. He is a born missionary and the people throughout his vast territory hold him in high esteem and value his faithful ministrations.

Faithful work has been done by our clergy, all of whom seem to realize that they must spread themselves out as much as possible and minister to as many of the small towns and villages as they can.

The N. W. C. has been quite well prepared for. A number of places made their canvass on Advent Sunday with very gratifying success. We are all busily engaged in furthering the Campaign and purpose to leave no effort unmade to bring it to a complete and successful end.

Our immediate needs are for a Church and rectory at Oakes and a Church and rectory at New Rockford. Both of these towns are growing com-

munities and strategic centers of importance and expansion. We have lots and a small building fund at both of these places. We need rectories also at Towner and Rugby. It is impossible in this country to carry on the work of the Church without a comfortable and up-to-date house for the clergyman to live in. Rents are enormous and houses very scarce.

We greatly need two additional archdeacons, one for the western part of the state and the other for the central part, who would do such work as Archdeacon Martyr is now doing. Frequently places suffer because of the removal of missionaries, and before they can be supplied, serious injury takes place to the work because there is no one to carry on even temporary services. An archdeacon would largely prevent this loss as well as look after many of the towns and villages that now have no ministrations of the Church and very infrequent ones of any kind.

We need four *Ford* automobiles. This would tremendously augment the services of four of our missionaries. They would be enabled, the best part of the year, to reach a number of places which they cannot reach by railroad.

These are the outstanding physical needs of our work at the present moment. Of course, the great need is for strong spiritually-minded men.

Our Indian work shows steady advance under the faithful work of the Reverend H. H. Welsh, native priest-incharge. Mr. Welsh makes his headquarters at Saint James's Church, Cannon Ball, on the Standing Rock Reservation, where we have an apology for a rectory and a very good parish house and a lay-reader's house. Twenty miles across the reservation, at Red Hail, we have Saint Gabriel's Chapel, a parish house and a lay-reader's house. Near Fort Yates we have a mission but no chapel. Mr. Welsh is assisted on the Standing Rock Reservation by two very faithful catechists.

Miss Margaret R. Elliott, a white worker among the women and children of the reservation, makes her headquarters at the sub-station near Cannon Ball, and does very efficient work, not only among the Indians but among the whites.

The Reverend Wellington Salt, native deacon, has for more than twenty-five years been doing valiant work among the Indians on the Turtle Mountain Reservation in the northern part of the state with his headquarters at Dunseith. On this reservation we have Saint Sylvan's Chapel. We have no rectory or parish house. Mr. Salt is ably assisted in his work by his wife, both of whom are thoroughly interested in the welfare of the Indians.

On the Fort Berthold Reservation in the northwestern part of the state we are carrying on work on either side of the Missouri River, which runs through the reservation. At Fort Berthold we have succeeded in securing a vacated government school house which we expect to move on our own ground and fit up for a chapel. Here we have a resident lay-reader. We hope to have a chapel on the western side of the reservation where we now have a helper who conducts meetings in a private house each Sunday.

On the Fort Totten Reservation, which is in the central part of the state, we need a chapel to take the place of the old log one which was destroyed by a severe wind storm. Here we have a resident lay-reader. Towards this chapel we have \$1,400.

Our Indian congregations always more than pay their apportionments and the Sunday-schools are most liberal in their Lenten offerings. The congregations are increasing in their gifts for the support of their own current expenses.

The pressing things of our Indian work are \$1,500 to help build a new chapel on the Fort Totten Reservation and \$1,500 to remodel the rectory at

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF NORTH TEXAS

The Missionary District of North Texas comprises all that portion of Texas generally known as the Panhandle, including and lying north and west of the following counties: Wilbarger, Baylor, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Callahan, Coleman, Concho, Tom Green, Irion, Reagan, Upton, Crane, Ward. It has an area of 76,551 square miles and a population (in 1910) of 423,865. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1913. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Edward Arthur Temple, D.D., consecrated in the year 1910.

The appropriation of the Board to North Texas is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,600; (2) For work among white people, \$4,100.

Report of the Bishop—1919

I N my last report I had to record a very distressing condition of things over a large portion of this district, the result of one of the worst droughts ever experienced in this part of the state where droughts are frequent and ex-

pected by the people. I am glad to report this year that this condition has passed in a great measure, but the results will be felt for a number of years. Abundant rains have fallen all over this section, and the farmers who

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remained have made splendid crops. There were a few cattle left in the country because they were too poor and weak to stand shipment. Those that survived are now fat and strong with abundance of feed and water. ranches are being rapidly restocked by shipment from outside, and in this respect the country will soon be normal. Many of the people who left the country have returned, and others are Materially this country is coming. prosperous, and is rapidly becoming normal, but it will take many years for the parishes and missions to regain their former numbers and strength.

In all parts of this district they are digging for oil, and every place has hopes of finding it. The towns are all filled with strangers, many of them young men without homes; all must be looked after spiritually. I have been able to secure two more clergymen to assist in the work and have every hope of getting still another to help in the near future. There have been no new missions opened during the year, but the help of these extra clergymen makes it possible for us to give more frequent services to the missions already established than has ever been possible before. All three of the parishes have

rectors and all the missions are having more frequent services.

A decided step forward has been made in the little student work that is possible, for there is only one state educational institution in this district. The Archdeacon of The Plains has his headquarters in Canyon, and holds regular services in the little church recently erected there, and is working among the students at the West Texas State Normal College. The congregations already overflow the little church building and a number of students have been presented for confirmation. We are trying to increase this work and hope in the near future to build a hostel for the young women attending the college.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF OKLAHOMA

The Missionary District of Oklahoma consists of that part of the State of Oklahoma west of the east line of the counties of Kay, Pawnee, Payne, Lincoln, Pottawatomie, McLain, Garvin, Carter and Love. Its area (approximately) is 40,000 square miles, population, 850,000 (census of 1910). The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1910. The Right Reverend Francis Key Brooke, D.D., died October 22, 1918. The Presiding Bishop placed the Bishop of Eastern Oklahoma in charge of this district until General Convention of 1919 united the Districts of Oklahoma and Eastern Oklahoma with Right Reverend Theodore Payne Thurston, D.D., as bishop.

The appropriation of the Board to Oklahoma is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the Bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$6,065; (3) For work among Indians, \$1,000; (4) For work among Negroes, \$500; (5) For United Offering work among white people, \$1,100, among Indians, \$300.

[No report has been received from the bishop.]

THE PANAMA CANAL ZONE

The Panama Mission includes primarily that part of the Republic of Panama, political sovereignty over which was secured through purchase by the United States Government, and commonly known as the Canal Zone. It is about fifty miles long and about ten miles wide. It also includes the cities of Panama and Colon, besides that part of the Republic of Panama lying south of the southern boundary of the Zone, and that part of the United States of Colombia included within the jurisdiction of the Bishop of British Honduras prior to March, 1906. Reverend James Craik Morris, D.D., is the bishop-elect.

The appropriation of the Board to the Panama Canal Zone is \$4,466 for work in the Canal Zone.

Report of the Bishop-in-Charge-1919

A CCOMPANYING this is a statistical report of the work in our mission on the Isthmus of Panama for the year 1919. These statistics reveal a very healthy condition in the mission, and credit for this is due to the faithful and persevering labors of those few clergymen and lay helpers who have for so long a time been my fellow workers in the pleasant task of caring for this field.

To these laborers I desire, through you, to convey my grateful acknowledgment of loyalty and loving service; and I congratulate him who is to become the bishop of the Canal Zone in reality on the pleasant task that will fall to him in having such fellow workers.

To you, sir, for your confidence and trust in me, for your patience at my shortcomings as your commissary during these twelve years that I have acted

for you, I return loving thanks. You have honored me on four different occasions by appointing me as your commissary to represent you in four difficult fields, and my wish here in this my last annual report as a missionary bishop is to put on record my appreciation of the liberty and freedom, the lack of interference, which have marked this relationship with you. If my labors in Cuba, Haiti, Porto Rico and Panama have contributed anything to the wellbeing of those missions, it has been largely because of the inspiration given me by the confidence you have reposed

With this report the Panama Canal Zone passes from its anomalous condition and becomes organized and equipped for aggressive work as a missionary district, and with a resident bishop. It is not, therefore, my place to recommend plans for the further extension and development of the influence of the Church. He who has been selected, and will be consecrated as the first bishop of the Canal Zone, is in every way qualified to organize and inspire, and I believe that on the

foundations already laid he will be able to erect a structure impressive and useful.

In the summer of 1919 I visited for the last time the Isthmus, and confirmed 171 persons, besides attending to the other duties laid upon me as your commissary.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

The Missionary District of the Philippine Islands includes the archipelago bearing that name, together with Guam, and Wake Islands. It has an area of 115,026 square miles and a population of 7,635,426, of whom 6,987,668 are civilized and 647,740 are wild. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1901. The presiding Bishop placed the Bishop of Shanghai in charge of this district. Reverend Gouverneur F. Mosher is the bishop-elect.

The appropriation of the Board to the Philippine Islands is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For administration, Treasurer's office, printing, incidentals, etc., \$2,960; (3) For work among native peoples, \$60,616; (4) For work among Chinese, \$3,682.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF PORTO RICO

The Missionary District of Porto Rico includes Porto Rico and adjacent islands, and the Virgin Islands of the United States. It has an area of 3,600 square miles and a population of 1,118,000 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1901. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Charles Blayney Colmore, D.D., consecrated December 17, 1913.

The appropriation of the Board to Porto Rico is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among Porto Ricans, etc., \$35,094.

Report of the Bishop—1919

THE past one has been a normal year in Porto Rico, the official acts showing a slight increase over the last year. Our meeting of convocation was held in the new buildings at Mayaguez, which had been finished a few months before and gave great encouragement to all, that the work of building up the material equipment had been begun. No new equipment has been secured during the year included in this report, all efforts at raising funds having been stopped during the progress of the Nation-Wide Campaign in the United States.

The survey made for the Campaign, however, showed more clearly than ever how deficient the Church in Porto Rico is in proper equipment. Every mission in the district is in need of large improvements to give any adequate means of accomplishing the work we have in Churches, parish houses and rectories are needed on all hands. Our askings are comparatively large, because of the fact that practically nothing has been invested in the recent past to build up the equipment. The Campaign has raised great hopes in us that Porto Rico's day is approaching. The district has not been behind-hand with its own quota. Each mission has subscribed more than the amount assigned to it and the one parish of Saint John's in San Juan has promised considerably more than the total quota for the whole district.

The usual number of changes has taken place during the year in the per-

sonnel of the staff, thus confirming our former opinion that it will be necessary to train our own native ministry. Four young men are now preparing themselves to take up the study of theology and several younger boys are being brought up with that end in view. The Reverend H. C. Salmond, of Tennessee. has been appointed to take charge of the English-speaking work in San Juan and will take up his work early in the new year. This will free the Reverend H. P. Walter for the important duties of warden of our local seminary and the training of the native young men in the practical mission work near San Juan. We began last summer a training school for women parish workers in Ponce under the supervision of the rector of Holy Trinity Church. young women are in training and Deaconess Gadsden has been appointed to take charge of the school. With these two training schools we should in future years have some efficient native workers in the Church.

The Reverend Camille Estornelle, who was a candidate of this district, studying at the Philadelphia Divinity School, graduated last year and was ordained deacon in May and took up work at Saint Luke's, San Juan, in June. The Reverend Messrs. Whittle and Dickey have been transferred to Wyoming and New York respectively.

It is my sad duty to record the death of two workers and a prominent layreader. Miss Frances Cuddy, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, had been with the

mission in Porto Rico for eighteen vears. Mr. Carmelo Maldonado, a devoted native catechist who was doing splendid work for the Church in the country districts around Fajardo, died as the result of an attack of influenza. and Mr. Gerhardt Monefeldt, a faithful communicant and lay-reader in Maya-. guez since the beginning of Saint Andrew's Mission, has been called to the higher life.

Saint Luke's Hospital, badly damaged by the earthquake in 1918, has been thoroughly repaired and under the efficient management of Miss Ellen T. Hicks has done excellent work and made a good reputation in the com-With the assistance received munity. annually from the Board, the hospital

is in good financial condition.

At the General Convention of 1919 the Church in the Virgin Islands of the United States was made part of the district of Porto Rico. By this action more than 1.800 communicants have been added to the district. There is one parish, All Saints', in Saint Thomas and two, Saint John's, Christiansted, and Saint Paul's, Fredericksted, in Saint The rectors at Saint Thomas and Christiansted decided to ask to be transferred to the American Church and are still in charge of their parishes. The Reverend Philip S. Smith, of New Jersey, went down to Fredericksted in July as rector of Saint Paul's. Each of these

parishes should be provided with an assistant clergyman, but none of them will be able to pay the salaries at first. All three parishes are at present selfsupporting.

Our industrial training is progressing quietly and our expectations are to increase the facilities for training at both Mayaguez and El Coto de Manati, with-

in the next three years.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SALINA

The Missionary District of Salina was set off from the Diocese of Kansas by the General Convention in 1901. It includes 50,700 square miles. The present population is about half a million. Its bishop, the Right Reverend John C. Sage, D.D., died Oct. 2, 1919. The Right Reverend George A. Beecher, D.D., Bishop of Western Nebraska, is in charge of the district.

The appropriation of the Board to Salina is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,600; (2) For work among white people, \$5,350.

URING the General Convention in Detroit in October, 1919, the presiding bishop appointed me as bishopin-charge of the missionary district of Salina. On the twenty-third day of November I made my first visitation to the district and held services in Christ Cathedral, Salina, in the morning, and in the evening preached at the Church of the Holy Apostles in Ellsworth. In the afternoon of Monday, the twentyfourth, I met with a committee representing the cathedral chapter and went over with them various accounts due from the district and the cathedral chapter to the local banks. In the evening I held a meeting of the entire cathedral chapter, at which time many details were taken up for consideration relative to the indebtedness on Church property. Mr. Charles A. Tompkins, assistant treasurer of the Board, was present at these meetings and greatly assisted us in his counsel relative to these important matters. On Tuesday, I met with all the clergy of the district and began the day with a celebration of the Holy Communion and spent the balance of the day in conference with the clergy relative to the work of the whole district. I visited Saint Barnabas Hospital and held a conference with Mother Helena, who is a registered nurse and superintendent of the hospital. I also visited Saint John's Military School and held a conference with the headmaster, Major Ganssle. school is leased for a period of twenty years, the lessee paying to the district of Salina the sum of \$1,000 as rental each year. I am not able to state the definite details of this lease at this time.

During the two months of November and December I made three visitations to the district, spending the time of each visit in the city of Salina for the purpose of conferring with the members of the cathedral chapter in an effort to formulate definite plans for meeting the financial obligations rest-

ing upon the district.

On December twenty-eighth I organized the various committees for the Nation-Wide Campaign in the city of Salina, with the result that on Monday, the twenty-ninth, the committees reported a subscription of \$3,600 for the local budget. I have received word from the chairman of the committee that this has been increased to \$4,038 for the local budget. They are endeavoring to increase the total budget to \$6,000, including \$1,000 for the Nation-Wide Campaign fund. On the twenty-third of November I confirmed a class of four, presented by the Reverend Dr. Morrow, priest-in-charge of Christ Cathedral, Salina.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SAN JOAQUIN

The Missionary District of San Joaquin includes the counties of Alpine, Calaveras, Fresno, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Mono, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Tulare and Tuolumne in the State of California. It has an area of 46,000 square miles and a population of 300,000 people. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1910. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Louis Childs Sanford, D.D., consecrated in the year 1911.

The appropriation of the Board to San Joaquin is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,600; (2) For work among white people, \$4,900; (3) For United Offering work among white people, \$500.

Report of the Bishop—1919

THE first six months of 1919 were the most discouraging in our history. The influenza epidemic had closed all our churches for periods varying from three to six months. Regular services and sessions of the Church-school had ceased. Our treasury was depleted, and most of all a general apathy pervaded the district.

The last six months on the contrary have furnished more of encouragement than any corresponding semester since the setting apart of the missionary jurisdiction. The improvement is due to the programme of prayer and service in which the whole Church is engaged and which is known as the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The begin-Changes in the Staff. ning of the year found us with two vacancies: at Lodi and Bishop. former cure became vacant in October, 1918, by the death of the Reverend C. A. Verleger, reported_a year ago. The latter vacancy was occasioned by the resignation of the Reverend James Cope, locum tenens, in December. The end of the year finds us, fortunately, with all vacancies filled. The Reverend A. G. Denman, on leave of absence, serving in France in the Canadian Army, returned January first, and resumed the charge of Saint Paul's Mission, Bishop, and Trinity Mission, Lone Pine.

On January thirty-first, the Reverend F. M. Baum resigned Trinity Mission, Madera, on account of ill health, and

died on March ninth. He was well known on the Pacific coast but had been connected with San Joaquin only one year. In that short time he won the confidence of his people and the affection of his fellow clergy. Never physically strong, he brought to his work a surprising energy. His unfailing enthusiasm and self-forgetfulness made him as beloved as he was respected. The Reverend F. O. Jones of the diocese of Oregon has since been officiating under license in Madera.

The Reverend W. T. Renison, rector of Saint John's Church, Stockton, returned March first, from France, where he had been serving as a Y. M. C. A. secretary. His resumption of the parish released the Reverend G. D. B. Stewart, locum tenens, who on the same date assumed charge of Saint John's Mission, Lodi.

The Reverend F. G. Williams, who had been vicar of the Mission of the Holy Spirit, Fresno, for two years, resigned August thirty-first to take work in the diocese of California. His place has been filled since November fifteenth by the Reverend George G. Hoisholt, lately returned from China.

The Reverend Richard Whitehouse after six years' effective work as the vicar of the Mission of the Good Shepherd, Reedley, resigned August thirty-first to accept a position in the diocese of Montana. The vacancy was filled October first by the appointment of the Reverend F. D. Graves, rector of the

Church of the Saviour, Hanford. The vacancy at Hanford thus created has been filled by the election of the Reverend D. T. Gillmor of the diocese of Los Angeles, who assumed charge January first, 1920.

The Reverend K. L. Houlder of the district of Idaho, officiating under license, resigned Saint Michael's, Tuolumne, January thirty-first. From February first to April thirtieth the Reverend H. A. Butler, of British Columbia, officiated there under license. Since then the mission has been technically vacant, but the work has been very well cared for since May by the labors of Deaconess Dorsey, in conjunction with the services of Mr. C. C. Miller, a candidate for orders in the district of New Mexico.

Reduction of Debt. In December, the mortgage indebtedness of Saint Mark's Mission, Livingston, Saint Luke's Mission, Merced, and Saint John's Mission, Porterville, was wiped The gift of \$1,000 from the undesignated legacies together with a local subscription will extinguish the debt of Saint Paul's Mission, Visalia, in January. The sale of a city lot in Fresno, originally purchased as the site of the bishop's house, will reduce in January the debt on the episcopal residence to \$1,000. Other partial reductions and the carrying out of plans already under way make it possible for me to say that by Easter of the new year the total secured obligation of the district will be reduced to \$5,000, a net decrease of \$10,000.

The Nation-Wide Campaign. At the convocation in 1919, a diocesan programme was inaugurated looking to three months of intensive prayer and service in October, November and December. The plan contemplated a diocesan every-member canvass and an offering of personal service on the part of every parishioner. The schedule fitted in so happily with the Nation-

Wide Campaign that the two were worked together. The surveys, however, were so hastily made, and with so little knowledge on the part of the clergy and laity how to do it, that we did not feel justified in asking for more than the bishop had already entered in his budget presented to the council of domestic missionary bishops. We had practically no help from the national committee, the visit of Bishop Huntington to convocation, the conference of the Reverend L. G. Wood with our diocesan committee and the meeting with Dr. Hyde at Stockton and Fresno being the only personal contact with the national agents of the Campaign. Our diocesan committee, of which Mr. F. A. Eckstrom of Stockton was the efficient chairman, worked unremittingly, and while the unanimous cooperation on the part of our parishes and missions hoped for has not materialized, and the direct financial returns have been somewhat disappointing, the indirect results in the access of interest and increased local initiative have surpassed our expectations. Local conditions prevented in some places the canvass from being made December seventh. Every parish and mission which made the canvass "went over the top," oversubscribing the Nation-Wide quota and increasing, by amounts varying from one hundred to two hundred per cent, the subscription for local support. More than one half of the diocesan quota has been pledged. Parishes which would have died of fright ten years ago had they been asked to give \$300 to the missionary apportionment will give \$3,000 in 1920 with enthusiasm. A few parishes and missions are hopeless at present, but others are planning the canvass in Lent and are confident of success. The surprising feature is in the new determination on the part of certain missions to achieve self-support. Reedley, Lindsay, Porterville and Visalia are in this class, all having increased their monthly pledges in sums from one hundred to three hundred per cent.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SOUTH DAKOTA

The Missionary District of South Dakota includes the whole State of South Dakota and also the tract of land in northwestern Nebraska once known as the Santee Reservation. It has an area of 80,000 square miles and a population of over 500,000 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1883. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Hugh Latimer Burleson, D.D., consecrated in the year 1916; the suffragan bishop, the Right Reverend William P. Remington, consecrated January 10, 1917.

The appropriation of the Board to South Dakota is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For support and traveling expenses of suffragan bishop, \$3,900; (3) For work among white people, \$4,700; (4) For work among Indians, \$31,283; (5) For United Offering work among Indians, \$1,460; among white people, \$684.

Report of the Bishop-1919

THE year 1919 has been a prosperous one for the Church work in South Dakota. On March first our suffragan bishop returned from over-seas and took up his work. The impress of his presence is already strongly felt. From the beginning it was planned for him to be located in the western part of the state, but it was impossible for him to secure a dwelling-place until August, so he and Mrs. Remington made their headquarters at the Bishop's House in Sioux Falls until September first, when they became residents in Rapid City, and thus was established a second episcopal center. Bishop Remington will devote himself largely to work among the missions in the white field.

The reaction from war conditions has set in, and we have greatly increased our staff of clergy. During the year there have been nine received, and another who has been canonically connected since July, 1918, returned from war service and took up his work. Four

have been added by ordination. During this time we have lost two, making a clear gain of twelve. With two or three more we shall have our present posts well filled and be ready to begin aggressive work in new places.

The White Field.

There are now five deaneries in the white field fully organized and operating. The clergy gather in small groups for helpful and stimulating conferences; also, the deans have taken a measure of oversight of missionary work in their deaneries. The plan is still in process of development, but it makes hopeful progress.

No new buildings have been erected during the year, but many have been repaired and improved, and three rectories and one bishop's house have been purchased.

All Saints School. The greatest project ever undertaken in South Dakota is nearing completion. It was to

raise a fund of \$200,000—\$100,000 to be known as the Helen S. Peabody Endowment, in honor of the one and only principal of All Saints, who has been its guiding spirit for thirty-five years; and the other \$100,000 to modernize the plant and erect necessary new buildings. This campaign was begun in May under the stimulating leadership of Mr. Charles H. Burke of Pierre. The city of Sioux Falls subscribed \$110,000 and over \$50,000 have been raised in the rest of the state. More will be secured, but for the completion of the entire amount we must probably count upon the help of interested friends out-The subscriptions run over a period of four years. This movement will place the school on a substantial footing.

The Nation-Wide Campaign. In common with the rest of the Church, the Nation-Wide Campaign was carried forward in the white field, and participated in by the majority of the parishes and missions. A few places, whose clergy had only recently come, will complete the work in January and February. It was necessary, also, to delay the Campaign in the Indian field until February, as much education is needed and processes are slow. It also was essential to translate all the literature to be used into the Dakota tongue. The total results will not be known until March; but if the accomplishment already made is a fair sample of what will be done elsewhere, there is no question that South Dakota will reach its full quota. This, in addition to the splendid gift of the state to All Saints' School, sets a mark in generosity altogether unparalleled. It is significant that along with this is going a much more adequate self-support. I venture to believe that in this respect we have made a greater advance than in any previous year.

At the convocation in June the district voted to pay the salary of one of its bishops. This was done for six

months following, and is now merged in the work of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

Indian Field.

It is possible to report good things from the Dakota field. We have at last succeeded in what has been my constant effort since coming to South Dakota, and have provided an adequate literature for our Indian work. A special edition of the Dakota Bible has been printed, the Niobrara Course of Instruction prepared by Dr. Bradner of the Board of Religious Education, is in use throughout the field, and on Christmas we received our first consignment of new Service Books, so-called because it does not contain all the offices of the Prayer Book, but only those necessary for the work. It is the completion of a work inaugurated by Bishop Biller and was tremendously needed, as the former edition of the Prayer Book, issued in 1875, had become archaic, and those which did exist were altogether dilapidated. The putting forth of this book was a tremendous undertaking. I wish to record my obligation to Archdeacon Ashley, the Reverend A. B. Clark, the Reverend William Holmes, and the Reverend Philip J. Deloria, the committee of translators; and also to the Bishop White Prayer Book Society of Philadelphia who undertook the publication, and to the many friends who have helped me to finance it. The Indian people will have a bilingual book (one page English and the opposite page Dakota) which will help them greatly in their devotional life and be an educational factor of no small value.

One Church has been built during the year—a chapel at Grand River on the Standing Rock Reservation.

During the year in the Dakota field we have lost one of our clergy by death—the Reverend William Saul, deacon. He was among the early helpers of Bishop Hare and had worked long and faithfully.

District of South Dakota

The Reverend Luke C. Walker, after nearly fifty years of service, retired upon a pension during the year, though he still continues to exercise his ministry.

There have been some changes in the leadership in this field; the Reverend David W. Clark has become the superintending presbyter of the Crow Creek Reservation, the Reverend Henry Whipple St. Clair, formerly of Minnesota, has taken charge of the Sisseton Reservation.

Our Indian Schools. Saint Mary's and Saint Elizabeth's have continued their quiet and effective work under Miss Bridge and Deaconess Baker. I have insisted that a beginning be made by the people in giving some contribution in return for the education of their They cannot do much, but children. either in money, labor, or kind they can each give something. The response to this request has thus far been gratifying and hopeful. I wish to say that no where in the mission field, foreign or domestic, is there more self-sacrificing and devoted service than that rendered by the white women who are teaching in our Dakota schools.

We are looking forward hopefully to the establishment of a small school for boys in the near future, which will in a simple way be an industrial school, giving training in agriculture and handicraft, and enabling us to select the most promising of our Indian boys, from whom we hope to secure some future candidates for the ministry.

The Niobrara Convocation. Our convocation this year was held at Saint Elizabeth's Church, Wakpala, and signalized the thirty-six years of service of our honored priest, the Reverend Philip J. Deloria. About 2,000 Indians were gathered and the convocation was stimulating and successful in every respect. Two Dakotas were ordained to the

priesthood and one to the diaconate, and the total offering reached nearly \$7,000—a great advance over any previous year.

In closing, I would express my gratitude that the stimulus of the Nation-Wide Campaign has made it possible to increase moderately the salaries of our missionary clergy, especially those in the Indian field, and also the teachers in our Indian schools.

I am sure that I speak the mind of the suffragan, as well as my own, when I say that we are cheered and encouraged on every side, and thankful that our lot as leaders in God's Church has fallen in such a hopeful field as the state of South Dakota.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SOUTHERN FLORIDA

The Missionary District of Southern Florida includes that portion of the State of Florida lying south of the southern lines of the counties of Levy, Alachua, Putnam and St. John. It has an area of 37,349 square miles and a population of over 400,000 people. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1892. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Cameron Mann, D.D., translated from North Dakota, 1913.

The appropriation of the Board to Southern Florida is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$4,600; (3) For work among Negroes, \$3,750; (4) For United Offering work among white people, \$650.

Report of the Bishop—1919

PRESENT my report for 1919 with the glad assurance that, on the whole, that was the most satisfactory year the district of Southern Florida has had. Not that I can point to any great building erected, or any large endowment secured, or to several new parishes organized and new missions established. But there has been considerable advance in every department of our work. There was larger and prompter payment of parochial, district and general dues; $_{
m much}$ improvement was churches, rectories and furniture; there were more confirmations than in any previous year; the Sunday-schools made their biggest Lenten Offering for missions; and, best of all, the spirit and temper of the clergy and laity were predominantly loyal and enthusiastic.

One man was ordained deacon and priest. Four priests were received; one was transferred. Two deacons and two priests died. Consequently the number of clergy remains just what it was. There are forty-six, of whom nine are non-parochial. But we have had the efficient help of seven priests, not canonically resident, who ministered during a good part of the year—and specially at the time of the influx of winter visitors and winter residents. These seven men were actually, though not nominally, on the Southern Florida staff, and counted for much in the work of the district.

The Nation-Wide Campaign was carried on through much of our territory,

and in most places successfully. Where it was not attempted the reason was that there was no resident clergyman to make proper preparation, and no layman was qualified to do so. There will be attempts this year to conduct some sort of campaign in those places. Our campaign was hampered by lack of literature, lack of outside speakers-we had but one-and by the illness of several of our own clergy at the most Moreover—whatever critical period. was the guiding rule in making out the diocesan quotas—it seems that the quota assigned to this district was excessive. Six dollars per communicant for general work—in a region inhabited by people having the small incomes that our resident folk usually have, is rather a large order to start with. Had this levy been on the winter visitors, it would look different. But the winter visitors say they pay at home. Nevertheless, by many of our congregations the allotment was met, and even exceeded. And it appears that Southern Florida, while not giving all that was asked, will give four or five times more than ever.

In the death of Reverend E. I. Georges the district lost an able priest, who was leading the colored folk of Tampa in a remarkable way. And he had an excellent helper in the Reverend N. J. Ward, deacon, who did exactly the diaconal work, as it is prescribed in the Office for Ordination of Deacons. He also died during this year.

District of Southern Florida

The death of Reverend H. A. Brown did not change conditions here, for he was only canonically resident—having returned to his duties as an army chaplain. But he is affectionately remembered by the people of his former charge in Tampa.

The Reverend W. A. Gibson was doing well in Saint Salvadore Mission, West Tampa, amongst both colored people and Cubans, when he was summoned to the other world.

The statistics for 1919, as reported to the convention, which met in January, 1920, are given at the end of this report.

I confess I do not understand some of these figures. The total report for general purposes is only \$1,493.53. But the report sent out by the General Board of Missions shows a giving of \$4,811.79—an excess of over \$500 on the district apportionment. I suspect that, in most of the parochial reports to convention, the money given for missions was listed under "diocesan purposes" as going to meet the diocesan assessment.

Also, I cannot explain the report of only 4,599 communicants, when the report of the previous year was 5,007.

The striking item in building was the completion of the structure of Saint Paul's Church, Key West—not the interior finishing and furnishing—at a cost of \$16,000. Of this sum \$8,000 was borrowed.

Other highly important accomplishments were the moving of Holy Trinity Church, West Palm Beach, to a larger and much finer ground, and its enlargement, at a cost of \$23,750; the adding of a chancel and chapel to Saint Patrick's Church, West Palm Beach, at a cost of about \$4,000; the moving of Saint Matthew's Church, Delray, to a better site, and adding to it a sacristy and bell-turret, all at a cost of \$1,000; the completion of Saint Mary's Church, Deerfield, costing \$800; the payment of debt on, and addition to, the parish hall of Holy Cross Church, Sanford—

\$2,500; the purchase of a \$9,000 rectory by Saint Andrew's Parish, Tampa; an \$8,000 enlargement of Saint Stephen's Church, Cocoanut Grove; a \$1,000 enlargement of Saint Mary's rectory, Daytona; the improvement of both church and rectory in Saint John's Parish, Tampa, at a cost of \$1,550.

Minor, yet considerable improvements were made in Holy Spirit Church, Apopka; Saint James's Church, Zellwood; Saint Thomas's Church, Eustis; Saint Barnabas's Church, De Land; Saint James's Church, Ormond Beach; Grace Church, Ocala; Church of the Redeemer, Avon Park; Saint Edmund's Church, Arcadia; All Saints' Church, Lakeland.

Also, there were gifts of windows, vestments, altar furnishings, and so on, to Saint Mary's, Micco; Saint Andrew's, Tampa; Saint Matthew's, Winter Haven; Holy Trinity, Bartow; Holy Cross, Buena Vista; Saint Mary's, Daytona; Holy Cross, Sanford; Saint Matthew's, Delray; All Saints', Lakeland. A bell has been put into Christ Church, Bradentown; and a stone altar into Saint Patrick's Church, West Palm Beach.

There are now eighty-five churches, thirty-five rectories and seventeen parish houses or halls in this district. Most of these are simple wood buildings, but some are handsome and durable structures of brick or stone.

Of our two institutions, Saint Luke's Hospital remains as I reported it a year ago. There are good buildings on an excellent site; there is an endowment fund of \$52,000. But there is not sufficient support from the local physicians—who are intent only on personal gain, and who support a county hospital, which they rule—to enable Saint Luke's to run under the present prices of labor and material. So, there is nothing to do but to wait—keeping the buildings in repair and letting the endowment grow.

The Cathedral School for Girls had a fine year. It took all the pupils it could accommodate and had a long

"waiting" list. The buildings were greatly improved, at an expense of \$13,500. Of this sum we had to borrow \$3,000. All the rest was given by various people in the district. The school now has sixty boarding pupils, which is all it can hold. One new dormitory would be welcome. But I do not care to have more than seventy-five boarding pupils. Too great a number would destroy the "home atmosphere" which is now a chief charm and value.

I regretfully state that the Reverend Roderick Prevost Cobb, who has been rector of the school during the past eight years, has felt obliged, for reasons of health, to resign his charge. He became rector of the school when it was in a precarious condition. His fine and kindly personality and his large ability soon changed that condition. school now has an excellent reputation and a strong support. As its terms are made on the lowest possible scale—so that people of small means may be able to send their daughters—it does not make money. It does something better; it makes Christian and Churchly women. It ought to have a good endowment, but it has one only of \$1,500. Moreover, it owes, besides the \$3,000 already mentioned, \$5,000 of floating debt, and \$7,500 for the property bought two years ago-as stated in my last report. I have to confess that the financial condition of the school is my chief worry. But the school itself is one of my chief satisfactions.

The work amongst the colored people steadily improves. We retain the invaluable services of Archdeacon Ir-We have another white priest, Mr. Caslor, who has achieved surprising results in West Palm Beach and Delray. Dr. Jackson continues his services to colored folk in Homestead. There is a colored priest at Cocoanut Grove and one at Orlando. The deacon at Saint James's, Tampa, will soon be ordained priest, and, it is hoped, the new church there will be completed this year. There are well-attended parochial schools in Cocoanut Grove, Orlando and Tampa.

Finally, we are all committed to the enterprise of making this missionary district into a diocese. I have very strong confidence that we will succeed.

And so, I sign this report with much gratitude for the past and much hope for the future.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SPOKANE

The Missionary District of Spokane includes the eastern portion of the State of Washington to the summit of the Cascade Mountains. It has an area of 43,000 square miles and a population of 409,690 people. The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1892. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Herman Page, D.D., consecrated in the year 1915.

The appropriation of the Board to Spokane is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$5,750.

District of Spokane

THERE has been considerable change in the personnel of the clergy in the district of Spokane during the year 1919. In the spring the Reverend A. C. Peabody resigned charge of Okanogan and Omak to take up work at Windsor. Vermont. He was succeeded in the fall by my son, the Reverend Herman R. Page, who left the army July first. In the summer I made certain readjustments in the city of Spokane. Reverend M. J. Stevens resigned Epiphany, Hillyard, to devote his entire time to Saint John's, Spokane, and Saint Thomas's, Spokane (colored). Reverend J. G. Larsen, who came to us from the diocese of Dallas, assumed charge of the work at Hillyard and also Saint David's, Spokane. The Reverend Lindley H. Miller, who came from the diocese of New York, took charge of Saint Mark's, Ritzville, and Saint Peter's, Spokane, on September first. The Reverend E. W. Burleson, formerly of Sand Point, Idaho, took charge of Holy Trinity, Palouse, on November first, the work there having reached such a point of development under the care of the Reverend G. W. Laidlaw that it asked for a minister of its own.

In September the Reverend I. E. Baxter resigned quite suddenly the care of Saint James's, Spokane; so on November first I transferred the Reverend L. K. Smith from Prosser and Kennewick to Saint James's. At the same time the Reverend Frederick Luke resigned his work in the four missions of Sunnyside, Granger, Mabton and Zillah to accept a call to become the assistant at All Saints' Cathedral, Spokane. The Reverend John Leacher, who had the missions at Pomeroy, Waitsburg, Starbuck, Huntsville and Dayton, left us in September to undertake work in the diocese of Montana.

It will be noted that all but one of these resignations came in the fall, and the result has been that five missions in the Yakima Valley have been without ministration all winter, although the Reverend C. A. Bragdon, S.T.D. (retired), has been kind enough to take temporary charge at Prosser and Mabton where the work has gone on well under his direction. Occasional services have been held at Kennewick. Mr. Leacher's field was perforce uncared for. The Reverend B. A. Warren at Walla Walla was the only clergyman of the Church in that whole section of the district.

The Reverend H. I. Oberholtzer of Grace Church, Ellensburg, returned from over-seas in the fall and has put new life into the parish.

The work of the year was sadly hampered by the influenza which raged in some of the missions well into Lent. The effect was peculiarly disastrous in our Sunday-schools. Nevertheless the results for the year have been encouraging. The number of confirmations was the smallest in years; but on the other hand we seem to have struck bottom in the matter of Sunday-school attendance and are well on the up-grade again. This is a most gratifying fact. I am convinced that our work in the west will never grow until we do far more with the children than we are doing at present.

The records also show that substantial reductions have been made in the indebtedness of the churches of Saint Paul's, Walla Walla; Saint Michael's, Yakima, and Holy Trinity, Spokane. This fact is of great importance as the chief reason why the district of Spokane has lagged in meeting its apportionment has been because three of its five parishes have been well nigh ruined through heavy debts. I am glad to report that in all these cases the debts have ceased to be a menace and that the parishes are ready for more constructive work.

At Roslyn, a town of about 4,000 people in the coal mining district, the Reverend W. A. Sharp and his wife are doing a really heroic work. For many

months Mr. Sharp was the only clergyman in this district. His church grows steadily. The enrollment of the Sunday-school now reaches about 200. For teaching this number of children Mr. Sharp has only one helper besides himself. I am hoping to give him assistance ere long.

The work at Okanogan and Omak progresses favorably. The Nation-Wide Campaign in Okanogan more than quadrupled the amount pledged for current expenses and assures the quota for the general work of the Church.

The work to the north, in Okanogan and Ferry counties, moves steadily under the care of the Reverend G. H. Severance. In Oroville the Sundayschool which begun a few years ago with five pupils now has an enrollment of about ninety. For many months Dean Severance has been the only ordained clergyman ministering regularly in Ferry county. The work at the Church of the Redeemer, Republic, is in fine condition. Dean Severance has also organized two community churches, one at Chesaw and one at Orient.

I am glad to report progress in Stevens county, where the work is in the charge of the Reverend C. M. Budlong. The results at Northport have been especially gratifying.

The work at Ritzville developed to such an extent that I asked the Reverend L. H. Miller to give it two Sundays a month. A Sunday-school has been organized and the situation is promising.

The work in the city of Spokane has held its own but because the changes mentioned above have been so recent there is little to report, save in the case of Saint John's. A few years ago Saint John's was a parish and obtained permission to move its building, thereby incurring a large debt. At once the work began to languish and when I arrived as bishop, Saint John's had

closed its doors. I placed the Reverend M. J. Stevens in charge some few years ago and the work has taken on a new life. We had a chance to sell the property which had proved undesirable and purchased a fine lot a few blocks away, which also had on it an excellent rectory. It may be remembered that the Reverend M. J. Stevens is a carpenter priest. Largely with his own hands, and with such help as he could secure, he has built the Church of the Epiphany, Hillyard; Saint Thomas's, Spokane (colored), and the church at Glenrose. During the summer he erected the parish house section of the new church for Saint John's. It is a singularly attractive building. The people have gathered there for many social functions and the mission is developing a new corporate life. Services are held in the building and the attendance at these services, and also at the Sundayschool, has shown a marked increase. In the Nation-Wide Campaign, Saint John's was one of the missions that went over the top.

Last fall it became New Rectories. necessary for me to acquire a number of new rectories. In accordance with the custom of the district I have promised clergy who have come to me a certain stipend and house rent. The scarcity of available houses which has prevailed all over the country existed also here; and if my new clergy were to be decently housed I faced a situation which threatened exorbitant rents. So I was obliged to purchase several rectories-one at Hillyard, one at Palouse, and one for Saint James's, Spokane, in addition to the one already mentioned for Saint John's. In no case were the missions able to give any help because they had already incurred other financial obligations to the extent of their present ability. I wish to say in passing that these purchases represent no speculative fever. Since I have been bishop I have acquired but one rectory, and these buildings were pur-

chased only as a matter of self-protection in carrying on the work. In each case I feel that I bought at a low figure.

Saint Luke's Hospital. I am also happy to chronicle the fact that Saint Luke's Hospital has again become a Church institution. It was founded by Church people and when the articles of incorporation were drawn up I do not doubt that it was intended to be a Church institution on the religious side. When the fire occurred a few years ago I was obliged to rule whether it was a Church hospital or not; and I found that the Church had neither property nor religious rights that were beyond During the past year the question. trustees desired that it should be under the care of the Church. The articles of incorporation were changed so that now this institution is under the spiritual care of the bishop just as a parish is. At present the hospital is sadly handicapped for room, but plans have been drawn for a new wing on which we hope to begin construction immediately. A financial campaign will be carried on in Spokane during September, 1920. It is also hoped that a good donation will come from the Church at large. Last year Saint Luke's turned away 1,500 patients. This is abundant evidence of the need of the hospital. When the new wing is completed we shall have a capacity of over two hundred beds; and there will probably be one hundred nurses and attendants. The opportunity for spiritual ministration in such an institution will at once be evident. We are planning on incorporating an attractive chapel in the building.

Saint Paul's School, Walla Walla. Saint Paul's School, Walla Walla, has had the best year in its history. new building, which we erected several years ago with the help of the Board of Missions, largely increased the ca-pacity of the school. But even this was not enough. Several years ago a large residence lying south of the main building was acquired by Bishop Wells.

This year we have been obliged to use this for dorinitory purposes. When I came here as bishop there were about twenty-five boarders at Saint Paul's. This year we have had sixty, with about as many day pupils from Walla Walla. One serious feature in connection with the school is that there is a debt of about \$25,000. I feel that this is more or less of a menace to the financial stability of the institution, although we have been able to gradually reduce the amount year by year. It is a debt of old standing, incurred some years ago, before the present principal, Miss Galbraith, took charge.

Church Home for Children. When I came to Spokane I found the Church Home for Children housed in a truly miserable wooden building. In spite of the quarters, however, the Home did splendid work and was always full to capacity. When Houston School was closed we had on our hands a fine building erected for school purposes, which had ample dormitory quarters. The building was of brick and shingle construction, not fire-proof. The city authorities, however, were willing that we should use it for the Church Home on condition that the third story was closed off. So the trustees of Houston School deeded the property to the district for the use of the Home and we now have an excellent building with spacious grounds. The new Home has a capacity of about forty children and is filled to the limit. A small indebtedness was incurred in the renovation of the building, but this is being steadily reduced. The Church people of the district are supporting the work with much generosity. The parents or the guardians of the children pay a small amount monthly for the support of the children so that the sum to be raised on the outside is not overlarge. One cannot but feel that homes for children like this offer a large opportunity for spiritual usefulness for a relatively small outlay. It should be possible to largely increase the number of these institutions.

The Bishop's House. Another fact which it is pleasant to relate is one in connection with the bishop's house. When I came here there were invested funds with the book value of about \$9,500 to be used for a bishop's house. They represented the assets of a fund given for a bishop's house by Felix Unfortunately, the value of Brunot. these funds had greatly depreciated; so when the present bishop's house was bought it was possible to make only a small cash payment, and assume a mortgage of \$6,500. As there were no funds for paying interest, insurance, etc., it was necessary that I should pay them as well as certain installments on the mortgage. In return for moneys advanced on the principal and for improvements and tax assessments, the trustees of the district gave me the securities invested for the bishop's house. I had spent fully \$4,000 and while the face value of the securities was \$6,800, their actual value is only about \$3,400. A recent gift of about \$4,300 from the Board of Missions, coupled with other gifts from my personal friends, enabled me to pay the outstanding debts on the property, and I have donated to the district the above mentioned securities to be used for the endowment of the episcopate, with the reservation, however, that the bishop shall have the right, if he so desires, to use the income from these securities at any time for the upkeep of the bishop's

house. In other words, the district now possesses the present bishop's house free from all encumbrance, and has also all but about \$3,400 of the old securities belonging to the Bishop's House Fund. These securities are in units on the Eagle block, corner of Riverside Avenue and Stevens Street. There is no better down-town location in Spokane. The trouble has been that the Eagle block is somewhat old, and therefore does not bring the highest rents; but Spokane is bound to grow, and there is every reason to believe that some day these securities may regain their face value or more.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF UTAH

The Missionary District of Utah embraces the State of Utah. It has an area of 84,970 square miles and a population (in 1910) of 373,351 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1907. The Right Reverend Frank Hale Touret, D.D., bishop of Western Colorado and later of Idaho, is in charge of this district. Reverend Arthur W. Moulton is the bishop-elect.

The appropriation of the Board to Utah is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$10,370; (3) For work among Indians, \$300; (4) For United Offering work among white people, \$1,100; among Indians, \$1,100; (5) For work among Japanese, \$600.

District of Utah

DURING the past year the Church in Utah has suffered from having no bishop in residence. The influenza epidemic affecting the life of the Church in the early part of the year, my very serious operation at the Mayo Hospital in Rochester and the necessity of spending most of the summer resting, and my election to Idaho in the fall, have made impossible any record of activity in Utah that is worthy of the name. I have tried to have general oversight of the Church work in the district and in the spring and early summer I made several trips into Utah.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of Church work in Utah for the year 1919 is the foundation we have tried to lay for a more efficient service to the Indians. At the time of the convocation in May, I arranged with the archdeacon to visit South Dakota as soon as possible. On the tenth of June, Archdeacon Reese and Bishop Burleson were in conference. The archdeacon spent two days at Sioux Falls going over the situation in Utah and getting an outline of the method of work in South Dakota. The archdeacon was also fortunate in having the opportunity of counseling with the Reverend Dr. Ashley, who is an authority on Indian work. Bishop Burleson kindly loaned the Reverend William Holmes, a most capable Indian clergyman in South Dakota, to the work in Utah for the month of August. Mr. Holmes came out and at the end of August, the archdeacon reported as follows: "Mr. Holmes has done finely. It is too long a story to tell in detail but the Indians received him cordially as he was a Sioux who came a long distance to see them. The leading men came wherever he was to meet him and we had fine services with an average attendance of forty. The Indian agent has given of his time to help us meet the leading Indians and to bring them to an interest in our plans." I am sure we are laying the foundation of new Before Mr. life for the Indians. Holmes left the reservation, he had diagnosed the case and had prescribed. His plan was to have four of our best Indians go back to South Dakota with him and begin a course of training for future service to their brethren in Utah. The plan was carefully worked out and can be put into operation at any time. Because I have not been able to give the situation close supervision, we have not yet responded to Mr. Holmes's suggestion. I am confident, however, that the next bishop of Utah can develop this tentative plan and that the Indian work in Utah can be prosecuted with much more vigor than ever before. A quotation from the archdeacon's report to me in the fall is of general interest. He writes as follows: "The Utes formerly in their fighting days sent emissaries to get the aid of the Sioux. It seems proper and fitting that now they should send members of their tribe to the Sioux to get help for the newer life."

The institutional life of the missionary district of Utah was never in stronger condition. The three institutions, Saint Mark's Hospital, Rowland Hall, and Emery House; are splendidly meeting their opportunities.

The clergy staff needs new men to be added to its ranks and needs them at once. I have visited the East in search of new men, I have written letters appealing to the spirit of chivalry and courage and adventure, I have telegraphed individual clergymen and members of the faculty of theological schools; all to no purpose. Not a single new clergyman has come into the district during the whole year. new bishop of Utah must secure recruits or else the Church will have to surrender and acknowledge defeat. There is a fine opportunity awaiting the right leader. The present clergy staff will be loyal to their new bishop and the laymen of Salt Lake City will put their shoulders to the wheel and help.

The need of Utah is two-fold: A bishop in residence and six or eight heroic men in Orders to help sustain

the work. The right leader for the missionary district was chosen at the General Convention at Detroit, but at present I have not heard that bishop-elect Moulton has accepted his election. God grant that the missionary enterprise into which in the past has gone so much devotion and loyalty and consecration and up-hill hard work, may soon have a bishop in residence to cheer and revive the courage of the Church-people of Utah.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF WESTERN COLORADO

The Missionary District of Western Colorado includes that part of the State of Colorado bounded on the east by the counties of Jackson, Larimer, Boulder, Gilpin, Clear Creek, Park Lake, Chaffee, Saguache, Mineral and Conejos. It has an area of 37,763 square miles and a population of 115,434 (census of 1910). The district within its present bounds was constituted in the year 1907. General Convention of 1919 receded this district to the Diocese of Colorado. Its bishop, the Right Reverend Frank Hale Touret, D.D., consecrated in the year 1917, was translated to Idaho.

The appropriation of the Board to Western Colorado is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$6,600; (3) For United Offering work among white people, \$300.

Report of the Bishop—1919

THE year 1919 began most hopefully for the district of Western Colorado. The last three months of 1918 had been months of great anxiety caused by the influenza epidemic which so seriously handicapped the work of the Church and which was responsible for such great mortality throughout the whole country. Just before Christmas, however, the quarantine was lifted and practically all Church people enjoyed their Church privileges on Christmas Day. It looked as if the bishop and the people in Western Colorado were on

the verge of unusual activity and that the year 1919 was going to be the best in the history of the Church on the western slope of the Rocky Mountains. But what do we find? The editor of the Western Colorado Evangel wrote as follows in the February issue: "The Churchmen of Western Colorado will be surprised to learn that Bishop Touret underwent an operation on January twenty-second at Rochester, Minnesota, and will be delighted to know that the operation was highly successful. The operating surgeon was Dr.

William J. Mayo. The bishop will probably return to the district about the middle of March." In another place in this same February issue, we read: "The Evangel reaches its readers exceedingly late this month due to the fact that a recurrence of influenza has reached Grand Junction and the printer. A depleted printing force has caused the unusual delay." Thus handicapped by the bishop's illness and the return of the dread epidemic, the district of Western Colorado hardly got on its feet before April.

Between the first of April and the middle of June, I made many visitations in Western Colorado, attending many meetings in Western Colorado and Utah (for Utah without a bishop needed oversight) and I presided at the annual convocation of the missionary district of Utah as well as the annual convocation of the missionary district of Western Colorado. Between the first of April and the first of July, I was very active. Under necessity I travelled almost continuously and when summer came. I knew that I had been too busy for a man so recently in the hands of Dr. Mayo. I, therefore, started for the East and spent the summer on the Island of Nantucket, to re-establish my health and recover from the effects of too great activity so soon after a very difficult operation. I went to the General Convention in Detroit, only to discover that Western Colorado, by vote of the General Church, was to lose its identity as a missionary jurisdiction and be made once more a part of the diocese of Colorado, making the boundaries of the Church coterminus with the boundaries of the state. In this same Convention, I was elected bishop of Idaho, and in November I returned to my residence in Grand Junction, spending my last month in Colorado in closing up my affairs and in conference with the clergy, preparing to hand over my jurisdiction to the Right Reverend Irving P. Johnson, D.D., bishop of

Colorado. This I was able to do early in December.

It is interesting to note that whereas a few years ago there was decided opposition to the proposed plan for Western Colorado to lose its identity and become a part of the diocese of Colorado, this year when it actually happened by vote of General Convention, it seemed to win universal favor on the part of both clergy and laity in Western Colorado. The visit of Bishop Johnson to Grand Junction early in December encouraged all who met him to believe that he was to have a very close supervision of Church life and that, despite the fact that he lived 450 miles away, he was to be a frequent visitor in their midst. Furthermore, the idea became at once stimulating to the members of the Church in the missionary district that they were part of a large diocese and instead of making them feel less responsible for the life of the Church, they seemed to take on more real responsibility. I am content that the arrangement is going to work out for the best and truest interests of the Church at large.

In leaving the district for Idaho, I am leaving a clergy staff whose continued friendliness and cooperation have never failed. I am leaving a group of Churchmen and Churchwomen whose sympathetic interest and loyal devotion from the moment I stepped foot into Western Colorado have cheered and encouraged me in my work. I am leaving a missionary enthusiasm which was new to Western Colorado and which has been expressed in the ability and desire for two successive years to go over the top with the missionary apportionment. I am leaving a missionary district where the ideal of service is stronger than it has ever been. In certain places, notably in Grand Junction and in Meeker, the Church life is exceedingly strong and within a very short time these two missions are quite likely to become par-

ishes.

For reasons outlined above, I have little to report in the way of official acts. I was loth to leave a state where I had spent nearly fifteen happy years. But it was the King's Command. Before leaving the district, I had the very great privilege of attending a large banquet in Grand Junction and knowing that the bishop of Colorado, who was present on the occasion, had received a very warm welcome and had been pledged sincere and enthusiastic support.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF WESTERN NEBRASKA

The Missionary District of Western Nebraska includes the western two-thirds of Nebraska. It has an area of 55,000 square miles and a population of 385,856 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1889. Its bishop is the Right Reverend George Allen Beecher, D.D., consecrated in the year 1910.

The appropriation of the Board to Western Nebraska is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$5,675; (3) For United Offering work among white people, \$1,500.

Report of the Bishop-1919

AS I understand it, it is the wish of the Board that the bishop add as a supplement to the statistical figures some short general statements concerning the work in his field.

New Buildings. The new church at Kimball was completed this year, and represents at least \$6,000—and it is all paid for. The Church of Our Saviour at North Platte has been completely recovered with stucco, and the rectory and parish house and the North Side Chapel painted and many minor repairs made in the property. The money has been subscribed for the erection of a new parish house to cost \$30,000. The new cathedral for Hastings will be begun in March, 1920.

General Conditions. The work throughout the district as a whole has been gradually improving in every way. The clergy have all returned (some literally and some figuratively) from the war, and have settled down to their work in real earnest. The confirmations have increased about fifty per cent. The Sunday-schools have also increased from thirty to fifty and one hundred per cent in every place where the *Christian Nurture Series* of instruction has been introduced. The congregations have increased in all the missions, and the clergy all report cheerful and encouraging outlook for the future.

The Nation-Wide Campaign. The only way it has been possible for us to carry on the Campaign in this district has been to work it up in one parish and mission at a time. It has been a marvelous revelation to us all to see what remarkable results have been attained. If the work keeps up through the district as it has begun, we shall be able to ask the Board to relieve us of further missionary support, and become a diocese. North Platte has raised a

budget of approximately \$10,000 a year on the three year subscription plan. Kearney has just done the same. Hastings has subscribed \$10,000 a year for three years for the new Cathedral Fund. and \$1,200 a year for the general Campaign, and about \$3,500 for the local budget. North Platte's quota of \$1,800 a year for the general Campaign will also be paid, and is included in their budget. McCook, where there have been no outside speakers or extra parochial services, the rector has increased the local budget from \$400 to \$1,600, and \$200 a year for the general fund. I am sorry that I cannot report all the places in the district, but I can say that nothing has ever taken such vital hold on the people of this section of the country as this Nation-Wide Campaign. We all feel that the rest of the district will make just as good reports as these which have already completed their campaign.

The Kearney Military Academy. was necessary for us to refuse about fifty applicants for the Academy this year on account of the lack of room. One hundred and nine boys are attending the school and there is every reason to anticipate a much larger school next year if we can furnish the quarters. Plans are being formulated for the erection of new barracks during the coming summer vacation. Thirty-two of the school family, including one of the masters and his wife, were confirmed before the Christmas holidays. Twenty-three received Holy Baptism, leaving but one boy in the entire school who was not baptized, and he was unfortunately detained at home at the time of the bishop's visitation. One of the members of the teaching staff has offered himself for the Sacred Ministry. The Academy is in need of a larger endowment. We have an endowment of about \$35,000, and this should be increased to \$100,000, so that we could be able to pay larger salaries to our teachers, and greatly increase the value

of the equipment of the school. There is the matter of scholarships for worthy boys whose parents cannot afford to send their lads to boarding schools, and the Church should have the means to help these boys through the use of the interest on the endowment for this purpose. We are still \$4,500 behind on equipment for this year and we shall not be able to meet this indebtedness out of the year's earnings in the school. The school has proven itself a useful agency of the Church for missionary influence. The school is more and more a credit to the Church, and it is known far and wide as a Church school, and not as a secular or private commercial industry. The aim is to keep the charges as low as possible so that we can continue to minister to those homes where some of the finest boys in the world live, but whose parents happen to have limited means. We have been placed in "Class A" in the list of the accredited schools of the state, so you can see that the scholarship standard is correct. Please help us to get the new buildings and the increased endowment.

Saint Luke's Hospital. I stated in my last report that the Romanists were planning to build a large new hospital in Kearney. I have now to report that this project has been begun and that after consulting with the board of trustees for Saint Luke's it was decided definitely that we should not undertake to build our new hospital in competition to this larger enterprise. At the present time there is a new hospital organization known as the Buffalo County Hospital Association, and they are planning to build a new and larger hospital (non-sectarian). If these two hospitals are to be erected in Kearney I seriously doubt whether either of them will be successful. It was a matter of serious consideration what we should do with the present Saint Luke's Hos-The grounds and buildings were given to the Church by the city of Kearney through the former board of

the old hospital, and so the Church had been practically responsible for the equipment and running expenses. We have operated the hospital for the past nine years. It seemed that it would be wise to offer to the new Association all that we had in this hospital. Formal action was taken, and the deed has been placed in escrow in the Farmers' Bank until the whole new plan has been fully carried out.

Saint Luke's, in the mean time, is carrying on its work, and will continue to do so until such time as the new hospital is ready to begin its work. The property will all revert to the Church if the new project fails or is not undertaken eventually.

Statistical Information.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF WYOMING

The Missionary District of Wyoming includes the State of Wyoming. It has an area of 97,575 square miles and a population of 146,000 people. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in the year 1907. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Nathaniel Seymour Thomas, S.T.D., consecrated in the year 1909.

The appropriation of the Board to Wyoming is as follows: (1) For support and traveling expenses of the bishop, \$3,900; (2) For work among white people, \$3,870; (3) For work among Indians, \$5,400.

Report of the Bishop—1919

Ordinations. To the diaconate: On February 8, 1919, in Grace Church, New York, John Samuel Gillespie. On June 22, 1919, in Saint Matthew's Cathedral, Laramie, Frederick Charles Wissenbach.

To the priesthood: On February 8, 1919, in Grace Church, New York, the Reverend Charles Glenn Baird. On April 14, 1919, in Christ Church, Douglas, the Reverend Howard Rasmus Brinker. On November 9, 1919, in Saint Mark's Church, Cheyenne, the Reverend John Samuel Gillespie.

Clerical Changes. On April 15th, 1919, the Reverend S. Arthur Huston, for nearly six years rector of Saint Mark's, Cheyenne, resigned his parish in order to accept a call to Christ Church, Baltimore. In the removal of

Mr. Huston, the district lost not only one of its finest rectors and one of its most beloved clergymen, but a leading figure in the affairs of the state of Wyoming, particularly along educational lines.

The archdeacon of the district, the Venerable Ernest Dray, returned in July from his service of three years in the 4th London General Hospital, England. The archdeacon was accorded a royal welcome to Wyoming.

The Very Reverend D. W. Thornberry returned in September from his year under the Y. M. C. A. in France, and resumed his duties as dean of the cathedral.

The Reverend Alan R. Chalmers, to whose untiring and zealous activities is due the formation of the Rural Parish

District of Wyoming

of Park County, has returned to the East, after three years of faithful and fruitful service in Wyoming.

Among the newcomers during the year, I report the arrival of the Reverend Philip Knox Edwards as rector of Saint Mark's Church, Casper; the Reverend Elvon Lee Tull, missionary at Torrington, and dean of the Platte; the Reverend Charles A. Bennett, rector of Saint Mark's Church, Cheyenne, and the Reverend Arthur Ernest Whittle, assigned to Glenrock.

On September 21st, 1919, the Reverend A. F. Schepp, Ph.D., rector of the Church of the Holy Communion. and dean of the Rock Springs Deanery, was called to his reward, after months of acute and terrible suffering which he bore bravely as a true Christian soldier. Dr. Schepp will be sorely missed at the clerical gatherings of the district. His philosophic mind and his keen sense of humor made him a man of the greatest force and charm, and he was greatly beloved. He was buried in Rock Springs on September twentythird by the bishop and many of the clergy of the district.

The Reverend Morten Joslin was subsequently called to the rectorship of the Church of the Holy Communion, Rock Springs, which post he now fills.

The Reverend J. J. Bowker, rector of Saint Thomas's Church, Rawlins, was called to England early in the year by the illness of his mother. As the time of his stay was uncertain, he resigned his parish, and the vestry called the Reverend Rowland F. Philbrook, formerly of Glenrock, who took his new duty on May fifteenth. Mr. Bowker met with an accident which caused his death on October 23rd, 1919. He was buried in Canterbury, from Saint Martin's Church.

The Reverend Frederick C. Wissenbach was ordained deacon on June 22nd, 1919, and is in charge of the work at Rock River, Medicine Bow, Hanna and Elk Mountain.

Mr. John Wyatt Norris, of Sioux City, has become a postulant in the missionary district of Wyoming. He spent the summer in charge of the work at Saint George's Church, Lusk, and enrolled in the Philadelphia Divinity School at the opening of the fall term.

Parochial Achievements. Owing to

Parochial Achievements. Owing to war conditions, and conditions attendant upon the influenza epidemic, there has been little done in the way of building new structures, etc., but the work of the year appears to be characterized by a steady and intensive development.

The formation of the Rural Parish of Park County has already been referred to, but it takes a prominent place among the parochial achievements of the year. It was formed by the union of the following missions: Christ Church, Cody; Saint Andrew's Church, Meeteetse, and Saint John's Church, Powell. A vestry consisting of representatives from each of these churches has been elected, and local committees for local administration have been appointed. The parish is entirely self-supporting and it is hoped that it will be the pattern for further accomplishments of this nature, which not only relieve central funds to a great extent but also develop a spirit of self-confidence on the part of the people:

Saint John's Hospital, Jackson, has been improved to a notable extent, through the gift of Mr. D. E. Skinner, a patient who expressed his gratitude for the care which he received in our institution by making a gift of approximately \$10,000 for its enlargement and improvement.

Saint Mark's Church, Casper, has purchased a site for a new church, parish house and rectory.

It is expected that Saint John's Church, Green River, will next year make application for admission as a parish. It has met its apportionment, paid its pension fund in advance and has increased local subscriptions.

Institutions.

Saint Michael's Mission. The completion of the \$20,000 stone dormitory and class room building is the greatest material accomplishment at Saint Michael's for the current year, thus making nine permanent stone buildings and two permanent log buildings which have been erected, besides six or seven temporary buildings.

Through the gift of Mrs. Harvey Childs, Jr., of Pittsburgh, eighty acres of land, lying immediately south of the mission, have been purchased.

Cathedral Home for Children. Several windfalls have come in the direction of the Cathedral Home for Children during this year.

Through the bequest of Mr. Charles J. Phelan, the Home has become the possessor of a 160-acre tract near Rock River, right in the oil lands. G. R. McConnell, Esq., of Laramie, has acted as administrator of the estate and advisor of the interests of the Home. A portion of the land has been leased to A. C. McLaughlin of California on terms which brought us an immediate bonus of \$5,000, and a valuable royalty will be one result if we bring in oil upon our property.

Mr. Edward Ivinson, of Laramie, whose name appears in all lists of benefactions to the Church in Wyoming, gave to the Cathedral Home a forty-acre tract lying adjacent to the new property of the Home, and a onehalf interest in an eighty-acre tract in another part of the city of Laramie. The first-named property will be used in connection with the Home when it moves into its new quarters next spring. The half-interest in the eighty-acre tract was held with Judge Meldrum, United States Commissioner, of the Yellowstone National Park, he being the other An opportunity came to sell the whole tract for \$10,000, and Judge Meldrum generously stated that he would take only \$4,000 of the purchase price, giving the remaining \$6,000 to the Home as the price of the sale of its half interest.

Thus the workers in Wyoming have rallied to the support of this institution which in turn renders notable service to Wyoming's own.

Cathedral Foundation. The present year has marked great advances in the cathedral foundation. At the beginning of the year we owned the half square which has been the property of the Church since the days of Bishop Talbot. Through the gift of Miss Grace Scoville of New York we were given one-half of the south-east quarter of the square, and Mr. Ivinson gave to the Church the north-east quarter. The remaining half of the south-east quarter will be acquired by purchase and we will then own the finest square in the University City of Wyoming, on which we now have our splendid cathedral, the present Cathedral Home for Children, and the deanery. Plans are being made for the improvement of the square and the erection of buildings.

REPORTS FROM THE DIOCESES

The Board aids forty dioceses in the prosecution of their diocesan work. The reports from the bishops follow:

ALABAMA—The Right Rev. Charles Minnegerode Beckwith, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$800; For Negro Work, \$2,120.

THE following report has been sent by the principal of Saint Mark's School, Birmingham:

Saint Mark's School, Birmingham. The work of the school for the past year has been one of interest and endeavor. Both teachers and pupils have entered into their work with enthusiasm, and a desire to make the best of the opportunity afforded by the school has been their purpose and goal.

The school has increased in its engiliaron from 275 to 303 pupils. This increase may be accounted for largely by the increased number of graduates who go out from the school and send others back to take their places.

The n-efutures of the school would be greatly increased if provision could be made for marse-training. This is one feature of the school that should be looked into and the means and equipment provided for its maintenance. There is a great demand for competent nurses, both in hospitals and private homes. If this feature could be added to the school it would fill a long-felt Every school teacher, every housekeeper and servant in the home should have definite knowledge of "first aid treatment." The addition of a nurse-training department to the school would serve in giving a knowledge of first aid treatment to all of the pupils as well as preparing skilled

The ethical and religious side of the school is emphasized by the use of the Book of Common Prayer and Church

Hymnal in the daily opening services, and emphasis upon the teaching of the Church here and emphasis upon the Ten Commandments.

A statement of the financial needs of the school and the struggles under which the work has been carried on will be set forth in the report of the trustees. A statement of that part of the school's finances handled by me is hereto appended.

THE diocese of Arkansas has made great progress during the past year. We were the first diocese, as I understand, in the Province of the South-West (Seventh) to raise our apportionment for the year and have gone over the amount by about six per cent. This work has been most gratifying and could not have been done except for the united work of all the clergy and we were helped by the provincial secretary, the Reverend A. W. Garden. At this writing the diocese promises to go over the top in the Nation-Wide Cam-

paign.

Two missions will become organized parishes by our next council, namely Lake Village and Foreman. All the parishes in the diocese are now supplied with rectors except Eureka Springs, where Dr. Belden died. vestry having called a rector, expects a positive acceptance soon. The parishes in Little Rock were never in such a prosperous condition, each having doubled the rector's salary and Christ Church having an assistant with almost the full salary of the former rector. Too much cannot be said of the great missionary work of Dean Templeton, who has been chairman of the Nation-Wide Campaign and who has looked after two missions for me during the year, restoring one from ruin and showing that rural work can be done. In the other he is preparing to erect a new church edifice.

We have added three new clergy to our force during the year. The Reverend F. W. Gee, a very devout Methodist minister, ranking high in his denomination, has become a candidate for Holy Orders and will in six months be one of my faithful clergy.

The greatest need we have is assistance for Bishop Demby. I have been

obliged to purchase on time a residence for him and I trust the Church will soon give me \$7,000 for the payment and opening of this home. The Church has done everything possible in these trying days for the Negroes in Arkansas. Bishop Demby and Dr. D. E. Johnson archdeacon) understanding (former the acute conditions, have helped me in bringing about amicable feeling. I felt obliged to send Bishop Demby to New York and Philadelphia to make clear the problem and show the real facts regarding the troubles. If the Church will come to my help financially now, we can help our brethren as no other body of Christians can. I am trusting to the Church to do much for the Negro when the Nation-Wide Campaign is over.

I thank GOD for a splendid corps of clergy, one half of whom we have raised up in our own diocese, and also for the spiritual life manifesting itself in good works, especially in response to

mission calls.

La Grange. The Church's work at La Grange continues to present the splendid opportunity for advancement and development which has characterized it for some years. The work as it administers to the recreational needs and general community service, however, was greatly hampered by the reduced force and reduced vitality of those who remained, having labored during the influenza epidemic of the fall of 1918. Some little time has been necessary to gather again a sufficient staff of workers to carry the elaborate and complex ministry of the Church, with its hospital, kindergartens, club work, friendly visiting and public health work.

However the fall of 1919 found the work admirably equipped in personnel with its opportunity before it. As the fall work progressed it became more and more evident that the Church would be unable to realize on its opportunities to the fullest extent until the projected plans for a new hospital and two more community buildings, entered in the survey for the Nation-Wide Campaign, were carried to completion. This was especially evident in regard to the training school. The La Grange Settlement Training School has had more inquiries than since before the war, and we have had to turn aside requests for training in social work in the Church on the ground of limited plant and facilities of work.

The future of the work will depend largely upon our opportunity to meet the generous offer of the mills for the expansion of the work.

The work at La Grange is the only white work in the diocese for which the Board makes an appropriation and the following statistics for white work have to do with the La Grange Settlement.

Negro Work. The taking over of the Fort Valley High and Industrial School, at Fort Valley, Georgia, is the greatest advance made in the Negro work in the diocese during the year. A chaplain, the Reverend W. M. Marshall, has been placed there and is doing excellent work in introducing Church services and a Church atmosphere. They now have a vested choir and render the services with reverence and heartiness. The great need in that regard is for a chapel, as we now must have the services in the assembly hall. There are 22 officers and instructors at the school and 627 students registered during 1919. In taking the school, the Church has seized a great opportunity to render a signal service.

Also in Saint Christopher's School at Columbus, Saint Matthias's School at Atlanta and Saint Stephen's School at Griffin excellent work is being done and there is a large enrollment. We have just built and equipped a new school house at Griffin, the ground for the building being given by a colored physician of the city, who is a devoted Churchman. Early in the summer we expect to begin the building of an adequate school house and settlement centre for Saint Matthias's Mission, Atlanta. The means for this were provided by the diocese in the Nation-Wide Campaign.

We are planning too to erect at an early date a church building for Saint Paul's, Atlanta. For this the colored congregation have themselves quite liberally contributed. There has been one ordination of a colored deacon during the year and two candidates for Holy orders will soon be ordained. The diocese has provided for the placing of another Negro priest in the field and these additional clergy will place the work in a satisfactory condition.

THE work of the four missions in this diocese grouped as "racial" has gone on well during the year.

Saint Augustine's Mission for colored people makes steady progress under the Reverend D. N. Wallace. Plans are completed for the new building (guild hall and church) for which the congregation has been working for several years and to which many of the parishes in the diocese have contributed. With the help of the Nation-Wide Campaign it is hoped to see the building soon begun. The mission is admirably located and has an excellent property.

The work of the two Chinese missions (San Francisco and Oakland) is under the Reverend Mr. Ng, who has proved a fine leader and executive. Both are well situated. Both need additional equipment for attendance and interest grow steadily. A priest to assist Mr. Ng is most necessary.

The Japanese Mission is moving forward under the Reverend Mr. Tajima, who took charge last spring. The present building has been sold and negotiations are in progress looking to the purchase of property nearer the

center of the Japanese district. Both these Oriental missions are of the utmost importance in view of the delicate problems connected with our international relations. Everything which helps not only to Christianize these people, but also to bring the oriental and our own races into more friendly and brotherly intercourse and into positions of mutual responsibility, must be furthered in every possible way.

COLORADO—The Right Rev. Irving Peake Johnson, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$2,400.

THE most eventful action during 1919 has been the cession of Western Colorado to the former diocese, placing the whole state, with its 100,000 square miles of territory, under the single jurisdiction of the bishop of Colorado.

The Western Slope has never formed a homogeneous missionary district, because of the lack of any outstanding see city to which all parts of the district were accessible. In a territory of 40,000 square miles there are only two cities of over five thousand in population and both of these under eight thousand. There was not a single church that had a parochial organization, so that the district consisted of a large number of weak missions unrelated to any strong center of life and strength. I visited several of the places in December but am not sufficiently acquainted with the situation to make a particular report.

In the diocese of Colorado the work of 1919 has been one of constructive progress greatly stimulated by the work of the Nation-Wide Campaign, which latter, owing to our great distances, could not, in the time allotted, be felt outside of the stronger centers in any appreciable degree. When one considers that it takes as long to go from Sterling in the northeast portion of the state to Mancos in the southwest, as it does to go from Omaha to New York, although, of course, the distance is only that from Buffalo to Boston, one realizes the difficulty of coördinated work that will reach the whole diocese.

The work of the bishop as now existing requires the administration of one hundred parishes and missions of varying strength in a territory about the size of New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware.

During the past year the greatest improvement in the diocese has been the

finishing of the parish church at Boulder, where our state university is situated. This church has been in a ruinously unfinished condition for twenty years past.

Saint John's Missionary College at Greeley is flourishing, having ten students at present who are doing excellent work. Dean Bonell is gradually overcoming the difficulties of establishing a seminary and is reaching out and moulding into shape good material for future missionaries.

It is with some hesitancy that I undertake the oversight of the 100,000 square miles which constitute Colorado, and the one hundred parishes, missions and preaching stations which have to be visited annually. It means staying on the job and trusting to the Church at large to furnish the means of nursing into life and strength the many places which need help and ministration throughout the district.

We have about fifty towns in Colorado of one thousand population or over and in every one of these there is a congregation which is regularly shepherded excepting four or five of the smaller towns. We have a faithful band of clergy who are putting up a gallant fight for the Church under many difficulties.

The Church in Denver, Pueblo, Colorado Springs, Trinidad, Boulder, Greeley, Fort Collins, Grand Junction, and Cañon City, which are the cities of five thousand and over, is strong and vigorous. The Church in the mining towns—Leadville, Cripple Creek, Victor, Central City, Georgetown, Aspen, Ouray, and Creede—is keeping its life in the most depressing atmosphere I have ever seen. The high cost of mining and the low value of gold, expressed in commodities, has brought the mining industry pretty nearly to a standstill, while the high price of silver has not

yet met the increased expense of operation. When one realizes that mines are the sole source of living to the mountain places, one understands how depressing it is when everything else is prosperous and they are losing out. I have been obliged to demote all of these places to missions, although some of them were once most flourishing parishes. In Cripple Creek I lost nearly the entire vestry in one year.

One by one the missions are responding to wise leadership, and being taken out of the long list of problems into the lengthening list of expectations. work of the Reverend J. A. Stansfield in the San Luis Valley, of the Reverend D. C. Lees in the upper Arkansas Valley, and of the Reverend D. F. Bolles in the lower Arkansas Valley have been especially valuable, in that places which seemed ready for abandonment three years ago, because of years of previous neglect, are beginning to put on strength. Alamosa, which was to have been demoted from a parish to a mission because there were not enough. men to form a vestry, has now a strong vestry of leading citizens, of whom eight men have been presented to the bishop for confirmation in the past eight months. These places were our diocesan extremities and three years ago they were mighty cold. Now where one man was working it needs two, at least, to cover the field as soon as the means can be secured.

The missions at Sterling, Fort Morgan, Fort Lupton, Loveland, Windsor, and Castle Rock have all grown in strength and vigor, while a new mission is being established at Eaton.

There has been little church building because of the prohibitive figures, but we have every reason to be encouraged because of the diocesan spirit which has developed and made the work of the bishop more practicable. We have established an associate mission for the missions of Denver, and have at present two priests in residence (Reverend Neil Stanley and Reverend F. W. Sherman), who have in charge Saint Andrew's, Emmanuel and Epiphany Missions, and are ready to take on new work their numbers increase. as Through the kindness of Canon and Mrs. Winifred Douglas there is under way a rest house for the clergy at Evergreen, in which our annual summer school can be housed and where the elergy can go for retreats and recrea-

On the whole we are glad that we are alive and believe that we are growing in wisdom and in stature.

DULUTH—The Right Rev. James Dow Morrison, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$4,000; For Indian Work, \$5,380; Work among the Swedes, \$890; For United Offering Work (Indian), \$1,000.

THE diocese of Duluth has in a good measure recovered from the disaster incident to the great forest fire which a little more than a year ago desolated a large portion of our territory.

We have rebuilt the church at Moose Lake, and the building is a great improvement over that which the fire destroyed. It was the first public building completed in the city, and I have deferred its consecration for a short time to permit its use by other religious denominations and societies. The town which was entirely destroyed I am glad to say is being rapidly restored.

Saint Andrew's Church, Cloquet, has also been replaced. In the restoration of the city which the great fire had swept away, the location of the business and resident centers was materially changed from the position they had formerly occupied, and it was deemed expedient to dispose of the old church site, and purchase a lot in a more central locality. A very desirable lot large enough to provide ample room for both church and parsonage was purchased and this church now stands on it, and is used for worship. It is a fair and commodious building, with nave, transept and chancel, and although bare of ornament, what we have is free from In rebuilding this church we have been generously assisted by the Missions, and American Board of Church Building Fund Commission, and the Society of the Double Temple.

The diocese of Duluth might say with the Psalmist, "we went through fire and water." The losses sustained in the forest fires of October 12th, 1918, have been followed by the tornado of June 22nd, 1919.

The city of Fergus Falls, a town of about eight thousand population, is beautifully situated on the Otter Tail River, where the hills merge into the great plain of the Red River Valley. One of our strongest parishes had been established in this place, and had become a power for good in the community, as well as a source of strength to the whole diocese. On the afternoon of Sunday, June 22nd, Fergus Falls was visited with a violent tempest, and in a few moments the town was in ruins. Sixty persons were killed, hundreds were injured, one half the buildings of the city were destroyed or badly injured, and Saint James's Church, with its fine organ and spacious guild rooms, was completely demolished. The people, notwithstanding the heavy losses they have sustained, have continued with vigor their parochial activities. They report that their Sunday-school, which meets in a temporary hall, was never more flourishing, and in the spring they hope, with some outside assistance, to rebuild their church.

In the Indian field, I wish to mention with gratitude the fruitful labors of our devoted women workers. Miss Colby at Onigum has fully one hundred persons in her Sunday-school and Bible classes, and the government agent has spoken to me in the warmest terms of her powerful influence among the Indians, by whom she is regarded with gratitude and affection. Mrs. H. F. Parshall has purchased a building in the village of Cass Lake, and furnished it to serve as a guild house and reading room for the use of the Indians and white population. With tireless energy, fine business management, and tact, she has made the venture a splendid success. It has become the efficient substitute for the saloon, and the popular

resort of the community. In the afternoons, the Indian women and girls are frequent visitors, and in the evenings, a crowd of men and boys are always present to enjoy its hospitable welcome and to profit by its refining influence. The Reverend W. K. Boyle (native priest) has been relieved from war service, and has resumed his duties at Mercer Memorial Chapel, Onigum.

I have received an appeal from a band of our Indian brethren, living far back in the forest, to establish a mission among them. I am not able at present to provide a missionary, or to build the necessary chapel and parsonage, but I have licensed one of their number to act as lay-reader under the supervision of the superintendent of Indian missions.

I have also licensed lay-readers to assist our work at the Indian missions at Wild Rice Rapids, and Saint An-

drew's Mission, Bena.

In the whi e field, our diocesan committee has fai hfully presented the cause of the Nation-Wide Campaign with gratifying results. The report is imperfect as many congregations have not yet made their returns to the committee, but in almost every instance that has come under our observation there seems to be a deepening sense of responsibility, as shown by men and women offering themselves for service in Church work, an increase of the numbers preparing for confirmation and a

large augmentation of financial pledges both for local work and for the general agencies of the Church.

I have visited all the parishes and missions and many of the preaching stations during the past year, and have confirmed two hundred and sixty persons, of whom thirty-seven belonged to the Indian field, and eleven came from our Swedish missions. I have transferred one clergyman to another diocese and have received four presbyters by letter of transfer.

I add the statistics as presented by the diocesan secretary at our convention in June. He informs me that he has not yet received the parochial reports for the year ending December 31, 1919.

EAST CAROLINA—The Right Rev. Thomas Campbell Darst, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$1,300; For Negro Work, \$4,000.

Negro Work. The work in the colored parishes and missions has been unusually helpful during the past year. Bishop Delaney has rendered invaluable assistance, and his work among the colored Church people of North and

South Carolina has demonstrated beyond doubt the wisdom of the Church in electing him to his office in the Church of God.

The colored communicants in East Carolina represent one-sixth of the

total communicant strength, and during he past year exactly one-sixth of those confirmed were colored people.

Our colored parishes and missions, as a rule, responded generously to the call of the Nation-Wide Campaign, pledging about twenty thousand dollars for the three year period. We have five clergymen in active service at the beginning of the year 1920, and will have two additional clergymen in the next two months. Splendid parish schools have been maintained at Fayetteville, Beaufort, Washington, Belhaven and Edenton during the past year. The school at Beaufort is sadly in need of an adequate building, and we hope to provide same from the Nation-Wide Campaign funds.

White Work. The work served by our white missionary priests is moving along splendidly, and this is especially true of the interesting pioneer work in the Wilmington archdeaconry.

The Venerable W. R. Noe has labored unceasingly during the past year, and his labor has not been in vain. He plans to begin the erection of chapels, community houses and parish school buildings at several strategic points during the coming year. It is interesting to note that every mission in the Wilmington archdeaconry pledged the full amount of its Nation-Wide quota, which was twenty dollars a year for each communicant.

We have twenty-eight white clergy in active service, and of this number six receive aid from the Board of Missions and twelve others receive part of their stipends from the diocesan missionary committee.

One group of missions has become self-supporting during the past year,

and two other "groups" have been able to divide and provide, in large part, for the salaries of two men where one served before.

Never before has the Church in East Carolina been more thoroughly equipped for its task, or more keenly sensible of its responsibilities.

We went gloriously over the top in the Nation-Wide Campaign, and we face the New Year and its wonderful possibilities with hope and confidence and humble gratitude.

THERE was no special improvement in the diocese during the past year. There was an optimistic feeling that things would improve in 1920.

There was a sufficient increase in the mission funds to make us hopeful. There have been no special changes in the diocese during 1919, except in Pensacola and Fernandina, where an increase in population took place and

where business began to pick up. Owing to the rise in the price of turpentine, Jacksonville improved a great deal. I might say that there have been evidences of a waking up and improvement in every part of the diocese, not to any great extent, but to such an extent that we have all been encouraged.

GEORGIA—The Right Rev. Frederick Focke Reese, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For Negro Work, \$4,300; St. Athanasius' School, Brunswick, \$1,800.

THE statistical statement appended shows such variations as compared with last year as may be expected and which are due in many cases to local causes. There is no shocking evidence of growth and yet there is evidence in some places that faithful work by the clergy is shown in increased response from the people. The shifting of population in other places due to the emigration of Negroes northward and to changed conditions of employment has weakened the missions curiously.

There has been some gain in communicants in spite of the less number confirmed and also encouraging increase in pupils in day-schools and some increase in the Sunday-schools. The contributions for parochial purposes show a very considerable increase, but unhappily this is partially offset by a decrease in diocesan and general contributions. However nearly all the congregations have paid their missionary apportionments in full, so that the decrease mentioned must be in other gifts.

The Negro churches have responded generously in the Nation-Wide Campaign, most of them meeting their quota and in some cases more than doubling them.

Saint Athanasius's School for Negro youth at Brunswick is still progressing All except the youngest favorably. children receive some industrial training, the girls in sewing and domestic science, and the boys in carpentry. The work done is admirable in spite of the seriously inadequate equipment for such instruction. The teaching force is well organized under the capable administration of the principal, Mr. W. A. Perry, and is doing excellent team work. The trustees have felt it necessary to increase the salaries of the teachers and this has been done in faith that God would through the Church provide the means to make good their act of justice.

The work of this school has for years commended itself in its results in the character of its pupils and graduates to the entire community, both white and Negro. The same may be said indeed of all the schools conducted in the diocese. In fact, the work of the Church among the Negroes, evangelistic and educational, while insignificant in extent in comparison with the need and

the opportunity, is distinctly productive of good results, both morally and religiously. The only regret is that the people of the Church seem to be so insensible of the tremendous necessity of this work among the Negroes, and of the responsibility of our Church to do it well. There are at least a half dozen large towns in this diocese where with the necessary equipment of church and school house and with priests and teachers properly qualified and paid, we could establish missions which would soon exert an influence for good in their several communities.

INDIANAPOLIS—The Right Rev. Joseph Marshall Francis, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$3,000; For Negro Work, \$500.

DURING the year, five clergy of the diocese working among white people, and one working among Negroes, have received part of their stipends from the appropriation of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. Three of them have been working in college towns—the Reverend Mr. Burrows at Bloomington (State University), the Reverend Mr. Miller at Crawfordsville (Wabash College), and the

Reverend Mr. Young at Irvington (Butler College). Perhaps the best indication of growth is that each of these places oversubscribed its quota in the Nation-Wide Campaign: Bloomington, 140 per cent; Crawfordsville, 108 per cent; and Irvington, 104 per cent. The past year witnessed the withdrawal of a large number of professors from the State University and a consequent reduction in the number of communicants

and of Sunday-school scholars. But despite the paucity of numbers, the Church is being recognized increasingly as a powerful influence in the community, and its vicar has impressed himself upon its life. As President of the Chamber of Commerce and secretary of the Rotary Club, he is brought into close touch with the varied interests of the city.

At Crawfordsville, where we have only a small congregation, Mr. Miller is doing valuable constructive work; and, under Mr. Young's ministrations, a good deal has been accomplished at Irvington. At the latter place, the congregation is still worshipping in a store room but a plot of ground has been secured, on which we hope before very long to have our own building.

Saint John's congregation at Bedford has made marked advance during the year and has organized as a parish, relinquishing all missionary aid. The mission was begun thirteen years ago. The results attained have been remarkable for Indiana. The congregation owns a valuable property in a splendid location. It has a beautiful stone church and a stone rectory and parish room combined. The mission was started right, with a resident priest from the beginning. There are now more than a hundred communicants.

New Castle offers a good field for work, which we have not been able to cultivate as industriously and effectively as we hope to do in the future. Present indications point to a doubling of the population within a short time.

The work among the Negroes, which is carried on at Saint Philip's Church, Indianapolis, shows some slight gain for the year. We have not, however, really touched the problem. One of the handicaps is the lack of a parish building. At present there is only the church building. Christian social service is essential, if we are to reach the large Negro population of the city.

IOWA—The Right Rev. Theodore Nevin Morrison, D.D., Bishop; The Right Rev. Harry Sherman Longley, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$1,500.

THERE is very much that offers encouragement in the diocese of Iowa. The mission field a few years ago presented a pessimistic attitude. Congregations were small. The effort for maintenance was small. The denominational churches in many places were strong and the effort to maintain the Church in these places seemed hopeless to the struggling group.

A new spirit of optimism is apparent. Where a vacancy occurs in a cure, there is no longer indifference, but in most cases there is an expressed desire for services and the demand comes, "When will we have a regular priest again?"

The call of the Nation-Wide Campaign in the missions was loyally answered, when you consider that the amount asked from these places was increased many times.

The crying need is for a larger income to increase the meager stipends of the clergy. Unless the demand can be met, we cannot secure men for the fields and the missions must remain closed.

We are convinced that, if in this Middle West the Church is to grow and do effective service, the general Church must carefully survey this field and give greatly increased aid in men and money. The Middle-West is growing rapidly, and is becoming more and more a strategic point and unless present opportunities are seized, the weakness of the Church will render Her ineffective to present Her claims and make

a contribution of what is specially committed to Her to the spiritual upbuilding of this part of our nation. Money invested now will yield abundant returns for the future.

The fields where the money is used which is contributed by the Board send encouraging reports. Among them Creston has advanced its priest's stipend \$300. Newton and Oelwein have also increased their share of the priest's stipend, while Saint Mark's, Des Moines, is now paying a little less than one-half of the total salary.

KANSAS—The Right Rev. James Wise, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$4,000.

THERE are two outstanding features in the work of the Church in Kansas for the year 1919 that give promise of greater things in the future. The first is the definite results growing out of our diocesan conventions, or, as they Training better be styled, Schools for Christian Leadership. The 1919 convention far surpassed in attendance, in interest, in practical things accomplished, any of the previous gatherings. A Forward Movement budget of \$6,000 for the diocese was accepted by the convention, which enabled a diocesan educational secretary to be placed in the field, a returned chaplain to be sustained as a diocesan missioner, and a grant made for the furtherance of plans by the diocesan students workers' conference, dealing with the college and normal school

One interesting feature, for example, of the plans of the student conference,

is the offering of a prize of \$50.00 to the university student who writes the best essay on "The Incarnation of our Lord."

We believe the development of such methods of work in a state like Kansas will eventually enable the Church to reach the great mass of unchurched and gather them into Her life.

The second matter of absorbing interest is the experience of the diocese of Kansas in the Nation-Wide Campaign.

Through an unfortunate clerical error the original quota assigned to Kansas was about three times the amount it should have been. The men and women were all keyed up for the attack and even at the last moment when the quota was made known, although it staggered us all, a determination to go over the top was manifest. With the adjustment of the quota made after the canvass, the diocese is in sight of raising its entire quota.

KENTUCKY—The Right Rev. Charles Edward Woodcock, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$900; For Negro Work, \$700.

THE state of the Church in the diocese of Kentucky is, on the whole, encouraging. With the help of the Nation-Wide Campaign it is hoped to remove some serious limitations. One of the direct results of this campaign will be to meet a long-felt want and remove a deep concern, and that will be to increase the inadequate salaries of our faithful and self-sacrificing missionaries. These underpaid clergy merit our first attention.

One white and one colored mission have been started during the year. The white mission is only just beginning and no report is available. The outlook for the colored mission seems very bright. This mission is located in Louisville and is under the direction of the Reverend David L. Ferguson. The interesting feature of this mission is its Church-school with an enrollment of 150 pupils. Connected with this school is an industrial school with forty-two scholars. A playground, also, is provided for the children.

Trinity Mission suffered the loss of its church building by fire. Fortunately the parish house was saved. Steps were immediately taken to erect a new church. As a result of the labor and sacrifices of the Reverend John B. Robinson and his faithful people the new church will soon be ready for occupancy.

Saint Mary's, Madisonville, and its associated missions, now rejoice in having a priest-in-charge, the Reverend George M. Dow, who began work January first. Plans are on foot to secure a rectory at this point.

With a great rural population spread over a large area where there are many small towns and villages without enough clergy or sufficient means to minister to them, the Church expands but slowly. These small towns are remote from the see city with poor communications so as to make it almost impossible to minister to them from the chief center. To meet this demand the diocese plans to have an archdeacon for the white work.

We have received much needed assistance from the General Board of Missions and could not have maintained our work if this had not been forthcoming. For this we would express our deep appreciation.

Statistics for the various points assisted by the General Board are as follows: Baptisms, 8; confirmations, 6; burials, 11; marriages, 1; Churchschool pupils, 298; communicants, 333. Indications point to a more encouraging report next year.

LEXINGTON—The Right Rev. Lewis William Burton, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$4,500 (subject to agreement that the Bishop will raise an equal amount during the year from friends for the same work); For Negro Work, \$600; For United Offering Work (White), \$600; (Negro) \$300.

In making out the following report, I have utilized the outline and intensive-study surveys by the stipendiaries of this diocese, their conciliar parochial reports, special reports which I asked of each of them, and certain reports to the recent diocesan council.

The committee on the State of the Church reported to the diocesan council that they "feel greatly encouraged when they review the work in our own diocese of Lexington during the past conciliar year. Almost every parish and mission reports progress; not so large, perhaps, as we might have hoped for, or reasonably expected, but still progress." The committee justly attributes this result to the influence of the Nation-Wide and Sewanee Campaigns, which were simultaneously conducted in this diocese. The most remarkable feature was the readiness with which the smaller missions met their quotas. Some little groups of communicants contributed at points at which no quota was laid. The diocese contributed nearly 951/2 per cent of its apportionment for diocesan church extension; and its council voted to make the expectation for 1920 \$570 larger than last year.

White Work.

The General Missionary. This position was occupied until March 1, 1919, by the Reverend W. B. Dern, and was then relinquished by him because of the serious illness of his wife. He rendered intelligent and faithful service. From May 1, 1919, the Reverend J. J. Clopton has been in charge of this important task of extending our Church into the regions where coal and oil developments are creating an opportunity. In far eastern Kentucky is one organized mission at the largest coal mining center in the state. Mr. Clopton has also charge of two long established but weak organized missions in central Kentucky. One of these is in the town which is the site of the Eastern Kentucky Normal School. Besides these three organized missions, he has visited fifteen points. Nine of the total places mentioned are in his regular itinerary for services. All are on the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, whence his popular title of the "L. & N. Missionary." He follows two main lines, each for some two hundred miles from Lexington. We have church buildings at Rich-

mond and Jenkins. Elsewhere we are dependent on the loan of churches, school-houses or court-houses; a condition which prevents aggressive, sometimes regular work.

At Jenkins an earnest and intelligent lay-reader enables us to have services A large number of every Sunday. young men and women, constituting the office forces, are the chief opportunity at Jenkins. At Karles, assisted by two earnest Churchwomen, Mr. Clopton has organized a Sunday-school of four teachers and sixty-five scholars. A lot has been given at Ravenna, and the means furnished for the purchase of two adjoining lots at Lawrenceburg. Lynch, a large center for coal mining that has reached a population of over five thousand in about two years, Mr. Clopton has held the first Episcopal service. Mr. Clopton served during the Nation-Wide Campaign as executive chairman for the diocese with efficiency and zeal. He fills admirably the ideal of the type of missionary needed for the eastern half of the diocese; and, though connected with the diocese for less than ten months, he has already become one of the most acceptable and useful men in it.

Beattyville and Outlying Missions. The Reverend A. Patterson continues a self-sacrificing identification of himself with his mountain parishioners in three counties. Beattyville and Proctor, on opposite sides of the Kentucky River, near the junction of the three forks that make the river, have weekly services. In each of twelve other preaching stations, in school-houses, logging camps and private homes, he officiates monthly. In seventeen years in this field, he has had three hundred and fifty-five baptisms and presented eighty-three for confirmation. He is the sole Episcopal missionary within his three counties as against twenty-five of various denominations. He declares that the greatest need of the mountains is well-instructed

preachers and teachers. Mr. Patterson's field is in the heart of the oil region, where nearly nine million, five hundred thousand barrels of oil were produced in 1919, to be exceeded in 1920. Mr. Patterson has long wished to be relieved of Beattyville, or town work, that he may devote all his efforts to his isolated mountain people.

Bellevue and Dayton. The Reverend I. D. Lang was transferred to this point from the mission at Corbin on October 22nd, 1918. He is aiming to make Saint John's self-supporting, and reports that more money was raised in the parish last year than at any previous time; and it was accomplished without a specific drive. A long-standing debt of \$550 was extinguished, besides making improvements to the amount of \$200. He is also reaching out to the community surrounding Saint John's. He has gathered about himself some forty young people, members of other churches, as well as those having no church connection at all, giving them wholesome entertainment under the auspices of Saint John's. And he and his vestry are reaching out after the men of the neighborhood who are not communicants. The present parish house is a one-story frame building—the former church—five squares away from the present church. An adjacent parish house is a great desideratum. I commend Mr. Lang's intelligent zeal.

Covington—Saint John's. This parish, long vacant, was from October first supplied by the Reverend F. W. Bliss, who has since been advanced to the priesthood. Mr. Bliss has given every sign that, by loving and patient work, he will revive this important parish, the situation of which affords so much opportunity. He is wisely building up first the Sunday-school. He has a committee from each class to visit the sick scholars; and he has introduced into the Sunday-school the double-pocket envelope system.

Latonia. Latonia, a suburban district within the city limits of Covington, is ministered to every Sunday by the rector of Trinity, in the latter city, the Reverend J. H. Gibbons. A building debt of \$2,172 is a handicap which the American Church Building Fund Commission is offering to assist in lifting. This church is in a well-populated residence district and should not be allowed to pass from out our hands. It could not be in more faithful and diligent hands than those of Mr. Gibbons.

Harrodsburg and Somerset. These missions are ministered to by the Reverend H. P. Manning, resident at Dan-One service every Sunday is given to Harrodsburg, ten miles away; one monthly week-night service to Somerset, forty-five miles away. Harrodsburg offers but little prospect of growth for our Church; but Somerset has been made important by the Southern Railroad, and is the center of a large tributary territory. The results of the infrequent though regular services of Mr. Manning encourage us to believe that a resident minister would build up a respectable congregation in our neat, well situated chapel.

Mr. Manning served as executive secretary in the Nation-Wide Campaign, having a talent for system and details. His largest contribution to missions is by skillful editorship of the diocesan organ (*Diocesan News*), to which also Mr. J. L. Richardson practically contributes his services as publisher.

The Good Shepherd, Lexington. The Good Shepherd lost its then recently enlarged and beautified church on January 20th, 1918, and suffered an estimated loss, at present building rates, of \$23,000, with insurance upon it based only on the original value of such a structure. Since then it has worshipped, first, in a Baptist tabernacle, and, for most of the time, in a public-school building. It is remarkable, and most auspicious, that its congregation has

held together, and that its Sundayschool is increasing—sixty-five on the roll; fifty in average attendance; eight teachers.

The Reverend A. H. Marshall took charge January Ist, 1919, but felt obliged to remove to a climate suited to the ailments of his only child, and resigned a ministry here of great promise, March 15th, 1919.

At great personal inconvenience, Archdeacon Wentworth has been in charge for most of the remainder of 1919. He has unified and led the congregation to decisive steps toward a substitute for their burned church. They have a new lot in the choicest part of Lexington. If they are generously helped to build adequately, the brighest opportunity awaits them that Lexington can offer. The Reverend T. L. Settle will remove from Middlesboro and relieve the archdeacon at the Good Shepherd on March first.

Georgetown. Georgetown has for some years been under the care of the Good Shepherd's minister and still contributes to his support. But its little flock has been so depleted by death and removals, and its members are so advanced in years, as to make it apathetic as to services, especially in the winter season when its church cannot be properly heated.

Pineville. Middlesboro and The Reverend Mr. Settle will leave a congregation which has been quickened to newness of parochial life under his effective ministry. They had increased his salary, but had not felt able to build the parish house which he considered necessary in this growing city and in this center for a large surrounding mining community. His forte lies in institutional work, he thinks. Hence his determination to remove to Lexington. In Middlesboro he has been a director in the Board of Commerce, scout-master and leader of the high-school Bible

The Pineville Church people have been coming fifteen miles to worship at Middlesboro. Mr. Settle claims that Middlesboro is the logical center from which a population of forty thousand in the Cumberland Mountain mining field can be easily reached. He has plead for an associate mission at Middlesboro, as a key to this opportunity. He will bring the best qualities of leadership to the Good Shepherd, Lexington, and will not fail in what can be accomplished by hard work.

Nicholasville. Judge Chalkley, as layreader-in-charge, is ministering to this He has succeeded so far in mission. meeting the indebtedness on the valuable church building, which was bought from the Methodists in 1916, that only a gift from the American Church Building Fund is necessary to clear it of all lien and to fulfil the condition on which certain persons are willing to improve its interior. Besides being a lay-reader of exceptional intelligence and fidelity, Judge Chalkley, as secretary for clerical supply, has been an invaluable agent in securing clergymen for parochial vacancies.

Paris and Cynthiana. The important parish at Paris, which Judge Chalkley, as lay-reader-in-charge for the first half of 1919, and, since then, the bishop, by frequent visitations, have held together, will on March first welcome as rector the Reverend W. S. Cain. He will assume the rectorship also over our faithful little band at Cynthiana.

Winchester and Mt. Sterling. Winchester and Mt. Sterling were left vacant November 1, 1919, by the removal of the Reverend W. R. Dye to Maryland. Winchester is pulsating with the possibilities of new life, created by the influx of several Church families, among those interested in oil developments in fields for which the town serves as headquarters. Winchester should have a resident minister, holding services there every Sunday.

Credit is due our little flock at Mt. Sterling for holding together through many adversities.

Grayson, Louisa and Morehead. To these the bishop ministers by at least an annual visitation.

Educational.

Corbin. Under the lay-reading of Mr. Fred Burman, editor and publisher of the newspaper in the nearby town of Barbourville, the congregations at Saint John's Mission were growing; but from the third week in September he has been critically ill. Mr. H. E. Wentworth has acted as lay-reader and, with the assistance of the workers at Saint John's Institute, he has continued to keep the Sunday-school on the up-grade.

Mr. Burman on July thirteenth began services at Barbourville, in the Presbyterian Church through the courtesy of its pastor. This was a new opening, and its closing through Mr. Burman's illness is a misfortune.

Saint John's Institute. The arch deacon reports that "the year just closed has been the most successful in the history of the school." The faculty is equal to any the institution has had, in both scholarship and loyal Churchmanship. Nearly all of them are tithing for the sake of the school or the Nation-Wide Campaign. Two of them contribute their services and receive only their board. There are ten workers all told. There are one hundred and eight day scholars and seventeen boarding pupils. The latter are all mountain children. Lack of room and equipment prevented the reception of as many more. daily routine housework at school is done by the boys and girls. Religious instruction is given to all pupils. Attendance on services is compulsory. There is an excellent voluntary attendance on classes in Churchmanship. Home economics, industrial and agricultural

training, are emphasized. Provision under a special teacher is made for summer playground entertainment and for associated instruction in useful crafts and in simple arts. Special entertainments and social functions are given for the people of the vicinity.

The local management of the school has paid all current expenses, including teachers' salaries and labor wages, out of its local receipts. Two-thirds of its support otherwise is through individual friends, and not through Church organizations.

The Community Store. This is a special feature of the institution. It deals largely in second-hand clothing, given by Auxiliary branches. It brings people from outlying parts into vital touch with the school on its missionary side, and under its salutary religious and social influence; and at the same time, by sales at a low price, the people are benefited without the loss of their self-respect. Meanwhile the proceeds of the sales are a great assistance to the school in its philanthropic work.

Wentworth Farm. This farm of three hundred and eleven acres, about one-half mile from the school, helps to maintain current expenses, provides a basis for agricultural instruction and experimentation, affords an object lesson to farmers and furnishes work by which, especially in the planting and cropping seasons, children can earn some portion of the cost of their education. But above all it is destined to play the part of an endowment of the school.

The archdeacon has financed the Farm, it having been deemed inexpedient for the diocese to undertake it. It represents an investment of \$22,314.56, of which there remains unpaid \$13,755; of this, \$8,900 is payable through thirty-five years, with interest at less than six per cent. Its net earnings this last year were \$1,707.88, notwithstand-

ing that the Farm has been built up in fertility, and \$1,000 worth of fencing set up on and around it.

The archdeacon reports that Assets. the school property, real estate, buildings, and equipment may be conservatively valued at \$48,300; the Farm at \$24,140; the chattels, livestock and produce of the Farm on hand, at \$6,803; and the cemetery, which was originally a part of the Farm and is now in the possession of Archdeacon Wentworth, at \$10,000—a grand total of \$89,243. The archdeacon claims that Saint John's Institute and Industrial Collegiate School has the third largest plant in the mountain missionary field. While he was not the founder of the institution, and while the sacrifices and labors of others must be gratefully remembered, the thanks of the Church at large are due Archdeacon Wentworth for the wisdom and faith, the courage and steadfastness, and the consequently notable success, with which he has managed and developed the work at Corbin since it came into his hands. To his son, Mr. Harold E. Wentworth, as superintendent, is due a recognition of his business ability and tireless energy, devoted without stint to school and farm.

Margaret Hall. While Margaret Hall, our diocesan school at Versailles for girls and young women, is not so distinctively missionary as is the work at Corbin, it must be included in this report, because it is extending its privileges to those who come from missionary parts of the diocese; and because it is sending back to all parts of this diocese, and to other dioceses from which they may come, girls that are so thoroughly indoctrinated in religion as this Church hath received the same, and so well trained in missionary and other forms of service, that they become leaders in the Church and society, intelligent school teachers and faithful moth-

ers of families. It is to be noted that Margaret Hall at Versailles and Saint John's School at Corbin, both in this diocese, are the only schools of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the state of Kentucky; not referring of course to Sunday-schools.

The Reverend George H. Harris, President of Margaret Hall, has proved to be a God-given successor to the Reverend J. M. Maxon. To the latter Margaret Hall is indebted for its new birth to worthiness and consequent popularity. Mr. Harris has carried it on upon the same high plane of honest standardization. Miss Charlotte E. Forsyth has been the efficient and popular coadjutor of both these presidents of Margaret Hall. God has wonderfully blessed the sacrifices and toil of these laborers with His increase.

The institution is embarrassed by its own success, because of lack of space for the large waiting list of pupils; because of its need of equipment equal to its opportunity for development; and because of the necessity for scholarships and endowment by which to extend its advantages to all our Church girls.

Negro Work.

Missionary. Saint Andrew's Mission, Lexington, is the base of operations for the Reverend E. E. Hall, who, with exceptional intelligence, well cultivated by education, and with quiet but positive and persistent missionary zeal and leadership, has accomplished definite and progressive results within the year and a half since his ordination to the diaconate in Saint Andrew's, June 29, 1918. Church spirit and loyalty have been increased. All extraparochial, as well as current local obligations, have been met. From the people of the congregation have come memorial gifts to beautify and equip the church—a handsome pulpit, the handiwork of a member; an art-glass window set into what was a blank wall over the altar; brass

altar cross and vases; and the installation of city water—all at a cost of some \$400. Repairs were made on the church at an estimated cost of \$500; but the work was done by members of the parish, who also met the portion that required money outlay. At the beginning of the year the rectory bore an indebtedness of \$545. During the year it was enlarged and improved at a cost of some \$650. The American Church Building Fund Commission gave the last \$500. The balance was raised by the Reverend E. E. Hall.

This missionary to the colored people has extended Church services to Frankfort. He teaches two days each week in the state normal school there, the students of which hail from all parts of the state. Four of his communicants at Frankfort are connected with this institution. He also holds services at Danville; and Georgetown and Paris are visited by him. During the past year, I have confirmed eight at Saint Andrew's, which number included representatives from Frankfort, Georgetown and Danville—from representative colored families and citizens in those places.

Educational. Miss Margaret Hummons continues to conduct acceptably Saint Andrew's Primary Circle (kindergarten). She reports the year 1919 as the most successful one in the history of the school. She has succeeded in getting the parents to visit the school. Fifty children have been enrolled. It is the only kindergarten in Lexington for colored children. The expenditures have been only \$56.48 over the \$300 granted from the United Offering of the Women's Auxiliary.

LOS ANGELES—The Right Rev. Joseph Horsfall Johnson, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For Japanese Work, \$300; For United Offering Work (White) \$500.

EACONESS S. R. MILLER the United Offering worker, divides her time between certain weak missions and parishes in Los Angeles and vicinity and the Indian reservations in San Diego County. The latter she visits twice each year, in midsummer and in midwinter, spending about six weeks at each visit. This enables her to keep alive the religious work started by her some years ago and to supervise the lace making industry, also of her starting. "While there," she writes, "we have Sundayschool every Sunday morning, Bible study on Wednesday afternoons. We also have Christmas services with them." In Los Angeles and vicinity her time has been divided among four churches and her work has consisted of the more usual duties of a deaconess. She writes: "I have organized three Woman's Auxiliaries, three mission-study classes, two young people's Christian leagues; have attended woman's guilds and Auxiliaries each week, Sunday-school every Sunday; organized a junior Bible class, secured scholars and teachers for the Sunday-schools." All this in addition to incessant parish visiting, visitation of the sick and going out to speak at meetings in the interests of the missionary work of the Church.

The importance of the work among the Japanese cannot be over-estimated in view of the intense feeling that exists among many people in California against the Japanese and the persistent anti-Japanese propaganda carried on by certain of the daily papers to provoke hostility between the Americans and the Japanese. The promotion of mutual understanding and sympathy between the two races by the spread of Christianity among the Japanese seems to be the only alternative to strife and possible The quality of work at Saint Mary's is of the highest, its inadequacy to the situation is of course apparent.

The Reverend John M. Yamazaki, the missionary-in-charge, writes as follows: "I am glad to report that Saint Mary's Mission, by the generous support of the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary has now a Japanese Bible woman who works under me to teach a part of the Sundayschool and goes around to visit the parents of Sunday-school pupils so as to draw them to the Church. The Sundayschool of Saint Mary's is increasing in its number of pupils and reaching to be a better organization. As the result of Nation-Wide Campaign, the Mary's Mission doubled its pledges for missions, general and diocesan."

LOUISIANA—The Right Rev. Davis Sessums, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$1,000; For Negro Work, \$700.

THE Board appropriates for work amongst white people in the diocese of Louisiana the sum of \$1,000. This amount has been distributed amongst the following clergymen: Reverend J. C. Goodman, Reverend R. H. Prosser, Reverend W. E. Vann. The amount of appropriation, \$700, for Negro work has been paid to the Reverend D. F. Taylor.

The work amongst white people is work which should be regularly maintained; and certain special matters should be mentioned.

At New Roads, where the Reverend Mr. Prosser ministers, it is hoped to build a church; and the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese has already contributed the sum of \$551.92 for this purpose. Land was purchased some time ago, with the title in the diocese. When this church can be erected, increase in membership and Church activities can be expected.

At Saint Stephen's, Innis, which is also under Mr. Prosser's charge, it is likely that the congregation will increase the payment towards stipend. When this is done, it is hoped that arrangements can be made for more frequent services at Innis and New Roads.

Special reference should be made, in connection with the places under the Reverend J. C. Goodman, to Bunkie and Melville and Clinton. At Bunkie considerable increase of contributions has been promised towards stipend; and it is hoped that more frequent services

there can be arranged. At Melville the church was so much damaged some time ago by flood from the river that it would practically have to be rebuilt. It may be possible to purchase a building from another religious body at less cost. This need for a church building is pressing, and it is hoped that ere long it can be met. At Clinton, where Mr. Goodman has revived the work, interest and response have been shown and a class of sixteen candidates was confirmed there not long since.

In Bastrop, Mer Rouge and Oak Ridge, where the churches are under the charge of the Reverend Mr. Vann, the work has improved in system and organization, and particularly at Bastrop gifts have been made to meet debts. Repairs to the church building in Mer Rouge are under contemplation. Mr. Vann has labored with a devotion and energy which are much appreciated by the people, and these faithful services on his part have won an improved general responsiveness.

The work amongst Negroes at Saint Luke's Church, New Orleans, which is under the charge of the Reverend D. F. Taylor, has made progress in the past year. Particular mention is to be made of a considerable sum raised by the congregation to meet indebtedness to the diocese of long standing. An increased membership has taken place in the congregation of late, and there is hopeful outlook before the work. The property consists of a church building and rectory. A parish house is a need there.

The above information relates to work for which assistance is given from the appropriation made by the Board. The diocese has no institutions supported by missionary money. The annual council of the diocese assembled on the 21st of January in 1920, the date of meeting having been changed from the Spring. The general statistics of the diocese are not yet completely in hand. The sum given in the diocese last year for diocesan missions amounted to \$6,197.98. The gifts for general missions up to December 31, 1919, amounted to \$7,450.36. Up to January 23, 1920, the pledges in the Nation-Wide Campaign amounted approximately to \$37,520 per annum for three years—with the Campaign still uncompleted. In the Campaign for the University of the South it is understood that in this diocese the total thus far secured, including gifts and pledges, amounts to \$34,127.66.

The Church of the Good Shepherd, Lake Charles, having been greatly damaged by storm, has been thoroughly restored, with additions to the edifice. This restoration was accomplished partly by cash gifts, and partly through a loan

secured from the American Church Building Fund Commission, and a large sum is already pledged to meet this Ioan. Saint Mark's, Shreveport, which is a large and impressive church, was recently very much damaged by fire, and heavy financial loss was involved. The congregation has met this misfortune with great courage and generosity. It is understood that a sufficient sum has already been pledged to restore the building; and besides this, the congregation has pledged the quota asked for in the Nation-Wide Campaign. Eunice, which is a mission, there is prospect that a church building can be begun at an early date. There is probability of further local subscriptions, and the diocese is ready to lend a sum of \$500. In New Orleans the congregation of Grace Church, under the charge of the Reverend Mr. Edbrooke, is to build a new and costly church on Canal Street, and the corner-stone is soon to be laid.

The aid rendered to the diocese by the appropriation from the Board of Missions is a needed help, and is much appreciated.

MARQUETTE—The Right Rev. Gershom Mott Williams, D.D., the first Bishop resigned during 1919; The Right Rev. Robert Le Roy Harris, D.D., is the present Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$3,900.

THE missionary field of the diocese of Marquette has shown substantial progress during the past year in spite of the influenza which closed one mission after another during the winter. This crippled our work, cut down the number of confirmations and the offerings, resulted in much suffering and I regret to say many deaths.

Our missionaries showed fine heroism and devotion to duty during the plague, risking their lives again and again, nursing the sick and caring for the dying. Especially noteworthy were the courage and devotion of the Reverend P. P. Ernst and Mr. Thomas Foster, who nursed the sick day and night, at times even doing the cooking and washing for destitute families which would have died but for their care, as no nurses or help were available. Both subsequently had nervous breakdowns resulting from their devotion to those stricken by the plague. Fortunately both are recovering. All our clergy showed fine contempt of danger and made many new friends for the Church by their heroism and self-sacrifice.

Among the encouraging features of the work is the reopening of the church at Newberry which has been practically closed for years. Reverend Mr. Walton is now maintaining regular services there and the outlook for successful work in this promising field is excellent.

At Moran, a lumber town which Mr. Ernst visits each week, the church is crowded by the men who come in from the lumber camps for service. He has also reorganized the work at Saint Ignace, where our Church ministers not only to our own people but to many people of the denominations whose places of worship are closed and who gladly attend our services. Moran and Saint Ignace have subscribed their full quota to the Nation-Wide Campaign and are in better condition than for years. The work at Munising and Gwinn under the Reverend Mr. Walton is showing remarkable progress. Both oversubscribed the N. W. C. We have now a fine Sunday-school at Gwinn and large class for confirmation, the first in a number of years. The people at Munising are about to enlarge the rectory, a gift from Bishop Williams, and open a small parish house for community work. The Church influence is changing the civic spirit of the whole community.

Our devoted general missionary continues his splendid work in the large rural field to which he ministers. Wilson is a model rural work and ministers to the people for miles around. It is a fine religious and social center for the community and has a class ready for confirmation. Ralph, once one of the toughest lumber camps in the north woods, has become a model community under the influence of the Church. The loving saintly personality of Mrs. Marie Campbell, a devoted Churchwoman, has wrought a marvellous change. tically every child is baptized and every adult confirmed. At my last visitation, post-office, store, station, were closed that the men might attend the early celebration of the Holy Communion before going to work. Practically the whole population were present which demonstrates the fact that the Church can do most effective rural work when devoted Church people are willing to give their best to serve the Master. We are now gathering funds for a new log church at Ralph, and hope to build this summer.

In addition to Wilson and Ralph, Mr. Poyseor's work at Ewen, Gogebic, and Sidnaw is going on quietly but effectively. All the stations under the general missionary have fully subscribed their rusts of the N.W. C.

their quota of the N. W. C.

Iron River and Chrystal Falls have a new priest-in-charge, the Reverend Charles F. Jones, and show promise of new life and activity. Iron Mountain has shown remarkable progress under the Reverend Mr. McDowell. A fine class of twenty-four, mostly adults, are ready for confirmation. Iron Mountain, Vulcan and Norway were the first missions to go over the top and exceed their quota in the N. W. C. We need another priest at once in this large field as there are some towns nearby which have no regular English services which our missionary could easily reach in a machine. and where our services would be welcomed. The denominations are giving up a number of fields in this diocese which we should seize. If the Church would provide the funds for additional clergy I could take over a number of communities where we would have practically no competition. Whole towns go months with no religious services.

Menominee, where Mr. Ernst did excellent work until his health failed, is now in charge of the Reverend Herbert L. Lawrence, and is making most satis-

factory progress.

Manistique, which was about to erect a new parish house under the vigorous leadership of the Reverend Mr. Gill, has suffered a blow by his removal to Detroit. It is hard enough to keep the large cities constantly taking our communicants, but when they take our

clergy too, it makes our task doubly difficult. I hope, however, soon to have a man in this field. The Reverend Mr. Bailey continues his excellent work in Ontonagon and adjoining fields and the work is in flourishing condition.

The work at New Allouez, Kearsarge, and Lake Linden has been faithfully carried on by the Reverend Mr. Mill under the oversight of Dean Van Broeck. Due to the slump in copper prices under government control, this field has suffered a temporary setback and we have lost heavily by removal to the automobile manufacturing centers like Detroit and Flint. We are constantly training young Church people for the more powerful dioceses about us. In time the mines will all be reopened. In the meanwhile the Church continues to minister to the people regularly and efficiently and is especially needed in this period of local depression.

The large rural field in the eastern part of the diocese covering nearly 150 square miles offers one of the finest opportunities in the American Church for real service. This field is in charge of the Reverend William Maltas, one of the most godly and devoted missionaries I have ever known. I was able to bring in a number of outside clergy during the summer and minister to some fourteen stations. Usually the preaching places were crowded with worshippers, only a small proportion of whom are our own people. Maltas, though approaching three score and ten years of age, attempts to minister to these fourteen places during the winter, enduring hardships cheerfully, that prove him a true soldier of Christ.

If we lose him before other men can organize the results of a quarter of century of loving service we are liable to lose the whole field. We need two men to assist him at once and I trust the funds will be appropriated by the Nation-Wide Campaign before it is too late, and the field lost to the denominations. They feel it is useless to enter portions of the field as long as our much loved missionary is in charge. The people mostly members of various denominations will furnish buildings, heat, light and part of the stipend if we will furnish the clergymen. In one mission chapel last year I confirmed eleven persons. Mr. Maltas is failing in health. We must act in this field within a few months or lose it. People of all denominations, in places even Romanists, welcome our missionaries in this field. They offer us their children in baptism and confirmation. those who control the funds of the Nation-Wide Campaign help us seize and develop this promising rural field?

MINNESOTA—The Right Rev. Frank Arthur McElwain, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For Indian Work, \$350; For Work among the Swedes, \$600; For Negro Work, \$300; For United Offering Work (Indian), \$500.

THE diocese of Minnesota voted at its annual council in May, 1919, to take over the full support of its missionaries with the exception of the United Offering worker and thus relieve the Board of said responsibility after the present fiscal year expires.

Indian Work. At Birch Coulee our work has made marked progress in church attendance, in the number of communions made and in interest. Every family contributed to the Nation-Wide Campaign. The government has announced its intention of giving up its day-school, but we hope that friends of the Indian work will enable us to have the buildings and put a teacher in charge. The district public school is too far away for the little children.

Negro Work. At Saint Philip's Church, Saint Paul, the Reverend Mr. Lealtad presented one of the largest classes in the history of that mission, containing in its numbers some for whose allegiance this faithful pastor had worked for many years.

Swedish Work. The year has been marked by progress in all our missions. The most noteworthy advance is the revival of interest at Saint Johannes' Mission, Minneapolis, where the Church school has been revived and the people have reassumed their Church obligations under the direction of the Reverend F. L. Anderson. Saint Sigfrid's, Saint Paul, has large plans for Christian Social Service and Americanization.

MISSISSIPPI—The Right Rev. Theodore DuBose Bratton, D.D., Bishop; The Rt. Rev. William Mercer Green, D.D., is the bishop coadjutor, having been consecrated May 20, 1919. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$2,500; For Negro Work, \$2,700; Vicksburg Industrial School, \$2,500.

HAVING been absent from the diocese during the latter part of 1918 and the early half of 1919, my report for the latter year will cover activities begun in 1918 and completed in the period which this report should cover.

War Work. As soon as possible after the establishment of Camp Shelby, near Hattiesburg, I gained permission to erect the Episcopal Hut as a center of social service during the week, and on Sunday as a chapel in which to administer the Sacraments of the Church. Within ten days the people of the diocese gladly contributed the money to erect the Hut, equip it, and to pay the expenses for one year of visiting clergy and other smaller charges. The Reverend Dr. Simpson Atmore, of Trinity, Hattiesburg, acted as civilian chaplain during the period of the war, and the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew sent Mr. Murdock, of Illineis, to be lay-worker among the men, and live in the little cubicle which the Hut provided. Later Mr. Shields, of New Orleans, took Mr. Murdock's place. About twenty of our clergy, with Chaplains Malinckrodt and Wheeler, kept up the Sunday communions. I confirmed many of the soldiers and not a few were baptized during 1918 and 1919.

Practically all of our clergy shared their time with war activities, as speakers in Loan, Red Cross, and Y. M. C. A. drives, on state and county committees, and as preachers in cantonments. The bishop and Archdeacon Smeade went to Europe for work among our soldiers; the Reverend W. D. Bratton was chaplain of the 155th Regiment during the entire period, serving at home and in Europe; the Reverends John Gass and J. H. Boosey were army chaplains for a short period; and the Reverend Harry

Perry was Red Cross chaplain for a year at Camp Shelby.

Mission Work. Such activities as above noted, involving absences from fields, naturally resulted in more or less of disorganization. There were more vacant missions than for twelve years past. The parish priests devoted many Sunday evenings to the missions nearby them, but with all, many missions were deprived of regular ministrations.

At the close of the year, we are in need of about ten more clergy than we have if our field is properly to be manned.

Our coadjutor was consecrated the last of May and the bishop returned early in June. Both at once began a period of renewed activity and the confirmations for 1919 compare fairly well with previous years. The organization of mission congregations is growing stronger as the realization of the great problems of the new era are more and more clearly seen.

One new mission in Artesia was organized in November, which has already a suitable lot and growing building fund for the church to be builded

Much interest is being manifested in the Nation-Wide Campaign, which was postponed to January and February, because of the Sewanee Campaign to which the diocese is subscribing more than sixty thousand dollars.

The Archdeaconry of Colored Work. Perhaps the greatest demoralization incident to the War is to be found in our Negro missions, from which a large exodus of members was made. We are now able to see the results with accuracy, since war activities have ceased. Naturally the cultural power of the Church is witnessed most in those who

need it most. The power of the Church to change life is nowhere more in evidence than among our Negro people. And when the call came from North and Middle West for workers, it appealed strongest to our Negro Churchmen, who left us in great numbers at the solicitation of manufacturers needing workmen and willing to pay large wages. Archdeacon Middleton could not know until recently if his great losses were permanent or temporary. The net result of the period is very great loss to our own missions, and corresponding gain to our neighbors near and remote. Some years ago the boll weevil ravages had a similar effect. We lost heavily and had to build up again. We must accept our losses again, and patiently build up as we did before. The archdeacon is comforted in the knowledge that nearly all of the many communicants gone North will seek their Church homes in the new lands to which they have moved.

In spite of losses our confirmations have increased this year. But the facts are specially noted that our losses have been heavy; that this would appear discouraging to the student of statistics; that it was the inevitable result of war calls and war conditions; and finally and most emphatically that the facts form a powerful plea for renewed expenditures and reduplicated effort. To our staff of clergy we will add the Reverend S. A. Morgan, priest-in-charge of Mound Bayou and Greenville, who has arrived and begins work on January 1, 1920.

Education. No report should omit mention of: 1. All Saints' College for girls (white) now in its tenth year of useful operation of its several departments, viz.: Preparatory, High School,

Junior College (two years), Music and Art. The boarding capacity is about fifty students, filled to overflowing for several years, now without soliciting agencies. Another dormitory is needed and would be filled at once. A chapel is needed, that school and college may realize the best development of the young women. The thorough work done has gained for our high school girls entrance into our best colleges in the North and the South alike where they have invariably taken high stand.

Our Junior College prepares students excellently for life and its duties.

2. The Vicksburg Industrial School, one of the Church Institute schools for boys and girls of the Negro race, is enjoying its best year of attendance, having two hundred pupils enrolled with an average daily attendance of over one hundred and fifty. It supplements the inadequate accommodations of the city schools and therefore duplicates the grades. In addition carpentry is taught the boys, while the girls have cooking, sewing, etc.

The need is for an additional building for use as an auditorium, a boarding department, and to relieve the overcrowded condition of the present plant.

3. Saint Mark's Kindergarten and Primary School in Jackson, where one teacher and one pupil teacher as assistant, instruct about forty pupils. The parish house serves as school room and chapel. The need is for a church for our growing congregation. When this can be builded, the parish house will accommodate double the number of pupils now enrolled. It would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of the school work among the Negro people.

MONTANA—The Right Rev. William Frederic Faber, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$5,700.

DISTASTEFUL as it is to me, I cannot give a just account of the Church's work in the diocese of Montana for the year 1919 without distinctly presenting adverse conditions which have confronted us. As these are far from being the whole story, I will note them first, for I do not wish them to leave the final impression.

First, the War. As regards economic effects, Montana felt the war as a drain, without any corresponding stimulation of "war-time prosperity"; a drain of her young men, and a drain of funds; respecting the latter, contributions enormously in excess of our allotments; respecting the former, as it was stated, a percentage greater to the total of population than that of any other state of the Union.

Secondly, the drouth. The two years preceding had brought crop failures in large portions of the state, but 1919 was worse. Few places in Montana had anything like normal returns. In 1918 agricultural products were valued at over one hundred and forty-six millions; for 1919, as shown me today at the state house, some sixty-two millions. Disastrous forest fires raged for months, with a pall of smoke hanging for weeks over western Montana. The obvious effect was a considerable exodus of ranchers; the shipping of vast numbers of cattle out of the state, as they could not be kept alive here. The census returns are not yet available so that we are left to conjecture our population. Five years ago and for several years the annual influx was very large. Estimates two years ago gave us some 760,000. A prominent business man, of large interests in the state, hazarded the guess that we had lost the last year or two, 150,000. We cannot tell as yet; earlier estimates may very likely have been inflated. Be that as it may, the situation

has been anything but favorable for advance.

A review of the reports of missionaries (half of our clergy are missionaries) shows also considerable interruptions owing to the influenza epidemic and the fuel shortage. Winter set in with unusual severity in October and has continued almost without break for five months; so the fuel problem was a pressing one. However, the enormous snows will prove a blessing. The thirsty land will soon, we may hope, "bring forth grass for the cattle, and green herb for the service of men."

Keeping in mind the conditions described, we have much reason to be thankful as we review our statistics for the year. We show a small increase in number of communicants. While the number of baptisms is considerably less than in 1918, the number of confirmations is exactly the same; and for each of the last two years one less than for each of the two years preceding. The Sunday-school showing is better—more teachers and more pupils. The number of organized missions and of preaching stations is reduced; of the former some have had to be "demoted" to the latter class, and of the latter some abandoned.

The Nation-Wide Campaign appeals have come to us as primarily a summons to re-enlist our lives, with all our abilities, for the service of the Church as committed to us here, in Montana. We tried pretty hard to meet our general missions apportionment last year; we failed, paying only seventy-five per cent of it. But we have been more than pressed to keep up our diocesan missionary obligations, and have had to keep two of our fields vacant because we simply could not support missionaries for them; a third, clamoring-for which the General Board had appropriated \$750—we have not been able to set

off because we could not raise the required additional \$750. These are the facts. In view of them, to expect the diocese of Montana to send each year for the next three years a quota equal to five times our last general missions apportionment, and, besides, maintaining her present work also to finance new projects here, is utterly fantastic.

A friend hands me a copy of a magazine, new to me, The Nation's Business, published by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. In it is a map of the country showing business conditions February 11, 1920. There is one state which is entirely black, only one: Montana; all of it "poor." Comment is needless.

We have not lost our courage, nor our self-respect. We know the state will recover. "Five years at least—but it will come," so men are saying. The resources are here; and population will flow back—it has begun to already.

But the diocese has had to defer building projects and improvements, and, in short, whatever was not urgently needed. And with splendid determination, in a number of places, debts have been cancelled or reduced. Some of the salaries have been increased-most of them should have been. A drive in the city of Helena has brought in nearly \$13,000 to reduce the debt of Saint Peter's Hospital. The total of contributions last year was \$33,000 over 1918. The total of property is \$78,000 more than the year before; the total indebtedness \$25,000 less.

There is one thing of which this report should make mention. With a desire to lend our encouragement to every effiort for Christian cooperation, we have conferred with the Home Missions Council in their planning for "Every Community Endeavor." This, in a word, is an effort to avoid wasteful expenditure of men and money in "over-

churched" places, and distribution of work and workers so as to leave no place "unchurched." In this we shall go to the limit of what, as Churchmen, it is right for us to do; and it means that for the present we shall not organize, or erect buildings, except where obligations already existing, or a sufficient number of our communicants in the place, justify it. With absolute candor as to what we will not do (because as loval Churchmen we cannot) but with sincerely fraternal spirit, we are laboring with our fellow-Christians for the Christianizing of this whole state no longer in the isolation of even a year ago—facing the sacrifice (if sacrifice it is) of some "organized missions" whose growth and promise may seem not to warrant more than the occasional ministrations of the Church. By compensation we may expect to be able to put more intensive effort where the conditions call for it. And withal we are venturing to hope that, going forth in this larger spirit, in a temper of unity, we shall not fail of increase both spiritual and material, in the end.

NEBRASKA—The Right Rev. Arthur Llewellyn Williams, D.D., died Jan. 29, 1919. Right Rev. Ernest V. Shayler, D.D., was consecrated Sept. 11, 1919. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$2,850; Special Fund for Work among the Negroes, \$390; For Indian Work, \$1,400; For United Offering Work (Indian), \$600.

E NTERING upon my work as bishop September eighteenth last, and then an absence of three weeks at General Convention allows me opportunity to say but little regarding the work.

After nearly a year's interregnum, added to the transmigration of the clergy, I found the field undermanned and in urgent need of reorganization. This we are attempting.

Aside from Omaha we have no large city and the weakness of the Church in most of the small towns is appalling. As I go from place to place the needs of the people are so many that one is reminded of young birds in a nest with wide-open mouths awaiting food.

Nine mission stations in the western part of the diocese have been closed for months. Church at Fairbury, Tecumseh, and Auburn are without men, while our general missionary ministers to a few scattered points.

I have now placed a man in charge of the nine missions above. One of these missions ministers to a hundred children and some officers at the government Indian school. Fall City is relinquishing missionary aid this year; Wymore partially; Neligh, after thirty years a mission, is about to become a parish and the Nation-Wide Campaign is renewing and enlarging life in many places.

The Winnebago Indian School is particularly efficient. The crying need is for men and money in a dozen of towns from 2,000 to 5,000 population.

NORTH CAROLINA—The Right Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop; The Right Rev. Henry Beard Delany, D.D., Suffragan Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$800; For Negro Work, \$7,188 (including Archdeacon's salary); St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, \$16,000. For United Offering Work (White), \$1,380; Negro, \$2,760.

THE diocese of North Carolina has given up all claim upon the general treasury for aid in its white missionary work, and now receives appropriations for its Negro work alone.

The diocesan missionary work is administered by three convocations, each raising and expending its money under the general directions of the Convocation acting under the bishop and its own archdeacon. This method has been pursued now for nearly twenty years. It is believed that its effect upon Negro work has been to increase their sense of responsibility and also in the

annual meetings of the clergy and representatives of the colored congregations to give them some practical experience in the transaction of Church business. The colored clergy and congregations by this convocation organization are not cut off from their organic connection with the diocese, but retain their membership in the diocesan convention.

The outstanding feature of the Negro work of the Diocese of North Carolina at this time is the fact that at the end of the year 1918 a suffragan bishop of the diocesan was consecrated to have

special charge of the Negro work of The Right Reverend diocese. Henry B. Delany, D.D., the suffragan bishop, had been for a number of years archdeacon of the colored convocation and had proved in that office his fitness for this higher work. Though exercising episcopal oversight under the diocesan over this particular work, he retains also the title and office of archdeacon; and his episcopal function effectively supplements his archdeaconal oversight. By an arrangement with the bishop of East Carolina and South Carolina, Bishop Delany has also the episcopal oversight, under the diocesan, of the Negro work in those two dio-.

It is too early to speak very confidentially of the results of this policy of having a Negro bishop for the immediate oversight of the Negro work, but so far as a judgment can be formed it fully justifies this action by the diocese of North Carolina and the generous

co-operation of the two sister dioceses.

The statistics of the Negro work in the diocese for the year 1919 are appended hereto.

NORTHERN INDIANA—The Right Rev. John Hazen White, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$4,400; For Italian Work, \$700.

BEG very respectfully to submit my report for the year 1919 of work done in the diocese of Northern Indiana with moneys given out of general funds for the work of Church extension. The complexion of the diocese and the character of work done from year to year do not change very much. There is a large area of territory with a very numerous population entirely unministered to by established parishes or missions. I have tried for some years with the help of the Board of Missions to meet this situation through the work of an archdeacon. For the past four years I have had in this office a most valuable, brave and efficient man, who has done splendid work, travelling from place to place and ministering to many scattered people and small missions. Always bright, happy, hopeful and courageous, he has done a wonderful work. Toward his salary of \$1,800 your specific appropriation of \$1,000 has been applied. During the last year he has been much embarrassed by reason of inadequacy of support with the vastly increased cost of travel, etc., and our diocesan Board has increased his salary to \$2,500.

By far the most important work in this diocese is that in the Calumet region contiguous to Chicago, rapidly filling with factories and bringing in literally thousands of laboring people every year. I have done my utmost to meet the situation as it is developing, but it is far too big a problem to be cared for locally. Still my policy has

been to plant securely such missions in this region as I could maintain and develop. So we are building up a fine parish at Indian Harbor, where the Reverend Leon E. Morris, a most consecrated priest, is doing very efficient work and to his support we devote with your approval, \$900. At East Chicago, there is building very fast a strong mission, The Good Shepherd, to which nothing is contributed from general funds, but \$800 is given from our diocesan mission fund.

At Valparaiso where Reverend C. B. Cromwell is serving most faithfully, to whom we give with your approval \$600, the work of the Church is progressing most favorably. This mission was started a few years ago, has now grown until they have a very nice but modest church and fairly comfortable rectory. There is fine opportunity for aggressive work if Mr. Cromwell could only have some financial backing to enable him to minister to the very large body of students in attendance annually at the University of Valparaiso. He also has charge of a mission at Hoart and a small work just developing at Chesterton. Money put into work at Valparaiso would bring rich returns.

I have done all in my power to nurse and encourage the Italian Mission at Gary, San Antonio, of which the Reverend Nicolo Accomando is the faithful priest-in-charge. Some years ago you gave me \$600 towards his support. On this he has fought very bravely, but it is a very meager provision for so important a work. He has enlarged his church building on borrowed money.

If the Church could only get behind him with some generous aid, it would be hard to estimate what the results might be. In that Calumet region there are thirty thousand unchurched Italians. The Reverend John F. Plummer still continues to do most efficient work at Kokomo and is building securely for the future. His work is about the most promising of all our mission work.

The Welsh Mission at Gas City is still ministered to by the Reverend Forest B. B. Johnson, to whom we give \$200.

The Reverend Edwin E. Smith, I removed from Bristol to the care of Trinity Hungarian Mission, South Bend, and permitted his stipend to go with him. He has been there but a year, but has done most efficient and faithful work. These two missions—to the Hungarians and Italians—engage very much of my heart and interest. If in the expansion of our work provision could be made for their strong development I should be greatly rejoiced.

JOHN HAZEN WHITE, Bishop of Northern Indiana.

OLYMPIA—The Right Rev. Frederic William Keator, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$2,500; For Japanese Work, \$600.

THE money given by the Board, supplemented by about double the amount contributed by the diocese, maintained our missionary work in such wise that we were able to complete the year with all stipends paid in full to December thirty-first. At our annual convention in February the treasurer reported that so far as contributions for diocesan missions were concerned the past year was the best in the

history of the diocese. It is always our aim to make the appropriation from the Board go as far as possible and to apply it upon work that is deserving.

We are hoping that under the stimulation of the N. W. C. we shall soon be able to support our own work without any outside assistance.

OREGON—The Right Rev. Walter Taylor Sumner, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For White Work, \$3,000; For United Offering Work (White), \$600.

THE keynote of last year's work has been progress, all along the line. Recovering from the results of the war and sickness, nearly every parish and mission shows a new spirit of growth and faith. Financially, the Church in Oregon has displayed a spirit of self-sacrifice that is notable. At the close of the period under review, the Nation-Wide Campaign was arousing a spiritual and material response whose full fruit has not yet been fully gathered. A new day has dawned for the Church.

The two strategic points of the diocese, Corvallis and Eugene, show increased numbers for confirmation and in communicants. The Oregon Agricultural College at the former city will enroll nearly four thousand students next year, in Eugene the University of Oregon is attracting a fine grade of men and women. At both these centers of influence, the Church is making herself felt.

The Coos Bay Missions have been faithfully served, and steady advance made. At Newport and Toledo, the resident vicar has consolidated past work and has opened up new fields for religious education. One of the vital problems we have to face is the isolated Churchman, the families growing up without our ministration. At Roseburg the missions round have been linked up and under the new rector, the faithful and devoted workers look for great things. Medford and Ashland, Grants Pass and Eugene all have made notable increases in their pledges. Our need is for consecrated men to fill vacant posts in this field.

In Portland, the little mission of Saint Philip has made great growth. Saint Andrew's, Portsmouth, has given an inspiring example in the real hard work in building. Grace Memorial and Saint Michael and all Angels' are both ready to build fine and beautiful new Houses of God. Saint David's has opened out in Montavilla and Mount Tabor with Church-schools which touch only the edge of great possibilities. All honor to the Board of Religious Education for their pioneer work!

The Good Samaritan Hospital continues its quiet and efficient work. Early next year the new wing will be provided for by a special effort. Saint

Helen's Hall has now secured fine quarters with a magnificent campus and ideal position. The work of the Sisters of Saint John the Baptist is beyond praise.

Oregon today needs the prayers of the faithful. We stand on the threshold of a new day. To secure the young people, to reach the boys and girls, this

is the crux of our work.

THE census returns show a growth of population within the boundaries of the diocese, but a shifting and changing of character which affects the efforts at Church extension. The rural population has diminished, as has been the trend for over a half century, and many towns are stationary. The growth has been principally in a few of the larger industrial centers, and is generally in foreign types.

The present policy seeks to maintain work already in existence, and to promote advance in rapidly-growing places.

Nevertheless, there have been earnest efforts to rise to self-support on the part of organizations in several of the smaller places, and with notable results in some. Griggsville and Pittsfield in Pike County, whose combined efforts yielded but an average of \$800 for clerical support, are now raising \$2,000 for this purpose.

A notable instance of Church growth in a strictly rural surrounding, is that of Saint John's Church, in the township of Pre-emption in Mercer County—a country cross roads. Long dependent upon missionary funds for existence,

Saint John's has asked for classification among self-supporting parishes, has largely increased the pastor's stipend, and has erected a substantial brick church building at a cost exceeding \$20,000.

There are no rented pews nor assigned sittings in the diocese.

THE missionary work among whites, Indians, and foreign-speaking people in this diocese goes quietly forward with little change. Two missions are about to receive resident priests, having made provision for his support in each instance. The Indian work is being strengthened by the erection of a rectory, to be followed later by a community house.

The Nation-Wide Campaign has enlarged the budget of nearly every parish and mission. It is hoped to see religious education at school centres provided, also a revival of social service

work for invalid children.

Nineteen nationalities are represented in the Americanization plan in Sacramento, where formerly Japanese alone were reached. A dozen automobiles are hoped for to multiply the activity of the missionary in rural fields.

Two deaconesses are supported by the United Thank Offering, one as educational secretary, one as general parish visitor. Both are highly valued. Another deaconess is in charge of Christian teaching among foreign-speaking people. The help of the Board in this rural, scantily populated field is highly appreciated.

THE Nation-Wide Campaign has made provision for a great forward and constructive work among our mill people. Our budget calls for the expenditure of \$49,000 in this field alone in three years.

The Negro work here shows marked improvement under the Suffragan

Bishop Delany.

A tract of land of over 250 acres has been bought for an industrial school soon to be erected, and the American Church Institute for Negroes has offered to raise \$75,000 for this work.

The white people of the diocese in the Nation-Wide Campaign have taxed themselves for the support of the colored work \$19,675 in three years and have also undertaken to raise the salaries of all the colored clergy and to guarantee the difference between their present salary and \$1,000 for a single man and \$1,200 and a rectory for a married man.

In the case of the white clergy the diocese has quaranteed the following standard, \$1,600 and a rectory for married men and \$1,500 for single.

I N sending the annual report for the year 1919 of the missionary work of the diocese of Southern Virginia, I beg leave to say that the division of the diocese on December 10, 1919, makes it impossible for me to give a full statistical report for the year. The present diocese of Southern Virginia has relinguished all aid from the General Church and will care for its Negro work in the future. We are deeply grateful for the generous aid extended during so many years by the Board of Missions, which has made it possible for us to reach the stage where we will no longer have to rely upon outside assistance, but can look forward to giving larger help to the missionary work of the General Church.

The Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg and Saint Paul's Normal and Industrial School, Lawrenceville, though situated in the diocese, are not and have never been diocesan institutions, but have been for years connected with the Church Institute for Work Among the Negroes, and will need for the great work they are doing the generous assistance of the Presiding Bishop and Council.

I would express for the diocese of Southern Virginia our earnest appreciation of the assistance of the Board of Missions which has enabled the work in the old diocese to grow and prosper so that now we have become "two bands."

THE outstanding accomplishment of the diocese in the past year was the raising of our endowment fund from \$35,000 to \$100,000 during the summer of 1919. One devoted woman of the diocese started the movement with the gift of \$12,000, another followed with \$10,000, and two others gave \$5,000 About three hundred people pledged the \$65,000 necessary and the pledges are payable within five years. It was the hope that everyone in the diocese would have a part in this movement, but many were frightened by the size of the first gifts and stayed frightened to the end. This means everything to the life of the diocese and brings to fruition the hope of many years.

In the parish of Saint Paul's, East Saint Louis, where we are spending nearly a quarter of our apportionment for white work, wonders have been accomplished. A discouraged and beaten parish has awakened to new life under the leadership of the Reverend Peter Langendorff. In addition to their current expenses the small congregation has raised nearly \$7,000 in two years, the church building, which was in awful condition, has been entirely renovated and beautified and it was the first parish in the diocese to meet its quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The blossoming into life of the two stagnant parishes of Belleville and Pekin, which for years have maintained but an unprofitable existence, is also a matter of great encouragement, and is a presage of what will be done in other places when the people realize that self-support is the only way to growth and prosperity. One of these parishes increased the amount paid to a clergyman by over 400 per cent, and the other 125 per cent. This can be done in many places.

We are profoundly thankful that in thirty places in the diocese the stipends of the clergy have been increased in the past three years.

the past three years.
Our colored work too looks a little more hopeful this year. The Reverend A. J. D. Keuhn, rector of Saint Peter's Church, Mound City, is in charge of the colored congregation of Saint Michael's, Cairo, where the bishop recently confirmed a class of six, the first to be confirmed in several years. Our other congregation of colored people, Saint Luke's, Springfield, have been without a priest for a great part of the year and are earnestly looking forward to the day when the parochial life will be resumed. A lay-reader has held the people together, and they have done good work, the debt on their church of \$1,400 having been paid off entirely in the past year. We want a hard-working American Negro priest for this work and we need him now.

We need above all two fearless, consecrated missionaries for work among the coal miners in the southern part of the diocese. We can divide the field in such a way that each man will have a

pleasant town in which to live with a fairly good congregation to start with, and we are at last able to offer a man who has the qualifications for this work, a living stipend.

The generous help of the Church through the Board of Missions has made possible for many years the life of the Church in the little places in the diocese. While we are making more adequate return than in the past, we are hoping for the day when we can give largely to the Church's work elsewhere.

THE election and consecration of a bishop coadjutor for Tennessee, and the assignment to him of all the missionary work of the diocese, open a new chapter in the history of the Church in Tennessee; but as the consecration did not take place until September, the new bishop was scarcely able to begin his work before the beginning of the new year. He encountered post-bellum problems quite as difficult of solution as those imposed by war times, and he has found himself hampered at the outset of his work by an insufficient number of active clergymen, the list having been reduced to about thirty during the past

Some of the difficulties have been met in Memphis by the cathedral assuming charge of the missions in the city and vicinity; and by increasing the cathedral staff of clergy and inaugurating a guild of lay-readers it is planned to have services in all the missions every Sunday and more frequent priestly functions than ever before. The work was greatly strengthened by a series of mission services under the dean of the convocation of Memphis, in all the missions of the city during Advent.

The former archdeacon for work among the colored people of the diocese has continued his oversight of this work since his consecration as bishop suffragan of Arkansas and plans are being perfected for the establishment and maintenance of a training school for a colored ministry, to serve the needs of the dioceses of Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee. The school is to be located in Memphis.

 $\mathbf{W}^{ ext{HILE}}$ this diocese received no assistance from the Board of Missions during the year 1919 for white work, yet we feel that appropriations in the years gone by have in some measure been responsible for accomplishments this year. The Church has gone into several new centers, notably two new sulphur fields. At Gulf, in Matagorda County, we have placed a priest, who is the only resident minister. There are about one thousand people in Gulf, and the Reverend Frank A. Rhea has become a sort of city manager, inspiring, and initiating civic, social, educational, and religious community enterprises, to which the whole people are responding splendidly. At Freeport we have secured a rectory and built a church within the past ten months, and the Church is prepared to minister to this growing community. We still have several vacancies where good men are in demand, and this is certainly the part of the Master's Vineyard which challenges the best of any nature and offers the widest possible opportunity for development.

The colored work has received assistance from your Board, and indeed we are grateful. For six months the Venerable George Gilbert Walker has been covering the diocese as archdeacon of colored work, and he has indeed done splendidly. At Beaumont a mission

has been established. We have an option on well located property and plan the erection of a church before long. At Tyler the work has been revived. The archdeacon has also opened up new work in Houston, Temple and several other towns, and with two additional colored priests in the field we are looking for a brighter day for the colored people of this diocese.

WASHINGTON—The Right Rev. Alfred Harding, D.D., Bishop. Appropriation by the Board: For Negro Work, \$2,500.

THE past year has been one of the most gratifying in the history of some of our churches which minister to the colored people in the District of Columbia, notwithstanding the restlessness of the people, largely due to wartime demands upon their time, which

has necessitated in a large measure the permanent or temporary removal of many from their home churches.

In the District of Columbia we have a colored population of more than one hundred thousand. There are 113 places of worship under the oversight

of the following religious bodies: Baptists, 60; Methodists, 41; Episcopal, 7; Congregationalist, 3; Presbyterian, 1; Adventist, 1.

The Sunday-school scholars of the race in the Protestant Bodies number 16,000, of which the Episcopal Church

registers approximately 500.

It has been evident for some time that men and money were sorely needed to meet this growing population in our midst. The outlook is brighter now and we hope, through the results of the Nation-Wide Campaign, to reorganize and direct this work to meet these compelling demands.

The Reverend Wm. V. Tunnell, Vicar of Saint Philip the Evangelist Chapel, Anacostia, reports despite the drawbacks of a shifting population, the work in this mission has steadily advanced. Current expenses have been met in full, including apportionments for diocesan and general missions, as well as for

extra-diocesan purposes.

The rector of Saint Luke's (the only organized parish in the diocese for colored people), the vestry and congregation are to be congratulated upon the successful accomplishment of the liquidation of a long standing indebtedness on the church. For the past nine years the work of this parish has been handicapped by reason of this heavy financial burden. The full payment of this debt gives the people a freedom and a vision of the opportunities to do effective and efficient work. On Thanksgiving Day the church was consecrated.

Calvary and the Atonement Chapels under the vicar, the Reverend F. I. A. Bennett, are doing a most effective and progressive work. This church is laboring under an indebtedness. However, the debt is being gradually decreased and the people are working to the end that the church may soon be consecrated.

The resignation of the Reverend R. S. Hoadland, whose work has been in the archdeaconry of Southern Maryland for a number of years, first as lay-reader

and later as vicar of Saint Mary's Chapel, Charlotte Hall, Saint Mary's County, Saint Simon's Chapel, Croome, and Saint Philip's Chapel, Aquasco, Prince George County, becomes effective the last day of January. Mr. Hoagland makes mention of some distinctive marks of progress in this field where his entire ministry has been spent, as follows: Notably among these are the deepening spirit of devotion, the increased attendance at Saint Mary's Chapel and the faithfulness on the part of some to fulfill their pledges as a result of the every member canvass which has been conducted in each mission. The several chapels have undergone renovation, due to much sacrifice and liberality on the part of the people.

Saint George's Chapel is the only church of ours for colored people in the six square miles of the District of Columbia comprised within the confines of Saint Alban's Parish in the northwest section of the city, to which the chapel is attached. It is strategically located on grounds adjoining the Reno Public School. Services have been held daily in the chapel since its founding in 1906. Baptisms reported since that date. 200; confirmations. 100. The vicar, the Reverend Edward Douse, reports the need of a parish hall and rectory.

Saint John's Chapel, located in Georgetown, is surrounded by a large population of colored people, but owing to the inadequate facilities to meet the needs of the people, the work has not progressed in proportion to the splendid opportunities that are within our reach. Ways and means are under serious consideration to meet the conditions in this section of the diocese.

THE missionary operations in the diocese of Western Michigan, as in all other parts of the Church, have been considerably interrupted by the unusual conditions existing during and after the The shortage of clergy and the unrest among the people have interfered with activities that had been previously planned and initiated. However, through the indefatigable labors of Archdeacon Vercoe, and with the help of some of the zealous clergy, the field has been kept well in hand. The Nation-Wide Campaign has been carried into the missions wherever possible, and the results so far reported entitle us to believe that by the spring or summer of 1920 all the mission stations, including particularly Mount Pleasant, Big Rapids, Albion, Belding and Greenville, will be reopened. It is hoped to put two additional archdeacons into commission and to inaugurate a rural mission parish in one of the fruit-farm-

ing communities. The amount appropriated to the diocese by the Board of Missions has assisted towards paying the salary of the archdeacon and the sipends of six or eight of the missionary clergy.

THE diocese of West Missouri takes pleasure in presenting its annual report and in announcing that the year that has closed has witnessed a great awakening in Church interest all along the line. Thanks to the generous aid of the General Board of Missions, it has been able not only to supply services

to many outlying stations, but also to supplement the very meagre salaries of its faithful missionaries and to enable them and their families to bear a little more easily the frightful burden of the high cost of living, which has been so keenly felt all over the Middle West. One faithful worker—who for over

cleven long years has stood devotedly at his post—is now able, for the first time in many months, to look the world in the face and realize that the Church whose minister he is, is at last awakening to its responsibility and beginning to realize that "the laborer is worthy of his hire."

Very great help has also been rendered along these lines by the diocesan Church Club, which through the generosity of a devoted layman has been able to keep its field secretary (the Reverend J. W. Jones) travelling about the country and ministering to unsupplied missions on Sundays, in addition to his organizing work among the men on weekdays. The stimulating effect of the presentation of the Nation-Wide Campaign in these various places has been most marked, and has deepened the devotional spirit as it has widened the vision of the Church's missionary activity.

This diocese, unlike many in the West, has a very small alien population and therefore does not report any missions conducted in foreign tongues or exclusively for people of other lands —its people being almost entirely American. It has, however, a very large colored constituency and consequently a very important duty to the Africans and West Indians who live in its midst, and I am thankful to say that it is beginning to realize this God-given responsibility. This past year has witnessed the most remarkable growth in the history of Saint Augustine's Church in Kansas City. Its list of communicants has practically doubled and it is rapidly assuming the position of leadership among all the colored congregations of this community. Responding to the untiring labors of its devoted missionary, the Reverend Harry M. Rahming, it has entirely outgrown its

present very cramped and unsuitable location, and is counting the days until it can move into a new and larger church, for which a fine building-lot has been secured by the diocese in the new colored residential district. Once in the new building, I am confident that the mission will in a very short time be able to organize as a parish and to become practically self-supporting.

To the many kind friends in the eastern states who have at heart the spiritual welfare of this great people in our midst, I most heartily commend the allimportant work at Saint Augustine's.

I shall be glad to correspond with any and all who may desire to aid me in this intensely practical work and to help those who are trying in the most noble way to help themselves to better things.

THROUGH the Woman's Auxiliary one woman worker is supported at the Sheltering Arms Hospital, twenty miles from Charleston, in the Kanawha and New River coal fields. During the past year over 3,000 patients were treated and cared for, most of them miners, men, women and children, sick and injured. The hospital is perhaps the greatest missionary agency in the diocese, reaching nearly all nationalities and creeds. The work of Miss O. J. Bascom (the missionary) extends to the chapel situated on the hospital grounds, where she has a good Sunday-school for the neighborhood, also various organizations.

Negro Work. There are about 65,000 Negroes in West Virginia out of a population of the state of 1,221,000, scattered over 24,000 square miles.

The Negroes are chiefly in the mining districts, but move so rapidly from one place to another that it is impossible to do any organized work among them. The mission in Charles Town, the station in Shepherdstown, and a work recently organized in Charleston are the only places where systematic work has been carried on. These missions together report 114 communicants with 94 scholars in Sunday-school. They are under the charge of the Reverend J. T. Jeffrey and the Reverend A. N. Slayton. These missions train and furnish a large number of communicants for the Church in Washington, Harrisburg, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. Most of the young people go to these places as soon as

they are old enough. To this work the Board appropriates \$400. Saint Philip's congregation, aided by the parish church, adds enough to make the salary \$600. The mission meets current expenses and contributes to missions and other objects. There is a parish school at Saint Philip's, with two teachers and seventy-three scholars.

General. The work is carried on by missionaries in ninety-seven churches and chapels, besides a number of unorganized places. These missionaries reach about 2,000 communicants. The diocese raises for this work about \$9,000 and the various points about \$9,500.

CHURCH WORK AMONG SWEDES

The Board appropriates \$4,190 for work among the Swedes. This is carried on in the eastern dioceses where the Rev. T. Gottfried Hammarsköld, D.D., is general missionary. Besides this, the Board appropriates for Swedish work in two dioceses. Reference to these appropriations will be found under Duluth and Quincy.

THE thought that has dominated me and my co-workers during the past year is how we best can help to make one Christian nation out of many different peoples dwelling in our country. In trying to do this, we have become convinced that professed allegiance to one country, one flag and one language is not all that is required for molding men and women into real Americans.

Some leaders of the Americanization movement advocate the enactment of laws which would prohibit the use of all foreign languages even in churches, but any such action is bound to do more harm than good, because it would prevent people who are in the habit of publicly worshipping God in a foreign tongue, and who cannot understand English, from exercising their religion freely, and also make it impossible for a great number of parents and their children to join in a common worship at the same Altar. Such policy is contrary to the law of God, to nature, and to our best American traditions. There is another and better way open to the Church for bringing about a genuine assimilation, and the Swedish clergy have chosen it because it is Christian and more effective than any compulsory They feel that both foreign and native born need a conversion that restrains, transforms, inspires and creates a right attitude towards God, our fellow men and our country. This is the only kind of Americanization that will make men fully realize that they are not only mutually dependent upon each other, but also mutually responsible for each other, and therefore all ought to avoid injuring others in their material, physical, social and spiritual interests.

Our Swedish clergy contend that we must draw together in order to meet the danger that besets our own democracy. They emphasize that the principle of fraternity and co-operation is the essence of Christian ethics and must be fearlessly and consistently proclaimed and applied. Their people are urged to earnestly and loyally say, "Our Country is Christian, we believe Jesus Christ is the Master of all life's relationships; therefore we must obey Him, be faithful citizens, and not tolerate class rule, sedition, privy conspiracy, and rebellion."

All reports show a steady increase of young people at services conducted in English, and that the Swedish language is now seldom used in our Sunday-schools, confirmation classes and social work. The absence of compulsion makes our citizens from the Scandinavian countries feel that they are not rated as foreigners. This feeling makes them eager to learn and use English as soon as possible. The policy of the clergy is one of helpfulness and encouragement rather than compulsion and reproach. They are doing their utmost to make the people realize the advantage of being familiar with the language and traditions of our country, and that citizenship is not merely a duty but a sacred privilege that carries with it personal dignity, obligations and responsibilities.

An every member canvass has been conducted in all parishes and missions. It has done much to promote spirituality, and inspire a desire to express the professed faith in acts of service and sacrifice. In several places the number of contributors has been doubled.

Extensive repairs and improvements have been made on our churches and rectories in New York City and Saint Paul, Minnesota, vested choirs introduced, and a number of parochial organizations started.

Saint Ansgarius, the oldest Swedish church building in Chicago, has been sold at a great sacrifice, because the neighborhood has undergone such unfortunate changes that services there could no longer be continued with any degree of success. This parish, organized in 1849 by Bishop Whitehouse, has in the past been a spiritual home for thousands of immigrants from the Scandinavian countries. The present time is the most critical one in its history, but with some financial assistance it would soon become a center of missionary activities among the unchurched Scandinavians residing within the states of Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin.

How to meet the constantly growing demand for more workers remains our most difficult problem. It cannot be properly solved without some educational institution equipped for the training of those who are to minister to Scandinavians. Experience has demonstrated that the usual courses given at

colleges and seminaries do not qualify men for the kind of work that should be done among Danes, Norwegians, Swedes and Finlanders. To be a successful missionary among these races one must be familiar with their history, cultural development, mental attitude, and religious conceptions. All my coworkers strongly advocate the establishment of a training school for both clerical and lay workers, and many of them have expressed the hope that such an institution would be located in Chicago, because it is most centrally situated and offers greater opportunities than any other city for different kinds of work in which the prospective students should be interested.

During the past year I have conducted 219 services, taken part in 47, preached 174 sermons, delivered 62 addresses, administered Holy Communion 29 times in public and 18 in private, baptized 34 children, solemnized 8 marriages, and officiated at 24 funerals. All parishes and missions have been visited, some of them as many as eight times, and extended conferences held with social workers interested in Christian Americanization.

WORK AMONG DEAF-MUTES

An appropriation of \$700 is made by the Board to assist in supporting two general missionaries among deaf-mutes. The Rev. Brewster R. Allabough, whose headquarters were in Cleveland, died May 19, 1919. The Rev. George F. Flick, who has headquarters in Chicago, ministers in the Middle West.

THE Reverend Brewster R. Allabough, general missionary of the Mid-Western Deaf-Mute Mission, died suddenly from apoplexy at Middletown, Ohio, Monday evening, May 19, 1919. His post was not filled until January, 1920, when the Reverend C. W. Charles, with headquarters in Columbus, Ohio, was appointed by the synod.

Mr. Allabough was a faithful and conscientious worker among his silent congregations up to the last. His report for 1919 was never made to the Board because of his untimely demise.

In a letter written late in 1919, Archdeacon Abbott observes:

"Reverend Mr. Allabough made to me every month of the eight years of

the existence of the Mid-Western Deaf-Mute Mission, a detailed report of all his services, and all receipts and expenditures. These reports, together with the general cash book, and a cash book for each of the dioceses, containing all receipts and expenditures, and vouchers covering all expenditures for the eight years, are on file in my office, an annual report of the general missionary, secretary and treasurer, covering the eight years. These annual reports were printed up to, and including, 1915-16. Since that time, on account of high expense in printing, these annual reports are contained in type only."

It is to be hoped that the work among the deaf mutes in the United States may soon be more adequately maintained by the Church at large.

THE Church work among the deaf during the last year in the Chicago and adjoining dioceses resulted as follows: 139 preaching services and lectures, 7 baptisms, 7 confirmations, 4 marriages and 1 burial. Total attendances, 3,869.

The places regularly served were Chicago, Rockford, Kenosha, Racine, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Saint Paul and Sioux Falls. Other small communities were visited occasionally.

The total number of deaf communicants in my field is 162. Many of them are looked after by local rectors.

As a result of the Nation-Wide Campaign at All Angels' Church for the Deaf in Chicago the double-pocket envelope system was adopted and the pledges for the parish support amounted to over \$500 and for the missions, about \$175. A new steam heating outfit was installed at the cost of \$1,425 just before the end of the year. There is no such a thing as church debt there. An en-

dowment fund has just started and has now about \$600.

The employment situation has helped the deaf people, so there is scarcely any unemployed among them. The Goodyear Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio, has demonstrated to the employing industrials the trustworthiness and capability of deaf persons as workers, of whom there are about 600. In Detroit the Ford Motor Company employs about 160 deaf men. In other lines of work the deaf have their place.

In Chicago early in 1919 a club of deaf men started a movement which resulted in purchasing a handsome club house, not far from the church for the deaf. The price was \$25,000. The club members are the only possessors of the mortgage bonds. It was not a philanthropic gift. It has a membership of about 250.

There is also a Chicago League of Hard of Hearing whose membership is large and consists of persons that are not commonly called deaf-mutes. A recent appeal of the league asked for a large fund to enable its operation in the aid of the unemployed "hard of hearing" and for social welfare. The same appeal stated that there were about 15,000 of such persons in Chicago that the league sought to look after. Some of these people have found their way amongst the deaf at the church and the clubs of the deaf where they rejoiced being less isolated.

Lectures along educational lines seem to be in great demand and I have been able to supply some of them wherever possible. Of course these people would appreciate pictorial talks, and a selection of good "movies" such as the Pathescope affords would give them great pleasure. This is especially true of those living in small towns.

I thank the Board for its continued co-operation in this work amongst the deaf.

THE AMERICAN CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The American Church Missionary Society was founded in the year 1860 and incorporated in 1861. It supported missionary work in fifteen dioceses and missionary districts within the United States, and in 1873 assumed charge of the work in Mexico but relinquished it in 1877 when it became an auxiliary of the Board of Missions. In 1888 it assumed charge of the work in Cuba, and in 1889 established the mission in Brazil. In 1905 the Society transferred its work in Cuba and Brazil to the Board, retaining, however, its corporate existence and its other work, in accordance with its articles of Agreement made with the Board in 1877 and re-affirmed in 1905.

IN accordance with its articles of agreement, made with the Board of Missions in 1887, and reaffirmed January 2, 1905, the executive committee of the American Church Missionary Society makes the following report to the Board for the fiscal period ending December 31, 1919.

The details of receipts and expenditures will be shown in the annual statement of Mr. George Gordon King, treasurer.

The invested fund of the Society is now \$176,938.50. The income on about two-thirds of this is appropriated at the discretion of the committee, while the income on the rest is paid in accordance with specific terms of the several trusts which it sums up.

The work of the Society is voluntary, evangelical and auxiliary to the Board of Missions. It adds to the stipends or aids the work of clergymen who are commended to it by their bishops and who are in sympathy with its purpose. It has been thought best not to make

any other appeal to the Church than a statement of its position and its readiness to keep faith with those who entrust offerings to its care. At present the work is wholly domestic, but it is always ready to care for special gifts in accordance with the wishes of givers.

The basis of adjustment between the Board of Missions and the Society leaves the administration of work and the appropriation of funds solely with the executive committee of the Society while the choice of fields and stations is arranged by mutual consent.

These terms of agreement were legally and formally set forth between the Board and the Society under date of January 2, 1905.

The committee, on behalf of the Society, reports its readiness to serve and work in voluntary and evangelical missionary effort for Christ and His Church.

AMERICAN CHURCH INSTITUTE FOR NEGROES

The American Church Institute for Negroes has its office at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, N. Y. The Right Reverend Thomas F. Gailor, D.D., is President, and the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Vice-President. Mr. Louis J. Hunter is Treasurer; Mr. George Foster Peabody, LL.D., Assistant Treasurer; the Reverend Robert W. Patton, D.D., Special Representative; Mrs. Isabel M. Carter, Secretary.

OWING to the increased cost of commodities and of all living expenses, it has been impracticable for

the American Church Institute for Negroes to encourage any new undertakings in the Church industrial high

schools for Negroes in the Southern states during the past year. Indeed, it has been with the greatest difficulty that the standards already attained could be maintained without establishing large deficits in the budgets of the schools.

Although for the reasons mentioned, the utmost economy has been necessary, the Institute is able to report that the schools, as a whole, have maintained the standards of the previous year, and that, with one exception, they have not gone heavily into debt for current needs. In the case of the school which is the exception to the general rule, the deficit has not been caused by careless management at the school, but is almost exclusively due to the increased cost of supplies with a corresponding decrease in income. The Church is to be congratulated that the school boards have shown a conscientious and business-like regard for the difficult financial conditions confronting them and have been faithful and scrupulous in the discharge of their duties.

In spite of very limited financial resources, making necessary the most rigid economy, there has been no reduction in the total enrollment of Negro boys and girls attending these schools. In fact, there has been a slight increase in this respect. Approximately, 2,700 pupils were enrolled during the year 1919 in the Institute schools.

The aggregate of the deficits of the schools for the year ending December 31, 1919, was not excessively large in view of the large number of boys and girls enrolled. The total deficit amounts to about \$25,000. This deficit would, of necessity, have been much larger had the salaries of the teachers been increased in proportion to the advance in the cost of living. The trustees of the Institute desire to pay tribute to the heroic self-sacrifice on the part of the teachers in these schools. In no cases have the salaries of the teachers in our Church schools for Negroes been adequately increased. In most cases there

has been little or no increase, and this has worked severe hardships upon them and their families. The trustees of the Institute plead with the Church for larger contributions for the support of these schools, especially in view of the uncomplaining and devoted service on the part of the teachers themselves.

A resolution passed by General Convention directs that the American Church Institute for Negroes shall have precedence with the Board of Missions in the distribution of moneys received from the Nation-Wide Campaign. These funds, however, will not be available, except to a limited degree, during the year 1920, and will not be available in full until all the dioceses shall have completed their full quotas.

The disbursements, through the American Church Institute for Negroes for the support of these schools, during the year 1919 were as follows, as per the treasurer's report:

General appropriations from Institute, \$15,200; specials transmitted by Institute, \$2,561; Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society appropriations, \$50,573.37; special contributions through Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, \$4,417.12; income from investments (St. Augustine's School Endowment Fund), \$30.47; administration expenses, \$3,389.03; total, \$76,170.99; cash in bank, December 31, 1919, \$1,270.14.

During the year 1919, the Institute received reports and recommendations from the bishops and school authorities of the dioceses of South Carolina and Mississippi, suggesting new locations and plans for an industrial high school for Negroes in both dioceses.

In the case of South Carolina, it was proposed that the appropriation from the Institute for Saint Mary's School at Columbia should be withdrawn and applied to a school to be located in the country near Sumter. At the request

of the trustees of the Institute, the Board of Missions had made an appropriation for the purchase of land at this point. The land has now been bought. The school is to be known as Saint Mark's School, and it is hoped that, with the aid of the Institute, in cooperation with the bishop, an industrial high school, worthy of the Church's responsibility, may be developed in this part of the diocese of South Carolina. Dr. James H. Dillard, president of the James Slater Fund, and the Reverend Robert W. Patton, D.D., were appointed by the Board of the Institute to report on this matter. An investigation was made, and the committee named brought in a favorable report on the plans for the establishment of a school at Sumter, South Carolina.

The same committee was appointed to enter into negotiations with Bishop Bratton, looking towards the withdrawal of the appropriation hitherto paid to the Vicksburg Industrial School at Vicksburg, Mississippi, and using it in the development of another school more favorably situated in the diocese. The negotiations in this case are still under way; but it is hoped that, in the not distant future, arrangements of a most encouraging character may be reported.

The American Church Institute for Negroes has been accepted by the Presiding Bishop and Council as its agent for supervising the work of the Church's high and industrial schools for Negroes. We herewith add to this report the following authoritative action taken by the Presiding Bishop and Council at the February meeting, 1920.

The special committee, appointed for the Presiding Bishop and Council to confer with a similar committee of the American Church Institute for Negroes, presented the following report:

That the Institute should work in complete accord with the Presiding Bishop and Council, and in particular with the Departments of Missions and Finance, so that there should be no misunderstanding and no duplication in effort and appeals:

That the province of the Institute should remain, as heretofore, the maintenance of academic, normal, industrial and professional schools and colleges, to prepare Negroes to be teachers in public and parish schools, to be educated leaders, business men and women under Christian and Church influences:

That the Institute should continue its fostering care and oversight of the schools at present its beneficiaries, and add to the number Church institutions of a normal and higher educational character reaching the required standard.

The Presiding Bishop and Council, at its meeting on February 11, 1920, adopted the following:

RESOLVED: That the Presiding Bishop and Council approve the above statement of the relation of the American Church Institute for Negroes to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

On motion of the Bishop of Georgia, the following resolution was also adopted by the Presiding Bishop and Council:

RESOLVED: That the Department of Finance be instructed to secure from the officers of the American Church Institute for Negroes a statement of their appropriations, receipts and needs, and a budget for 1920.

THE PROVINCES

The Provincial Secretary, elected by the Provincial Synod with the approval of the Board, is the bond of union between the two bodies. The map and tables of the provinces given herewith furnish much interesting information.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF LIBERIA

The Missionary District of Liberia includes that part of Western Africa known as the Republic of Liberia, having an area of 14,360 square miles and a population of 1,000,000. The District within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in 1850. The Right Rev. Arthur Selden Lloyd, D.D., is in charge of the District. The Rev. Walter Henry Overs is the bishop-elect.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the District is \$58,620. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in forty-seven stations.

Missionary District of Brazil

Report of the Bishop—1919

I HEREWITH submit my annual report for the current year.

Upon the return of the The Staff. Reverend C. H. C. Sergel from his furlough in England, he was assigned to Livramento, the southern frontier of Rio Grande do Sul, a missionary district of great promise, and the Reverend F. T. Osborn put in charge of the Church work in Meyer, the suburb of Rio de Janeiro. The work in Rio de Janeiro is now organized as follows: Archdeacon Meem has charge of the Church of the Redeemer, Rua Haddock Labo; the Reverend Salomao Ferraz of Saint Paul's Chapel, Santa Thereza, and the Reverend Mr. Osborn of Trinity, Meyer.

Southern Cross School. It is a deep, deep joy to report that the equipment of the Southern Cross School is at last complete, except as regards the school chapel. The Reverend Mr. Thomas now looks out from his commodious headmaster's home upon the school and orchard, and the athletic field lying across the road in front. In a corner of this field and fronting the school building it is proposed to erect the future chapel, where its presence may accentuate during hours of work and hours of play the religious element of life. The school is full this year; the faculty is doing good work; a distinct Church atmosphere has been created; four of its inmates, one teacher and three students, are candidates for Holy Orders; the school has pledged itself to support next year the two Brazilian clergy on its staff. This is an accomplishment of which the headmaster may well be proud. should sting with its challenge many a Church school at home with never candidate for the ministry. should further spur many a Church school in mission fields to self-support

and to help the Board of Missions bear its burdens by relieving the Board, wherever possible, of the salaries even of ordained teachers.

I asked the Church half a dozen years ago to give Mr. Thomas the equipment needed for the establishment of a Church school, expressing confidence that it would soon become self-support-The prophecy is fulfilled. The school chapel excepted, the equipment is complete; the institution is self-supporting, and he straightway relieves the Board of Missions of the support of the only teachers on his staff whose salaries have been provided by the Board. All this represents accomplishment, economy, administration, work-crowned by a spirit of selflessness, a worthy desire to relieve the home Church wherever possible.

A Glance at the Chief Church Centers. To the Church of the Mediator, Santa Maria belongs the high and imperishable honor of being the first to achieve self-support, as well as to have built its own church and rectory almost Underentirely unaided from home. the Reverend Mr. Baptista Barcellas and the inspiration of having learned that most difficult of all lessons in mission work, viz. self-support, the work in Santa Maria moves forward. In Porto Alegre, Trinity Church under the pastoral care of the Reverend George Upton Krischke has shown remarkable development during the past year in all parochial activities, in larger church attendance, and increased offerings. There is every promise that by Easter next, Trinity will provide the entire salary of its own rector, relieve the Board of one of its many burdens and achieve self-support, thereby adding another star to our mission-flag. In Pelotas, Church of the Redeemer, I confirmed the largest class as yet presented in its

brief history of twenty-six years. Thirtyfive candidates received the imposition of hands. Pelotas has always held a sort of primacy in the accuracy of its liturgical services, the beauty of its church building, and the success of its men's Bible Study Class under the Reverend Jose Severo da Silva. During the past year the congregation has brought its rectory and parish hall fund up to the respectable figure of nearly \$2,000 U. S. gold. The Church of the Saviour, Rio Grande do Sul has given proof of new energy in its Church life under the pastoral oversight of the Reverend Jose Leao. They have taken a long step forward in the direction of self-support and have decorated with singular good taste the interior of their beautiful The English-speaking element church. in Rio Grande is increasing. I hope to place an American priest there in the early future, and thereby strengthen Rio Grande as a Church center. In Bage, where the congregation under the Reverend Antonio Guimaraes has their Church building and lot large enough for a rectory and parish hall as the result of their own efforts and where they meet in part their rector's salary and all parish expenses, the Church work is growing apace. Let it be noted that in each of the above points the incumbent is a national clergyman, a fact perhaps without parallel in any other mission field of this Church. Nowhere else in the foreign field to my knowledge can there be found five Church centers which are manned solely by national clergy, and nowhere five congregations so far on the road to self-support.

The limits of this report forbid even a meager sketch of the vast region under the care of the Reverend Mr. Cabral, Archdeacon of Porto Alegre, and the frontier recently confided to the Reverend Mr. Sergel, and the thirty or more other parishes and mission stations where services are held. Everywhere, with but one or two exceptions, during my recent visitations, I found the work

tingling with loyalty, life and hope. I'm often asked while at home "Do your people stick? Aren't they changeable? Don't they soon grow weary of welldoing?" I answer: I am far more frequently saddened during my home-land visits at the sight of Church families growing lukewarm and Church children renegade to duty than in Brazil. As I look back over the twenty years of my work as chief shepherd and review the abiding loyalty and unfailing Church devotion of my folds everywhere, I have reason to thank God that He gave me this work to do. gives me a thrill of deepest satisfaction to greet the familiar faces of many years at my frequent visitations. Generally speaking the absentees are those who finished "in the confidence of a certain faith, in the comfort of a reasonable, religious and holy hope, in the communion of the Catholic Church" and are now sleeping in God's care.

New Points to Be Occupied. A new mission station in Porto Alegre will be shortly occupied by the Reverend Vicente Brande, soon to be restored to the priesthood of the Church from which he was suspended at his own request some years ago for causes not affecting his moral character. He has supported himself meanwhile as head of a successful school and has always been regarded as a man of unblemished character. He has gradually come to see that the vows of his office are unredeemed while he fails to make proof of his ministry. There is a wide field of usefulness for him in a section of the city of Porto Alegre, half way between Trinity Church in the center of the town and Theresopalis, a suburb two and a half miles distant where the Southern Cross School is situated.

Santos, the greatest coffee port of the world, where for a decade or more we have longed to plant the Church, has been thrown open to us in a singularly providential way. The Reverend Joseph Orton, an Englishman by birth, for

many years resident in Brazil and associated with Christian work here, was strongly recommended to me by Bishop Every, Anglican Bishop of the Argentine. After satisfactory interviews during a recent visit to Santos, examining his credentials, and work, it was decided to take him on my staff as lay-reader and candidate for Holy Orders that he might begin Church work in Santos in the immediate future. Mr. Orton brings his own support with him. The only outlay necessary is house-rent, chapelrent and outfit for chapel. How wondrously God has opened the way to the Church to enter Santos!

Immediate Needs

All I shall write under this heading has reference to the Nation-Wide Campaign recently inaugurated and to be rigorously prosecuted, I trust, during the coming days of opportunity. While the needs I shall mention are all immediate, some are more urgent than others. Let it be noted also that I place in the forefront the call to men. Give us the men first and the equipment will follow however tardily in God's good time.

1. Theological School. Among the most pressing needs that face us at present is that of a theological school. Some ten years ago I determined to admit no more men to Holy Orders for a time in order to accentuate self-support. I did not feel that it was either a healthy or a symmetrical development to enlarge the native ministry further until the native Church should take larger part in their support. So important did I deem this lesson that with the approval of my staff I closed the Theological School for a decade notwithstanding the pressing need for men. Now that the Brazilian Church has begun to learn its lesson and self-support is under way in all the chief centers, and further, now that the Southern Cross School has become a feeder for the

ministry we must keep our faith to the Brazilian Church and keep alive this hope of perpetuation through their national ministry. In order to do this I need a theological teacher who can act as dean house-father to the four candidates now ready for instruction and such others as may be gathered in the future. I must ask the Board for the rental of a suitable building for this purpose, but first the consecrated man who is willing to give himself to this task and carry it forward as the present bishop of Virginia did in years gone by.

- 2. Urgent Need of Three Missionaries. The fast developing work demands three American deacons or priests to be assigned to the following tasks. One to assist the Reverend Mr. Thomas at the Southern Cross School, who is doing overwork and must have someone to share his responsibilities. A layman, godly and capable, if such could be found, could fill this demand. school is now self-supporting as I have said above. It is but just that the Church should secure and safeguard the institution's future by taking this step here and now before shattering Mr. Thomas's health and probably the school along with it. An American clergyman is needed for Sao Paulo, a city of 750,000 inhabitants, the second city of Brazil and its most progressive center of population. A third missionary is needed to strengthen the Church's lines either in Rio de Janeiro or Rio Grande, as the most pressing exigency may de-
- 3. Girls' School. Now that the Southern Cross School is on its feet, time and place and circumstance all demand the establishment of a Church school for girls in Porto Alegre, the center of our work in Rio Grande do Sul. It seems quite needless to emphasize so manifest a need. The Church must provide for the training of Her daughters as She has done for Her sons in this age when

womankind is discharging tasks hitherto assigned only to men and exercising increasing influence in shaping civilization. To begin such a work a headmaster and wife are needed and one or two women teachers. These, with a rental allowance of two thousand dollars annually will be quite sufficient at the outset. Then so soon as a clientele is built up, as happened in the case of the Southern Cross School for boys, eighty-thousand dollars will be needed for a building.

4. New Churches Needed. Church extension proper, aside from educational or evangelistic extension, presses pathetically in four points already occupied and holding credentials of substantial and permanent growth.

In the beautiful section of Rio de Janeiro known as Santa Thereza, where the late Dr. Franciscoll Castro the head of the Rio had organized a hospital for the poor, and under Archdeacon Meem began Church work which he continued faithfully until his lamented death last year, "his works do follow him." Now under the Reverend Mr. Ferraz the work in Santa Thereza is growing rapidly in a hired building, Saint Paul's Chapel. Eighteen thousand dollars is urgently needed to purchase a lot and build a church in Santa Thereza.

Likewise in the suburb of Meyer the growing congregation of Trinity Chapel still worship in a "hired house." They own a lot which cost them five thousand dollars, and have a building fund of four thousand dollars, all of which represents their Church devotion. If we should "help those who help themselves" as the adage says God does, the Church should help house the one hundred ninety-eight communicants of the growing suburb of Meyer. Sixteen thousand dollars will do this.

A chapel costing fifteen thousand dollars is greatly needed for the Southern Cross School. It is a sine qua non to affirm and accentuate that the institution stands for Christian education in the

midst of a commonwealth whose Positivist governor for many terms declares: "Theological morals, exhausted and decrepit, struggles in vain to reestablish its influence now fatally lost. . . . Positivist instruction alone can cure the skepticism that dominates the upper classes and the indifference or revolt that characterizes the lower classes." Over against a declaration like this I think it well to place our cross-crowned chapel of the Southern Cross School to show that whatever the leading statesman of Southern Brazil may think of "theological morals" and their exhaustion and decrepitude at least Catholic "morals" and the "faith once for all delivered to the saints" are vital and regnant, drawing their life from Him "Who is alive forevermore." The future chapel of the Southern Cross School will serve further as a house of worship for the growing Brazilian congregation in the flourishing suburb of Theresopolis, and also for the increasing number of English and American residents of Porto Alegre for whom Reverend Mr. Thomas holds Church services.

In Livramento, the frontier town where the Reverend Mr. Sergel is stationed, we need a church greatly. Three American packing establishments have been recently organized in Livramento. It is the junction of the Rio Grande and Uruguayan system of railways. It seems to be in every sense a strategic point, the southernmost outpost of the American Church, which stretches thence northward across a hundred parallels 'of latitude, to Bishop Rowe's furthest north within the Arctic Circle. Mr. Sergel, one of the most tried and trusted members of my staff deserves something more than a hired hall for his work. The Church should give this skilled veteran an equipment somewhat worthy and adequate. So doing, Mr. Sergel will make, by God's blessing, of Livramento a strong center, reaching out from thence to other outlying frontier points of great promise where re-

ligion is decadent and lifeless. Seventeen thousand dollars will be sufficient I take it for the purchase of a lot and to build a church in Livramento saving an annual rental of four hundred dollars. I trust it will be noted that each need springs from the growth of the work and means a proportionate saving of outlay to the Board of Missions in rentals.

Parochial Equipment. The time has come in my judgment to strengthen the Church in those points where there has been largest growth and most substantial approach to self-support. Where the Church has sounded the anchorage and found it favorable there let Her plant Her anchors deep and immovably. In any adequate programme for the future, we must give heed to improvement of plant, where our investments in property render the best returns. The completion of parochial equipment follows seed-time and harvest as the night the day. Where the lands show productiveness we must build our houses and barns.

Church of the Redeemer. Rio de Janeiro has now an adequate church building in the midst of a spacious lot, where a rectory and parish house can be built for eighteen thousand dollars, and yet the Board pays annually one thousand eight hundred dollars to rent a rectory. In the past ten years the Board has paid out eighteen thousand dollars in rentals, the amount needed to build a rectory and parish house for the Church "to have and to hold from this day forward." Shall we continue this manifest impolicy for the future and during the next ten years waste eighteen thousand dollars, by throwing it into the bottomless pit of rentals, or spend it on the needed rectory and parish house and end all further outlay?

Like conditions prevail at Meyer where twelve hundred dollars is paid out annually in rent for a rectory whereas twelve thousand dollars would build a rectory, an abiding asset to the Board that can be saved out of ten years' rental.

In the city of Rio Grande do Sul on the lot by the side of the beautiful Church of the Saviour, a parish hall, eight thousand dollars, and rectory twelve thousand dollars. Here the work is approaching self-support and the fund for a parish hall is being accumulated slowly.

Like conditions obtain in Pelotas where nearly two thousand dollars are on hand for the rectory and parish hall to be built by the side of the Church of the Redeemer. Sixteen thousand dollars would build the needed equipment and save the Board an annual output of four hundred dollars for rent.

In Porto Alegre where the congregation of Trinity is giving full proof of its self-devotion and assuming every responsibility it can meet, and who could not raise sufficient funds for a parish house and rectory during the next dozen years, an investment of twenty thousand dollars would not only provide the same but would free the Board of the burden of six hundred dollars annually for house-rent, and wipe Trinity, Porto Alegre off the Board's annual budget for the future. In other ways what the Church set out to do will have been accomplished. Porto Alegre and the candle of the Lord will shine there, burning, yet unconsumed, that please God may never be put out.

In Bage with the building of a rectory and parish house costing five thousand dollars the Church of the Crucified passes to the self-supporting stage and the Board of Missions will be relieved of further outlaying.

In Santa Maria where they have church and rectory self-supporting, they need a parochial school. Should the Church not help them in this? They have done so well and are to my knowledge doing their best to "carry on" their present obligations. It would take some years before they would be able to maintain a parochial school, though one is sorely needed in their midst. I

do feel that the Church in the United States can find no better work to do than to reward the Church of the Mediator in Santa Maria for their splendid work and give three thousand dollars for a school building to be erected on the church lot there.

Remoter Needs. Up to this point I have touched upon needs growing out of work already undertaken. Thus far we are in the sphere of intensive rather than extensive spiritual culture. But we must needs "lengthen our cords" as well as "strengthen our stakes." In Santos, the great coffee port, we have made a start as mentioned above. There as elsewhere, the work will develop rapidly and soon a church building will be needed. Fifteen thousand dollars will anchor the Church in that port and provide for a lot and building. The growing city of Sao Paulo with three

quarters of a million people must be our next point of advance. There are Church people there praying God to open the way to us. There are others, I am assured by the British chaplain, awaiting the Church's coming to join Her ranks. When God gives me the personnel needed, viz. an American deacon or priest and a Brazilian priest, we will unfurl the Church's flag in Sao Paulo. And as the Church grows there, for She has grown wherever planted in the fruitful soil of Brazil, striking root downward and bearing fruit upward, an adequate equipment will be needed. For a site and church in Sao Paulo, not less than fifty thousand dollars will be needed. And may God give us vision to see the need, and grant us grace to make it

OUR MISSION IN CHINA

I. MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF ANKING

The Missionary District of Anking includes that part of China lying within the Province of Anhui, and that part of Kiangsi lying north of latitude 28°. It has an area of 88,000 square miles and a population of about 36,000,000. The district was established in 1910. The bishop is the Right Rev. Daniel Trumbull Huntington, D.D., who was consecrated on March 25, 1912.

The amount appropriated from the Board of Missions to the district is \$65,566. The appropriation assists in maintaining work in thirty stations.

Report of the Bishop-1919

I HAVE the honor to submit herewith my report for the missionary district of Anking for the year 1919. The following are the changes in staff:

Sister Constance Anna arrived in Wuhu in March. Miss Kathleen La M. Rigby arrived in Anking in March. Miss Jeanie V. Heald resigned from the mission in December to our great regret.

The following have gone home on furlough: Miss Marie Alden Hewitt in July. Miss Sada C. Tomlinson and Mr. and Mrs. Vincent H. Gowen sailed in September. In all three cases the furlough has been prolonged from six months to a year; in Miss Hewitt's case, on account of her health and in the other two cases for special study.

The following have returned from furlough: The Reverend T. L. Sinclair and family in February. Mr. James H. Pott and Mr. Leonard H. Tomkinson in August.

I have ordained the following: The Reverend S. M. Giles, ordained priest January 5th. The Reverend C. P. Liu, ordained priest April 27th. Mr. T. P. Liu and Mr. T. S. Tsen, ordained deacons February 9th. Mr. W. C. Yen, ordained deacon March 9th.

The following property has been acquired: A new house for the teachers of Saint Agnes's School in Anking was finished in June and occupied in September. At Nanling, a new piece of property adjoining our old property has been acquired and a church and rectory are in process of erection at a total cost of about \$5,000. In Anking, a residence for the Chinese clergyman is in process of erection next to the cathedral; price \$2,700, the money to be repaid from Lease Rentals. At Chinyang we have acquired the property adjoining our church at a cost of \$1,300; provided from specials. At Kungchen we have bought the property which we have rented for some years past at a cost of In Kiukiang we have purchased the house built by the late Reverend James Jackson, D.D., paying, by resolution of the Board, the original cost of the property plus 5 per cent. In Hukou we have purchased the property belonging to the Plymouth Brethren to be paid off from Lease Rentals and the appropriation for rent made by the Diocesan Board of Missions. In Kuling, the Church of the Ascension has been built and will be ready for the use of

the congregation this summer. This was built by a subscription of foreigners in China with some assistance from the Church Building Fund Commission.

General Conditions. Throughout the year the country has been distinctly unpeaceful but perhaps not more so than all the rest of the world. The war between the North and the South has not been prosecuted actively at all since February and futile attempts at negotiation have been made. The chief interest, however, throughout the year has been the anti-Japanese movement. This became intense on the announcement of the terms of the treaty giving the German rights in Shangtung to Japan. The students were leaders in the patriotic movement and started the Japanese boycott which has, on the whole, been decidedly successful, reducing very greatly the amount of Japanese imports. They also went on strike in May and all our schools above the primary grades joined them so that the schools were closed early in June. Then a general strike was organized which affected the whole country and in some places entirely stopped business for several days. This, at least, secured the resignation of three of the most objectionable officials. More trouble from the students was anticipated in the autumn but for the most part they went back to their studies and contented themselves with a steady agi-tation of the boycott. The Foochow incident in which several Chinese were killed by Japanese intensified the anti-Japanese feeling. Except in the matter of schools these conditions have not greatly affected the work.

Meetings. The diocesan synod met on February tenth to twelfth. The only action taken which seems likely to have at all far-reaching consequences was the establishing of a fund for the increase of the salaries of catechists and school teachers. The Board of Missions subsequently took action at the request of the three bishops giving the desired

increase to catechists and it will be possible to use the fund for the increase of the salaries of the teachers. This move seems to me to be very hopeful with reference to the future self-support of the Chinese Church.

A summer class for the primary school teachers was held in Anking from July first to the eighteenth at which most of the men primary school teachers of the diocese were present.

School Work. As mentioned above, the students' strike affected the work of the higher primary and middle schools making it necessary to close down early in June.

During the year there has been considerable increase in the number of boys in the schools. This has been especially marked with reference to the higher primary schools but the lower primary and middle schools have shared in it. I regret to say that the reverse has been the case with reference to the girls' schools. This has been due mainly to the fact that the girls' schools are supported largely by specials as the Board has never seen fit to grant an adequate appropriation for the education of girls in this diocese. Our two higher primary schools, Saint Agnes's and Saint Lioba's, receive only a grant of \$200 each from the Board, the rest being made up from specials. As silver has become so high. while the amount received in gold has remained fairly constant, the amount in silver is less than half of what it was three years ago. This has made large reduction necessary, especially as it is impossible to get anything like the amount of fees from girls which I receive from boys. I would plead most earnestly for an increase in the appropriation for these two schools, as the proportion of the work is very greatly marred by the comparatively small amount done for the girls.

Medical Work. The work of Saint James's Hospital and the dispensaries has continued as usual. We unfortu-

nately found it necessary to allow Dr. Bliss to go to the assistance of the Church General Hospital in Wuchang so that Dr. Taylor has been alone here for most of the year. The burden has been exceedingly heavy but we hope to be somewhat relieved by the appointment of Dr. Reid.

Evangelistic Work. No new evangelistic centers have been opened during the year and no large meetings have been held, the disturbed state of the country making it inadvisable to do so. I have visited all the principal stations during the year, but my absence at the General Convention made it impossible for me to visit many of the outstations. Personal Report. I left to attend the meeting of the General Convention, sailing with my family on August ninth. From the close of the Convention until the end of the year I spent much of the time in making addresses on behalf of the missions in China.

I have performed the following official acts: Ordinations—priests, 2; deacons, 3; marriages, 1; confirmations, 79 (4 in the diocese of Connecticut); baptisms, 54; Catechumens admitted, 62; Holy Communion, 40; other services, 121; sermons and addresses, 116 (in U. S., 41).

II. MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF HANKOW

The Missionary District of Hankow includes that part of China lying within the provinces of Hupeh, Kiangsi and Hunan. It has an area of 18,441 square miles and a population offically estimated at over 50,000,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention of 1910. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Logan Herbert Roots, D.D., consecrated in the year 1904.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$134,026. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in forty-eight stations.

Report of the Bishop—1919

I HAVE the honor to present herewith the report of the missionary district of Hankow for the twelve months from January 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919.

The Episcopal Endowment Fund now amounts to \$1,361.72, of which sum \$1,015.21 is on fixed deposit at the bank at 4 per cent and the balance is deposited in the savings bank (\$346.51).

The following were the members of the council of advice at the close of 1919: The Reverend Messrs. L. B. Ridgely, S. T. D., A. A. Gilman, S. T. D., A. M. Sherman, T. P. Maslin and Messrs. E. P. Miller, T. J. Hollander, T. Hobbie and H. G. Nichols.

The following are the members of the standing committee elected by the synod of the district, which met in February, 1918: The Reverend Messrs. L. T. Hu, Archdeacon; F. H. Lieo, L. B. Ridgely, A. M. Sherman; and Messrs Wang Saoleo, Archie T. L. Ts'en, Samuel S. Y. Seng, Yang Tin-tsang.

Mission Diary. The mission staff was increased by the arrival of the following persons: April 28, 1919, Dr. Paul Wakefield. June 30, 1919, Miss Sarah C. M. Montgomery. August 21, 1919, Miss Violet L. Hughes. Reverend J. A. Mac-September 10, 1919, Miss Donald. Dorothy M. Wood. September, 1919, Dr. Theodore Bliss. October 27, 1919, Miss Elisa Gardner.

Dr. Wakefield joined the Boone staff and is now living with his family on the Boone Compound, Wuchang.

Miss Montgomery became the wife Foster, Esq., on thirtieth. The ceremony took place in Saint John's Pro-Cathedral, Shanghai, the Right Reverend F. R. Graves officiating.

Miss Violet Hughes, after brief visits in both Kuling and the Hankow center, entered the Peking Language School in

October.

The Reverend J. A. MacDonald also entered the Peking Language School in October having first made short visits in Kuling and at Boone University.

Miss Dorothy M. Wood married Mr. H. G. Nichols of the Boone staff on September tenth.

Dr. Theodore Bliss has taken up work at the Church General Hospital and now occupies the doctor's house on that compound.

Miss Elisa Gardner is visiting at Saint, Hilda's and assisting in the teaching in the English Department there.

In September, J. A. Wilson, Jr., Esq., returned to his work at Boone University after one year's absence in order to serve in France under the Y. M. C. A. In November the Reverend Edward Walker also returned to work at Boone after an absence of nearly two years and a half with the Labor Corps in The Reverend F. G. Deis and the Reverend R. E. Wood are still abroad and their return to mission work is indefinite.

Mr. Theodore Hobbie, who had been loaned to the Kuling School during the emergency there, returned to Wuchang in September and took up his duties as teacher and Scout master.

Miss Crosby took up work at the Church General Hospital, Women's Department, in the fall in order to tide over the crisis there caused by the departure of Miss Dexter on furlough and of Miss Peters, loaned during the early part of the year by Bishop White, of the Canadian Church Mission. When the hospital staff is increased by much hoped-for workers Miss Crosby hopes to return to her duties at Saint Hilda's

Owing to the necessity of closing Saint Joseph's Trade School in Ichang, Mr. Thacher Souder was transferred in September to Hankow where he is assisting the Reverend T. P. Maslin in the Trade

School at Saint John's Church compound in the native city.

In October, Miss Kent left for Wuhu, having been granted a year's leave of absence in order to try her vocation with the Sisters of the Transfiguration.

The following members of the mission left on furlough during the year 1919: Deaconess E. W. Riebe, Miss E. G. Dexter, Miss Dorothy Langman, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Kemp, Dr. and Mrs. C. McA. Wassell, Sister Anita, O. S. A.

In March, Mrs. F. G. Deis sailed for America and later in the year joined her husband in France.

Bishop Roots sailed on September sixth to attend the General Convention in Detroit. With the bishop were his two oldest sons, John and Logan, and John Littell, who entered Kent School in the fall.

The following members of the Mission returned from furlough during the year 1919: Miss A. M. Clark, Miss Ruth Kent, Miss C. A. Couch, Miss A. E. Byerly, Miss M. E. Wood, Reverend E. L. Souder and family, Deaconess E. W. Riebe.

Miss Henrietta Gardiner, a special worker at Boone University, spent a few weeks in America during the summer and returning arrived in Wuchang September twenty-third.

The resignation of the Reverend G. G. Hoisholt was offered and accepted. Mr. Hoisholt left Hankow June 19th.

The Reverend W. F. Hayward, who left on furlough in 1918, returned to China June 6th, 1919, but is returning to America again early in 1920.

The following ordinations have taken place during year just past: On May fifteenth at the cathedral, Hankow, the Reverend Messrs. Tsang Yeo-tsz, Stephen H. S. Tsang, Ts'en Rao-ch'u and Leighton T. Y. Yang were ordained to the priesthood and the Reverend Reuben H. T. Teng to the diaconate.

On June thirtieth in Saint Michael's Church, Wuchang, the Reverend C. T. Yin was ordained to the diaconate. July sixth, in the Japanese Chapel, Hankow, the Reverend P. S. Uchida was ordained to the priesthood.

I record, with a sense of deep loss which the whole diocese shares, the death, from tuberculosis, on October twenty-eighth, of one of our deacons recently graduated from the Boone Divinity School, the Reverend Peter F. Y. Fu.

Visit of the Foreign Secretary. More than ten years have elapsed since we last had a visit from one of our Mission Board secretaries. That is too long But Dr. John W. Wood did not come as a stranger. His twenty years of service in the Church Missions House and constant touch with the mission through correspondence and by personal contact with the missionaries on furlough have been improved so faithfully that his knowledge of our work and conditions made it possible to use to the best kind of advantage all of the scant month in February and March which he had in the district of Hankow. The fact that the mission treasurer, Mr. Walker, accompanied him most of the time added much to the practical usefulness of the visit. The manifest advantage of having the treasurer and the Foreign Secretary know at first hand the conditions in all three districts of the China Mission suggests that it might be well to have other departments than those of business and home relationships given the benefit of closer correlation by some kind of China-Mission-Wide visitation. The chief lesson of the visit, however, is that the closer touch between the mission and the Mother Church which it made possible should be maintained in the future by similar visits at regular intervals of not more than three years.

Reflex in China of the Nation-Wide Campaign. The Nation-Wide Campaign in America has already stirred new life in the China mission. The re-

port for 1920 will be the place for recording details and definite results but it should be noted here that the movement of 1919 in the American Church deeply affected the Chinese Church before the end of the year, and that the movement within the Episcopal Church in China as in America was coincident with a similar movement in other communions. The stimulus and uniting power of a good name is seen in the fact that the Chinese movement is called in English the "China for Christ Movement," and that it has an equally good, if not better name in Chinese which appeals to the Christian community even more widely than the Inter-Church World Movement has done in America. In this diocese of the Chung Hua Sheng Kung Huei, for example, the movement has quite naturally come to be called the "Diocesan China for Christ Movement." Its chief emphasis is on the stirring up of the spiritual life of the Church and the special appeal is to the laity, while its relation to other Christion forces in China and to the social and political needs of China at this critical time give it a far-reaching significance.

Steady Development of Well Tried Plans. The general outline of the mission's policy does not alter greatly from year to year, but there is a kind of steady development in all directions which is the best indication of wholesome life. During the past year the staff, both Chinese and foreigners, have enjoyed good health, though we have lost one of our promising deacons through tuberculosis and two of our most experienced American presbyters have been laid off by illnesses which took them away for a considerable time to the quiet and invigorating atmosphere of the Kuling hills. We have also had the help of several special workers who have labored, wholly or in part, at their own charges. I would mention with much gratitude especially the generous action of Miss Mary Peters and

the Canadian Church Mission which released her for our benefit, in coming to our rescue in the nursing staff of the Church General Hospital at Wuchang during a period of great strain and stress which included the summer. School, hospital, and evangelistic work have gone steadily forward, making the slow gains which indicate that we are on the right track.

The first class (three members) has been graduated from Saint Phoebe's Training School for Deaconesses, and this marks the fruition of plans long ago made and faithfully carried through by which we believe our work for women has been placed on a level hitherto unattainable. One of the three graduates was trained for Bishop Graves.

I have to record the closing of one institution which has for many years been carried on with great devotion at Ichang; that is the Saint Joseph's Trade School. This was intended for homeless boys, and into it, both for running expenses and for equipment, as well as in personal attention, Bishop Huntington put highly valuable contributions. Many boys have been saved from death or vagrancy and started on lives of useful and Christian service. But the cost of such a school was heavier than we could wisely carry permanently by contributions from America, and so far we have been unable to secure that highly technical and expert management which would make it independent of large contributions from abroad. We therefore decided to close the school in the summer and provide in the schools for those boys to whom we owed a moral obligation to fit them for useful lives. This decision was reached regretfully, but without any doubt that it was the right decision for we had the approval of Dr. Wood, who had seen the school himself, and who represented the Board of Missions, while not even those who regretted the step most could suggest a better course.

The closing of the Trade School at Ichang made possible the better equipment of the Trade School at Saint John's in Hankow, and of the work for women in Ichang, but the chief beneficiary is the Huntington School, the importance of which as both an educational and an evangelistic force in Ichang and a large outlying region becomes yearly more apparent. Huntington School, which is of middle school or junior middle school grade, preparing students for Boone, now occupies the fine site and buildings originally provided for the Trade School, and is entering on a new era of usefulness. I note here also that while it was decided to locate the Central Theological School of the Chung Hua Sheng Kung Hui at Nanking, the Theological School of the China Mission continues its work under Dr. Ridgely as dean until the C. T. S. actually opens its doors. During the past year we have had in this school students from Bishop Iliff (S. P. G.), Bishop Banister (C. M. S.) and Bishop White (Canadian Church Mission), as well as from our American districts of Anking and Hankow.

The far-reaching effect of our educational work, especially of Boone and Saint Hilda's, becomes yearly more evident. It is being strengthened and coordinated in these troubled times when the government schools are declining rather than gaining ground. An incidental indication of Boone's influence is found in the fact, noted in the report of the university library, that there have been one hundred readers a day at the Trinity Church Reading Room which is supplied with one of Boone's travelling libraries.

In this connection I would call attention to the conference of college presidents which was held in Shanghai during the fall term. This was significant as embodying the growing spirit of cooperation among Christian higher educational institutions, issuing in the establishment of a permanent organiza-

tion. Two things about the meeting deserve our deliberate attention: the comparatively vast plans for expansion in equipment and in staff which are contemplated by other institutions as compared with Saint John's and Boone; and the unanimous agreement of the presidents that wherever it is deemed expedient to have a full college arts course there should be also a theological course. This points to the importance of maintaining our divinity schools at both Saint John's and Boone.

Progress of the Chinese Church. The crucial test as to the success of the mission is found in the condition of the Chinese Church. I note therefore with much satisfaction the following indications of progress.

The archdeacon and the dean of the Catechetical School are both of them Chinese presbyters, and are abundantly justifying the confidence which the responsibilities they carry involves. This is not the time to place responsibility on Chinese shoulders and leave the Chinese to bear it without sympathy or cooperation from the foreign staff. Rather is it the time for the sharing of responsibilities with increasing emphasis on the Chinese share. The appointment this year of one of our Boone Divinity School graduates (class of 1909) to succeed the archdeacon as dean of the Catechetical School marks wholesome progress.

On June first the cathedral congregation, under the Reverend Y. H. Lieo as rector, assumed the entire management and support of its own work (excepting the parish schools), and is meeting its obligations in a way that indicates ample capacity to continue and to become permanently self-supporting. I welcome this as another indication that we have entered a new stage of mission and Church work in this diocese, and that we must immediately consider how to avoid parochialism while still stimulating local strength. The cathedral has made a good start, embodying in its budget

generous provision for meeting not only its rector's salary but also its apportionment for local and diocesan missions. We may therefore approach with confidence the task of embodying this practice in diocesan legislation.

Another noteworthy feature in the year's work is the gift by, or through, an old choir school boy, a former pupil of the Reverend Y. K. Lieo now of Hanyang, of more than three thousand dollars for the erection of a building for the Hanyang English School. I am confident that financial strength such as this indicates will be uncovered and brought to the regular support of the Church's work in proportion as we are skillful in making our Chinese Christian brothers realize that the Church is really theirs and not the foreigners.

The most remarkable evidence of new life in this diocese comes from Changteh, the newest station we have, and is due mainly to the extraordinary zeal and ability of General Feng Yu-hsiang, who commands the nine thousand or so men of the Sixteenth Mixed Brigade. During the year more than a thousand of his soldiers have been baptized, and the movement has just got well under way. I cannot here describe it further than to say that it appears to me entirely genuine, as shown by the character and acts of the men affected, and that it has a significance for the civilians of Changteh almost as great as for the general's brigade. It constitutes a challenge not only to us, as a diocese, but to all the Christian forces connected in any way with Changteh, to a great forward movement which will establish strongly and permanently the work of the Church in Changteh.

The outstanding feature of the year 1919 in China has been, as Dr. Gilman says, the Student Movement. I mention it here simply to record my own opinion as to its significance with reference to the Church, namely that it marks the birth of a new national life which is fraught with all the possibilities, both

for good and for evil, which beset patriotic movements in other countries. If it can be permeated and ultimately transformed by the Church's life, its influence on both the Church and the State will be profoundly beneficial. But it requires preservation from decay or corruption by the salt of the earth and guidance in ways of truth by the Light of the World.

Papers Accompanying this Report. The papers accompanying this report include lists of stations, statistics and other statements of fact about the district. These are important and worthy of careful attention. I wish particularly, however, to emphasize the value of the reports for the several members of the staff which I send herewith. My own report is mainly in general terms, and may for that reason be interesting, but the reports of the staff are full of the detail and local color which leave one who reads them with the conviction that the work of the mission is sound and successful when the most crucial tests are applied to it, while at the same time these reports indicate that our success is due to that measure of unity in our service which brings the corporate life of the great home Church to bear on the manifold problems of the Chinese people.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF SHANGHAI

The Missionary District of Shanghai includes that part of China lying within the Province of Kiangsu. It has an area of 44,500 square miles and a population of 38,000,000. The original district included the missionary districts of Hankow and Anking, which were set off in 1901 and 1910, and was established within its present bounds by the General Convention of 1901. Its present bishop (fifth Bishop of Shanghai) is the Right Reverend Frederick Rogers Graves, D.D., consecrated in the year 1893.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$149,492. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in fifty-two stations.

Report of the Bishop-1919

THE following is the report of the work of the missionary district of Shanghai from January 1st to December 31st, 1919.

The Staff. During this period the following were added to the mission staff: Dr. and Mrs. Walter G. H. Pott; Mr. W. S. A. Pott was reappointed.

The following have left on furlough: Mr. S. W. Green, Mr. and Mrs. G. N. Steiger, Mr. E. L. Sanford, Mrs. W. H. Standring, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ely, Miss E. W. Graves, Miss L. J. Graves, Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Sailor, Miss Sarah H. Reid, Dr. and Mrs. A. W. Tucker, Mr. Alfred Newbery, Mr. Donald Roberts, Mrs. F. R. Graves, Dr. and Mrs. B. L. Ancell.

Those who have returned from furlough are: The Reverend W. P. Roberts, Mr. S. W. Green, Miss M. S. Mitchell, Dr. C. S. F. Lincoln.

The following have left the mission by resignation: Dr. Julian Petit, Mr. H. P. Sailor, Mr. A. Newbery, and Mr. G. N. Steiger.

Mr. J. Randall Norton and Miss Josephine M. Graves were married on May twenty-ninth. The Reverend F. L. Hawks Pott, D.D., and Mrs. E. G. Cooper were married on June twelfth. Mr. S. W. Green and Miss Ellen Miller were married in July.

The Reverend H. N. Woo was the oldest clergyman in the mission and died at the advanced age of eighty-six years on December eighteenth. He was faithful to his work till the last and was an example all his life of Christian character.

Ordinations. The Reverend H. K. Waung and the Reverend H. C. Tung were ordained to the priesthood on March twelfth.

General Meetings. The Kiangsu Synod met on May sixth and seventh and a copy of the report has been forwarded to the Board.

The regular Bible Woman's Confer-

ence was held from May twelfth to seventeenth.

The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was on October ninth and the offering for the year amounted to \$913.

The meeting of the Men's Auxiliary was held on September twenty-fifth. The contributions for the year amounted to \$573.78.

Educational Work. There has been gratifying progress in every department of our educational work. The Board of Education for the diocese has co-ordinated the work from the day schools to the university, and everything is working in a satisfactory manner except for the lack of sufficient workers from home. Young men are needed to teach in the preparatory department of Saint John's and in the university as well as in Soochow Academy and in Mahan School. Women are needed for the educational work in Saint Mary's Hall and for the oversight of day schools. The first place which needs to be filled is Saint Faith's School, Yangchow, where a young woman is urgently required to teach music and English as assistant to Miss Bremer. It is also very important that we should receive enough money to enable us to proceed with the erection of Saint Mary's Hall. It has been impossible to build on account of the bad exchange and the concomitant rise in building materials. This institution ought to be rebuilt at once, because it is doing a work which is increasingly large and effective, but the rebuilding will have the further advantage of setting free the present buildings for the use of the preparatory department of Saint John's. Other institutions for the education of girls are seizing the present opportunity to build and we cannot be left behind.

Evangelistic Work. The full tables of statistics which accompany this report will show how the evangelistic work

has progressed. The progress in Nanking and Hsiakwan, the riverside suburb of Nanking, has been particularly Printed accounts of this gratifying. have been sent to the Board. In every station there has been marked progress, but here again we are faced with the discouraging fact that in each station there is but one foreign clergyman where there should be at least three. This is true of Yangchow, Nanking, Hsiakwan, Wusih, Zangzok and Soochow. What makes the situation worse is that in Yangchow, Wusih and Soochow the clergyman in charge is in each case the head of a large school, a work which in itself is sufficient to occupy his whole It cannot be too strongly emphasized that we must have a supply of young clergy so that each one of these stations may be reinforced at the earliest possible moment.

For three years I have pressed the Board to send at least six young women for the evangelistic work. That is the

force which is absolutely needed to do it with efficiency and is only the minimum which is required. We could use ten women, or more if we had them, in this branch of our activity.

Medical Work. Dr. Lee and Dr. Tucker returned from their Red Cross work in Siberia and we have had the further aid of Dr. John H. Snoke at Saint Luke's Hospital. Here again the lack of workers embarrasses us. The number of nurses has been utterly insufficient. There has been none at Wusih, for the most of the year only two at Saint Luke's, and for all of the year only one at Saint Elizabeth's. There should be two at Wusih, two at Saint Elizabeth's and four at Saint Luke's.

The following is a condensed statement of the work in the medical branch of the work. The report of Saint Luke's Hospital has been printed and a copy sent herewith.

State of the Church. The work of the Chinese clergy has been particularly good and they have been well seconded by the catechists and Biblewomen. The printed report of the diocese, which was sent last summer, will give full details. I cannot close this report without repeating once again that the work is growing and in an encouraging state in every department, and that the great and crying need is reinforcements of men and women.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF CUBA

The Missionary District of Cuba includes the Island of Cuba and the Isle of Pines. It has an area of 47,000 square miles and a population of 2,200,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention in 1904. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Hiram Richard Hulse, D.D., consecrated on January 12, 1915.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$54,873. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in 46 stations.

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Missionary District of Cuba

Report of the Bishop-1919

LIKE the rest of the world, Cuba is suffering from the aftermath of the war. The increased cost of living has aggravated the poverty of the clergy; the native clergy in particular suffer from this.

Strikes and wornout material have both contributed to make the railroad service poor. This has made it difficult for us to conduct our services regularly and efficiently, as most of the clergy have several places under their care.

Social unrest has brought about an attitude of questioning and expectancy on the part of the people. Religious uncertainty has made them ready to turn toward any new gospel. There has been a revival of animism among the ignorant, while the more educated listen eagerly to the message of Spiritism. Witchcraft and Voodooism are prevalent among the colored population. Several white children have been killed during the past year in connection with this superstition.

This questioning attitude gives us an opportunity to be heard, but so far it has not promoted steady faith. People flit from place to place without any feeling of responsibility.

Our most hopeful work is in the country. Wherever we have been able to establish our work in a permanent way in a small country place it has met with success; our best Cuban congregations are found in places of this kind. The Church has been the pioneer in this field. There is not a single country place in which the Church is established where we were not first on the field. If in any place of this kind there are two churches we are not the ones at fault.

On the large sugar plantations there are usually many small remote villages where the people have no religious privileges and frequently no school opportunities. Our ministrations in such places have been eagerly accepted.

Work of this character is most needed both for the salvation of souls and the building up of a sense of responsibility among the citizens of the nation without which any attempt at democratic government will be a failure.

But the work of the Church on a sugar plantation is absolutely dependent on the good will of the administrator. If he is favorable it is possible for the missionary to get around and do his work. If he is indifferent or unfavorable it becomes almost impossible to get from place to place. This work has been completely neglected by the ancient Church of the land and we have had an opportunity to enter an untilled tield where we have had considerable success. This success has sometimes aroused antagonism. While the Church so long established in Cuba shows no inclination to take up this work obstacles have been thrown in our way. In one place where we have had a large and successful work a change in administration has made it difficult tor us to continue and it may be that the work built up through so many years will disappear. Even here, however, what has been built into the character of the worshippers will remain and as people shift from place to place they will find their way to us in other locations.

While we have no new buildings to report this year we have the money in hand, thanks to the generosity of the Church in the United States, for a new school building in Guantanamo. This has been greatly needed for a long time. Our missionary teachers have had to move twice in the past sixteen months, while the school has completely outgrown its accommodations. With a new and adequate building it will be an important element in the life of the growing city of Guantanamo. The Board of Missions has lent us the money to purchase a residence for our missionary so

that by the end of the year we hope to have an adequate plant consisting of church, rectory and school with living rooms for the teachers.

English-speaking Negroes are coming in large numbers to the eastern end of the island. As most of them belong to the Church of England we feel a special sense of responsibility for their welfare and are planning to extend our work among them. We need three new workers for this particular field, one of whom has already been secured and will soon be on his way here.

In the province of Camaguey, Mr. Asheton-Martin has been appointed to La Gloria. He also acts as general missionary to the English-speaking people, holding services in Ceballos and Moron as well as around La Gloria.

The most important advance we have made in the Cuban work is the starting of a boys' boarding school in Marianao, a suburb of Havana. We now have twenty boys and a promise of more next year. If we can keep this going for a few years until we can build up a reputation it will be the most effective agent we can have in building up a native Church and obtaining an educated native Ministry.

Needs. The great need is for better material equipment. It is impossible to build up a successful work in a rented building from which we may be ousted at short notice. In Camaguey, Sagua La Grande, Cienfuegos and Santiago we have made good beginnings but we can advance no further until we get adequate buildings for our work.

THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

The Dominican Republic is not a missionary district as such, but at the General Convention in New York in 1913 the House of Bishops passed a resolution to the effect that the Bishop of Porto Rico take jurisdiction over "such Christian people in Santo Domingo as may have asked or may hereafter ask for his pastoral oversight." (Journal of the General Convention, 1913, page 98.)

The appropriation of the Board to the Dominican Republic is \$4,490.

Report of the Bishop—1919

N this district we are still waiting for clergy. Appropriations have been available for months for salaries and rent allowances, but the proper persons have not been secured for the difficult and isolated work. In the meanwhile the Reverend Mr. Wyllie and his most efficient wife have been holding things together single handed and have made as much progress as possible among the Church people who are widely scattered in the republic. Regular services have been maintained at the capital in quarters loaned by the customs collectorship. These are the only English services of any kind and have been greatly appreciated by the government officials and other Americans in the city. The Reverend Mr. Wyllie in the capacity of archdeacon has visited a number of different stations during the year and has sought to reach the Church people and bring to them some of the consolations of their religion. In five different places he has secured lay-readers who have been authorized to gather the people together and read the Church services. These are in all cases on sugar plantations where a number of colored people reside, immigrants from the British Islands of the Caribbean. these places, the capital, San Pedro de Macoris and La Romana, all on the south coast, should be occupied at the earliest possible moment, with clergy and equipment consisting of church and rectory in each place. The people are there and are only waiting to be shep-

herded and praying that it may be soon.

At the city of San Pedro de Macoris there is resident a priest of this Church, the Reverend B. I. Wilson, a colored man, who was ordained by Bishop Holly some twenty-five years ago. Later some differences arose between the priest and bishop and Mr. Wilson does not seem to have been recognized as regularly connected with the mission in Haiti. There is no record whatever of suspension or deposition in his case and the clergy of Haiti have certified to me that he is still in good standing. He has ever since his ordination been faithful to his profession and has been exercising his ministry regularly year after year with no support other than that obtained from the people among whom he works. I have transferred the Reverend Mr. Wilson from the mission in Haiti to that in the Dominican Republic and he is today a priest of this Church in that district. He is not properly supported, however, and I hope to secure a small stipend for his support from the Presiding Bishop and Council. presence of an American priest in the city of Macoris will not interfere with Mr. Wilson's work as his will be chiefly in Spanish, while the large work waiting to be done immediately by our Church is among English-speaking people. The early part of the year was interrupted by an epidemic of influenza when all meetings were prohibited and churches closed.

May I ask that the Church at home be requested to pray that suitable laborers may speedily be found to do the work in the field already white for the harvest. The Reverend Mr. Wyllie has been in the republic for two years already. The work he is doing single handed will break down the most rugged. The great Church must have clergy who are willing to help in this work. God grant that they may be found soon.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF HAITI

The Missionary District of Haiti includes the republic of that name on the Island of Santo Domingo. Established in 1874, under concordat of the American House of Bishops, it was, until the General Convention of 1913, called the Church in Haiti. At that Convention it relinquished its autonomy and was received as a foreign missionary district. The Bishop of Porto Rico is in charge of the district.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$10,060. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in thirty-five stations.

MISSIONARY STAFF.—Presbyters, 10; deacons, 1; lay-readers, 27. Women workers: Nurses, 1; teachers (we have in all 24 teachers, only one is paid by the Board); Sunday-school teachers, 33.

Report of the Bishop-in-Charge—1919

WING to the continued difficulty in communications it was possible to make only one visit to Haiti during the year. We were very fortunate on this occasion to have the Reverend A. R. Gray, D.D., secretary for Latin America, visit the missionary district with me. He was able to see the situation of the Church in and around Port-au-Prince and to get an idea of the conditions prevailing in the country. I was able to visit the mission in Aux Cayes on this trip, which I had not been able to do on the two years previous. The trip from Port-au-Prince to Aux Cayes was made in an automobile, this being only the second time the through trip had been made and I believe it was the last for some time as the rains set in immediately and the roads became impassable. The return trip to the capital was made by steamer. It is with much regret that I have to report the serious

illness during the year of the three oldest priests in the native Church; the Reverend Messrs Pierre Jones, Charles E. Benedict and Alexandre Battiste, the last of whom has since gone to his reward.

The work has progressed very much as usual and I am still of the opinion that there is undoubtedly a large work for the Church to do in Haiti but that it is entirely necessary that the work should have more episcopal supervision than it has been possible for me to give it from Porto Rico. It is with this end in view that I have requested the presiding bishop to accept my resignation as bishop-in-charge of the district. I trust that God has a great future for the Church in Haiti and pray earnestly that He will develop it in the hands of my successor in the district.

OUR MISSION IN JAPAN

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF KYOTO

The Missionary District of Kyoto includes the Prefectures of Kyoto, Osaka (in part), Wakayama, Nara, Shiga, Mie, Fukui, Ishikawa and Toyama, having a population of about 8,000,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention of 1898. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Henry St. George Tucker, D.D., consecrated in the year 1912.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$92,722. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in sixty-five stations and sub-stations.

MISSIONARY STAFF.—Bishop, 1; priests (foreign 4, Japanese 23), 27; deacons (Japanese), 2; laymen (foreign), 1; catechists, 13; physicians (foreign), 1; teachers (foreign 1, Japanese 33), 34. Women workers: Foreign—evangelistic workers, 9; teachers, 10; wives of missionaries, 7; Japanese—nurses, 10; Biblewomen, 18; teachers, 50.

MISSION STATIONS

Convocation of Kyoto. (Coterminous with the governmental administrative district of Kyoto.)

Kyoto—Fourth city in the Empire and for 1,100 years prior to 1868 capital of Japan. Ecclesiastically is now see city of this missionary district. Work opened in this city in 1889. Churches, three; missions, two. Missionaries: the Rev. J. J. Chapman, Mrs. Chapman, Miss Neely, Miss Peck, Miss Gardiner, Miss Ambler, Mrs. Tucker, Miss McGrath, Miss McGill, Miss Spencer. III. Convocation of Osaka. (Coterminous with the governmental administrative district of Osaka.)

Osaka—Second city in the Empire. Population, nearly 2,000,000. Situated at the head of Osaka Bay, with a fine harbor, it is the first city of the country in commercial importance and manufacturing interests. Station established 1875. Missionaries: Dr. J. L. McSparran, Mrs. L. Bull. Native clergy: The Rev. Y. Naide, the Rev. S. Yanagihara, the Rev. N. Abe. Churches, four; preaching places, two; three of the churches are independent of foreign help as regards their pastors' salaries. The Church of England also has work in the city of Osaka under the Bishop of Osaka, who resides in Kobe. There is no geographical line of division within the city of Osaka between the English Missionary District of Kyoto.

Sakai—A city of 75,000 inhabitants, situated about eight miles south of Osaka. Station established 1889. The Rev. K. Matsumoto, native priest, in charge.

Kishiwada—An important manufacturing town further south of Osaka. The Rev. T. Kwan, native priest, in charge.

IX. Convocation of Toyama. The large and populous governmental district of that name, practically untouched by the Church. Rev. P. A. Smith, priest in charge.

Toyama—A very important city of 70,000 inhab-ants. One preaching place and one resident cateitants.

Takaoka—City, 40,000. Visited by the priest in charge. Sub-station.

Shimminato-Port town.

VIII. Convocation of Ishikawa. (Government administrative district.) This district also has many large towns entirely untouched by the Church.

Kanazawa—A city of 120,000 inhabitants. Seat of an army division and an educational centre. Famous for porcelains, etc. Missionaries: Rev. and Mrs. P. A. Smith. Native priest, Rev. J. Sasaki.

Daishoji-Town of 20,000. Resident Catechist.

VII. Convocation of Fukui.

Fukui—City of 50,000 inhabitants. An important centre of the silk industry. Missionaries: Miss Tetlow, Miss Denton. The Rev. Z. Yagi, Priest.

Tsuruga-A town of 25,000 inhabitants on the coast of the Japan Sea, and port of entry for ships from Vlad-vostok and Port Arthur. The Rev. H. Fukuroi, priest

Takefu-Town of 20,000. Resident catechist.

Obama--A seaport town, also on same coast. Po 00. Station established 1887. The Rev Population, 10,000. Station established 1887. The Rev. T. Yamada, priest in charge. One church, one preaching place and two sub-stations in neighboring villages.

II. Convocation of Shiga. The government district of this name is coterminous with the province of Omi. It embraces the very populous district about Lake Biwa, the largest body of fresh wa-ter in Japan and is often compared to the Sea of Gallilee.

VI. Convocation of Mie.

Kuwana—Town of 20,000 inhabitants. and resident catechist.

Uyeno—Town of 13,000 inhabitants. Station established in 1889. Resident Priest, Rev. C. Okamoto. Nabari, out-station.

Yokkaichi-City, 40,000. Resident catechist.

V. Convocation of Nara. The government district of this name is coterminous with the ancient province of Yamato.

Nara—Capital of the district and ancient capital of the Empire. Famous as the ancient centre of Buddh-ism and learning and art. Now a city of only 40,000 inhabitants in the extreme northern part of the plain of Yamato, the ancient birthplace of the Japanese nation. Station established 1885. Missionaries: Miss Mary Laning. Native clergy resident, the Rev. D. Yoshimura, priest in charge.

Koriyama—A manufacturing town of 15,000 inhab-ants. Rented chapel. The Rev. G. Nakamura, priest in charge.

Tatsuta—Seat of Horyuji, the oldest temple in Japan. Rented chapel and sub-preaching place. Resident catechist.

Tawaramoto-Large town in centre of Yamato plain. Church.

Kutara-Church and sub-preaching place.

Takata-Prosperous and important manufacturing town. Rev. S. Sone.

Sakurai—A town of growing importance which, with surrounding villages, has about 10,000 inhabitants. Good church, parish hall and rectory. One subpreaching place.

Gojo—Important town in southern end of the Yamato plain. Population, 8,000. One church and one subpreaching place. Rev. M. Wakatsuki. Growing church.

Yagi-Rev. C. Kitagawa.

Sub-station-Matsuyama, mountain town Sub-station—Matsuyama, mountain town, eight miles from the railway. Other Stations—Shimoichi, Gose (ten miles from railway in rich lumber district. Rented chapels in these places. The province of Yamato is unique in that the Church is practically the only Christian body at work here. Besides Nara, the capital city, there are eighteen places of town rank. The Church is at work in fourteen of these towns and in several villages. IV. Convocation of Wakayama.

Wakayama—A city of 85,000 inhabitants and capital of the government district. It is situated on the coast and is an important port. Station established 1891. Missionary, the Rev. J. H. Lloyd, Mrs. Lloyd. One church and two preaching places.

Kishi-Town near Wakayama. Chapel. Resident catechist.

Nokami-Town. Chapel.

Tanabe—Famous health resort and bathing place. Rented chapel. Resident priest, the Rev. M. Horiuchi. Out station, Minabe.

Hashimoto—Large town northeast of Wakayama. Church and one sub-preaching place. Other Stations—Yuasa, Marusu.

Other Stations—Yuasa, Marusu.

This wealthy and populous district is noted for its oranges, many of which are exported to America. The Church should have more workers in this rich field.

From the southern part of this province a large number of laborers have gone to America, many of them have returned, and among them are a great many Christians.

Report of the Bishop—1919

BEG herewith to submit the annual report of the missionary district of Kyoto for the year ending December 31, 1919.

During this year we have lost one of the ladies of our foreign staff by the retirement of Miss Suthon. Two new recruits have been added, Miss Gardiner who is resuming her work under regular appointment as a teacher in Saint Agnes's School, and Miss Denton who has been assigned to evangelistic work on the West Coast.

The number of Japanese clergy has been increased by the advancement to the priesthood of Mr. Takamatsu of Kyoto, Mr. Yagi of Fukui, and Mr. Sasaki of Kanazawa.

With regard to the Japanese staff the great problem continues to be the scarcity of Bible-women. The salaries which we give are so low that they are not adequate to meet the ordinary living expenses of Japanese women. There is much opportunity at present for Christian work amongst the women of Japan, but this work can only be successfully carried on by our trained women workers. To develop a staff of such workers it is necessary that we should offer them a salary sufficient to enable them to live without being dependent upon their families for help. The same thing is true in regard to kindergarten teachers. Our experience is that when they have finished their two years of compulsory service after being trained at Sendai,

they leave us to take positions in government kindergartens where the salaries are almost double what we pay. The cost of living in Japanese style has increased more than 300 per cent during the past three years. While we have, during this period, raised the salaries of our workers some 50 per cent, the increase has not kept pace with the general increase in the salaries of teachers and officials in government and private employ. These have all risen from 100 per cent to 200 per cent so that we find ourselves in a position where our evangelistic workers and teachers are receiving salaries not only much below the general average in the country, but much below what one might call a living wage. The economic changes that have taken place in Japan have been so sudden that it has been impossible to adjust our scale of salaries to the new conditions. The time has come, however, when this adjustment must be made if we are to maintain and develop an efficient Japanese evangelistic and teaching force.

General Conditions. 1919 was on the whole much more encouraging from the point of view of the evangelistic work than the preceding year although the results do not appear in the statistics. The contributions of the Church increased by nearly 50 per cent. In addition to the amount reported as "contributions" several of the congregations

raised quite substantial sums for building purposes. Christ Church, Osaka, for example, gave Y15,000 towards the new church; Sakai, over Y4,000 for the same purpose; Saint John's, Osaka, secured in cash and pledges Y6,000 as their contribution for the building of the parish house. Other churches contributed on a smaller scale towards the purchase of land or the erection of buildings. Of course this increase in contributions must be attributed in part to the great financial prosperity which has prevailed in Japan for the past two years, but it indicates also a deeper sense of responsibility for self-support on the part of our Japanese Christians. Nearly all the churches have increased from 50 per cent to 100 per cent their contributions towards their pastor's sal-

Along with this effort towards financial independence there has developed a stronger interest in evangelistic work, partly, perhaps, because the effort towards self-support has made evident the need of a much larger church membership. Apart from this, however, Japan's wonderful economic and industrial development during the past two years has given rise to social and moral problems which have turned the thoughts of many towards the need of religion. This is reflected in the large attendance at all kinds of Christian meetings and in the numbers of inquirers who are represented from classes of people that have hitherto been almost inaccessible to Christian influence. It is too early to say whether this interest will be permanent or not, but one cannot but feel that the Church in Japan has an opportunity for a real advance such as had been denied Her for many years.

Medical Work. The work at Saint Barnabas's Hospital during the early part of the year was greatly handicapped by the absence of Dr. McSparran who was serving with the Red Cross. At the time of Dr. Wood's visit to Kyoto a conference was held in which Dr. Mc-

Sparran and Dr. Teusler took part in regard to the future of the medical work in Osaka. It was decided that medical work should be continued, but that the property in Kawaguchi should be sold and a new hospital erected in a more favorable location. This sale was effected in the autumn, the sum of Y550,000 being received for the hospital property, and the dwelling house at No. 27. It is proposed to use about Y100,-000 of this in the purchase of land and from Y200,000 to Y250,000 in the building and equipment of the new hospital. We hope to have enough balance to constitute an endowment, the income from which will enable us to develop the work of the hospital among the poorer classes.

Educational Work. The new academic building of Saint Agnes's School was completed in September. It is satisfactory in every respect and adds greatly to the efficiency of our work. For the past few years the school has been growing steadily both in numbers and in reputation. The new building makes it possible to increase the number of students up to two hundred in the school department. The great difficulty which all schools in Japan are meeting at the present time is the necessity of paying very much larger salaries to their teachers. In the government schools salaries have been practically doubled, and in addition to this an emergency bonus is given. Then the opportunities for earning large sums in commercial houses are so plentiful that teachers are leaving the schools and it is almost impossible, even with the government scale of salaries, to secure an adequate supply. This difficulty is greatly increased in private schools which are not able to make the same advances in their salary scale which the government has made. As a consequence of this we have lost some of our best teachers at Saint Agnes's and it is a question how we are going to retain even those who have remained with us unless we find

some way to pay higher salaries. An increase in the number of students will be of some assistance, but the amount of tuition paid in Japanese schools is so small that it is impossible for them to become self-supporting under present conditions.

The same considerations apply to our kindergartens. They are all flourishing but we find it increasingly difficult to maintain our teaching staff. The only solution would seem to be an increase in the appropriations for these institutions until such time as it becomes possible to adjust tuition fees to the increased cost of operation.

In the autumn a hostel for students in the Imperial University and the Government College was opened in connection with Saint Mary's Church. Already we have more applications than we have accommodation. This hostel is demonstrating the importance of this kind of work and we should endeavor to open one in connection with all the government colleges.

Evangelistic Work

The churches in Kyoto all made good progress last year increasing their financial contributions from 25 per cent to 50 per cent and gathering in a large number of new members. Both Saint John's and Holy Trinity have plans for reaching self-support within the next three years. At Nishijin we have been greatly troubled because of the impossibility of renting a house for the work. The church has had to be moved three times during the past ten months and just at present they have no place at all for worship. The work there is so promising that we should make every effort to buy land and put up a building in which not only the services may be properly carried on but in which institutional work can be established to meet the needs of the great laboring population of West Kyoto. Miss Peck is still carrying on her Nurses' Institute and work among

the children in this section with excellent results, but is much hampered by the difficulty of securing rented quarters suitable for the work.

The great problem that the Osaka. Osaka churches have been discussing during the past year is the formation of an independent diocese and the election of a Japanese bishop. They are practically ready for this step although they have not yet fully decided whether or not they will take it at this meeting of the Sokwai. The new building at Christ Church, Osaka, is well on its way to completion. At Saint John's Church the people have raised some Y6,000 towards their parish house which, together with the land, will cost about Y30,000. I hope that we may be able to supplement the money that they have raised so that this parish house can be built promptly and Saint John's equipped to take its part in the development of the first Japanese diocese.

Sakai. The new church building in Sakai is completed and adds greatly to the efficiency of the work. In order to show their gratitude for the assistance given in building this church the congregation became completely self-supporting from January, 1919.

In the provinces of Wakayama, Nara and Mie the work has been going on steadily; the only thing calling for remark is the purchase of land in Koriyama and the great difficulty which we have experienced in maintaining the work in places where we do not own property. Not only have rents risen enormously, but the demand for houses is so great that it is impossible to secure any place for more than a few months at a time. This is very disastrous so far as our work is concerned.

In Shiga Ken we have reopened the work at Hikone with Mr. Ooka as resident catechist. Mr. Chapman is in general charge of the work in this province.

There has been but little change in conditions on the West Coast. The

church at Fukui is making steady progress towards self-support. Mr. Smith has been transferred to Kanazawa to take charge of the work among students there; it also furnishes a more convenient center for his out-stations. We have arranged to transform the old embroidery school into a student hostel and there is every reason to hope that Mr. Smith will be able to bring it much more closely into contact with the large student body than has hitherto been possible. We should increase our missionary force on the West Coast. There should be a priest resident in Toyama and we should have at least six women to be stationed in Toyama, Kanazawa and Fukui, and in addition to these we should have two women for the work in Obama and Shinmaezuru.

My idea is that it would be well to make the Fukui house a center to which the missionaries on the West Coast could be brought back from time to time for recuperation. Climatic and other conditions are so bad that where people are stationed in these West Coast cities without any opportunity for a change they break down. The reason is that we have never been able to preserve the continuity of our work. I think if we had a force who were all trained on the West Coast and so well acquainted with conditions that they could relieve one another it would be possible to solve the problem of supplying the missionary help that is so urgently needed.

II. MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF TOKYO

The Missionary District of Tokyo extends from the centre of Tokyo to the northern boundary of the island, a distance of 450 miles, and is 200 miles in breadth. It contains a population of about 11,000,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention of 1898. Its bishop is the Right Reverend John McKim, D.D., consecrated in the year 1893.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$144,215. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in seventy stations.

Report of the Bishop-1919

IN presenting this report, I share with the disappointment of those who may read it, that the statistics, while showing a much larger increase in contributions and in the material progress of the district, show a falling off in the number of baptisms and confirmations. same may be said of the other six missionary districts of the Nippon Sei Ko Kwai. The increase in contributions is due to urgent appeals for the extra support of the Japanese clergy and catechists because of the high cost of living. The falling off in spiritual directions is the result of prosperity due to the war, and the desire to get rich. Our loss is partly due to the resignation or retirement of eleven Japanese catechists and clergy who could not live on their small salaries. The bishop of Kyoto and I, foreseeing a catastrophe to the work if something drastic were not done immediately for the relief of Japanese workers, took upon ourselves the responsibility of increasing their support, by an average of 50 per cent, with the confident belief that the Presiding Bishop and Council would ratify the same.

Educational Work. Our educational work was never more successful and encouraging. The new college buildings at Ikebukuro which were intended to accommodate two hundred and fifty students, have three hundred and fifty enrolled, and many on the waiting list. The formal opening of the buildings

was held May thirty-first, in the presence of more than twelve hundred invited guests, many of whom were members of the Cabinet, eminent financiers, government officials, and leading educators. It was an added pleasure to the occasion to have Dr. John W. Wood represent the Board of Missions, who, in an impressive address, formally presented the buildings to the school. It should be remembered that what the Church calls Saint Paul's College is really two schools, situated eight miles apart, namely, the middle or high school, under military training, opposite Holy Trinity Cathedral, and the college proper at Ikebukuro. There were, in the year 1919, seven hundred and twentyfive students in the middle school, an increase of fifty students over the preceding year. This is the limit the government permits us to take because of cramped quarters, originally intended for two hundred and fifty students. Of this year's graduates, forty-four have entered Saint Paul's college department, three of whom are candidates for Holy Orders. The evangelistic work had been very satisfactory. The volunteer Bible classes held at the noon-day hour have had an average weekly attendance of two hundred and seventy-five students. There have been thirteen baptisms. During the past year, an alumni association has been formed with eight hundred and seventy-eight charter members. We hope that Saint Paul's with the fine

reputation it has already made as a Christian institution, may be the means of moral and spiritual uplift to the empire of Japan, through the men that it graduates.

Saint Margaret's School has three hundred and fifty pupils. A number of the girls in the school were baptized and confirmed this year, and the morale of the school is excellent. We greatly need additional ground for new buildings, and for playground. The adjoining property is vacant at present, and may be had, I believe, if we can pay the price.

The kindergartens throughout the district send most encouraging reports. The number of pupils is larger than last year, despite the fact that the fees have been increased, in many instances, more than 50 per cent to meet the necessary increase in salaries on account of the high cost of living.

Saint Luke's Hospital. The erection of the new buildings for Saint Luke's Hospital has been postponed for two reasons, the first being the absence of Dr. Teusler who has been in Siberia for a year and a half as chief commissioner of the American Red Cross Association. The second reason is a more serious one, and is due to the prohibitive increase in price of materials and labor, making it necessary for us to have more than twice the amount we estimated and to which the Church so generously contributed four years ago. Because of the evacuation of the Red Cross from Siberia, Dr. Teusler has returned to Japan, and is now free to devote his whole time and energy to re-organizing the work at Saint Luke's Hospital and to taking steps for the immediate building of at least three of the units of the new hospital. It is our intention to build as much as our funds will permit, and to urge, at the same time, that the Church at home will give us the rest

The increased cost of that is needed. living in Japan, is shown by statistics, to be greater than that of any other country in the world. The demands for the extension of Saint Luke's are imperative. There has been for almost a year a written waiting list of more than twenty patients, urgently needing attention, for whom there has been no room in the present building. In many instances, patients who should have remained longer for convalescence, have been required to leave in order to make room for those waiting. Dr. Teusler should have the assistance of three other American doctors as soon as they car be had. The nursing staff is very inade quate, and the hospital cannot do it work until the training school for nurse is established in the new buildings fo which the land is waiting, but for which there is not money for building.

The thanks of the Church, especiall those of us living in the district o Tokyo, are due to Dr. McSaparran, whom Bishop Tucker lent to us to take Dr. Teusler's place during his absence.

Evangelistic Work. The evangelistic workers of the mission have worked faithfully and diligently, doing their best to meet the many opportunities given them notwithstanding the many disappointments caused by inadequate support and other assistance. Unless the Presiding Bishop and Council car come to our relief by largely increasi the salaries of our workers, both fore and Japanese, we shall have furt resignations, and consequent disaster the work we are trying to do for t. strengthening of the Kingdom of God i the empire of Japan. We have been ur able to employ graduates of our thec logical school, and these men hav taken secular positions at more tha twice the salaries they would have r ceived as catechists and clergymen. Ti C. M. S. have doubled the salaries of their clergy and catechists and the S. P. G. in some instances have more than

doubled the salaries of their Japanese staff. We cannot keep our workers unless we pay them a living wage which they are not receiving. If the laborer is worthy of his hire it is up to us to do something, for he is not getting it. Delay in raising salaries is sometimes urged on the ground that the present increase in prices is abnormal and temporary, and that we may expect a de-

cline again, but though there is a possibility of a slight fall in prices, no considerable decrease is expected by the majority of people, nor does the Japanese government expect any decrease as is shown by the increase in salaries of all its officials, and by plans for a further increase in the near future.

MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF MEXICO

The Missionary District of Mexico includes the Republic of Mexico. It has an area of 767,274 square miles and a population of 16,000,000. The district within its present bounds was established by the General Convention of 1904. Its bishop is the Right Reverend Henry Damerel Aves, D.D., consecrated in 1904.

The amount of the appropriation from the Board of Missions to the district is \$35,242. The appropriation aids in maintaining work in forty-four stations.

Report of the Bishop—1919

URING the year 1919 the Church's work in Mexico has come to the turning in the long lane of its endeavors to make headway in the face of the many adverse conditions incident to a seemingly chronic state of revolution: and this turning has brought to view a brighter and more assuring prospect.

By the successful efforts of the government to extend its reign of law and order, nearly all of the territory in which many of our native congregations have been for some years either behind the lines of the "enemy" or in the "No Man's Land" of contention, and therefore inaccessible, have been recovered to us. And although this recovery has returned to us many points of previously thriving work that are now largely depleted and impoverished, with homes, schools, and churches in a greater or less state of wreckage, the glad opportunity is given us to reach them once more, and to take up the task of their re-establishment.

Another promising feature of the "turning" is the marked change in the conditions of travel. While conditions of safety have not yet become all that might be desired, the days when train schedules were devoid of the element of time, and the passenger must crowd into, or climb on top of a freight car, with the feeling of uncertainty as to progress and destination, have, especially in the southern part of the republic, very largely passed; and here and there the comforts of the Pullman have replaced the democracy of the box-car.

Another very promising event of the

year has been the introduction before the National Congress by President Carranza himself, of a resolution for the amendment of several of the more restrictive features of the Reformed Constitution touching the regulation of education and religion, including the drastic article which forbids a foreignborn minister of any religious cult to exercise his ministry in Mexico. Though this legal ban is not lifted, there is the general belief that it will be in the due course of events; and in the meantime it is being largely ignored.

As touching more intimately the life and outlook of our native work, should be recorded the very satisfying effect of a change of policy decided upon some three years ago regarding our local administration. It has been for some time a growing conviction with the bishop that the spirit of "nationalism" which so largely actuated the motives of the first and third revolutions, and which the present government has so thoroughly impressed on the popular mind as the supreme need of the country, should be allowed to find a larger degree of expression in the affairs of our native Church. Pursuant to this conviction, and in a very gradual and natural way, our native ability has been given greater opportunities and responsibilities of administrative leadership than ever before. If such a policy needed, as an experiment, any conjectural or suppositional reasoning for its justification, it is in need of such no longer. The challenge of opportunity has been given to the natural native, and national pride, and the answer has come in the way of an intensified and aggressive interest, the revealing of a faculty for initiative, a larger degree of self-reliance, a profounder sense of responsibility, all of which have put into the work a new spirit and a deeper rooted life. In this there is no reflection, certainly, on the fine capabilities of our American helpers of the past or the present, for such an effect, it will be seen, is only natural. And if in the

future the call for foreign helpers is to be less loud than it has been in the past, the simple meaning of the fact will be that the native Church in Mexico, by the development of its executive capacities and leadership, is in less need of such help.

And apropos of this larger degree of self-dependence in the work, may be naturally anticipated a growing desire for a larger degree of self-support; and the results of our experimentation for the past two years by placing on the native field the specific responsibility for the support of at least one of its clergymen, has shown that such anticipation is justified.

In line with what I have just said is the further anticipation, which time will very soon make manifest, of the necessity for a native suffragan to share the burdens of the native field. For, through no fault of his, the bishop has come to the years of life when the long trips through the mountains, necessary to his visitations, will soon become impracticable. And it may here be noted that in consequence of the sympathetic approval given by the Board of Missions in its late conference with foreign bishops in Detroit, to such a proposition, tentatively offered by the bishop of Mexico, the preliminary plans have been laid for its prosecution, by the choosing at our next convocation of three nominees for such office, to be offered in due time to the House of Bishops for its option.

In the meantime the work in the field has its grave problematical difficulties, some of which are simple and others difficult by reason of the element of uncertainty that enters into them by reason of the problematical condition of the country. Certain it is that the havoc of revolution has occasioned considerable loss to our material equipment—a loss that must of necessity hinder us where it does not halt us in our work. Certain it is, also, that the clearing away of the smoke of strife in the territories of our past and present scenes of missionary work is revealing many

opportunities, both old and new, that are calling to us, with appealing challenge. And certain it is, moreover, that the field is in need of a considerable outlay for property and new buildings to satisfy the demands of a better establishment and a stronger development.

If this were all, our problem, in terms at least, would be simple. But this is not all. The fact that the country is not yet pacified; and the doubts, reasonable perhaps—especially in view of a coming presidential election—whether peace and stability are soon to prevail, places an ugly "if" in many of our problems. It has been with this consciousness of future uncertainty that my statement of our many present and future needs has been made out for the consideration both for the Board of Missions and the Nation-Wide Campaign. The conditional element is indeed there; and a postponement of many of the investments recommended will not be unwise. Nevertheless there are some problems in which the "if" is very small, and the needs, though not great, are very pressing, as may be seen by a brief survey of our more important institutional work.

House of the Holy Name. At our House of the Holy Name, Mexico City, a radical departure from its previous scope and character of work has been made. Under Miss L. Liprandi, a young Church woman of fine character, good educational equipment, and successful experience as a teacher, there has been in operation the past year a work that may be characterized by its scope as educational, industrial, social, charitable, and co-operative. With the help of staff of seven native teachers, Miss Liprandi is carrying on a commercial night school in which is taught accounting, stenography, typewriting, English, Spanish and arithmetic, together with an industrial school for women and girls, with day classes in dressmaking, millinery, drawing, artistic needlework and music. In connection with this there is a

woman's exchange, and the further cooperative feature of sewing for one another and for the poor. The night school, which gives opportunity for commercial training to young men and women who are occupied during the day, has had an enrollment of 108, with an average nightly attendance of thirty-eight, most of whom have paid a tuition of twentyfive cents a week. The average attendance at the industrial classes has been Three of the seven teachers employed receive no pay, and two receive only five dollars a month. social feature of the work consists of monthly literary and musical entertainments, and occasional exhibits and sales, in which the congregation of San José de Gracia takes an active part. Though a departure from past methods, it is believed that this work meets the general needs in a specific and very helpful And the fact that it represents the studied conception (slightly modified by the bishop) of the clergy and people of San José de Gracia as to how both the interests of the community and the Church can best be met, and their lively co-operation also, gives to the enterprise an interesting and promising The development of the character. work is limited to our present equipment and the capacity of the building. To our present equipment of thirty-six desk chairs, eleven typewriters, and two sewing machines, we need the addition of thirty desk chairs, six typewriters, and six sewing machines, together with several tables and other equipment for our industrial department, amounting in all to an outlay of some \$900.

The Mary Josephine Hooker School. Our Mary Josephine Hooker School, whose staff consists of Miss T. T. McKnight, principal, Miss Hester Van Arsdale, assistant, and four exceptionally good native teachers, has had during the year an average attendance of twentysix girls (together with twelve day pupils), which represents its full hous-

ing capacity. By consulting the schedule of appropriations it will be seen that the per capita overhead expenses here are exorbitantly high. The solution, which we have been unable to effect during the past years of revolution, must be by additional building, which will double the school's capacity, and will add comparatively little to its running expenses. The building fund (some \$9,000) now in trust with the Board, will be sufficient for this-or nearly so—and the work will be begun during the early months of the year 1920. But the school has the present urgent need of the equipment which was asked for in my estimate for 1920, and it is impossible for the school to successfully teach many of the subjects required by the government in the "normal grades" and in the department of domestic science, without this equipment.

Let me say here that Miss Hester Van Arsdale, who came in April, with her fine educational ability, quiet enthusiasm and great capacity for hard work, is appreciated as a very valuable acquisition.

House of Hope Hospital. During the past year our House of Hope Hospital, Nopala, has been under the efficient management of Mrs. Samual Salinas, who has been a faithful "mother" to the institution from its beginning. Srta. Chagoyan, our native graduate nurse, has given excellent service; and Dr. Vara, a railway physician of the government, has, at small cost, given the hospital stated visits on two days each week, and answered calls of emergency. This temporary arrangement has not been entirely satisfactory: and it is a pleasure to state that, at the present writing, a resident, American physician and surgeon, Robert C. Macy, M.D., is on the ground. Dr. Macy has strongly urged (what disturbed conditions have previously prevented) the furnishing of the hospital with baths and other modern sanitary conveniences. As we have our own large reservoir of water near to

and at a higher level than the hospital, this can easily be done, with the installation of three stationary bath tubs, three modern toilets, and a septic tank, at a cost of some \$700. In this connection the doctor writes: "An important part of our work here is a practical demonstration in hygiene; and for that reason as well as for our own protection and convenience, I want to see these improvements made."

I would state here that Dr. Macy reached his field in time to meet the epidemic of influenza.

Saint Andrew's Seminary. The problem that gives us most anxious concern, because of its vital relation and importance to the future strength and development of our native work as a whole, is centered in our Saint Andrew's Seminary, at Guadalajara, which is our only source of ministerial supply, and which should be also, certainly, a school where our native young men, very few of whom can afford to attend the higher government schools, may be given the advantages of academic and commercial training that will fit them for the many opportunities of a broader and more ambitious life-work.

At this vital center of our Church's native interests, we have suffered more from the effects of revolution, than anywhere else. Some five years ago we lost by draft into the army all but two (since ordained) of our student body preparing for the Church's ministry, none of whom has returned. Later our preparatory department of some twentyfour boys, many of them orphans, had to be disbanded; and our little remnant was given quarters for six months in the vacated International College (Congregational) in the city, and was later housed in rented quarters. In June, 1919, the school, consisting of twelve young men, all students for the ministry, was moved back to its home in Colonia Seattle. During these past years, however, the school plant had been repeatedly sacked by night raids

of armed bandits. By these we lost the greater part of our school equipment and house furniture, including plumbing, windows, and electric wiring, our farming implements, our blacksmithing and carpentering tools, our stored harvests, our poultry, and much of our live stock.

The sum asked for in my schedule of needs for 1920, but which was not granted, was not intended or expected to cover all our losses and needed repairs; but it was considered sufficient to provide for present modest necessities, for the restoration of our preparatory department, and to enable the school to work the farm. And the hope is persistent that the Church will make a sufficient venture of faith to enable us to keep this very important plant in operation.

Xochitenco Schools. During the year two schools have been planted at Xochitenco on the eastern shore of Lake Tescoco, some twelve miles from Mexico City. These schools, one for girls, one for boys, have had an average attendance of one hundred, the limit of our present capacity. The girls school is held in our little church building (chancel curtain), and that for boys in a poorly lighted and meagerly equipped rented room. When it is said that sixty of these pupils have neither seats (except the floor and chancel steps) nor desks, the urgent need of equipment here will be realized. Both schools are conducted by graduates of the Hooker School, and Miss McKnight has directing supervision of the work. The future need is, of course, a commodious, modern school building.

Of course a present great need of the field, aside from the increased number of mission schools being petitioned for, is the enabling help to repair our damaged church buildings. And if the time has not yet come when this help may be "safely" given, it will be hoped that another year (1920) of progress towards

a stable peace will bring the necessary confidence.

Because of enforced inactivity, due to the legal ban placed on foreign ministers, the Reverend A. H. Mellen resigned his office as archdeacon of the native field at the close of last year, to accept the agency for Mexico under the American Bible Society. Of course this loss was keenly felt, for Archdeacon Mellen had been of invaluable service during the long and trying periods of frequent and protracted separation and isolation; and his services as treasurer of the district, and his faithful and ever ready co-operation and counsel were appreciated most highly by his bishop and his native brethren.

During the year Mr. George F. Miller has been giving to the Church his valuable services as treasurer for the Board.

On January 12th, 1919, the Reverend Samuel S. Salinas accepted the bishop's appointment as archdeacon of the native field. The full year and more of Archdeacon Salinas's services has revealed a fine administrative ability and untiring energy, and his recognized ability for leadership has met with a general spirited response from his brethren that inspires very hopeful confidence for the future.

The English-Speaking Field. The year has brought no very marked change to our English-speaking field. While a few foreigners are drifting back to the larger centers, their numbers are not sufficient to warrant a change in plans for meeting the anticipated demands of such return.

Our English-speaking work has been resumed at Tampico. The Reverend Eugene F. Bigler was placed in charge of the work there in October, too late in the year for any report more specific than one of general prosperity.

At Monterey (Saint Paul's Parish), where we have at present a dozen or more Church families, the vestry has been reorganized, the Church-school revived, and arrangements affected for oc-

casional ministrations by the Reverend Eugene F. Bigler, the Reverend Charles Cock, of Laredo, Texas, and by the bishop, under the kind hospitality of our Methodist brethren.

At Guadalajara, the foreign colony has been very acceptably ministered to by the Reverend Efrain Salinas.

At San Luis Potosi, the bishop has been able to hold one service.

At Pachuea, services have been occasionally held by the Reverend A. H. Mellen, and twice by the bishop, hospitality for such being kindly offered by our Methodist brethren.

At El Oro one service or more has been given by Reverend A. H. Mellen.

At Torreon one service was held by the bishop.

At Vera Cruz the bishop was able to give two services with large attendance.

At Christ Church, Mexico City, services have been regularly held by the Reverend A. L. Burleson, priest-incharge.

Finally let it be said that, notwithstanding the many difficult and hindering problems confronting the work, there exists in the field a spirit of unity, harmony, loyalty, and consecrated purpose that signals the presence of God's blessing under which nothing remains difficult. Henry D. Aves,

FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

January 1-December 31, 1919

THIS is the forty-eighth report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and the last one, for the next report of the Woman's Auxiliary will be

that of an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

There is naturally great temptation to linger over the nearly fifty years' history of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, to tell again the story of its organization in every diocese and missionary district of the Church at home and abroad, with over 1,100 diocesan officers, of its gifts through the years of over \$14,000,000, of its United Offering missionaries, of its more than 3,000 boxes yearly, of its hundreds of study classes; but especially would one like to speak of its leaders, and yet much of that story can never be put into words. What the Auxiliary owes to Bishop Lloyd for his leadership during twenty years can never be expressed. To his guidance in spiritual and practical affairs is largely due its ever widening grasp of opportunity. Its gifts of money, life, intelligent interest, prayer, have all grown, so that it has accomplished great tasks in these last twenty years and it stands today ready to undertake still greater things. Its newly created executive board in some measure expressed its appreciation of Bishop Lloyd in the following terms:

In recognition of the immeasurable debt of gratitude which the Woman's Auxiliary owes to Bishop Lloyd for his unfailing courtesy, inspiring interest, wise counsel and deeply spiritual leadership, we, the members of the executive board, desire now to tender to him in the name of the Auxiliary our heartfelt appreciation of all that he has given us, and our sincere regret that the discontinuance of his service as president of the Board of Missions must mean, in some measure, a curtailment of the sympathetic relationship which we have been privileged to enjoy under his guidance.

To him is largely due the true conception we have of the Church's Mission; under his leadership the contributions for missions have increased six-fold, and the coordination of all departments of Church work as embodied in Canon 58

has long been his cherished desire.

Realizing the inadequacy of any words to express our appreciation and gratitude for such leadership, we believe we can offer him no better proof of loyalty than rededication of ourselves to the supreme cause which is nearest to his heart.

We would, therefore, pledge him our profound intention to hold the Auxiliary loyal to the new organization which the Church has established for the achievement of Her whole Mission, and to carry into our new work to the utmost of our ability the principles and ideals which he has taught us to value and strive after.

The resignation of Miss Julia C. Emery, accepted by the Board of Missions December, 1916, was noted in the annual report of two years ago; but this final report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions would record the resolutions passed at the Triennial of 1919 in recognition of the service rendered by her and by Miss M. T. Emery, who resigned in February last.

WHEREAS: The Board of Missions has with great regret accepted the resignation of Miss Julia C. Emery as secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, after forty years of faithful service, and

WHEREAS: We feel that the growth of the Auxiliary and its usefulness have

been largely due to her untiring zeal and devotion, and

WHEREAS: She has endeared herself to us of the Auxiliary and to countless

men and women throughout the Church by her sympathetic interest and loving

counsel, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That we the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in triennial meeting assembled do place on record our grateful and loving appreciation of Miss Emery's labors in the cause of our Master, and be it further

RESOLVED: That a copy of this resolution be sent to Miss Emery and that it be placed on the minutes of the meeting.

Also WHEREAS: For forty-three years the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions has been blessed with the devoted services of Miss Margaret T. Emery, who has given the best years of her life to the work of Christ and His missions, with earnest endeavor and intimate knowledge of the needs of the ministry in the mission field, and

WHEREAS: With sympathetic delicacy she so dignified both giving and receiving, that through the length and breadth of the land the personal touch between those who contributed in filling boxes and the recipients was felt as an inspiration

through the spirit of her loving consecration; therefore
BE IT RESOLVED: That the appreciation of the Woman's Auxiliary be expressed through its members in session assembled at this Triennial of 1919 and conveyed to Miss Margaret T. Emery for the life of service which must beautify all her years.

Turning to the work of the past year, there are two principal matters to report —the part taken by the Auxiliary in the Nation-Wide Campaign, and the Triennial in Detroit in October.

With experience and power gained through The Advent Call of the year before, the Auxiliary seemed peculiarly ready to take its place in the Nation-Wide Campaign. One of the differences between the two efforts was that the latter was not alone a woman's undertaking, and for that reason it was impossible to lay down definite rules and methods from the Auxiliary's headquarters, and although a few definite suggestions were planned, these finally resolved themselves into the counsel to "do whatever the diocesan leaders of the Campaign request." Because the work in dioceses varied so much, it is impossible to report just what was done by the Auxiliary—its work ranged from little more than general interest to "saving the Campaign." Perhaps one of the best features of the work was the fact that the members of the Auxiliary served as members not of that organization, but of the Church.

To report adequately the Triennial, one of the most important ever held by the Auxiliary, would require more space than can be given. This report will attempt to give only the most important facts. Much preliminary work had been done by committees appointed at the Triennial in 1916, and to these committees were added others appointed in Detroit, so that the delegates owed much of the ease with which work was accomplished to the committees on Conference with the Board of Missions, on Programme, on Cooperation, on Despatch of Business, and those on the Reports of the General Secretary and Junior Secretary and that on the Fund for Saint Agnes's School, Kyoto. Mrs. Stevens, the president of the Michigan Branch, presided at all business sessions.

During the Triennium 1916-1919, \$70,000 for Saint Agnes's had been raised, and \$100,000 for the Church General Hospital, Wuchang. The fund for the hospital, indeed, was not undertaken by a committee of the Auxiliary, but so many members and branches contributed towards it and their interest in it was so keen, that it was reported by Miss Helen A. Littell, through whose efforts the largest part of the task was accomplished. At the great United Offering service \$468,060.41 was given for the training, sending and support of women for mission work at home and abroad, and for the care of such workers when sick or disabled. with \$5,000 to each of the following objects: the school for Navajo Indians at San Juan, New Mexico; the rebuilding of Auxiliary Hall at Valle Crucis, District of

Asheville; the school at Guantanamo, Cuba; and the chapel at Saint Hilda's School, Wuchang, in the District of Hankow, China.

A jubilee gift of \$50,000 to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary was voted, the interest of which is to be used for women missionaries on furlough. This gift is to be known as The Emery Fund in appreciation of Mrs. Twing, who, as Miss Mary A. Emery, was first secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, of Miss Julia C. Emery and Miss M. T. Emery. Five thousand dollars to complete the building for the Indian School at San Juan, as a memorial for Miss Mary E. Hart, the founder of the Little Helpers, was also voted.

The delegates had two general problems to face: first, the enlargement of the work of the Auxiliary; second, the possibility of cooperation with other societies of Churchwomen. The first was met by resolving to become Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, should the canon creating that body be passed, thereby adding religious education and social service to the accustomed work for missions; by undertaking larger educational policies; re-organizing the box work on Red Cross lines; planning to make the United Offering a contribution from all the women of the Church, and giving it the title of the *United Thank Offering*, and by replacing the general secretary by an executive secretary to be nominated triennially by the Auxiliary to the Board or Council, who should have an executive board to aid her in the direction of the work, and such other secretaries as might be needed.

The former general secretary was nominated by the delegates as executive secretary, and the executive board was formed by the election of Miss Eva D. Corey, Massachusetts; Miss Elisabeth R. Delafield, New York; Mrs. Marcellin Adams, Pittsburgh; Mrs. Loaring Clark, Tennessee; Mrs. Herman Butler, Chicago; Miss Edith Brent, Colorado; Mrs. John McE. Ames, Kansas, and Mrs. Louis F. Monteagle, California, representing the eight provinces; and Miss Elizabeth Matthews, Southern Ohio; Miss Nannie H. Winston, Kentucky; Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast, Pennsylvania; Mrs. Frederick B. Stevens, Michigan; Miss Lucy C. Sturgis, Massachusetts; Mrs. Arthur S. Phelps, New Jersey; Mrs. Hugh L. Burleson, South Dakota and Mrs. F. J. Foxley, Louisiana, representing the Auxiliary at large.

The Board of Missions was requested to dissolve the Junior department of the Woman's Auxiliary and to create a Junior Auxiliary until the newly proposed organization for children and young people, the Church School Service League,

might be formed.

The other important question, of cooperation, was met by the resolution to invite the other societies of Churchwomen having national organization—the Girls' Friendly Society, the Daughters of the King, the Church Periodical Club, the Guild of Saint Barnabas, the Church Mission of Help and the Churchwomen's Patriotic League—to join in creating a Church League of Service to be a federation of such women's organizations, for the purpose of appealing as never before to all the women of the Church in carrying forward the whole work of the Church. A report of this action was sent to General Convention.

In view of such a League being formed, the Auxiliary endorsed a National Council with provincial, diocesan and parochial committees, and elected Miss Delafield, Miss Sturgis and Miss Matthews as the representatives of the Auxiliary on this Council. It was also voted that the service of presentation of the next United Thank Offering should be arranged by the National Council of the Church Service League.

Since the Triennial, at its last meeting, held in New York December 10, 1919, the Board of Missions appointed the executive secretary nominated by the dele-

gates of the Woman's Auxiliary, and re-appointed Miss Tillotson as educational secretary and Mrs. Biller as organizing secretary.

On December eleventh at the second meeting of the Presiding Bishop and Council, held at the Church Missions House, Bishop Gailor was authorized to thank the Auxiliary for the continued activity and support promised by it as "the

Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council."

The executive board of the Woman's Auxiliary held an informal meeting in Detroit on October eighteenth, and organized with the election of Miss Corey as chairman and Miss Matthews as secretary and held its first regular meeting in New York on December eleventh. Miss Brent withdrew from her position as representative of the Sixth Province on the executive board. By-laws were adopted; standing committees on the United Thank Offering, appointments under that Offering and publications were adopted; and an advisory committee to the educational secretary was appointed. Mrs. Powell Clayton, who had had large experience in the Red Cross work in Tennessee, explained the re-organization of the box work of the Woman's Auxiliary along those lines, and was asked to put the plan into operation from headquarters.

The representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary on the National Council of the Church League of Service, attended its first meeting, held at the Church Missions House on December twelfth, at which time the name of the League was changed to the Church Service League, and the executive secretary of the Woman's Aux-

iliary was added to the members at large.

So the last year of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was marked by preparation for important changes, and at the beginning of its work as an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council the Woman's Auxiliary faces its tasks in a spirit of eager anticipation, induced not by changes in its machinery, but by the realization of those great facts represented in the words, "responsibility," "opportunity," "a wonderful future"! For we are facing these, created not only by conditions in the Woman's Auxiliary, not only by the new outlook for women's work, not even alone by conditions in the Church, but also by reason of the age in which we live. Today we are called upon to take our place in the great reconstruction time of the world, and as surely as we believe that the new civilization must be built upon the Rock, so surely will we do our part to see that the women of the Church accept their responsibility. For the Woman's Auxiliary of today has it in its power to be a tremendous influence. Surely the Church is going to save civilization, for out of these days of unrest may well come the time of which Francis Thompson sang in Lilium Regis, his Apostrophe to the Church:

O Lily of the King! low lies thy silver wing,
And long has been the hour of thine unqueening;
And thy scent of Paradise on the night-wind spills its sighs,
Nor any take the secrets of its meaning.
O Lily of the King! I speak a heavy thing,
O patience, most sorrowful of daughters!
Lo, the hour is at hand for the troubling of the land,
And red shall be the breaking of the waters.

Sit fast upon thy stalk, when the blast shall with thee talk,
With the mercies of the King for thine awning;
And the just understand that thine hour is at hand,
Thine hour at hand with power in the dawning.
When the nations lie in blood, and their kings a broken brood,
Look up, O most sorrowful of daughters!
Lift up thy head and hark what sounds are in the dark,
For His feet are coming to thee on the waters!

JUNIOR REPORT

THE year 1919 has been an eventful one in the life of the Junior Auxiliary. In the year it grew from the child of the Woman's Auxiliary into a life of its own. This grown-up existence was brief. For one of the first things done by the Presiding Bishop and Council was to place the Junior Auxiliary in the Department of Religious Education. Thus, again it became a child, but we believe that it will rapidly attain its full growth through merging into the Church School Service League.

In December, 1918, I presented the plan of what is now the Church School Service League to the Board of Missions. As the Board commended it, the same was presented to the General Board of Religious Education on January 30, 1919. This Board also took favorable action. The Joint Commission on Social Service took no formal action but expressed its approval of the plan as outlined. The next step was the holding of an informal conference in Boonton, New Jersey, to consider the question. This resulted in the request to each of the general Boards to appoint a representative to confer with the Junior secretary on formulating plans for the development of the Church School Service League. This request was granted and a committee formed. The committee had numerous meetings but took no formal action until it presented a recommendation to the Presiding Bishop and Council asking that body to form a Commission of the Church School Service The Presiding Bishop and Council decided otherwise and placed the Junior Auxiliary and the Church School Service League in the Department of Religious Education, appointing me a secretary in the Department. Thus the committee was automatically dissolved.

A great impetus was given the "Junior Plan" when the Board of Missions sanctioned its work in the five fields of service. From a questionnaire sent out in

April, we found that many dioceses reported progress.

Twice during the year I visited the five Church schools in Detroit that were appointed in 1918 to be the demonstration schools for General Convention. They were most successful and helpful in showing how various types of schools could

adopt and adapt the plan of the Church School Service League.

In February a group of men and women met to consider the advisability of producing a course of graded missionary study for use in the week-day session of the Church-schools. As a result, Dr. Bradner, representing the General Board of Religious Education, was asked to confer with the Junior secretary in regard to producing a course. The secretary appointed three committees for three different grades. The primary committee issued *Down the Garden Path* which was published. Through various unfortunate circumstances the other two committees failed to produce any material.

A committee has been formed and is now working on new material for the combination of the Little Helpers and the Font Roll which is now in The Little

Helpers Department of the Church-school.

During the year I visited and held institutes in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Long Island, New York, Newark, Michigan and Massachusetts. I had a class at the summer school of Wellesley, Geneva, Racine and Sewanee. I attended three sessions of the primary council of the General Board of Religious Education and served on the national commission of the Church-school programme of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The most important part of my report has been left to the last. This is most

fitting for it ends the last report of the last Junior secretary.

Detroit will always stand for great things in the hearts of all Juniors. It was the goal toward what we looked for three years and the result well justified our expectations.

The "School of Methods"—where the General Board of Religious Education combined with the Juniors in presenting the Sunday and Week-day expression work; the wonderful exhibit contributed by dioceses from every part of the country, the conferences, meetings and delightful entertainments are well known to those of you who were present.

The momentous thing for us was the action taken upon the report of the Junior secretary by the Woman's Auxiliary as follows:

1. That the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be separated

from the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary.
2. That the Junior Department shall be the Junior Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, or in the event of the passing of the proposed Canon 58, it shall be the Junior Auxiliary of the Executive Committee of the Church.

3. That the diocesan officers of the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary shall cease to be the diocesan officers of the Junior Department, and shall become the diocesan officers of the Junior Auxiliary to the Board of Missions or the Executive Committee of the Church. Except that one junior officer in each diocese or missionary district shall be retained as a member of the Woman's Auxiliary Board in order to keep the Woman's Auxiliary in touch with the Junior Auxiliary

to the Board of Missions.

4. That if the Junior leader is to be kept on the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, one of the officers of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary should

also be put on the Executive Board of the Junior Auxiliary of the diocese.

5. That it shall be the purpose of the officers of the Junior Auxiliary to merge that organization as speedily as possible into the Church School Service League, conducted under the National Central Committee, the Provincial Central Committee. mittee and the Diocesan Central Council.

6. That the very grateful thanks of the women of the Auxiliary be given to Miss Frances H. Withers for the thorough and comprehensive plan she has developed and inaugurated for the Juniors of the Church in all fields of Christian education and service.

And so the end of my report goes back to the beginning. The Juniors have lost their lives for the sake of finding it. They have been the pioneer society in working for the five fields of service. The whole Church is now following their lead. Surely they can feel that in losing their identity as the Junior Auxiliary in the larger field of the Church School Service League, is well worth the price paid in the contribution they have made to the Church.

It has been my privilege heretofore to be the leader of the Junior Auxiliary. As the chairman of the national commission of the Church School Service League I shall still be a leader of those working with young people. Here in the Department of Religious Education I am in a better position than ever to help and assist them in every way possible so that the rough way may be made smooth and the obscure be made clear.

Praying that God will bless them in the new work as He has in the old, I close my last report as secretary of the Junior Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

C.; \$5,000 for the school at San Juan, N. M.; and \$5,000 for the chapel at Saint Hilda's School, Wuchang.

ACT OF INCORPORATION

Act of Incorporation of 1846, as amended by L. 1867, Ch. 374, passed April 12, 1867, and as amended by L. 1880, Ch. 226, passed May 8, 1880.

Снар. 331

An Act to incorporate The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

Passed May 13, 1846, by a two-thirds vote.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- § 1. All such persons as now are or may hereafter become members of The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, originally instituted in the year eighteen hundred and twenty and fully organized by the General Convention of the said Church in the year eighteen hundred and thirty-five, shall be and are hereby constituted a body corporate for the purpose of conducting general missionary operations in all lands by the name aforesaid. Nothing herein shall affect the power of the said convention to make such rules and regulations or so to alter or amend the constitution of the said society, as the said convention shall deem necessary or proper to promote the purpose for which the said society is incorporated as aforesaid. (As amended by L. 1880, Ch. 226.)
- § 2. For the object designated in the first section of the Act generally, or for any purpose connected with such object, the said corporation shall have power, from time to time, to purchase, take by gift, grant, devise, or bequest and hold real and personal estate, and to sell, lease and otherwise dispose of the same, provided the aggregate clear annual income of such real estate at any one time held, shall not exceed the sum of thirty thousand dollars. The corporation hereby created is declared subject to the provisions of chapter three hundred and sixty of the laws of one thousand eight hundred and sixty, entitled "An act relating to wills." (As amended by L. 1867, Ch. 374.)
- § 3. The said society shall, in its usual annual printed report, state the amount of its real and personal estate, and the income arising therefrom: a copy of which report shall be deposited in the State Library.
- § 4. This corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions contained in title third of chapter eighteen of the first part of the Revised Statutes so far as the same are applicable and have not been repealed.
- § 5. This Act shall take effect immediately, and the Legislature may at any time alter, modify or repeal the same.

CANON 57.

Of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society.

The Constitution of the said Society, which was incorporated by an Act of the Legislature of the State of New York, as from time to time amended, is hereby amended and established so as to read as follows:

Constitution of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as established in 1820, and since amended at various times.

Name.

ARTICLE I. This Organization shall be called The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and shall be considered as comprehending all persons who are members of the Church. The Presiding Bishop of the Church shall be, ex officio, the President of the Society.

Board of Missions for Missions for the purpose of discharging the corporate duties of the Society.

constitution of Board. S II. The Board of Missions shall be composed of forty-eight elected members, of whom sixteen shall be Bishops, sixteen shall be Presbyters, and sixteen shall be Laymen. Eight of said Bishops, eight of said Presbyters, and eight of said Laymen, shall be elected triennially by the General Convention of the Church. Eight Bishops, eight Presbyters, and eight Laymen shall be elected triennially by the several Provincial Synods at the last meeting of the respective Synods prior to the triennial meeting of the General Convention, the Synod in each Province choosing to represent the Province upon the Board of Missions, one Bishop, one Presbyter, and one Layman. The persons so chosen may be residents within the limits of the Province, or all or any of them, at the option of the Synod, may be chosen at large. The persons chosen by the Provincial Synods shall become members of the Board upon certification of their election to the Secretary of the House of Bishops, and to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, not later than the

Vacancies How Filled. bers of the Board shall remain in office until their successors are elected. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur through the death, resignation, or removal of any member elected by the General Convention save when such vacancy shall occur within three months prior to a meeting of the General Convention. In case the Provincial Synod in any Province shall fail to elect one or more members to represent it on the Board, or in case a vacancy occurs in the representation of any Province at any time, the Board shall have the power to fill said vacancy or vacancies until such time as they shall be filled by the Provincial Synod or Synods. The three members of the Board representing each Province shall in the year 1913 be the members elected by the Missionary Councils immediately preceding the meeting of the General Convention of that year, and shall hold office until the General Convention of 1916, and until their successors are elected.

President of the Board. Officer of the Board of Missions, who shall be styled the President of the Board of Missions, and shall be, ex officio, a member thereof. Bishops, Presbyters and Laymen shall be eligible for said office. If a Bishop

be chosen he shall resign his jurisdiction (in accordance with Section 5 of Article II. of the Constitution), or make suitable provision for its care. Should he resign, a special jurisdiction may be assigned to him by the Presiding Bishop or by the House of Bishops. The person chosen shall hold Term of office for six years, unless in the meantime he shall resign or be removed by the General Convention by a majority vote of each House, the House of Deputies voting by Orders; but he shall be eligible for re-election. The salary of the President of the Board of Missions shall be fixed and paid by the Board and shall not be diminished during his tenure of office. Upon reaching the age of sixty-five, the President may Provision for Pension on Retirement. be retired and entitled to receive from the Board an annual pension of one-half the salary of which at that time he shall The President of the Board shall have his headquarters in the be in receipt. Church Missions House, and shall be the executive head of the Board and its presiding officer.

In Case of Vacancies Board May Elect.

If the office of President shall become vacant between sessions of the General Convention, the Board may elect a President, who shall hold office until the General Convention elects The Board of Missions may in its discretion elect from among its members a Vice-President and prescribe his duties, or any other communicant of the Church, whether clerical or lay, may be so elected and shall become, ex officio, a Member of the Board.

\$ IV. The Bishops of this Church, other than those chosen for active membership, shall be honorary members of the Board, with all the rights and privileges of the elected members, except the right to vote.

Budget to be Submitted. § V. At the General Convention of 1919 and at each subsequent Convention the Board of Missions shall submit a budget for the ensuing year, and a provisional estimate for each of the succeding two years. The budget and estimate, and the report of the Board of Missions hereinafter required, shall be considered by the two Houses of General Convention in Joint Session assembled. Such Joint Session shall begin on the first Monday of the Convention, and shall continue for three consecutive days, or such part thereof as shall be necessary for the consideration and disposition of such budget and estimate and of such report, and for the consideration also of general questions of missionary policy and action. A report of action by the Joint Session shall be made to each of the two Houses for such concurrent action as may be necessary.

Meetings. § VI. The Board shall hold four regular meetings in each year. Special meetings of the Board may be held in pursuance of resolutions of the Board or may be convened by the President. It shall be the duty of the President to call a special meeting whenever thereunto requested in writing by three members of the Board in each Order.

Executive Committee.

The Board shall choose from its own membership an Executive Committee, to which large discretionary powers may be delegated. The President of the Board shall be, ex officio, Chairman of said Committee. The Board may organize auxiliary associations to co-operate with the Board in the furtherance of the missionary work of the Church. The

By-laws. Board may also enact all necessary by-laws for its own government and for the government of its officers and of the Executive Committee, subject always to the provisions of this Canon.

Quorum. § VII. For ordinary purposes, ten active members shall constitute a quorum, but for the election or removal of Officers and Committees, for the making of the annual appropriations or for changing the By-laws, a majority of the active members must be present at a meeting.

Treasurer. § VIII. Each General Convention shall elect a Treasurer of the Board of Missions, who shall hold office for three years, and shall be, ex officio, a member of the Board. Said officer shall be removable by a two-thirds vote at any meeting of the Board of Missions.

Secretaries. § IX. Upon the nomination of the President of the Board of Missions, the Board shall elect such Secretaries as may be necessary, who shall perform such duties as the President of the Board shall assign to them. The persons so elected shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board of Missions, or until their successors are chosen.

Assistant Treasurer shall nominate an Assistant Treasurer to be elected by the Board of Missions and to hold office during its pleasure, or until his successor is appointed. The Treasurer and the Assistant Treasurer shall give bonds in such amounts as the Board of Missions may deem necessary.

§ XI. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the office of Treasurer between the sessions of the General Convention, the Board of Missions shall appoint a successor to act during the unexpired term.

Salaries. § XII. The salaries of all the Secretaries and of the Assistant Treasurer shall be fixed by the Board of Missions. The Treasurer shall serve without compensation. The Secretaries, the Treasurer and the Council of Assistant Treasurer shall constitute a Council of Advice for

the President. The scope of the powers of the Council shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Board.

§ XIII. Each Provincial Synod shall have the right:

First: To elect, subject to the approval of the Board of Missions, a Provincial Secretary who shall work under the direction of the Board, and whose compensation shall be fixed and paid by said Board. He shall hold office during the pleasure of the said Board.

Second: To elect as members of the Board of Missions a Bishop, a Presbyter, and a Layman, to be the representatives of the Province.

Third: To promote the holding of Missionary Meetings and to take all such measures to foster missionary interests within the Province as are not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention or of any Diocese or Missionary District within the Province.

Apportionments in Gross. § XIV. Each Province shall have the right to require that the Board of Missions in making an annual apportionment shal. make such apportionment in gross for sub-division by the Provincial Synod thereof, as the said Synod may determine.

Required. ARTICLE III. § I. The Board of Missions so soon as practicable after the close of each fiscal year shall make and publish a full report to the Church of its work. This report shall contain an

account of receipts and expenditures, and an exhibit of all trust funds and other resources of the Society.

The Board shall make a like report to each General Convention, which report shall include also a detailed statement of the salaries paid to all principal officers.

§ II. The Board of Missions shall also make frequent report to the Church at large alike of its transactions as a deliberative body and of the progress of its enterprises; so that all the members of the Society may be the more earnestly moved to intercessory prayer and generous giving.

Committee to Arrange for Addresses and Meetings.

Missionary Society, shall be appointed by each General Convention, to arrange with the Missionary Bishops and others to address joint sessions of the two Houses of the next following General Convention, upon the needs, conditions, and opportunities for Church extension in the several fields. This committee shall also arrange for the holding of public missionary mass meetings at the time and place of the General Convention, in consultation with the local committee of arrangements therefor. The report of this committee shall be submitted for approval at the opening of the joint session provided for in this Article.

Right of Officers to the Floor at Joint Sessions of General Convention.

Treasurer, the Assistant Treasurer, and the Provincial Secretaries, shall have the right of the floor at all Joint Sessions of the two Houses of the General Convention at which missionary matters are under discussion, and when such matters are under discussion in the House of Deputies the President and Vice-President shall likewise have the right of the floor.

Missionary Conferences.

ARTICLE IV. § I. The Board of Missions shall, from time to time, arrange, through its officers, for holding Missionary Conferences, for the systematic study of Missions, and for arousing among the people greater missionary zeal. These Conferences shall be held in various parts of the country, under such regulations as the Board may deem proper. The Missionary Conferences may pass advisory resolutions, and may memorialize or petition either the General Convention or the Board of Missions at any time.

- Responsibility for the Missionary Work of the Church is a responsibility resting upon all members of the Church, as individuals, and in their collective capacity as Congregations, Dioceses or Missionary Districts.
- (b) It is the duty of each Bishop and of each Minister in charge of a congregation to make known the needs of the work to the people in his Diocese or Congregation.
- Offerings. (c) Every congregation of this Church shall make at least one annual offering for the missionary work of the Church, and each Minister in charge of a congregation and the lay officers thereof shall use all diligence

to secure each year the funds required by the Board of Missions for the spread of Christ's Kingdom, at least to the amount of the apportionment for the year.

Salaries of Missionary Districts shall be paid from the treasury of the Society. The salaries shall, in all cases, date from the time of their consecration, or from the date of their translation, if already consecrated, and shall not be diminished, in any case, during the official connection of the Bishop in question with the Board of Missions, except with the consent of said Bishop. Collections made by the people of Missionary Districts for the support of their Bishops shall be reported to the Board and accounted contributory to the salaries of the said Bishops.

Termination of Relation to the Board. \$ II. Whenever the Board shall be satisfied of the ability of a Missionary District to support its Bishop with a salary not less than that provided for at his consecration, the relation of such Bishop to the Board of Missions may be terminated by said Board.

Contributions to be Reported. § III. Every Bishop of a Missionary District shall make an annual report to the Board of Missions of the funds received for the work of his District, together with a specification of all disbursements thereof made by him or under his direction. This report shall include a statement of the funds received directly by the Bishop, by Trustees (whether incorporated or unincorporated), or by any local fiscal officer, and whether received from the treasury of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society or from any other source. For the making of such report, the Treasurer of the Board shall provide suitable blanks prepared in conformity with a uniform system of accounting which the Board of Missions shall establish for all Missionary Districts.

Appropriations. ARTICLE VI. § I. In all organized Dioceses and Missionary Districts having Bishops in the Domestic field, the Board of Missions is authorized to make annual appropriations to be disbursed by the Bishops with the approval of the Standing Committee, Council of Advice, or Board of Missions of the Diocese or District, and whenever any of said Bishops may so Purposes to Which elect, the Board of Missions shall act as above provided, inApplicable stead of such Standing Committee Council of Additional Standing Cou stead of such Standing Committee, Council of Advice or Board of Missions; Provided, that no part of such annual appropriation shall be expended for any other purpose than the support of Missionaries, or the supply of Mission Stations with clerical service, without the concurrence of the Board of Missions; and an itemized account of the expenditure of any Account of Exappropriation received by a Diocesan Bishop shall be made by penditures to be Made. him annually to the Board of Missions; and, Provided, that in the management of the Foreign Missions, the Bishops shall have as their Council of Advice the Board of Missions for the general sched-Council of Advice ule of expenditures; but for the details of the local work, for Foreign Missions. they may have as their advisers the Council of Advice of their respective Districts.

Foreign Missionary SII. In the management and general expenditure of the Advice and Consent Foreign Missions, the Bishop shall act with the advice and consent of the Board of Missions.

Who May be Appointed ary, who is not, at the time, a Minister in regular standing of this Church, or of some Church in communion with this Church, or a member thereof. But nothing in this Article shall preclude the Board of Missions from employing for work not directly religious, according to their discretion, and at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese or Missionary District, other persons not so qualified.

Amendment Article VIII. § I. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time by the General Convention of this Church.

Alterations or Amendments, of the General Convention, so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this Canon and of such amended Constitution, are hereby repealed; Provided, however, that nothing herein shall in any manner impair or affect any corporate rights of the said Society, or any vested right whatever. § III. This Canon shall take effect immediately.

CANON 51.

Of Provinces

Subject to the proviso in Article VII. of the Constitution, the Dioceses and Missionary Districts of this Church shall be and are hereby united into Provinces as follows:

The First Province shall consist of the Dioceses within the States of Maine,

New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.
The Second Province shall consist of the Dioceses within the States of New York and New Jersey, and the Missionary District of Porto Rico.

The Third Province shall consist of the Dioceses within the States of Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the Diocese of Washington.

The Fourth Province shall consist of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee and Kentucky.

The Fifth Province shall consist of the Dioceses within the States of Ohio,

Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The Sixth Province shall consist of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

The Seventh Province shall consist of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and

New Mexico.

The Eighth Province shall consist of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregan, Nevada, California, Arizona, the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, and the Missionary District of the Philippine Islands.

- § 2. When a new Diocese or Missionary District shall be created wholly within any Province, such new Diocese or Missionary District shall be included in such Province. In case a new Diocese or Missionary District shall embrace territory in two or more Provinces, it shall be included in and form a part of the Province wherein the greater number of Presbyters and Deacons in such new Diocese or Missionary District shall at the time of its creation be canonically resident. Whenever a new Diocese or Missionary District shall be formed of territory not before included in any Diocese or Missionary District, the General Convention shall designate the Province to which it shall be annexed.
- § 3. For the purposes of the Province the Synodical rights and privileges of the several Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the Province shall be such as from time to time shall be determined by the Synod of the Province.
- § 4. The representative body in the Province shall be a Provincial Synod composed of all the Bishops residing within the bounds of the Province having seats in the House of Bishops of the General Convention, and Clerical and Lay Deputies chosen by the several Dioceses and Missionary Districts. Each Diocese and Missionary District shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen. The Bishops may sit and deliberate in council separately whenever they may deem it necessary.
- § 5. The President of each Provincial Synod shall be one of the Bishops of the Province elected by the Synod by the concurrent vote of the three orders and by a plurality in each order. He shall hold office for such term as the Sy 10d may determine.

- § 6. The Provincial Synod when duly organized shall have power (1) to enact ordinances for its own regulation and government; (2) to act as or to provide for (a) a Provincial Board of Missions, (b) a Provincial Board of Religious Education, and (c) a Provincial Board of Social Service, to be severally auxiliary to the general Boards having jurisdiction of these subjects; (3) to elect judges of the Court of Review; (4) to perform such other duties as may be committed to it by General Convention; (5) to deal with all matters within the Province, provided that no Provincial Synod shall have power to regulate or control the policy or internal affairs of any constituent Dioceses or Missionary Districts, and provided further that all actions and proceedings of the Synod shall be subject to and in conformity with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons for the government of this Church.
 - § 7. The President of the existing Missionary Council in each Department shall within one year after this canon takes effect summon the Primary Synod of the Province to meet at some convenient place within the Province
 - § 8. The Primary Synod, in addition to the Bishops, shall consist of four Clerical and four Lay Deputies from each Diocese and Missionary District in the Province, elected by its Convention or Convocation. In case there be no meeting of the Convention of a Diocese or of the Convocation of a Missionary District before the meeting of the Primary Synod, the delegates elected for the last Missionary Council shall serve.
 - § 9. The Primary Synod when thus convened, a majority of those entitled to seats being present, and when it shall have chosen its proper officers, shall be organized for business.
 - § 10. Upon the completion of the organization of any Province it shall be entitled to receive and there shall be transferred to it from the officers of the Missionary or Educational Department theretofore embraced within the territory of such Province, all of the records and the funds held by such officers, and thereafter such funds shall be devoted to the purposes for which the same were held by the Missionary or Educational Department.
 - § 11. The present organization of the Missionary Departments and of Department Boards of Religious Education, and all officers and committees elected or appointed by the same shall continue until the Provincial Synods are duly organized.

By-Laws of the Board of Missions of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America

ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, MAY 9, 1917.

AMENDED MAY 8, 1918. AMENDED DEC. 11, 1918.

ARTICLE I.

THE FIELD.

For the guidance of the Board it is declared that the World is to be regarded as the Missionary Field.

ARTICLE II.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of the Board shall be in addition to the President and the Treasurer as elected by the General Convention, certain Secretaries to be elected by the Board upon the nomination of the President; and an Assistant Treasurer to be elected by the Board upon the nomination of the Treasurer.

The President, when he deems it to be necessary, shall nominate to the

Board for election an additional Secretary, or Secretaries.

The President shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as are provided in the Constitution.

ARTICLE III.

MEETINGS.

1. The Stated Meetings of the Board shall be held in the City of New York at 9:30 A. M., on the second Wednesday in February, the second Wednesday in May, the first Wednesday in October, and the second Wednesday in December, unless some other time and place be determined upon at a previous meeting of the Board.

2. For ordinary purposes, ten active members shall constitute a quorum, but for the election or removal of officers and committees, for the making of annual appropriations, or for changing the by-laws, a majority of the active members must be present at a meeting. In the event of a quorum not appearing at any meeting, the members present may adjourn to any day before the next Stated Meeting of the Board.

3. When a special meeting is called, as provided for in the Constitution, notice of the same, specifying the particular object of the meeting, shall be sent by the Recording Secretary to each member of the Board at least ten days before such meeting.

4. The order of proceedings and business at the Stated Meetings of the Board shall be as follows, unless otherwise specially directed by the Board:

- Celebration of the Holy Communion. 1.
- Calling of the Roll. 2.
- 3. Reading and approving the Minutes.
- 4. 5. 6. Statement from the President.
- Report of the Treasurer.
- Report of the Committee on Trust Funds.
- 7. Report of the Committee on Audit and Finance.
- 8. Presentation of the Missionaries.
- 9. Report of Provincial Secretaries.
- 10. Report of the Council of Advice.
- 11. Report of the Executive Committee.
- 12. Receiving Communications.
- 13. Report of Recognized Auxiliaries.
- 14. Report of Special Committees.
- 15. Unfinished Business.
- 16. Miscellaneous Business.
- 5. The officers elected by the Board shall have a seat and a voice at all meetings of the Board but without the right to vote. They shall have the right to present for the consideration of the Executive Committee such matters as they desire.
- The Provincial Secretaries shall have a seat and a voice at all meetings of the Board but without the right to vote. They shall make reports at such times and in such form as may be directed by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV.

VOTING.

- 1. On the demand of five members, any vote shall be taken by the call of the roll and recorded.
- 2. No vote shall be taken on any proposal submitted by any person not an elected member or officer of the Board while that person is in the room.

ARTICLE V.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

- 1. The Executive Committee, provided for in the Constitution, shall consist, in addition to the President and Treasurer, of five Bishops, five Presbyters, and five laymen, to be elected at the meeting for organization, and annually thereafter at the December Meeting; at least one member of the committee shall be chosen from each of the Eight Provinces.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall meet on the Tuesday before the Stated Meetings of the Board, and on the second Tuesday in each other month except in the months of July, August and September. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Presiding Officer at his discretion.
- 3. The Executive Committee shall exercise all the powers of the Board in the interval between meetings, except that it shall not make appropriations for matters, other than those coming under the standing rules of the Board. exceeding in the aggregate \$10,000 between two meetings of the Board, unless specially authorized by the Board.
- 4. At each Stated Meeting of the Board, the Executive Committee shall make a complete report in writing of its acts since the previous meeting of the Board.
 - 5. Five members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI.

THE COUNCIL OF ADVICE.

1. The Council of Advice provided in the constitution shall be the advisers of the President, in the management of the office of the Board. After conference with the Council of Advice the President shall have power to provide for the payment of all obligations coming under the standing rules of the Board, and to arrange in cases of emergency for appointments and furloughs.

2. The President may also consult with the Council of Advice in all matters requiring action by the Board or its Executive Committee; and with regard to recommendations which it may seem necessary for him from time to time to bring to the Board or its Executive Committee concerning anything

connected with the Board's business.

3. The President, in consultation with the Council of Advice, shall have power to make necessary expenditures in connection with the business of the Board, for items not exceeding \$1,000, between any two meetings of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII.

THE COMMITTEE ON TRUST FUNDS.

The Committee on Trust Funds shall be elected at the meeting for organization, and annually thereafter at the December meeting. It shall consist of five laymen, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, and shall have the supervision, subject to the directions of the Board of Missions, of the investment and reinvestment of the Trust Funds now held or which shall hereafter be received by the Society, and shall see that the income from the said funds is paid over to the Treasurer from time to time, to be by him disbursed in strict conformity with the declared purposes of the several donors. Such funds, unless accompanied by special directions, shall be invested in such securities as are authorized by the State of New York for the investment of Savings Bank and other Trust Funds. All such securities and all money in the hands of this Committee awaiting use or investment shall be deposited with or placed in the charge and custody of such Domestic Trust Company, having its principal office in the City of New York, as the Board of Missions may designate, as hereinafter provided. Such Trust Company, under the advice and direction of this Committee, shall collect and pay over to the Committee the income of the securities, invest and reinvest the capital thereof, care for and properly protect the property, both cash and securities, committed to its charge, keep proper accounts for the Committee, and hold all said property at all times subject to the order of the Committee. No sales or transfers of any of these securities shall be made unless directed by a Resolution of this Committee or of the Board of Missions, and all such transfers, to be valid, must be signed by the Chairman of this Committee, and the President or Recording Secretary of the Board of Missions, the latter of whom shall attach the seal of the Society to the same. No money in care of the Trust Company awaiting investment shall be withdrawn except by checks, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of this Committee or in the absence of either or both by another member or other members of the Committee. This Committee shall keep an

accurate account of each Trust Fund separately, and shall make a full report in writing in regard to these funds to the Stated Meetings of the Board of Missions in October. This Committee shall keep full and accurate Minutes of their proceedings, which shall be duly recorded in books provided for that purpose, and such Minutes shall be submitted to the Board of Missions for its approval at each of the Stated Meetings. This Committee shall enter into such a written agreement with a Trust Company, to be designated by the Board of Missions, as shall protect the interests of the Society and its trusts, before committing to the custody of said Trust Company any of the aforesaid property; the compensation of the Trust Company for the services rendered, as hereinbefore prescribed, to be such a percentage of the income by it collected from the invested funds as from time to time shall be approved by the Standing Committee on Trust Funds.

ARTICLE VIII.

THE COMMITTEE ON AUDIT AND FINANCE.

The Committee on Audit and Finance shall consist of three members, to be elected at the meeting for organization and annually thereafter at the December meeting. It shall cause to be audited, monthly, the accounts of the Treasurer by an outside independent party, either an Audit Company or some well-known firm of certified public accountants. It shall cause to be audited, annually, the reports of the Committee on Trust Funds, and shall cause to be examined the funds, securities and property belonging to the Society. This Committee shall report to the Board at each of its stated Meetings.

ARTICLE IX.

THE TREASURER.

- 1. The Treasurer, or Assistant Treasurer, or Second Assistant Treasurer, shall deposit in such Banks, or Trust Companies, in the Cities of New York. Philadelphia or Boston, as shall be approved by the Board, on the recommendation of the Committee on Trust Funds, all moneys received by them; and the account in such Banks, or Trust Companies, shall be kept in the name of the Society. The said moneys so deposited shall be withdrawn on the check of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, or Second Assistant Treasurer, in accordance with the action of the Board of Missions or Executive Committee, but only upon the warrant, or with the countersignature of the President, or any one of the Secretaries.
- 2. The Treasurer, the Assistant Treasurer, or the Second Assistant Treasurer, shall be authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver in the name and in behalf of the Society, any and all receipts for gifts, contributions, bequests and legacies to the Society; and shall be further authorized to enter into an agreement or agreements and sign and execute any and all obligations of the Society, in the nature of refunding or indemnity, in cases where such agreements or obligations are required or necessary as a consideration of payment.

- 3. The Treasurer shall inform the Executive Committee at each Stated Meeting concerning the state of the Treasury, and shall present to the Board at each Stated Meeting a full and accurate account of the receipts and disbursements, and of the state of the Treasury. He shall have the temporary charge, custody, and oversight of any gifts, bequests, or securities, other than money, which may be intended for the use of the Society in its ordinary work. Said property of whatever kind shall be reported to the Board of Missions, with the ordinary reports of the Treasurer, and shall not be sold, or hypothecated for any purpose, except by the authority and order of the Board or the Executive Committee. He shall also have the custody of the Charter, Deeds, Leases, Bonds and Contracts of the Society, with the exception of the Trust Funds.
- 4. The Treasurer may nominate a Second Assistant Treasurer, to be appointed by the Board of Missions, to hold office during its pleasure. The Second Assistant Treasurer shall give bonds in such amount as the Board of Missions may deem necessary. In the performance of the powers and duties conferred upon him hereby, he shall be subject to the direction and control of the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer, and he shall perform such additional duties and services as may be required of him by the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer.

ARTICLE X.

THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

One of the Secretaries to be elected by the Board shall be designated the Recording Secretary, whose duty it shall be to see that due notice is given of all meetings of the Board, and of the Executive Committee, and to communicate all matters imposing duty on an officer, committee or member of the Board. He shall make full and accurate Minutes of all proceedings of the Board of Missions; which Minutes shall be duly recorded in a book, to be provided for the purpose, and read at the same or next meeting of the Board, to the end that any errors therein may be corrected and the record approved. The Minutes of the Executive Committee he shall likewise keep and submit at the next meeting of the Board of Missions, in the proceedings of which they shall be embodied so that there shall be one complete record. He shall carefully preserve the Minutes and records of the Board of Missions and Executive Committee, and deliver them to his successor, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him. The seal of the Society shall be in his custody and in all cases in which its use is directed by resolution of the Board or Executive Committee or by the provisions of these By-Laws it shall be affixed and attested by him or, in case of his necessary absence, by another Secretary to be designated by the President.

ARTICLE XI.

COMMITTEE ON UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Upon organization of the Board a Committee on Unfinished Business of three members shall be elected to serve for the three years to follow.

ARTICLE XII.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS TO FILL VACANCIES.

All vacancies in the Board, or in any of the offices thereof, shall be filled by a ballot at a Stated Meeting, subject to the provisions of the Constitution.

ARTICLE XIII.

ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any Stated Meeting of the Board at which a majority of the active members is present; provided that notice of such proposed alteration or amendment has been included in the notice of the meeting or given at the previous Stated Meeting.

ANNUAL TABLES OF CONTRIBUTIONS

This is the final report of the Board of Missions, which transferred on December 31st, 1919, all of its business to the Presiding Bishop and Council. The report follows for convenience in comparison the general form heretofore in use. Beginning with 1920 the record of the parishes and missions as to offerings for general missions will be kept by the diocesan authorities and this office will report only by dioceses.

From our records we have supplied the amount of the offerings recorded in the following tables, and this year's diocesan journals have given us the necessary statistics as to parishes and communicants. A summary will be found under the head of each diocese. A general summary will be found following the tables. If any errors or omissions are observed in the tables we will be grateful

for having our attention called to them.

For the year ending December 31st, 1919, \$1,424,997.27 was received from 5,869 parishes and missions upon the apportionment of \$1,590,000. This amount includes \$99,443.64 received from the One Day's Income Plan. Contributions from parishes were \$924,699.50. Individual gifts were \$154,540.11. The Sunday Schools gave \$243,751.47.

The gifts from the Sunday Schools demonstrates what can be accomplished by systematic offerings. The Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Auxiliary contributed \$102,006.19. Other receipts to meet the 1919 appropriations were from the United Offering of the Woman's Auxiliary, \$95,214.18; from interest we received, \$133,120.41; and from miscellaneous sources, \$31,772.73.

The Committee on Trust Funds begs leave to present to the Board of Missions the following report of the Trust Funds of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of Amèrica, which are in its hands. Each security is here reported at its par value unless otherwise stated, and the interest is reported at the rate borne by the security at the close of the fiscal year. Since the last report some securities have been collected and the money pending reinvestment has been deposited in bank at a lower rate of interest and new investments have been made at different interest rates than those borne by the securities paid off, changes also have been made in the interest rates on some of the securities still held by the committee, all of which affect the income of the funds invested in such securities and the "Interest paid to Treasurer" reported herewith is the net amount collected for each fund after deducting its proportionate share of the expenses incurred by the committee for services rendered in the custody and care of the securities and in the collections and payments made for account of the trust funds during the period covered by this report, December 31, 1918, to December 31, 1919.
